TURBINES ARE BACK!

- Corio Generation unveils plans for huge Inverloch windfarm

THE threat posed by the development of a huge offshore wind farm, as close as 10 kilometres from the coast at Inverloch, has not gone away.

The local community, including representatives of the South Gippsland-based lobby group, Responsible Renewables, heaved a sigh of relief on December 19 last year, when the Minister for Climate Change and Energy Chris Bowen declared a 15,000 square kilometre area, in three

zones, east of Wilsons Promontory, as suitable for offshore wind development.

At the same time, he declared that turbines would be placed no closer than 10km from the shoreline, previously 5km, anywhere along the Gippsland coast.

However, while he stopped short of declaring proposed development zones between Wilsons Promontory and Phillip Island as part of the ambitious rollout of renewable energy, he didn't rule it out.

"The area that I am declaring today will start 10 kilometres from the shore, not five kilometres as we previously consulted on, taking into account community feedback," said Minister Bowen at the time.

"Also, I am declaring the area east of Wilsons Promontory, not the area west of Wilsons Promontory today, in response to community concerns, environmental concerns and feedback.

"I look forward very much to working with Lily (D'Ambrosio) and the Victorian Government to further consider that area west of Wilsons Promontory over the coming 12 months to see if those community concerns can be dealt with and those environmental concerns can be dealt with."

So, consideration of development areas offshore from South Gippsland and Bass Coast is still very much a live issue.

This was confirmed last Thursday, February 2, by representatives of Corio Generation, a company owned by the \$150 billion Macquarie Group, when they attended a public information session in Inverloch to answer questions about their Great Southern Offshore Wind project.

"I can be very clear, we are not proposing a project that is offshore from the Prom or Waratah Bay... we are looking at a Bass Coast site and our preferred location is off Inverloch," said Development Director for the Corio project, Penny Pickett.

They outlined plans for a 1.5 gigawatt, fixed-bottom windfarm, of upwards of 100 turbines, each of them 360 metres high, along the Bass Coast, preferably off Inverloch.

Ms Pickett confirmed that water depths of up to 60 metres could be considered, but no closer than 10km from the shore, prompting a question from Inverloch resident, Chris Howard.

"We've heard that you are looking at a reef location, directly off Inverloch, 30 metres deep, as being your preferred location. Is that true?" asked Mr Howard.

"I couldn't say," Mr Pickett said.

According to a spokesperson for Responsible Renewables, Chelsea Taylor, such a location would make the turbines clearly visible from the Inverloch Surf Beach.

"Absolutely, we will see them without any problem at all. If you put them into context with our local windfarm at Bald Hills, those turbines are 120 metres tall and we can see them from many, many miles away," said Ms Taylor.

"If we have 360-metre-high turbines in the ocean, 10 kilometres offshore, we're going to know about it, not to mention all the environmental

considerations as well."

Ms Taylor said her group was perplexed to understand why Corio was out spruiking its proposal at Inverloch when the government hadn't even declared any development zones along the Bass Coast and South Gippsland coast, that these would still be under consideration for the remainder of 2023.

"I asked that question of the advisors that are here representing Corio today, the company associated with Macquarie Bank, and they advised me that it's up to the proponents to take the risk on of potentially lobbying the government to have these areas included."

Ms Taylor said that only a small amount of information was available about the Macquarie Bank proposal but noted that it was particularly concerning that they were considering a Bass Coast project ahead of any approval of development areas by government.

The decision by Corio to rule out locating their windfarm near the Prom or Waratah Bay is in line with statements by Minister Bowen in December last year.

Speaking on Gippsland ABC Radio, Minister Bowen said: "I've taken out that area west of Wilsons Promontory around

Waratah Bay, et cetera. I've just removed that area in total. That's the big change.

"So, basically all the area that was around that Waratah Bay, Wilsons Promontory area is out. There is an area which is much, much further out, about 40 kilometres out from that area, which remains in. And that was based on two things, community concern about visual amenity around that beautiful Wilsons Prom area, and also, we've still got work to do on the orange bellied parrot which may fly through that area."

Asked if she thought the Corio project, and how far it was advanced, would come as a surprise to many in Inverloch, Ms Taylor agreed.

"From what I can tell from my discussion with other community members is that there is a complete lack of awareness regarding what these proposals potentially mean and what they will look like from a visual perspective along the coast at Inverloch and the rest of Bass Coast and what the impact will be on the marine environment, where they will bring this facility on shore, how that will march over our land terms of connecting to the grid.

"So, there are many, many unanswered questions right

now."

The issue of 'why Inverloch' was raised by another Responsible Renewables member Tim Leroy who put it to the Corio representatives that relatively shallow sites in Port Phillip Bay, with strong wind profiles, close to the grid represented far better propositions than deeper sites off Bass Coast with no connection to the grid.

The Corio representative said they weren't looking at Port Phillip Bay.

"You're simply picking on a small, rural community, knowing it will be easier to get it through than if you look on a more populated area where you would soon lose your social licence for a project like this," Mr Leroy said.

The community will get another opportunity to ask questions about the proposed Great Southern Offshore Wind project at Wonthaggi next Sunday, February when Corio sets up a stand at the Rotary Market in Apex Park at Wonthaggi from 8am to 1pm.

Zero tolerance for anti-social behaviour

THERE is zero tolerance for anti-social behaviour, intoxication in public places and public order offending across South Gippsland and Bass Coast.

The warning comes as police and licensed venue premise employees have borne the brunt of poor behaviour over the holiday period.

"Poor behaviour will not be tolerated," Senior Sergeant Brad Steer stated.

"We encourage individuals to go out, have fun, but respect others and respect property."

Two individuals (a male and female) have been banned from licensed premises of late with both subject to additional criminal offences, and that is just two cases.

"Anyone intoxicated in a public place and anyone with open liquor in public will be charged. Likewise, public order and criminal behaviour offending will not be tolerated, and individuals will face charges.

"We are working with licensed premises and sporting clubs to educate people, but after 6-8 weeks of witnessing (and being the focus of) these anti-social behaviours increasing they will no longer be tolerated on any level anywhere across South Gippsland."

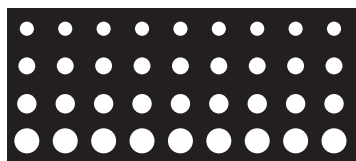
Young offender hands himself into police

The male has been charged with theft, assault and criminal damage.



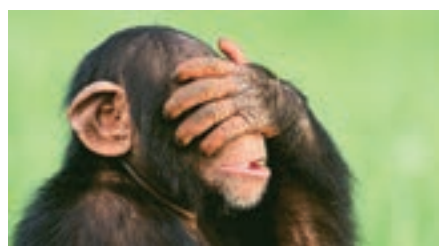

3mFM is updating its on-air name

SIMPLY put, 3mFM are one of the few remaining radio stations in the area to still have the Victorian designation “3” in their on air callsign. The commercial radio stations have all gone to a name that represents their image or have dropped the number. Smooth FM Sydney is actually 2PTV. The ABC is no longer 3LO / 3AR / 3GL they use Radio National, ABC Radio Melbourne, ABC Gippsland etc. South Coast FM represents the “South” of South Gippsland and the “Coast” of Bass Coast Councils. When? The station is to become South Coast FM at midnight on Saturday, February 11, 2023. Make sure you listen to hear how the new station name sounds on air!

Pub ceiling fell in after deluge

THE roof and ceiling of the Fish Creek Hotel simply couldn't cope recently when more than an inch and a half, over 40ml of rain fell in 10 minutes. However, while service in the pub's bistro was interrupted for the day, there's no indication they stopped drinking in the public bar. The tropical weather of last week also produced a meteorological phenomenon on Monday when a waterspout was photographed moving from Inverloch inland.

Change to permanent water saving rules

WESTERNPORT WATER has revoked Water Restriction By-law 105 and replaced it with Water Restriction By-law 106. According to Westernport Water, the new Model Water Restriction By-law is the same as the previous with two minor additions. The first of the two additions relates to Part B – Schedule

of Restrictions Category 6, which ‘encourage(s) the use of alternative water sources (such as recycled water) for dust suppression under all stages of restriction where it is practical, safe and reasonable to do so. The existing By-law only encourages the use of alternative sources under stage 4 restrictions.’ The second addition relates to ‘Category 3 – Using Supplied drinking water in Swimming Pools and Toys’. According to Westernport Water's website, ‘require residential and commercial pool and spa owners under stage 4 restrictions to submit a Water Use Plan if topping them up with anything other than a bucket or watering can. The existing By-law only allows top ups using a bucket or watering can under stage 4 restrictions. The change will encourage pool and spa owners to consider water efficient practices, such as using a cover, to help conserve water during restrictions.’ The ‘Schedule of Restrictions’ also outlines in more detail each of the four stages – including, Alert, Save, Just Enough and Critical across each of the eight ‘Category of water use’. The purpose of these changes is to promote the efficient use and conservation of water. - Expanded polystyrene drink containers.

These items join lightweight plastics bags, which are already banned across Australia, and applies to conventional, degradable and compostable plastics. People who need single-use plastic drinking straws due to disability or medical needs can still purchase and use these items.

Too high or not too high, that is the question

BEST man on the ground at the week-long Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) hearing into an application for a 42-unit, four-storey residential hotel at Inverloch, was the developer's legal counsel, Dominic Scally, a principal at Best Hooper Lawyers.

Mr Scally presented his client's case clearly and addressed the other side's arguments with the precision of a trial lawyer.

And he injected notes of humour and sarcasm in equal measure, at one stage accusing his opposite number, Barnaby McIlrath, for the South Gippsland Conservation Society, of "chasing another rabbit down a hole" over whether or not the venue would have a liquor licence.

"No application has been sought to sell liquor. It's not relevant to the proposal," he said.

It didn't hurt that Mr Scally praised the South Gippsland Sentinel-Times during proceedings for "getting it right" when reporting his own claims that the campaign against the project by the conservation group had been "an appalling disgrace".

But it was the calm, careful presentation by the Responsible Authority's lawyer, Maria Marshall, a partner at Maddocks, especially her cross-examination of the developer's expert witness, Tim McBride-Burgess, that may have won the day.

Only time will tell. Representing the Bass Coast Shire Council, Ms Marshall focussed her attention on the key point of the shire's case, that the proposed foreshore building is simply too high at 14.2 metres, 4.7 metres above the maximum height in the shire's Design and Development Overlay Schedule 10 (DDO10), uniquely applying to the old Inverloch Marine site.

"Is it important to have regard to the DDO10 as it only relates to a specific site? Do you think you should have had regard to that?" Ms Marshall asked the Forte Group's planning expert.



Opponents of the proposed four-storey residential hotel at Inverloch have cried 'foul' over the use of wide-angle or 'fisheye' photos which they allege have skewed the likely impact of the foreshore development.

Mr McBride-Burgess said the DDO10 was relevant but so was the fact that in surrounding residential areas (GRZ), 11 metres had been allowed.

He said the earlier planning panel did not have this new project in front of them when they recommended a 9.5 metre height limit, and he said it was reasonable for a key development site to deliver a building that was at least the height achievable in nearby residential areas.

"But I put it to you that you can't absolutely say that if you can go higher in a residential area, that it would automatically carry over into a Mixed Use Zone or a Commercial Zone, can you?" Ms Marshall said.

"No," said Mr McBride-Burgess, noting however that the proposed building was below the tree height and its impact was reduced by the design of the "nautical" design of building and setbacks.

Ms Marshall used case law

to argue that "special circumstances" needed to exist if the height limit of 9.5 metres was to be exceeded and Mr McBride-Burgess had to agree with the shire's advocate that no special "social utility" had been demonstrated or that there was anything "atypically excellent" about the building's architecture or urban design.

At the time the C124 amendment to the planning scheme was introduced, the independent planning said: "The Panel accepts that the site is a key site in the town centre and that any development of it should be carefully managed given its abuttal to the foreshore reserve. The application of a mandatory 9.5 metre height limit is considered appropriate at this location."

The only chink in the shire's height argument is that the height limit would only be considered "explicitly mandatory" if the planning schedule carried the words: "A permit cannot be granted

to construct a building or construct or carry out works which are in accordance with any requirements in a schedule to this overlay."

It doesn't.

So, while the shire mounted a strong argument that the residential hotel be limited to three storeys of 9.5 metres, it remains open to the VCAT panel to agree with Mr Scally and the Forte Group that it has been designed in the context of its foreshore location and within the scope of the shire's design controls and the realm of its planning scheme.

The VCAT panel, headed by Senior Member Laurie Hewet, will visit the site this coming week ahead of handing down its decision which the local conservation society argues will have far-reaching implications for future development in the town, not to mention dominating The Glade community park, the CBD and the foreshore.

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Two vehicle collision in Tarwin Lower

INVERLOCH-Venus Bay Road reopened just after 9pm on January 31 after a car collided with a truck near the intersection of Sparks Road around 4pm.

Families desperate for more childcare



New arrivals at the Phillip Island Early Learning Centre's 3-year-old kinder program open some great, healthy lunches under the supervision of early childhood educator Denise Szutta during back-to-school week last week.

THERE are 216 families on the Phillip Island Early Learning Centre's waiting list.

For a centre that has 250 families enrolled, 34 staff and as many as 176 children, aged six weeks to six years, under the roof at any one time, that's a lot. But they're not on their own.

Childcare centres across the region, across Australia, are in the same boat.

At the Karmai Community Children's Centre in Korumburra, built in 2017, and already expanded twice, they have a waiting list of 130 families.

The 8 per cent increase in fees last year, with more hikes on the way, is an issue but simply finding a place in childcare, after-school care, 3-year-old or 4-year-old kinder near where you live or work, at the right time, is a nightmare for many.

At Cowes, they are doing what they can, says campus principal Rod McKenzie, with the school community paying for two extra buildings to be constructed on the site to boost capacity at the main centre.

"We're already the biggest early childhood centre in Gippsland. It's an indication of how this area is growing," says Mr McKenzie, indicating the site could handle more kids with more facilities.

But the shortage of places and rising fees isn't even the biggest problem.

The biggest issue is not having enough early childhood educators to fill all the shifts.

So, essentially, some centres can't accept the kids they're allowed to take because they simply don't have the staff.

And it's not unusual for a centre to call a parent at work and ask them to come in and pick up their children early because they don't have anyone to fill the next shift, or can't reach the required staff-to-child ratio at a certain time.

Karmai Community Children's Centre presently has vacancies for Cert III and Diploma in Early Childhood Educators for their afternoon shift (2pm-6pm), for casual rotating shifts (6am-6pm) and their after-school program.

The centre has capacity for 120 children at the centre, an additional 35 in their after-school program and 44 in the before-school group.

They can even take Bachelor of Education undergraduates for the after-school program, where they are all school-age kids.

But, again, the story of staff vacancies is the same all over.

The State Government is responding this year with a range of measures, including offering free TAFE and vocational education and training for applicants from the start of January 2023.

Funding for additional centres and the implementation of free kinder for 3-year-olds and 4-year-olds are other initiatives, but it doesn't solve the staff crisis.

The State Government is hosting an education conference at the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre on Wednesday, February 15 that is expected to shed some light on the problems. The conference is also available online from 9am to 5pm.

It's a question of no playing the anthem

THE Bass Coast Council might be expected to field a number of questions at next week's council meeting about why the playing of the national anthem wasn't part of the program for the Citizenship Ceremony at the Wonthaggi Workmen's Club on Australia Day.

While a Phillip Island resident has alleged in his question to council that an official of the council insisted the anthem not be played, reportedly out of respect to First Nations' People, the Bass Coast Ratepayers and Residents Association has also weighed in.

From the association's president Kevin Griffin: "The Australian Citizenship Ceremonies Code advises the Australian national anthem (Advance Australia Fair) should be played. The failure of council to play the national anthem at the recent citizenship award ceremony should concern all councillors. What procedures will council put in place to ensure that such oversights are not repeated?"

Gippsland PHN releases climate change strategy

THE connection between climate change and health is the driver for Gippsland Primary Health Network's Gippsland Climate Change Adaption Strategy.

The paper endorses world, national, state and local climate change reports which argue the health impacts of climate change are "overwhelmingly negative" and that reducing emissions of greenhouse gases will improve health outcomes.

Gippsland PHN is offering grants of up to \$1000 to 22 Gippsland general practices to undertake an energy assessment which will allow them to measure their climate impacts and facilitate positive steps toward climate change mitigation.

Slow progress for housing needs

CALLS are being echoed locally for more housing following an alarming report which showed Victorians in desperate need of social housing are waiting far longer than the national average.

The Productivity Commission's Report on Government Services 2022 report, released in January, showed an average wait time of 17 months for 50 per cent of the greatest need households in Victoria.

The national average is six months.

The report also shows an increasing proportion of people accessing homelessness services are employed.

Another report, released by the Community Housing Industry Association (CHIA), revealed the areas suffering the most from housing stress.

The analysis by CHIA and the UNSW City Futures Research Centre based on census data has found 6 per cent of households in Melbourne and 5.7 per cent in regional Victoria, are not appropriately housed.

According to the data, for Bass Coast, the number of households with unmet needs (not being met by the housing market) was 1300, or 7.2 per cent as a proportion of all households.

Rental stress was identified as the top source of the unmet need at 68 per cent.

Projected need by 2041 showed that:

- No action – 1500 (estimate)
- Annual growth of current social housing required to meet need by 2041 - 9.1%
- Average annual new dwellings <100



Recent reports have highlighted the dire need for more social housing in Bass Coast and the wider Gippsland region.

For South Gippsland, the unmet housing need was at 600, with the projected need by 2041 estimated at 700 (if no action taken).

For the Latrobe-Gippsland region, the number of households with unmet needs was estimated at 7300.

Big Housing Build

The State Government's \$5.3 billion Big Housing Build, an investment in social housing, had \$1.25 billion dedicated to regional Victoria.

Bass Coast had been allocated a 'minimum guarantee' of \$25M as part of the initiative.

A grant of \$3.6M was also announced last year, as part of the Social Housing Growth Fund.

This was to build up to 18 houses, providing social and affordable housing to respond to the increase in population, regional employment opportunities and community need.

Funding was to be provided to Community Housing Limited, Housing Choices Australia Limited and the Haven Foundation.

The new homes will be allocated to people who have applied for housing through the Victorian Housing Register.

Projects were expected to be commencing throughout 2023, as planning and other approvals are obtained.

According to Homes Victoria, six housing projects are underway in Bass Coast, with 36 new homes expected.

This has seen \$13.5M invested so far.

While in South Gippsland, three projects are underway.

Local sentiment

Following a council resolution during December 2021, the shire made available surplus road reserve land for the provision of social housing.

At the time, Community Housing Limited were progressing with two sites – the first at Ivor Street, Henry Street East, and Henry Street West, Wonthaggi North and the second at Wyndham Street and Roydon Street, Cowes.

Community Housing Limited

had submitted their application to Homes Victoria during mid-2022.

If successful, Community Housing Limited will further develop their proposal including consultation with Council and the community before submitting it to the Minister for Energy, Environment and Climate Change for approval.

Jessica Harrison of Housing Matters highlighted the organisation has been eagerly waiting for an announcement that the two housing developments in Cowes and Wonthaggi are going ahead.

"However, as the situation worsens, no announcement has been made," she said.

"When the projects do go ahead, we hope local building workers will find employment there. But if any workers come from outside Bass Coast, they are unlikely to find a place to live. There is fierce competition when any rental accommodation becomes available."

"There needs to be a huge building program to provide public housing, after many years of chronic lack of investment by successive governments.

"The working poor are struggling while people on Jobseeker or a pension have no chance of paying market rents.

"Benefit payments have not increased substantially since the Howard years.

"Unless the local and state governments want tent encampments on the edges of towns and businesses collapsing due to lack of accommodation for staff, they had better act much more quickly than they have to date."

Korumburra Hub advances

TENANTS of the Korumburra Community Hub are expected to begin moving in this April, with South Gippsland Shire Council forecasting the new facility will be fully open to the public by July.

The Hub will bring together a number of community services, with Korumburra Library, Milpara Community House (including Centrelink agency and Foodbank), Korumburra Senior Citizens Club, Medicare Services and Korumburra & District Historical Society all under one roof.

These community services are currently operating in infrastructure that is nearing the end of its serviceable life, with the library's present home to make way for a new IGA supermarket.

South Gippsland Shire Council will join the community organisations as a Hub tenant, establishing a customer service centre there.

External wall cladding, completion of masonry, services fit-off, painting, floor finishes and landscaping remain to complete Korumburra Community Hub and its surrounds.

Work thus far has consisted of completion of the structure and roof, solar installation, services rough-in, internal wall framing and lining, internal and external window frames and most of the glazing, and lift installation.

Leongatha set for childcare and kinder boost

LEONGATHA Early Learning Centre's building is nearing completion, with final finishes and painting taking place, and will soon help meet growing local demand for kindergarten and day care services.

Works are expected to conclude during March, with the facility set to begin operation in April.

Kindergarten, long day care and supported playgroup will all be accommodated at the Leongatha Early Learning Centre, with the spacious new building also set to host related family services.

At approximately 1095 square metres, the facility consists of four main day care/preschool rooms with shared amenities, allied health and associated staff and administration rooms, including a kitchen, laundry and

outdoor staff area.

Children using the centre will enjoy a large outdoor play space when the South Gippsland weather plays its part.

Measuring approximately 1500 square metres, the play space will consist of a mixture of nature-based elements and natural play structures designed to cater for varying age groups.

The adjoining Leongatha Children's Centre Incorporated will operate the Leongatha Early Learning Centre, having run a kindergarten and preschool since 2001, with councillors voting to approve that recommendation at their July 2022 meeting.

Leongatha Early Learning Centre was originally expected to open in 2022, with Mayor Nathan Hersey outlining reasons

for the delay in its completion at last December's council meeting.

"The construction of the facility has been significantly delayed by recent issues widespread in the construction industry such as material and labour shortages and poor weather conditions," mayor Nathan Hersey said in response to a question from a member of the public.

Delays were also previously acknowledged.

The centre's \$5 million budget was increased to \$5.325 million in 2021 following receipt of construction tenders, Cr Hersey stated at the December council meeting.

Council committed contributed just under \$3 million to the project with the remaining funds coming from the Victorian Government.

Korumburra Urgent Care Centre expands

GIPPSLAND South Health Service's (GSHS) Korumburra Urgent Care Centre has moved to a larger space as demand for the service hits record levels.

The centre has been relocated to the former theatre recovery area, effectively tripling its size.

GSHS Korumburra director of Nursing Tracey Edmonds said the new location was better able to cope with increasing demand.

"The new facility allows for more throughput and is a more comfortable, efficient and private environment for the community," Ms Edmonds said.

"It now better fits the criteria of an Urgent Care Centre," she said.

The centre was moved in response to a suggestion from the last accreditation review to create more space and easier access for people needing the centre.

It is at least three times the size of the previous room, improving efficiency for patients and staff.

"Having a bigger space has allowed us to set up two beds, which are often

needed, and to have more people working in the room," Ms Edmonds said.

"It has its own amenities which improves privacy for patients and nurses and doctors appreciate working in the better space."

Existing equipment was relocated to the new site, including Telehealth capabilities and observation machines.

"It was essentially moved and improved at no expense," Ms Edmonds said.

The relocation has been timely to deal with a big increase in demand.

"Demand for our urgent care services has increased substantially, though not necessarily due to moving to a new

space," Ms Edmonds said.

"Demand has almost doubled in the past three months so we're pleased to have this better space."

The centre continues to be operated by ward staff under direction of the nursing unit manager.

The Korumburra centre is seeing an average 50 per cent increase in presentations with patients presenting with a wide variety of conditions.

The old urgent care space is now an infusion clinic, which provides a service for patients requiring a short procedure such as iron infusions and pain management treatments, in a more comfortable environment.

Reseal preparations underway for South Gippsland roads

FORTY NINE roads in towns across South Gippsland Shire are scheduled to be resealed this financial year, with preparation work underway to enable that to occur.

Before resealing can take place, each of these roads needs to be inspected for defects then patched, with the aim of maximising the time the subsequent reseal will last.

Resealing provides a waterproof barrier that helps to protect the road for longer.

"Heavy rains last year caused damage to a number of council roads, which is why an extensive reseal program is now underway," a council spokesperson said.

Further resealing work is scheduled to occur during the 2023/24 financial year.

Repairs on hold at Carinya Lodge

WORK to fix the new front entrance of Korumburra's Carinya Lodge aged care facility is awaiting processing of an insurance claim, with approximately \$130,000 of damage done when a garbage truck hit the building's recently completed front canopy early last month.

At the time of the accident, the new entrance and administrative area was to be handed over in a couple of weeks, with just finishing touches remaining, such as the installation of handrailing.

Carinya Lodge CEO Cindy

Nicholas expressed her disappointment for locals affected by the setback.

"We were so close to opening and we really wanted the facility to be finished for the community and we want to express how sorry we are that we cannot open when we planned," Cindy said just after the building damage happened.

Quotes have since been provided to the relevant insurance company, with Carinya Lodge management stressing the urgency of repairs to the new entrance.

However, Cindy conceded that insurance companies are busy and there is no way of knowing how long it will be before work commences.

The handover of the front entrance and administration area will signify the completion of an extensive redevelopment project at Carinya Lodge.

Earlier stages of the project took longer than expected due to COVID-related construction delays, so given the latest hurdle, it will be an emotional day when the new section opens.

Putting people on the road to better health

LATROBE Community Health Service is calling out for volunteer drivers across the South Gippsland and Bass Coast region, with Wonthaggi's Amanda Carson still loving the role after nearly four years.

"You meet terrific and interesting people," she said, adding there is the opportunity for a good chat on longer drives.

Drivers are needed to transport patients to appointments across Gippsland and further afield such as Melbourne.

Amanda said volunteer drivers become part of a great team, backed by strong support, with any issues quickly resolved.

Each driver's schedule is tailored to their life requirements and wants, with the flexibility to choose the days you are available and whether you wish to stick to journeys in the local region or are happy to take on longer trips as well.

Amanda does both, with plenty of trips around Gippsland but also venturing to Berwick, and Monash Hospital in Clayton.

She said while some appointments are quick, other patients require treatment, with drivers able to explore nearby or enjoy a bite to eat while they wait.

Modern cars are provided by the health service, with fuel paid for.

While the social interaction and the chance to help others are strong incentives to volunteer, those on Centrelink benefits can also put their volunteer hours towards mutual obligation requirements.

Amanda said an additional benefit is the training opportunities that arise, such as learning first aid skills.

Latrobe Community Health has experienced a 50 percent dip in the number of volunteer drivers it can call on since the pandemic arrived.

Premier visits Wonthaggi Hospital

PREMIER Daniel Andrews, Minister for Health Mary-Anne Thomas, and Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale, officially opened the new Stage One expansion and update of the Wonthaggi Hospital facility on Wednesday (February 1).

The project includes 32 new inpatient beds and 18 additional emergency department treatment spaces, which will treat an extra 26,000 emergency patients a year.

The hospital's surgery capacity has also doubled – with three new theatres and a procedure room, as well as additional car parking and a new central energy plant.

"We are committed to stage two, and we will have more to say about as this term of Parliament unfolds. 2027 is our stated completion date and if we can beat that, if we can do more and if we can bring any of that forward, we stand ready to do that," Premier Andrews said.

"(Stage two) will have great economic benefits for this local community, as well as incredible benefits for

patients. When it comes to things like maternity services, where not only can we have bigger spaces, but we can offer a degree of complexity for women in this local community that isn't offered now. That's hundreds of families, of patients, who don't have to travel out of their community..."

Costed between \$250 to \$290 million, stage two (and three) will build two new

wards, boosting the capacity to treat sick and injured patients by up to 64 beds. Mums-to-be on the Bass Coast will benefit from a new labour and delivery complex with three birthing suites and neonatal unit.

A new outpatient clinic with around 25 treatment spaces will mean patients needing dialysis, chemotherapy and attending specialist appointments will be

able to get the care they need closer to home, eliminating the need for many patients to travel to Latrobe Regional Hospital or Melbourne.

The investment will complete the medical imaging unit begun in the first stage of works, refurbish allied health treatment spaces, administration buildings and training areas, and deliver extra car parking for staff, patients and visitors.

Mayor's message

THOUSANDS of Bass Coast children returned to schools last week, which I am sure made many parents happy, and draws attention to the amazing service to our community by school crossing supervisors.

Our team of school crossing supervisors are dedicated and hardworking, come rain, hail or shine they continue to provide a much-needed road safety program for our children.

Bass Coast currently have 12 school crossings that service 10 schools across the shire, with 18 dedicated school crossing supervisors that work hard to staff these locations.

We are seeking the support of our community to help promote awareness and inspire safety around our school crossings and affectively change driver behaviour to ensure road safety for our children and school crossing staff who support them.

Safe routes to schools are a priority for Bass Coast Shire Council – and all councils across the state - but sadly a lack of support and funding certainty from the Victorian Government means delivery of a safe, sustainable program is becoming very difficult.

Issues with the program are driven by severe school crossing staff shortages - including staff being seconded from other duties – due to the lack of state funding. At least 15 councils across Melbourne and surrounds are currently looking for lollipop people.

The short-term nature of the State funding commitments and the failure to maintain a true partnership with Council makes planning and delivering the program extremely challenging.

At this point in time, councils have no commitment from the Victorian Government to fund the service beyond term 2 this year.

Every year, councils must wait for the State Budget to be handed down in May to learn whether the service will be funded and what the State contribution will be.

Bass Coast Shire Council along with Councils from across the State, strongly urge the Victorian Government to provide sufficient funding to secure the future of the stressed school crossings program.

There is a significant opportunity to deliver a safer and more cost-effective solution for children travelling to and from school and we are seeking a true partnership between the State Government and councils. Unfortunately to date, the Victorian Government has continued to refuse to invest in such a critical partnership.

High praise for Bass Coast Health as demand increases

THE Emergency Department (ED) in the new Wonthaggi Hospital has been welcomed by patients and staff after its first month of operation.

Everyone has appreciated the first purpose-built ED to be offered from Wonthaggi Hospital and opened by Bass Coast Health (BCH) in December last year.

Patient Dorothy Gordon of Cape Paterson was impressed by the extensive space the new ED offers.

"The ED in the old hospital was cramped and this new department is almost luxurious. I've been to a couple of hospitals in my time and this is a nice space," she said.

Nurse in Charge Kort Johnson said the new ED's private rooms ensure patient privacy while allowing them to rest, which benefits their wellbeing.

"I used to work in the old ED and this is state-of-the-art. It has the room we need to keep the patient flow going, as well as everyone having an appropriate workspace," he said.

The new ED is also making an impression on Interns. BCH is hoping the new facility will help to attract new staff.

Dr Vikram Amara is one of the Monash Health Interns now undertaking a 10-week term in the ED as part of his medical training.

"It's a nice new environment and there are enough places for the patients and the staff to work in a more cohesive space," he said.

The new ED has passed the test posed by the demand of the hectic summer holiday period, when staff treated 972 patients from December 24, 2022, to January 4, 2023 – a 21.5 per cent increase on the same period for 2021-2022.

Fractures were the most common reason for presentation, followed by chest pain, abdominal pain, COVID-19 positive or probable, infections, wounds, sprains, limb and back pain, allergy and viral infection.

The ED treated patients from as far east as Wilsons Promontory, and west to Phillip Island and the northern Bass Coast Shire.

Members of the community are urged to be patient when presenting to the ED and know they will be seen as soon as possible. Patients are triaged based on the severity of their condition and are not seen in order of presentation.

Sicker patients requiring more urgent medical attention, such as those who may be experiencing a heart attack, are seen sooner than patients with minor wounds.

The Emergency Department at Wonthaggi Hospital is located at 235 Graham Street, Wonthaggi. In the event of a medical emergency, always phone 000 and request an ambulance.

Urgent Care Centre

The dedicated team at the Urgent Care Centre at the Phillip Island Health Hub is also receiving the 'thumbs up' from patients during this busy summer.

Cowes resident Mark O'Reilly visited the Urgent Care Centre in Cowes to receive treatment for a puncture wound from a snapper he caught at Rhyll Jetty.

"They do a great job at the Cowes Urgent Care Centre. I've been there a few times and it doesn't matter whether it's 5pm or 3am, it's always first-rate treatment. Five out of five stars from me!" he said.

The Urgent Care Centre at the Phillip Island Health Hub treated 746 patients from December 24, 2022, to January 4, 2023, – a 13.2 per cent increase on the same period for 2021-2022.

Viral infection was the most common reason for presentation, followed by tonsillitis, fracture, ear infection, wounds, infection, and COVID-19 positive or probable.

UCC patients are triaged based on the severity of their condition, not in order of presentation. As a result, some patients may face a wait.

The Urgent Care Centre is open 24/7 for the treatment of minor injuries and illnesses, and is located at the Phillip Island Health Hub, 50-54 Church Street, Cowes.

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2022 the year that was

- Review and 2023 outlook

Exiting the COVID pandemic in 2022 should have been welcomed with great fanfare, however its timing was overshadowed by a global economy under pressure on a number of fronts which included war, inflation and rising interest rates, all of which impacted on assets returns which will be explored in this editorial.

The invasion of Ukraine by Russia shocked the world in February last year. The initial expectation was that it would not last long, however Ukraine's admirable resistance has proved greater than what Russia anticipated and the war remains ongoing.

The impact of this war on the world economy has been a disruption to the supply of energy and food, resulting in higher prices which has in turn contributed to rising inflation.

In 2021 inflation in Australia began rising off the back of Covid lockdowns, and continued to rise rapidly in 2022 following the reopening of the economy which lead to further supply and demand constraints on goods and services.

The high inflation levels increased the cost of living, yet the Reserve Bank of Australia waited until May 2022 before exercising its monetary power policy of increasing the cash rate in a bid to curb inflation.

In hindsight it proved too late as the eight consecutive rate increases since have not slowed down inflation which currently sits at 7.8 per cent, a level not seen since 1990.

Subsequently the increases to the cash rate by the RBA lead to increases in interest rates. This resulted in a negative impact to home and business loans as repayments increased.

On the other hand, for retirees with interest bearing investments relying on cash to generate income for living expenses, it was a positive outcome

as it has increased their returns, although offset by the higher cost of living (inflation).

Looking at the 2022 returns* from the major asset classes, it was mostly negative with the exception being unlisted property and infrastructure as well as cash, albeit still low at 1.3 per cent.

Hardest hit was real estate investment trusts both internationally and domestically, posting negative 20 per cent and 25 per cent respectively. The negative territory was a direct correlation with the change in bond yield.

Similarly, residential property prices (Australian homes) fell by 7 per cent due to the rise in mortgage interest rates coupled with poor housing price affordability after the property boom.

Given the events noted earlier, international equities (global shares) also struggled with returns greater than negative 10 per cent. In comparison the Australian share market performed better with only a negative 1 per cent return.

The bond market experienced one of its worst years in decades with Australian bonds delivering negative 9.7 per cent and global bonds negative 12.3 per cent.

Economists have predicted that the outlook for 2023 is going to improve on 2022 and yield positive growth for most asset classes, however it will be a low return market due to the continued high levels of inflation worldwide and the ongoing risk of recession.

Hopes for speed review sees slow progress

A LOCAL resident is frustrated at what they say is a lack of action after campaigning for years for a speed review of Campbell Street in Wonthaggi.

According to the resident, they had contacted Bass Coast Shire in 2019 and 2020, raising concerns about the street such as:

- The street transitions from 100km/h zone to a 50km/h zone, (no intermediate speed buffer)
- Fronts Low Density Residential Zoned Land
- Caters for shire roadside bin collection
- Bisects a shire wildlife corridor

The resident has since contacted the shire again to see if there had been any progress of a review, after noticing other roads such as Lynnes Road in Wattlebank were under review.

In response, the shire stated they acknowledged the concerns regarding Campbell Street.

"The Department of Transport (DoT) regulate speed limit changes in Victoria. The VicRoads Speed Zoning Guidelines are applied to set speed limits consistently and credibly across Victoria," a shire spokesperson said.

"Council advocates on the community's behalf with requests to change speed limits on Council managed roads on the State managed arterial road network. Council receive a number of community requests for speed reductions each year.

"Council is working with DoT to assess this request along with many others.

"Campbell Street has been added to the speed limit change priority list for further investigation and review.

"The investigation will inform what treatment options would be appropriate."

Premier pressed on road conditions

ADDRESSING the media on Wednesday, Premier Daniel Andrews was asked about the carnage on regional roads.

"We know that record rainfall, and then culminating in one of the biggest flooding events that we've ever seen, off the back of an extended period of very dry weather, has caused a lot of damage to our road network," Premier Andrews said.

"There are teams, as we speak, who are repairing hundreds of 1000s of potholes, resurfacing entire stretches of roads, replacing bridges."

Record funding as part of the flood relief will see roads repairs continue across the state.

"More money in road maintenance and new road surfacing than we've ever seen. We've brought a level of consistency to that funding so it's not boom and bust, it's much more consistent and that gives you better outcomes as well.


"However, for the longest period last year because it was so wet (pre-flood). We couldn't get our crews onto these potholes and into this work. There's then had to be a whole lot of emergency work done post flooding and we might have to go back and redo some of that. But that's the price that you have to pay in order to get the road network functioning."

OUTSIDE of South Gippsland, they're still sniggering and even guffawing about the town name we locals don't even notice – Poowong.

Although the sensational rise to fame of the town's favourite son, Hawthorn midfielder Jai Newcombe, and the fact they launched the critically acclaimed movie, Kenny, here, has certainly polished up the infamous moniker.

Even South Gippsland Shire Mayor, Cr Nathan Hersey, himself a Strzelecki representative, was careful not to make fun of the Poowong name this week, when a National Gut Health Month promotions team engineered a change in the name to 'Pooright'.

Get it, don't eat badly and 'Poowong', enjoy a balanced diet and 'Pooright'!

They say it improves sleep, reduces stress, increases the feeling of well-being and better equips us for a happy productive life.

But Cr Hersey was more than happy to get involved in the Gut Health Month launch at Poowong this week, where a team of dietitians from the Dietitian Connection ran a gut health awareness program and trial involving six local families during the past week.

"It's a good message. It's

obviously we're here in Poowong and because of the name but we all know we love Poowong because it's a beautiful town, with its green, rolling hills and fertile soil. Poowong wasn't about trivial name play, it provided the opportunity to release important new research that states:

- Gen Z and Millennials are more likely to always / often experience gut-related health issues compared to older generations (Gen Z: 49%, Millennials: 51% compared to Gen X: 40%, Baby Boomers: 34%).
- Australians who have children under 18 at home are more than twice as likely to say they always experience gut-related health issues (22%), compared to Australians who don't have children under 18 at home (10%)
- Australians living in capital cities are more likely to say they experience gut-related health issues always or often (47%) com-

pared to those who don't live in capital cities (38%)

- Nearly half (48%) of Australians claim they are experiencing constipation or diarrhoea once a month or more often, with almost a quarter (23%) experiencing these once a week or more.

Poowong is an Aboriginal word meaning 'carriion' and First Nation's representatives were consulted about the promotional event.

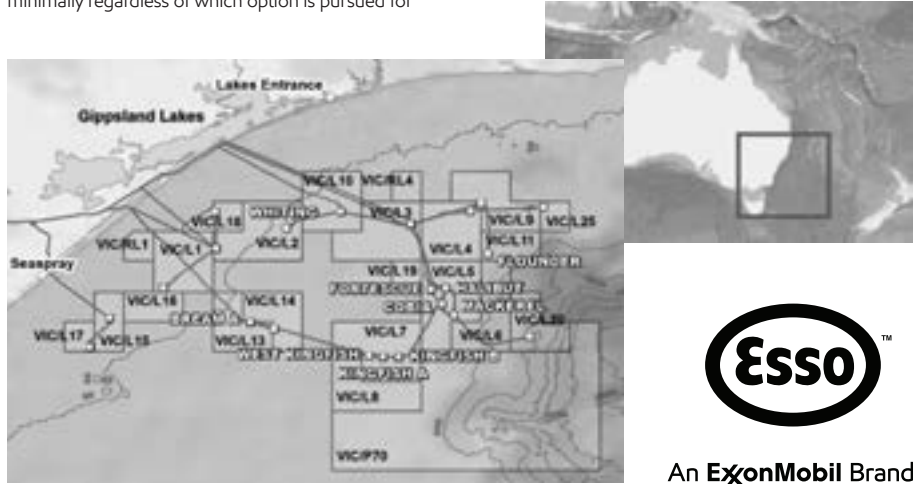

That may have involved seeing wicking beds, or a modern hothouse in action at The Cape Community Farm in Cape Paterson, and learning how they operate and promote efficiency.

Or perhaps it was hearing about Jane Bari's unique approach to determining if soil temperature is right for planting, checking if it is comfortable to sit on with a bare backside.

Such is the Wonthaggi gardener's passion for sustainable and affordable living, she has written a book on the subject, with ideas on how to budget, recipes, and the need to understand the microclimate in which your garden operates.

In her case, the wind plays a major part with many of her plants needing to be supported.

Wonthaggi is also home to a couple of community initiatives for growing fresh produce, with the Harvest Centre and Wonthaggi Community Garden both inviting people for a look and chat over the weekend.

Sharon Willcox, the volunteer who coordinates the Edible Gardens event said it is all

about encouraging more people to grow food.

That's something community gardens are brilliant at, providing space, companionship and valuable guidance.

Volunteer Caylie exemplified the effectiveness of the Edible Gardens weekend, having attended as a patron last year, and now an enthusiastic member of the crew at the Harvest Centre.

While she already had strong growing knowledge, Caylie is relishing the community atmosphere of gardening with others.

"It's good for mental and physical health," she said of the shared work.

Caylie said the Harvest Centre also welcomes refugees, with members from Myanmar enjoying seeing what grows in Wonthaggi while expanding their social network.

Linda Gordon is one of the motivated volunteers at Wonthaggi Community Garden, with the keen gardener enjoying the social element there and the chance to share produce with others.

Glenda's Gourmet Garden was an excellent spot to check out a range of ways in which you can preserve produce.

Kohlrabi was among the crops she is currently growing, being the most vitamin-rich vegetable and able to be used in soups and casseroles, roasted, or grated raw as a cabbage substitute in coleslaw.

On a spectacular community scale, The Cape Community Farm has already attracted 70 household members in its

months of operation, with 60 of those living in the Cape Eco Village and 10 from the wider Cape Paterson community.

As with the other community gardens involved in the Edible Gardens event, organisers will be delighted to welcome more members from the local area.

The Cape Community Farm is already producing a large volume of fresh food, benefiting members, the broader community and charities.

People can draw on the knowledge of the farmer, but many members also bring their valuable ideas and techniques.

Graeme McAlpine is one of those knowledgeable volunteers, with his expertise proving critical in setting up a high quality hothouse that will eventually incorporate heat beds.

He was happy to answer questions over the weekend on how it operates and outline its value in enabling seedlings to be nurtured for the farm and beyond.

Bass Coast Edible Gardens weekend drew people from all around, with many venturing from Melbourne, and even those with tiny home gardens would have learned ways to use their limited space effectively to grow food.

Such was the reach of the event, it had a presence in several Phillip Island towns, Glen Forbes, and Coronet Bay.

With supermarket prices on the rise and people's desire to minimise food miles has been grown, the Edible Gardens weekend is sure to continue long into the future.

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Anderson Road
boat ramp upgrade
needs a builder

BASS Coast Shire is seeking tenders for the Cowes boat ramp and jetty upgrade at Anderson Road.

The \$2M project includes the widening and extension of the existing boat ramp, elevation of the existing jetty landings and extension of the jetty.

The tender period closes at 2pm, Wednesday February 22.

The current facility comprises a shallow gradient boat ramp which enables restricted launching by typically smaller vessels, generally at higher tides.

The Cowes boat ramp operates within only a limited tidal range, during mostly favourable conditions.

The ramp is regularly impacted by sand which moves along the shoreline throughout the year generally influenced by prevailing winds.

The sand makes launching and retrieval difficult, particularly for 2WD vehicles and is a significant ongoing maintenance burden for the facility manager.

The new design raises the height of the ramp to just above the existing beach height.

The height of the ramp has been reduced as a large solid structure would trap sand on one side, but also starve the beach of sand on the other side, resulting in significant erosion elsewhere along the beach.

The key features of the proposed upgrade are expected to improve the functionality of the facility.

Construction is planned to commence between May – August 2023, pending final approvals and contractor availability.

The ramp will likely need to be closed during construction.

Upgrade nearing closer for
Mahers Landing boating facility

A PLANNING application to upgrade Mahers Landing boat ramp and carpark has been lodged with Bass Coast Shire.

The \$4M project, which received funding through the state government's 2022-23 Victorian Recreational Boating Action Plan, is undergoing progress designs and permit approvals with construction expected early this year.

The current facility comprises a shallow gradient, single-lane boat ramp which enables restricted launching by smaller vessels (typically up to 5 metres), generally only at high tides. Informal parking is available and the site has toilets and fish cleaning facilities.

An updated concept had been released last year, which seeks to improve the functionality of the ramp and increase the capacity of the site.

Alterations have been made to the design to provide greater numbers of formalised car and boat trailer parks, the configuration of the ramps has also changed from the western side to the eastern side to improve launching efficiency, traffic flow and accommodate a longer queue.

The double laned ramp itself now extends further out into the water providing all tide access for boats up to 8m in the length, and provision has been made for the installation of a jetty to enable temporary on water berthing.

The new design features an

all-time, double-lane concrete boat ramp with a jetty, along with a sealed car park with more than 50 formal car and boat trailer spaces including provision for accessible spaces.

There will be one-way anti-clockwise traffic flow throughout the facility and the provision of rigging and de-rigging lanes will assist in efficient launching and retrieval of vessels.

Some parts of the facility may have to be shut while construction works are underway.

Access to the existing ramp will be maintained where possible, which will remain open and operational for most of the construction period for boaters to use.

Construction will also be

scheduled during the off-peak period to avoid any major disruption during the peak tourism and boating season.

In summary the project comprises:

- Retention of the existing boat ramp to provide a launching place for non-powered craft.
- A new all-time dual-lane boat ramp extending approximately 80m from the carpark into Anderson Inlet, elevated above the beach on concrete piles.
- A 2m wide dual level jetty/holding structure adjacent to the ramp.
- Formalised rigging and de-rigging area adjacent to the boat ramp.
- Formalised and extended paved car park accommodating a

total of 66 spaces: 57 x car-trailer spaces, 5 x standard car spaces, 2 x car-trailer spaces

- Widening of the entry to the carpark.
- Upgraded rock revetment around the water side of the Mahers Landing precinct.
- Construction of a new public toilet/amenities block and park benches.
- Retention of the fish clearing facilities.
- Removal of existing vegetation and provision of new landscaping.
- Provision of pedestrian paths.
- Provision for stormwater treatment (swales and sand traps). Extracts of the proposed plans are provided below.

Teacher shortages hitting hard in first weeks back

SCHOOLS, especially in Victoria, are already reportedly under great strain from a lack of workforce coverage. This crisis has been brewing for a long time and has been having real impacts for a long time. Has it finally hit home?

"There are some hard lessons that must be learnt. Our research shows teachers are burning out," Dr Fiona Longmuir (Educational Leadership - Monash University) said.

"Our research with over 5000 Australian teachers indicated that teachers are burning out from long hours and emotional drain combined with feeling undervalued and disrespected. And with the current widespread staffing shortages, teachers are being stretched even further. This means the most likely trajectory is that the crisis will get worse.

"Actions directed at retaining current staff and appealing to those that have recently left must be a focus. Interventions that reduce workload and work intensity are most likely to have an impact.

"Our research suggests that teachers want less administrative burden, (including reduced data reporting), they want more specialist support for students' socio-emotional needs, and they want more time to build relationships that support students' learning and social development."

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Candlelight walk supports the voice

EIGHTY people arrived throughout the evening at San Remo earlier this year keen to celebrate the oldest continuous culture on earth and their Voice to the Parliament.

The spectacular light display guided people through the 20 twists and turns of the path and invited walkers to connect with the Yallock Bullock people, who walked this land for 40,000 years reflecting on their lived experiences since the British took over their homelands in 1788 and beyond.

Lorraine Rodda, event organiser, highlighted that the Law Council of Australia's statement released in May 2022, stands side by side with First Nations peoples advocating for changes to the Australian Constitution for the Voice to inform Parliament on the laws and issues affecting them and their communities; the basic entitlement of all persons is to control their destiny and to be treated respectfully.

The statement continued, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander affairs have historically faltered because elected leaders have not listened.

A First Nations Voice to Parliament highlights the right to self-determination that all people should possess and enjoy, which would be a significant step toward rectifying the problem.

People wanting to have a greater understanding of the impact of colonisation and racism embedded within our society can view the hearings of the Victorian Yoorrook Justice Commission.

Lorraine said she was shocked to learn that 45 per cent of Aboriginal men and 55 per cent of Aboriginal women are being held in remand, while waiting for their case hearing, including for minor offences.

In contrast, non-aboriginal people are released on bail.

The Recovery

This is part four of a series focusing on Peter Bland of Wattle Bank Farm

"MY journey of ABI (acquired brain injury) – that was a real journey," Peter said.

"I was in hospital for a while in South America, Punta Arenas up in Chile. I was then airlifted back to the Alfred.

"It took years of recovery – brain scans and MRIs, speech therapists and meditation. Meditation was fantastic for me. It made a huge difference.

"But none of it works until you swallow the pill of acceptance, and that took me a couple of years to really accept that I stuffed up, there'd been a mistake made and I was responsible for it.

"It had a consequence. People were affected. People were traumatised, and until I accepted all that no change was possible for me. No transformation was possible.

"When I did accept that and took full responsibility for my actions, in that I took responsibility for the avalanche. Once I got that, then a whole world of transformation was available to me and contribution and healing. On the other side of healing, it was beautiful."

The key for Peter had always been purpose, and at that period in his life he lost who he was.

"After one of my operations, I was supposed to be there about three hours and I'd been in for three weeks, and

a doctor comes around. His name is Dr. Kwan Chen. Dr Kwan Chen, who's an Eastern man in the western world comes around, he says 'Peter, we're amongst the best doctors with regard to infectious diseases and you're on the best drugs modern medicine can provide and you're a fit young man. Tell me, is there anything spiritual going on with you that isn't sitting right with you?'

"And I said, 'Yeah, well, I'm doing this network marketing, and I hate it – it's killing me'. And he says, 'I'm only a doctor, but if I was you, I'd be you...'

"Now, that was profound. I'm an adventurer, that's what I am, that's what I do. I run trips with purpose.

"I came out of that, literally, and I rang up my old contacts in the Antarctic world, and Roger with the boat Tooluka and new boat Australis, I chartered that and put the word out there and I put teams together."

Heading to private schools, Peter offered rites of passage. Trips of a lifetime for year nine/ten boys and their fathers to venture away and learn about leadership, empathy, resilience, discussions on the outdoors and work as a team.

"That was all inside of me – waking up to the best thing I

could ever do for myself was being me.

"This is who I am.

"Now I run these adventures for purpose – we bought this farm, we grow vegetables and mushrooms, we transitioned to a vegan lifestyle, and we run workshops down here.

"Healing, helping, contribution and growth is a theme for us."

And whilst Peter loves his natural horsemanship experiences and the workshop opportunities offered at Wattle Bank Farm, he still finds time to complement life in Bass Coast with life in the polar circles.

"I've got this trip to the Arctic in September, which is around climate change," Peter beamed.

"I'm looking to work with 18 other like-minded passionate adventurers, who want to sail with me on a tall ship from Norway into the Arctic Circle."

Setting sail from Longyearbyen, Svalbard – the world's northernmost settlement – crews will sail, snowshoe, ski and ice climb over eight days with the purpose of getting access to the scientists on the ice in research laboratories.

"Discussing the data that they are finding (from core samples) about microplastics, which have been found in the ice and waterways, and secondly, the temperature

changes that are occurring from the albino feedback loop that is happening.

"As the sunlight is coming down and ice is melting, more and more sunlight is being absorbed therefore melting more ice, exposing more ground, the more exposed ground is absorbing more sunlight. It's a lose, lose feedback loop.

"I want more people to be aware of it and also have an incredible time coming out with me and seeing the walrus and the polar bears, the minke whale and humpback whales – and the rest of it.

"And bringing awareness to what we can do to make a difference in the world with climate change.

"My focus at the moment is bringing people together, running camps here at the farm and getting people ready for this trip."

Councillors fiddle while height limit burns

THE horse has bolted apparently and it might be too late for the State Government to allow the Bass Coast Shire Council to shut the gate.

We're talking about the character of Inverloch and the fact that 11 metres, not 7 metres or even 9.5 metres, is now effectively the allowable height limit for houses and residential projects in the town's General Residential Zone (GRZ).

In fact, those who've accepted the shire's recommendation over the years and built a house under 7 metres are starting to look like real dopes.

At a VCAT hearing into the planned development of a 14-metre-high apartment block, adjacent to the foreshore, on the old Inverloch Marine site, not even a specific DDO, setting a height limit of 9.5 metres could hold the developers off.

And it was the existence of a growing number of homes and townhouses, stretching up towards 11 metres in the residential zone of the town, hoping to gain even a glimpse of the water, if not a commanding view to add to their project's value, that could swing the result for the residential hotel's investors.

The council will tell you that the State Government's controversial Bass Coast Distinctive Areas and Landscapes project has delayed the preparation of its Neighbourhood Character Study, Housing Strategy, and Residential Development Framework, supposed to protect Inverloch and elsewhere from the evils of growth.

It's supposed to stop the nuking of home sites in the once leafy town, the 100% footprints of these new McMansions and, yes, the reaching for the skies... but it might simply be too late.

You can't pull them down. In the absence of a planning scheme with real teeth, one that actually said homes over 7 metres would not be approved, local homeowners and developers have driven a truck through the shire's flimsy regulations and pretty much done whatever the hell they like at Inverloch.

What they've done, in the absence of an enforceable law, has already established a new character for built form in the town, and it's looking increasingly like we're simply going to have to adjust our tape measures, up.

Supporting survivors

The Catholic Church of St Joseph in the small township of Bass is a long way from St Mary's Cathedral Sydney.

A quiet, respectful, and safe protest at the Catholic Church's lack of appropriate response to sexual abuse was held to coincide with Cardinal Pell's funeral in Sydney.

A number of coloured ribbons were attached to the railing outside St Joseph's front door.

Each ribbon indicates support for the victims of sexual predator priests and brothers in parishes, schools and institutions over a great number of years.

Victoria did not escape the problem, and a number of abuses sadly took place in Gippsland churches and schools.

Many of these have either gone through the courts or are currently in progress.

Survivors' stories were shared with the Victorian Enquiry, a predecessor to the `Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse, and many of these described the terror and life-changing effects of sexual abuse.

Particularly by those whose mandate is to at the very least care for the spiritual needs of followers.

Not something that a beautiful city would appreciate.

The Royal Commission went a long way to support the plight of Australian survivors and bring sexual abuse to the public arena.

Let's hope the benefits brought by the Commission continues, and the lives of those struggling to even just live normally will be better off.

Halfway point for councillors

Christmas and the summer holidays have passed and it's now time for the kids to return to school and the oldies return to work.

So to our Bass Coast councillors will return to work this month.

They've reached the halfway mark of their current term.

Some of them will likely reflect on what they consider to have achieved in the past two years, and what they might achieve in the second half.

One thing that none of them is able to claim so far is any improvement toward open and transparent processes at Bass Coast Shire Council.

For example, we have the administrations ongoing disgraceful misuse of the Unreasonable Customer Conduct (UCC) to silence reasonable and legitimate alternate community viewpoints.

The UCC is a policy that is entirely subjective in content, and which is invoked at the whim of the executive.

Our councillors willingly accept that their CEO can make false assertions in effort to impose the UCC against individual community members.

In my case for example it is falsely claimed that I sent more than 400 emails to council in a 12-month period. The CEO refuses to substantiate the claim.

Another example is the draconian changes our councillors have introduced to council meeting rules. Having initially allowed public questions to simply be ignored, they subsequently codified the ability to prevent reasonable and legitimate public questions from ever seeing the light of day at council meetings.

The mayor alone holds sole discretion to determine if a question will be put to the public meeting.

The current sitting mayor, Cr Michael Whelan (Island Ward), has abundantly made clear his disdain for public questioning of council.

In March 2022, he took the unprecedented action of stopping public questions being put to the Council meeting.

And he later told ABC radio of his view that the need for public questions at council meetings is a fantasy.

So with just half their term remaining, in 2023 will our councillors start kicking some goals to unwind the appalling culture which they have allowed to be introduced at BCSC? Or will mediocrity be their goal?

Community well-being and priorities

People along Bass Coast like to get out and socialize over a meal or cup of coffee like the rest of Victoria. Meeting and talking to other people over a meal or cuppa is important for everyone's mental health. However, there are impediments which make this basic activity either unsafe or non-available.

The first impediment is safety. COVID is still a real threat to community health and many people choose to avoid indoor venues because of the ongoing risk to their health. The second impediment is opportunity. Many cafes, restaurants and coffee shops cannot get staff and/or cannot provide open air venues for seating patrons due to local government restrictions. These problems need to be addressed and solved by Local Government. If that happens then our community will feel happier and more people will be attracted to our area to work in hospitality. All they need is affordable short-term hostel-style accommodation so that they can actually afford to live close to potential workplaces.

The impediment to open-air hospitality venues could be solved with the stroke of a pen, subject to a few common-sense guidelines by utilizing footpaths and some parking areas. The present availability of open-air venues along the Bass Coast is scarce and getting scarcer. Recently, South Gippsland Shire Council sent a "dawn raid" to remove umbrellas and seating from parking places in front of the Cavity Bar at Venus Bay, as reported in the Sentinel Times on January

24th. This short sighted reactive action is not helpful to community amenity/well-being nor to the staff and employers affected.

Bass Coast Shire Council is also guilty of many things including not thinking and following through with programs designed to benefit the community as a whole. Two years ago, BCSC advertised a plan to make the central business precinct at Wonthaggi more pedestrian friendly by extending pedestrian areas with outdoor seating and attractive landscaping. Local business owners panicked at the thought of losing a few parking spaces and the Council caved in and nothing except for a few pedestrian crossings has materialized. These crossings give small protection against the busy traffic along Graham Street and the increasing prevalence of 40 tonne gravel trucks motoring down Graham Street does nothing to encourage the development of outdoor hospitality venues and of course there has been no attempt to improve the street ambience with landscaping and attractive seating.

Back in 2017, Tallangatta Township (in Towong Shire) had a very linear, unattractive appearance with shopfronts adjacent to a 3 metre, straight concrete footpath and continuous parking spaces down the street punctuated with telegraph poles. When the Shire advertised a plan to remodel the main street with landscaped zones, outdoor seating and underground power, some of the business community jacked up, claiming loss of business due to reduced parking for cars. The Shire stuck to their plan and today Tallangatta is a bustling township with a very attractive landscaped main street enjoyed by visitors and locals alike. The business owners have not lost patronage and the town is busier than ever; and there are no 40 tonne gravel trucks rampaging up the main street. Bass Coast Shire Council needs to reset its priorities.

The other impediment to the availability of hospitality venues is the total absence of affordable accommodation for potential hospitality staff within walking distance of town centres and hospitality sites. This problem is nation-wide. It could be solved easily by Local Government acquiring some real estate within walking distance of town centres and providing low-cost hostel style accommodation to potential hospitality staff. Apart from local unemployed people there would also be casual staff such as university students that might take advantage of cheap hostel-style accommodation if available. It's no good just whining about the lack of hospitality staff along the Bass Coast, we need to do something constructive to overcome the problem.

It could be a win-win solution for hospitality workers as well as the broader community because of the provision of more open-air hospitality venues along the coast. It's just unfortunate that Local Governments and many individual councilors cannot see how simple the path to community wellness could be.

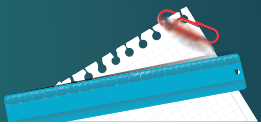

"Although it's a transition from primary to secondary school, we have been made to feel welcome into a safe space where we feel confident

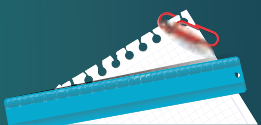
to express ourselves and take on the new responsibilities," said Charlotte.

"When entering a school crossing area please slow down and be prepared to stop, as there are kids around," Acting Sergeant Jack Allen of Wonthaggi Police said.

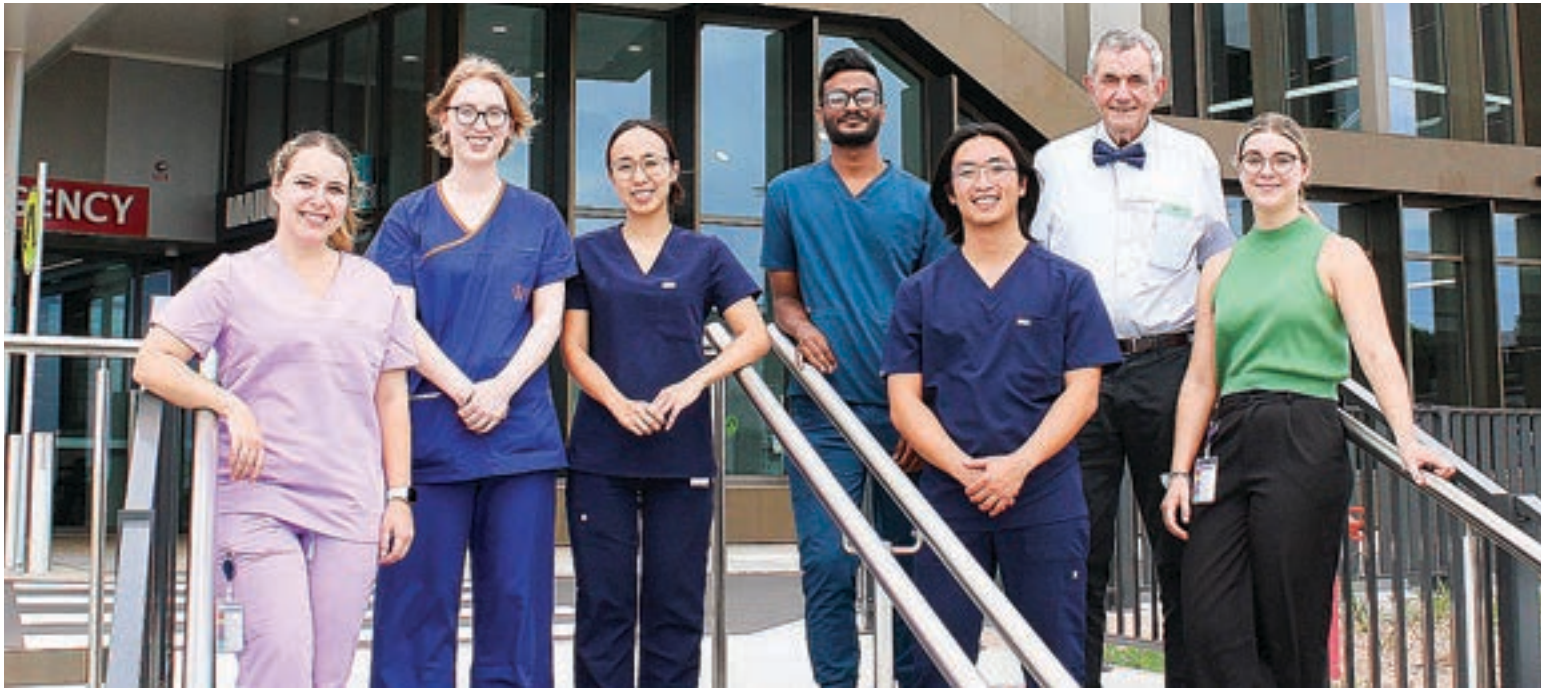
"You can help keep them safe by following the school Crossing Supervisor's directions.

"Flowers remain the go-to gift, cementing their status as a staple of the Valentine's Day experience. They're a sentimental token of love and affection that can be customised and tailored to fit any budget.


"Sensory indulgence is certainly a theme this year, with dining, getaways and sex toys rounding out the top gifts.

"Other hot ticket items include watches, lingerie and AirPods."

Despite economic headwinds, 89% of respondents say they will spend either more (25%) or the same (64%) as a year ago.

Ross aims for further fruit cake success

ENTERING pavilion exhibits not only provides the opportunity to earn local bragging rights, but the potential for regional success, leading to a shot at the holy grail, the Melbourne Show.

Ross Crawford has been entering his Rich Fruit Cakes, baked to the stipulated Victorian Agricultural Society (VAS) recipe, for 20 years and persistence paid off when he triumphed at last year's Melbourne Show.

That was two steps further than he has progressed previously, not having won the regional final before.

"I spend a lot of time in the preparation, making sure I've got a consistent mix," Ross said, also stating the importance of temperature control.

While Ross is driven by a competitive streak, he loves the social element of entering his baking in the show.

"It's fantastic living in the country and one of the great things is the socialisation; you get that through sport, church for some people, but the Show is a great event that brings the community together and you can all have a bit of fun," he said.

Cooking in general is something Ross enjoys so preparing his entries is not a chore.

In his early years of entering the Rich Fruit Cake category at the Korumburra Show, Ross aspired to "knock off Mrs Hopwood", a renowned entrant, a goal he eventually achieved.

Ross fondly recalls the feedback he got from a judge in his early days of entering, after his Rich Fruit Cake claimed a place.

"There was a comment that said I had a wrinkly bottom," he said.

In recent years, Ross has also begun entering the VAS Carrot Cake competition, once again requiring adherence to a set recipe, and has been working hard on his technique after last year's effort sank in the middle and missed out on a Show appearance.

While this year's carrot cake will be baked just prior to the Korumburra Show, his fruit cake is set to go.

"The cake's been baked and it's ready to rock 'n roll," Ross said, noting this scribe will be held accountable if it doesn't win.

Rare sheep breeds heading to Show

RARE sheep varieties will feature at the Korumburra Show, with the Valais Blacknose appearing in the showing for only the second time in Australia, and Elliottdale and Babydoll breeds on display.

The Elliottdale was bred as a carpet wool sheep, with its wool being coarse and fast growing, with Sugar Gum Farm based in Elaine between Ballarat and Geelong set to introduce the breed to Korumburra Showgoers.

Development of the breed commenced in 1967 and the first rams were released to the industry 10 years later.

"They were developed in Tasmania at the Elliottdale Research Station, which is how they got their name," Sue Curliss of Sugar Gum Farm said.

The creation of the breed was prompted by the importation to Australia of vast quantities of wool suited to carpet manufacturing.

By 1987 there were over 140 flocks of Elliottdales in Australia.

Although the breed is dual

purpose, suitable for meat as well as wool production, it has become highly scarce since the demise of the local carpet manufacturing industry.

"It would be one of the rarest breeds in Australia," Sue said, noting there are now only three flocks of Elliottdales in Australia, with the other two in Tasmania.

Korumburra Showgoers will meet Elliottdale 'Koda' and

probably his friend 'Wallaby'.

Koda was quick to take to halter training in preparation for the show, needing just quarter of an hour, but Sue said he differs from his fellow Elliottdale Wallaby in being bottle raised, making Koda easier to train.

Babydoll sheep will also be making the journey from Sugar Gum Farm to Korumburra Showgrounds.

Originating in the UK, the miniature breed is excellent for pets.

Babydoll sheep are also ideally suited to vineyards, orchards and cherry farms, grazing between the rows to keep everything neat without the need for chemicals.

"They fertilise as they mow," Sue said.

The Valais Blacknose is an ancient sheep breed originating in the Swiss Alps, in the Valais region, and having not only black noses but also black knees.

Members of the breed will venture to Korumburra from Farm Valais at Yarrambat for the Show.

While the Valais Blacknose can be used for meat and wool production, its cuteness and friendliness makes the breed a perfect pet.

"They will follow you around just like a dog and can be trained to do all sorts of tricks," Jane Lauber who is showing the breed in Korumburra said.

The Valais Blacknose only reached Australia in 2021.

Chariots of Fire was showing at the Wonthaggi Cinema, you could buy a three-bedroom home in Korumburra for \$25,000, dairy cows sold for an average of \$210 at a local clearing sale and you could buy a second-hand 120Y Datsun from Don Mullin Motors for \$4495 (sounds a bit dear)...

Ahh, those were the days!

But it was on with the show with the campaigning politicians all about the place, including Peter Nixon and the first-time hopeful Peter McGauran.

Maisie Brooks won the best orange cake event, Cliff Wallace

had the champion dairy cow, Val Wilson the best pure wool knitted garment, W.C. Calder the best Friesian and Myrene Rowe of Loch took out several championship ribbons in the poultry.

Leongatha's 80th show followed a week later.

30 years ago: Saturday, February 13, 1993 was Korumburra's Centenary Show, which makes it the 120th year this year. For the occasion, the show society had pulled off the huge coup of having the famed Carlton and United Brewery's Clydesdale team visit, with its beer wagon, making a proper spectacle in the grand parade.

During the week, Shadow Minister for Industrial Relations John Howard had attended an 80th birthday party locally, lamb chops were \$1.99 a kg, and the Leongatha Cycling Carnival attracted 6000 people, including 1992 Olympic Gold

Medallist Cathy Watt.

At the Korumburra Show, Wayne Kuhne and Bushlea Jerseys had the supreme dairy cow, Mickey Auddino was the Korumburra Miss Showgirl and camel rides were a novelty.

20 years ago: Making news in February 2003 were the upcoming council elections in March 2003 with John Hulle facing challenges in Bass Coast's Leadbeater Ward while in South Gippsland, Dick Lester and Ross Svenson were among the candidates in Tarwin Valley.

At the Korumburra Show in 2003, Jack Glasgow was the most successful exhibitor in the farm produce and Margaret Morrison won first in the Kelly's Great Apple Pie Competition, knocking off a visiting apple pie specialist from Scotland. M & C Jones won the soft feather large ribbon and there was a huge contingent of horses.

Kindness and friendship are under-rated

KINDNESS is a subversive quality. We talk about the fruits you will see in us when we are following Jesus. They are kindness, peace, love, joy, patience, goodness, gentleness, self-control, and faithfulness. I wonder if that is what you see in us Christians. My assessment is that we do some of it well but that we don't rate things like joy and gentleness and kindness highly enough. St Aidan asked his monks to share kindness with the Northumbrians in the sixth century and it changed the whole of their society. Sometimes we are more about asserting our own rights as church than loving one another with kindness, joy and gentle good humour. Hugh McKay claims that the key to having a meaningful life is kindness, which is available to us even when fondness is not. Being kind changes both the world and us.

In recent years we have been robbed of company and the sharing of social space. We have a loneliness epidemic and people feel isolated and that creates the need to see life purely from our own perspective. Friendship and compassionate support are the things we offer as church that can alleviate the loneliness. Nadia Bolz-Weber suggests that the way to get out of our own 'heads', our anxieties and fears and stresses, is to be of service to others and to allow them to be the same with us when we need kindness.

One of my favourite saints, Dorothy Day, believed that love of others was essential to knowing God and that in sharing together "we are not alone anymore". "Heaven is a banquet and life is a banquet, too, even with a crust, where there is companionship", she said.

Friendship is a 'gift of wisdom', and it is friendship itself with God which is at the core of our belief. In my own tradition we talk about being companions "on the way" together. The very definition of God is community and connection. It is in God's DNA! It is also what churches can offer the wider community around us, especially toward those who are marginalised through various diversities and struggles. So, as we continue to 'emerge' from the shadows of being shut in and isolated, let's think about how we can put aside the things which cause separateness and re-connect in friendship and kindness. How refreshing to concentrate on what unites us rather than what divides us. We may just discover that we all have a lot in common!

February may not be best gardening time, but plenty of options out there

FEBRUARY is often not the most favourite month for gardening not only is it often hot and dry but the flies are troublesome.

However, there are many plants that love the heat and put on a real show this time of year.

One of those are the Echinacea also called the coneflower, which is one of the most popular herbs worldwide.

Native Americans have used it for centuries to treat various ailments.

We grow it for the stunning floral display. Coneflowers are perennials that bloom from summer to autumn.

It is an easy-going, long flowering plant, the flowers are daisy in appearance with raised cone-like centres which vary in colours from green to yellow and brown.

Depending on variety the flowers are usually purple, pink or white, however, hybrid colours ranging from hot red to sunset pink, pale yellow and oranges as well as double forms are available.

Echinacea prefer a full sun to light shade position in the garden that has well drained humus rich soil.

They are frost hardy and tolerant of drought conditions. Echinacea are ideal for borders, rock gardens, garden beds, pots and containers and look great planted en-masse.

They attract birds and butterflies to the garden and can be used fresh or dried for flower arranging.

One plant that has made a big comeback in popularity is the hydrangea, most of the mop top varieties are finishing flowering now and unless you want to keep the aging flowers, it is best to give them a cut back.

A good rule is to make the cut above two buds on the stem.

Coming into flower now and making a big statement are the paniculata hydrangeas.

Native to China and Japan, hydrangea paniculata is a deservedly popular deciduous shrub. Tough, cold hardy, easy care, long lived, it is laden with large, conical snowy flowers from midsummer to fall.

Each lacy flower cluster is composed of small fertile flowers, and larger showy sterile blossoms that are subtended by showy petal like sepals.

As an added bonus, they change colour as autumn approaches, gradually turning pink, and intimately brown. Persisting well into winter, the panicles provide additional winter interest.

As the flower show fades, the leaves turn to lovely shades of red for a breathtaking fall display. Paniculata hydrangeas can grow up to two metres plus and can be grown as a single stemmed specimen or multi-stemmed shrubs.

They require a few hours of direct sunlight to flower best and are not fussy about the soil type as long as it is well drained. They are more drought tolerant than other hydrangeas.

Perfect for the shrub or mixed border and make an excellent backdrop in a perennial bed.

The flowers can be used fresh or dried and they are best pruned back in late winter or early spring (blooms occur on current seasons growth).

There are many varieties = Grandiflora or Pee Gee is a very large growing variety with large white cone

shaped flowers that become pink-tinged.

Hydrangea paniculata greenspire features long pointy, conical panicles that retain their lime green colour and the most popular of the paniculatas is the Sundae Fraise.

This compact bushy shrub has large fluffy conical flower heads at the tips of gracefully arching branches in summer.

Opening creamy white in mid-summer the florets turn to strawberry-pink as they age, before finally taking on rich pinkish-red tones as autumn approaches.

The large blossoms retain their red colour for 3-4 weeks prior to turning brown.

With its compact habit, this hardy hydrangea adds striking flowers to small gardens and is perfect for patio containers.

Fleming's nursery is renowned for their quality trees and when there is a new species or variety it is only released after many years of trials in their gardens in Silvan.

This year they are delighted to introduce the latest and greatest all rounder landscaping shrub to Australia – Distylium.

It is an evergreen, low growing shrub that does its job without fuss or fanfare and loves a tough situation.

Originating in China, the Distylium has been refined through a breeding program in the United States where the evergreen shrub has become an exceptionally useful landscaping plant.

While preferring acidic soils they are highly adaptable to site conditions including heat and drought conditions as well as wet soils and cold climates.

Through Fleming's trialling program, it has shown that Distylium perform best in full sun to part shade positions, but will also cope well in full shade. They flower from winter through to early spring with small, inconspicuous red apetalous flowers along the stem. The best thing about this plant is that it is so easy.

Once established they require little to no maintenance they do not even need pruning, the first variety to be released is called Vintage Jade which has a distinctive layered branching habit, forming a low spreading shrub. As a single plant it will reach to around 1-2 metres tall and 1.5 metres wide.

In the vegetable garden there is plenty that can be planted now including brussel sprouts, broccoli, cauliflower, beetroot, spring onions and lettuce to name a few.

The main thing to look out for this time of year are the white butterflies that are in abundance at the moment. You can try using derris dust or the ornamental butterflies that are supposed to trick the white butterflies that that spot is already taken.

Seed of the above can also be planted along with carrots.

But if you don't want to garden this time of year, it is also a good time to plan and order trees for bare root, as most nurseries put in their orders and if you want multiples of trees or a specific rose now is the time to order.

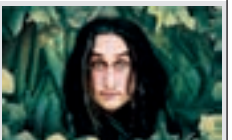

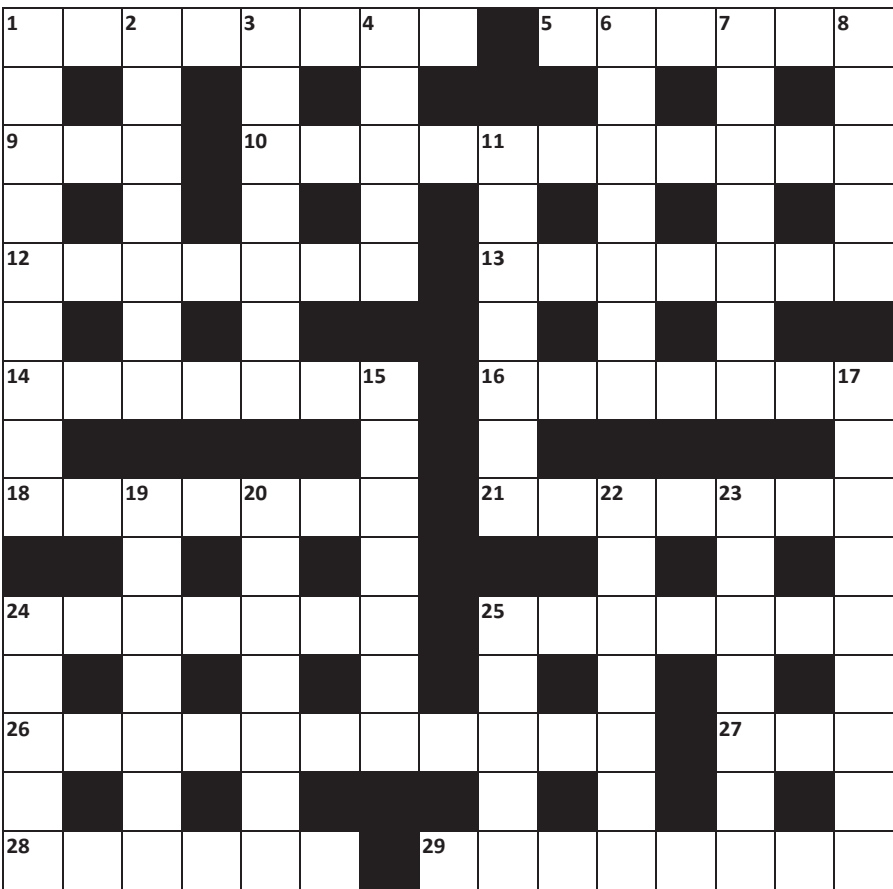

Australia's cattle herd to reach largest size in nearly a decade

THE Australian Beef industry and cattle herd are well positioned to capitalise on changing global supply dynamics in 2023.

This year will be a year of transition and maturity for Australia's cattle herd, with any increases in numbers now beyond rebuild status, with all key production metrics forecast to improve this year, according to the latest Cattle Industry Projections update from Meat & Live-stock Australia (MLA).

Continued rainfall and favourable seasonal conditions seen last year will ensure that there will be solid supply of both young and slaughter weight cattle over the next two years, regardless of seasonal outcomes.

Southern Australia will continue to drive increases in cattle numbers, particularly New South Wales, with supply improvements also expected from southern Western Australia, South Australia and Victoria to different extents.

In the north, 2022 saw favourable seasonal conditions for large parts of Queensland, driving the beginning of the state's herd rebuild and an improvement in female numbers. Northern Australia's rebuild is expected to gain significant pace this year.

Overall, the cattle herd in 2023 will grow to its highest level since 2014, reaching 28.8m head, an increase of 1.1m or 4.5% year-on-year. According to MLA's Senior Market Information Analyst Ripley Atkinson, this growth is underpinned by a few key factors.

"The record retention of

females for 15 consecutive months, coupled with above-average marking rates has delivered larger calf drops. This bodes well for supply to increase substantially in 2023 for both young and slaughter-weight cattle," Mr Atkinson said.

"Both of these metrics suggest that the lowest or most significant retention of stock on record occurred for the year. This underpins the positive growth in numbers forecast for the next three years

By 2025, the national herd is expected to reach its highest level since the 1970s at 29.6m head, before a steady decline. This continued growth is due to strong female reproductive performance, genetic improvements across

the herd and sound on farm management.

Input prices and cost of production will be major factors affecting the ability of the sector to remain productive and efficient.

In addition, the availability of skilled and unskilled workers to manage the increased supply of cattle in 2023 will be the major issue affecting the red meat industry. The processing sector's ability to process cattle will determine production levels and therefore exports in 2023.

MLA's Market Information team have recognised this with a two-scenario forecast for 2023.

"If labour concerns are not addressed within the processing sector, slaughter is forecast to reach 6m head,"

according to Mr Atkinson.

"Based on actual supply of cattle this year, the forecasts indicate an uptick in numbers to 6.625m head."

This year will be a year of transition for the cattle industry according to Mr Atkinson.

"Positive outcomes along the entire supply chain seem likely as the exceptional operating conditions on-farm continue.

"The overall outlook for Australia's beef industry both domestically and internationally is one of optimism and positivity, whilst it continues to deliver high quality beef in larger volumes, this is expected to be a major feature in 2023," Mr Atkinson said.

Nearly 14 per cent of all ABS semen sold to dairy farmers last year was ABS InFocus™ - a genetic product designed to breed a quality and consistent beef animal from a dairy cow.

Increasing demand for a genetic solution to improve the profitability of bobby calves and animal welfare in the dairy industry comes, as leading New Zealand milk processor Fonterra has ordered its dairy farmer suppliers to stop killing bobby calves.

Fonterra New Zealand suppliers must now raise bobby calves for beef, slaughter them for calf-veal or the pet food market.

ABS Australia technical and genetic services manager Matt Aikenhead said more dairy farmers than ever are looking for a sustainable solution to phase-out bobby calves.

WETLANDS are essential for the health of people and the planet.

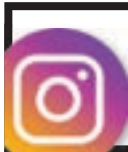

Horror year for workplace injuries

IN 2022, WorkSafe accepted 137 claims for workplace amputation injuries, with more than 150 body parts amputated, including at least 127 fingers or thumbs.

Digits caught or crushed in machinery or severed while using a saw accounted for about one third of all amputation claims.

Manufacturing was the most dangerous industry when it came to amputations, accounting for 45 per cent of claims. Construction made up 15 per cent.

Labourers were most at risk, with 51 accepted claims in 2022, followed by tradies (37) and production and transport workers (31).

In 2022, fines and court costs totalling \$256,094 were imposed by the courts against companies in eight WorkSafe prosecutions after workers sustained amputations.

Charges against nine other Victorian employers for alleged breaches of the Occupational Health and Safety Act that resulted in amputation injuries remain before the courts and 24 matters involving amputations are currently being investigated by WorkSafe.

Nicholson set to strut his stuff on the national stage

LOCAL prodigy Luke Nicholson, who paced Olympian Izzi Batt-Doyle in the Melbourne Marathon last year, is making some serious strides in his own running career as of late.

The San Remo athlete last week ran in the Box Hill Burn, searching for a quick time to earn him qualification into the Australian 5km Championships in Brisbane.

After training for months, running 90-100 kilometres per week, mixed between hard sessions, long runs, easy runs and gym sessions, Nicholson took aim at his goal, the National qualifying time of 15 minutes 30 seconds.

Competing on a 400m metre athletics track, Nicholson completed 12 and a half laps pacing himself with the quick group, who completed the first three kilometres only seconds slower than his personal best.

Nicholson spoke to the Sentinel-Times last week about his plans and feelings during the big event.

"Twelve and a half is a lot of laps so I just tried to settle in and find pace, it was wet, cool conditions, which I love, really set me up for a fast time," Nicholson said.

"I knew I was relatively fit, but was not expecting to be this quick, I always thought I had a chance for the time, but the mental and physical

fatigue can sometimes get the better of you."

The 21-year-old set himself up beautifully after the first three kilometres and he followed through in the final two to finish with an outstanding time of 15 minutes and 14 seconds, earning him national qualification!

He spoke on the outpouring of emotion he felt when the realisation that he had done it had hit.

"When I was crossing the line, my arms were elevated, and I was so happy with what I had achieved, I have had this goal in mind for over one and a half years," he said.

Nicholson is an extremely passionate and driven sportsman and has been working hard for several years, he is also a fantastic young man and former Newhaven College school captain.

He will now represent Victoria at the Australian Track and Field Championships in Brisbane in April, where there will be over 200 live events taking place.

"I am excited to race some of Australia's best over the five-kilometre distance, whilst Olympians and Commonwealth Games representatives will likely take the medal places, I look forward to being

in amongst some high-quality athletes," said Nicholson.

Nicholson, despite being insanely quick, finished 12th in the C grade race, showing how strong the Victorian distance running scene is.

"My goal for this championship will be to run a sub 15 minute race (14:59), that would be epic," he said.

He now plans to train with his Victorian teammates prior to the championships, in the hopes that they can build each other up to some sensational results.

The promising athlete, as usual, remained incredibly humble, and was extremely grateful for those that have assisted his career so far.

The talented runner is also excited to get more people involved and would absolutely love any and all support on his journey.

"As a full time Uni student (studying Health, PE and Chemistry teaching at Monash Uni), I will try my best to work and save up enough funds so I am seeking some local sponsorship to help cover my financial costs in getting to Brisbane," he said.

Speaking to the media after their session, a few of the local girls spoke on what it means to them to return home, train and coach the young locals.

"In the country footy and netball clubs are a big part of our communities, it's pretty much where you grow up as a country kid, the footy club is your family," McRae said.

"It's good too because I can just stay at mum and dads and I don't have to wake up as early, it's good to see the country community is getting exposed to more inner-city sports, because sometimes country and city are pretty separate and it's good that it's flowing out and getting to the grassroots of footy.

"When we were younger, we did basketball clinics and netball clinics but we never had footy

clinics, so it's great that there's now a pathway for younger girls to actually come through and have a pathway and you actually know people, you know families and you're helping them out."

Walton also enjoyed the local session and the shorter travel time, coming from the Island.

"It's really nice being home, it was only a 35-minute drive for me, some of my teammates were travelling three hours so it was a bit of a swap around since I'm usually the one driving so it's nice to have a camp down here, relax and show the boys the ropes," Walton said.

Hawks coaches Zane Littlejohn and Cherie O'Neill agreed with their players.

"We all started there, all our players and coaches all started at community clubs like Wonthaggi Power so it's nice to come back so to have local players on our list is really exciting," Littlejohn said.

"It's a really good opportunity and with the kid's clinic it's a really good chance to interact with a bit of community and it's a really good pathway for girls footy," O'Neill said.

"Community I think is vital for the sport to keep going ahead and keep building and it's going to grow the more kids that have a footy in their hands growing up the better the game will get as we go on."

BCSC representatives Ali Wastie (CEO), deputy mayor Rochelle Halstead and mayor Michael Whelan were also in attendance.

There really isn't a measure on the value of inspiring and growing junior and youth sport, especially in country regions such as the Bass Coast and the Hawks are determined to continue the relationship with the area and already have plans to help it thrive.

After hosting a previous junior footy clinic in Inverloch late last year, and backing it up with the weekend's event, the Hawks will return in late April when they make Wonthaggi their home for the weekend once again.

On Saturday April 30, during the VFL/VFLW season, Box Hill will host the Casey Demons in a blockbuster double header at the Wonthaggi Recreation Reserve, a ground that received much praise from the Hawks on

Saturday, despite the recent rain.

The Hawks and Demons matchup will surely be an exciting one, with the Casey men defending their 2022 premiership win against a Hawks squad who got a taste of finals a year ago, while the women's match features two teams coming off a finals berth and shapes to be a huge day for the region.

"We're really young but we've got a lot of youth and speed, so I'm really excited for that and everyone's really enthusiastic as well," said McRae.

"I'll definitely be putting my hand up for that one, it's really exciting to run out there (Wonthaggi) will be awesome, especially against Casey, so I'm looking forward to it," Walton said.

Fans can catch McRae and the local quartet in the women's match from 11:30am, while Walton and the Hawks men will take the field from 2:05pm.
