ROYAL Life Saving Australia's Summer Drowning Report 2023-24 was released last Friday, March 1, recording 99 drowning deaths across Australia between December 1, 2023 and February 29, 2024. It's an increase of 10 per cent on the 90 drowning deaths last summer and a five per cent increase on the five-year average of 94 drowning deaths. But in Victoria there has been a 23 per cent increase in summer drownings, up

from 22 last year to 27 this year, which is well above the five-year average of 19. Tragically, the Bass Coast local government area has punched well above its weight, and with a hot, holiday long weekend looming, there's expected to be one last crowd burst for our beaches. In 13 days over the summer, from Friday, January 12, when two people drowned at Smiths Beach and Kilcunda, and Wednesday, January 24, when there was a mass drowning at Forrest Caves on

Phillip Island, six visitors to Bass Coast have lost their lives. Another man in his 50s drowned while freediving with friends near Port Welshpool, on January 12, after he lost his fins. Anecdotally at least, there has also been a significant rise in the number of incidents where further tragedy was averted after surfers, off-duty surf lifesavers and others intervened.

Such was the case on Thursday, February 22 when Phillip Island surfers Niamh Moore and Leigh Conway were "in the right place at the right time" and affected the rescue of a three-year-old child and her parents after they were swept out in an inflatable ring at Smiths Beach.

The NSW Minister for Emergency Services, Jihad Dib, has moved quickly to address the problem in his state, by bringing together rescue organisations, researchers and government agencies for an experts' roundtable on Monday this week, March 4.

Local public affairs activist, Graham Jolly of Cape Woolamai, believes the Victorian Government should be doing likewise.

"Of course they should. It's been an absolute tragedy what has happened down here this summer and it's not just the families of the victims who've been affected," Mr Jolly said this week.

"The first responders, our surf lifesaving club volunteers and emergency services people; they've all been impacted by what's happened and the local community too. They're still talking about it.

"I went down to Anzacs (beach near Cape Woolamai) this week and that warning sign is still half submerged in the sand.

"And when is Phillip Island Nature Parks going to roll out its new signs.

"There's a hot holiday weekend coming up and no one seems to have done anything in response.

"I've petitioned the coroner to do a proper inquiry into the situation here."

We asked Bass MP, Jordan Crugnale, for a response.

She said she supports a similar initiative in Victoria to the 'Coastal Water Safety Roundtable' held in NSW yesterday and will be making representations along those lines in State Parliament this week, sitting from Tuesday, March 5 to Thursday, March 7.

NSW Emergency Minister Jihad Dib was quoted in the ethnic press in NSW this week about bringing together emergency services and relevant agencies.



Local emergency service personnel couldn't help but be affected by the mass drowning at Forrest Caves last month, and they'll be on alert at the prospect of one last big surge of visitors to the beach this long weekend.



Is Victoria dragging the chain when responding to the disastrous summer on our beaches?

"It's not just about better emergency response, it is also about building awareness in communities and finding those preventative actions that might save lives down the road," he said.

With predictions of a hot long weekend, including a 34-degree day in Bass Coast on Saturday, March 9, there's a pressing need for action and awareness of the dangers that exist.

Life Saving Victoria also supports the NSW initiative and will be closely monitoring the outcomes.

"We have had a similar scenario here this summer with drowning numbers up. We'll work closely with Life Saving Australia on the learnings that come out of this and look at setting up something similar in Victoria," said a spokesperson

for Life Saving Victoria.

Mr Jolly would like to see more direct messages on beach signs locally and more funding for local surf clubs to extend their patrols.

As it stands, Woolamai surf lifesavers will only be patrolling between 1pm-5pm on the hottest day, Saturday, and between 10am-4pm on Sunday and 10am-4pm on the holiday Monday.

"The authorities should be actively directing visitors away from dangerous beaches to patrolled locations and places like Cleeland Bight Beach, off The Cranny, which I would like to see patrolled through the summer as a safe swimming option," he said.

The State Government says they have already boosted funding to Life Saving Victoria:

"Since coming into Government, we have doubled our investment in Life Saving Victoria. Our record investment includes yearly funding for necessary training, equipment and water safety as well as an additional \$40 million to open new state-of-the-art lifesaving clubs," said a spokesperson.

"Victoria's lifeguards and lifesavers go above and beyond to educate and protect the community and save lives – we thank them for their vital service.

"We urge anyone visiting Victoria's beautiful waterways this summer to put their safety first – swim between the flags, never swim alone or when you've been drinking and always wear a lifejacket if you're on a boat, fishing, or not a confident swimmer."

Lifejackets still a must for rock fishers

THE Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) has completed a two-year trial on the pros and cons of making lifejackets mandatory at high-risk rock fishing locations on a permanent basis.

However, while the trial was officially over on the last day of February, it has been extended, VFA Chief Executive Officer Travis Dowling said last week, to ensure the safety of recreational fishers across Victoria while trial results are evaluated to determine longer-term arrangements.

"We know lifejackets save lives and we urge rock fishers to wear one no matter where they are right along the coast because no snapper is worth your life," Mr Dowling said.

"The new and extended zones have been identified through the two-year trial and will be added to the high-risk locations, meaning these important rules remain in place while we review the data and consider preventative measures."

The trial was spectacularly successful at Punchbowl Rocks near San Remo on Monday, November 13 last year when a fisherman, who was in the water for several hours, after being washed off the rocks while trying to retrieve a fish, was rescued by police helicopter.

One of the first responders said the man was wearing an approved PFD which almost certainly saved his life.

Now, almost everyone wears a lifejackets at Punchbowl rocks and the other dangerous rock fishing locations in the area.

The VFA has identified four new locations as high-risk zones where lifejackets will now be mandatory while the trial evaluation is taking place.

They are Jump Rock near Lorne and Phillip Island's Sunderland Bay, Kitty Miller Bay and Cowries Rock Platform.

High-risk zones at Punchbowl Rocks and Potters Hill Road, near San Remo, will be extended to include all rock platforms between Bore Beach and Kilcunda.

Existing zones at Pyramid Rocks on Phillip Island, Artillery Rocks (west of Lorne), Sheoak Falls (south of Lorne) and Cape Bridgewater (near the blowholes car park), remain classified as high risk, with fishers requiring a compliant lifejacket.

Updated signage in several languages is being added to access tracks.

More local productions to South Gippsland

THE Allan Labor Government is enhancing access to arts and culture in South Gippsland, bolstering investments in fresh comedy, music, circus, and theatre experiences for both local residents and visitors to savour.

Minister for Creative Industries, Colin Brooks, has unveiled support for 15 community groups through the Small Regional Presenters program. These initiatives will breathe life into community halls, mechanics institutes, and theatres across the region. This year's program aims to empower community groups and not-for-profit organisations, enabling them to bring creative performances to their local communities, facilitated by Regional Arts Victoria.

In Fish Creek fans of comedy, music, and history are in for a treat with Piano Palooza, presented by Fish Creek Memorial Hall Inc. Meanwhile, music enthusiasts in Tarwin Lower and Venus Bay will each enjoy a night of folk/acoustic music performances in the Small Halls.

The latest investment will also bring a diverse program of musical, comedy and storytelling of Piano Palooza and the all-women circus show Casting Off to the community halls of Strzelecki and Mirboo.

Blaze Aid fencing for Mirboo North

ALREADY, without advertising that they are coming to town to set up camp, the volunteer-driven fencing organisation Blaze Aid has 22 farmers needing help with their fencing.

They're now liaising with the South Gippsland Shire Council for a suitable camp site,

and expect to be established in the area within two weeks.

"One of the main things we have to do is find a suitable place to set up camp; somewhere with power, toilets and showers and access to a kitchen for catering purposes," said Blaze Aid's Mirboo North coordinator Peter Jones.

"Once we're on site, we can put out the word for extra jobs and also for volunteers.

"We do welcome local volunteers, and you don't have to have any experience because we have team leaders who will show you what to do.

"But certainly, many hands make light work. If we have a big crew we can do 100s of metres of fencing in a day.

"We do get a lot of grey nomads, students and backpackers too. The travelers can use their time at the camp as part of their 88-day visa requirement.

"But we provide all the meals and somewhere to stay, with the emphasis on enjoying yourself while you're here.

"But right now, the priority is setting up the camp."

Dispensary generator stolen

THE Miners' Dispensary's generator was stolen in the early hours of the morning of Wednesday, February 14. Consequently, the dispensary lost around \$60,000 worth of stock.

Patients who were expecting to collect their refrigerated medicines were inconvenienced. Patients who were booked for COVID and Shingles vaccinations during the week of the power outage were unable to have their planned vaccinations.

The staff now have refrigerated items back in stock, and the incident is under investigation.

Frankston woman killed in Friday morning crash

POLICE are investigating the circumstances surrounding a fatal crash near Kongwak last Friday morning.

Emergency services were called to Inverloch-Kongwak Road, about 2.5km north of Lynnes Road, just before 6am after a car was discovered off the roadway.

It is believed the car left the road and rolled into a paddock sometime early in the morning, while travelling through a curved section of the road.

On arrival, crews located the deceased driver, a 27-year-old Frankston woman, in the vehicle.

The exact circumstances surrounding the crash are yet to be determined and investigations remain ongoing.

What about the new Island tip?

THE Bass Coast Shire Council has bought a site for a new transfer station on Phillip Island, planning to move its facilities out of Cowes, but when?

Kym Lightfoot wrote to council seeking an update on progress at the Gap Road site: "Council purchased the Gap Road property on Phillip Island with the purpose of having a new transfer station. What process actions has council undertaken towards the building of the Transfer Station currently?"

Shire response: "Funds have been allocated in the Long Term Financial Plan and the project is currently in the scoping stage."

Phillip Island's \$12 million 'big battery', prompted by the Totally Renewable Phillip Island group (TRPI), is so far the only development on the Gap Road site.

Pools 'shovel ready' or buried?

AFTER the opening of the Cowes cultural centre in November last year, at a cost of \$31.3 million, it seems that twin plans for aquatic centres at Cowes and Wonthaggi are on the back burner.

No so, said the council in answer to a question from Kym Lightfoot.

"Would council please provide a listing of the stepped processes council must undertake that would enable the building of an Aquatic Centre in Cowes within the next three years?"

Council response: "In 2022, Council advocated to State and Federal Governments for funding through election promises to progress the Aquatics Project. Council was unsuccessful in achieving funding through either State or Federal Governments. Advocacy continues throughout 2023/24. The aquatics projects are shovel ready and relies on all levels of Government funding to progress further."

Community Bank provides relief

WHEN disaster struck so close to home, the Board of the Community Bank Mirboo North & District was keen to help make a difference to the lives of those locals who have found themselves in need. The Board was quick to decide to make a generous \$50,000 donation to the Gippsland Emergency Relief Fund (GERF).

NO DOGS ALLOWED

The enormous clean up for Mirboo North

TRUCKS and large machines rumbled along the streets in and around Mirboo North last week as the town clean-up continues with volunteers, council, government and private contractors working alongside one another.

Huge piles of fallen gums still line the roadsides of Mirboo North and two weeks after there remains evidence of the storm in every street, to varying degrees.

Some houses have their rooves caved in, unliveable, some have tiles ripped off with tarps covering holes, and one has a tarp covering the entire roof.

Logs, large trees and tree branches, sheets of tin, structural material, water damaged furniture and other items remain stacked in front yards, along driveways, and on nature strips.

Dump trucks, excavators, bull dozers, backhoes and loaders are aplenty around the most affected parts of town with more being floated in.

Danny Forrester, with CUT360, who are working as council subcontractors, said he had been on the job for eight days straight and they were working their way down Wells Road clearing trees and debris from along the roadside and nature strips.

"It's going to take a while" he said, of the entire clean-up.

Just around the bend on Old Thorpdale Road, gum trees lay in lengthy mounds on the roadside and in the front yard opposite.

The yard belongs to local woman Vera.

Fortunately, when the storm hit, Vera wasn't home as a large gum tree smashed into

the roof above the bedrooms and hail poured in causing immense damage to her home.

A large gum tree had fallen onto her driveway, blocking access and many more had fallen across her yard, damaging sheds.

The top of a large cypress hedge at the rear of her property had also snapped off.

"The reserve fell on me," she said simply.

Services had been quick to clear the tree from her house and driveway and the remnants are stacked up in her yard, along with a small hill of mulch.

"I've probably got enough mulch now to last me a lifetime," she said.

Vera is wondering if her front fence line will be cleared of the large fallen gums, as it

is, to her knowledge, not defined.

The insurance assessors have been and for now she is staying with family as her power has been switched off as a safety precaution.

She looks up warily at the splintered gums trees that remain next to her property and talks about a path that she used to wander through, that is now just a pile of debris.

Last week the South Gippsland Shire Council began a curb side collection of green waste and other waste and Council CEO Kerry Ellis commented on work being undertaken.

"Our outdoors team has cleared about 140 roads so far and we've got about 180 roads still to clear, and there are in excess of 1200

kilometres of road that require full inspection to determine whether they're safe or need further work," Ms Ellis said.

"We received 1150 calls over the past week and an additional 477 relating to trees and road hazards and we're working through responding to those as best we can."

Machines were also busy mulching trees in the fenced off reserve near the public swimming pool.

Hansen Yuncken, a Melbourne based construction company has been appointed by the state and federal government to also assist in clean-up operations.

And local volunteers are still working hard helping out friends and neighbours in a cohesive, community driven and supported effort.

\$6000 dog attack declared minor

A LEONGATHA resident was walking her dog in a residential street when she was rushed at by two dogs coming out of a nearby property, she was then bitten and bowled over.

Bev* who is in her late seventies, sustained bites to her hand, fingers, thumb and elbow as she tried to defend her own dog.

She ended up on the ground unable to move her arm properly and covered in blood. Bev called her husband to come and get her, who also called an ambulance.

The dog owner retrieved the two animals, stating they were just playing, put them in the car and drove away.

Bev subsequently underwent a shoulder reconstruction as a result of the fall.

The surgery left the couple \$6000 out of pocket, Bev in a sling for six weeks, and having to undergo countless hours of physiotherapy to regain full range of movement in her arm.

A Council Officer attended a few days later and assessed the bites Bev sustained, which

had mostly healed by then.

According to Bev, the officer did not take her fall or shoulder injury into account and declared the incident as minor.

This was confirmed by the South Gippsland Shire Council who stated in writing that: The dog owner has received infringements; however Council will not be proceeding with prosecution of a serious attack.

The reason cited for this is that under The Domestic Animals Act 1994, a burden of proof has to be clearly established.

South Gippsland Shire Council confirmed that Menacing and Dangerous Declarations are also managed under the Act and stated that: At this stage there is not enough evidence for Council to commence the process of a declaration in relation to this animal.

A couple of weeks prior to the incident the same dog had rushed the couples own dog, causing it an injured spine resulting in a limp, and a visit to

the vet and anti-inflammatories were needed.

"That dog is well known around here for being nasty," said Bev's husband.

In the South Gippsland Shire Council's Domestic Animal Management Plan 2022-2025, it states that a dangerous dog is one that a council has declared dangerous because it has bitten a person or animal, causing serious injury or death.

However, between 2021-2022, 37 dog attacks or rushes were reported to South Gippsland Shire Council and only three dogs were Registered Declared Dogs - known to be dangerous, menacing or of a restricted breed.

The couple are frustrated with the council for not acting, despite evidence the dog is dangerous, with no fencing in the dog owners front yard to prevent similar incidents happening in the future.

"The one dog which is known to be quite vicious and horrible needs to be euthanised, or it has got to be under some sort of strict control," said

Bev's husband.

The couple would like to at least see changes made to leash laws for dogs outside their homes, which is a view supported by 64 per cent of people in South Gippsland, according to South Gippsland Shire Council's Domestic Animal Management Plan 2022-2025.

Council has stated that during the consultation for both the development of the Domestic Animal Management Plan 2022-2025 and the General Local Law 2024, Council received feedback in relation to dogs on leash in South Gippsland.

But for Council to implement this as law, it has to be Gazetted as a Council Order under the Act and this is not included in Council's General Local Law.

South Gippsland Shire Council state that further consultation to consider the development of this Order is proposed to commence later this year.

Recognising the need for sustainability and affordable housing in Bass Coast

THE community were updated on the Wonthaggi North East precinct, affordability housing strategy and economic development framework during a sustainability development forum at the Wonthaggi Golf Club last Wednesday.

Hosted by the Bass Coast Shire Council and welcoming residents, and business owners, CEO Greg Box encouraged the community to network during a buffet breakfast before hearing from guest speakers Wade Bashaw, Dr Rachel Goldlust and Brendan Condon.

Dr. Rachel Goldlust, Mr Bashaw and Mr Condon discussed the importance of balancing social inclusion, environmental sustainability, and economic prosperity in the coastal region.

They emphasised the need for sustainable building practices and innovations, such as tree-lined streets and protected views, while acknowledging the need for industrial and

commercial land.

Later, during a question panel Dr. Goldlust and Mr Condon discussed the importance of building resilient homes that can withstand the impacts of climate change and rising energy prices.

Dr Goldlust highlighted the benefits and challenges of electrification in housing

and emphasised the need for a circular economy approach to meet the challenges of the future.

Mr Greg Box stated that the climate change action plan target with net zero emissions by 2030 sets clear direction for council to promote more sustainable residential development in the region and

intersects with council's other plans and strategies.

"The first of those for council is the Wonthaggi North East precinct - a comprehensive project designed to foster the growth and development of Wonthaggi, and extending from the existing township into a green and connected new community.

With the intention to build more sustainably into the future, the panel discussed ways in which developers and council can work together to develop a sustainable precinct that will help with lowering the cost of household bills into the future.

However, this plan raised the concern of housing affordability during the current housing crisis, with resident and architect Barbara Moje asking the panel to focus on the demographic of the town and consider high density development to help with low-income earners and single households, as Bass Coast is currently dealing with a rise in homelessness.

COUNCIL BRIEFS

Inverloch beach path along the road

CONCERNED about a lack of progress on the extension of the Inverloch foreshore pathway, Terry Parkin put this question to the Bass Coast Council at their February Meeting.

"Why is council again consulting with the Inverloch community on the continuation design of the shared pathway all the way to the Surf Club when previously the council and the community agreed to the design that council has partly built which is a safer option?"

Shire response: "The options for design in the 2019 community engagement for the shared pathway alignment were conditional on consents and permits being issued under the Marine and Coastal Act 2018. Council was able to secure these consents and permits for the 3a section of pathway between Veronica and Ozone streets, but not for the 3b section of pathway between Ozone and Goroke streets.

"This has resulted in the 3b section being limited to construction within the road

reserve and reducing the amount of design options available to Council."

But, will it be safe for pedestrians?

Council meetings at Berninnet?

RESTRICTIONS on the number of people attending Bass Coast council meetings would be a thing of the past, according to Louise Lyell, who put a suggestion to council in February.

"When will council relocate council meetings to the purpose-built Cowes Community Centre so that residents do not have to RSVP for one of the maximum six seats currently available in the not-for-purpose Wonthaggi Council Chambers. I believe patronage would increase at council meetings through better accessibility?"

Response: "Berninnet is a cultural centre, not a purpose-built location for Council meetings, although Council meetings may be held there. The Council Chamber has been reconfigured to provide increased

seating for the public gallery at Council meetings."

Council watcher John Trigt, who was recently denied a seat in the council chambers asked a similar question.

Pump track update, please

COUNCIL watcher, John Trigt, has written to council asking when the Cape Woolamai Pump Track will be built.

"Can the mayor advise the youth of Cape Woolamai the timeline and status update on the proposed pump track for Cape Woolamai and will it be considered in this in this year's budget."

Response: "Council has convened a community reference group to deliver the Mountain Bike, BMX, Pump Strategy. This Strategy will inform the delivery of new infrastructure across the Shire and is anticipated to be completed by mid-2024."

The short answer then, not provided by council, is 'No'.

The draft annual budget is usually produced in April

each year.

Mal Pinkerton put a similar question to last week's council meeting.

WHAT is the 'Capital Advancement' fund?

BASS Coast Ratepayers group officer, Graham Jolly, appears to have put his finger on another Bass Coast Shire slush fund offering little or no accountability about where the funds end up.

At February's council meeting he asked about six unnamed 'Capital Advancement' projects in the shire's capital works budget, each with funding allocations against them but no more detail. What are they for? he asked.

Shire response: "Capital advancement is an additional contingency set up in response to significant volatility in the construction industry. Any unspent funds will be used to fund projects in the 2024/25 Capital Works Program."

It might be interesting to ask if any Capital Advancement funds went towards the \$31.3M cost of Berninnet.

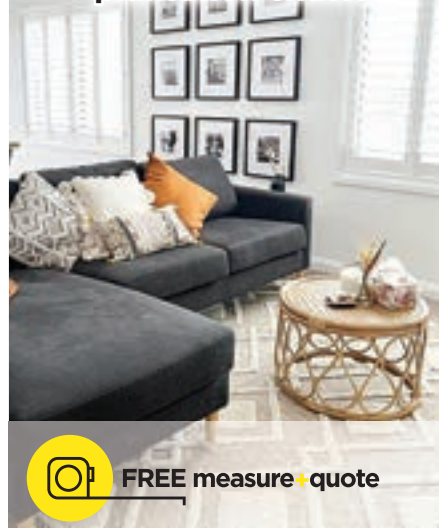

Now, Berninneit's a Passivhaus building

FINALLY, we have the real answer to a question asked of the Bass Coast Shire Council on May 17 last year about when 'the German windows' for the Cowes Cultural Centre would be arriving.

Fact is they arrived almost four months after Berninneit was officially opened, in November last year, which we are told is standard practice for windows in the construction sector, as the supply chain notoriously causes lengthy delays.

Here's what Terry Parkin asked about the windows at Bass Coast Council question time on May 17, 2023:

Terry Parkin, Cowes Cultural and Community Centre Windows. "Would council please advise when will the very special air sealed windows and doors that are being made in Germany for the Cowes Cultural and Community Centre will be delivered to the site of the new build."

Council response: "McCorkell Constructions are responsible for coordinating the supply, delivery and installation of every element of the build. They will continue to work with suppliers to ensure items are delivered in line with

project timelines."

The Sentinel-Times was asked to find out about the construction activity going on at the Cowes cultural centre last week and Deputy Mayor Cr Rochelle Halstead was able to confirm that "new doors from Germany are being fitted, the ones there were temporary until the Passivhaus windows arrived".

Council had the perfect opportunity to update

the community on the late arrival of the Passivhaus windows at last month's council meeting when it received two questions about when the Passivhaus assessment would be available.

Clearly one of the reasons why the council hasn't received its Passivhaus certificate is because they were still waiting for the Passivhaus doors and windows.

It is understood that the cost of the windows is part of the original contracted amount, and the principal contractor wears the cost of the delay.

But an issue for a council that prides itself on elite waste reduction, recycling and sustainability is what happens to the temporary windows and glass doors removed to make way for the German windows?

EPA fines farmer over dairy effluent in waterway

EPA Victoria has fined a farmer in the Fish Creek district \$1923 for allowing more than 1000 litres of dairy effluent to flow into a waterway that leads to Shallow Inlet.

EPA officers conducting a proactive inspection discovered effluent draining from an effluent pond through a pipe and into an unnamed waterway.

They also found signs that a nearby sump had overflowed, leaving pools of effluent on open ground.

The fine is the latest in a series of infringement notices issued by EPA officers as they conduct proactive inspections on dairy farms across Gippsland.

EPA Gippsland Regional Manager Jessica Bandiera says the mismanagement of dairy effluent is a problem right across the region, and the proactive inspections of dairy farms will continue.

"Dairy effluent must not be allowed into waterways. It is high in substances that can be toxic and pose a risk to the environment, stock and people's health," Ms Bandiera said.

"Properly managed on the farm, it becomes useful fertiliser, but flowing into a waterway it is a hazard to wildlife and neighbouring farms," she said.

EPA and other agencies offer advice for landholders on how to comply with the law and make sure dairy effluent is a valuable resource and not a threat to the environment.

"EPA officers can give landholders compliance advice for minor issues, or issue regulatory notices listing the required actions to fix a more pressing problem, but EPA won't hesitate to issue fines where serious mismanagement makes it necessary," Ms Bandiera said.

Every Victorian has a duty under the law to take reasonable actions to protect the environment, and in this case, the landholder has been issued with an EPA Improvement Notice requiring the dairy effluent system to be modified to prevent any further discharges into waterways.

Man of music and flowers

THE late Rodney Emmerson often picked 15,000 daffodils, from his own award-winning plots, on a farm just outside Leongatha, ahead of the town's time-honoured daffodil festival, to promote the event beforehand, and also as part of the magnificent display mounted each year in the Memorial Hall.

But as much as his name is synonymous with the Leongatha Daffodil Festival, for which he was the driving force for more than 50 years, Rodney Emmerson's selfless contribution to the town and the district went well beyond the humble green and gold bloom which has become the symbol of the town.

As mourners at his funeral service in Leongatha heard on Friday, March 1, he was for 68 years, from the age of 17, organist at St Andrew's Uniting Church in Leongatha, often playing for three services on a Sunday, morning and evening at Leongatha and also at St Andrew's Union Church in Tarwin Lower.

He also played for countless weddings, funerals and events; donating back any proceeds to the church.

He was also a key figure, with head shire gardener at the time, Richard Lester, in the rejuvenation of one of Gippsland's most treasured horticultural assets, Moss Vale Park at Berrys Creek.

Rodney James Emmerson, the son of dairy farmers Ernie and (Isabella) Jean Emmerson, older brother of Glenice and Joan, was born at Fish Creek on October 21, 1938 and attended the Fish Creek Primary School and Foster High School before moving to

Leongatha at 13 years of age in 1951.

He had already been travelling there by train for piano lessons since the age of nine.

Something else that might have prompted the move was the first Leongatha Daffodil Show, staged two years earlier, at the initiative of Rodney's father Ernie, and by 1957 becoming a major event in the town. It will celebrate its 75th anniversary this year.

Rodney's interest in propagating daffodils started early when he was given some daffodil bulbs, and by 1951, according to fellow Leongatha Horticultural Society leader, Sue Thompson, he started to buy daffodil bulbs in an effort to produce some award-winning blooms.

But, after winning champion daffodil for the first time in 1955, a severe bout of daffodil disease wiped out his collection and his progress, and he started again, maintaining a strict regime of biosecurity to protect the plants from then onwards.

An excellent student at school, he won the Victorian Alliance Française award for the best French pronunciation before going on to work in the State Bank in Leongatha and later in Melbourne.

Nephew Rohan Michael recalled Rodney telling him that he was taught how to fire a pistol and carried one around with him while completing funds transfers in Melbourne.

"I can assure you that no bank

employees would be allowed to wander around with guns in Melbourne's streets today," said Rohan while delivering part of the eulogy on behalf of the family.

On moving back to Leongatha, to work on the farm, Rodney expanded his involvement in the leadership of various horticultural organisations regionally, and also branched out into plant breeding. With local grower, Dolly Horn of Leongatha North, between 1975 and 1983, he grew a new, cross-pollinated Magnolia from seed, later to be named Dolly Horn, which won numerous awards before going into commercial production.

While Rodney was awarded the John Pascoe Fawcner Medal by the Royal Horticultural Society of Victoria for exemplary service to horticulture, he declined nomination for others, including the South Gippsland Shire Citizen of the Year award, content to remain humble and self-effacing despite his immense knowledge of horticulture.

Rodney Emmerson died at Woorayl Lodge in Leongatha on February 18, 2024, after a brief stay, and the family expressed its sincere gratitude to staff for their care and attention. Rodney was 85.

A feature of the funeral service at St Andrew's Uniting Church in Leongatha was the organ music by Dorothy Warren and two exquisite floral arrangements by Maureen Quigley and Dawn Green which graced the altar at the church.

Rodney is buried at the Leongatha Cemetery within sight of his daffodils on the edge of town where a parcel of land has been set aside as a botanic garden.



Crack and down she came

THE tranquil late Sunday ambience of Marine Parade in San Remo was broken around 5.30pm, quite literally when one of the old Cypress Pines, opposite the Beachside Bakehouse (near IGA) lost one of its big branches.

One of the first on the scene was Bass Coast Deputy Mayor Cr Rochelle Halstead, who was meeting with friends outside the San Remo Hotel.

"We were just sitting there when there was this almighty crack. A few people said I should go down and have a look, so I did."

What Cr Halstead found was

several small branches of the old tree on the ground, but also a huge, broken branch perched precariously across another branch and likely to fall anytime.

"I called the SES and got on to Unit Manager Mandy Chancellor. They offered to come down but acknowledged it was too big for them so we called the shire's afterhours number.

"They were very good getting here quickly and cordoning the area off. We then got a cherry picker in to make the area safe.

"There have been concerns about these trees in the past. Imagine if a car was parked

underneath or someone walked past.

"I think we need to be having a look at all these old Cypress pines and seeing if they need to come down."

All's well that end's well but maybe, consider not parking under one of these trees especially on a windy day.

Woorayl Lodge builds towards Boags Road project

THERE are hopes for extra aged care beds in Leon-gatha by mid-2026 as Woorayl Lodge management continues progress to bring stage 1 of its planned Boags Road facility to fruition.

The first stage is intended to add about 40 beds to existing capacity, with the current Mc-Cartin Street facility having 40 permanent beds, and one re-spite bed, with a waiting list of 30 for permanent beds.

The buildings will be created in pod form, with eight to 11 rooms per pod, with an office and kitchen to be included in stage 1.

“Each pod will be designed to be able to manage high care residents,” Co-CEO Jaimee Brydon said.

While a council permit has been issued, management is awaiting the outcome of an application for funding through the Federal Government’s Growing Regions Program.

Stage 1 has been budgeted at \$22 million, with \$8.25 million of that to be provided by the grant, if successful, and that figure to be matched by Woorayl Lodge and the remaining approximately \$5.5 million to be generated through fund-raising.

Should the grant application be successful, work would need to get underway by May this year, with a two-year time frame anticipated



for stage 1 works.

That build time would allow fundraising efforts to continue during building, with money raised going towards the later fit-out costs.

As for the sought after Federal grant, management will pursue funding through round 2 of the same program if unsuccessful in round 1.

Discussions have been taking

place with builders and consultants to enable construction to get underway in a timely fashion once funding is secured.

Member for Gippsland South Danny O’Brien was an interested visitor on Thursday, hearing about the stage 1 plans, but is not able to campaign for State Government funding with facilities such as Woorayl Lodge falling in the Federal domain.

Mayor’s Message

HELLO South Gippsland.

The clean-up continues in our region, and likely will for some time. I’d like to thank everyone who has and continues to roll up their sleeves and support South Gippsland.

On Tuesday, a Community Update Meeting was held in Mirboo North. Updates were provided to the community by Emergency Recovery Victoria, the Incident Control Centre, the CFA and Council. Other agencies were in attendance including the Department of Families Fairness and Housing, Agriculture Victoria (DEECA), SES, Aus-Net, Telstra and the Department of Education. All agencies were available after the meeting to answer questions from the community. Council also held a BBQ afterwards. Thank you to those who attended this meeting and participated respectfully.

Earlier in the week, the Chief Executive Officer and I showed Steve Dimopoulos MP (Minister for Environment, Tourism Sport and Major Events, and Outdoor Recreation) and Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action Secretary John Bradley around Mirboo North. Later in the week, we also had Minister for Mental Health Ingrid Stitt MP and the Minister for Water and Housing Harriet Shing MP come to the region. They, along with all other local members and Ministers who have visited, wanted to understand the impact to the region and was a prime opportunity to highlight what we need from the state government to help our community.

Substantial Koonwarra Landfill cost variation detailed

A SUBSTANTIAL contract variation for the construction of a new cell at the Koonwarra Landfill site has been explained, following the announcement of an almost \$774,000 increase in the cost of the project, which was initially just under \$2 million excluding GST.

The contract variation was approved by South Gippsland Shire Council CEO Kerry El-lis after consultation with the mayor and councillors on December 6 last year.

Council’s director of sustainable infrastructure, Tony Peterson, responded to the Sentinel-Times’ request for details on the project and the reason for the substantial increase in

the contract amount for the construction of Cell 5.

“Cell 4, which is the active cell, is reaching the end of its life and will probably be at capacity sometime this year, which is why we need to build the next landfill cell,” Tony said.

He anticipates the new cell, the final one for the site, being in service for approximately 10 years.

Tony explained that expected timeframe to fill the new cell, once complete, is based on council’s ability to improve its waste management.

There are plans to implement a system that takes food and green organics out of landfill, as well as introducing recycling improvements that

will also reduce landfill volumes.

Construction of the new cell is being undertaken by Goldsmith Civil and Environmental Pty Ltd, with that business specialising in landfill construction and having built the last two cells in Koonwarra.

“The contract variation was due to the removal and disposal of unsuitable subgrade material, and the sourcing and carting of suitable clay liner material,” Tony said.

“Prior investigation had been undertaken on the site; however, after the completion of the bulk earthworks component of the contract, the existing clay seams identified in the investigation did not provide the

required quantity of suitable clay liner material.”

Tony explained that construction of a landfill cell is heavily audited under the EPA regulations, with an environmental auditor overseeing the whole process and guiding any required changes.

“Where the cell is being built, we had to move about 15 metres of material above it, so even though we’d done a lot of bores, when you’re drilling down to that depth it’s hard to get a good picture of material,” he said.

He elaborated that an impermeable clay liner, meeting precise specifications, is required for the landfill cell to be compliant.

Emphasised was the collective aspiration to enhance community resilience against the backdrop of recent storm activity and power and communication outages.

It was unanimously agreed by participants that a subsequent gathering, featuring a more formal meeting agenda, will be hosted in the coming months.

This next step will look to build on the momentum achieved during the inaugural meeting, further solidifying the foundation for meaningful collaboration and action.

Legacy still benefiting children's hospital

LOCH Village Market, on Sunday March 10, continues the area's proud tradition of supporting the Royal Children's Hospital.

While Poowong Apex Club is now disbanded, it long ran annual family fun days at Loch Memorial Reserve raising money for the hospital.

Items owned by the club will be sold at Sunday's market, with all proceeds from that going to the Royal Children's Hospital Appeal, along with donations at the gate.

Noel Gregg, a member of the Strzelecki Lions Club which runs the Loch Village Market praised the contribution the Poowong Apex Club made through its fundraising event that ran until the COVID pandemic hit.

"They've been very successful in raising funds for the Royal Children's Hospital," he said of the Apex Club's contribution over the years.

Noel said the Lions Club is happy to play a small part by enabling the dispersal of former Apex Club items and resultant fundraising for the cause.

Men's Sheds in Venus Bay and Leongatha receive government grants

THE Allan Labor Government has announced the latest round of the Men's Shed Funding Program, aimed at improving the health and wellbeing of communities across Victoria. Among the 28 Men's Sheds to receive a grant are the Leongatha Men's Shed and the Venus Bay Tarwin Lower and District Men's Shed.

The Leongatha Men's Shed, under the South Gippsland Shire Council, will receive a grant of \$21,921.

The \$21,921 will go towards solar panels on the roof and security screens on the doors and windows.

"We're absolutely thrilled to get it and it's a bit of icing on the cake," President Max Wood said of the grant, noting there had been a couple of break-ins recently, although fortunately no major loss or damage.

Mr Wood is unsure the exact savings from the solar panels but acknowledges "it's going to assist", especially with the recent installation of a large dust extraction system.

The Venus Bay Tarwin Lower and District Men's Shed, also under the South

Gippsland Shire Council, will receive a substantial grant of \$64,260, for a 12x5 metre extension to an existing shed.

"Membership is going crazy at the moment - 53 members in the same community," Venus Bay Tarwin Lower and District Men's Shed

president John Hyett said.

"We need more social space and that is what this funding will go towards."

The Men's Shed is also speaking with local community groups exploring how they can share the new space which will include a dedicated office/meeting area.

Open Wednesday and Saturday from 10am to 1pm people can support the Men's Shed with a selection of locally made wooden goods in their little shop at 190 Lees Road, Venus Bay.

Men's Sheds provide a welcoming place for people to connect, socialise, and work on common projects together. They play a crucial role in improving the mental health of their members by reducing social isolation and promoting inclusion. Members share their skills, learn new ones, and make new mates in their local area.

The members of these sheds support their local communities in various ways, including running first-aid courses, making toys for children, and making equipment for community service organisations like the Country Fire Authority.

- Sporting Club Grants Program: for uniforms, equipment and resources that improve accessibility and engagement; support for athlete travel, strengthening volunteering, and new sport or recreation programs.

- Sport and Recreation Victoria also have funding including the new Youth Aquatic Accreditation Program to financially assist young people aged 16 to 25 years to undertake accreditation to ensure they are qualified to teach swimming and water safety. Other streams include:

Emergency Sporting Equipment, Significant Sports Events, Regional Sporting Infrastructure and more.

The Nationals Member for Gippsland South, Danny O'Brien said it is understandable that local farmers, some of whom are facing clean-up bills of up to \$100k for fence and tree clean-up alone, feel as though they have been forgotten by the Governments.

Mr O'Brien said he had written to the Minister for Agriculture asking that funding be made available for these farmers as a matter of priority.

"In addition to clean-up costs, I am aware of farmers who have lost or suffered significant damage to crops of potatoes and snow peas, while the Mirboo North nursery experienced almost 100 per cent plant damage.

"There are clean-up grant arrangements in place which were used following the large storms in June and October 2021 which should be made available now to assist these farmers when they need it most."

Mr O'Brien said the problem was caused by criteria in the current disaster funding arrangements which requires

a certain percentage of a region to be directly affected by the natural disaster before there will be clean-up assistance from the state and federal governments.

"Unfortunately, we now face the same situation we did a month ago when local farmers who were severely impacted by the 2023 Boxing Day floods also missed out on much needed recovery funds.

"It is clear to me that the current funding arrangements are letting our local farmers down and change is needed. The threshold

requirement simply doesn't make sense to me when there are some events, which may be highly localised, that can't be managed or insured against.

"Farmers do their best to be prepared and take precautionary action but it's impossible to prepare for severe, localised natural disasters and they really need recovery funding support."

Mr O'Brien said he had also raised this matter in Parliament with the Minister for Emergency Services and will continue to advocate for a change.

Donations support storm victims

GIPPSLAND Emergency Relief Fund is still busy providing emergency financial support to Gippsland residents impacted by the recent storm event.

"The focus has been on supporting those whose property is uninhabitable or has suffered severe damage. We are also ensuring that vulnerable residents such as the elderly and those with special needs are provided with prompt support," Gippsland Emergency Relief Fund (GERF) president Mr Andy Tegart said.

"GERF is working very closely with local government recovery teams, and we expect there will continue to be a regular stream of referrals over the next week or two, so GERF will continue to rely on the generosity of donors large and small. This event could eventually see up to \$500,000 in disbursements," Mr Tegart said.

GERF has been well supported by a large range of individual donors, some large corporate donations and very pleasingly a wide range of local community groups have responded to the appeal providing donations to assist community members.

GERF is particularly grateful to AusNet Services (\$100,000) and Community Bank Mirboo North (\$50,000) for their substantial donations.

All these magnificent donations will assist families right across Gippsland.

Donations to the appeal can be easily made via the GERF website (gerf.com.au) and all donations over \$2 are tax deductible.

"Every dollar donated to the appeal is distributed to those who suffered property damage during the storm, and individuals and businesses in Gippsland have always been very generous in their support. Your donation will be helping us to help others in their time of need," Mr Tegart said.

GERF has been supporting Gippsland residents impacted by natural disaster since 1978 and is run completely by volunteers.

Clean up efforts ramped up in Mirboo North last week. ob20_1024

Clean up ramps up in Mirboo North

THE CLEAN-UP effort of green waste and debris along roadsides, kerb side and in the yards and streets of Mirboo North and surrounds, ramped up last week.

Contracted crews from local, state and commonwealth government began to help local volunteers and local contractors last week with the clean-up effort.

The South Gippsland Shire Council has engaged 12 contractors for the removal of debris and eight of these are working on green waste.

Several streets were nominated as first points of collection with others being named in due course.

Contractors will also start assessing storm building debris for hazards.

South Gippsland Shire Council is working with Emergency Recovery Victoria (ERV) to determine impacts and develop a further plan for debris collection, with Hansen Yuncken being appointed as lead contractor.

"The lead contractor and a package of clean-up supports were recently announced to help eligible residents with clean-up including the removal of green waste and hazardous trees," said a spokesperson from ERV.

"We are supporting eligible people in Mirboo North impacted by the February 2024 Victorian storms to clean-up their properties, so they can focus on their recovery journey."

ERV commented that eligibility and guidelines are currently being finalised and registrations will be made available on the Emergency Recovery Victoria website at vic.gov.au/february-2024-victorian-storms.

"Every emergency is different and while it's difficult to estimate how long the clean-up process will take, we can assure those who have been affected by the storms that ERV will be there on the ground to support the community," said the ERV spokesperson.

Skip bins are available in various locations across Mirboo North for the disposal of storm-related waste such as building debris.

For other types of waste, individuals are advised to take it to the Transfer Station.

Fallen trees in the reserve near the Mirboo North Pool (Baths Road Reserve) and in the pool grounds, are also being mulched by council contractors.

The mulch will be transported to Council's depot in Leongatha and used in parks, reserves and community facilities around the shire, including Mirboo North.

People affected by the storms can also access the Recovery Support Program by calling the Emergency Recovery Hotline on 1800 560 760 or filling out an online registration form at vic.gov.au/recovery-support.

The Nats push for Mirboo North CFA station upgrade

THE NATIONALS are yet again calling for funding for a Mirboo North CFA station upgrade in the May state budget.

Speaking in state parliament, The Nationals MPs Danny O'Brien and Melina Bath made certain that the State Government was reminded of the desperate need for an upgraded Mirboo North fire station.

The current station was built in 1978 with an annex extension added in 1995 which was wholly funded by volunteers and the community.

"The station is antiquated – there's significant occupational health and safety issues including vehicle appliance doors which cannot be opened at the same time and firefighters are forced to squeeze into their trucks", said Ms Bath.

"The storms that ripped through the Mirboo North during February highlighted the critical role CFA volunteers play as first responders in local emergencies.

"The town was essentially cut off during the storm and its aftermath and CFA volunteers were the heroes, a fact the Premier was happy to recognise at a press conference.

"Making public safety a priority, brigade members rallied with chainsaws to remove trees and open up access roads – they even set up their own 'starlink' satellite unit for communications, borrowed from the home of a volunteer."

During her debate, Ms Bath acknowledged Member for Gippsland South, Danny O'Brien for his persistent advocacy on behalf of the Mirboo North brigade.

"Danny O'Brien first called for a new CFA station in 2015 and since that time The Nationals have voiced the need for this community infrastructure upgrade no less than 15 times in parliament.

"Mirboo North CFA volunteers continue to play a key role during Gippsland's emergencies from bushfire to storms and it's time they were rewarded.

"The Premier is prepared to acknowledge Mirboo North CFA volunteers in words – but the best way she could show her gratitude is to action funding for a fit for purpose station in this year's budget."

A new approach to being fire wise

THE SOUTH Gippsland Landcare Network, along with the Foundation for National Parks and Wildlife, is excited to announce the start of the South Gippsland Fire Wise Project.

The Fire Wise Project aims to improve, share, test and demonstrate the understanding of how numerous species of indigenous plants can be retained or planted in strategic locations around the built environment, to better protect assets from bushfire and enhance local biodiversity.

With a mix of educational materials, seminars, property planning, seed collecting and plant propagation courses, the project will raise the profile of fire planning and 'fire wise' awareness within the community.

It will also include two demonstration sites along the Great Southern Rail Trail, at Loch and Meeniyan.

The demonstration sites will include a diverse mix of native fire wise plant species, planted in both a garden and a shelterbelt arrangement.

The Fire Wise Project is spreading and adding to knowledge that grew out of some pioneering research that Lakes Entrance Community Landcare initiated in 2021.

They found that many native plant species are fire-retardant and/or have fire-resistant properties that make them a good choice for properties in fire-prone areas.

Such plants can reduce

wind speed, absorb radiant heat and trap embers.

The Fire Wise Project is funded by the Australian Governments Preparing Australian Communities program in partnership with the Foundation for National Parks and Wildlife (FNPW).

FNPW is an environmental charity organisation that has been assisting communities to restore and conserve Australia's natural environment for more than 50 years.

"We are thrilled to be part of this exciting project that will increase fire safety awareness and also assist in protecting and enhancing our native flora and fauna," FNPW CEO Ian Darbyshire.

The South Gippsland Landcare Network is extremely excited about this project and the skills and knowledge that will be gained.

It will enable works to further integrate fire planning into land management planning and advice programs.

With a changing climate, this is an essential service to be provided to the community.

This project will run until March 2025.

Funding has opened new doors for cancer survivors with survivorship nurse Tanya helping bridge the gap.

New program supports cancer survivors

A NEW program at Gippsland Southern Health Service (GSHS) is helping people to get their lives back on track after surviving cancer.

The Cancer Survivorship program is for people who have had cancer or who are close to finishing their treatment.

Survivorship nurse Tanya Cook says the service bridges the gaps for survivors.

“It’s not district nursing, not chemotherapy, not palliative care, it’s about bridging the gaps to help people to live well and thrive after cancer and be supportive if they get into trouble.”

Five patients started using the service last week after GSHS received funding from Gippsland Regional Integrated Cancer Services for the program.

Ms Cook said people have intensive medical and nursing support until they finish their cancer treatment but often need ongoing help.

“They still have specialist and doctor appointments but don’t necessarily have the intensive support they had before. We found as nurses and health professionals that they may still have physical, social, financial or emotional symptoms from their cancer or treatment.

“People today are surviving a lot longer after cancer and we don’t want local people to have long-term chronic health problems or issues that can be prevented by a nurse-led service to help after their cancer treatment.”

Ms Cook does a holistic assessment of each person, looking at their physical, emotional, social and any other needs they face after having cancer and treatment. People can be seen at Korumburra, Leongatha, Tarwin Lower or Foster health services and home visits can be arranged for people who live in the South Gippsland local government area who have difficulty accessing the service.

Ms Cook has more than 30 years of nursing experience, including working as a district nurse, McGrath breast care nurse and as a stomal therapist, giving her a good understanding of health systems across South Gippsland.

“I can give people practical advice and link them into services, including online, and social supports if they need. Some patients have come from other regions and don’t know the local services so I can offer advice and be someone to ring if they get in trouble.”

Ms Cook can assist clients with accessing doctors, screening services, telehealth appointments, and help people to access transport, referrals, financial and counselling support as close to home as possible.

“I bring things back to everyday language and it’s a big relief for people when I can link them in with services,” she said.

LEONGATHA Secondary College again ensured its students know there are plenty of available support services they can call on if needed, with the school holding its second Health and Wellbeing Day on Wednesday.

The relaxed outdoor event gave students the chance to enjoy a barbecue and other food while chatting to representatives of various help services available in Leongatha.

Headspace, Anglicare, The Salvation Army, Uniting, and Youth Access Clinic were among the organisations at the event.

Sandra Challis, a mental health practitioner and part of the wellbeing team in Leongatha, who was a driving force in organising the day, spoke of the value of students familiarising themselves with available services and some of the people providing them.

She said that makes it less daunting to engage with service providers should the need arise.

Harriet, a community engagement officer for Headspace said the Health and Wellbeing Day is ideal to engage with all the kids at the school, letting them know the organisation is available to assist in their area.

“Headspace comes to Leongatha once a week at the Youth Access Clinic next door to the school,” Harriet said.

“We want to get the word out there that if they are experiencing any stress or anything has taken a toll on their wellbeing, that we are here for them and we have the tools to support them.

Dermot O’Hara, a senior practitioner for Anglicare’s integrated family services was on hand to let students know the organisation is there to support families in the community.

Uniting’s Bella Green said the organisation offers free counselling with no waitlist, available at school or at its Leongatha office.

While there was lots of valuable information available, event organiser Sandra spoke of a winning strategy to get young people engaged.

“A bit of food helps,” she said of its ability to get students involved in the session.

She expressed her appreciation for the South Gippsland Shire Council sponsorship of the barbecue, and the contribution of Foodbank which provided other tasty and healthy options.

Year 8 student Ella Sellings was pleased with what the Wellbeing Day offered in terms of information.

“It’s good we have this because if kids need someone to talk to, they know where they can go and it raises awareness for mental health,” she said.

Cardiac services to expand at Latrobe Regional Health

CARDIOLOGY services at Latrobe Regional Health are about to get a significant boost with the expansion of the Cardiology team.

“The expansion of the team will allow us to provide seven days a week care to inpatients, rather than the previous focus on day procedures for outpatients,” LRH Cardiology Director Dr Derk Pol said.

Gippsland has the highest incidence of cardiovascular disease in Australia and current analysis shows that only 10 per cent of local patients received care locally.

“At the moment the overwhelming majority of cardiac patients are treated in Melbourne. When you look at Oncology or Dialysis that number is closer to 100 per cent of local patients seen and treated locally.

“This expansion will allow us to see more local people here at LRH. The plans for future expansion of services will mean that in

years to come, it will be unusual for a Gippsland patient requiring cardiac intervention, not to be seen locally,” Dr Pol said.

The benefit for local patients to be seen closer to their home is well known with less stress for the patients, family and quicker recovery.

“We want patients to be able to have the best possible care locally. I remember seeing a patient a couple of weeks ago. He had a referral from a GP and a positive stress test. We took him in to the Cardiac Catheter Lab and gave him a stent. He was home the next day and we saw him in our clinic two weeks later, and he’s saying: ‘You’ve changed my life! I was in pain every day. It was so good to be able to drive 10 minutes to the hospital, get great care from everyone and then be driven 10 minutes to get home. No trip to Melbourne where I wouldn’t know anyone and in a big hospital away from family and friends’”.

As part of the expansion cardiac specialists have either been recruited or have agreed to increase their time providing services at LRH.

“There is obviously a lot of demand for cardiac specialists and while we have two local cardiologists, complementing these doctors with others cardiologists who will extend their hours, allows us to offer the local community more services which of course improves health outcomes for people,” Dr Pol said.

By being on site at LRH more frequently, specialists will have greater involvement with patients, attend ward rounds and team meetings, provide support to colleagues and overall, build a more positive culture for the Cardiology team and LRH.

One other aspect of building the bigger service is ensuring local GPs are aware the services they have historically referred to Melbourne are increasingly

available in the Latrobe Valley.

“People are starting to realise we do have a department here now. Traditionally, local GPs would have sent patients to Melbourne, but more are becoming aware that patients can have a pretty full suite of interventions locally without going down to Melbourne, and that we are constantly expanding those services to offer local people more.”

The expansion of the Cardiology team coincides with the opening of LRH’s Stage 3A expansion featuring new operating theatres, surgical wards and services for women, children and babies.

“It’s a pretty exciting time for us at LRH but also the community,” LRH Chief Executive Don McRae said.

“The expansion of the Cardiology team is one part of a broader expansion of services which will see us offer more for locals and improve the quality of life for Gippsland.”

EXCITEMENT filled the air as three dynamic sisters from South Gippsland kicked off their second exhilarating Gippsland Lions Ride for Sight challenge at the iconic Phillip Island Grand Prix Circuit on Friday (March 1).

Against a backdrop of radiant sunshine, Sharon Oats of Inverloch, Leesa Willmott of Kilcunda, and Kerry Fitzgerald of Leongatha, all fervent businesswomen, revved up for action on the track.

Each year, Lions Ride for Sight, supported by Lions Clubs from across Gippsland, raises funds for the Centre for Eye Research Australia (CERA), exceeding \$1.2 million to date, to finance research into new treatments and therapies for eye disease, aiming to end preventable blindness.

The sisters' incredible efforts last year saw them shatter records, raising an astounding \$30,800 – the highest sum ever collected by an entrant. This year, fuelled by their unwavering passion, they aim to surpass their previous achievement, setting their sights on a fundraising target of \$20,000. With an impressive \$10,400 already secured as of Saturday, the trio are poised to make waves once again to support a cause close to their heart.

"There is still another month to go – but this year we really wanted to put the extra hard yards in," Sharon Oats explained.

"We are going to ride 400 kilometres in the nominated ride, and we will also do the multi-day ride covering 170 kilometres."

The First Lions Ride for Sight was held in 1994, running from Mallacoota to CERA headquarters in Melbourne. This year's event, the 30th anniversary, will be held from Friday March 22 to Sunday March 24 with a ride from Moe to Cowwarr (between Traralgon and Heyfield) and return.

"It's very important to our family because my parents and all three of my sisters have macular degeneration or early stages. Dad's legally blind, and Mum (Pam) has wet macular, which requires injections in her eye every six weeks."

As Sharon explained, sister Kerry takes the day off work and drives

Pam, down to her appointment in Frankston.

"The Centre for Eye Research are actually trying to develop an eye drop, which would counteract that injection."

A welcome initiative for the family.

"We are very passionate about the Lions Ride for Sight – it does bring more awareness when we go for a ride, people stop and talk to us about macular degeneration, and getting your eyes checked."

"We are really proud to be able to raise money for the Centre for Eye Research who do amazing research – developing new drugs, and the likes..."

Dad, Colin Willmott, explained the family had all been a part of the fundraising efforts over the years for the cause close to their heart.

Lions Ride for Sight Chairman Paul Drinkwater, from the Moe Lions Club, says the event is special for Gippsland Lions with the Lions aiming to raise \$60,000 this year.

"It's a real honour to be involved. If I'm asked to do it again next year, I just continually want to do it. It's a challenge but the CERA cause is very close to me, like a lot of people."

"I want to make it bigger and better," he says. "It's very exciting, and it will be a good challenge this year."

Cheering the trio on from the sidelines on Friday were loving parents Colin and Pam, former Lions Ride for Sight chairperson Ian de Bruyne (who is completing his 30th event this year) and current Lions Ride for Sight chairperson Paul Drinkwater, CERA Fundraising Specialist Brownyn Sugden alongside family.

As for lapping their first 4.45 kilometres.

"It was awesome riding around the track – it's so smooth and felt so good. A big thank you to Phillip Island racetrack for letting us take the time to do the lap."

Mayor Cr Le Serve celebrates 12 years in leadership

WOMEN in rural areas face significant challenges, including lack of childcare options and limited leadership opportunities; however, Bass Coast Shire Mayor Cr Clare Le Serve shared her story on how she overcame these encounters and endeavoured to make a difference.

Empowering women is crucial, and Cr Le Serve shared that she has certainly faced her challenges in life, but through her 12 years in council, and during her term as Mayor - she'll continue to advocate for her community.

On March 2nd Clare and her husband Neil celebrated 50 years of marriage. She moved from Melbourne to the country and married a dairy farmer in 1974, before becoming a young mother on their land in Bass.

"It was this one particular day that changed things for me," Clare reflected.

"A young lady came knocking on the door and asked if I'd like to join a community craft class. I was a new sleep deprived mother, milking cows and didn't think I had time to do craft, but she then stopped me in the street again, I went inside the Bass Valley Community Centre, where a group of women offered to hold my baby and make me a cup of tea."

It was then that Clare saw

the importance of community connection. She joined the Bass Valley Community Centre and listened to the women share their fundamental need for long-term childcare.

Clare began advocating for childcare and before and after school care in the region - working with other parents on feasibility studies, putting together business cases and writing grant proposals.

During this time, the family farm was sold in the midst of a crisis in the dairy industry and Clare began working with South Gippsland Personnel Group in Corinella as their assistant manager.

"It was meaningful work, enriching the lives of partici-

pants with a disability and getting them into the workforce," said Clare.

However, in 1993, Clare was in a serious car accident, causing her to be in recovery for over 10 years. "It was after my accident that I honoured the value of people with a disability in the workforce even more so than before. Knowing that they've certainly got great ability to contribute to their community."

It was after rehabilitation and a decade of recovery that Clare stood for council in 2012 and continued advocating for the Bass Valley Children's Centre - holding the official opening alongside

former Mayor Cr Pamela Rothfield in 2017.

"Leadership comes from within, and I always had an interest in politics, but I never would have dreamt that my career path would have taken me to local government."

"I got to the point where I figured I might as well put my own hand up and really lobby for what the community wants. I've run in the state election twice, and that was really about making Bass a marginal seat," said Clare.

It's now been 12 years since Mayor Cr Clare Le Serve stood for council and she said that the Bass Valley Children's Centre is certainly a highlight of her career, alongside the new Berninnet centre.

"If I could say anything to the women in the community, it would be to make sure you're okay, and then you can go out and help others."

In her term as Mayor, Clare is focused on the importance of a team approach and completing unfinished business within local government, as well as the need for a whole community approach to listening and communicating.

"As we celebrate International Women's Day, it's not about alienating men, but about working together."

Job quality and advancement: The world is changing but women do face job quality issues, including stress, limited advancement opportunities, and lack of flexibility and job security. These factors affect overall income and, consequently, superannuation savings.

Long-term impact: Over time, these factors accumulate, resulting in a significant super gap at retirement. Closing this gap requires addressing systemic issues, promoting equal pay, and supporting women's career progression.

It's crucial to continue advocating for gender equality and financial empowerment to bridge the gap and ensure a more equitable future for all.

And, last but not least, let's celebrate the businesses and companies who are providing incredible opportunities for women, especially those returning to work after children, it's not easy stepping back into the workplace or juggling many roles, but the employers who make it possible, they are part of the unsung heroes, as this editor can attest to.

Vulva vessels created to make statement

AS SOON as Anna Curtis, a ceramicist from Sandy Point heard about the Meeniyon Art Gallery's Fired Up Exhibition, she knew it was made for her.

"It was really perfect in terms of the work that I already produced."

Anna has been working with clay for about nine years and creates simple, functional pieces by wheel or hand that can be used every day, some that celebrate feminism in the rawest form.

"I've been making pieces of work that are in the exhibition, for a number of years now - vulva vessels - which I've been making with clay and fire in the kiln, and they're a statement around showcasing women's voice."

Fired Up is a group exhibition that showcases and celebrates women's creativity and amplifies the fire of feminism that burns within them to offer unique perspectives, experiences, and artistic prowess that portray the essence of feminist ideals.

"Art gives us another medium to be able to express those values that maybe can't be expressed properly through other means," said Anna.

Anna creates work that are both pieces of art and practical vessels that provide a tangible and physical sculptural expression of her values.

"There's only so much

that can be expressed with words or with pictures or with conversations, but having a 3D sculpture or otherwise expression, I think, is a really important way to send a message."

Fired Up intentionally coincides with International Women's Day which falls in March; this year's theme is Inspire Inclusion, and Anna explains that feminism for her isn't just sexual and isn't just her own personal experience as a woman.

For her, it encompasses the whole gamut of womanhood, whether that is someone who is biologically a woman, or women from the trans community.

"For me, feminism is creating equal and equitable opportunities for all women, regardless of race, gender identity or school, or biological sex as well. For me, it's really about anti-sexual feminism and creating those rights across all facets of being."

Happy International Women's Day this Friday

THIS Friday, March 8 is International Women's Day, an opportunity for women at work, women in education, women in the community and women at home to come together... for what?

There doesn't have to be a specific reason to get together for an event that traces its history back to the early 1900s, when simply winning the right to vote had only just been achieved in Australia a few years earlier, in 1902.

Clearly, we've come a long way since then on a number of fronts but, as we saw last week, when the Workplace Gender Equality Agency (WGEA) published its report on pay gaps at Australian companies, with 100 employees or more, there's still a way to go.

The report identified that 62 per cent of those companies have gender pay gaps that are above the desirable level of five per cent or less, predictably in favour of men.

It stands to reason, to some extent, that the pay gap reaches its highest differential of 31.8 per cent in the construction sector and closes to just 1.9 per cent in the food services sector, but it certainly puts the spotlight on all employers to assess their own situation, ask questions and consider a response.

Valuing the all-important homecare role, calling out the damaging practice of stereotyping, which is often at the root of family violence, and actively promoting inclusion, which is the theme of International Women's Day 2024, are all areas for improvement and reasons to talk and act.

But there's a lot about the differences that men and women, people of all backgrounds and interests regardless of gender for that matter, bring to the table and we should value and encourage that.

You take a look at the Fish Creek 'Rising from the Ashes' fundraising night last Saturday night, and you see that in action. While the men largely took the lead role in organising the event, and the women in catering, there was a significant crossover with a number of key organisational roles taken on by the women in the club, and a good number of the club's men involved in getting the food and drinks out.

While the prevalence of men in the trades, for example, and women in business and as leaders on the home front, will play into the contribution each can make to the success of a community effort like that, it should be enjoyed and celebrated, so long as everyone is included and gets the chance to learn, experience and contribute across the board.

On a side note, however, why do we as a community put up with the discrimination suffered by women in some ethnic and religious groups, here in Australia and around the world, while fighting the good fight on women's rights generally?

Passivhaus, they say?

AT THE council meeting, February 21, in community question time two questions were submitted one by Mr John Kuzma and one by Mario Boffa regarding Passivhaus house certification for the Berninneit in Cowes.

The questions:

1. Would council please provide a copy of the Passivhaus Certification issued for Berninneit in Cowes.

2. Would council provide each singular Passivhaus test result figures that determined the issuing of the certificate.

Response:

Final Passivhaus certification is a detailed process and involves significant testing and assessment. Final test results are approved in Germany. It is anticipated that results will be available in May.

Berninneit was opened on October 28, 2023, by the then mayor Cr Michael Whelan, who stated the building was a Passivhaus building.

We noticed there was a heap of activity in the last few weeks prior to the opening of Berninneit, seldom seen on Bass Coast shire projects. It may relate to the mayor Cr Micheal Whelan, in his desire to open the Berninneit centre prior to stepping down as Bass Coast mayor in November.

On Wednesday February 27 I visited Berninneit and noticed a flurry of construction activity with a contractor removing temporary doors installed to allow for the opening off Berninneit in October with Passivhaus doors that had just arrived on site from Germany this week.

Cr Micheal Whelan and the then C.E.O must have been aware of this issue and

approved the installation of the temporary doors to facilitate the October opening of the Berninneit centre.

The question Bass Coast ratepayers should ask is what is the cost to the ratepayers for the installation and removal off the temporary doors and are Bass Coast ratepayers prepared to condone wasting money this way?

As to, has the building been Passivhaus certified or has it been all hot air at the moment, why haven't we been given the truth and proper transparency?

In other news the young people at the YES Youth Hub have been trying their hand at creating small comic books this week. We are hoping to build up enough material to start a magazine for youth by youth in Bass Coast. We also provided some tasty afternoon tea thanks to some generous donations from Bass Coast Housing Matters and the Salvation Army.

On Monday evenings our staff are funded by YMCA Open Doors to provide a community meal for young people. This week we were treated to Sweet and Sour Chicken.

Visitors may notice a large gap towards the back of the garden where plot number 18 used to be.

There’s lots more to be done to rehabilitate the space, including getting rid of invasive roots and the dreaded plastic weed mat, installed more than a decade ago to control the couch grass that has slowly but surely taken over.

Volunteers set up a similar, experimental half tank plot in early summer and the results are very positive; a lovely harvest of basil, mixed lettuce and bright zinnias enjoyed by all.

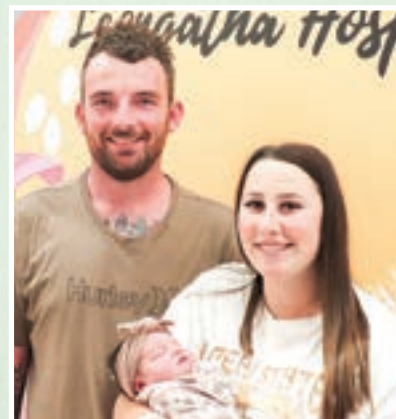

Emotional wellbeing

IN 2023, the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, reported approximately 17% of people or 3.4 million people had mental health issues, with 50% of them aged 18 – 24 years.

Another report, "In 2020 – 2022, of the 19.8 million Australians aged 16 – 85 years, 42.9% (8.5 million people) had experienced a mental disorder at some time in their life: 28.8% (5.7 million people) had experienced an Anxiety disorder such as Social Phobia or Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder" [National Study of Mental Health and Wellbeing, 2020 - 2022 | Australian Bureau of Statistics (abs.gov.au)]

Mental health is a complex issue. Professionals grapple with the cause: Is it biological factors, a chemical imbalance in the brain, or a traumatic life experience? Or does it stem from childhood events, ancestral trauma that is passed down through family lineage, or parents too busy, too exhausted and overwhelmed to spend quality time during the formative years with their children?

Or do drugs, violent computer games and inappropriate exposure of adult themes to children who are too young to emotionally assimilate these concepts play a role.

Or is social media, cyber bullying and FOMO the main culprits?

Maybe, it is a combination of the above mentioned, exacerbated by 24-hour technological access to information, both beneficial and detrimental that has seeped into the collective consciousness, further exacerbated by lockdowns, isolation and pressure to conform and fit into 'society.'

Therefore, the question is, how do we rectify this prevalent condition?

Fortunately, thanks to the 'It's okay not to be okay' program, established in 2016, lessened the stigma of mental health through increased awareness. Support resources, both online and in person, reassure individuals they are not alone in their struggle.

As a kinesiologist and women's circle facilitator, as I see it, the individual needs to be willing to end suffering, and address and heal core issues, physically, emotionally and mentally.

I'm a big fan of emotional freedom technique, a tool that self-empowers individuals to safely clear and heal past experiences, without reliving the trauma. Once the basics are mastered, EFT or tapping can be done any time and any place with amazing results.

On a physical level, exercise and natural remedies, including lavender and chamomile essential oils (external use only and avoid if pregnant or lactating) is calming in a bath, diffuser or inhaling from a cotton ball. Replacing caffeine with soothing herbal teas (passion flower, rooibos and valerian) is similarly beneficial.

I'm also an advocate for breath work, centering and meditation.

Mentally, forgiveness of ourselves and others, plays an important part, enabling a liberation from past perceived events.

Another essential tools include retraining the brain and affirmations whilst being kind and gentle with yourself.

Sometimes, a short-term low dose anti-depression medication, combined with mindfulness professionals to get to the root cause, may help break the cycle.

And finally, we cannot ignore this epidemic of anxiety and depression, but we can rethink how we do life by building positive community through respect, compassion and support. The recent power outages may have been inconvenient for many, yet neighbours rallied together offering assistance, a positive step towards unity and healthy interactions.

Fixing is free, but, if possible, a

donation is much appreciated to help with running costs.

Baklava

EVERY time I have made this it disappears a hurry, so it is a good idea to only serve what you are happy to have disappear. The Greeks make a huge batch, but I will give you a size that fits into a standard lasagne dish.

Ingredients

- 200gm butter
- 200 gm filo pastry (one packet is usually 300gm)
- 200 gm blanched almonds, chopped
- 200 gm shelled walnuts, chopped
- 4 tablespoons sugar
- 2 teasp ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teasp allspice
- 1 dozen whole cloves

Syrup

- 1/2 cup honey
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/3 cup sugar
- Small piece of cinnamon stick
- 1 teasp grated orange peel
- 1 teasp vanilla essence

Method

Make the syrup by combining all ingredients in a small pot and simmer 10 minutes. Allow to cool.

If you have not used filo before follow the instructions for using it so that it does not dry out (tea towel over the sheets).

Melt the butter in a small pot. Using a pastry brush, grease a lasagne dish, then, one at a time, buttering each sheet with melted butter, place 8 sheets of the pastry into the dish – you are covering the base and sides of the dish.

Mix the chopped nuts with the spices and sugar, then place a thin layer of the nut mixture over the buttered sheets. Continue with the same layering of one buttered filo sheet and a layer of nuts until the nuts are used up. Then place a further 3 buttered sheets to cover the dish. Brush the top sheet with butter as well.

Using a clean razor or Stanley knife, cut the top sheets into triangles (or squares if that is easier!), and place the cloves dotted on the top.

Bake on 180 for about an hour and a half until golden and puffed. When you remove it from the oven, pour over the cooled syrup and allow to soak through the Baklava.

Allow to cool for several hours before serving.

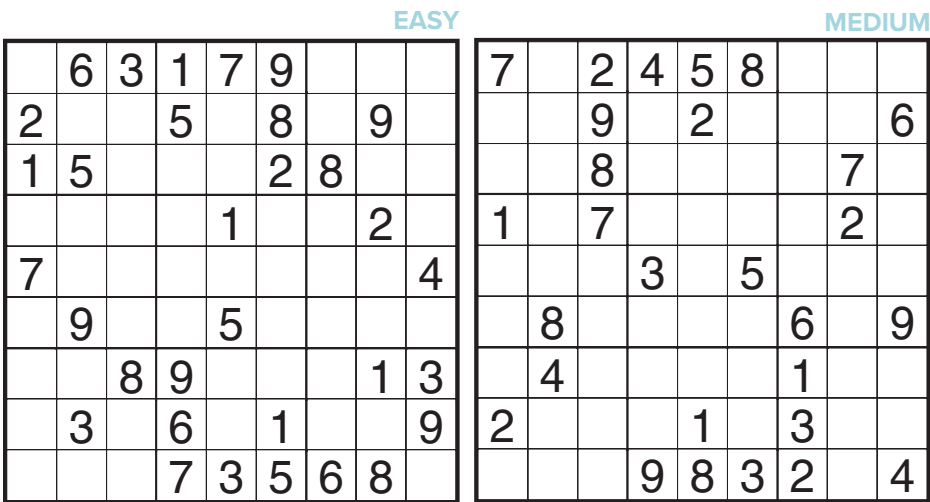

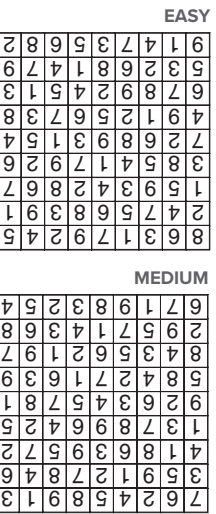

Consultation on animal welfare laws extended

THE Victorian Government has extended the consultation period on the draft Bill for the new animal care and protection laws.

Victorians now have until Monday March 25 to have their say on the Bill – which will replace the current Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act (POCTA Act).

Executive Director of Animal Welfare Victoria, Dr Trevor Pisciotta, said the extension gives interested people and organisations more time to make a submission, following recent extreme weather events.

“We’ve been committed to engaging with key stakeholders and the Victorian community throughout these reforms – this is the third and final round of consultation.”

“Regional communities have already strongly influenced the form of the Draft Bill, which will help to maintain the trust of our trading partners, consumers and the community in Victoria’s animal-based activities and industries,” Dr Pisciotta said.

Adding the POCTA Act is nearly 40 years old and does not always reflect current community expectations, developments in animal science or changing industry practices.

“These laws will strengthen Victoria’s reputation as a humane and responsible producer of food – while being fit-for-purpose for modern day farming practices,” Dr Pisciotta said.

Key changes include minimum standards of care and requirements around husbandry procedures – which already feature in the existing codes of practice and Australian Standards and Guidelines for Animal Welfare.

The proposed laws recognise animal sentience – that animals can have positive and negative experiences. Being explicit about this won’t change how Victorians need to treat their animals, or whether they can be owned or used by humans. It won’t create any legal rights for third parties, and it won’t give animals legal rights.

Dr Pisciotta encourages interested community members, groups and organisations to make a submission and complete a survey about future regulations.

“Please visit the Engage Victoria website, where you will find supporting materials to help you make a submission, including a guide to the draft Bill and a list of Frequently Asked Questions,” Dr Pisciotta said.

Victorian Government called to assist storm-hit farmers

MIRBOO North farmer Jason Harris has taken aim at the Victorian Government for failing to assist farmers with the substantial cleanup and repair costs incurred from the February 13 storm.

“They show up and get their photo in the paper and think they’re doing something but they’re doing nothing,” Jason said.

“They’re helping the council but they’re not helping the farmers.”

Jason estimates the cost of clearing trees and repairing fences on the approximately 140-acre beef farm at \$100,000, explaining that while building damage should be covered by insurance, that doesn’t apply to clearing trees and fence repairs.

“There’s kilometres of fence wrecked; that’s a whole new fence along the highway,” Jason said, explaining that you’d usually expect a single tree to come down on a fence, something that is easily repaired.

Jason contrasted the current situation with the State Government’s willingness to assist farmers following 2021 storm damage, saying that while he didn’t need to make a claim then, payments of up to \$75,000 were made available to farmers.

He has taken time off from his role as a director at Ray White Leongatha to work with his father clearing trees and repairing fences.

Sentinel-Times was driven around the Harris property, inspecting the numerous cypress trees that had come down over fences and elsewhere.

A number of paddocks remain out of use due to the damage.

Member for Gippsland South Danny O’Brien has written to the Minister for Agriculture and the Minister for Emergency Services urging them to provide assistance for primary producers impacted by the recent storm damage but there is nothing forthcoming at this stage.

The State Government has been contacted for comment.

Jason said he has made multiple efforts to request assistance through South Gippsland Shire Council, with farmers having been advised by Agriculture Victoria to contact their local council for assistance with clearing on-farm green waste and debris.

“I called once, emailed on Monday (February 26) and dropped into the community centre in Mirboo North on Thursday and spoke to two council workers who said someone would contact me,” he said on Sunday.

South Gippsland Shire Council CEO Kerryn Ellis addressed the issue of response times.

“In terms of us getting back to people, I absolutely acknowledge that it is taking a while and that’s because of the volume of requests that we’re receiving and also the fact we’re having to liaise with State Government and some voluntary agencies to try and coordinate support being available; so we appreciate people’s patience and will come back to them when we can,” Kerryn said.

She spoke of the advocacy efforts council has been making on behalf of farmers, including during the visit she made to the Victorian Parliament with South Gippsland Shire mayor Clare Williams, with the pair speaking to a number of ministers.

“We were making sure the ministers we met with were aware that farmers are not part

of the main programs that are offered and we wanted the State Government to understand that a lot of our farmers have had significant damage, very large trees down, fences damaged, and wouldn’t necessarily be eligible for the standard program,” the CEO said.

“We don’t have capacity to assist people on their private property but we are advocating hard to State Government that it’s not just people in the township that will need support, it is farmers as well.”

She noted that Agriculture Victoria has been in contact with farmers in South Gippsland Shire, particularly in Mirboo North, adding that council is also working closely with Gipps Dairy which is offering support.

Agriculture Victoria has been contacting farmers individually to establish how they are going and what support they need, Kerryn explained. The organisation also had a presence at a further Mirboo North community meeting last week.

The CEO is confident that progress is occurring in relation to farmer assistance.

“I believe Emergency Recovery Victoria (ERV) is now factoring in some support for farmers on private property as part of their cleanup program, which is exactly what Clare and I were advocating for,” Kerryn said, with hopes of an announcement in the short term.

She stressed that the huge volume of green waste farmers are faced with after the storm is the reason council is advocating to ERV about providing support for farmers.

“We’re awaiting a statement from ERV as to exactly what the scope of that program will be.”

Sheep flock to decline as lamb slaughter breaks record

AFTER three years of consecutive growth, the Australian sheep flock is set to decrease by 2.9 per cent to 76,500,000 in 2024, according to the latest Sheep Industry Projections from Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA).

During the 2020-2022 rebuild phase, producer focus on productivity and genetics has led to impressive marking rates across the sheep flock. However, the shift from beneficial weather conditions to average conditions in 2023 led to elevated turnoff of unproductive breeding stock, resulting in a 46.7 per cent lift to sheep slaughter.

According to Stephen Bignell, Manager of Market Information at MLA, as the sheep turnoff will mostly be limited to older, unproductive ewes, this year's lamb cohort is expected to remain solid, but slightly smaller, than previous years.

"The current resilience of the sheep flock means that high lamb slaughter will have a less intense impact on the national flock size than in previous maintenance periods. Meaning that there will be a decrease in overall flock numbers, but not

as dramatic as in comparative years," Mr Bignell said.

"After 2024, the flock is expected to stabilise and remain above the ten-year average."

Slaughter and production are projected to peak, causing record supply of Australian sheepmeat into the global market.

This comes after Australia produced the most lamb on record in the calendar year 2023, with 599,461 tonnes of lamb being produced in 2023, putting it 11.6 per cent higher than 2022,

which was another record year.

As the largest exporter of sheepmeat, high Australian production will increase globally traded sheepmeat volumes.

"Economic resilience in the United States and emerging markets will drive demand for lamb, while the outlook for consumer demand in China remains uncertain."

"Regardless, a shortage of competitor proteins will encourage imports of sheepmeat in high protein consumption markets."

Lamb production is set to break a new record in 2024, beating the previous year's record achieved in 2023.

It is projected that lamb production will reach 621,000 tonnes in 2024, a nine per cent or 54,000 tonnes increase compared to 2023 figures. If this eventuates it will be 21.3 per cent or 109,359 tonnes above the 10-year average.

Next year, the lamb production forecast is set to ease to 587,000 tonnes and then rise in 2026 by 19,000 tonnes to 606,000 tonnes due to improved carcase weights.

Mutton production will be the largest since 2006, set to produce 254,000 tonnes in 2024 up by 3.14 per cent on 2023 volumes. Production will remain elevated in 2024 due to a small lift to slaughter.

In 2025, fewer breeding ewes will be turned off. The forecasts for 2025 and 2026 will reach 229,000 and 207,000 tonnes respectively, as the industry moves towards a transitional period where production will stabilise.

No growth expected in beef consumption

WITH limited or negative real wages growth expected in 2024, coupled with the higher cost environment, Rabobank expects global beef consumption will at best remain steady and possibly decline through 2024, with some variations.

In its Q1 Global Beef Quarterly, the agribusiness banking specialist notes beef's premium status, despite a significant portion sold as lower-priced ground beef, with sales vulnerable to economic pressures. The report says this situation poses important questions for those in the supply chain around margins and trade – "can prices be maintained or pushed higher to make up for the loss of consumption or do retail prices have to ease to encourage higher consumption?"

The bank says, in a market where beef production growth is limited, the consumer may be willing to tolerate higher prices at the expense of some consumption, therefore maintaining demand. "On the other hand, in a market with growing supply – such as Australia – lower prices may be needed to encourage consumption."

Report lead author, Rabobank senior animal proteins analyst Angus Gidley-Baird said these supply and demand dynamics may swing beef trade flows towards the United States.

Mr Gidley-Baird expects Chinese import demand for beef to remain sluggish, at least in the first half. With strong import demand though in the United States, along with lower domestic supplies, beef trade is already being diverted to the US.

"Brazil's exports to the US in January 2024 were ahead of 2023 and Australian volumes to the US were up 127 per cent year-on-year," he said.

"So, if China's recovery is better than expected, global beef markets could become quite tight, fuelling price rises."

Although the prospects of increasing global beef demand may not be strong in the year ahead, the bank retains a positive outlook on the market.

"With US production declining and the country's economic outlook being reasonable, the US is likely to lead the beef price-setting market," Mr Gidley-Baird said.

"This is likely to draw increased volumes from Australia, New Zealand and Brazil, along with trade from Canada and Mexico."

Australia

Mr Gidley-Baird said the Australian market is still resting in producers' hands.

"With increasing cattle inventory levels and weak consumer demand – except in the US market – Australian cattle prices remain heavily reliant on producer sentiment and marketing activity," he said.

The Rabobank report said in Australia, large and increasing volumes of cattle in the system mean buyers have plenty of choice and, while consumer markets are weak, there is no need for processors to chase cattle. Therefore, any floor in the market is being generated by producer marketing activity.

"The dry conditions and pessimistic producer sentiment in 2023 saw cattle prices drop 40 to 50 per cent in the first 10 months of the year," Mr Gidley-Baird said. "Since rain in November and again in January this year, producer sentiment has turned around and prices have lifted by more than 50 per cent since October and are close to where they were at the same time in 2023."

With increasing production, Mr Gidley-Baird said, Australia's exports have been growing. "Volumes in 2023 were up 27 per cent year-on-year, with large increases to the US (up 84 per cent), China (up 30 per cent) and South Korea (up 18 per cent)."

Volumes to Japan, dropped five per cent reflecting the high beef inventory levels and weak consumer demand in that country.

"We expect consumer markets – particularly Australia's Asian export destinations – to remain weak for the first half of 2024 before stocks are cleared and flows start to recover," he said.

Dairy Australia's upgraded 2024 Forage Value Index released

AUSTRALIAN dairy farmers will be able to make more informed decisions when choosing ryegrass cultivars for their pastures following the release of Dairy Australia's 2024 Forage Value Index (FVI) including the new Forage Quality Rating just in time for the ryegrass sowing season.

First introduced in 2017 and updated each year, the FVI is a resource for farmers and producers which independently ranks varieties of ryegrass according to their potential contribution to overall farm profit. Given seasonal yield difference between varieties can be significant, this can contribute to substantial variation in profit per hectare each year.

The 2024 FVI includes for the first-time new data on perennial ryegrass varieties with

the introduction of the Forage Quality Rating.

Dairy Australia's FVI Lead, Ruairi McDonnell, explains that having access to the new Forage Quality Rating will help farmers be able to choose perennial ryegrass cultivars which can lead to higher milk production.

"The new Forage Quality Rating shows that there is substantial variability between cultivars in metabolisable energy (ME) concentration, which ultimately will lead to varying milk production potential for different varieties," said McDonnell.

"Farmers can look at the Forage Quality Rating for each cultivar on a seasonal basis at different stages of the year, as well as on an average yearly basis.

"The Forage Quality Rating shows that perennial ryegrass pastures are at their highest energy levels in winter and early spring, before declining in energy through late spring and summer," McDonnell added.

"Farmers can now use this information to assist with ration formulation decisions by using the seasonal ME concentration for the varieties used on their farm."

McDonnell also said that an improved statistical method was utilised in formulating the FVI this year which would make them even more valuable for farmers.

The data used to create the FVI is sourced from the Pasture Trial Network – a collaboration of seed companies, Meat and Livestock Australia

(MLA) and Dairy Australia, which conducts independent trials across the country. The lists for each species are then generated by Datagene using robust statistical methodology.

The FVI ratings system is based on global best practice and was developed in close consultation with farmers, the seed industry and fully qualified internationally recognised experts.

Farmers can download the 2024 FVI tables now to plan their autumn pasture sowing at dairyaustralia.com.au/fvi.

The detailed Pasture Trial Network individual trial results from across a broad range of Australian dairy regions are also available on the MLA website for farmers to consider those results in any seed purchasing decisions.

Patients enjoy a holiday thanks to dialysis bus

PEOPLE receiving haemodialysis were able to stay for longer while visiting the Bass Coast and South Gippsland.

The Big Red Kidney Bus mobile dialysis unit was at Wonthaggi Hospital during January and February, and provided 38 dialysis sessions to 10 patients.

Haemodialysis is a medical procedure that cleans the blood of patients with kidneys that are no longer working properly, enabling patients to continue to enjoy life.

However haemodialysis is a commitment, requiring several treatments a week, limiting patients' travel plans.

That's why the Big Kidney Bus gave patients, such as Carmel Sampson of Rosebud, new opportunities to travel and enjoy the company of family for longer.

"I booked in for three sessions on the bus and it meant I got to stay with my daughter and her family for a week. It's the longest that I've stayed with them since I've had dialysis," she said.

"Otherwise it's hard to visit them for so long when I've got dialysis three times a week."

Other patients to board the bus came from as far as New South Wales and the Grampians region of western Victoria.

The Big Red Kidney Bus is operated by Monash Health and Kidney Health Australia, and will return to Wonthaggi Hospital in early 2025.

The bus provides dialysis sessions in addition to the dialysis service Bass Coast Health provides to regular, local patients at Wonthaggi Hospital.

Aislin progresses in Paris selection

REIGNING National ISSF Women's Skeet champion and Rio Olympian Aislin Jones has retained a narrow lead in the domestic event series and secured a place in the international team for the Olympic qualification event in Doha, Qatar and the World Cup in Baku, Azerbaijan in late April/early May.

The Yarra Valley Grand Prix saw a tense battle for the win between top ranked Leongatha shooter Aislin Jones and second ranked, Laura Coles of Western Australia at the fourth and final event of the domestic qualification series at Melbourne Gun Club in Lilydale on the weekend. Day one of competition opened with Aislin holding a four-point lead from the three events prior.

Some context to how tight the competition is lies in the leaderboard for the series, which after the first three events had Jones tied with two time Olympian Chloe Tipple from NZ on 357, followed by Tokyo Olympian Laura Coles on 353 and Brittany Melbourne trailing on 339.

At the conclusion of the day one and the first 75 targets of the 125 target event Coles had pulled that back to an Olympic selection ranking tie across the top three after shooting 73/75 for the day to Jones and Tipple's 69 a piece leaving the trio tied on 426 points.

Day 2 of competition would see a match of mental will and stamina play out. The pressure of the final domestic selection event and tied scores has to be well managed if it's not to impact performance. A shift in focus, even briefly to outcome rather than remaining focussed on the next target can easily convert to lost targets.

With the Melbourne Gun Club's complex tree lined backdrop making target acquisition in overcast conditions difficult, Jones' plan for the second day as the light dropped was to trust that all of the work, she had put in at Korumburra Gun Club's very complex backdrop would stand her in good stead.

"I don't think I've shot at

Korumburra in great light yet. The targets are always hard there. If I can shoot well at Korumburra I can shoot well here," she observed in her usual quiet manner going into the day.

That faith in her process and ability resulted in two more consistent rounds of 23/25 which combined with the three 23/25 from the first day to give her a final total of 115.

Coles failed to back up her day one 73, shooting just 41/50 in the final rounds and tied with Jones on 115 and back to four points down on the Olympic selection table with only finals bonus points left to secure. Chloe Tipple took top place out of qualifying into the final with a 117, while the tie necessitated a shoot off between Coles and Jones to determine their starting order. Going just one pair into the shootoff, Jones claimed her right to the second place into the final with Coles clearly under pressure missing both targets in her pair.

As the light deteriorated in the afternoon all competitors opted for lighter lenses to help dig the targets out of the background, with tints that enable the target to stand out a little more than to the naked eye.

A tough final ensued as the

wind picked up making the pairs of targets both varied and unpredictable. Jones maintaining a narrow lead of two targets over Coles after the first 20 targets of the 60-target final.

Coles couldn't match the local leader or the Kiwi challenger in the final stages though and finished the final with the bronze medal and four bonus points for selections. Tipple and Jones completed the final targets to determine gold and silver with Jones claiming the win on 48 to Tipple's 46, more importantly maybe was the additional six points in the Olympic selections that winning gold provided.

Jones has been working hard on the physical fitness aspect of the sport and believes it's standing her in good stead.

"I've been a bit of a regular at DF Fitness in Leongatha to work on my core strength particularly for shooting. That's important in skeet so you have good control of the shotgun on these fast-crossing targets, especially in Pairs," she said.

"Other work I do there is to build fitness for my distance running which is more recreational. I love getting out on the rail trail to Koonwarra with my dog Ted, but while

it's important for running but it'll help with my stamina and dealing with the heat when it's hot in Doha, Baku and hopefully Paris too."

Jones was pleased but reserved after the win.

"I'm really pleased that I backed myself and the plan that my coach Lauryn and I put together over the past few months worked well. It was tough here but that can happen anywhere, and everyone has to shoot in the same conditions," she said.

"I'll go to Doha now and to Baku for the final two events and continue to work hard there and stick to our plan. They were the last two ranges I shot last before going to the Olympics in Rio in 2016 so hopefully that's a good sign."

The final standings for the domestic series were as follows. Chloe Tipple NZ 479, Aislin Jones VIC 478, Laura Coles WA 472, Brittany Melbourne VIC 446. The top three placed Australians now head to Qatar and Azerbaijan where the points from those events will be added to the totals above to determine who gets the sole place to represent Australia in Paris.

At the world indoor athletics championships in Glasgow last Saturday, March 2 it was Nicola Olyslagers' turn to stand on the top of the dais after she completed a last-gasp clearance at 1.99 metres to knock the reigning world champion, indoor and outdoor, Yaroslava Mahuchikh off her perch.

The victory wasn't a surprise with Olyslagers having equalled the Oceania record of 2.03m outdoors in January this year, and together with Mahuchikh the only jumper to have cleared 2 metres in 2024.

Eleanor Patterson who was entered for the event announced through Athletics Australia that she had remained home "to concentrate on her preparations" for Paris but in this most fickle of sports, any minor glitch in the preparation can force a late change in plans.

All that matters now is for Eleanor to focus on lining up at Stade de France on Sunday, August 4, 2024 for the high jump final at the Paris Olympics knowing it's anyone's gold on the night.
