RHYLL SAYS NO TO TRAIL

– Community raises concern about lack of consultation

A PACKED community meeting in the Rhyll Hall last Tuesday gave a very clear indication that the community are against the Council's proposed shared use path through Rhyll, with residents calling upon council to abandon the current plan and proceed with a headland trail.

Details of the proposed concrete path through the village and an alternative gravel path around the Rhyll Headland were in discussion.

The meeting was organised by the Rhyll Community Association, Rhyll Coast Action and the Rhyll Park and Hall Committee.

Rhyll resident Peter Balfe presented the comparison of costs and benefits on the Council's proposal (2.5m concrete path through Rhyll) and the headland trail (2.5m gravel path around the headland).

Jim Kiley of the Rhyll Community Association said Peter spent three years at VicRoads as their major projects director and then seven years as the deputy chief executive.

Peter provided the community with an assessment on the project, inviting the three island ward councillors, but only Cr Ronnie Bauer was in attendance and Cr Rooks discussed the community

concerns at an earlier meeting.

The Council's proposal involved construction of a new concrete path through the protected native vegetation and trees alongside McIlwraith Road, crossing Reid Street and constructing a concrete path down to the Rhyll Park; replacing the existing gravel path through the park with a 2.5 m wide concrete path which would deviate to go through to Molton Street alongside the children's playground, then crossing Lock Road and widening the existing concrete footpath to 2.5 metres down to Beach Road.

Rhyll says no to trail

The community associations were very critical of the Council's lack of community consultation about the proposal, which appeared to have no mandate.
"No one knew who had proposed the route."

The meeting also expressed concern about the apparent lack of any analysis of the project benefits and costs.
Council's estimate for the proposed works is \$450,000 compared to less than \$175,000 for the headland trail.

"A shared path through local streets could never be sold as a tourist attraction, whilst the headland trail could become a significant attraction," said Jim.

Peter presented the residents with a criterion that identifies that the council's proposed route was shown to have a much higher carbon footprint and negative impacts on the significant roadside vegetation and trees in McIlwraith Road, and the amenity and use of the park and the children's playground.

"It would also pose unacceptable risks to the safety of cyclists and pedestrians at the four road crossings, and crossings at 17 property access entrances with poor sight distance," said Jim.

Residents were particularly concerned about the safety of older pedestrians who need to use the Lock Road footpath,

and the prospect of months of construction noise and traffic disruption in the village.

On the other hand, it was demonstrated that the headline trail would have no negative environmental impacts and no road or property access crossings.

Presenting that the trail would in fact eliminate a major safety issue for pedestrians who currently can only use a steep narrow section of Beach Road to climb the hill next to the Yacht Club – addressing the concern of parents walking up this hill with prams.

The meeting resolved to notify Council that the community objected to a lack of consultation and 'call on the council to abandon the current plans and bring forward construction of the headland trail instead of wasting \$450,000 on a project that

the community did not want.'

At the end of the presentation, the Rhyll community voted in favour of objecting to a concrete footpath through the heavily treed McIlwraith Road plantation and the protected sedges and native grasses.

They objected to a 2.5m concrete path through to Rhyll Park and proposed deviation of the path adjacent to the children's playground.

All of the Rhyll residents in attendance carried the motion that, 'the meeting request the council to review the priority of a 2.5m gravel path around the Rhyll headland consistent with Council's PIITS 2014 and consult with the community regarding design and construction of the path.'

Cr Ronnie Bauer spoke on behalf of council stating that he would take this community proposal to his fellow councillors to address their concerns

and communicate with them accordingly.

The shire responded by stating: "As a response to recent community feedback, and to further understand the views of all community members, Council is working to undertake further community engagement on this project before proceeding further. We will update the project page on Engage Bass Coast and provide further information to the community about the engagement in the coming weeks. Community members are encouraged to visit Engage Bass Coast and 'follow' this project to receive updates on this project as they become available. The engagement period will run for one month, after which Council will consider all feedback and respond to the community with a proposed way forward."

Thousands detected during Operation Arid

POLICE detected almost 7000 traffic offences during a four-day statewide road policing operation over the Labour Day long weekend.

Operation Arid saw police ramp up enforcement following a shocking start to the year on Victoria's roads.

There have been 74 lives lost in the first 73 days of the year, 45 per cent higher than the same time last year and the five-year average – both 51.

Speeding, impaired driving, mobile phone use and unauthorised driving were the key issues detected by police during the four-day operation.

Offences detected during Operation Arid in the Bass Coast Police Service area included:

- 1 drink drivers
- 2 drug drivers
- 1 disqualified driver
- 2 unlicensed drivers
- 29 speeding offences
- 1 disobey signs/signals
- 2 seatbelt offences
- 16 unregistered vehicles

Statewide, more than a third of offences detected related to speeding, with almost 80 per cent of speeding motorists detected between 10km/h and 25km/h over the speed limit.

There were almost as many drug drivers caught as drink drivers, with 198 drink driving offences and 192 drug driving offences detected.

Mobile phone offences jumped 23 per cent from the last statewide operation in January, with 323 motorists caught using their phone while driving.

Unauthorised drivers accounted for 396 offences, with police using automatic numberplate recognition technology (ANPR) to detect and remove disqualified, suspended and unlicensed drivers from the road.

Operation Arid ran from 12:01am on Friday March 10 and concluded at 23:59pm on Monday March 13.

Professor John Thwaites AM Chair of Melbourne Water and Josh West then unveiled the sign.

This was followed by brief speeches given by Prof John Thwaites, Deputy Mayor, Cr Rochelle Halstead and Angela Christa (CBRRA member).

Bass MP Jordan Crugnale was also in attendance to enjoy the celebration.

Funds to divert waste

MINISTER for Environment Ingrid Stitt has announced the opening of the third round of the Circular Economy Councils Fund, which will support councils to increase recycling capacity and divert tonnes of waste from landfill.

Projects eligible for funding include initiatives that seek to increase the reuse, repurposing and recycling of materials at local or regional scale, helping to meet the Government's target to divert 80 per cent of waste from landfill by 2030.

A circular economy keeps materials, products and services in circulation for as long as possible and keeps them out of landfill. So far, more than 50 projects across the state have been supported by \$3.8 million in funding.

All Victorian councils and Alpine Resorts can apply for grants to develop projects.

O'Brien continues 'kamikaze corner' campaign

THE Nationals Member for Gippsland South, Danny O'Brien has urged the State Government to provide funding to fix a dangerous intersection at Leongatha South.

In State Parliament recently, Mr O'Brien called on the Government to provide funding for the realignment of the intersection of Bass Highway and Leongatha South-Outtrim Road, which has been the scene of a number of accidents including fatalities over recent years.

"This intersection was the scene of further accidents over summer and is in need of work," Mr O'Brien said.

"Although the road is predominately straight, those turning right into Outtrim Road don't have a turning lane and a small hill makes visibility towards Leongatha difficult.

"After lobbying some years ago, Regional Roads Victoria installed a left turning lane but there is further work that is needed."

Mr O'Brien said he understands that Regional Roads Victoria has plans for the realignment of the intersection, which also includes neighbouring Roughheads Road, but does not have the funding to proceed.

Offshore wind strategy revealed

MINISTER for Energy and Resources Lily D'Ambrosio has released the Victorian Offshore Wind Energy Implementation Statement 2, which sets out how Victoria will leverage industry-led investment in offshore wind for the first tranche of projects that will deliver at least 2 gigawatts (GW) by 2032.

The strategy confirms the location of the Victorian Renewable Energy Terminal at the Port of Hastings.

The terminal will support wind construction delivery of up to 1 GW per year, process turbines up to 18 megawatts and service multiple offshore wind developments concurrently.

The Victorian Renewable Energy Terminal will undergo a thorough Environment Effects Statement (EES), allowing the community to make submissions which will be considered before the project is progressed.

A Renewable Energy Supply Chain Hub will also be developed near offshore wind development areas.

Work will also begin on a renewable energy workforce development plan that will identify what skills and training is needed to support the industry, with a specific focus on Gippsland.

The strategy also outlines that VicGrid will lead on the development of transmission infrastructure for offshore wind.

It will consider a range of feasible options and is expected to announce the specific transmission connection point locations and route corridors in Gippsland and Portland by the end of the year.

OWEV is working towards a formal competitive procurement process for the first tranche of offshore wind energy capacity in 2025.

Further information will be shared in Implementation Statement 3 in late 2023.

Proud unveiling of Alex Scott mural

DOZENS of Wonthaggi locals gathered to witness the official unveiling of the incredible Alex Scott and Staff mural at the Wonthaggi Workmen's Club carpark last week. It has quickly become a source of pride for the town as it features Wonthaggi's strong mining history, while paying tribute to the agency's founders. Two plaques were also presented which commemorates the memory of Alex Scott,

Stewart Scott and Bruce Gibson, with another plaque also honouring Knox Bros. Timber and Hardware (1913-1987). The mural itself features the famed coal mining pit ponies, which are a mark of their firm's connection with the mines as a supplier of pit ponies. They were lovingly rendered by two of the state's best muralists, Brigitte Dawson and Melissa Turner of Melbourne's Murals, clearly with a special

gift for capturing the character and beauty of horses. It also includes the figure of Alex Scott, the founder of the firm and long-standing managing director, his nephew Bruce Gibson, who passed away a few years ago. Alex Scott and Staff director Tom Gibson said the event was a fantastic opportunity to not only highlight the agency's history but also Wonthaggi. "The plaque was in recognition of Alex Scott and his

early days followed by his son Stewart, who took over," he said. "He called upon his nephew, Bruce Gibson (my dad), and Alex Scott's grandson to come help him." He thanked all those involved in making the mural possible including Handley and Anderson funerals who provided the plaques. A time lapse video was also created throughout the duration of the painting.

Cowes industrial sites mostly compliant with EPA

EPA Victoria officers have inspected 10 industrial sites around Cowes in search of any threats to local waterways. The inspections are part of a state-wide program to resolve problems before they can cause a spill or let chemicals escape into stormwater drains, creeks and rivers. More than 100 sites have been inspected across Victoria so far. EPA Gippsland Regional Manager Jessica Bandiera says it's about sensible preventative measures each business should take. "Businesses around Cowes were cooperative and most of the issues we found could be fixed easily. The team gave compliance advice to nine businesses and will conduct follow up inspections at some of the sites," Ms Bandiera said. "We also issued four remedial notices; each one is an instruction from EPA to take specific actions to fix a problem. They come with a set deadline and there's no fine if the business complies," she said. "And I'm pleased to say that one of the businesses achieved a clean sheet and won't need any follow up." Ensuring the health of local waterways is important for Traditional Owners and their cultural responsibility to care for Country, so the inspection teams often include advisors from local indigenous communities. Typical issues found during the program's inspections include:

- The lack of a bund – a surrounding barrier that stops any spill from reaching a drain or leaving the property
- The lack of proper storage, handling, and management systems for liquids
- Inappropriate storage/handling of waste that might burn, like tyres and timber – there are size limits and minimum separation distances for stockpiles to limit the size and spread of fire
- Wastewater and wash water escaping to stormwater drains
- The lack of spill kits containing materials and equipment needed to contain a spill

The inspections target any site that can cause a spill, from concrete batching plants to chemical distributors, businesses offering vehicle and machinery servicing/repairs, chemical handling and a variety of other industrial activities. Mayor's message

CLIMATE change is front of mind in Council's decision-making, heightened since Council declared a climate emergency in 2019. Sea level induced coastal erosion has been a key focus with Council actively involved in managing key erosion hotspots across the Shire in Cowes East and Kilcunda and Inverloch in recent years.

Inundation risk arising from sea level rise was identified by Council in 2014 when it introduced the Land Subject to Inundation Overlay (LSIO) into the Planning Scheme to guide decisions on development proposals in coastal areas. The data required for the overlay was better in the Westernport areas due to the Coastal Hazard Assessment having been done. Recently the Cape to Cape Resilience project by the Victorian Government has identified further areas in and around Inverloch that are subject to inundation.

The LSIO identified two levels of sea level rise ie the level expected by 2040 of 0.2 metres and a higher level of 0.8 Metres by 2100.

Recently Melbourne Water commenced applying the more stringent 2100 inundation test and projected flood levels to their decision making on development proposals. This change in approach by Melbourne Water has meant that several planning applications that would previously have been approved have now been refused.

Bass Coast Shire Council officers have advised they will be unable to grant future planning permits for new homes and buildings where forecasting shows the property is likely to be impacted by climate change-caused sea level rise. To do otherwise would leave the Council and ratepayers open to significant legal issues down the track.

There is an urgent need for Government policy to manage this situation, to recognise the dilemma for people who hold

coastal land and who will no longer be able to build on their property. Clear policy direction and leadership from the State and Federal Governments setting out how to manage this emerging situation.

To begin with the State Government should prepare a State-wide Planning Scheme amendment that addresses coastal flooding potential across the State. There should be no doubt that coastal inundation is a state-wide issue impacting the entirety of Victoria's 2500km coastline. There is a precedent for this approach in the way the Victorian Government introduced a state wide bushfire overlay following the Black Saturday bushfires, setting out requirements for bushfire prone areas.

I have been on Council for nearly 7 years over that time the Australian Coastal Council and the South East Councils Climate Change Alliance both bodies have constantly pushed for climate change leadership from the Federal and State Governments. Coastal erosion has been a critical issue in Bass Coast over that time. We know that changes to the Planning Scheme to deal with climate change are well overdue. It is incredible that the Planning and Environment Act is not even subject to the State's own Climate Change Act.

I am calling for the State Government to take the lead role and provide a clear road map on coastal planning in a similar way the took over bushfire hazard planning after 2009's devastating Black Saturday bushfires. The Federal Government will be a critical part of planning for future climate disasters.

Critical stage for Kilcunda viaduct bridge

FINAL designs to help preserve Kilcunda's viaduct bridge have been completed with the project almost ready for construction.

After the community campaigned to have the bridge preserved, due to its deteriorating state, council first implemented permanent fencing to stop on-lookers from climbing on it and risking further damage.

However, further plans were undertaken to install a galvanized steel mesh 'portal' to allow pedestrians to walk under the bridge safely, as well as stepping stones for a wet weather pathway.

Council has been working with

Deery Consulting to develop the design.

"These preliminary concept designs and soil test results have been used to prepare the technical drawings for the project," the shire stated via their Engage platform.

"Design options were explored extensively and the safety fencing and retaining wall previously shown on the design were deemed unfeasible and extensive earthworks, retaining wall construction and other infrastructure were required.

"The safety fencing along the top of the bridge will remain and

there is an opportunity to paint it a colour that is more sympathetic to the skyline.

"The final design will provide the community with a safe thoroughfare and access while retaining the bridge for many more years."

The Viaduct Bridge in Kilcunda is an ex-railways timber trestle bridge owned by council and has been out of service for approximately 50 years.

Rhyll playspace stage 2 construction underway

STAGE 2 construction works for the Rhyll Playspace behind the Rhyll Angling Club were set to begin on March 14, 2023.

This project will complete the play-space upgrade at Rhyll by providing a nature-themed children's recreation area.

The works will include construction of a play tower, installation of a spiral slide and a connection bridge between the two towers, seating, landscaping, boardwalks, and pathways.

Council has appointed Planned

Construction Pty Ltd.

The total project cost is approximately \$300,000 and is jointly funded by the Victorian Government's Growing Suburb Fund, and Council's Capital works open space renewal program 2022/23.

The project is expected to be completed by late May 2023.

During the construction works for Stage 2, the existing play area will be closed, and temporary fences will be in place. Appropriate traffic and pedestrian control measures will be implemented

onsite during these works.

The community, residents, businesses, and other stakeholders will be kept up to date with the project via Council's website and can also on the on site QR code project sign, which will outline upcoming works and projected timelines for completion.

Surf Beach roads scheme a step closer

DESPITE opposition from between 246 and 408 of the 1033 property owners affected by the Surf Beach and Sunderland Bay road and drainage improvement scheme, the Bass Coast Shire Council is set to move ahead with the next crucial stage of its preparations.

At its council meeting this week, councillors will be asked to endorse the adoption of 'Base Case 1', costing between \$25.5 million and \$31.2 million, for the sealing of roads, installation of underground drainage and associated kerb and channel works, together with the construction of one concrete footpath on all road reserves in the two estates, principally at the cost of property owners.

The works will also include traffic calming with speed humps.

The higher range total project estimate of \$31.2 million, on an 85:15 split of costs between property owners and council would put the average cost per property at \$25,500.

The lower range of a total project cost estimate, at \$25.5 million with an 80:20 split of costs between property owners and council would put the average cost per property at an estimated \$19,600.

If council votes in favour of proceeding to the next stage, it will go ahead with accurate



costing of the project prior to producing a funding model including a distribution of costs schedule for each property owner.

It would be at that point that property owners will be given the opportunity to make submissions about the scheme and express their opposition or otherwise.

Next steps

In an officer's report, included in the agenda for this Wednesday's council meeting, the shire appears to have changed its attitude to demonstrated opposition to the scheme.

According to the report, 50% of the affected property owners

must demonstrate their opposition for the scheme to be abandoned.

"If Council adopts the proposed concept plan, which is recommended, the next step is to develop the estimated costs associated with the potential project and proposed funding model.

"A report would then be presented to a future Council meeting, in accordance with the Local Government Act, including the total project costs and those that may be levied to individual property owners.

"This will include a recommendation on whether to commence the legislative process and issue a notice of intention to declare a special

charge scheme.

"If the decision to issue the notice of intention occurs, all property owners would be notified by registered post, and provided details on the individual property owners' estimated contribution amount.

"Property owners will then have 28 days to lodge submissions to object or support the project.

"If over 50% of property owners lodge submissions of objection to the proposed special charge scheme, then in accordance with legislation the project cannot proceed. If less than 50% objections are received, then Council will decide on whether to declare a special charge scheme."

Shared pathway almost complete

WORKS continue to progress for the long awaited Guy Road shared path in Corinella with the project still expected to be completed in April this year.

The Guy Road Shared Pathway is a six-kilometre-long, 2.5-metre-wide shared cycling and walking link between the Corinella Community Centre to the Bass Valley Primary School and Children's Centre, via Tenby Point. The pathway will link into existing pathways connecting to the Bass Highway in one direction and Coronet Bay in the other.

Works undertaken in February include:

Concrete Footpath

- All concrete footpath works are complete.

Boardwalk

- All boardwalk sections are complete.

Gravel Path

- The works on the low lying gravel path sections between Brick Kiln Road and Joseph Road, and between Tenby Point and Cemetery Road (north) were delayed due to wet weather and flooded areas.
- The pathway section between Jamieson Street and Brick Kiln Road is complete.
- The section between Joseph Road and Argent Road is almost complete.
- The section between Brick Kiln Road and Joseph Road is underway.

Footbridge

- Piling works are complete.

Due to the discovery of Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in 2021, the project has been heavily delayed.

- Prevent your dog from chasing or attacking people or animals

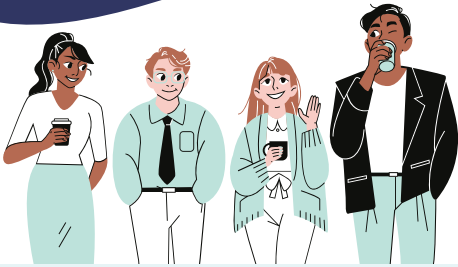

Wheelchairs for life

WHEELCHAIRS for Kids has been an international project of Rotary for 25 years.

Founded by Rotary Scarborough in Western Australia teams of volunteers gather daily to build the wheelchairs based on an Australian design, with the final product delivered to individuals abroad who are in desperate need.

Since establishment in 1998, over 54,000 chairs have been distributed to 90 countries worldwide with occupational therapists and physiotherapists setting up each chair on the receiving end to ensure the perfect fit for each child.

"It is one of the best projects Rotary have undertaken," Rotarian Richard noted.

"So many people have been involved over the years and the benefit is incredible."

Each all-terrain, orthopaedic wheel-

chair can be customised to grow with the child with one chair suitable for children from four years to 16 years of age at a cost of \$275 each.

"Our mission is to help any children anywhere in the world," South Eastern Division Wheelchair for Kids coordinator, Russell Hayes said.

"Over 300 volunteers participate weekly in the manufacturing with over 6498 volunteers participating over the 25 years. It is completely volunteer driven with all funds raised going directly to building more wheelchairs."

Fundraising for Wheelchairs for Kids is not just available to schools either with workplaces, and private donations also available.

"Kids have a great day out," fellow South Eastern Division Wheelchair for Kids coordinator, Grant Klaaysen added amongst the chatter and chorus of Foster Primary School children participating in the relay.

With the assistance of principal, Scott Moorhouse, Dr Laurie Warfe and Liz Hall, the Early Act Program incorporating the Rotary Youth division has seen 10 grade five students involved in bringing the project to Foster Primary School.

"It has been a fantastic day and our aim is to raise enough monies for 10 wheelchairs," Foster Primary School principal, Scott said referencing the direct fundraising students undertook and the sausage sizzle.

"Our parents club have even sponsored the icy poles the kids are enjoying as a way of thanking them for their hard work."

South Gippsland Asset Management Plan up for adoption

SOUTH Gippsland Shire Council's new Asset Management Plan appears set to be adopted at Wednesday's council meeting, with the aim of providing services in the most cost-effective manner, and an acknowledgement of the budgetary challenges to achieving desired service levels.

The plan provides a long-term outlook, taking account of the lifecycle of assets from acquisition, through

maintenance, operation, renewal and disposal.

"Lifecycle costs (or whole of life costs) are the average annual costs that are required to sustain the service levels over the longest asset life," the proposed new Asset Management Plan states.

"Our overall lifecycle budget is slightly lower than the projected lifecycle costs and as a result council

is not able to fund the current infrastructure lifecycle costs in order to maintain the current levels of service and/or provide new services in the long term," the document says.

The overall forecast lifecycle costs across council's asset categories is \$31,326,718, while the planned annual lifecycle budget is \$25,497,430, leaving a shortfall of \$5,829,288.

New focus for Venus Bay and Tarwin Lower business association

THE BUSINESS association for Venus Bay and Tarwin Lower is set for a transformation, with an expanded focus, broader membership base, and a new name to be considered.

Currently known as the Beach & Riverside Business Association (BARBA), the organisation's president, Dan Lawrie of Alex Scott Real Estate in Venus Bay, outlined recent feedback from members.

"Existing members have been canvassed for their views and there was a strong message that 'out-of-season' tourism should form a major plank of a reinvigorated association," Dan said.

That may include the reintroduction of a dual-town festival during the winter.

Previously, the towns united to host a winter festival and the 'Tour de Tarwin', with the latter involving running, walking or riding from Venus Bay to Tarwin Lower.

While there isn't a proposal to bring either event back in its previous form, a reimagined 'out-of-season' festival is seen as an effective way to bring people to town and support local businesses.

Dan noted that informal discussions

"It is time to initiate plans to ensure our businesses remain viable, vibrant and able to continue to serve their communities," he declared.

The business association's expansion of membership eligibility includes those who are self-employed, working from home, tradies, holiday rental owners, and people with experience in tourism, communications and events.

Originally, membership was restricted to physical shop holders.

An AGM will be held on Wednesday March 22 at 6pm at the Venus Bay Community Centre.

A new name for the local business association is likely to be determined at the meeting.

New members are encouraged to join, with committee roles also needing to be filled.

Kickflips and ollies for Kilcunda

BASS Coast Shire is pleased to announce that Grind Projects has been awarded the contract for the construction of skate park and new play space at Kilcunda Foreshore.

Construction was expected to commence last week.

The construction of the new skate park and playspace is in partnership with the State Government through Sport and Recreation Victoria, who have contributed \$250,000 towards the \$720,532 budget.

The project will see a new skate bowl constructed where the existing play space is located, whilst a new play space will be installed to its immediate northwest.

Kilcunda Community Association president Andrea Bolch said the community had been advocating for the project for almost six years.

“Kilcunda is a rapidly growing

town and it’s great to see a wonderful amenity being built for the young people of our town,” she said.

“There are limited amenities in Kilcunda and limited places to come together as a community, so this will provide a wonderful venue for all ages to be active and hang out.

“It will also be a huge attraction for our visitors and I imagine an added attraction for the OceanView Holiday Park next door.”

Features of the project include:

- The skate bowl will feature a roll in for beginners, a deep end for more advanced skaters, slappy kerb, water fall and pier 7 ledge. The facility also has a shelter with seating and accessible ramp entrance from both the rail trail and the foreshore sides.
- The play space will have a

natural feel including rock carvings along with traditional play elements for climbing, sliding and swinging. There will also be an accessible rubber under surface linked to a carousel and basket swing that ensures safe play.

- Landscaping works including drainage and a dry creek bed which acts as a swale, whilst the existing Norfolk Island Pine which creates shade will be retained. Some minor vegetation removal is required before substantial re-planting of trees and garden beds will be completed to act as landscape buffers around the play and skate areas.
- Accessible concrete pathways will be installed throughout the space and will create an uninterrupted path of travel from the main entrances (car park and rail trail) to the skate park, playspace, as well as

nearby toilet block and barbecue shelter. The transitions to these activity area’s will all be step free.

- User amenities such as a water fountain, bins and bike racks will be installed.

The works will involve the need for heavy machinery and equipment to be used, including noisy works such as demolition, retaining wall construction, and use of trucks for removal or delivery of materials to the site.

As a result, access to the area will be restricted, and appropriate traffic and pedestrian control measures will be put in place to ensure public safety.

The project is anticipated to be completed by the end of June, while the skate bowl is scheduled for completion in late May.

Early stages underway for crucial highway upgrade

DETAILED designs are being finalised for crucial upgrades on the Bass Highway at Kilcunda.

The State Government is investing \$7.8 million to make travel on the highway safer and more accessible with upgrades to improve safety for motorists, cyclists and pedestrians.

Improvements to the road will include new pedestrian operated traffic light signals, turning lanes and better parking facilities along the Bass Highway.

“Early works to improve traffic flow, safety and accessibility on the Bass Highway in Kilcunda have begun and the project is due to be completed by early 2025,” said Beth Liley, Regional Director (Gippsland), Department of Transport and Planning.

“We are finalising detailed designs for the safety upgrades at Kilcunda and we will continue to keep the community informed.”

This project is part of a \$226.7 million investment to improve safety on high-priority roads and intersections across Victoria, including the Gippsland region’s Strzelecki Highway between Mirboo North and Morwell.

'Clean' hydrogen gas to be produced in Gippsland

AN Australian joint venture between Japanese organisations J-Power and Sumitomo Corporation (JPSC JV) has been selected as the preferred hydrogen provider to Japan Suiso Energy (JSE).

The clean hydrogen gas will be produced in Gippsland and JSE will liquify the hydrogen for export to Japan.

The JV will produce the clean hydrogen, extracted from Latrobe Valley coal with CO2 capture, utilisation and storage (CCUS). J-POWER successfully produced 99.999% pure hydrogen gas, extracted from Latrobe Valley coal, as part of the Hydrogen Energy Supply Chain (HESC) Pilot Project, which achieved a world first liquid hydrogen supply chain with the delivery of the hydrogen at the Port of Kobe in Japan in February 2022.

In January 2022, the Hydrogen Energy Supply Chain (HESC) pilot Project achieved a world first by demonstrating that clean liquid hydrogen can be extracted from a mix of Latrobe Valley coal and biomass, liquified, shipped and unloaded in the port of Kobe in Japan.

The governments of Australia and Victoria contributed a combined \$100 million in funding to the \$500 million project. The rest was invested by the Japanese Government and Project Partners.

Crucial meeting for State Coal Mine

THE Friends of the State Coal Mine are holding a public meeting in the Kirrak room of the Wonthaggi Workmens Club on Wednesday, March 29, 2023, at 7pm.

The reason for the meeting is to inform the people of Wonthaggi and district about what is happening at the State Coal Mine Eastern area.

The underground tours have been suspended since March 16, 2020, and show no sign of reopening any time soon.

The coal mine café has also ceased operation since January 25, 2023, and similarly doesn't look like reopening any time soon.

The mine is an important part of Wonthaggi's early history, and it is essential that it is preserved for present and future generations.

The Friends group is currently in negotiations with the local member of parliament, who is in turn in touch with a number of other politicians in order to hopefully resolve this issue.

It is hoped that by holding this meeting, they will be able to create renewed interest in the mine and gain support from the people of Wonthaggi and district.

Therefore, they ask that if you can join the friends, you will help them to achieve their aim to reopen underground tours and re-establish the café.

The cost of a membership is \$10.00 per year and it will entitle you to receive monthly newsletters, the Sprag, either by snail mail or email.

Council to drop Wonthaggi's dead

THE Bass Coast Shire Council is considering a motion to abrogate its responsibility for the management of the Wonthaggi and San Remo cemeteries.

In a report to be presented to the next council meeting on Wednesday, March 15 the council has frankly acknowledged that it can't operate the two facilities to either the standard required or to the satisfaction of the two communities.

"The management of cemeteries is not the core business of Council. Despite local government's long involvement in the management of cemeteries, it is a service that councils are actively moving away from," says a report to council this week.

"Council currently has a minimum service offering, and the community would benefit from other services that could be offered under different management models, such as those offered by a Class A Cemetery Trust."

Council is already a long way down the track of abolishing the existing trusts and appointing a Class A cemetery trust, the Southern Metropolitan Cemeteries Trust (SMCT), as land manager of the two cemeteries.

A not-for-profit, metro-based organisation, SMCT administers nine cemetery locations including the Springvale Botanical Cemetery, the Melbourne General Cemetery, Brighton General Cemetery, Dandenong and Sorrento Cemeteries.

"The Class A cemetery aligned to this area is SMCT. A transfer to SMCT is recommended," according to council, "as it can provide options, service and main-

tenance to the community that Council operations cannot."

"The current management arrangements for the Wonthaggi and San Remo cemeteries are unsustainable and subsidised by Council rates funding, with full cost recovery deemed unrealistic for the community."

The changes follow a long period of problems and community criticism of the operation of, especially the Wonthaggi Cemetery, where the blame for flooding, lack of care and maintenance, and the absence of basic facilities, including a public toilet, have been sheeted home to the managers, the Bass Coast Shire Council.

An audit of community feedback, referred to at an April 2020 meeting of the cemetery trusts reported that over the previous 12 months approximately 449 emails were received about ground maintenance issues such as twigs and bark on the lawn, weeding, deteriorating signage, broken adornments and historical graves.

The exposed nature of the Wonthaggi site leaves it open to storms with the resulting problems of flooding, fallen trees and branches, and an inability to cut the grass and carry out routine maintenance.

This criticism reached a crescendo last November when Cr Les Larke blew the whistle on the parlous state of the cemetery after a "disturbing" visit there on Remembrance Day, November 11, 2022.

He has waged an on-going campaign about the condition of the facility and its financial woes.

As well as the difficulties with care and maintenance, the report also raises the lack of funding, and an inability to generate income from the modest number of burials (46 Wonthaggi, 7 Sam Remo in 2022) and other sources.

"Cemeteries have opportunities to generate revenue from four

major sources: burials, cremations, mausoleum crypts, and other sources not affected by land capacity like interment of ashes, memorialisations and chapel use.

"But the Wonthaggi and San Remo cemeteries do not have a chapel, mausoleum or facility to conduct cremations. Thus, revenue is largely generated from a low number of interments."

The council report goes on to note that "there are insufficient funds in trust to pay for capital works, and revenue is not set to increase markedly to cover these costs."

The lack of volunteers is also an issue, although it may be more a reflection of council's unwillingness to organise a volunteer program than locals putting up their hands to help.

"The trusts could contain their maintenance costs if community volunteers were active in cemetery maintenance, however there is no capacity in the existing resources to support the co-ordination and management of volunteer cemetery groups," said council in its report.

At a special meeting of the local cemetery trusts in June 2019, several members of the Friends of Wonthaggi Cemetery Trust had to write to council asking for clarification about their involvement at the cemetery.

So, it seems that a shift to external management by the city-based Southern Metropolitan Cemeteries Trust may be a done deal and councillors will be asked to give "in principle approval for officers to explore the transfer of management" at this Wednesday's council meeting.

A positive year for South Gippsland Hospital

IT WAS an exciting day on February 23, as South Gippsland Hospital (SGH) held their Annual General Meeting after a positive 12 months preceding.

SGH Board Chair, Ms Sue Pilkington, paid tribute to the Hospital's "wonderful staff", with the observation that "it's easy to forget now that between July and October 2021, Victoria went in to and out of lockdown three times and the impact that had on our health service and our staff."

"Once again, our staff continued their exceptional work for our Health Service and this community," Ms Pilkington noted.

"Our sincere thanks are extended to every member of staff and those who support them in their work for us."

The Board Chair went on to highlight the 'five key areas of our performance in 2021 – 2022', including safe, high quality healthcare at SGH; a strong financial performance; targeted investment in SGH's future; continuing collaboration with local, sub-regional and regional health services, and the high and enduring levels of satisfaction among SGH staff.

Ms Pilkington told the AGM that the results of regular Government surveys of Victorian health services staff, including those at SGH, on matters such as organisational culture and employee experiences in the workplace, had been consistently above 90 per cent for some time, benchmarked against other health services and also State Government entities.



A hybrid South Gippsland Hospital AGM recently took place with many positives celebrated, CEO Paul noted.

Treasurer Mr David Pollard outlined that net assets of the hospital increased by \$1.2million in 2022, up from \$8.9million in 2021, and capital projects and acquisitions also increased by \$1million over the year with a net surplus of \$713,258.

The hospital also saw an incredible 84 per cent growth in their Home Care Package Program up \$489,182.

During his address, CEO Mr Paul Greenhalgh acknowledged the staff and volunteers for their ongoing commitment to the health service and the community. Wellbeing was paramount to the hospital, particularly after a couple of difficult years stemming from COVID-19.

"The SGH team live the values of the organisation, day in day out, and they have responded to the challenges of 2021-2022 with enormous skill and dedication. Our people are our

greatest strength" he said.

Full time employment was up 4.5 per cent with 96 per cent of employees not only proud to tell others they work for South Gippsland Hospital, but also recommend friends and relatives be treated at SGH. Ninety-five per cent of employees would also recommend SGH as a good place to work.

These comments reflected similar feedback from visitors and patients.

"Great admission, procedure and discharge. Was particularly grateful for the input to the sedation which resulted in less cognitive disruption on recovery. The GP anaesthetist handled this extremely well. Thank you."

"The staff were all lovely and very professional. The facilities were excellent."

"Explained what medication they were administering and made sure I was comfortable, fed and hydrated."

A staggering 96 per cent of adult inpatient's surveyed said they would rate the care received at the hospital as good or very good, with 100 per cent agreeing that using South Gippsland Hospital Community Health Service was helpful to their health and wellbeing.

The capital program of work at the hospital was delivered on budget and included the Healing Garden, upgrades to ICT Network, Duress Alarms and Fire System, installation of steriliser and reverse osmosis unit and upgrade of the hospital ventilation and air-conditioning, redesign of the acute ward, staff amenities and wayfinding signage, and the new Urgent Care Triage Room, CHC Clinical Space and Ultrasound Room.

The Board Chair concluded the meeting by congratulating SGH for being judged as one of three finalists in the Victorian Premier's Awards for Small Health Service of the Year for 2021-2022.

She also commended the Board for developing SGH's new Strategic Plan and Vision, to "shape the SGH of the next three years, and beyond."

South Gippsland Hospital's Strategic Plan for January 2023 to December 2025 focuses on four interconnected areas 1) caring and quality services, 2) valuing all our people, 3) purposeful positive partnerships, all underpinned by 4) sound and aligned funding; and all highlighted by their vision – delivering the best and safest health care for our community.

Grand Ridge Rail Trail Bridge repairs

REGULAR users of the Grand Ridge Rail Trail from Mirboo North to Boolarra will know that the Cartwright Bridge suffered serious storm damage last winter.

After an extensive feasibility review, the committee of management now plans to get started on the repair work.

Preliminary works will be undertaken from March 22-24, and during this time there may be some brief periods when the Cartwright Bridge will be closed.

The major works will commence from April 24, for at least two weeks, and during this time the Cartwright Bridge will be closed continuously to all traffic - pedestrian and vehicle.

The rest of the Rail Trail will remain open during both periods.

The work is being funded by the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action, and managed by Strzelecki Engineering from Mirboo North.

New kinder for Korumburra

MINISTER for Early Childhood & Pre-Prep Ingrid Stitt has announced new kindergartens would open in primary schools including Korumburra in 2024.

Two-room centres opening to outdoor learning and play spaces will be built at Korumburra, St Albans Meadows, and Napoleons primary schools and Kyabram P-12 College, with each offering 66 kindergarten places.

The new kindergartens are sharing in \$371 million provided in the Victorian Budget 2019/20 for Three-Year-Old Kindergarten funding.

Built with modular construction to expedite delivery and minimise disruption for the school and local community, the technique delivers new high-quality learning environments more quickly, supporting 42 jobs during construction and 164 in associated industries.

Councillors to decide on contentious Korumburra development

A CONTROVERSIAL proposal for a Korumburra service station will be voted on by South Gippsland Shire councillors at Wednesday's public meeting.

The proposal is to include a truck stop and carpark, a convenience store, three food and drink premises with seating for up to 90 customers, and with a drive-through option available to one of the three tenancies.

Councillors are being called on to decide the outcome of the proposal due to the receipt of 13 objections,

particularly relating to amenity issues on the surrounding area.

Despite that opposition, the recommendation to councillors is to vote in favour of the development, resulting in the issuing of a Notice of Decision to that effect.

Should councillors support the recommendation, amended plans will need to be submitted to and approved by the responsible authority before development starts according to council's March meeting agenda.

The site of the proposed development is located on the western side of the South Gippsland Highway, Korumburra at number 8418.

A Planning Delegation Report for the site notes it is located "in an established mixed use precinct that supports a range of non-residential land uses including farming and industrial supplies and a nursery".

Furthermore, when addressing concerns about noise associated with the proposed development, the report notes that South

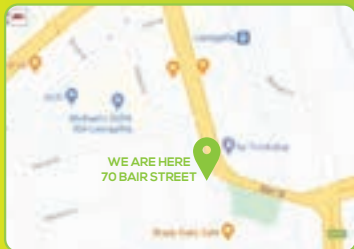
Gippsland Highway is designated as an arterial road and carries high levels of traffic.

The report concludes by expressing why council supports the proposed development.

"Council has considered the matters under Section 60 of the Planning & Environment Act 1987. It considers that the proposed use and development is appropriate having regard to the relevant matters and can be managed through appropriate conditions."

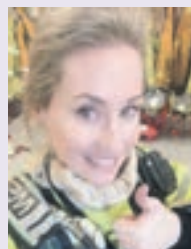


Jess, Firefighter

Nappy rebate vote in South Gippsland

A RESIDENT'S call for South Gippsland Shire Council to implement a rebate program to encourage the use of reusable nappies and other sanitary items will not proceed at this stage unless councillors vote against the recommendation before them.

The vote will be taken at Wednesday's public meeting, with a report prepared on the matter following a petition received at council's February meeting.

It was submitted by Van Bui, attracting 25 valid signatures within South Gippsland Shire and stating the aim of such a rebate program would be to reduce household waste.

While council's March meeting agenda states the environmental benefits of the initiative have been considered, the report argues such a service does not appear to significantly influence a change in behaviour.

The report credits the City

of Casey with pioneering the service, saying it has continued the rebate program for approximately 15 years, but calls into question its effectiveness.

"Discussions with City of Casey staff indicate they do not believe the program has had much impact on increasing the numbers of people switching to reusable products," the report states.

A 2022 City of Monash study into the uptake of reusable

nappies and rebate schemes is referred to, saying "It found that removing cost as a barrier was not a prominent reason for the continued use of reusable cloth nappies."

The report adds that the high cost of disposable nappies makes cloth nappies a more financially attractive option in the long term.

It is also argued up-front costs associated with reusable cloth nappies appear to be reducing.

“It is debilitating”

SPEAKING on The Project recently, Professor Jayashri Kulkarni from Cabrini Women's Mental Health says up to 750,000 Australian women need specialised support to manage Premenstrual Dysphoric Disorder (PMDD); a condition that significantly affects their ability to work, study and maintain relationships.

“PMDD is a debilitating major depressive condition,” Prof Kulkarni said. “For the women who experience its most severe form, it robs them of their quality of life, of their ability to work and their relationships.”

“It can have tragic outcomes, including suicide.”

PMDD is a severe form of cyclical depression, caused by increased brain sensitivity to fluctuating hormones and is influenced by psychological and environmental factors.

The symptoms cause clinically significant distress, interference with

work, school, usual social activities, and in particular relationships with others.

“Women feel overwhelmed, depressed, even suicidal,” Professor Kulkarni said.

“It is so important to let them know that with the right treatment and support, there is hope.

“Management options need to include the consideration of all aspects of the woman's life including her work, relationship stresses, past traumas, current physical health and daily demands.”

“Many women experiencing PMDD require hormone treatment and other strategies to assist them to improve their quality of life.

“PMDD is a severe form of depression and is influenced by psychological and environmental factors. It is critical to underline that PMDD is a brain disorder, not a reproductive organ disorder.”

Data shows cervical cancer diagnoses higher regionally

Cancer Council Victoria is urging women and people with a cervix in regional Victoria to get up to date with cervical screening and protect themselves from cervical cancer.

Recent data from Cancer Council Victoria's Victorian Cancer Registry, has revealed that females living in regional Victoria are 28% more likely to be diagnosed with cervical cancer compared to those living in major cities.

In 2023, thousands of Victorians will receive an invitation from the National Cervical Screening Program to participate in cervical screening for the first time in half a decade.

Those who are due for a Cervical Screening Test will now have the option

to self-collect their test.

Self-collection allows people to collect their own vaginal sample in a private space at the doctors or other health setting using a swab.

It's quick, easy and just as reliable as a sample taken by a doctor or nurse using a speculum.

If you are due for a Cervical Screening Test, speak to your doctor or nurse about your options, including self-collection or call Cancer Council Victoria's experienced cancer nurses on 13 11 20 for information and support.

Newborn screening for SMA improves chances of walking

CHILDREN with spinal muscular atrophy (SMA) are more likely to walk, be more functionally independent and free of respiratory and feeding support when screened, diagnosed and treated shortly after birth, according to a new study conducted at Sydney Children's Hospitals Network (SCHN).

Significantly, the findings show newborn bloodspot screening (NBS) for SMA, coupled with potential to access disease-modifying therapies, is correlated with greater motor milestone acquisition with those diagnosed before the onset of symptoms reaching regular childhood developmental milestones.

The study, published in The Lancet Child & Adolescent Health, is one of the first to investigate the effectiveness of NBS for SMA beyond clinical trial populations.

“The research shows the effectiveness of newborn screening for spinal muscular atrophy in the broader population,” says the lead author of the study Dr Didu (Sandi) Kariyawasam in the School of Clinical Medicine, UNSW Medicine & Health, and a paediatric neurologist at SCHN.

“Until recently, SMA was the

leading genetic cause of infant mortality worldwide. Many babies born with the severest infantile-onset form of the disease – type 1 SMA – died before their second birthday.”

NBS programs test for a range of rare, treatable conditions as early as possible after birth – even before symptoms appear. While there is currently no cure for SMA, recent advances in the effectiveness of genetic treatments have opened the possibility for a test for SMA to be included in newborn bloodspot screening.

“While the development of genetic therapies has been crucial, having a proactive model for early diagnosis is equally as important as an intervention,” says Dr Kariyawasam.

“The earlier the diagnosis, the earlier treatment can begin, which is where newborn screening comes in.”

Sound therapy is beneficial whether you are spiritually minded or not with multiple health benefits possible.

Salt, calcium and vitamin D – do you get enough, or too much?

WHAT you eat and drink, as well as how much sunlight you get on your skin, all affect your micronutrient levels – and in turn the health of your body and mind. So, what is a micronutrient? A micronutrient is a nutrient that your body needs in small quantities.

They include vitamins, such as vitamins A and D, and minerals, such as iron and calcium. Getting them into your body via what you eat and drink – except for vitamin D, which your skin can produce when the sun shines on it – is essential for health and wellbeing.

Anyone's diet can be unbalanced in one or more micronutrients. How to address salt, calcium and vitamin D problems

Salt:

- Consider the Suggested Dietary Target of 2000mg/day of sodium for adults (about 1 teaspoon of salt). Estimate how much you might eat on an average day by looking at the nutrition information labels on the processed things you eat, and note how much salt you add to cooking and meals. The average hamburger can get you to half of the daily target! The Heart Foundation has an online converter for sodium to and from salt, if you need it.

- Choose reduced salt versions of processed products, for example tomato sauce.
- Reduce or remove the salt that you add during cooking or at the table. This is hard, I know, because our taste buds are used to higher levels of salt in our meals. But remember, even a small reduction can help, for example one teaspoon to three-quarters of a teaspoon.

Calcium:

- Fill in this online calculator (eatforhealth.gov.au/nutrient-reference-values/nutrients-dietary-energy-calculator) to see how much calcium is recommended for you. We each need different amounts of nutrients depending on factors including sex, age and pregnancy.
- Again, look at the nutrition information listed on the packets of the processed foods you consume, and work out how much calcium you might get in a day from those sources (for example dairy, cheese, fortified oat milk, tinned sardines or salmon, tofu, and some nuts and seeds).
- Then, consider the calcium you might get from non-pack-

aged/labelled fresh foods, such as leafy green vegetables. Think broccoli, cabbage, bok choy, spinach, and so on. Food Standards Australia New Zealand has an online search tool where you can find out what nutrients a food or drink contains. The problem with calcium is that our gut doesn't absorb all of it from foods and drinks. We absorb about 30 per cent of the calcium in milk, 50 per cent in bok choy, and only 5 per cent in spinach – because spinach has something called oxalates in it that bind to the calcium in the gut, preventing its absorption. This doesn't mean that spinach isn't a good food overall though. Note that having enough vitamin D in the body enhances the gut's ability to absorb calcium, so if you are low in both calcium and vitamin D, your bones will particularly suffer.

- Make sure you eat and drink enough from the dairy and/or alternatives group.

- Make sure you choose alternative milks that have calcium added to them, for example oat milk with added calcium.

Vitamin D:

- It's almost impossible to obtain enough vitamin D from diet alone – the main dietary sources for Australians are fortified

margarine, oily fish and eggs.

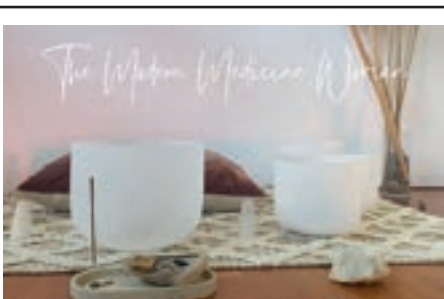
- Did you know that if you put mushrooms in sunlight, they'll produce more vitamin D? How cool is that? Only 15 minutes of mushroom 'sunbathing' is required, preferably with their gills facing up.

- It's important to get enough sunlight on your skin (in a safe way). In summer in Australia, a few minutes mid-morning or mid-afternoon is all that is needed for your skin to produce enough vitamin D. In some winter months in the more southern parts of Australia, it's two to three hours per week.

- People who are at particular risk of vitamin D deficiency are those with dark skin, who keep their skin mostly covered with clothing, and who spend large amounts of time indoors.

A word on supplements

It's best to try to get enough calcium and vitamin D into your lovely body through what you eat and drink, and via sunshine on your skin. However, if you can't (or won't), then supplements might help. It's best to consume supplements with food and be aware of any side effects. Also, be mindful of the amounts you take – you don't want to ingest toxic levels of any micronutrients.

It's a question of respect not cost

OK, so the Bass Coast Shire Council has finally thrown up its hands and acknowledged that it can't run the Wonthaggi and San Remo cemeteries to the satisfaction of either itself or the local communities.

Frankly, it's not a surprise.

In a report to council this week, councillors are being asked to admit their failures and to consider handing over the management of the two cemeteries to the Southern Metropolitan Cemeteries Trust (SMCT) which operates, principally metropolitan cemeteries, including Springvale Botanical Cemetery, the Melbourne General Cemetery, Brighton General Cemetery, Dandenong Community Cemetery and the Sorrento Cemetery.

But given that such a move raises far more questions than have so far been answered in the publicly-released reports, a decision along these lines would seem to be extremely premature.

For one, you are talking about a very small operation with just 53 burials between the two cemeteries in financial year 2022; 46 at Wonthaggi and 7 at San Remo and the ashes from 13 cremations (5 Wonthaggi and 8 San Remo) memorialised locally.

And despite the fact that San Remo has not produced an operating profit in the past five years, between them, the two cemeteries have recorded a net loss of only \$73,000 in the past five years.

Not a significant amount for such an important service.

You'd think a council with the resources of Bass Coast would handle such a small management role with ease.

And notwithstanding the fact that council has set aside a modest \$3.2 million in its Long Term Capital Works Program for projects over the next 10 years, and is projecting it will contribute \$2.2 million for staffing over the next five years; it would seem to be more of an issue of spending priorities and a lack of commitment to delivering basic community services than it is an indictment on council's ability to manage generally.

The community probably doesn't need to be concerned about the ability of a not-for-profit organisation like SMCT to manage the cemeteries but they should be concerned about the possible impact on burial costs.

And the cost of operation, maintenance and future expansion isn't going to go away.

There's also the question of whether the Wonthaggi Cemetery is even located in the right place (next to the tip), given projected expansion of the town and on-going drainage problems there.

The council is going to have to consult with the community and provide a much more comprehensive report, including comparative examples from other regional communities, the likely cost to local families of such a change and future planning for the two facilities before it simply hands the problems over to someone else, expecting them to go away, or at least be hidden from view under commercial-in-confidence and contractual protocols.

Drainage woes

It has been three months since I contacted VicRoads regarding numerous drainage issues on Phillip Island Road fronting Sunderland Bay and Surf Beach estates.

There are numerous drainage issues as a direct result of VicRoads failure to maintain or to have installed adequately sized drainage pipes.

I contacted our local MP for an email contact for VicRoads.

I was informed by our MP that the email had been forwarded to VicRoads on December 13, 2022. Since that time I have neither heard or seen any progress on this matter from either VicRoads or our MP, even though I have sent two emails to the MP in the past three weeks.

The drainage outfall at Sunderland Bay Road at Phillip Island Road is under capacity and completely blocked.

I believe the failure to maintain drainage is directly related to the proposed Sunderland Bay Surf Beach Special Charge Scheme.

If drainage issues remain through failure of council and VicRoads to regularly maintain pipelines and pits, it is likely, when it comes to the declaration stage of the special charge scheme, that a number of ratepayers will believe that the Bass Coast Shire Council (BCSC) plans will rectify their drainage issues even though council has stated that the drainage is being designed to flood every five years. Council stated at the December council meeting, that VicRoads will not be required to contribute one cent to the special charge scheme.

That means ratepayers will pay for the 3 km of drainage works along the frontage of the estates.

The failure also of BCSC and VicRoads to act on the 2014 Sunderland Bay Road Traffic Management Plan: d2n3eh1td3vwdm.cloudfront.net/general-downloads/Infrastructure-Assets/2014-06-03-Surf-Beach-and-Sunderland-Bay-Traffic-Management-Plan2.PDF is also of extreme concern.

It would appear that road safety is not a major concern to either BCSC or VicRoads.

It was recommended in the traffic management plan almost nine years ago that the number of entry and exits points into the estates should be drastically reduced and that dedicated turning lanes be incorporated at the intersections.

There was a rear end crash at Dunvegan Crescent over Christmas, luckily it did not result in a death but traumatic for the occupants, none the less.

There have been a number of crashes and a death on this section of road. I am disgusted in BCSC failure to address these major drainage and safety issues with VicRoads and implement plans to coordinate upgrades of Phillip Island Road and road and drainage works in the estates simultaneously to ensure uniformity of designs.

Appreciating our beautiful Eucalyptus species

NATIONAL Eucalypt Day (NED)! What started as a small event ten years ago is now an annual national celebration of our iconic Aussie gum tree.

Organised by individual groups, events like ours are unified through a trust, Eucalypt Australia, and widely advertised on social media.

NED is promoted by TV personality Costa Georgiadis and gum gurus such as Dean Nicolle.

This all came about because one Bjarne K Dahl, a forestry expert, made a lot of money over his lifetime in the bush a fortune, in fact, from fortuitous land purchases.

Having no heirs, he set up a bequest to promote, study and protect the trees he loved.

This trust fund is now Eucalypt Australia and Dahl's birth date (March 23) is recognised annually.

Here in South Gippsland, we are celebrating National Eucalypt Day on the weekend of March 25-26, with two open days at the pioneer Lester property in Mardan, and on Saturday at Korumburra's beautiful, well established

Botanic Park.

For many years now, Richard Lester has been successfully growing species of all shapes and sizes that would not normally grow in our climate.

A tour of his collection shows how he manages this - very useful knowledge now that so many exotic gums are readily available. Species such as E. tetraptera (Square Fruited Mallee), which is suggested as a tree for small gardens, benefit from careful preparation.

The Lester farm also has some fine examples of remnant gums plus many other trees planted over generations. Among these is Eucalyptus Strzelecki.

Strzelecki gum, aka Wax Tip, gets a particular mention for three main reasons.

One is that Korumburra Botanic Park has a thriving young specimen given to the park a year ago by FOKBP (Friends of Korumburra Park) member, Vicki Philipson, a much-awarded botanic artist who also provided the wonderful gum leaves image for this year's poster.

Then, as this is the fifth

year of local NED, a noteworthy anniversary, it seemed like a good idea to have a special Feature Tree - our second reason.

The third, and most important, is to spread the word that our fine local E. Strzelecki, while not yet facing extinction, is in escalating decline.

The hope is that awareness will encourage farmers and people with large properties to plant seeds (described as quite easy to germinate) or tube stock.

There is plenty of general and also scientific information about eucalypts online.

And of course there will be info handouts available at both event sites:

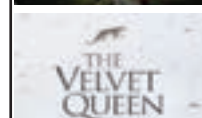

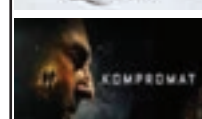

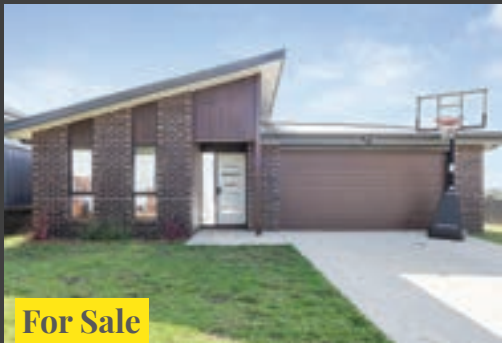

Pastures may need extra care after the wet spring

PASTURES affected by flooding and severe waterlogging will need some extra care this season to re-establish healthy productive pastures.

By focusing on soil testing, soil temperatures, seed depth, irrigation, weed control and grazing management, this will all help with pasture re-establishment.

Soil testing is highly recommended. After flooding sandy soils can have issues with leaching of various nutrients, such as sulphur, potassium and nitrogen. Heavy soils that have been inundated for prolonged periods; denitrification can occur.

Previously planned fertiliser applications may need to be adjusted to suit. The soil test may also indicate the need for gypsum application to help build and protect soil structure.

Soil temperature is a critical aspect of any pasture establishment. The ideal soil

temperature for sowing varies depending on the species. For ryegrass and clovers, the ideal soil temperature for germination is between 20 and 25°C. Persian and Shaftall clover can withstand higher soil temperatures of up to 35°C. Oats have an ideal soil temperature range of between 10 to 25°C, while wheat and barley prefer temperatures a couple of degrees lower than oats.

If you are unsure of soil temperatures, a good rule of thumb for ryegrass and clover is to sow when daily maximum air temperatures for five consecutive days average less than 25°C. Above these temperatures seeding establishment is reduced significantly and pastures may need to be resown.

The sowing depth of seed is proportional to the seed size. A general rule of sowing is that sowing depth should be twice

the length of the seed. For example, ryegrass seed should be sown at 1-2 cm depth. If seed is sown too deep, it will increase the time it takes to emerge, or it may fail to emerge at all.

To achieve a dense, productive pasture aim for plant densities of 600 seedlings/m². Plant densities should be measured one week post emergence. If the plant density is below 600 seedlings/m² action may be required.

Pasture with counts lower than 80 per cent will require more drastic action to perform at their best. Newly established seedlings are more susceptible to moisture stress than established plants.

Depending on the season, the first irrigation will typically use 1.5 ML/ha with subsequent irrigations requiring 0.5 ML/ha, depending on soil type and irrigation layout.

After the pasture sward is established, the first grazing is crucial to get right, as it can set

the pasture up for the remainder of the season. The pasture should be 10 cm high and at least at the two-leaf stage.

Before grazing check if the root system is developed enough by using the 'pluck test'. To complete a 'pluck test', take a tiller between your fingers and pull in a motion to mimic a hungry cow's bite. If it tears without pulling the plant out of the ground, it is ready to graze.

Graze pastures to a residual height of 4-6 cm. This will help promote tillering, minimise damage to the pasture and set the residual height for future grazing's. On-off grazing should be used to help achieve residuals of 4-6 cm when first grazing new pastures.

It is vital to get the basics of pasture establishment and grazing right to ensure the best result possible and produce healthy productive pastures.

Agri-Tech roadshow coming to Foster Secondary College

Fox and wild dog bounty program back in operation for 2023

THE Victorian Government's fox and wild dog bounty has resumed for 2023.

Agriculture Victoria Biosecurity Officers will again operate monthly collection centres across the state from March until October.

Agriculture Victoria Biosecurity Manager Jason Wishart said participants could submit

entire fox scalps for a \$10 reward and/or entire wild dog body parts for a \$120 reward at specified collection centres during scheduled collection times.

The Fox and Wild Dog Bounty program received \$6.7 million in the Victorian Government's 2020-21 Budget and will continue until 2024.

Since the program was

introduced in 2011, over a million fox scalps and close to 4,630 wild dog body parts have been collected in Victoria.

Foxes and wild dogs prey on livestock, especially lambs and sheep, inflicting significant economic and production loss to Victoria's livestock sector. They also have an impact on native wildlife.

Participants are reminded that the Victorian Fox and Wild Dog Bounty has gone digital.

Crackdown on illegal firewood collection

AS MANY Victorians stock up their firewood supplies for winter, the Conservation Regulator is urging people to help save critical wildlife habitat and protect Aboriginal scarred trees by sourcing firewood responsibly.

Birds and reptiles as well as a range of native mammals, such as possums, gliders and bats, rely on hollows in both standing and fallen trees for habitat.

The illegal collection of firewood, if made up of mature trees and limbs, also has potential to harm Aboriginal scarred trees. Once gone, an important piece of Aboriginal cultural heritage is lost forever.

Domestic firewood collection from public land is only available in designated areas during the autumn and spring firewood collection seasons.

During these times people can collect a maximum of two cubic metres of firewood per person per day and a maximum of 16 cubic metres of firewood per household per financial year. Only fallen timber without hollows can be collected.

This year the Conservation Regulator is targeting firewood theft with Forest Fire Management Victoria and Parks Victoria through Operation Hollows.

Authorised Officers are educating the public about the rules and penalising thieves. Anyone caught breaking firewood collection rules can face on-the-spot-fines of \$740

under the Forests Act 1958 or a maximum penalty of \$9,246 and/or 1 year jail if the matter is taken to court.

Last year the Conservation Regulator laid 625 charges and issued 85 infringement notices and 16 official warnings for firewood offences, including cutting or taking fallen or felled trees, and disturbing, damaging or destroying wildlife habitat. Cases which resolved in the Magistrate Court system faced convictions, fines and had chainsaws and trailers forfeited and destroyed.

It is also important firewood collectors understand their obligations under the Aboriginal Heritage Act 2006. All Aboriginal places, objects and Ancestral remains are protected in Victoria. It is an offence to harm Aboriginal heritage and substantial penalties apply.

If you think you have found a scarred tree or other Aboriginal cultural heritage, contact your relevant Registered Aboriginal Party (if one has been appointed) or First Peoples - State Relations on 1800 762 003.

Mr O'Brien said he has been contacted by several frustrated land holders throughout the electorate who are struggling to manage weeds due to rampant weed growth on neighbouring properties – many of which are Crown land.

He said he has regularly raised the issue of weed eradication with the state government, but is not seeing any action on the ground.

“Unfortunately, it is becoming somewhat of a tradition that around this time of year I am

inundated with calls from fed-up farmers and landholders who are rightly concerned about unmanaged weeds, particularly ragwort and blackberries and particularly in the South Gippsland Shire,” Mr O'Brien said.

“Most landholders do the right thing, but many farmers are angry and frustrated that some of their neighbours do not and that the government doesn't enforce the law with respect to weed management.”

“Indeed, the government departments themselves are some of the biggest culprits when it comes to mismanagement of weeds on Crown land or in road reserves.

“Weeds currently cost Australian farmers \$4 billion each year through yield losses and

product contamination and this government needs to take action to ensure they are not contributing to the problem,” said Mr O'Brien.

A spokesperson from Agriculture Victoria responded stating, “Agriculture Victoria works with a wide range of land managers in the South Gippsland area including private landholders, local government, and crown land managers to meet their responsibilities to manage declared noxious weeds.”

“In the past few months Agricultural Victoria Biosecurity Officers have visited 30 properties of concern across South and West Gippsland to assess noxious weed infestations and discuss control options with landholders.”

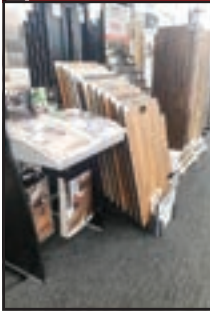

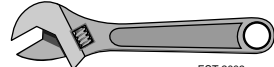

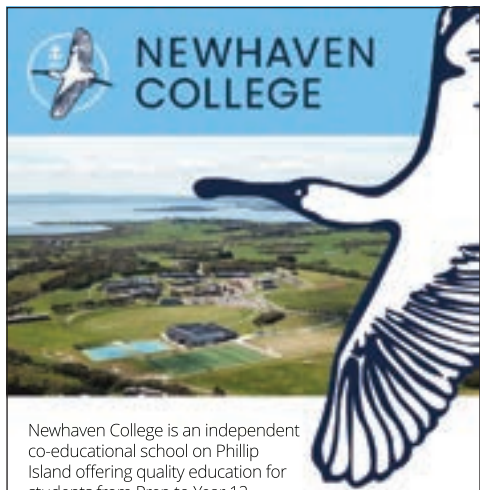

A horizon of choices and opportunities

EXCITED chatter and much listening was had as students from Bass Coast College senior campus embarked on the annual Year 12 Tertiary Camp to Melbourne last week.

Across four days students visited universities, TAFE and tertiary education facilities to explore the options available.

From RMIT to Swinburne, Australian Catholic University (ACU) to Deakin, it was a chance to understand the facilities, courses offered and experience university life first-hand.

“(The camp) helped give a hierarch of university preferences for when it comes time to put in your preferences,” Kayla began.

Notably, the camp brought a sense of calm and resolute to students as universities adapt to the changing post-secondary dynamics and options.

“They are pretty flexible on the ATAR’s now,” Mica explained.

“Especially after COVID, there are more pathways, and they are making it more accessible for everyone. It’s for everyone now not just high achievers or (those who could afford to go).”

The relief of not stressing about the year in front and each BCC student doing the absolute best each can do was evident.

“A lot of the speakers said, ‘don’t stress’ – there are so many pathways to gain access to do what you want to do,” Mica said.

For Kayla hearing about the students own experiences and not having the same information reiterated was a highlight, as was hearing the different options.

“All the different universities have different set-ups,” Mica explained.

“Deakin had the nursing ward and Swinburne was more about science – there was variety for everyone.”

“Being able to go to the places you were most interested in and customise it for what you want to do was interesting,” Ella added.

Ella and Scout also highlighted the new and different ways universities were tackling the ever-changing market by offering varied modes of learning -for example, Victoria University’s Block Model, and the wider inclusion of trimester across more universities, not to mention breadth of double degrees.

The journeys each student is looking to embark on beyond year 12 is just as varied as the universities themselves.

“I want to do something in Allied Health, like OT at ACU – their allied health services are spot on for me and going there really set it for me,” Archer noted.

“Business commerce at ACU,” Isaac added.

“Science, but I am not sure where yet,” Kayla said.

“Nursing and midwifery (double degree) at Deakin in Burwood or ACU,” Mica stated.

Visiting the universities, public and private, also helped clarify the costs for students with public education the same no matter the university.

Closing the Gap in Bass Coast

IN 2008, the Council of Australian Governments (COAG) established Closing the Gap to provide the basic health, education and other services needed to put Indigenous Australians on an equal footing with other Australians.

Since then some targets, such as children's school readiness, child-removal rates and incarceration rates, went backwards, and other measures have faced repeated delays.

In March 2019, a formal partnership saw, for the first time, Australian governments share decision making with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peak representatives to develop a new National Agreement on Closing the Gap.

In February 2023, the Minister for Indigenous Australians, Linda Burney, announced more than \$420m towards a new plan providing clean water, food security and housing to Indigenous Australians. The announcement is part of the practical actions the government

has promised to close the gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australia. Next Step towards Closing the Gap

The implementation plan covers water, housing, education, legal assistance and support for women and families experiencing violence, with a particular focus on rural and remote communities.

The funding is in addition to the \$1.2bn announced in the October 2022 budget, and will be delivered through formal partnerships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations and communities.

Closing the Gap locally

The Bass Coast Reconciliation Network (BCRN) consists of community members and key organisations within the Bass Coast. These organisations are also working to Close the Gap.

Phillip Island Nature Parks has had a Reconciliation Action Plan for

several years and has also developed an Aboriginal Employment Strategy and added two new employees to the Conservation team.

Westernport Water rolled out their second Reconciliation Action Plan in 2022.

Bass Coast Health is committed to working with First Australian communities to understand their health and well-being needs and to improve our health practices.

In 2020 Bass Coast Health employed an Aboriginal Hospital Liaison Officer, and in 2021 an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Advisory Committee was formed and will launch their Reconciliation Action Plan in 2023.

The Bass Coast Reconciliation Network is proud to be working and walking with these organisations and the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the community to close the gap.

70 trees chopped for 'appropriate infill'

THE Bass Coast Shire Council is set to support an "appropriate infill" subdivision of 16 allotments in Cowes despite the need to remove 70 trees from an area subject to a Vegetation Protection Overlay.

However, according to a report prepared for this week's council meeting, 57 of the trees at the 35 Cowes-Rhyll Road site, opposite the Cowes Catholic Church and Primary School, have been assessed as having low retention value.

Council has also worked with the developer to retain eight trees pre-

viously nominated for removal and the applicant must enter into an off-set agreement for the replacement of 0.221 hectares of native vegetation.

A long list of conditions has been produced to protect retained vegetation during construction and upon completion.

The project on a 1.391ha site off Cowes-Rhyll Road adjoins land already developed for housing in the Blue Gum Estate area near the Phillip Island RSL.

Blocks vary in size from a compact 450m2 to generous lots over 600m2

and up to 744m2.

The application attracted 11 objections raising a variety of concerns about such things as potential flooding from an underground spring, significant native vegetation removal, the need for wildlife fencing, no pedestrian access to Cowes-Rhyll Road, traffic congestion and lack of consultation.

But with no objections coming from relevant authorities and an exhaustive list of 46 itemised conditions, council is set to support the project.

Stop the social media trolls, says Cr Laing

AS AN avid contributor to social media, Cr Leticia Laing is well aware that the publication of one's thoughts online can cut both ways.

But in a Notice of Motion to this Wednesday's council meeting, Cr Laing is asking the Bass Coast Shire Council and its peak body, the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV), to draw the line at bullying and abuse.

She is asking council to petition the MAV to place the following about the bullying of councillors and candidates on the agenda for the next MAV State Council meeting.

"That the MAV advocate on behalf of candidates and Councillors for

additional resources for the eSafety Commissioner, Local Government Inspectorate and other relevant bodies to address online bullying, harassment and trolling of candidates and Councillors on social media platforms, including but not limited to:

- Expanding the authority of the eSafety Commissioner to remove online abuse on online service provider platforms which would either fall under the current threshold of content with the 'intent of causing serious harm' or under a new threshold of 'unintentionally causing serious harm'.
- Work with local governments

to develop specific support and social media management programs available for candidates and Councillors through the eSafetyWomen program in the lead up to the 2024 elections.

Cr Laing is also calling on council and the MAV to campaign for a change to the Local Government Act to not require reimbursements of childcare costs or expenses, incurred by a Councillor, to be reported as an expense item in the Annual Report or elsewhere in council documents.

Cr Laing has claimed to have been previously vilified for making such claims on her councillor allowance.



Around the Bay

With Jim's Bait and Tackle

THE fishing season is very quickly winding down for those who just fish the warmer months.

But those that know will still be wetting a line over the winter period with plenty of fish to be caught.

Although we had several reported over the weekend, the tuna reports have started to slow and they are a little wider than they have been.

The next couple of weeks will tell if it was just the bad weather of the previous week that pushed them out wider or they are actually on the move.

ger flathead from in the bay and not just one or two but good numbers, there are still plenty of the tiny ones but good to see them growing up a bit. Gummies have been nothing too special this last few months, certainly nothing like they were around October but a few of size are showing up, the bigger ones require a trip offshore.

Whiting reports, if they were 5 years ago they would be considered excellent but everybody's expectation has certainly changed because the fishery has been so good.

That doesn't mean that offshore fishing is finished it just means a change of species.

Now is the time to break out the kingfish gear and go and chase, in my opinion, a much better fighting and eating fish than tuna and will be much more of a challenge also.

We have been spoilt for the last few years and now everyone expects to head out and catch a bag full of 40cm ones, forgetting that it's only been recently that was the case.

The reports we are getting now are a bag of mixed sized ones and even some undersized showing up which is more like we are used to from a few years ago except the condition of the whiting is much better.

Calamari have been very difficult to get a read on this year and you can't really blame the weed either; it's just been inconsistent.

The reports of late have also started turning up a few makos, snapper, gummies, schoolies and good numbers of flathead, all worth the effort of heading offshore.

There have been some bigger salmon and plenty of live bait if you want to go and chase a kingfish.

Another species we have seen this season that has been a little scarce lately has been blue sharks.

The blue shark is the makos dopy cousin and 100 per cent opposite, a draughtboard with a different coloured skin as one customer described.

There was plenty of people fishing back in the bay over the weekend both in boats and from the land with mixed results from all.

The boats are finding another run of big pinkies/snapper again which is about the same as last season.

They aren't the 6 or 8kg models of the early snapper season but some very respectable pan sized ones.

The reports mostly came from the edges of the channels and some of the deeper snapper spots with the shallower areas producing plenty of smaller pinkies.

Every week now we are getting reports of big-

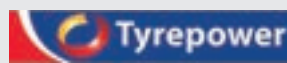
