Heroes recognised for brave conduct

TWO tales of unwavering valour have emerged in this year's Australian Bravery decorations announcement last week by the Governor-General with Samuel Haycroft and Thomas Robinson amongst 28 individuals commended for brave conduct and eight bravery medal recipients.

Guardian angel of the waves

SAMUEL Haycroft has been commended for brave conduct for his actions rescuing a man from a capsized boat off Ventnor Beach back on July 29, 2015.

On the evening of Tuesday, March 26, the Governor-General announced 50 Australian Bravery Decorations to recognise the courageous acts of 89 people, with Samuel recognised for his act of

bravery nearly a decade earlier.

"On behalf of all Australians I congratulate the recipients of Australian Bravery Decorations. Confronted with danger, each chose to help someone. Their bravery is commendable, and their selflessness is inspirational," the Governor-General said.

Samuel shared that he was a resident in Ventnor at the time. "I got a text from a neighbor asking if I could hear someone yelling for help? So, I stepped out onto the back veranda, and sure enough I could hear a voice.

"I began jogging through the street, following his voice and it took me down to the beach, there was a four-wheel drive parked at the edge of the water, maybe half a dozen people and the high beams were on and pointed out to sea – where


sure enough that's where his voice was coming from."

"I looked around and there was a teenager with his malibu board, I grabbed a torch from someone nearby put it in my mouth, picked up the board and started paddling out in the freezing cold water.

"I needed that torch to direct me to his voice, and sure enough a couple of hundred metres out the swell started to pick up, and I could see the man sitting on top of a capsized tinny," he said.

The man was blind and without a life jacket. Samuel remained calm in a crisis, directing him to the surfboard, where they both began paddling in. "I was kicking, he was paddling – but the water was freezing. I could hardly feel my legs," said Samuel.

Samuel said he could see the headlights of the four-wheel drive on shore, and he knew help was coming. "I continued to kick to get him to shore, but it was a jet ski that was passing by that helped us. The jet ski got the man on board – I remained in the water and could see him being loaded into an ambulance, but I still had to keep paddling and get myself out of the freezing cold water," explained Samuel.

"It wasn't until now, that I heard that he was alive and well and living in Queensland."

"It was just my initial instinct to help someone in distress, despite feeling uncomfortable and unsure of the conditions out in the water."

Thomas commended during armed arson attack

VISITING their Coronet Bay holiday home in spring of 2019, Mr Thomas Robinson and his wife faced a man banging on their front door around 3am, claiming that someone was after him and requested to use their phone to call the police.

Mr Robinson was commended by the Governor-General for brave conduct during this traumatic incident after the man struggled to use the phone and threw it across the room in frustration – Mr Robinson instructed his wife to

leave and call triple 0.

The intruder then picked up a box of matches from the kitchen bench and began lighting small pieces of paper on fire, all whilst Mr Robinson was trying to calm him down. The man then grabbed a gas lighter and continued to set fire to the paper, also pulling down the window blind and spraying an aerosol to act as an accelerant.

Mr Robinson tried to obtain a fire extinguisher to put out the fire, but the man grabbed a

knife and told him to put the extinguisher down. Mr Robinson approached the man but was pushed back, injuring his leg.

Acting erratically, the man grabbed Mr Robinson's shirt. He held on for some time, alternating between threatening Mr Robinson and apologising.

The fire progressed, and the house filled with thick smoke. They went down on their knees to get under the smoke, where he eventually dropped the knife,

but tossed other items onto the flames. The men crawled along the hallway and Mr Robinson assisted the man outside where they were met by emergency services.

In an interview with the Sentinel-Times Mr Robinson confirmed that the family received counselling for the distressing event, the home was salvaged and has since been restored – a holiday home that has been in the family since 1995.

Phillip Island reflects slow return of internationals

NEW data has revealed that Victoria is lagging behind the nation on the return of international tourism.

The latest visitor survey data from Tourism Research Australia has confirmed Victorian international tourism spending is at 73 per cent of pre-pandemic levels, compared to 96 per cent in New South Wales and 94 per cent in Queensland.

In Phillip Island's case, international visitor numbers are in worse shape, still down at 30-40 per cent of pre-pandemic levels, but they are on the improve according to Destination Phillip Island Regional Tourism.

Despite not being aware of any up-to-date comparisons with other states, Destination Phillip Island General Manager Kim

Storey said the Island's international visitor figures were still trailing well behind numbers in 2019. "The international bookings haven't returned to their best levels yet but they're improving. You've got to remember that China started back late but we are seeing promising signs. In January the true holiday arrivals went ahead of international friends and family arrivals for the first time which is good," said Ms Storey this week.

"We would expect airline holiday arrivals to be back at capacity by the end of the year.

"And they are doing things to promote Victoria. We are hosting the International Tourism Exchange in Melbourne this year, in May, and we've got operators from this area going up to that.

"We'll also be hosting visits here before and after so international trade can take a closer look at what we've got and we would expect improvement out of that.

"They're working on other programs too, but we are seeing steady improvement in international visitor numbers."

While overall combined national and international tourism spending in Victoria continues to rise, the Victorian Tourism Industry Council (VTIC) warns Victoria's growth has stagnated and has called on the State Government to scrap its upcoming short-stay accommodation tax as well as develop an underground solution to the Melbourne Airport Rail Link.

Shadow Minister for Tourism, Sport and Events, Sam Growth, has criticised the State Government for a lack of action, saying a range of regional Victorian hospitality venues have gone into administration or closed permanently, as cost-of-living pressures and increasing taxes hamper business conditions.

Alongside interest rate rises and higher insurance premiums, said Mr Groth, venue operators have cited energy price increases and increases in state taxes and charges, such as liquor license fees, as key factors.

"International tourism remains below pre-pandemic levels, overall tourism performance has Victoria lagging behind New South Wales and Queensland after losing our second place during the pandemic, and regional businesses continue to suffer."

Wonthaggi police recover stolen vehicles, arresting alleged offenders

TWO vehicles stolen from Inverloch overnight on Easter Saturday were recovered by Wonthaggi police, with four alleged offenders arrested and facing serious driving charges and theft.

A silver Nissan Navara and a white Toyota Hilux, both damaged, have been returned to their owners following forensic analysis.

"We got calls during the morning of erratic vehicles driving around the Bass Coast area, believed to be the two vehicles that were stolen overnight," Senior Sergeant Jason Hullick said.

Police tracked the Navara in Wonthaggi, following its path via gouge marks left in the road due to the fact the car's right rear tyre had blown.

Two males, aged 15 and 17, were arrested on Cameron Street, Wonthaggi, alleged to have been passengers in the Navara before jumping out.

The Navara was then tracked to Blue Water Circle in Cape Paterson, where the alleged driver, a 16-year-old male was arrested with assistance from the community, reportedly having dumped the car and fled on foot.

The Hilux was located a short time later, dumped in Wonthaggi, with a fourth person then arrested at the intersection of Korumburra Road and McKenzie Street, being the alleged driver of that vehicle.

All those accused of being in the stolen Navara are from Leongatha, while the 18-year-old male alleged to have been driving the Hilux is from the southeastern suburbs of Melbourne.

The alleged drivers of the two stolen vehicles were charged and bailed and will appear at Korumburra Magistrates' Court, with charges including reckless conduct endangering life, unlicensed driving and theft of motor vehicles.

The two alleged passengers will be charged on summons to appear in court.

Police Easter road operation results

OPERATION Nexus over the Easter period resulted in a number of offences being detected on roads in the Bass Coast Police Service Area, including three drink drivers, four drug drivers, one unlicensed driver, 31 speeding offences, two seat belt offences and 11 unregistered vehicles.

There were also two cyclist offences recorded.

No mobile phone offences were reported.

Country road safety survey open

RACV is asking Victorians to provide feedback about how safe they feel on roads in regional Victoria as part of their My Country Road survey. The survey is open and will run for six weeks.

The survey uses an online interactive map that shows high-speed roads with large concentrations of crashes causing death or serious injury in regional Victoria.

The map highlights roads with speed limits of 80km per hour or higher where there have been fatal or serious crashes for the five-year period between 2018 and 2023. Kids to hit the books for Premiers' reading challenge

CALLING all Victorian children and young people to explore, learn and enjoy the world through reading, it's time to embark on this year's Premiers' Reading Challenge. The Challenge encourages students between early childhood and Year 10 to read a set number of books during the year, with their efforts recorded online. A book list recommends age-appropriate texts that children might like to try, but any book counts towards their Challenge totals.

This year's 'Explore, Learn, Enjoy' theme captures the excitement and sense of adventure that reading gives us all.

Children who have not yet started school are also encouraged to join the Challenge by reading 40 books with the help of their families – with picture books, short stories, poems or non-fiction books in any language all eligible for the Challenge.

In 2013, the Challenge was expanded to include young children from birth to five, following strong evidence indicating that reading to young children from birth promotes brain development and language learning.

Concern about Loch's Bells Road Bridge

SOUTH Gippsland Shire Council responded to concerns expressed by a local resident about works at the Bells Road Bridge in Loch, saying the bridge has undergone a full

refurbishment involving deck reconstruction, and sandblasting and painting of girders underneath.

Work has occurred as part of council's Bridge Rehabilitation Program, with council noting that bridges are assessed by an independent contractor every two years.

"The works commenced in December and are now complete, pending the installation of guardrail," a council spokesperson said, indicating that final stage is part of a wider guardrail program intended to be undertaken should costs permit.

Should that occur, it would address the resident's concern that there are no side barriers, having noted there is a fair bit of truck traffic on the bridge and you come onto one end of it on an angle.

"If you drive onto it at a fair pace, you think you are going to drive off the edge," the resident said. While pleased with the sandblasting work carried out, he expressed dissatisfaction with the standard of concreting done. Sentinel-Times is awaiting further comment from council after another inspection takes place. The bridge is open for use council confirmed.

Did you witness an assault?

POLICE are appealing for witnesses after two Bass Coast Highway Patrol officers were assaulted in Foster on Thursday, March 21 at 10.30am on Main Street, Foster.

It's understood the police officers were conducting investigations into traffic offences when they intercepted a vehicle.

A 58-year-old male from Port Welshpool has been charged with multiple offences and remanded in custody to appear at Latrobe Magistrates at a later date. A 20-year-old male also from Port Welshpool has been charged with similar offences but bailed to appear at Latrobe Magistrates at a later date. Investigations into the assault on the two police officers is

ongoing and police have requested anyone with mobile phone footage or dash cam footage between 10.30am and 11am on March 21 on Main Street and in the Foster area to please come forwards. MP calls for rebuild funding for Foster PS

THE NATIONALS Member for Gippsland South, Danny O'Brien has called on the State Government to fund a fully rebuilt primary school for Foster. Speaking in Parliament last week, Mr O'Brien highlighted that Foster Primary School's main building was built in 1965 and is certainly showing its age. "The school has asbestos issues throughout and literally has chunks of brickwork falling off its exterior," Mr O'Brien said. "It does not make financial sense for the school to continue to throw money at maintenance for things that clearly need to be replaced. "I have been working with Foster Primary School and its wider community since I was first elected in 2015 to highlight the need for new facilities. It's simply not acceptable that our children and teachers have to put up with these conditions." Mr O'Brien said The Nationals had committed to providing \$3 million to fund the rebuild in 2022, but the Government had failed to match that commitment. "I collected and presented the State Government with over 1000 signatures on a petition backing the project, but despite the enormous community support shown the Government has continuously failed to finish the job. I am now calling on the Government to ensure that the funds are committed in the 2024-2025 State Budget to ensure that this crucial project can be undertaken as a matter of priority."

Coal mine hosts multi-agency training exercise

IT WAS a sight to behold last Tuesday as Wonthaggi SES, Wonthaggi Fire Brigade, Bass Coast Police, Ambulance Victoria paramedics and State Coal Mine Tuesday night volunteers participated in a group training exercise at Wonthaggi's State Coal Mine under the expert guidance of Parks Victoria State Coal Mine staff Holly Gloster, Anthony Jones and Phill Price.

The training exercise is part of the mine's WorkSafe requirements with emergency services having previously gathered over the years to perform various rescue and drill scenarios.

Tuesday's scenario was an opportunity for SES members and paramedics, including a volunteer Ambulance Community Officer, to work closely with Parks Victoria personal to ensure procedures are up to date as they look to commence walk-in, walk-out underground mine tours in the near future.

"(Tuesday) gave all agencies the opportunity to work together with a collaborative approach as a team," Ambulance Victoria acting senior team manager Bass Coast Anthea Chester said noting it was a great exercise to learn from and ensure agencies were prepared for the unfamiliar environment when the mine reopens to tourism.

"It better enables us to be prepared so we can deliver best care for the community and visitors to the area.

"It was a really good night and has allowed us to learn in advance what is possible rather than during a

real-life event. We were really impressed with the equipment SES had and working with them to get the patient, in this case a 75kg dummy, safely up the incline."

The first exercise involved the extraction of patient with an ankle injury, whilst the second was a patient suffering a suspected cardiac arrest.

Local senior sergeant and municipal emergency response coordinator Brent Muir was on hand from Bass Coast police and watched over the scenario, whilst local firefighters were on hand to support and assist where necessary.

State Coal Mine volunteers assisted with mine familiarisation and support.

"The training was successful with excellent collaboration and learnings for all participating agencies," Senior Sergeant Muir stated.

It's not the first-time

multi-agency exercises have occurred at the mine with the local SES and CFA crews undertaking a wide array of training exercises including underground fire scenarios.

"It was a really good opportunity for familiarisation around the mine," Wonthaggi SES unit controller Jarrod Hargreaves explained.

"The multi-agency aspect was great. It was great to have Brent Muir on scene in his role as the new municipal emergency response coordinator; and having AV a part of the multi-agency scenario was a huge opportunity as we find ourselves working more closely with them these days too."

"Our (SES) members were also able to practically apply skills that we don't often see used in our space, particularly around the ropes – it was good skills building.

"It was also a good

opportunity for the incident controllers from each agency to develop a small command team under the control of VicPol and watch how that team worked together to help coordinate the response."

The training scenario was a good opportunity for the State Coal Mine to test their emergency management procedures and is a crucial part of keeping the prospect of underground mine tours open in the future.

For other local agencies, the training scenario provides the opportunity for members to further enhance their skills.

"It's an opportunity for our firefighters and members to work with other agencies," Wonthaggi Fire Brigade second lieutenant Kevin Else explained.

"During this scenario we played a supporting role from above ground, but previously we have run training exercises replicating electrical fire scenarios and extraction of patients."

Parks Victoria have recently announced on their website that they will reopen walk-in, walk-out tours whilst the drift car works are in progress. Walking tours are scheduled to re-commence in mid-2024.

Tours were suspended in 2020 when engineering inspections revealed the rail 'drift car' and the track it runs on, no longer met modern safety standards.

The State Coal Mine restoration project is expected to be completed in late 2024 or early 2025 according to the Parks Victoria website.



Easter Saturday vehicle accident in Wonthaggi

EMERGENCY services attended a collision in Wonthaggi on Saturday March 30, at the intersection of Murray and McKenzie Streets.

It is understood a man was driving out of a car park on Murray Street, where he collided with a utility.

His vehicle then collided with another car and a power pole.

The man was taken to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

The occupants of the other vehicles were not injured.

The exact circumstances of the incident are to be determined, but it is understood the man had a medical episode.

Wonthaggi police issue beach safety reminder

FOLLOWING a tragic summer of drownings in the local area and after a recent chat with surfer Gavin about the rescues he and fellow surfers have carried out at Kilmunda, Wonthaggi police again remind people not to take risks when visiting beaches.

"Remember to download the Beachsafe App, which provides detailed information from beach patrol status and facilities and hazards to weather, swell and tide."

Visitors to Cape Woolamai stranded

VISITORS from the Melbourne area became stranded on the foreshore at Cleeland Bight, near Spew Hill, during the late afternoon on Easter Saturday, with the three adults and two children having gone into scrubland at Cape Woolamai.

Officers from Cowes, San Remo and Wonthaggi Police Stations, along with volunteer surf lifesavers from the Woolamai Beach SLSC and a rescue helicopter from Life Saving Victoria, responded to a report of the stranding.

Police stressed that despite the group reading signs advising people not to enter the area, they did so anyway, becoming marooned by the high tide and unfriendly terrain.

"This necessitated a significant response of emergency services, and thankfully due to the excellent local knowledge of volunteer surf lifesavers and local police, the five people were quickly rescued without injury," police stated.

"This was a good result but is another big reminder for everyone to be aware of water dangers and to be safe at our local beaches."

Overnight rain impacts South Gippsland Shire

MONDAY night's rain led two Leongatha households to call on their local SES unit for help, its members also clearing a large gum tree from the South Gippsland Highway at Meeniyan, while those at Leongatha business Approved by ED spent Tuesday morning dealing with flooding.

The tree call out came about 4.30am, with the SES crew having to tackle the approximately 10 metre gum with chainsaws to clear the road.

Leongatha SES unit controller Matt Saario said about 60mm of rain fell overnight, with more in some areas.

Water came through the roof at both Leongatha properties the SES visited.

Matt said that while there was damage to tiles at the first property, only a bit of water got in, with blocked gutters at the second property resulting in overflow into the house and causing a bit of damage.

Approved by ED owner

Elliot Davies said it is the third or fourth time water has entered the premises through the ceiling but this is the worst instance despite the fact the roof was believed to have been fixed.

He estimated that between half and three quarters of the building was impacted, with water approximately half an inch deep.

Computers at the front of the office and laptops were hit by the deluge, with staff doing

their best to dry the electronic equipment.

There was extensive work required to remove surface water from the floor before efforts to dry it.

While it is made from vinyl, it was uncertain whether water had damaged the glue underneath.

"There'll probably be a bit of mould," Elliot said, noting the ceiling appears to be sagging a little, but he is hopeful it can be dried out effectively.

General Manager of Destination Phillip Island Kim Storey said "this plan identifies the importance of stewardship of this destination, that a vibrant tourism industry supports our region's economic prosperity and contributes to the livability of the region."

The ultimate aim is to create lasting, net-positive impacts and support a thriving tourism sector. It

The story of the Tunnel Rats added to the Vietnam Veterans Museum

TWENTY two years ago, Vietnam Veteran Jim Dowson went to the old veterans museum in San Remo, there he met an old man who planted a seed, and last week that seed bloomed.

The man at the museum asked Jim who he was.

Jim told him.

Three Field Troop, Royal Australian Engineers in Vietnam between 1968 – 67, otherwise known as Tunnel Rats.

"Our job was to go down the holes, with a 9mm pistol and a torch, and that's what they nicknamed us, the tunnel rats," Jim explained.

The man said to Jim, "You had a tough time you boys and you should tell your story."

As Jim walked out the man said, "Don't forget that story."

But, it wasn't until six months ago, when Jim and his mates from 3 Troop visited an unwell comrade in Adelaide, that the words of that old man hit the Veteran.

"You better do something before you're all down," Jim thought, and so he began putting together their story.

A frame encompasses memorabilia from the 3 Troop Tunnel Rats, including their written story with nine signatures from the men, photographs of the veterans taken both in Vietnam and more recently in Australia, a Citation for Gallantry – awarded in 2018 and medals earned.

This unique and valuable piece of history was presented

to the National Vietnam Veterans Museum on Wednesday April 28, and is now available for the public to view.

Mateship forged through adversity, is the title of their story.

It begins:

Young men who met as strangers, the sapper of 3 Troop bonded for life during their 12 month service in Vietnam.

The challenges, sadness, happiness and humour they shared created memories to last a lifetime, leaving an indelible mark on each engineer.

The sappers of 3 Troop are assigned as engineer support to 3rd Battalion (3RAR) joining 1 Field Squadron.


Two sappers attached to each infantry platoon assist with tunnel, bunker and village searches, field defence, the disarming of mines and booby traps, and the use of explosives for demolition and disposing of unexploded ordnances.

Each vet will also add their own photographs and medals to individual frames which will become part of the collection displayed in the museum. It's an important addition

to the museum, because it's from veterans and by veterans and the reason we have the museum here in the first place is to keep a place that is the spiritual home for Vietnam Veterans," said Wendy Anderson, the museum's education and interpretation officer and volunteer collection manager.

"This group is also not largely represented, so it can be added to the collection and Tunnel Rats are of great interest to groups and particularly to school children that come in."

And now twenty two years later their story has finally been told.

Kerryn Ellis delighted to extend her commitment to South Gippsland Shire

RECENTLY reappointed South Gippsland Shire Council CEO Kerryn Ellis is proud of what has been accomplished during her time in the role and has many ambitions for the shire's future, having been contracted for another five years.

Councillors endorsed Kerryn's reappointment during their March council meeting, albeit the ongoing CEO was unable to be present.

"This is terrific news for the organisation and for South Gippsland," mayor Clare Williams said following the meeting.

"We are fortunate to have a CEO of Kerryn's calibre and we have achieved so much under her strong, considered leadership."

The mayor added that the CEO's reappointment provides council and South Gippsland Shire with a solid foundation for the years ahead.

Sentinel-Times chatted to the ongoing CEO about her achievements thus far, and what improvements for the shire she is looking forward to being part of in the future.

While she considers there have been many highlights, Kerryn spoke of three that stand out.

The first of those occurred just after she started the job in March 2020, with the development of council's Community Support Package during COVID.

"We had our Budget almost fully drafted and we actually went back and found \$2 million out of a small council budget to support the community through the pandemic period, which is a project that's now been independently evaluated, and we've had fantastic feedback about it," Kerryn said.

"I was proud of how agile we were as an organisation to get that happening and supporting people as quickly as we did."

The refurbishment of the Leongatha council offices is another of the highlights, with that project nearing completion, Kerryn explaining why action was needed.

"They had not been touched for well over 20 years when I started and they were antiquated, with no environmental

sustainability features; the air conditioning didn't meet occupational health and safety requirements, and the building didn't meet disability access requirements," she said.

Kerryn stressed that while there had been extensive conversation over a number of years about building new council offices in Leongatha, that would have cost at least \$10 million and potentially much more.

The refurbishment cost is in the vicinity of \$4 million.

"At a significantly reduced cost, we were able to provide a contemporary modern workplace for staff and community visitors," Kerryn said, adding that the facility will look fantastic once cladding is complete.

Having commenced her role during the period when administrators had replaced elected councillors, the CEO spoke of the importance of restoring community trust in elected local representatives.

Kerryn has enjoyed watching the current councillor group work closely with the community, observing that the organisation and its councillors are now sector leading.

"We have a low staff turnover rate and have won numerous awards and

accolades and I'm frequently asked to share our success story with other councils," she said.

While delighted with the shire's progress, the CEO sees great potential for South Gippsland over the next few years.

Kerryn expects to see opportunities arise through the establishment of offshore wind energy generation in the area, along with exciting innovations in farming and agribusiness.

She looks forward to continued improvements in local tourism and the resultant economic boost.

The potential creation of a unique cultural tourism offering on Yanakie land near Wilsons Promontory, recently purchased by the Gunaikurnai Land and Waters Aboriginal Corporation, is a likely visitor drawcard Kerryn is excited about.

She also looks forward to seeing the benefits for South Gippsland Shire of Parks Victoria improvements being made to facilities at Wilsons Promontory, including new accommodation and new cultural heritage experiences, that will further boost the visitor experience.

Kerryn noted the Great Southern Rail Trail extension from Welshpool to Hedley

will soon be complete and that improvements will be made along the trail such as the installation of interpretive signage and seating.

She envisages ongoing improvements in the local arts and hospitality scenes.

"It's an exciting time for South Gippsland and I'm really honoured to have the opportunity to continue to work with councillors and the community," the CEO said.

She noted that more frequent and severe weather events present a challenge for council, requiring it to work closely with community and find innovative approaches to improve resilience.

With council elections taking place later this year, Kerryn is ready to welcome the chosen councillor group and help set them up for a successful term.

She also intends to build on relationships established during her time with South Gippsland Shire Council.

Final stage of South Gippsland Shire Council office revamp

FINAL stage works on South Gippsland Shire Council's main office refurbishment in Leongatha are continuing, entailing the replacement of external cladding.

Works include removal of asbestos-containing materials.

With the building dating to the 1970s, its aged and deteriorating exterior needed renewal, a council spokesperson explained.

"The works will help improve the aesthetics and provide a modern update," she said.

Council stated the cost of the external works is just under \$989,000 (excluding GST).

Internal improvements previously took place, including installation of new kitchen facilities and bathrooms, a reconfigured office space, improved accessibility and the introduction of energy efficiency measures such as LED lighting and better insulation.

Plumbing and electrical and security system improvements were also made.

"A refurbishment of the municipal office in Leongatha was required to modernise the office space and to meet accessibility and environmental requirements," the council spokesperson said.

It was explained that reconfiguration of the office space was influenced by the pandemic and the need to accommodate social distancing.

"The works undertaken were modest and were the minimum amount required to make the building functional and compliant," council stated.

The total works will cost approximately \$4 million (excluding GST), including a contract variation of \$117,700 (excluding GST), which was necessitated by the discovery of significant structural issues during the internal phase of the project that required rectification.

The total cost also includes a number of smaller contracts that fall beneath council's procurement threshold and are therefore not publicly disclosed but total over \$1 million over a five-year period, with these contracts relating to works such as interior fit-out and furnishing, elevator refurbishment and accessibility upgrades.

Commitment to children and families

SOUTH Gippsland Shire Council has set a framework to provide guidance as it works with service providers, government agencies and the community to support children and families in reaching their full potential, having formally adopted its Children and Families Plan 2024-2028 at its March public meeting.

The plan was developed through extensive research and engagement with families, children, agencies, council officers and councillors.

Identifying the services delivered in South Gippsland Shire for children and their families and the effectiveness of the support provided was considered in developing the plan.

Consultation included an online community survey, a short hardcopy survey, pop-up engagement activities, online focus groups, and targeted discussions with community and early years agencies, council officers and the project steering committee.

Nearly 700 primary and preschool aged children had their say, speaking about what they love most about their community and what they would like to see improved.

An Annual Action Plan will be developed and implemented to achieve the key themes outlined in the recently adopted document, with annual reporting against the intended projects and initiatives, along with reviewing of the Children and Families Plan every five years.

Among the themes described in the now adopted Children and Families Plan is the aim to provide welcoming and inclusive places and spaces for

all children and families, and accessible and responsive services for them.

The Children and Families Plan calls for spaces and places for children and families to be accessible to those of all abilities and have features that enable children to explore and use their imagination.

Childcare, kindergarten, schools, community centres, libraries, parks and playgrounds are some examples of



places and spaces for children and families.

Services are broken into universal categories such as childcare, kindergarten, maternal and child health, as well as targeted services such as early intervention, disability services, and family relationship programs and family violence services.

Another key theme underpinning the Children and Families Plan is that

all children and families in South Gippsland deserve the opportunity to thrive.

That includes ensuring the most vulnerable children and families receive the additional support they need and that the voices of children and families are heard and considered in planning and service delivery.

The desire to ensure children and families are connected and engaged in their local community, feel safe and have a sense of belonging is identified as crucial.

The value of partnerships and collaboration in strengthening outcomes for children and families is also highlighted.

"By working together, service providers, community organisations and government agencies are able to achieve much more than they can individually," it is stated in the new plan, with that being identified as more important in regional and rural communities where services and infrastructure can be dispersed.

South Gippsland Shire Mayor Clare Williams spoke of the importance of the Children and Families Plan and how it was developed.

"The extensive engagement process with our local children, families and service providers has enabled us to understand what is needed in South Gippsland to allow our youngest residents and their families to thrive."

"Moving forward, the Plan will help drive action for council to provide better services and environments for our valued community members," Cr Williams said.

Poowong School students are passionate about sustainability

POOWONG Consolidated School is taking some great strides in sustainability and students have a few projects underway in an effort to become a five star school under the Sustainability Victoria's ResourceSmart Schools program.

A Green Team has been set up, which encompasses a passionate group of 12 students, and a Garden Club, made up of 30 equally passionate students has been established.

The Green Team meets weekly and is responsible for a range of activities and events that contribute to the sustainability of the school.

Schools are recognised and rewarded through certification of sustainability projects, which are obtained by completing of modules and meeting benchmarks for resource use and are valid for four years.

Schools can progress from one star up to five stars and move towards becoming a Leadership School.

Poowong rejoined the program in 2023 under the guidance of new science teacher Lauren Dobia.

Lauren has an interest in gardening, being outside and in sustainability and found the students were also keenly interested in these things and in going along to the garden club.

With the support of the community and with such passionate students, the program was rolled out.

The school is currently rated as a one-star school and are

currently working on the next modules.

Lots of work is being carried out on the Waste module, with the school starting to compost and installing bins around the school, diverting kilos of food waste from landfill.

The grade fours are also actively working on a landfill experiment looking at how food decomposes as compost and comparing it with the worm farm.

"We have made some massive changes in a short amount of time, that even sometimes I forget, and then I think that's new and that's new. So that's really exciting," said Lauren.

"We're a while off our third star but we have also made some massive, massive changes with our waste module. So that would be our next star."

The Poowong School also has a space called 'The Forest' which

is used for creating a connection with the outdoors but also as a place children can come and build dens.

This has also been integral to the biodiversity module that the school is also working on.

The school has been planting native herbs and potatoes and taking more care of the gardens to build soil health.

"They (the students) really love that they lead it. My green team is so passionate, they just love coming to the meetings every week because they love talking about it. They love it every time they get a job or something that they can run."

The students successfully ran a School Harvest Festival in February where they cooked, sold or transformed fresh produce from the school and the community.

More recently students ran hot lunches, where they picked potatoes from the garden, cooked them and then served them.

"They just get so proud, they are just so proud of themselves," said Lauren.

A new Green Team will be picked in the middle of the year, however, Lauren commented that the current members have enjoyed it so much they don't want to leave, yet new members are already asking when they can begin.

They say that from little things, big things grow. Poowong Consolidated School might be a small school but it's accomplishing great things.

Should dog owners be concerned?

VETERINARY clinics in the Latrobe Valley have been reporting an increase in parvo virus cases over the past few weeks. In fact, the Moe Veterinary Centre has seen over 11 dogs die from the disease, and vets throughout the region are reporting similar numbers. So, is it a risk to dogs in the neighbouring areas of South Gippsland and Bass Coast? Short answer yes.

Parvo virus is highly contagious with symptoms including vomiting, diarrhoea, lethargy, reduced appetite and tummy pain in mainly puppies and adolescent dogs, although it can also affect unvaccinated older dogs. Symptoms progress quickly and even with treatment it can be fatal.

Owner of Moe Veterinary Centre Dr Laura Thorbecke, who previously worked for the Tarwin Veterinary Group, told the Daily Mail it's the worst outbreak she's seen in the region. "I've been a vet in Gippsland for more than 10 years and have seen more cases present in the last month than I've ever seen before in my career."

Dr Thorbecke is urging local pet owners to ensure their furry friends are vaccinated. "The number one thing that owners can do to keep their pets safe is to have them vaccinated. Vaccination is very protective, so making sure puppies receive a full vaccination course and adult dogs are kept up to date with their boosters is vital."

The challenge is that once an environment is contaminated it often persists for a long time, meaning dogs are at risk even if they don't socialise with other dogs or leave their properties.

Active local dog owners' group, Phillip Island Bass Coast Dog Owners Association has highlighted the issue and prompted some feedback:

Talking to many dog owners since hearing about this outbreak some months ago, that don't vaccinate their dogs. They tell me "there are no dog diseases around and it's purely to scare animal owners by vets to make money." Their statements are false and misleading.

"There are a lot of good volunteers in Rotary there, but they do need some help and some young blood coming into it, both male and female, and it would be good to see some other next generation Rotarians," Andrew said.

Mum's call for epilepsy support

HAVING epilepsy is like a "superpower" for young Jack Ashton, and his mum doesn't want him segregated because of it.

As Gippsland Southern Health Service's Director of Nursing at the Leongatha Campus, Kylie Ashton supports many worthwhile causes, but the Make March Purple campaign to shine the light on epilepsy is particularly close to her heart.

Kylie has shared Jack's story to help break down the stigma around epilepsy and in the hope that more funding can be secured for potentially life-saving research.

Kylie hopes Jack's classmates when he goes to school next year will have the opportunity to learn how to recognise and help if he has a seizure, not be shielded from learning about this part of Jack.

Jack was diagnosed with epilepsy when he was just four months old, though Kylie believes he may have had the condition even earlier. "As he got older, it just became clearer," she said.

At the time Kylie worked in a remote Western Australia hospital and faced some early challenges in getting the right support but after consulting a paediatrician a care plan was developed.

"Being diagnosed at such a young age has meant epilepsy has been a large part of the narrative of his little life," Kylie said.

"As Jack has gotten older, he has developed ways to let us know when a seizure is imminent, showing signs that he has some awareness that something isn't right."

Jack's epilepsy requires him to take a medication known commonly as keppra

twice a day, he is also prescribed emergency rescue medication in case of prolonged seizures.

The medication is working well. Jack hasn't had a seizure since December 2022 after experiencing them every six to eight weeks prior to that.

"They were quite severe seizures, Jack would stop breathing, but the medication seems to be holding him quite solidly at the moment," Kylie said.

There are many different types of seizure disorders. Jack is classified as having generalised seizure disorder, he experiences tonic seizures, meaning he doesn't tremor or shake like others but has sudden tension or stiffness, stops breathing and falls to the ground.

It usually takes 1-1.5 minutes for him to start breathing again.

With her full-time work at GSHS, Kylie admits the seizures can be scary for Jack's carers.

"The best piece of advice is



to stay calm," she said.

"Epilepsy and other seizure disorders can be quite scary for both the person having the seizure and those who are there to witness it. The main thing is to call for help, stay with them, clear the area around them, reassure them and place them in the recovery position on their side after the seizure checking that their airways are clear and they're breathing. For Jack, anything greater than three minutes is considered a long seizure and I ask that Jack's carers, family included, call the ambulance at this point."

Despite the lack of seizures over the recent months, Jack remains at risk and his condition and medication are regularly reviewed.

The potential for relapses means Kylie wants Jack's daycare, kindergarten and school friends to be aware of what to do if needed.

"Children having an epileptic fit can be segregated for safety and comfort, but if Jack has a seizure, I don't want him to be segregated

because the kids that see him, if they know how to manage it, are going to be the ones able to save him in the play yard.

"They need to become his heroes if he has a seizure."

Kylie said Make March Purple was important for shining a light on epilepsy and pushing for more research.

"There are a lot of great causes out there and while every cause is important, this one is particularly close to me because it relates to my family," she said.

"It's extremely important that we continue to raise awareness and support research into the development of new and innovative treatments and of cause strive to discover a cure."

"Research has done so much for epilepsy. There are implantable devices, changes in medication and treatment options that weren't available 10 or 20 years ago. Without research, we wouldn't have had those breakthroughs, but it has to keep going."

Jack is meeting all milestones.

"He's not at all compromised," Kylie said.

"Epilepsy is like his superpower. There have been times when Jack has had a seizure, and we have had to consider if it was caused by the activity he was engaged in or if the timing of the seizure was unfortunate such as falling from height off a slide."

"He is the youngest of four and a real go-getter. He's a kid you want to wrap in cotton wool, but he is also the kid won't let you and he loves to push beyond all physical boundaries to take risks. He just goes off like a bull at a gate on the next adventure. He's not at all risk adverse."



"MILLY was having seizures throughout the day and at night, so that's why we had to have the surgery. It was our only option because the medication wasn't working anymore."

In September last year Milly Wagenaar was just four-months-old when she started having seizures at night.

After having an MRI, Milly was diagnosed with epilepsy and a brain lesion which was causing her to have the seizures and part of the epilepsy.

At the worst point, Milly was having up to 70 seizures a day, while in hospital, which were eventually able to be controlled with medication and the family took their baby home.

But then in December, a few days before Christmas, the seizures started again.

Neurologists referred the family to the Royal Children's Hospital, because by then, the only way to control the seizures was through surgery.

Milly's first Christmas was spent in hospital where she underwent another MRI and a PET scan in preparation for the surgery, and then went home to await a date for the operation.

Last week, on Wednesday March 26, and coinciding with Purple Day, which is a day observed to raise awareness and promote understanding of epilepsy, Milly successfully underwent surgery.

"They managed to get a lot of the brain lesion out and remove all that tissue, but the lesion was connected to her right arm and leg movements. We think that she's probably going to have a permanent disability from that because at the moment she's not moving her right arm and leg at all," explained Amy Wagenaar, Milly's Mum.

The ten month old had been awake after the operation, was in a stable

condition and was interacting with her mum.

Milly also got to face time her older brother, five-year-old Rory, who was the only one in the family able to raise a smile out of Milly, to everyone's delight.

It will be a few more days before the swelling on Milly's brain goes down and a full assessment of her condition can be made, and rehabilitation will likely follow.

Amy is full of praise for the

work of the neurology team, including the doctors, nurses and cleaning staff who have been available, helpful and responsive around the clock for Milly and Amy.

"It's a little bit sad because she spent her first Christmas in hospital and now she's spent her first Easter in hospital, but she's in the best place possible," Amy said.

Milly's brother, grandparents, parents and great aunt celebrated Easter and Amy's birthday on Good Friday with cake and a play in the sandpit in the hospital.

Amy said she is grateful for all the support they've received from family, friends and St. Joseph's School in Wonthaggi, where Rory attends, as well as all the money donated to the Good Friday Appeal.

"Until you're in this situation, you don't realise exactly what the appeal means and where that money goes, but the support you get from all the hospital staff is just unbelievable, and you feel like you owe them so much because they just help you, unconditionally," said Amy.

"If we didn't have this hospital and this medical team for Milly, we don't know where we'd be right now. She looks healthy, but she's not well and just to have the support of this place; even if you just give one dollar, it goes a long, long way."

New approach but another good outcome for Tommy

TOMMY Brown's friendly manner and commitment to raising funds for the Royal Children's Hospital again proved a successful combination, with the popular Korumburra local raising \$4000 this year.

Known for raffling off a wheelbarrow of goods for the cause, Tommy took a new approach, running meat raffles in the weeks leading up to Good Friday, followed by an Easter Egg raffle drawn on the day.

"We've done that so we didn't have to keep hitting businesses for donations," Tommy said, explaining the meat trays and easter eggs were purchased, with profits from ticket sales going to the Good Friday Appeal.

Why every dollar counts at budget time

AN interesting post and lively discussion on social media over the weekend about the condition of the bridges on Olsen's Walk and the need for constant work to keep the Korumburra Botanic Park in the state we'd all like to see highlights an important and timely point.

At this time of the year our local councils are applying the finishing touches to their annual budgets, and while they like to highlight the works and services that are included, they don't often produce a list of projects, programs and community requests that can't go ahead for lack of funding.

It's a list we'd like to see.

Certainly, the community of Korumburra would like more funding for the Korumburra Botanic Park, but through the 'Friends' group they've accepted that there's only a certain amount of funding available.

It highlights the fact that every dollar counts where councils are concerned and why areas of waste, and overspending must be ruthlessly stamped out.

At the February meeting of the Bass Coast Shire Council, local resident, Mal Pinkerton, asked a pertinent question about 'Operational Efficiency Improvement Targets' and frankly did not get the proper response from council.

"What are the council's operational efficiency improvements targets for 2024?" he wanted to know. "Please provide a list."

Turns out council doesn't have a target for efficiency. It should. So should South Gippsland Shire.

"Council does not have formal efficiency targets. Council is required to keep growth contained within the rate cap and notes that in recent years the rate cap has been well below CPI, imposing a significant efficiency factor," said Council in response.

It completely misses the point of the question to be talking about the rate cap and limited funding, accept to acknowledge that a level of efficiency is being forced on the council rather than planned for and embraced.

The fact is that priorities change and areas of spending, including but not limited to employee costs, expected to balloon out to \$37 million at Bass Coast next financial year, must be reviewed and justified in minute detail every year... because every dollar counts.

We know this because the annual rounds of community grants at both shires, which closed in the past few days, are always heavily oversubscribed with requests for great community projects, like the bridges on Olsen's Walk.

Our councillors need to make an arform of questioning the funding priorities in their annual budgets, and also probing areas of waste and possible improvement.

And in the case of Bass Coast, they should be demanding detailed performance reports, separately, on both the Wonthaggi Union Community Arts Centre and Berninnett centre, if they are to acknowledge that every dollar counts.

Excessive clearing at Tarwin Lower Cemetery

I HAVE been visiting Tarwin Lower cemetery over decades as it is a "local flora/fauna gem" including a huge diversity of orchids and a precious wildlife corridor.

When I visited on Monday, February 26 I was horrified to find a huge area of the understorey had been totally removed by a bulldozer - similar to the clear-felling practices of Vic Forests until recently.

On further enquiry I understand that this has been implemented by the Cemetery Trust for removal of weedy wattles.

Surely this could be done more sensitively with employment of arborists and selective removal. Future weed management could include the removal of wattles/pittosporum and blackberries at an earlier stage in their growth.

During past visits I have sighted koalas, echidnas, wombats, wallabies, kangaroos, a multitude of reptiles, insects and bees as well as an abundance of birds. I can provide a list.

I enjoy the flora immensely and look forward to seeing the seasonal changes on each visit. As you will be well aware these remnant bush lands provide huge benefits for local farmers. They preserve massive carbon stores.

This brutal removal of entire understo-

rey along with the weedy wattles has destroyed precious habitat, released much carbon into the atmosphere and as I understand from numerous scientific papers - it has rendered this area more susceptible to fire.

While the trust manages this public land well as a cemetery, there is no interest in its unique irreplaceable value from a flora and fauna /wildlife corridor perspective and a less destructive and heavy handed approach to the wattle/weed problem, has not been considered or implemented.

During the season, B grade games are played on both surfaces. Cricketers would jump at the opportunity to play on turf anytime. A semi-final game I watched, was played on a synthetic wicket when a short distance down the road, a turf wicket was available. The weather was perfect all the week. Both teams had a mix of junior player in the teams. It was the perfect opportunity for those juniors to gain experience on

a turf wicket for their development. Especially a final. All other cricket associations in the Gippsland region would not hesitate to play all games on turf. In fact, most of the senior clubs in Gippsland have turf wickets.

Furthermore, Country Week Cricket and inter zone cricket are played on turf. Hence it makes sense that cricket should be played on turf at every given opportunity.

Thank you to our local heroes

REPRESENTATIVES from AusNet, SES, CFA, the State Government and Cr Geoff Ellis and others met with locals at the Community Recovery Meeting at the Grantville Hall on March 22.

They deserved the heroes' welcome and grateful thanks of the community that locals gave the CFA after they saved Grantville and surrounds in the bushfires of January-February 2019. Thankfully, though belatedly, towards the end of the evening, locals did show their unanimous appreciation through sustained applause.

However, for much of the meeting, the emphasis was on sharing problems, grievances and suggested solutions.

Though AusNet and Telstra were widely criticised, most people appreciated what those on the ground did to get things back to normal as soon as possible. Without AusNet and Telstra workers and emergency services doing their best and working long hours in dangerous conditions in a situation on an unprecedented scale, things could have been far worse.

Some people seemed to have unrealistic expectations of emergency workers, such as those in the SES. They seemed to mistakenly think they were Government workers, not volunteers.

It was concerning to learn of a legally blind woman living alone having no power and no way of communicating for the five days her power was off. Another person had serious food poisoning and couldn't get help, and one resident was found dead in their house.

Some residents came up with positive suggestions re: communications, and recommended all residents with special needs should be registered with Council so Red Cross could check on them in future emergencies.

Since the meeting I have heard of one man who rushed to help a neighbour trapped in a car between fallen trees on The Gurdies-Kernot Road. These and other community-spirited people like them, along with our emergency personnel and our community centre personnel who gave great support to locals during the outage, are our local heroes. Thank you.

Insight from Cathy McGowan

CONTINUING the running theme of guest speakers with experience running successful campaigns for independent community representation in Canberra, the Politics in the Pub event hosted by Voices for Monash recently proved to be enlightening and delightful!

Featuring community advocate and former independent MP for Indi, Cathy McGowan AO, as guest speaker sharing stories and details from her two successful campaigns and time in Canberra over the journey to now, where she travels the country connecting with local communities who want better political representation.

A fierce advocate for community representation, the proud 'dairy farmer's daughter' described her journey growing up in the country and how dairy co-ops worked for the farmers and locals rather than concentrating resources and power in Melbourne and Sydney – likening the duopoly in politics between the Lib/Nat coalition and Labor to the supermarket power of Coles and Woolworths.

Community has been

central to her journey across a career in consultancy before politics (where she advocated and organised health service for rural communities struggling to receive care) with those skills transferring to her ability to mobilise a movement for her two successful campaigns and then translating that acumen and organisation to her role as local MP representing the voice of the people in her region.

Host for the evening, Deb Leonard, asked how being an independent is different from being a party member. Cathy explained that as an independent, the community shaped her policies and achievements – from building more mobile phone towers in the many blackspots, to implementing better mental health facilities in rural towns, to improving transport across the electorate. Not constrained by party politics, Cathy, and her successor Helen Haines MP, have been able to focus on issues that are vital to their community.

Cathy advocated for listening to the community via kitchen table

conversations and community engagement, that was the key to building her platform in her first term in Canberra. Voices for Monash are now mirroring this formula for success and are conducting Kitchen Table Conversations and listening events all over the Monash electorate.

Cathy said the community have a vital role to play in achieving better representation; "Only doing the work will community representation come to be" she said.

FORGIVENESS is at the heart of the Christian Faith in which Jesus taught us to call God, Father.

We know God is merciful from the example of Jesus and the parable of the prodigal son. How do we reconcile Jesus' words in Mt: 18:6, "If anyone causes one of these little ones who believe in me to stumble, it would be better for them if a great millstone were hung around their neck and thrown into the sea", with a loving and forgiving God?

The same Jesus who said, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do," also said, "when I am lifted up from the earth (i.e. crucified) I will draw all people to myself".

Forgiveness is meant to convey the love, mercy, and goodness of God. Given that Jesus wants people to have an experience of the love of God, to draw them into his family, those who callously sin by misusing forgiveness and mercy as a means to abuse the vulnerable and therefore tarnish the hard-earned image of God, must be especially displeasing to God.

Immerse yourself in new open water swimming book

MELBOURNE bayside photographer, Fiona Basile, has released her latest book, *Immerse*, a stunning 144-page, hard-covered photographic book celebrating the beauty and joy of an open-water swimming community in Seaford, on the Mornington Peninsula. Though many of the swimmers in the community are local to Seaford, there are a number who come from further afield including Frankston, Mount Eliza, Carrum, and even Doncaster East.

Fiona explains, "When Melbourne was locked down for many months during the 2020/2021 COVID pandemic, locals found solace in the soothing and welcoming waters of the bay, and in the fellowship and friendships that formed during this time. From a handful of people who took up open water swimming during COVID lockdowns, the group has now grown to more than 90 people."

Fiona's own open water swimming journey at Seaford started during the 2021 COVID lockdown. Needing to get out and do something different, she ventured down to Seaford pier at dawn to find a small group of swimmers making their way to the five-knot marker pole off the shore. Given it was winter, and freezing, she thought they were crazy. While standing at the end of the pier, a pod of dolphins swam by the swimmers in close proximity, leaving Fiona and the swimmers feeling

exhilarated.

"Following that amazing experience, I started chatting to the swimmers back on shore and was invited to join them. I went again the next day, and despite the freezing temperatures (it was winter!), I jumped in. And the rest is history!"

As time went by, Fiona started taking photographs while she swam in the water and started learning more about the swimmers' stories. Inspired by the photos and the stories, she embarked on a 'heart project' for 2023, which has been the creation of *Immerse* – a celebration of a special open water swimming community. Amidst the gorgeous seascapes and open water photographs, the book features 35 inspiring

swimmers who share how open water swimming has improved their health and wellbeing, and zest for life, while fostering a deep sense of community, connection, care, and gratitude.

Fiona has gone on to share these stories in a series of author talks around Melbourne and parts of coastal Victoria, including Port Fairy and most recently, Inverloch. Twenty locals attended the talk last Monday, March 25, hosted by Jess Martin and the team at Inverloch community library. There, Fiona was able to connect with locals, including many members of the Inverloch Icebergs, who engaged in a lively discussion during the QnA session. Many of the Inverloch Icebergs shared of their own stories of community

and connection through open water swimming.

"The Inverloch community were so warm and welcoming and had many of their own beautiful stories to share of open water dipping and how it's been a gift in their lives," said Fiona.

"There is such a strong community bond among the dippers, and I loved connecting with them, and creating some new friendships, too!"

"It was also really special to join the Inverloch Icebergs the following Tuesday morning for an early morning moon-lip dip in the inlet, with a highlight being when the group broke out into a beautiful harmony of song. It really is unique and special being immersed in the open waters, experiencing the beauty of nature, with like-minded people. And no, I don't think about what else is in the water!"

Fiona hopes the reader of *Immerse* will be inspired to take up her invitation: 'Dive in, immerse yourself in the inky, deep waters and enjoy all that it brings. You never regret a swim, or dip!'

Immerse is a book that has captured the hearts of many and is perfect for anyone who loves swimming, the beauty of nature, and the ocean, and for anyone who values fostering and building community, connection and care (for self, others and the natural world). Searching for dinosaur eggs, not Easter eggs

THE SUN was shining and there wasn't a whisper of a breeze as children and adults searched The Caves beach along the Inverloch coastline for evidence of dinosaurs.

Guiding them on their search was Palaeontologist Mike Cleland, who works for Bunurong Coast Education and regularly takes groups to show them the wonders of the natural world.

Last Friday the Dinosaur Discovery group were on the hunt for eggs, not the chocolate kind, the elusive dinosaur kind.

Australia is the only continent on which dinosaur eggs have not yet been found, Mike informs the group.

So, they search.

The dinosaur discoverers bring Mike their finds – sandstone, mudstone and conglomerate rocks are among dolerite lava, and some have petrified wood, coal and twigs in them.

Max Webster from Langwarrin finds a rock with dinosaur food in it. Dinosaurs ate conifers and part of one has been fossilised.

Mike commented that people enjoy the Dinosaur Discovery because it has the allure of finding something significant.

The last significant discovery from The Caves site

was a dinosaur tooth with a serrated edge indicating it was carnivorous, and it was found by a year ten school student.

But unfortunately, no dinosaur eggs were found on the day.

Mike shows the group ripple marks in rock sediment which are often found with dinosaur footprints in them.

After leaving the beach the group heads to Wallace Park and are given rocks from Mt Gambier to break up and the group begins chipping away with their hammers.

Excited children showed their finds to Mike, with small fossils protruding from the rocks.

Sea urchin spines and shell fragments were found, with these special pieces able to be kept and taken home by the dinosaur discoverers.

Over the school holidays there are many great activities held by Bunurong Coast Education including, Rockpool Rambles, Wildlife at Night, Estuarine Ecology, Native Plants and Animals, Making Art from Nature and much more.

Inside the Chapel, patrons can read about the history of Poowong and delight in old photographs, relics and items that have lasted throughout time in the Historical Society's display.

Or people can simply enjoy the charming atmosphere of the church itself, the oldest public building in the shire and built from the gum trees that grew in the area; and that is still lined with the original pews and stained glass windows.

and household bills.

In Copelands Road, Warragul you can walk around Wrens Wood, a five-acre garden with oaks, gums, maples, conifers, roses, buddlejas, rhododendrons, camellias, fruit and nut trees, a vegetable and berry garden, a forest of vines and ferns, and orchids. Flower and plant stalls, a coffee van and pizza van will round out the offerings at Wrens Wood with proceeds going to Abbey Gardens Lifestyle programs.

Tucked away at the end of a long driveway is Jenny's Garden, 35-year-old garden of mixed flowering plants and exotic trees that runs into a sloping acre of mainly native trees creating a small forest for wildlife.

Close by is Stonehaven, an ornamental garden with stone features, beautiful maples, natives, bulbs and roses.

Next door is Kirkdale, a beautiful garden of five acres with 100-year-old trees, large lawn areas and lake built in the 1990s filled with Japanese maples, many oak trees, conifers and natives.

At Trafalgar South is Bellissimi Alberi a delightful garden that will bring all your senses alive. Forest pansies, birches, magnolias and more. Pathways lead to lush flower beds that daffodils, iris, azaleas and roses share. Some plants for sale.

Two inspirational South Gipps gardens opening for one day

GARDEN lovers are in for a Saturday treat with the chance to visit two delightful private gardens opening in Inverloch, with Open Gardens Victoria on Saturday, April 6. The gardens are each owned by mother and daughter Judy Morcom and Sue Jarvis.

Set just off the Bass Highway as you enter Inverloch from the Wonthaggi end, Judy's Garden is an inspiring owner-designed garden set on one acre. When Judy and Allan Morcom purchased the property 16 years ago, it was little more than a farm paddock with a stand of mature trees at the rear of the property and the headwater of Ayr Creek running at the front in an open drain.

"Originally we planted lawn at the front, but our land is very flat and Inverloch's wet winters made for very soggy lawns," says Judy.

"Now raised gardens occupy this space, with a dry riverbed to drain the area."

The garden is planted with about 80 per cent native plants, selected for the contrasting colour of the foliage, and includes an array of banksias, kangaroo paws, a grass tree, acacias, leptospermums, leucadendrons, and proteas.

These plants provide a haven for many native birds, including honeyeaters, wrens, parrots, and the bossy wattle birds. Close to the house, a fishpond is surrounded by a lush fernery.

The productive vegetable garden supplies Judy and Allan with all the veggies they need in spring and summer, and during the winter, snow

peas, onions, garlic, and broccoli keep them going.

Judy enriches her soil with wonderful compost made on the property using horse manure, garden waste, and autumn leaves.

Located just a six-minute drive away at the other end of Inverloch, Sue Jarvis' one-acre garden was just a vacant block 3.5 years ago. The garden is a mix of mostly native plants, with some foliage plants dotted throughout to provide colour and texture.

"I first started planting the sides of the block to create a windbreak and screening from the road," says Sue.

"Then slowly we've formed the gardens one-by-one, using topsoil in some areas to build up and assist with drainage."

Sue is a bird lover, and this young garden has a strong focus on planting native flowering plants for nectar-feeding birds and bushy shrubs for sheltering visiting blue wren families. King parrots have also started frequenting the garden.

A lovely, raised vegetable garden provides fresh veggies all year round, with three round Corten steel herb gardens placed close to the house for easy access. Towards the rear, an apple, apricot, avocado, lemon, mandarin, and orange tree have been planted, along with a kiwi fruit vine tumbling over a handmade support built by Sue. This area has recently been added to with additional raised vegetable garden areas for zucchinis, cucumbers, and pumpkins.

At the rear of the property, Sue and her husband Lochie have transformed an old cubby house into a wonderful chook house and run.

Nesting boxes for wildlife

IT CAN take many decades for a hollow to form in a tree, and hollows provide important havens for native wildlife to shelter, survive and breed.

Landcare members are involved in planting thousands of trees each year, the problem with this is, according to Loch-Nyora Landcare President Malcolm Brown, those volunteers will be dead by the time the hollows form.

"We need to make as many hollows as we can because that's habitat for wildlife. So you can do that to a point, by using nesting boxes," explained Malcolm.

Different species of wildlife often choose a hollow for specific reasons, so nesting boxes come in a variety of shapes and sizes with holes of various diameters to cater to different animals.

One with a tiny hole could cater to a sugar glider, whereas one with a big hole would be good for a brushtail possum and bats will crawl into a box with only has a slit for an opening, and they'll hang upside down and sleep there during the day and then come out at night. Malcolm has organised an information session on nesting boxes as he believes the responsibility has largely fallen to volunteers.

"We can't rely on governments to protect our native wildlife. It's just not going to happen. It's not going to happen in our national parks or through government campaigns and all of those kinds of things," said Malcolm.

"Government depends more and more on giving volunteers grants so that the volunteer goes out and does the work for the government."

In an upcoming presentation at the Loch Hall, Wildlife Victoria will speak about nesting boxes, including what they are, where they can be put, how to install them and where to get them.

As well as educating locals on nesting boxes, Wildlife Victoria have templates available for people to build the boxes themselves.

Malcolm is hoping that the local Men's Shed will agree to make the nesting boxes, if people are willing to pay for the timber.

"Then the nesting boxes can go off to people who can make homes for wildlife," said Malcolm. Nesting Boxes for Wildlife will be a free event held at the Loch Hall on Sunday April 7 at 11am.

Natasha's seed bombs win Sustainable Product of the Year

WONTHAGGI business Native Seed Box has won the Melbourne International Flower and Garden Shows Sustainable Product of the Year 2024.

Natasha Ballard is the founder and owner of Native Seed Box which has been creating seed bombs for the past five years and have been in business since 2021.

The bombs are rolled in the Wonthaggi workshop and are stocked in over 50 stores and posted to customers all over the country.

Seed bombs are clay, soil and seed rolled into a ball that can literally be thrown and grown and are good for urban gardens, hard to reach or wet places or areas where there's slippage.

The micro business was nominated by one of their small stockists and Natasha was both thrilled and shocked to receive the award following the judges unanimous decision.

"I was just really surprised they chose our small product," said Natasha, whose product was up against those from well-seasoned and much bigger companies.

120,000 people attend the prestigious International Flower and Garden Show over the four days and this year's theme was sustainable gardens.

"Everything that we do is 100 per cent sustainable, to the point of, we have solar panels when we run our machine and all our product is home compostable, so you can chuck the whole thing in your compost and it will break down. There's no plastic in any of our products, packaging or postage," explained Natasha.

The business has also recently acquired a seed bomb rolling machine, which is a well-protected, secretive invention and

one of only about 12 known machines across the world.

It can produce thousands of balls compared to hand rolling and this means scalability and growth for the business.

"That has been exciting for us because it's going to allow us to move into and explore the possibility of which is really where my heart and passion lies, and that is revegetation and rewilding projects."

"We can actually make a difference, but we're still making a difference in urban gardens. We want people to celebrate natives."

Natasha is also holding seed rolling workshops at schools.

"Educating and spreading the message is an important part of I think it's like a more of a holistic approach to encouraging people to celebrate natives, plant lots of plants, plant lots of flowers for wildlife, for pollinators. It's got to move things in the right direction."

The award is an indication to Natasha that people, communities and industries are starting to turn towards sustainable products, and it's a boon not only for her micro business but for the Australian environment.

"I think it's a win for pollinators. It's a win for native gardens and sustainability and wildlife," said Natasha.

The cheese features a brief description of the centre and a direct link to the Farmer Health website.

NCFH Director Dr Alison Kennedy said that while the centre had previously worked with corporate partners to deliver farmer health checks, this was a new and exciting style of partnership.

"The fundraising is fantastic, but the branding and expansion of our reach will have a

tremendous impact on our service," she said.

"While we greatly value the funds raised to grow our work to support the health, wellbeing and safety of farmers, we are particularly excited about the opportunity to promote our services and resources to a much broader audience across Australia."

Dr Kennedy said there was no set fundraising goal, but NCFH hoped the relationship with Udder Delights would grow over time.

"These corporate partnerships allow us to reach a larger audience of farmers across Australia and help fund the research, development, delivery and evaluation of our programs nationally," she said.

"We continue to see higher rates of suicide in farming communities and high levels of farm injuries and fatalities on farm so our work to prevent these risks is essential."

One of Udder Delights' farmer suppliers, Rick Gladigau, said farming could be isolat-

ing, which could lead to mental health issues. "It's great to hear that there are organisations out there helping farmers out across Australia. The NCFH need all the help and funding to be able to help the backbone of Australia's fresh food supply."

Handle with care: bobby calf transport requirements

AGRICULTURE Victoria is keen to remind producers of their responsibilities when transporting bobby calves.

Agriculture Victoria conducts regular audits of bobby calves at saleyards, calf scales and abattoirs.

Agriculture Victoria Livestock Welfare Compliance Program Manager Veronica Campbell said Agriculture Victoria Authorised Officers still find unfit calves being supplied for transport and sale, and calf trailers that are over-crowded or don't meet the prescribed requirements.

The requirements for transporting bobby calves are detailed within the Australian Animal Welfare Standards and Guidelines – Land Transport of Livestock. These standards are

mandatory in Victoria under the Livestock Management Act 2010.

Ms Campbell said everyone along the supply chain is responsible for bobby calves, including sellers, buyers, transporters, scale operators, livestock agents and saleyard and abattoir staff.

Bobby calves that are fit for their intended journey must be healthy and alert. They should weigh at least 23 kilograms, be strong, able to bear weight on all four limbs and able to rise from a lying position. Their hooves should be firm, and their navels dry, wrinkled, withered, and shrivelled.

"If a calf isn't fit to load, appropriate arrangements must be made for its care or treatment. If in doubt, leave it out."

"Bobby calves must be assembled and transported to ensure delivery in less than 18 hours from last feed with no more than 12 hours spent on transport, unless moving between rearing facilities where the journey must be less than six hours."

Calves must be fed, within six hours of loading. Anyone in charge of bobby calves must have a record system that identifies when the calves were last fed prior to transport.

Ms Campbell said calves must be adequately protected from the weather during transport and be kept clean and dry. In practice this means the trailer or crate should have an enclosed front for protection and appropriate bedding or material on the floor of the trailer to reduce the risks of slipping.

"All bobby calves must have sufficient space in the livestock crate to be able to lie down on their sternums during transportation. It should also be remembered, it is an offence in Victoria to use an electric prod on calves, regardless of whether or not the electric prod is working. Anyone who uses or places an electric prod on a bobby calf can be prosecuted."

Introducing methane reducing technology into the paddock

NEW research is investigating the potential of a lick-block formula that could help reduce methane emissions from livestock.

This research is part of a collaboration between Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA), the University of Sydney and commercial company, Agcotech. The research will provide valuable information for the potential for delivering methane-reducing feed additives to Australian livestock in a wide range of grazing applications.

Prof Luciano Gonzalez at The University of Sydney is part of the research team and he said lick blocks were one potential delivery solution for feed additives, extending the reach of additives from controlled feeding environments such as feedlots to extensive grazing environments such as pasture.

He said early results from a pen trial with young steers saw an average 12 per cent direct abatement of methane, while also allowing bodyweight to increase at 0.78 kg/hd/day on oaten hay.

"We are trying to replicate dry feed conditions with our grazing cattle, as that is where there is significant potential to reduce overall methane emissions for our industry," Prof Gonzalez said.

"We have started on low dose of active ingredients to ensure best animal welfare, with no set back of cattle at this stage of trials.

"Farmers are unlikely to use technology unless it is production focused as a priority. The research goal is to turn that methane into body weight, rather than allow that energy to go to waste."

Charles (Chick) Olsson,

Chair of Agcotech, said he saw an opportunity for Australian red meat to demonstrate its environmental credentials.

"It is a path our industry has started on, an aspirational goal that has got the whole Australian science community involved with beef and lamb improvements via reductions in methane," Mr Olsson said.

"We plan to slowly introduce new technology that is safe, cost-effective, and mitigates methane emissions for all ruminants. We are currently developing molasses blocks, feed pellets and liquid feed as carriers for our natural range of plant extracts."

CN30 Project Manager, Julia Waite, said in the future, graziers looking to include a supplement with methane reduction benefits should be able to choose from multiple options – both in terms of the active

ingredient and the method of delivery.

"Grazing properties vary in their management regimes and risk appetite – which impacts the kinds of technologies that would be suitable," Ms Waite said.

In addition to productivity and safety trials, MLA is exploring how these additives can reach livestock in extensive systems.

"Across the portfolio we have active trials looking at dosing through the water supply, lick-block through to a more out-there biodegradable bolus," Ms Waite said.

"The advantage of lick-blocks as a delivery mechanism is that the technology is familiar to producers, so there's one less unknown when considering adoption and for many, it may fit in with their existing supplementation regime."

Green waste recovery to benefit Mirboo North

THE STATE Government is helping to fast-track the clean-up of storm debris in Mirboo North and ensure the benefits of any valuable green waste that's recovered are passed on to the local community.

Emergency services have been on the ground since the storms on Tuesday February 13, removing fallen and hazardous trees, opening roads and supporting the restoration of critical infrastructure.

Now, the huge volumes of debris collected and stored is reaching capacity and action is needed to process it.

Minister for the Environment Steve Dimopoulos announced this week extra facilities will be established to process storm debris and that all proceeds from the sale of any by-products will be invested back into the community.

Emergency Recovery Victoria will establish up to eight new facilities across South Gippsland in partnership with local Councils.

These facilities are expected to process more than 300 tonnes of sawlog, 3000 tonnes of firewood and fine green waste that can make 4000 cubic metres

of mulch.

This work will be coordinated by the Clean-up Recovery Taskforce and ensure nothing goes to waste, with green waste reused and turned into products like firewood and mulch. Any profits generated from the sale of these products will be reinvested in the community through the Mirboo North and District Community Foundation.

The Mirboo North and District Community Foundation is a community run organisation that provides funding for local initiatives and not-for-profit organisations as well as making funds available for community members in need.

DEECA is working with mills and forest contractors to ensure that high value timber and other green waste can be processed locally.

Storm impacted locals can still dispose of their green waste without charge, courtesy of gate fee rebates and the waiving of waste levy fees at local processing sites.

"(The site) was listed on Domain for sale," Julian exclaimed.

"It was like a revelation to find it because we really were starting to get a bit desperate for where we were going to make the show and suddenly this popped up."

"We thought wow, this is perfect. It's an amazing TV set – probably the best location we've ever had, but equally the end product will be one of the best we've ever produced, and I think these houses will be so aspirational for Aussie families looking for a holiday home. I think it will attract a lot of people who see the show to come down here and have a look."

"Our show is not only going to be watched by Australian families, but it will also be broadcast in 170 territories around the world and translated into many different languages – I think that will be a real boom for tourism as well."

"I was at the penguins last night and it's such a multicultural experience. There are so many different people who come here, and I think *The Block* can do a lot for Phillip Island's tourism in the future as it rolls out over the next two to three years around the world."

So, if the Grand Prix Circuit and Live Penguin TV during COVID hasn't put Phillip Island on the radar then chances are *The Block* will.

As for how filming is going – "The first month of filming –

it's been perfect. A great way to get into island life," Julian said.

To stay ahead of the contestants, the framing and roofing is now complete. A huge accomplishment in one week when for one house, half was still non-existent.

Fan favourite from 2022 Tom Calleja can also be spotted amongst the mix on site, continuing with the show as a plumber after wrapping his own season.

"It's always good to be back," Tom smiled.

"I love the community vibe on *The Block* – it's totally different to last year, and our season. It gets easier and easier for these contestants," he added laughing.

"I haven't been a part of a coastal block, so it will be interesting to see what the contestants bring this year compared to a city or country one. So far, all the bathrooms are pretty different than usual on *The Block*..."

"The island is really growing on me. I was a bit closed minded at the start, but the longer I stay the more I like it, everyone is lovely. The locals seem pretty welcoming of it all."

As for how being in front of the camera to the side feels.

"It's different. There are no stress levels – I'm not working to the same harsh deadlines, I'm not sleep deprived, I go home to a nice bed each night. But it's still really fun. Being on the other side is awesome, my relationships keep growing with everyone behind the scenes."

"It's a fun workspace and a good environment," Tom added.

"To be honest, understanding that none of it is scripted. It's pretty raw, it's just organised chaos that works."

After a sneak peek inside the first completed room, all this writer will tease is that I'll definitely be tuning in for some inspiring ideas to refresh my own home, particularly when the businesses are on our own doorstop... Hello Tyde..."

Local scaffolders, water

proofers and a multitude of trades have been employed whether sub-contracted or employed through Aidan O'Shannessy of Nine In Six, *The Block*'s official builder.

"We've got between 80-150 tradies on site a day, depending on what we are doing," Aidan explained.

"We've got quite a few local trades. A few of the contestants have local chippies, local plasterers, local scaffolders.

"We've employed five to six local people for administrative roles through to labouring.

"It's all going to plan, it's a hell of a lot to do in a small period of time. The setting helps, it's been lovely weather, everybody's in good spirits... It feels like one of the calmer vibes of the show we've had for a while."

But it's not just the businesses, trades and hospitality venues reaping the rewards of the influx of temporarily permanent individuals, those with short term accommodation are also winning, with Nine In Six alone renting 13 to 14 houses around the island.

And as for two of the most important people on the show...

"We are loving island life," Scott Cam beamed.

"And the people of Phillip Island, Millowl as we know from yesterday, are so friendly and nice, everywhere we go people say g'day, hello – it's like I'm on *The Truman Show*."

"I'm loving it!" Shelley Craft added – a huge smile from ear to ear.

"We got the VIP treatment at the penguins last night and it makes us feel like we've had the Phillip Island experience now, all we need to do is get to the racetrack, do a few of the vineyards..."

"We've been to a beautiful French restaurant – Richard and Ash, they're fantastic. We've making ourselves very much at home."

For Shelley the drive to and from the Island allows her to decompress and ensure a smooth day ahead.

"By the time I get to work I'm

in a joyous mood, ready for a good day, and I think that really reflects in the contestants. The fact we've got this much space to work with – everyone's got their own areas, no one's on top of each other, and there's the island time. The minute they drive out the gate they're not in the hustle and bustle of the city – I think that is keeping everyone a bit calmer this season."

From scones with jam and cream delivered to Scott from his neighbours Fay and Frank to Shelley enjoying a coffee with the owner of the b' n b' she's staying in, locals are making everyone feel at home.

"We're a very close-knit family (the crew), we've worked together for many years, so we're working but it's almost like we're on holidays."

As for how the crew are embracing life outside the Cove.

"I'm really looking forward to taking my kids to (the penguins) – and having them down here. It's such a wonderful experience and to see the facilities, they're breathtaking. It's one of the best run tourist attractions I've ever seen. Amaze n' Things is definitely on the list for the holidays," Julian added.



Why it's taking time to fix Olsen's Walk

THE state of the bridges on Olsen's Walk at the Korumburra Botanic Park has again been highlighted on social media over the weekend with members of Friends of Korumburra Botanic Park turning the discussion into a call for volunteers to help with maintenance on the park and the walk.

The park has long been established as a project on which the Korumburra community, through the 'Friends', is working closely with council to maintain but more help is needed.

Here's the flavour of the Facebook post:

"I am both sad and angry about how the Council is mismanaging the Korumburra Botanic Park and Olsen's Walk, which I have been informed is actually part of the Park.

"Just as many others believe, I think it is a wonderful asset belonging to the town, beautiful with an amazing ambience. But it has now been 2½ years since the council blocked off Olsen's Walk posting signs which state the walk is temporarily closed. It is becoming apparent the council has reduced the funding allocated to the Botanic Park.

"The mowing of the lawned area now waits until it is knee high. As a result, after the mowing there are large clumps of mowed grass that kill the grass underneath. The dead grass has progressively been replaced by weeds. Today it is covered in weeds.

"Olsen's Walk has been left to become totally overgrown, except for one small loop of the track in front of the picnic area. I used to run into visitors frequently who always had so much praise for the whole Botanic Park. Now, there are no tracks to wander along and long itchy weeds to spread a picnic blanket on."

Korumburra Community Noticeboard administrator Shirley Arechia turned the conversation into a positive.

"Friends of Korumburra Botanic Park are doing an amazing job working with the South Gippsland Shire Council. They volunteer their time and would love the support from other volunteers. Olsen's Walk wasn't a Shire project, it was created by a volunteer who had a vision, who never came to Facebook to brag or complain."

Friends of Korumburra Botanic Park hold regular working bees and events at the 12-acre space it manages with the South Gippsland Shire Council. Follow their Facebook page or make contact with one of the members of the group and make a commitment to helping out.

Remembering Woodleigh Kernot Cricket Club

IT'S been fifty years since Woodleigh Kernot won the first of four cricket premierships.

The Woodleigh Kernot team from 50 years ago were recently asked to remember the '74 grand final – remember their roots in a rural community, and where life has taken them over the 50 years since.

The stories were circulated online to players and supporters.

The Woodleigh Kernot Cricket Club (WKCC) virtual reunion started at Christmas and finished last week.

Nearly all players or player's families responded.

Some players are no longer with us, Graeme Otto is in Perth, Max Crawford is 92 with memories of his century at the showgrounds and an umpire revealed a long-held confession.

The reunion became as much a reflection of social history as cricket history.

All of our cricketers came from farming stock, all could reach out and touch the Woodleigh to Kernot Road.

Team bonding was not necessary.

This is a summary of the stories that piqued the interest of Woodleigh and Kernot families past and present over the past 10 weeks.

The first new photo to surface at the virtual reunion was from Keith Hall's daughter Bev.

A great picture of Keith Hall and Max Crawford at the Ranceby presentation night admiring the Ranceby shield and the '74 Premiership certificate.

We think this grand final was Keith's last game before his enthusiasm for life shifted to lawn bowls and numerous aviation adventures.

We were given access to Evan Jones' eulogy.

It captured every aspect of

Woodleigh life fifty years ago.

Keith Challis was not in the team but very much a part of Woodleigh cricket.

"Played cricket to make up the numbers," he said, now living in Main Street, Nyora.

He watches every game of Nyora cricket and football.

Tony Ware remembers losing blood at the crease thanks to a Peter Vick bouncer.

Brother Charlie remembers Tony taking a crucial catch "out in the deep" in that grand final.

Tony remembered playing for Ranceby Association in the Westernport Sunday competition in '74. Ranceby won it in that year.

Rhonda Day told us that husband Tony very much enjoyed the company of his cricketing teammates.

At Kongwak, he played with Russell Hayes and when they both ended up with dairy farms at Woodleigh and Loch respectively, they reunited in their cricketing whites at Woodleigh Kernot.

Tony led us to a Premiership in '76. Russell was perhaps the best bowler going around at the time.

Both played in all four WK premierships in the seventies and a fifth if you count Leongatha's Lightning Premiership.

The Leongatha Lightning Premiership – an innings consisted of eight six ball overs – was three preliminary matches, a semi final, and a grand final all on the one day.

The annual event attracted more than 20 teams, some from Melbourne.

Russell went on to bigger cricketing things at Lang Lang Cricket Club and now lives near Portland.

Charlie and Tony Ware,

Graeme Otto and Garry Knox were the four teenagers in the team.

Our Captain was Cam Crawford. His enthusiasm back in '74, along with "the four kids," the newly recruited Russell Hayes and Tony Day and the dairy farmers of the day created a winning combination.

One of those dairy farmers was Barry Johns. He and his wife Ruth came to Kernot to milk cows for Bruce Campbell.

Both are life members at both clubs.

They celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary last year.

Bill Brook gave us the lighter side of Woodleigh Kernot cricket.

He mentioned his regular pre-game whiskey with good mate Evan, swapping a tethered black goat for a white goat in the middle of the night, our visitation to Coal Creek to examine the Woodleigh Railway station, the fundraising strippers in the Jeetho Hall was well organised by Wilbur Collis and raised enough money for a new pitch at Nyora, how the Ashes were created inside and then outside the Loch pub, and the ritualistic fence painting in Loch's main street after a winning grand final.

He even named the alleged culprits.

Bill Brook maintains an extensive collection of clippings from his time playing football at Loch and cricket for WK.

We inserted a few of his favourite clippings in the virtual reunion.

Robert Hughes gave us a piece extolling the virtues and the forward thinking of Ranceby cricket.

Rule changes added another 10 years to the life of Ranceby Cricket, but not sufficient to stave off its

demise.

He mentioned the smell of Pennyroyal at the Loch oval, and the pre season job of linseed oil on treasured cricket bats.

"Better to celebrate that we were lucky enough to share the Ranceby experience, rather than mourn its demise," Robert said.

We acknowledged our opposition in that '74 Grand Final.

Poowong's Alex Miller gave us a hint of where his players are now.

Chris Gasgoyne, Graham Edwards, Ken and Bruce Salmon, Tony and Alex Miller, Geoff Ferguson, Peter and Michael Vick, David Ryan, Alan Trigg all played for Poowong. The scores Woodleigh Kernot 181 and 92 defeated Poowong 81 and 105.

The '74 Grand final was played at Hallora.

One of the umpires divulged via the virtual reunion that his well-kept secret for 50 years involved him at the bowlers end at what turned out to be the last over of the grand final.

So intent was he, so engrossed, he very nearly let out an appeal for LBW when a Russell Hayes delivery hit the Poowong batsmen on the pads.

He strangled his appeal and duly gave the batsman out.

WK began its celebrations. He went on to umpire many subsequent Ranceby grand finals.

Charlie Ware had one of the biggest stories to tell but in true Charlie style he ordered that "this better be brief."

Charlie has the rare honour of once taking all 10 wickets in an innings.

New grant to boost sustainability in commercial fishing

Startups and small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) are eligible to apply for a competitive grant of up to \$100,000 and projects that demonstrate feasibility may further apply for a grant of up to \$1 million to develop a proof of concept.

The initiative, known as the Business Research and Innovation Initiative (BRII), will foster innovative solutions to enhance the energy efficiency of Australia's commercial fishing sector. This will be achieved through the adoption of renewable energy sources and low-emission technologies, which have the potential to revolutionise Australia's fishing fleets and related services.

By adopting energy-efficient technologies, the fishing sector can reduce carbon emissions, benefit from cost savings and position itself to capitalise on the growing market for sustainably sourced seafood.

FRDC Managing Director, Dr Patrick Hone, believes there's a growing market for sustainably sourced seafood and the BRII will help deliver better outcomes for all.

"The cost of doing business is increasing. Innovations to help reduce our carbon emissions, reduce costs and improve our energy and production efficiency will benefit the environment and make Australia's seafood sector world-leading economically," Dr Hone said.

Successful applicants will receive funding from DISR and be connected to industry experts and stakeholders by FRDC, to accelerate the implementation of their solutions.

AFL eyes on Wonthaggi's Jack Hutchinson

TURNS out Wonthaggi Power might not see too much of Jack Hutchinson coming back from Collingwood's VFL side if the raps on his potential follow their present trajectory.

According to AFL Media's Cal Twomey "VFL forward Jack Hutchinson has emerged as an early candidate for the mid-season rookie draft".

In his first two games this season, Hutchinson has kicked three goals, one against Sandringham and two against Brisbane while his former Power teammate Ryan Sparkes has been equally impressive with a blistering 22 disposals first up, 10 kicks and 12 handballs, followed by 18 possessions against Brisbane in a narrow loss.

But it seems to be Hutchinson who has captured the interest of recruiters at this early stage, ahead of the midseason draft at the end of May.

Here's what Twomey had to say on the AFL's news site:

"Hutchinson, a powerful medium forward who attacks the ball and launches at marks, made his debut for the Magpies' VFL side last week. He had previously caught the eye of scouts in the practice matches and kicked a goal from nine disposals against Sandringham in round one.

"The 22-year-old will need to play three state league games to be eligible for the mid-season rookie draft under the AFL rule introduced last year, having played for Wonthaggi last season in the Gippsland League.

"His coach at Wonthaggi was former Magpie Jarryd Blair, who was in attendance at RSEA Park last week for the VFL clash.

"Clubs are watching Hutchinson closely given his exciting traits in the air and presence inside 50 and he is shaping as a clear option for the mid-season draft, which has spawned mature-age success stories such as Jai Newcombe, John Noble and Sam Durham in recent seasons."

In theory, both Sparkes and Hutchinson could line up for the Power in their first-round clash against Warragul at Western Park this Saturday, April 6 before turning out next for Collingwood against Carlton at Ikon Park on Sunday, April 14 at 2.05pm which could be the ideal time for local footy followers to get down and see the local duo play in the black and white.
