HUNDREDS of millions of dollars in developer profits are at stake, but just as importantly, so is the future of housing in the Bass Coast Shire; including conventional blocks at Wonthaggi, lifestyle land along the coast and rural living zones, not to mention the protection of our distinctive coastal and rural landscapes.

Regrettably, we're told, that doesn't include the Western Port Woodlands, where existing sand extraction licences can't be challenged.

It's all happening in front of the Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) Standing Advisory Committee, appointed by the previous Victorian Minister for Planning Lizzie Blandthorn MP.

And a steady stream of sharply-dressed lawyers representing the developers, the shire and the government, as well as some well-seasoned technical experts, have been paraded before the planning panel at public hearings in the past few weeks.

Exactly where should they draw the line

on the outer limit of housing development east of San Remo? And should that boundary simply adopt an arbitrary fence line or move up and down with the contours of the main ridge in an effort to do what the whole process is supposed to do – protect significant landscapes from an explosion of boxes?

David Crowder, a Director of Ratio Consultants, a person with 25 years' experience in town planning, recommends the latter, with appropriate protection for the proposed extension of the George Bass Walk so that it features views of the coast and hinterland, not houses on a hill, in the hopes we might develop something like the 'Great South West Walk' in the west of the state.

A Freycinet Lodge type development might be allowable, on the edge of San Remo, however, making best use of that spectacular location.

But there's no need for an overkill in planning controls either, he says.

"There are enough safeguards in a (standard) 'settlement boundary' to deal with the interface issues between urban and rural," he says, noting that 'protected settlement boundaries' should only be imposed in special circumstances.

"Retaining some flexibility is better," he said.

What about the various small coastal settlements on Phillip Island; at Ventnor where the controversial "Cadogan land" is apparently back in play, at Newhaven, at Cape Woolamai where that hoary old chestnut of the Phillip Island Airport is being revisited, and even connecting Smiths Beach to Sunderland Bay?

Developers have made pitches to the panel for hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of additional land to be opened up on Phillip Island.

But would a 'green' Bass Coast Shire Council or local residents ever allow that? Not likely.

Locals say much of it is fanciful.

And with the possible exception of an expansion in some of the Waterline settlements, at Corinella, Coronet Bay and the like; it seems that future expansion of coastal or 'lifestyle' blocks will centre on San Remo and Cape Paterson.

And as the hearings continue this week, it's an assessment of the benefits of expanding Cape Paterson to the north which will come sharply into focus.

The public hearings continue at the Cape Paterson Surf Lifesaving Club on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday this week, April 12, 13 and 14, and then at the Silverwater Resort, San Remo, on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday next week, April 17, 18, 19 and 20.

And first up on Thursday, April 13 at Cape Paterson will be the Cape Paterson Residents and Residents Association (CPRRA) who are bitterly opposed to the expansion of their town, by as many as 1000 extra blocks.

Ringing in their ears will be the claims that they are already losing the argument, that here is an area of land already inside the settlement boundary which is needed to meet the demand for lifestyle blocks in Bass Coast, or else push that demand to already over-developed or more sensitive locations in the shire.

The CPRRA will have a full day to state their case, which is not without merit, especially given the fact that Cape

Mr Rankine told the DAL panel last week that if they can't stop the sand mining, they should at least recommend the establishment of wildlife corridors and restrictive planning controls on pristine bushland on the old Holden Proving Ground site.

Paterson is poorly provided with infrastructure.

The other big issue which will continue to play out in front of the panel in the coming week is the Western Port Woodlands campaign, featuring submissions by the Save Western Port Woodlands, South Gippsland Conservation Society and Victorian National Parks Association groups today (Wednesday) and continuing on Friday.

Former Bass Coast Mayor, Neil Rankine, made a passionate, well-reasoned pitch to the panel last week, that if, as they say, they can't roll back the sand mining licences, they can at least recommend for a system of biolinks and native bush corridors to

be established from the old Lang Lang Proving Ground to the Grantville Nature Conservation Reserve.

"The magnificent jewel in the crown is the Holden Proving Ground. This reserve has no protection whatsoever and it needs it," said Mr Rankine.

He said the pristine qualities of the former proving ground site should be protected, as promised by the former Environment Minister Lily D'Ambrosio, and if protected appropriately, would have no development value with its present zoning.

Local activist and singer-song writer, Tim O'Brien, who addressed the panel in words and song last week, believes the State Government should

buy the proving grounds site, now that it was back on the market, and it should become the 'Gateway to Bass Coast', highlighting the region's magnificent natural attractions, and forever saving its immense environmental value.

And last Wednesday, the Wattle Bank Community Group, represented by Morgan Tyler, Brendon Johnson and Christopher Haig, reported to the panel on exploding development in their area, calling for 'Wattle Bank' to be formerly recognised as a settlement so that the community can protect and enhance its lifestyle.

Multiple injuries following horrific crash at Bass

ON MONDAY (April 10) just after 10am emergency services attended a serious collision at Bass.

Police from Wonthaggi Police Station and Bass Coast Highway Patrol, along with paramedics from Ambulance Victoria, volunteer firefighters from Bass CFA and Corinella CFA, and volunteers from SES San Remo Unit and SES Wonthaggi Unit responded to a collision involving a Mazda hatch and a Ford sedan, which occurred on the Bass Highway in Bass, near Soldiers Road.

It is believed that the Mazda hatch failed to give way and collided with the Ford sedan.

Multiple occupants of the Mazda hatch were trapped within the vehicle and required extrication.

The driver of the Mazda, a 42-year-old woman from New South Wales, and four passengers of the vehicle, being a 11-year-old male from New South Wales, a 9-year-old female from New South Wales, a 67-year-old male from Bangladesh and a 63-year-old female from Bangladesh were also taken to hospital

with significant but non-life-threatening injuries.

The driver and sole occupant of the Ford sedan, a 30-year-old Heathcote Junction woman, was taken to hospital with significant but non-life-threatening injuries.

The collision caused significant delays, and necessitated a partial closure of the Bass Highway, on what was a very busy morning, with many tourists returning to Melbourne. Local police appreciated the patience of road users during the incident.

Investigations are still

ongoing; however, it is believed that the driver of the Mazda sedan will be issued with an infringement notice for failing to give way.

This is another important reminder for all road-users to be careful when entering main roads, and ensuring there is sufficient distance from oncoming vehicles.

Blaze lights up Wonthaggi sky

A FIRE decimated a house in Wonthaggi on Thursday evening (April 6) at 5.55pm.

The fire was contained to the single premise with firefighters from Wonthaggi, Dalyston and Inverloch attending alongside Wonthaggi Police and Bass Coast Highway.

Fire investigators and arson chemists have since listed the blaze as unable to determine cause, however, investigations are ongoing.

Stranded in the bay

TWO males and a female were rescued from a damaged sea kayak in Western Port Bay at 4pm on Monday, April 10.

The trio had appropriate safety equipment on board and were able to attract attention and call for help, after spending an unknown amount of time stranded in the water.

Police Air Wing and Coast Guard service rescued the group, and they were taken to Wonthaggi hospital to be treated for hypothermia.

Remaining pieces of the kayak were being retrieved from the water by the coast guards.

Shed Fire in Korumburra

The CFA responded to a shed fire on Gordon Street in Korumburra at around 7.05pm on Monday, April 10.

Three CFA units from Korumburra and Ruby fire brigade attended the scene.

No occupants were inside at the time, and the scene was declared under control and safe a short time later.

Progress continues on Wonthaggi North's future

THE Victorian Planning Authority (VPA) has been completing technical work to implement the recommendations of the VPA Standing Advisory Committee (SAC) in regards to the Wonthaggi North East Precinct Structure Plan.

In August 2022, the VPA SAC released its report into plans for Wonthaggi North East, which recommended updates and additional information regarding drainage and costings. Since the VPA's last update in December 2022, they have been working with technical experts to finalise the Wonthaggi North East Revised Drainage Strategy and Wonthaggi North East Functional Designs and Costings Report in response to the SAC's recommendations. VPA expect these reports to be completed by May 2023.

In the coming months, VPA will be focused on finalising the planning scheme amendment and associated documents to submit to the Minister for Planning for consideration.

New kinder coming soon

KORUMBURRA parents will be able to ditch the dreaded double drop-off with a new kinder planned for Korumburra.

These new Kindergartens at Korumburra, St Albans Meadows, Willmott Park, Roxburgh Park, and Napoleons primary schools and Kyabram P-12 College in 2024, will create 495 new kindergarten places for local kids.

Two-room centres opening to outdoor learning and play spaces will be built at St Albans Meadows, Korumburra and Napoleons primary schools and Kyabram P-12 College, with each offering 66 kindergarten places.

The new kindergartens are sharing in \$371 million

provided in the Victorian Budget 2019/20 for Three-Year-Old Kindergarten funding.

Built with modular construction to expedite delivery and minimise disruption for the school and local community, the technique delivers new high-quality learning environments more quickly, supporting 42 jobs during construction and 164 in associated industries.

Kindergartens on-site or next door to primary schools ensure kindergarten programs are easier to access, drop-off time is simpler and more convenient for parents and provide a smoother transition from kindergarten to school for local children.

Regional cap for public transport in place

THE regional fare cap is now in effect for regional public transport fares.

The cost of a daily ticket on the entire regional Victorian network is now capped at the same prices as metropolitan daily fares – currently \$9.20 for a full fare or \$4.60 for a concession. On a weekend or public holiday, daily fares are capped at \$6.70 and currently just \$3.35 for concession.

For those who take long-distance V/Line journeys, the regional fare cap can save people more than \$40 for each and every one-way journey on the regional public transport network.

The cap also applies to interstate travel within 60 kilometres of the Victorian border, as well as Albury, Merimbula, Deniliquin and Mt Gambier, to ensure those living in border communities in New South Wales and South Australia benefit as well. The fare cap applies to all PTV regional buses, town buses and V/Line trains and coaches.

However, according to a statement released by the Liberal Nationals party, the cheaper fares are at risk as independent analysis reveals a \$155 million funding shortfall.

Parliamentary Budget Office

figures showed the government's cheaper V/Line fares policy to be \$358.1 million over the next four years, \$155 million more than has been budgeted by the State Labor Government to date. For more information or to purchase tickets visit vline.com.au or ptv.vic.gov.au.

Phone issue frustrations at Venus Bay Community Centre

THOSE attempting to ring the Venus Bay Community Centre (VBCC) are urged not to feel ignored if they don't get an answer, with ongoing phone issues to blame.

While the centre's phone appears to ring from the caller's perspective, that is often not the case, potentially creating the false impression the important community facility and service provider is closed.

Problems have occurred over a number of months.

"We keep putting a message on our Facebook page to say sorry, our phone's not working," VBCC manager Alyson Skinner said.

She added that she attempted to resolve the problem by having calls to the centre's landline diverted to her mobile phone, but that proved unsuccessful.

THE Fire Danger Period (FDP) will finish across local government areas in the South East in the coming weeks.

Ending on April 10:

- Bass Coast Shire
- French Island
- South Gippsland Shire

While restrictions are lifting in these areas, CFA still expects the grassfire risk to remain across the state in the coming months so Victorians need to remain alert and prepared.

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Long weekend operation stings bad drivers

POLICE detected almost 8000 traffic offences during a five-day road policing operation over the Easter long weekend.

Operation Nexus saw police highly visible and actively enforcing across the state in an effort to reduce road trauma.

It follows a shocking start to the year on Victoria's roads with 89 lives lost, up 25 per cent on the five-year average.

Good Friday accounted for almost a quarter of all detections over the Easter period, with 101 motorists caught drink and drug driving on this day alone.

More than a third of all offences detected were for speeding, with almost 80 per cent of motorists detected between 10km/h and 25km/h over the speed limit.

Almost a quarter of speeding offences were detected on Easter Monday, the final day of the operation.

Mobile phone offences jumped 31 per cent from last year's Easter road policing operation with 343 motorists caught using their phones while driving.

Police also detected and removed 529 unauthorised drivers from roads, including suspended, disqualified and

unlicensed drivers.

Across the Bass Coast Police Service Area, offences during Operation Nexus included:

- 7 drink drivers
- 2 drug drivers
- 2 disqualified drivers
- 1 unlicensed drivers
- 45 speeding offences
- 2 disobey signs/signals
- 2 seatbelt offences
- 1 mobile phone offences
- 14 unregistered vehicles

"We had a lot of tourist traffic, but overall people were generally good, with only one main collision at the intersection of Soldiers Road and

Bass Highway, Bass," Senior Sergeant, Eastern Region Division 5 Road Policing, Jason Hullick stated.

"There were no lives lost in Bass Coast over the Easter period, but it is disappointing that we are still catching people speeding and testing positive to drugs and alcohol.

"It is a reminder for people to continue planning their journeys safely and make alternative arrangements home."

State-wide there were two lives lost on Victorian roads over the Easter period, with

single-vehicle fatal collisions in White Hills on Friday and Wangaratta on Sunday.

With five lives lost to date in April, police enforcement will continue across the state throughout the school holiday period and the unofficial Anzac Day long weekend later this month.

"Everyone thinks road trauma won't happen to them, until it's too late. Don't let your complacency be the reason for another death or serious injury on our roads," Assistant Commissioner Road Policing, Glenn Weir added.

Successful burn off for local brigades in South Gippsland

BRIGADES from across District 9 recently came together to help South Gippsland Shire Council to deliver two planned burns in Kongwak Pioneer Reserve. Brigades from the Strzelecki and South Gippsland Groups delivered two fuel reduction burns on March 25, alongside members of the South Gippsland Shire bush reserve crew.

These burns helped to reduce the risk to nearby communities and encourage native plant regeneration. The burns were a great opportunity for crews to strengthen their knowledge of ignition patterns and observe fire behaviour when it interacts with different fuel types.

A recent fuel hazard assessment of the reserve showed it had very high fuel loads. An assessment following the planned burn showed a fuel hazard rating over the planned burn areas

of low, which is a great outcome for the local community.

Fuel reduction burns go a long way to help mitigate the effects of wildfire and the use of controlled fire not only reduces fuel loads but can help to increase the health and biodiversity of reserves such as Kongwak.

Planned Burn Operations Officer (PBOO) on the day Gary Williams said, "The Shire crews did a great job in preparing the burn blocks and CFA crews did pre-and post-burn work to ensure a safe and successful burn, mitigating any threat to the nearby residents from the burns".

Coastal Councils Australia-wide unite for climate solutions

COASTAL erosion, flooding and even tsunami are shared challenges for all Australians, but one that directly impacts those of us lucky to live near our beautiful coast. The exacerbation of these coastal hazards through climate change is leaving our communities, properties, and infrastructure increasingly vulnerable.

This is why the national Australian Coastal Councils Association was established in 2004. They represent the interests of coastal councils plus their communities, to plan and adapt for impending climate impacts, as we are on the frontline. Bass Coast knows this too well.

Late last month I represented Bass Coast at the association's National Forum on Coastal Hazards convened in response to more frequent, severe, extreme and damaging weather events along Australia's coastlines plus growing concern about how to best manage these.

Councils and government agencies shared knowledge on how we face this crisis together – including shared data, innovation and assessments.

Key was shifting from recovery and repair to prevention, aligning with the Federal Government's Disaster Ready Fund. This invests up to \$200m a year in helping communities protect themselves against natural disasters through projects such as flood levees, sea walls, cyclone shelters and fire breaks.

Insurance Council of Australia also updated on their Actions of the Sea and Future Risks report. Australia needs at least \$30 billion of investment for coastal protection and adaptation projects over the next 50 years. They also recommend improved data collection nationwide, plus Land Use Planning reforms that cement a national baseline of climate risk to avoid

building properties in high-risk areas.

On flooding, current planning schemes do not protect houses being built in vulnerable areas. The Building Codes does not protect people from climate change and the National Construction Code must focus be reformed to focus on sustainable housing. I was able to catch up with fellow Mayors and councillors from Victoria. We plan to meet again soon to discuss our approach to coastal inundation and the response to the Government's adoption of the higher inundation risk level, presented by sea level rise in assessing planning applications.

There were interesting developments in nature-based responses to coastal erosion, with university researchers in every state documenting and assessing solutions such as artificial reefs. Two artificial reefs in Port Phillip with different approaches appear to be already managing waves in Port Phillip Bay, while also creating new habitats for shellfish and other species. Correct design is vital, so research evaluating the best approach is underway as a precursor, to new national guidelines.

In Fremantle a beach lost to erosion was rebuilt using dredged sand they are hoping to achieve 10 more years while the Port is relocated. Erosion hotspots in Western Australia are being mapped. A national inventory of nature-based solutions is also being developed, so organisations Australia-wide can protect our coasts.

Climate change is not a challenge with a beginning, a middle and an end. This is a long journey that we must start now, so pooling all resources, to collaborate and learn, is essential.

Coastal councils are facing an existential responsibility with little guidance. State and federal governments must recognise this, step up and take urgent leadership – before it's too late.

Residents plead for spray signage in treated areas

RESIDENTS are aggravated that the Bass Coast Shire Council have sprayed the side road vegetation in residential areas of Wonthaggi without any signage or use of spray dye in the treated areas.

A resident, who wished to remain anonymous, has raised concern that her dog got sick from the treated area after she had to move off the gravel on Chisholm Road and onto the side road to let a vehicle pass.

The speed limit along Chisholm Road, Wonthaggi remains 100km, and despite the speed limit being another issue entirely, this road is the only access road to the Wonthaggi town centre for pedestrians who walk their pets into the main street.

It was claimed that the roadside vegetation had been poisoned the day before and a resident's dog got very sick from what she assumed was the treated vegetation, ending in a \$500 vet bill.

A few weeks later we had to get off the road to allow the large council chemical spray truck to go past. We watched the truck stop at each pole marking a drain - and then move on to the next drain. If we had not seen this, I would not know the chemical truck had been and would have walked the dog right into the freshly sprayed grass again, with the risk of further danger. There was no warning the vegetation had been poisoned, lane ways have also been poisoned without notice or signs to warn people."

The subject has been raised with the Bass Coast Shire Council for comment, but they declined to provide a response at this stage.

However, an Agriculture Victoria spokesperson said, 'While there are no general legal requirements for councils to put up signs or use spray dye when applying pesticides, it is good practice for them to take either step in order to minimise the risk of people entering treated areas.'

Agriculture Victoria encourages councils and other public land managers to ensure they are taking appropriate steps to address the risk their chemical use may pose to others, including neighbours and people accessing the treated area.'

Calling women to run for local government

ORGANISERS of a groundbreaking program to help more women run for local government say time is running out to get involved.

Applications close on Friday, April 14, for the government-funded Women Leading Locally program aimed at equipping community leaders for public office.

There are 65 fully funded training places available for women across Victoria, with masterclasses in campaigning, leadership, governance and diversity. Graduates earn a certificate in community leadership and governance.

The aim is to increase the num-

ber of women running in the 2024 local government elections, as part of a Victorian Government policy to strive for a 50/50 gender split.

Delivered by the Institute of Community Directors Australia (ICDA) and Women for Election, the program targets the 31 local government areas with the lowest representation of women.

Organisers are especially keen for additional applicants from these 18 LGAs: Ararat, Bass Coast, Buloke, Campaspe, Colac Otway, East Gippsland, Gannawarra, Glen Eira, Mansfield, Mildura, Mount Alexander, Northern Grampians, Pyrenees, Swan

Hill, Towong, Wellington, West Wimmera and Wodonga.

Applications are open to all women with a passion for their local community, and youth, First Nations women, women with disability, women from diverse cultural and linguistic groups, and LGBTIQ+ women are strongly encouraged to apply.

Applications for the 2023 program are open until April 14. The program provides a no-cost opportunity for 65 women to be supported to stand for local government elections in 2024.

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Woodlands' anthem fails to sway DAL panelists

A PASSIONATE plea from Western Port Woodlands' activist, Tim O'Brien, including a moving rendition of his woodland's protest anthem 'On A Grantville Shore' prompted gratitude from the Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) Standing Advisory Committee this week.


But that's about all.

As the Lead Chair of the Bass Coast DAL panel, Kathy Mitchell AM, said to Mr O'Brien, following his address on the Wednesday before Easter, the committee's hands are tied when it comes to impacting existing uses, including sand extraction.

"I just want to be clear in case there's any expectation about this. We can't revisit the sand mines, they are existing uses with existing permits," said Ms Mitchell.

But speaking as a former tourist business operator and concerned local resident, Mr O'Brien left no one in any doubt about his position, that if a government process designed to protect "distinctive landscapes" failed to even mention the Western Port Woodlands, something was seriously wrong.

"There is a spectacular dishonesty in the pretence of professing to recognise the value of the environment of the Bass Coast region while simultaneously excluding the Western Port Woodlands from Significant Landscape Overlays (as if the last remaining stand of coastal forest, this significant

wild habitat so important to the region and the health of the Bay, this rare and diminishing ecosystem of ecological vegetation classes that has been elsewhere stripped from the region, is not significant, not deserving of protection).

"To fail to include the Woodlands in the Proposed Landscape Planning Controls beggars belief for its calculated bone-headedness, for its failure to recognise the wishes of the Bass Coast community (and Council!) and for its deliberate anti-climate science environmental carelessness," said Mr O'Brien.

"Why would the report be silent on this, the last remaining significant forest in the region, and Western Port's last forest?

"Why? I can't help but feel that this silence carries the stench of interference and loss of impartiality of the former Department, DELWP (now Energy, Environment and Climate Action) in the preparation of the Draft Statement... hell-bent in pursuit of "strategic extractive resources" (sand for city concrete) at any and all environmental cost."

But Ms Mitchell did say, at

the end, that the panel would be considering various submissions about biolinks, including from the Bass Coast Shire Council, about the potential for establishing biodiversity biolinks and wildlife corridors across the shire.

The DAL process makes reference to the Bass Coast Shire Council's Biodiversity Biolinks Plan 2018 in Volume 1 of its Landscape Assessment for Bass Coast, without actually listing the potential for a corridor between The Gurdies and Grantville.

The council explained the reason for its biolinks plan back in 2018:

"The purpose of the Bass Coast Biodiversity Biolinks Plan is to provide connectivity in the landscape by linking remnant patches of indigenous vegetation using biolinks or wildlife corridors," according to the shire's plan of 2018."

Mr O'Brien said the panel should be prepared to go further and set out where protective overlays should be located to preserve the remnant bush between the Lang Lang Proving Ground and the Grantville Nature Conservation Reserve.

At 10.15am on Wednesday, April 12, the DAL panel will hear from the Save Western Port Woodlands, South Gippsland Conservation Society and Victorian National Parks Association on this very subject.

E-scooter trial extended across Victoria

MINISTER for Roads and Road Safety Melissa Horne has announced the e-scooter trial will be extended for six months and will now include the use of private e-scooters.

The State Government has introduced the following rules:

- Riders must wear a helmet, be at least 16 years of age and adhere to the same blood alcohol content (BAC) and drug use restrictions as drivers. Riders cannot consume alcohol while travelling on an e-scooter.
- E-scooters can only be used on roads with a speed limit of 60 kilometres or less. They can be ridden on roads, in bicycle lanes, on bicycle paths or separated and shared paths – but not on footpaths.
- E-scooters cannot travel above 20 kilometres per hour.
- Devices capable of exceeding 25 kilometres per hour are not classified as e-scooters and are still illegal.

E-scooter riders must also not carry passengers, ride two abreast, use a mobile phone or lead an animal on their e-scooter. Victoria Police will be enforcing the safe use of e-scooters.

Further work will be carried out throughout the trial extension to understand product safety standards, rider education and if any changes to penalties are required.

E-scooter share schemes will be able to operate with the approval of local councils – with the schemes in Ballarat, Yarra, Port Philip and Melbourne expected to continue.

Hands off Bass Coast farming: DAL panel told

TYPICALLY, a medium-sized, three-bay hay shed is about 100sqM in size.

If you're a farmer in the Bass hills and some other parts of the Bass Coast Shire, and you want to build anything bigger than that, you'll need a permit from the shire.

That's if the Draft Statement of Planning Policy (SPP) put out under the controversial Bass Coast Distinctive Area and Landscape (DAL) process stays as is.

Again, typically, a shed like that would be under 5 metres in height, but if you wanted to build a 6-metre-high machinery shed, for example, you'd need a permit.

If you own an undulating to hilly farm in the Bass Hills, Bass River Valley and coastal plains in the western part of the shire, and the shed you need is going to be sited more than 200 metres above sea level, you'll need a permit.

If you want to build a fence, any height, excluding a post and rail fence up to 1.8 metres, you'll need a permit.

A permit is required to remove native vegetation and tree belts, to use building materials and colours not included on the list and to site farm sheds in certain locations.

In short, the draft SPP being proposed by the State Government is a potential nightmare of red tape for affected farmers, but without any support from government coming back the other way in its distinctive areas plan.

And the Victorian Farmers Federation has seen red.

As well as a formal submission, back in April 2022, by VFF President Emma Germano, a VFF representative from head office, senior policy advisor Lisa Gervasoni and Bass stud breeder, Faye Tuchtan, representing the Bass Coast VFF Branch, appeared at a hearing into the DAL on Thursday, March 30.

Each was scathing in their assessment of the Draft Statement of Planning Policy with Ms Gervasoni providing the following recommendation on behalf of members:

"If a statement of planning of

policy is to be progressed, it is critical that it be revised to ensure that it supports state planning and agriculture policy. Landscape controls should then be developed to support the ability of agriculture to grow and implement climate resilient production systems," Ms Gervasoni said on behalf of the VFF.

"If the statement progresses without including a fulsome consideration of the requirements of s46AP (1)(d) (including productive farm land as significant) we request that the Panel recommends that specific landscape and other controls are not implemented on agricultural land."

It's a clear, simple message from the VFF – hands off our farms.

The draft SSP does say:

"A key aspect of the proposed SLO is to balance the need to protect the significant landscapes with ensuring the continuation of

agricultural uses: the draft Bass Coast SPP supports the protection and continued use of agricultural land and recognises agriculture as important to the local economy."

But there's precious little practical support and no research of the sector locally.

The Strategic Agricultural Land Project that became Protecting Melbourne's Green Wedges and Agricultural land study were projects undertaken on behalf of the Minister for Planning. They were based on a view that all agricultural land within 100km of Melbourne is strategic agricultural land that must be protected.

Unless the government is prepared to carry out a proper assessment of agriculture in Bass Coast, they say, as part of its Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) process, the Victorian Farmers Federation is calling on the panel to recommend no changes

impacting farming in the shire.

Ms Tuchtan made a compelling submission as a commercial farmer operating in the area.

"We note that the focus of the SPP for the Distinctive Areas and Landscapes appears to be on settlement boundaries and landscape at the exclusion of agriculture.

"But the Regional Growth Plan for Gippsland (page 27) states that protecting and maintaining Gippsland's strategic and productive agricultural land is essential for the continued growth of the food manufacturing sector."

Ms Tuchtan said there was no meaningful consideration of the importance of agriculture in the Bass Coast DAL process.

"We consider that an essential part of the landscape in rural areas is the farmscape, whether it be dairying, livestock, viticulture, cropping or horticulture. Therefore, part of the rural outlook is

the vista of farm sheds, silos and stockyards," she said.

"As well as tourism, agriculture is an essential part of Bass Coast Shire. The current agricultural strategy for Victoria recognises Victorian agriculture is a cornerstone of our economy. Victoria's farmers, agribusiness and surrounding communities are an integral part of our way of life. They feed us, clothe us, and export our products to the world. Agriculture creates essential jobs in our regions and supports the productive management of our landscapes".

"Upon reading the SPP I wonder whether the authors have visited the region – they state that Grantville has a police station, a school and a supermarket – in fact, Grantville has none of these!

The proposals in the SPP appear to take control over our agriculture and agricultural land. This must not happen, farmers must be able to run their business in the best way they can," said Ms Tuchtan, calling the proposed controls a "complete overkill", bringing with them large costs associated with planning applications and compliance.

"I question where the idea of only post and rail fences came from – do we actually have enough timber or money to install rail fences? While we wait for a planning permit to be approved for a post and wire fence, stock will be out on the road.

"Farmers are best to look after all farm fencing – new, upgrades, repairs. They have been doing this since settlement without any restrictions or regulations or input by any government or quasi regulators."

Ms Tuchtan continued on systematically taking apart every aspect of the DAL and SPP as it proposed place extra burdens on farming.

You can't help thinking however that the proposed regulations are something of a blueprint for a new attitude to planning rules governing farming.

Bath challenges Minister over Inverloch erosion

WHEN will the State Government finally act and fund the major capital works, including breakwaters, groynes, rock walls and renourishment of the dune system at Inverloch already identified in the exhaustive Cape-to-Cape Resilience Project?

That was the gist of a question put to the Minister for Environment Ingrid Stitt in State Parliament recently by Member for Eastern Victoria Region, Melina Bath, who has followed up with a visit to the area and an urgent call for mitigation action on Inverloch's foreshore before local infrastructure is irreparably damaged through coastal erosion.

"Speaking with frustrated Inverloch community members, there's been years of talk and no action – short and long-term measures are needed to protect the town," said Ms Bath this week.

"It's untenable that after three and half years of consultation and studies, the Andrews Government is no closer to implementing remediation action on Inverloch's foreshore.

"Infrastructure around Wreck Creek is only one

storm event away from being lost.

"Inverloch's Surf Life Saving Club, local roads and homes are at immediate risk, yet the Andrews Government continues to kick the tin down the road.

"The Surf Life Saving Club is only 10 metres away from the high tide mark, and in the last eight years, 70 metres of beach has been eroded and two surf lifesaving towers have been lost," said Ms Bath.

Speaking in state parliament Ms Bath called on the Andrews Government to act now so the Inverloch Surf Life Saving Club and other public infrastructure do not succumb to coastal erosion.

Ms Bath said after three and half years it "beggars belief the Cape-to-Cape Resilience Project is still without a tangible action" when Inverloch's coastal erosion is considered the worst in the state.

"The Minister has stated \$3 million in funding is on the table, however this amount is insufficient and there's no evidence the money is being used for mitigation purposes."

Music industry derailed by COVID

MUSIC Victoria has launched the 2022 Victorian Live Music Census revealing that the live music industry experienced strong year-on-year growth, only to be derailed by the pandemic.

From 2017 to 2019, there was a 48% growth in the economic contribution made by live music across Victoria (\$1.72b to \$2.55b), where most of the growth was identified at regional Victoria box offices (12% growth a year in regional, compared to 10.5% growth in metropolitan areas).

In 2019, the data in the census reveals that:

- there were 1,076 live music venues;
- there were 184,043 gigs that reached audiences of 50.15m (not including small regional venues); and
- the average ticket price was \$25 (not including all the free shows).

When comparing 2019 with 2020-21, it is inevitable that the census data would show large reductions, including:

- over 75% of Victorian events were either cancelled, postponed or rescheduled
- 69% of event revenue lost
- 71% of audience and visitor spending lost
- 72% of music related income lost by performers
- 46% of performers considering leaving the industry


The data identifies 535 small venues across regional tourism areas (with APRA music licences), with 308 venues offering a minimum of one live gig per week.

In Gippsland, there were 42 venues with 10 in Phillip Island.

The 16,000 plus gigs presented in 2019 were attended by 2.66 million patrons who generated revenue of \$207.5 million of which \$29.4 million was spent offsite in host communities.

About 65% of patrons resided within 25kms of the venue.

As was the case with concert performances, some 75% of gigs in small regional venues were cancelled/ postponed across 2020/2021, with the consequent loss of revenue.

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Must 'fast track' Wonthaggi mine tours, says Melina

THERE'S been precious little action since 300 people turned out at a public meeting in Wonthaggi last week but the plight of the State Coal Mine has attracted plenty of attention.

Not least from Eastern Victoria MLC Melina Bath who was quick out of the blocks to meet with Friends of the State Coal Mine after raising the issue in State Parliament on Thursday, March 23, a full week before the public meeting at which Bass MP Jordan Crugnale spoke.

"Wonthaggi's State Coal Mine is an incredible community facility, which is much loved by all as an ode to our past," said Ms Bath during her visit.

"Given the facility's significant heritage value, reopening of mine tours must be fast tracked by the Andrews Government.

"Following my meeting with representatives of the Friends of the Wonthaggi State Coal Mine, I am committed to supporting volunteers in their endeavours to recommence underground tours and reopen the café as a matter of priority.

"The Andrews Government must deliver action and not disingenuous lip service to the Wonthaggi community so local volunteers can continue their important work that preserves the history of the Bass Coast."

In the Legislative Council on March 23, Ms Bath used her constituency question to

highlight the problems:

"My constituency question is for the Minister for Tourism, Sport and Major Events. The not-for-profit Friends of the State Coal Mine in Wonthaggi have serious concerns about the long-term viability of their mine tours, the function centre and the cafe of significant historical context.

"The underground tours, suspended at the beginning of

the COVID lockdowns, have not been reinstated, and the cafe had to close in January this year. In an effort to bring about a positive solution to this hiatus in operations, the Friends of the State Coal Mine are holding a meeting on 29 March – next week – at the Wonthaggi Workmen's Club at 7 pm.

"They are absolutely positive about getting this reinstated,

but they need support, so my question is: will the Minister for Tourism attend this meeting and find a way forward for this important tourist venture?"

The Minister for Tourism, Steve Dimopoulos, didn't attend the meeting but Ms Crugnale has undertaken to ask him to visit the mine in the not-to-distant-future.

Hopefully he will come bearing gifts.

Childcare pain still felt in South Gippsland

REGIONAL areas all over the nation are continuing to grapple with childcare availability as South Gippsland Shire also struggles with staff shortages and long waitlists.

Following a new study released by the Regional Australia Institute which showed childcare users in Queensland waited more than 12 months to access services, the situation in South Gippsland is also struggling to improve.

According to council, all centres are currently seeking additional staff and waitlists are in place at most.

'Many centres have advised that they currently have limited capacity to take on new families,' the shire noted.

'At times, in some centres, childcare places have been reduced to accommodate staff shortages.'

'Staff with certificate 3, Diploma and Bachelor qualifications are needed in South Gippsland.'

Overall, South Gippsland has approximately 420 long day care places in Children's Centres across the region.

However, there is some good news as an additional 121 places are opening in term 2 as part of the Leongatha Early Learning Centre.

'The opening of the Leongatha Early Learning Centre will help to reduce the overall waitlist, however, it will take time to employ qualified staff in order to be able to operate at full capacity,' the shire highlighted.

According to Regional Australia Institute, across the country, the regional job vacancy rate has almost doubled in the last five years, with more than 81,000 roles advertised in January.

Island artist wins first 'Blair' prize

THE Bass Coast Health Inverloch Art Show attracted plenty of interest over the Easter weekend and a good number of sales as well.

The event got off to a great start on Friday night with a well-attended opening event.

The Overall Winner of the 35th Art Show was Phillip Island ceramic artist Emma Le-Mar, who accepting 'The Blair Art Prize' - in memory of Inverloch resident and art show supporter Blair Hodges who died in November last year.

Cr Brett Tessari, a Bass Coast Shire Councillor former mayor, together with Lyne Hodges, presented the award with Brett paying a moving tribute to Blair.

And it was a heartfelt response from winning artist Emma Le-Mar on the night and on Facebook afterwards.

"I am incredibly proud to have been awarded The Blair Art Prize at the Inverloch Art Exhibition. This was beyond any of my expectations, and I still can't



believe that I won best in show," said Emma.

"Of course, this would not have been possible without (Orkney Islands mentor) David Holmes, as well as the support of all of my friends and family (in Australia and the UK). Just so thankful, grateful."

The Blair Art Prize will be an ongoing award and is named in memory of Blair Hodges in recognition of his long-standing support of the Inverloch Art Show.

The winner of the prize for 2023 will also receive prize money of \$2000.

Most car child restraints incorrectly fitted or used

ALMOST 90 per cent of child car restraints in Bass Coast Shire are incorrectly fitted or used, dramatically increasing the risk of transport-related injuries, according to figures released as part of the 'Safe Seats, Safe Kids' free child car restraint fitting and checking program.

The figures have prompted Kidsafe Victoria to issue an urgent call for local parents and carers to regularly check that their child car restraints are correctly installed and adjusted to fit their child and book in for a free fitting or check.

Of the 47 child car restraints recently inspected in the municipality, 89% were incorrectly installed or used, including:

- 70% which required adjusting, and
- 19% which required a complete refit.

Kidsafe Victoria CEO, Melanie Courtney, said the figures highlighted the immense danger posed by incorrectly installed or used child restraints.

"The risk of life-threatening injuries has been shown to be 4-6 times greater when child car restraints are incorrectly fitted or used."

"Ensuring child car restraints are properly installed can be challenging for parents if they haven't been shown how to do so, which is why the 'Safe Seats, Safe



Almost 9 in 10 child car restraints are incorrectly fitted or used in Bass Coast, promoting Kidsafe Victoria to urge all local parents and carers to regularly check that restraints are correctly installed.

Kids' program is so important."

"Many parents and carers who attend one of our free checking days simply don't know that their child isn't restrained safely."

"Our accredited fitters ensure the restraint is correctly fitted and also provide education and advice to help parents continue to keep their kids safe on every trip."

Transport related incidents are one of the leading causes of accidental death for Australian children. On average, around seven children under 15 are killed, and

300 are injured each year on Victorian roads.

The 'Safe Seats, Safe Kids' program - which was introduced to help combat the issue of incorrectly fitted child car restraints and improve safety outcomes for children travelling in vehicles - is run by Kidsafe Victoria in partnership with Neighbourhood Houses Victoria, with support from the Victorian State Government.

Typical incorrect installation and usage issues identified as part of the program include:

- Top tether straps that are twist-

ed, connected to the wrong point in the vehicle or not connected to an anchor point at all.

- Twisted harness straps or harness straps that are at the incorrect height
- Seatbelts that are threaded through the incorrect path
- ISOFIX attachments which aren't secured correctly
- Children who have been graduated to the next stage of restraint before they are the right size

Local parents and carers - including grandparents - can book a free appointment to have their child car restraint installed or inspected at the Inverloch Community House, where free fitting and checking days are regularly held - www.safeseatssafekids.com.au.

"The landscaping they've done already in that Jupiter Park area, they've done a lovely job."

Wind farms fears on the council table

THE South Gippsland Shire Council hosted a visit from two Federal and State ministers during the week with some difficult subjects on the table.

For one, how will the drive for offshore wind farms, and the associated power pylons that will inevitably march across our rural landscape to the Latrobe Valley affect this community?

The visit followed on from a recent advocacy trip to Canberra by Mayor Nathan Hersey, Deputy Mayor Clare Williams and CEO Kerryn Ellis.

The Hon Kristy McBain, Federal Minister for Regional Development, Local Government and Territories, and also the Member for Eden-Monaro which borders the Gippsland region, and the Hon. Melissa Horne, State Minister for Local Government, Minister for Roads and Road Safety, Minister for Ports and Freight visited South Gippsland to talk about key issues impacting the South Gippsland community.

This included discussions surrounding renewable energy and securing better engagement with residents, as well as transport and regional development, both subjects championed by South Gippsland Mayor, Cr Nathan Hersey.

"The recent visit by Minister McBain and Minister Horne presented Council with a good opportunity to discuss our regional priorities and issues that are of concern to local residents," said Cr Hersey.

"We would like to thank both Ministers for their visit and look forward to more productive conversations in the near future."

Also discussed were Council's priority road projects, namely the Leongatha Heavy Vehicle Alternative Route (Stage Two) and South Gippsland Highway Realignment at Korumburra.

"Council is continually advocating for improvements to our region that will see tangible results for our future and increased economic diversity," said Cr Hersey.

South Gippsland intersection safety concerns yet to be allayed

MEMBER for Gippsland South Danny O'Brien has acknowledged a safety improvement initiative planned for the intersection of Bass Highway and Leongatha South-Outtrim Road, but is calling for the intersection to be realigned to improve visibility, and for the creation of right hand turning lanes.

The intersection has been identified by Regional Roads Victoria (RRV) for the use of Side Road Activated Speed (SRAS) technology following a number of accidents.

When a motorist travelling on a side road approaches a main road with a 100km per hour speed limit, sensors trigger an electronic speed sign that temporarily reduces the speed limit to 70km per hour.

"On the Bass Highway, the Side Road Activated Speed signs will be triggered when a vehicle on Leongatha South-Outtrim Road or Roughheads Road approaches the highway," RRV states.

The Department of Transport and Planning (DTP) has advised that electronic speed signs and vehicle detection works for the intersection concerned are scheduled to commence by May 2023.

While thankful for any efforts to improve road safety and save lives, Mr O'Brien says more is required.

"I was contacted by local farmer Callum Moscript who highlighted a number of valid issues with the current intersection," Mr O'Brien said.

Mr Moscript told the Sentinel-Times what prompted him to reach out to Mr O'Brien.

"There have been multiple collisions, fatalities, and it comes to a point that you ask, when are we going to do something about it?"

Having farming properties close to the intersection, Mr Moscript regularly witnesses its perils.

"I see near misses on nearly a weekly basis," he said.

"Our farms are both sides of Roughheads Road and we have got vehicles and machinery that go up the road frequently, as well as suppliers."

Mr O'Brien outlined his concerns with the current intersection.

"It is a T-type intersection of both Leongatha South-Outtrim Road and the Bass Highway, and across the road is a local road, Roughheads Road," he said.

"For traffic coming onto the Bass Highway it is difficult to see looking towards Leongatha if you are coming out of the Outtrim Road.

"The other issue is traffic turning right into the Outtrim Road does not have a right-turning lane.

"There is a CFA shed and the old school on either side of the road, and there is an issue there with a small incline that makes it difficult for drivers coming down the road to see."

Mr O'Brien said after he raised the matter in State Parliament, seeking funding for a realignment, he was advised of the decision to install SRAS technology.

"The installation of Side Road Activated Speed signs is a start, but the realignment of the intersection remains important and I'll keep fighting for a safer outcome," he said.

RRV reports it is investigating potential upgrades to improve traffic flow, safety and access along the Bass Highway at the Leongatha South-Outtrim Road and Roughheads Road intersection in Leongatha South, also outlining what sparked the investigation.

"As part of an extensive community engagement process undertaken in late 2017 and early 2018, the intersection at Leongatha South-Outtrim Road and Roughheads Road was identified by the community as a high-priority location for safety and accessibility improvements, which was supported by planning investigations undertaken by the project team," it states.

Mr O'Brien believes more needs to be done to fix roads, particularly in regional Victoria, with reducing speed limits not a sufficient solution.

Why Russell's still on about it

RUSSELL Broadbent doesn't care so much what's happening to his beloved Liberal Party, especially here in Victoria over the Moira Deeming furore and the Aston by-election, as he does care about the government's failure to address the fallout from mandatory COVID vaccinations.

Speaking in the Parliament recently he again highlighted that the Minister for Health and Aged Care Mark Butler's department was continuing to ignore his letters, apart from standard replies, highlighting specific incidents of serious harm from vaccinations.

"In every one of our electorates, they're there. Some have been injured not so severely, but many have been severely injured by the vaccines that were mandated, and the fact that we did mandate them, and force employers to enforce them on their employees," he said, making reference to a "daughter" who had died somewhere in Australia, allegedly as a result of reaction to a COVID vaccine.

"That comes to my mind today, because those things are more important to me than the petty politics that we carry on with in other areas."

The South Gippsland branch of Uncle Bobs Club has operated cardboard collection fundraising for approximately 40 years.



Students the victims of Tarwin Lower vandalism

TARWIN Lower Primary School's students continue to suffer the consequences of a recent weekend vandalism spree that has left them without a useable sandpit and destroyed the pole supporting a netball ring.

The principal feels for the students affected by the ongoing impact of vandalism.

"They're the ones who miss out," Jennifer said.

The sandpit is also normally used by playgroup families.

MENTION the word "vaccination" today, and most people think about the COVID-19 jabs.

For a while there, the annually recommended seasonal flu shot dropped out of the spotlight. Perhaps it was fatigue – who wants to hear about needing yet another poke in the arm?

Or perhaps it was the fact that we were at home for a large part of 2020 and 2021 – who needed an influenza (flu) shot when we were practising social distancing, wearing masks, locked down, and prevented from going to work or school?

The flu is a virus that's spread in several ways. First, you can contract the virus from a person near you who has the flu and sneezes, coughs, or talks.

This is because different strains of influenza share common elements (called cross-protection), which means that the flu vaccine is able to work against them, too.

Crusade to save critically endangered crimson berry plant

A TEAM of ecological explorers has embarked on a mission to salvage critically endangered plant specimens from Wilsons Promontory National Park to regenerate the species on Phillip Island. Crimson berry, otherwise known as *Leptecophylla oxycedrus*, are prickly shrubs that only grow to two metres tall but can be hundreds of years old.

They get their name from the spectacular red, edible berries that grow on them.

The plant is now extremely rare, and while prolific in Tasmania, it's only found on Phillip Island, Wilsons Promontory and Corner Inlet in Victoria.

Phillip Island Nature Parks' Threatened Species Plan highlights crimson berry as one of the five key threatened flora species on Phillip Island (Millowl) and has a recovery action plan for the shrub.

To ensure it can continue to survive on the island, dedicated experts from Nature Parks, in collaboration with Parks Victoria marine rangers and field ecologists, travelled by sea to North Waterloo Bay, a remote location on the east coast of the Prom, to deliver a translocation program for young crimson berry plants.

Phillip Island Nature Parks Ranger Susan Spicer said the seedlings in Wilsons Prom had been found along a walking track by Brooke Love, a restoration ecologist on Parks Victoria's Prom Sanctuary team. As the plants were growing on the

walking track and were at risk of being trampled, Parks Victoria reached out to Nature Parks to see if they could support the recovery program.

The seedlings had grown from plants estimated to be 300-400 years old.

"We see this as an opportunity to translocate the young crimson berry seedlings to a safer location and, in turn, this may help us increase the genetic diversity on the island," Ms Spicer said.

But the conservation efforts are not without challenges.

"Crimson berry plants have extremely sensitive roots and do not like disturbance, so we need to take great care in the translocation process," Ms Spicer said.

"The seedlings will be cared for in the Barb Martin Bushbank until they are settled and showing active growth.

Current crimson berry populations on Phillip Island are largely remnants clinging on to cliffs that had been spared the effects of agricultural practices. However, they are old plants and are not showing signs of natural recruitment."

After week one all transplanted seedlings are showing great results and at this point James Anderson the Nursery Coordinator at the Bushbank is confident of their survival.

Outcomes of the translocation will be shared with a Melbourne University student who is collaborating with Royal Botanic Gardens Victoria on a genetic study.

\$4M upgrade for bridge over Tarwin River

MAJOR works to deliver a safer and stronger bridge over the Tarwin River West Branch in Leongatha are a step closer to getting underway, through the Australian and Victorian governments.

Minister for Regional Development Kristy McBain and Victorian Minister for Roads and Road Safety Melissa Horne visited the bridge on Nerrena Road, where detailed design and environmental assessments are now being carried out ahead of construction in 2024.

The major works will strengthen the bridge and reinforce the bridge deck, as well as replace piles on the Leongatha side of the bridge.

Lanes of the bridge will be

widened for traffic by replacing the existing barriers with a safer bridge guard fence on the outside of the bridge.

The works will improve travel for drivers on this vital agricultural freight route in South Gippsland, where heavy vehicles make up 16 per cent of all vehicles relying on the bridge.

The Australian and Victorian governments are jointly investing \$4.04 million to deliver the works, with \$3.23 million provided by the Australian Government and \$808,000 by the Victorian Government.

The funding comes as part of the Australian Government's Bridges Renewal Program, under the Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program.



Water quality is top priority

THE regular cleaning of water mains is essential to maintaining the high-quality of Westernport Water's drinking water.

Pipe cleaning is done using a technique known as air scouring, which pushes compressed air into the water pipe at high velocity. This dislodges any naturally occurring sediment in the pipe, which is then flushed out at a nearby hydrant.

Planned air scouring will start on April 26 and go through to May 9, 2023. Townships include Wimbledon Heights, Smiths Beach, Surf Beach, Sunderland Bay, Cape Woolamai, Rhyll, Newhaven and Bass.

The water supply will be turned off temporarily in each affected street to clean the water main. Westernport Water's cleaning contractors will progressively work through each township.

Residents will be directly notified of work being done in their area, prior to any interruption. If possible, customers will be asked to turn their stop tap off at the water meter, prior to the time of commencement listed on the interruption notice.

Contractors do not necessarily have to be on your street or at your property to carry out their work. Customers are advised not to operate any tap or appliances that use water between the hours stated on the interruption notice to avoid the potential for discoloured water.

After the cleaning is complete, customers may notice that the water is a little cloudy, this is only air that will bubble out/settle if you leave the water in an open container. Alternatively, customers can run their back tap for a short time to flush the cloudy water through their internal plumbing.

Your say on offshore wind transmission lines

MINISTER for Energy and Resources Lily D'Ambrosio announced that VicGrid has begun public consultation in Gippsland and Portland for new transmission connections for offshore wind energy.

According to the government, VicGrid will ensure new transmission is available in time to support Victoria's first offshore wind farm, coordinate planning to avoid multiple lines criss-crossing the landscape.

VicGrid will lead four phases of public engagement to share information.

VicGrid has prepared a Development and Engagement Roadmap 2023.

This will provide information on VicGrid's role and development approach, gather feedback on the approach, and establish ongoing consultation and coordination arrangements.

Phase One of the plan will begin immediately.

Only after this process of information sharing will VicGrid commence developing preferred options for routes, which will be informed by the feedback received through Phase One.

In Portland, a new or upgraded 500kV substation is proposed while in Gippsland, a new 500kV transmission line and terminal station connecting generators at the coast back to the existing network in the Latrobe Valley.

Nik Shepheard raises awareness in Inverloch

TEN years ago, Nik Shepheard of Kite Board for Life Australia had a life changing experience.

"My life came to a point where I didn't want to be here anymore, and my suicide attempt was averted by my partner and my then 5-year-old son...They weren't meant to be there that day and it was only within minutes and I wouldn't have been around."

He knew that something had to change.

"It was real pivotal part in my life, to say what do you really want here? What is it you really want to do? And I had to make a decision that day and then I started."

Nik decided to use his love of kite boarding as the anchor to raise awareness about suicide and depression. He would do this by being the first man to circumnavigate Australia on his kite board, the longest ever journey undertaken. He would stop in coastal towns to talk to individuals and communities alike.

"I started focusing on how I could do such a thing, no one has ever attempted it, and then my life started to change. It's like I have something, I've always had my family and friends, but this was something I could make a difference to, and it was my second chance to do something."

"Kiteboarding has always been that thing that lifted me up out of my hole...It's the freedom. I can go, basically go anywhere... I love to do long distance kiting and the deeper and the darker the water, the better."

Nik launched from his home at Mount Martha on the Mornington Peninsula on February 11, 2023. He landed in Inverloch about four weeks ago and while he has itchy feet and would have liked to have kept going on his journey, mechanical issues have prevented him.

"A big part of that is journey is to talk to individuals, but also community groups,

schools, workplaces and sporting clubs... I talk about my life, I talk about depression, I talk about suicide, I talk about how it affected my life, how I got better, how I stay well, my battles, my constant battles, how I deal with them. Recovery, resilience, and the big important one is warning signs, especially for guys."

"...every time I speak, it's soul on the sleeve...Sometimes there's tears, sometimes there's the F-bomb, sometimes there's a lot of laughter, there's a bit of everything..."

Nik reaches out to communities before he arrives with a Facebook post on the local Community Noticeboards, and he has been well received by the Inverloch community.

"So, before I came here I did that and that's how I met Rod Price, and Rod's pretty integral in the community...and so he invited me in and tucked me under his wing and I met the inner circle of Inverloch and they've all been super supportive."

Nik has spoken twice at the Inverloch pub in front of more than 80 people and has had the chance to connect individually with many people in Inverloch.

"Everyone's got a story and a lot of it's just listening, and you engage with these people, and they walk away feeling better and that's what I'm doing, that's what it's about. Or they walk away with a plan."

Nik's boat, adorned with an array of colourful flags, has become a common and recognisable site among Inverloch locals, and not least among the Inverloch pre-schoolers who regularly spend time on the beach.

"I've become a celebrity to them because whenever they're there, you can hear (if I'm in the boat) its, Nik! Nik! Nik! Nik!"

"So, I had a chat to them one day, so I had to try and explain to these little kids, these little pre-schoolers what I was doing and, it just came out...I'm trying to make sad people happy, and then one of the kids piped up and said, well we do that at

school, and I said, great! Perfect."

One of Nik's aims on this journey is to create an ongoing legacy in the communities he stops at, through an initiative called Beach Reach.

"The idea was to kind of dot these beach reaches as I go as well. It's like a legacy. It's a place where people can come in their local community who've either suffered depression or lost someone to suicide. Its non-clinical and it's a group of people with a common bond and it's for the carers as well, so the people who don't suffer but are the people who are looking after them. So it's a way that people can swap stories, provide support, friendship... But not only that, they enjoy activities together while they have that meeting."

A Beach Reach program has been established in Inverloch and will meet regularly. Anyone can join in the meetings, which will initially be organised and run by Inverloch local, Rod Price.

"It's so simple but I think it's a game changer, it really helps," said Nik.

Nik will continue on his journey around Australia, with his next stop being in Welshpool.

"I believe this is my life's work," he said.

Of course, it's laughable. The powerfully connected people of the Mornington Peninsula would never allow their sea views to be destroyed by one or more of Chris Bowen's huge offshore wind farms, even for such a compelling cause as a "climate change emergency".

Let someone else do the heavy lifting, they'd say.

And where's the best place to put a sand mine? Certainly not South Yarra, even if the sand is strategically important to the construction effort in Melbourne, for concrete, including for Melbourne's \$13 Billion Metro Tunnel Project.

So, where would you put it?

You put it somewhere in regional Victoria where, no matter how much the locals jump up and down and say it's an environmental disaster, you think no one will notice.

That's the situation with the sand mines at Grantville, where they are turning one of Victoria's 'most distinctive environmental landscapes', the Western Port Woodlands, into a moonscape.

The issue took centre stage last week, locally at least, at the Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) Standing Advisory Committee's planning hearings, and will do so again today, Wednesday April 12 when the Save Western Port Woodlands Group take their case to the panel, if not to save the woodlands, at least to have the area declared as "a distinctive landscape".

There could hardly be a more distinctive landscape in the Bass Coast region, or an area of bush so important to what's left of the ecosystem of Western Port.

Honestly, they couldn't give a toss what disasters they inflict on us down here, away from the city lights. We saw that with the recent decision to go ahead with the 33-turbine Delburn Wind Farm near Mirboo North, starting as early as next year (24 on-going jobs, big deal).

If they can't stop the sand mining in the areas at Grantville already turned over for the purpose, then the State Government must at least buy the old Holden Proving Ground, with its important native bushland areas, and preserve it in perpetuity, at least for some sort of payback.

A Voice matters

I note with considerable sadness that the Liberal Party has decided to oppose the Voice.

I would also note that former Prime Minister John Howard chose not to issue an apology to the Stolen Generation.


When some years later Prime Minister Kevin Rudd did issue an apology to the Stolen Generation, I don't remember it being the end of the world as we know it.

What I do remember was the tears of members of that generation as their pain was acknowledged. I remember it as a unifying and healing moment.



unlike nearly all others in Victoria is not privately owned, it is owned by the State Government and it is their responsibility to adequately fund, maintain and operate.

There is a wonderful Friends Group and they and their supporters conducted the underground tours at no cost to the Government prior to COVID closing the underground tours.

This once wonderful tourist attraction has been starved of funds and it is time for the Government to step up, fund it properly and re-open it fully as soon as possible.

The Government claims that some equipment needs upgrading and the cost estimate is less than \$1 million.

Prior to the November State Election, the State Government gave grants to three privately owned companies on Phillip Island totalling just on \$7 million dollars.

One of those companies received \$5.2 million.

Without question, if the Government can give over \$5 Million to a private company on Phillip Island to promote tourism, they would be negligent if they won't provide less than \$1 million to re-open their own facility.

The most authoritative book written on the history of the State Coal Mine was The Wonthaggi Coalfields, a story of the men and the mines by Phillip Harper.

His father was one of 13 men killed in the disastrous 20 Shaft explosion in 1937.

Newhaven College students have their say on ATAR's future

THE recent debate on whether to abandon the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) since it only considers a student's academic skills has sprung the attention of VCE students at Newhaven College.

Year 12 students Oscar Healey, Brinn Hamley, Niamh Moore, and Gabe Pascoe together with Principal Tony Corr, discussed the pros and cons of the current VCE scaling system, while suggesting alternative eligibility criteria.

The question rose on whether the ATAR that currently stands is actually serving what its intended to do.

Mr Tony Corr stated that at the moment it's a system that is largely based around exams, SAC scores and ranking, and that then determines your overall ranking and therefore your university.

"We as a school, also really value what we call a holistic education, so we're encouraging students to have community projects in volunteerism, co-curricular activities, leadership opportunities, outdoor education, as well as offering music and drama programs, and we see these as a very important part of education and in theory, none of that goes into their ATAR score," said Mr Corr.

Year 12 student Gabe is working towards being accepted into a Bachelor of Science at Melbourne University and he addressed the issue by stating that:

"In terms of academics, I believe it is really fair in how it scales the academic subjects, but where it falls in my opinion is when a university gets your name and your score, they know nothing about what you've done – it really is just the subjects that do you that matter."

"I believe scholarships in

Australian universities could be a good way of encouraging a broader range of people to undergo tertiary education. I know a lot of people that are heavily involved in sport that want to go onto university, but these aren't necessarily the subjects that scale up to give them the score they need," said Gabe.

Universities are currently accepting those that achieve a certain ATAR score despite the subjects, as someone can succeed no matter what subjects they undergo.

However, it is certainly harder for some students than it is for others and Gabe continues in saying that 'the current ATAR result doesn't give a university an insight into who the student is.'

Another issue raised was the current downscaling of folio subjects and all art subjects in general. Year 12 student Niamh has a vision of studying a Bachelor of Arts, focusing on humanities and

design but states that universities don't take into consideration the level of preparation that goes into a student's portfolio.

"In order to start a career in arts or design, businesses are looking at your portfolio and early entries – things that besides the ATAR that do define a student. Mature aged students are accepted without an ATAR but the work we've completed throughout our schooling isn't considered," said Niamh.

"I'm not dismissing that language and sciences are naturally harder and do require more work, in which case they should be scaled up; however, folio subjects do require just as much work and a lot more preparation."

Year 12 student Brinn Hamley goes onto to speak about her goal in getting into a Bachelor of Early Childhood Education and how already in term one of her final year, she is already feeling the stress of SACs and exams.

"We are all feeling the overwhelming pressure to isolate ourselves to study, to put a hold on our social lives, but this isn't good for our mental health, and this stress could also then affect our work when we're doing exams and therefore alter our end result," said Brinn.

The pressure of exams is a major factor in many students overall result, and Principal Tony Corr stated that "from a principal's perspective, it disappoints me very much at the end of year 12 when a student who's contributed in so many ways during their 13 years of school, for whatever reason, their ATAR isn't at the level they expected, and that's their last moment."

"They leave the school feeling a little bit down and despondent and I don't think that's how we want a young person to enter the world, especially when they've done so much for so long, and too many of them are in that category."

New pathways for secondary school students

AS PART of the State Government's major reforms to school-based vocational education and senior secondary schooling, the VCE Vocational Major and Victorian Pathways Certificate will replace VCAL from this year.

The integrated certificate will offer students more choice and flexibility in their studies.

Bass Coast College are offering VCE Vocational Major this year.

VCE VM Coordinator Jim Lees said they have three classes at year 11 and one at year 12.

"Bass Coast College has always strongly supported Vocational Pathways for our students, our VCAL program that we used to run prior to this year was very popular and well supported within our community. We continue to support our students with the VM moving forward," said Jim.

VM students complete four core subjects (English, Mathematics, Personal Development Skills and Work-Related Skills), as well as a choice from a small selection elective subjects such as VCE PE, VCE Design Technology (either textiles or engineering), and VCE Music.

On top of these VCE electives

students can also choose to undertake Certificate II in Furniture Making Pathways, Certificate II in Outdoor Recreation, or a Cert III in Visual Arts. This ensures students are meeting the requirements of nationally recognised training set out by the VCAA, as well as catering to their interests.

"Students at Bass Coast College also engage with our local community and employers in

Structured Workplace Learning or in some cases as a School Based Apprenticeship. This provides the students with an immersion within an industry they wish to explore as a future career pathway," said Jim.

"We also have a number of VCE VM students undertaking adult learning at both TAFE and RTO, both within our community and, in some cases, to the Southeast suburbs of

Melbourne. The goal of our VCE Vocational Major is to provide our students with opportunities to explore and pursue a career in an industry they have a passion for."

Students in the VCE Vocational Major are required to complete 180 hours of VET paired with their choice of other traditional VCE studies and time in the workplace, all of which provides credit toward their VCE.

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More medical students in regional areas

THE Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) has called on governments to facilitate more regional and rural placements for medical school students to encourage future doctors to live and work outside of major cities.

It comes following reports of a study looking at more than 2000 University of Queensland medical students between 2011 and 2021. All of the University's students must do a six-week placement in a smaller rural community in their third year.

The study also found that even those who just did the 12-week placement were three times more likely to work outside the major cities.

RACGP Rural Chair Associate Professor Michael Clements urged the nation's leaders to heed the study's results.

He also urged all future doctors to consider a career outside of a major city.

"Ask any GP outside of a major city and they will tell you that as a rural or regional GP you are an integral and valued member of your community. Your skill set will soar early in your career because rural communities rely on their GP for the majority of their health and wellbeing needs, particularly when other specialist health services or hospital care is a long drive away."

Snapshot of Gippsland's health and wellbeing

A NEW fact sheet, released by Gippsland Primary Health Network, provides a snapshot of the Gippsland community including health, wellbeing, education, social and employment data.

Gippsland PHN Chief Executive officer, Amanda Proposch, said Gippsland had unique health and wellbeing priorities. Data includes:

- Gippsland has an older population with 24.8% aged 65 years or older, compared to 16.8% across Victoria.
- The population is increasing rapidly in Baw Baw and Bass Coast
- Children in low income or welfare dependent families – 15.4% Gippsland 9.3% Victoria
- Adults who report feeling undervalued by society – 12.5% Gippsland 11% Victoria
- Children years 5-6 report being bullied – 18.9% Gippsland 15.9% Victoria
- Adults who had no money to buy food in the past year – 7.9% Gippsland 5.9% Victoria
- Aged pension (people 65 years and over) – 67.4% Gippsland 58.1% Victoria
- Gaming machine losses per head (adults) - \$591 Gippsland \$553 Victoria
- People who travel to work by public transport – 1.5% Gippsland 12.6% Victoria
- Full-time participation in secondary school education at age 16 – 81.2% Gippsland 88.5% Victoria

- Current smokers (adults per 100 people) – 19 Gippsland 16 Victoria
- Consumed alcohol at levels likely to increase lifetime risk of harm (adults per 100 people) – 65 Gippsland 60 Victoria
- Health and social assistance are the largest employing industry in Gippsland, and it has grown from 11.3% of employment in February 2020 to 16% in November 2022
- The Australian Digital Inclusion Index (<https://www.digitalinclusionindex.org.au/>) has been developed to measure the digital divide between populations. The low Gippsland index highlights low digital inclusion

(64.2 compared to 72.0 across Victoria), impacting access to a broad range of services, including health.

Ms Proposch said Gippsland PHN would continue to work with the community and partners to identify solutions that meet the needs of communities, providers, and other stakeholders.

Boosting cancer screening rates

GIPPSLAND Primary Health Network (Gippsland PHN) has partnered with 19 local general practices to boost screening rates for bowel, breast, and cervical cancer, and testing for hepatitis B and C.

A report by the University of Melbourne, prepared from the Victoria Department of Health, shows the COVID-19 pandemic has delayed patients' screening and diagnostic appointments, contributing to a 30 per cent reduction in cancer notifications since restrictions were applied in Victoria in 2020.

Participating general practices submitted an expression of interest to participate in the Gippsland PHN Maximising Cancer Screening project, that is currently underway until June 2023. During this time, practices will choose one of the focal cancer screening types and will be supported by Gippsland PHN to embed screening activities.

These activities include extracting clinic data to identify patients who are under screened or have never been screened, facilitated learning workshops and opportunities to share, network and connect with other practices involved in the project.

An incentive payment of \$12,000 will be given to participating practices that complete the program.

Bystanders helping save lives

VICTORIAN bystanders are stepping up to help save lives as cardiac arrest emergency cases reach record highs, according to new research by Ambulance Victoria (AV).

The latest Victorian Ambulance Cardiac Arrest Registry (VACAR) Annual Report reveals paramedics responded to 7,361 cardiac arrests in 2021/22 – a rise of 5.8 per cent.

When cardiac arrests were witnessed by members of the public, 79 per cent of people were willing to step up and commence life-saving cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) – up from 77 per cent a year earlier.

More bystanders are also using public automated external defibrillators (AEDs) which significantly improve survival rates. In 2021/22, 107 cardiac arrest patients received a shock from an AED before paramedics arrived, up from 82 the year prior.

There are three simple steps to save someone's life: Call (Call Triple 000), Push (Perform CPR) and Shock (use an AED).

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Pioneer Palaces of Rhyll

The remaining nine historic cottages

TAKE a step back in time on the Pioneer Palaces of Rhyll tour on Saturday, April 29. Join the Phillip Island and District Historical Society in partnership with the Bass Coast Branch of the National Trust and supported by the Bass Coast Shire Council as they tour the remaining nine historic cottages of Rhyll.

Learn about the lives of the early inhabitants and the roles they played in shaping the history of Phillip Island.

Two guided tours will run on the day, with a choice of 9am or the afternoon tour commencing at 1pm – both meeting at the Rhyll Mechanics Institute Hall on Lock Road and inclusive of morning or afternoon tea.

Participants get to experience the Jansson Cottage, Richardson Cottage, Len McFee's Cottage, Almond Villa - Lock's Cottage, Rimutara, Heath Hill - McIlwraith's Cottage, Stradbroke House - Smith's Cottage, Minota, and Mot Pena - Underdown's Cottage.

The delightful cottages date back to the 1800s with the Almond Villa very significant – it is one of the earliest cottages built in approximately 1868. It is likely that it was built from materials from the deserted oystering settlement located at Rhyll foreshore which finished up in the early 1860s.

Captain John Barnard Lock who was a master mariner, came to Australia from England in the mid-1850s. He commenced transporting oysters from Rhyll to Geelong – which were destined for the goldfields. He and his wife

Elizabeth moved from Geelong to Rhyll in about 1860 – that's eight years before the Island was opened for subdivision. At that time the Island was leased by the McHaffies – with the exception of the areas licenced to those who were engaged in the business of fishing.

When Captain Lock and his wife Elizabeth lived here in the early 1860s, they would have originally lived in one of the cottages in the first oystering settlement which was on the east side of Rhyll – between the yacht club and former caravan park.

In October 1861 Elizabeth gave birth to their first child Martha Ann Lock – the first European girl born on the Island, unfortunately she was born blind.

It is said that Captain Lock was the true founder of the village of Rhyll.

The Rimutara – William and Annie McFee's Cottage was built by Bill Richardson (owner and builder of Richardson's Cottage) in 1887 at a cost of 204 pounds for William and Annie McFee as their summer house.

It was originally called Rimutara meaning Pleasant Island in the Maori language, as New Zealand was where William lived with his parents, in his youth, for ten years.

At the time William bought his land in Rhyll, he owned an ironmongery store in

Melbourne, employing 16 men – which today would be called a hardware store.

During the summer period, the family would reside in Rimutara for months at a time, with William travelling back to his business in Melbourne on a Monday morning by ferry to Stony Point, then onto Melbourne by steam train, returning each Friday for the weekend on the Island with his family.

The McFee family including their ten children, moved from their permanent residence in Hawthorn to the Island after losing a great deal of their wealth in the land crash of the early 1890s. Before their move the cottage was extended to cater for their permanent occupation.

William was a shire councillor for Woolamai and Phillip Island Shire for 35 years.

Local historians will lead the guided coach tour of these nine historic homes, all located in the beautiful hamlet of Rhyll. Each tour is expected to run for three hours and includes refreshments at one of the cottages.

This year's theme for the annual Heritage Festival is 'Shared Stories' and the stories of the residents of these cottages will be admirably shared with all participants.

The Gippsland Deer Forum held in Meeniyan explored control options to manage the growing problem of feral deer.

Deer - a growing problem locally

FERAL deer cannot be eradicated from Gippsland but can be managed via collaborative programs involving coordinators, all land managers and recreational and professional hunters. There is also the opportunity to turn a pest into a resource by developing robust demand and supply chains for wild-caught Gippsland venison.

These were the key messages that emerged from the Gippsland Deer Forum hosted by the South Gippsland Landcare Network (SGLN), South Gippsland Shire Council, Victorian Deer Community Control Network (VDCCN) and Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) last week. Held at Meeniyan, the Forum explored the current control options and framework to manage the growing problem of feral deer which will cost the Victorian economy up to \$2.1 billion over the next 30 years if the current population growth and spread continues.

The 60 people who attended the Forum were a diverse mix of farmers, life stylists

and recreational and professional hunters. Responding to concerns about the economic and environmental damage caused by feral deer, participants also included five South Gippsland Shire Councillors, one Baw Baw Shire Councillor and state MP, Danny O'Brien.

A highlight of the forum was the case study presented by a founding member of the Cape Liptrap Community Deer Control Group, Cheryl Batagol.

Cheryl shared the group's journey from realising the extent of the feral deer problem to developing a strategic plan and more recently, working with a commercial harvester. She also described the strong sense of community arising from the group's efforts which were celebrated at a Deer-hunters' Ball held at Tarwin Lower last week. Ninety people, including recreational hunters assisting the group, attended the Ball which raised \$15,000, much of which will be used for future deer control.

There was also significant interest in the discussion, led by Dominic Britten

of Gippsland Wild Foods, about developing a market for wild-caught Gippsland venison. Valued highly in many other countries such as New Zealand, venison is a low-fat meat that is currently underutilised in Australia. Stimulating demand for the product could create employment and lead to large numbers of deer being removed from the region.

Importantly, there was general agreement that feral deer control needs dedicated funding to have facilitators in the regions assisting landowners, businesses and public land managers to work together to raise awareness and develop solutions for their areas.

Take advantage of firewood collection season

THE Nationals Member for Gippsland South, Danny O'Brien said the firewood collection season is a great opportunity for locals to get out and gather firewood for free while also helping to remove debris from our forest floors.

"Firewood is a critical source of heat (and even cooking and hot water) for many Gippslanders, particularly as rising energy prices make alternative heating sources unmanageable in the already stretched family budget," Mr O'Brien said.

"If you are in a position to do-so, I also encourage you to think about your neighbours and relatives

who might not be able to collect wood for themselves.

"Whilst there is a 2 cubic metre per day per person restriction on collecting, you can collect for others if they complete a nomination form."

Mr O'Brien said nomination forms are available at DEECA offices and on the website ffn.vic.gov.au/firewood.

"The collection of firewood is a great way to help tidy up our national parks and Crown land and help reduce the risk of bushfire and I will continue to lobby for accessible areas to be available for collection across Gippsland."

Mr O'Brien said for those who are unable to collect their own wood or require more than the allowed 16 cubic metres, there are concessions available for eligible households.

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Landholders to be compensated

THE State Government has announced it will pay landholders who host transmission lines \$8000 per kilometre per year for 25 years indexed to CPI as the state's energy transformation gets underway.

Environmental justice group Friends of the Earth welcomes the news saying it's a good step in the right direction, and there is more to be done to deliver real community benefits and protections for the natural environment as transmission is rolled out.

Friends of the Earth has been consulting with regional communities in Gippsland to understand their interests and concerns about transmission, and learn about what is needed to make sure transmission is done properly.

Gippsland farmer Ursula Alquier says:

"It's no surprise communities are concerned about the large buildout of transmission infrastructure in Victoria and it's absolutely critical the government gets its landholder and community benefits strategy right early on."

"This is a step in the right direction and now we need the government to deliver stronger community benefits and coordinate engagement on the ground."

Friends of the Earth says a proper plan for community engagement needs to be matched with real protections for the environment.

Friends of the Earth will continue to listen and engage with people in Gippsland to learn more about their interests, concerns and visions for the energy transformation.

Mangrove restoration project a success

A LOCAL two-year project to restore mangroves within the Western Port Bay area is finishing this June.

The 'Reel Big Fish' Restoration Project was delivered by Bass Coast Landcare Network in partnership with Parks Victoria and Oz Fish with a connection to Deakin University.

The project was funded by Melbourne Water and occurred across four sites of Phillip Island and Bass Coast.

Acting Project Coordinator and Bass Coast Landcare Facilitator, Joel Kilgour said that the planting of the mangroves was a success, particularly at Scenic Estate,

Phillip Island.

"Last year we found at Scenic Estate we had 71 per cent survival after 12 months which we are stoked about" he said.

"After the first 12 months were fairly confident that a lot of them will grow to be mature plants eventually. They will thin out a bit naturally but it is definitely giving them a good chance."

Joel said that other sites of success, were Tenby Point with a 25 per cent survival rate and Queensferry with a 34 per cent survival rate.

He explained that "traditionally people get a 1 or 2 per cent survival rate with mangrove revegetation."

The project's aim was fish restoration and nursery, bird life habitat and to stop coastal erosion.

Murray Wannan, president of the Corinella Boating and Angling Club said that the mangrove restoration project "was good for fishing but also good for the bay."

"The re-establishment of the mangroves will help reduce erosion and help with better water quality for Western Port," he shared.

Mangroves offer a range of benefits. They sustain fish habitats for fishing and provide habitat for birds. They also sequester and store carbon, protect coast lines and promote tourism.

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



Award winning painter donates work to help feed families

KARIN Ellis and Ken Griffiths met when Wonthaggi Secondary College, the school they were both working at, got a new arts wing.

Karin was teaching dance and performing arts and Ken was teaching art.

"I ended up in an office with a few people including Ken, we were very polite to each other for 10 years," explains Karin.

When Ken later found himself as a single and available man, he asked Karin to go to Sydney to see the surrealist exhibition and their relationship of more than 30 years began.

Prior to meeting Ken, Karin had moved from Melbourne to Dollar to live self-sufficiently with her first husband and two daughters.

"We had a house cow and the sheep and chooks and ducks and it was a great time, but often there just wasn't enough to feed the family."

While the pair had continued running a guitar repair business they had begun in Melbourne, the costs of travel to and from Melbourne meant profit margins were low and things became financially difficult for the family.

"At one point I got quite desperate, and I went down to Foster which is the nearest town... and asked if there was any way I could be helped just to get myself through with some staples... And they were more than happy to help, and I got a monetary voucher to go to the supermarket... so that was terrific..."

But by the end of that same year, things hadn't changed much.

"Then came Christmas and things were a bit bleak and Christmas morning, bang, bang, bang, at the door and it was two people with this huge hamper... and I still get goosebumps thinking about open-

ing the door... it had little gifts for the girls, and it was just very, very thoughtful."

Karin was so grateful for the donation that she started volunteering with the shire, where she worked assisting children in their homes for a few months.

While volunteering, someone recognised her from her earlier days of dancing in Melbourne and she got a job teaching dance for 10 years at the ballet school in Meenyan.

Following this, she taught at the Wonthaggi Secondary College, where she subsequently met Ken.

Ken had taught art for 10 years at Wonthaggi Secondary College, and while he had been an avid illustrator since the age of 14, he says, "I discovered how to paint."

He was noticed by an Exhibitor on the Gold Coast and he and Karin moved there for the promise of an exhibition and full promotion of Ken's work.

"Although I had a successful

exhibition, I ended up working at a hardware store, in the nursery section. I was in charge of the nursery for five or six years."

Ken's knowledge of plants grew.

"Of course, being in charge of a plant nursery, my taxonomy of plants is pretty good. I understand plants pretty well."

...And Karin's knowledge of hanging paintings grew.

"In the time we've been together I've learnt to ply my hand to the canvases... and I've hung the Inverloch Art Show for quite some years," said Karin.

Karin got called to be on the committee meeting of the Inverloch Art Show, but she wasn't sure what they did with the money raised.

"When I found out, I'm sitting there, and I got some tears in my eyes."

She says she decided to ask Ken to donate a painting,

"...he agreed since that

whole thing had helped me so much when I was a young mum."

Over the past decade, Ken has become a locally renowned artist and won a huge number of awards for his paintings and has also previously and generously donated his work in the past for community benefit.

"When Artspace was first established, Karin and I were foundation members of it, and I put in another painting... of cement works and poppies for a raffle so we could start buying the systems and rods to hang paintings on."

"This time, Karin asked me whether I'll do it, and I just said yes, and we walked around the house and chose that painting," – the Hippeastrums.


The Hippeastrums shows beautiful white and pink flowers (hippeastrums) in full bloom against a backdrop of a derelict building which blends into an apparently barren earth.

"That building in the back was in Ballarat, which is my hometown," said Ken.

The painting was inspired by a similar, earlier work and Ken's knowledge of plants; and the interest that the contrast between a man-made industrial landscape and the natural beauty of nature incites.

"It looked really pretty, and really contrasted the industrial waste and dirty sort of building with beautiful flowers in front, it's a really nice conjunction, a good system."

Hippeastrums, displayed at Artspace Gallery in Wonthaggi, was one of the raffle prizes for the Inverloch Art Show, with funds raised going to buy food boxes for local families and individuals experiencing short term difficulties.

A FEW things are guaranteed to occur, life will always come with death and taxes. And a long weekend on Phillip Island will always come with wind or rain or if you're really lucky, both!

For those who aren't into fishing or the competitive nature of a fishing competition then you may not be aware of another occurrence that happens.

The weeks even the days that lead up to a fishing competition the reports are so fruitful you would think we are reading the menu at a fish market.

The numbers are plentiful, the species are varied and the sizes, well let's just say they aren't exaggerated. But around comes the weekend, everyone is excited for the fishing competition.

This weekend just gone we ran our seventh annual Easter fishing Comp for the Good Friday appeal, which was run over the four days of Easter.

Although the weather wasn't favourable and the ramps for most of the weekend remained partially empty, the window for fishing, Friday was wide open.

A lot of the fish we weighed for the weekend came from Good Friday which as usual turned out to be much better than expected.

Light winds, a little drizzly, overcast and flat water, the good cocktail for fishing, but as per previously stated the larger fish we were seeing the week before had disappeared.

The comp began at 6am Good



Tuna was difficult to catch on the weekend but Ash was lucky enough to find a couple.

Friday and up until about 3pm that day, the largest fish we had weighed was a 190g whiting.

The good thing about running a fishing comp is that there is a larger amount of people on the water covering a larger area.

A lot of the entrants went out the front chasing the tuna/kingfish to win the major prize, but we only saw two all weekend, yes two!

The majority of reports from the comp were whiting, which dominated, only a very small handful were over the 500g size though, a lot falling in the 300g category.

This year due to some extra generous donations we were able to offer the open category of heaviest snapper, which brought in a nice early red weighing over the 3kg mark from the top of the bay.

One of the main things from the

weekend was the majority of fish weighed were by our junior and small fry categories... it's always good to see the kids coming up to weigh their fish and grabbing their catch out of the esky themselves without mum and dads help.

Not as many calamari as we would normally see in our competition being weighed, but the largest, going just over 1kg was one of the few caught.

Overall, the number of fish that were weighed for the quality of the fishing days was still positive. As murphies law states, we will be back to seeing the big fish next week.

Despite the above, we had record entries and because of the generosity of everyone involved, those fishing and especially

sponsors, donated a record amount for the weekend of \$3675, taking our total to over \$20,000 since we started the comp.

With the school holidays the next two weeks, we are hoping the weather improves slightly so more people can get out and get some fish.

The water temperature is dropping so we will start to see a changeover in the fish that are around and hopefully the larger 3kg plus salmon the guys are seeing offshore start moving in as the reports from the beaches have been very slow.

We will of course see some of the rubbish fish move in but the pay off is the table species that will be caught are generally very healthy and in good condition with their winter fat layers making them well worth the effort of heading out for a fish.

Mel has now finished up in preparation for the impending birth of her first child and the next stages in her family's life, but she won't be far and no doubt will show up on our Facebook posts from time to time and we will wait and see what the spring brings if she is to return.

I will continue the normal shop hours until the end of April then I will go into our reduced winter hours and closing during the week.

Pivotal years for Mirboo North Tigers

WHEN Mirboo North easily won Mid Gippsland's 1956 and 1957 senior football premierships, the club decided to join the stronger South Gippsland Football League.

In those days, Mirboo North wore a royal blue woollen jumper with a red number on the back and was known as the Blues.

Mirboo North had comfortably defeated Dumbalk and Hill End by 39 and 41 points respectively, and with a star-studded side — that included the five Snell brothers — was looking for bigger fish to fry on the football field.

The SGFL included the larger towns of Leongatha, Korumburra and Wonthaggi and it was also commencing an under 16 thirds competition for the 1958 season.

A feature of the SGFL was the home team wore white shorts.

Mirboo North was off to a disastrous start when reigning SGFL premier, Korumburra, cleaned up the Blues by 69 points, after unfurling its 1957 pennant in front of the packed Korumburra grandstand.

After Mirboo North reversed its opening round loss to the Cats midway through the season, the two clubs faced each other again on grand final day at Leongatha.

Korumburra controlled the opening term, booting 4. 6 and restricting the Blues to two behinds.

Then, under Gordon Abbott's astute coaching, Mirboo North recorded 15 of the next 16 goals and secured its third consecutive flag across two leagues by 58 points.

Abbott knew football inside and out, having played in Geelong's 1937 and Essendon's 1942 and 1946 premiership sides.

Stars that day for the Blues were 17-year-old ruckman,

Michael Patterson, who debuted with Richmond the following year, wingman Brian Burville and Alan 'Pud' Snell, with four goals.

There were slim pickings for Mirboo North for the next five years, before it lost a tight grand final to Leongatha in 1964 by a goal.

The Blues continued their upward swing and took out the 1966 SGFL flag with a decisive 12.13.85 to 4.9.33 victory over Wonthaggi at Leongatha in glorious spring sunshine — a week after St Kilda defeated Collingwood by a point in the VFL grand final at the MCG.

Included in Mirboo North's line-up were talented teenage high school students, Anthony Prowse, John Kiss, Robert Fowkes and the silky-smooth,

Neil 'Greezer' Breeden, plus Ron Mullins and 'Pud' Snell from its 1958 flag team.

Snell, who lifted his Mirboo North senior premierships tally to four, capped off a brilliant year with a best on ground performance, after also winning the SGFL's 1966 best and fairest award.

Barry McCartin was the Blues' spearhead and leading SGFL goal kicker, having taken up the sport the previous year as a 25-year-old recruit.

Bernie Mercer added a third Mirboo North flag to his football resume, after representing Korumburra in the 1958 grand final and also winning the Cats' best and fairest award the same year.

Mirboo North's last appearance in the SGFL came in the

1968 first semi-final, when it was soundly beaten by Leongatha.

At the season's end, the SGFL was abandoned by the Victorian Country Football League.

As a result, Mirboo North returned to Mid Gippsland, Leongatha joined the Latrobe Valley Football League, whilst Korumburra and Poowong moved to the West Gippsland and Ellinbank Leagues respectively.

Stony Creek and MDU went to Alberton and Wonthaggi shifted to the Bass Valley Football League.

In its 11 years in the SGFL, Mirboo North won two senior premierships, as well as the 1958 and 1963 thirds flags against Korumburra and Leongatha.

Andy Taylor's immense contribution leads to MGFNL Hall of Fame

MIRBOO North Football Netball Club's Andy Taylor was warmly welcomed as a member of the Mid Gippsland Football Netball League (MGFNL) Hall of Fame at Monday's season-opening event in Morwell.

His contributions to the Tigers, MGFNL and the Latrobe Valley Umpires Association are immense, and he remains a passionate volunteer, currently being the club's vice president of football.

"You can get so much enjoyment out of volunteering," Taylor said, urging others to take up opportunities to do so, and describing footy clubs as great environments where everyone is welcome regardless of their backgrounds.

Taylor's footy journey began as a Mirboo North junior in the 1970s.

While he moved to Melbourne to undertake his apprenticeship after leaving high school, Taylor returned to Gippsland in the 1990s with his family, becoming actively involved at the Boolarra Football Netball Club where he helped establish junior footy

teams.

A shift into dairy farming brought Taylor back to Mirboo North in the late 1990s and his wholehearted commitment since has seen him take on a variety of roles, playing a major part in bringing on and off-field success back to the club.

He has contributed to the development of junior footballers through coaching the Thirds and Fourths, also spending

time as senior assistant coach, and having coached netball.

Taylor helped oversee the merging of Mirboo North's football and netball clubs during his time as president.

He's held a number of club executive positions and played a key role in achieving infrastructure projects, helping provide a better environment for all at the club.

He paid tribute to all those who have contributed to improved facilities.

"The facilities at Mirboo North used to be atrocious," Taylor said, making it clear he has enjoyed doing his bit to improve the situation.

Mirboo North's Hall of Fame nomination for Taylor spoke of the widespread respect he has earned from parents, players, members, those at opposition clubs, and from league executives.

"Andy's wise counsel is appreciated at an MGFNL director (delegate) level, as well as within our club," the nomination stated.

Taylor said footy is in his blood and he wouldn't change a thing when it comes to the many roles he has played.

"We won't necessarily wind the club up," he said.

"If the club stays as an entity, it will be able to do fundraising events somewhere along the line."

Miller said nobody at this month's meeting expressed a desire to shut down the club, with everyone keen to see it maintained, even if in a non-playing capacity for now.

He said while superficially there appear to be enough youngsters at local schools to get junior cricket up and running, there need to be sufficient numbers in the right age group interested in cricket and parents also need to be onboard.


