# Mushroom murderer guilty of all charges

ERIN Patterson, the Leongatha mother of two, found guilty of three counts of murder and one of attempted murder in Morwell yesterday, did not flinch as the foreman read out her four guilty

Maybe there was a flutter of the eves from Erin as the first of the murder verdicts was entered, for Heather Wilkinson, age 66.

And perhaps she swallowed once as another of Korumburra's well-loved former residents, Gail Patterson, 70, was named.

But, honestly, there was noth-

Courtroom 4 was packed, with media, interested members of the public, Detective Eppingstall and members of the homicide squad, and both legal teams, although Crown Prosecutor Dr Nanette Rogers was a notable absentee.

The air was sucked out of the room as the jury entered, and Erin Patterson stood for her moment of truth in the familiar swirls of her brown paisley shirt.

"On the charge of attempted murder against Ian Wilkinson, do you find the accused Erin Patterson guilty or not guilty?" asked the judge's associate. "Guilty".

"On the charge of murder against Heather Wilkinson, do you find the accused Erin Patterson guilty or not guilty?" "Guilty".

"On the charge of murder against Gail Patterson, do you find the accused Erin Patterson guilty or not guilty?" "Guilty".

"On the charge of murder against Donald Patterson, do you find the accused Erin Patterson guilty or not guilty?" "Guilty".

It was quite a moment, not just because the marathon trial was into its 11th week, not just because the eyes of the world were on Morwell, Leongatha and Korumburra, not just because the jury deliberated for six days but because ordinary people realised for the first time that such evil existed in the world.

Justice Beale had warned against outbursts. There weren't any. Just a stunned silence as the enormity of one of Victoria's most heinous crimes sank in.

No one spoke outside afterwards. One of Erin Patterson's friends, who has been in court most days, worked her way through the media pack, with the help of court security staff, tears in her eyes, but without saying

A representative of the Patterson family also left without speaking, as did Colin Mandy SC, Erin Patterson's defence counsel, and Detective Eppingstall. Although police have since issued a

statement in relation to the verdict handed down in relation to the deaths of Gail and Don Patterson and Heather Wilkinson:

"Victoria Police acknowledges the decision of the jury today.

"Our thoughts are with the respective families at this time and we acknowledge how difficult these past two years have been for them. We will continue to support them in every way possible following this decision.

"We would also like to acknowledge the work of Homicide Squad detectives over the course of this complex investigation, as well as the significant support received from a number of other areas across Victoria Police."

They said the Patterson and Wilkinson families will not be supplying a statement via Victoria Police and have asked for privacy at this time.

"At this stage, Victoria Police will not be facilitating any requests for interviews in relation to this verdict."

Detective Inspector Dean Thomas, who had oversight of the investigation, spoke to the assembled media after the verdict and said it was important to remember that the victims were loved family members and that the families deserve their privacy at this stage.

#### 'The right verdict'

Throughout the trial, a number of members of the public, some of whom operate social media sites, have followed the evidence

One of them, Tammy Egglestone, who runs a True Crime Podcast on Instagram, said she thought it was the right outcome.

"It was a little unknown, though, because the defence put in so much doubt, but in the end, they didn't buy it," said Ms Egglestone.

"Overall, it was a tragedy but I don't believe there wasn't a motive and we may never know what it was. I don't believe she did it for no reason.'

The three charges of murder and one of attempted murder arose out of a family lunch of Beef Wellington, green beans, mashed potato and packet gravy, painstakingly prepared by Erin Patterson at her Leongatha home on July 29, 2023, as a special lunch for her husband Simon's parents and his aunt and uncle.

But, as has been revealed by the jury verdict, Erin Patterson went looking for death cap mushrooms, the most poisonous mushrooms in the world, researched how to prepare them and dry them so they could be secreted in the individual packages of Beef Wellington and then tricked the Pattersons and Wilkinsons into attending the lunch with a bogus claim about having cancer.

#### 'Beyond a reasonable doubt'

During the 10-week trial, the court heard from 53 witnesses, viewed 125 exhibits and ran up almost 4000 pages of transcripts.

Was it the "compelling" evidence of Ian Wilkinson, the Pastor of the Korumburra Baptist Church, about the mismatched plates used by Erin Patterson, including four large grey plates for her guests and a smaller plate for herself, orangey-tan

One of Erin Patterson's friends, who has been in the courtroom most days, left without making comment on the verdict. in colour, that raised the bar beyond a reasonable doubt?

Was it the choice to make individual portions of Beef Wellington, allowing Erin Patterson to exercise control, according to the prosecution case, with devastating effect over who ate the poisonous meals?

Was it the fabricated cancer claim with which she lured her guests to the fatal family lunch, or the faked illness from death cap mushroom poisoning afterwards?

Was it her unwillingness to help the people she allegedly loved by telling doctors and health care staff that she had included wild mushrooms in the meal, or even asking after their condition as they lay dying in hospital?

Maybe it was because she sent health department officials on a wild goose chase around Asian grocers in the Oakleigh, Clayton and Mt Waverley areas?

Perhaps the jury accepted that the accused must have seen the only two credible sightings of death cup mushrooms ever in Gippsland, posted on the iNaturalist website by Christine McKenzie near the Loch Recreation Reserve on April 18, 2023 and/ or the sighting by Dr Tom May in Neilson Street, Outtrim on May

And coupled with the phone and communications tower data, analysed by world-renowned expert in digital forensic science, Dr Matthew Sorell, that placed Mrs Patterson's phone in the Loch area around that time – did that make the difference?

Or was it the possible visits to both Loch and Outtrim on May 22, 2023, the day after Dr May posted his death cap mushroom sighting?

Perhaps it was her insistence on leaving the Leongatha Hospital after just five minutes. against the medical advice of Dr Chris Webster that she may have been exposed to a deadly dose of death cap mushrooms?

Also, that she initially refused treatment not only for herself but also for her children, who she claimed ate the leftovers?

Was it the fact that she concealed her well-used mobile phone from police when they searched her house a week after the lunch, giving them a dummy phone instead, and then lying during her police interview about which phone number she used?

Was it the fact that she disposed of the deadly dehydrator at the Koonwarra tip the morning after arriving home from hospital in Melbourne, four days after the meal?

Was it her fabricated evidence that she'd been foraging for mushrooms for years, and not just in the four months leading up to the poisonous lunch date?

Or was it that the jury looked at all of the evidence, from the testimony of the 53 witnesses to the 125 exhibits in the case, as pieces of a deadly jigsaw puzzle, allowing them to reach their decision, beyond a reasonable doubt, and deliver a verdict of guilty on all charges?

We'll never know how the jury came to their decision, but we will hear from the judge, Justice Christopher Beale, when he sums up and hands down his sentence in due course.



#### Toora set to host Gippsland Offshore Wind Day

GIPPSLAND Offshore Wind Days is coming to Toora.

Southerly Ten has teamed up with other Gippsland offshore wind projects to host information sessions through July, with Toora on its radar.

The local session is set to be held at the Toora Hall on Wednesday, July 23, from 4pm to 6pm.

The community is encouraged to come along to hear about project plans, meet locals already working in the industry, view maps and share their ideas and feedback.

Government agencies such as VicGrid, Offshore Wind Energy Victoria, and the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water will also be there to answer questions about Victoria's transmission and energy plans.

#### Act on penalty reminder notice or risk enforcement action

VICTORIANS who have an outstanding fine for failing to vote in the 2024 local council elections are urged to act before the matter is referred to Fines Victoria.

Victorians who failed to vote in the October 2024 elections will start receiving a penalty reminder notice this week, which carries a fee of \$29.20 in addition to the original \$99

Electoral Commissioner Sven Bluemmel advised recipients of a penalty reminder notice to act as soon as possible.

"If you receive a penalty reminder notice in the mail, you have three options: pay the fine, request an internal review, or elect to go to court,' Mr Bluemmel said.

"Please get in touch with us if you have any questions or require further clarification because once we hand it over to Fines Victoria for enforcement action, we are unable to further assist."

Non-voters have 28 days to respond to the penalty reminder notice. The Victorian Electoral Commission encourages people who are unsure what to do, or who require assistance throughout any stage of the infringements process, to call 1300 551 575 or visit vec.vic.gov.au/voting/finesand-reviews.

#### Improved satisfaction for **Bass Coast Shire Council**

BASS Coast Shire Council has seen improvements across the board in this year's Community Satisfaction Survey.

Council performed above the Large Rural group average on every measure.

The overall performance score rose to 56, up three points from last year, with steady gains across key service areas.

Waste management remains the highest-rated service, climbing to 65 after three years at 63.

Sealed local roads were another standout, scoring above both group and statewide averages.

The survey was conducted by the Department of Government Services on behalf of participating councils.

A minimum 400 residents and ratepayers over the age of 18 were selected at random to complete the survey.

The survey covered council's overall performance, value for money, overall council direction, customer service, waste management, community decisions, sealed local roads, and consultation and engage-

The purpose of the Statement of Planning Policy is to create a framework for the future use and development of land in Bass Coast to ensure the protection and conservation of Bass Coast's distinctive

# New Wonthaggi servo approved despite early opposition

A DISPUTE over a proposed service station in Wonthaggi seems to have come to a close, with the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) ordering that a planning permit be issued for the project.

The development, at 63-67 McKenzie Street, will see a service station built on formerly residential land where houses were only recently demolished.

Bass Coast Shire Council confirmed the matter was resolved between all parties before the scheduled VCAT hearing, after the company behind the proposal, Pearl Energy, amended its plans to address concerns raised by objectors. As a result, both objectors withdrew from the appeal.

Council told the Sentinel-Times that VCAT subsequently ordered the permit to be issued, but no formal published order exists because the resolution was reached prior to the hearing.

According to the planning permit, the site will allow a service station with associated buildings, works, and signage – including internally illuminated signs – in a General Residential Zone. To proceed,

the developers must first vary a restriction on the land's title that previously limited the land to dwellings only.

The permit sets strict conditions on how the site must operate. Opening hours will be limited to 5.30am to 10.30pm Monday to Friday, and 6am to 10pm on weekends. Deliveries, including fuel, will only be allowed between 7am and 9pm on weekdays and Saturdays, and from 9am to 8pm on Sundays and public holidays.

Noise and lighting controls

will also apply. The developers must install acoustic fencing and manage light spill to minimise impacts on nearby homes. Signs must be kept tidy, must not flash or move, and can only be illuminated during operating hours.

Traffic safety has been a key concern throughout the process. To address this, the service station's entry and exit on McKenzie Street must be "left in, left out only". Additional roadworks, signage, and a modified median island will

be required to prevent right turns in and out of the site.

However, while the permit has now been issued, the project is not fully ready just yet. Council has confirmed that amended plans still need to be submitted and endorsed to ensure all conditions – including drainage, landscaping and traffic management – are met before any construction can begin.

Before works start, the developer must also consolidate the three land titles into one and satisfy various technical and environmental requirements. If the project does not begin within three years, the planning permit will expire.

Pearl Energy's proposed development has drawn community attention since early this year, when residents initially raised concerns about squatters occupying three houses, particularly a doublestorey corner property, that has since been demolished to make way for the project. Now, after a process involving Council, residents and VCAT, the project is set to go ahead but only under detailed conditions aimed at minimising the impact on the surrounding neighbourhood.

### Police seeking information on assault

POLICE were called to Parr Street Leongatha on Saturday night at 6.30pm after a male resident was assaulted. It's understood that three police units attended, and the victim was transferred by road ambulance to the Alfred Hospital with multiple broken bones including arm, wrist and rib, and a contusion to the head.

The victim was released from the hospital on Sunday.

At the time of print, the offender/s are outstanding and it's unknown if the parties are known to each other.

### Poowong rapist awaits sentencing

A 45-YEAR-OLD male from Ferntree Gully was found guilty last Monday, June 30 at Morwell County Court of three charges of rape and one of intentionally cause injury relating to incidents in Poowong in 2020. The case has been adjourned to August 4.

#### Young accused driver denied bail

ON MONDAY June 30, police apprehended a 15-year-old male driver in Leongatha's Boags Road, accused of stealing a Toyota Prius from an Inverloch address the previous night and committing multiple fuel theft offences at various petrol stations in the Latrobe and Bass Coast areas.

It is also alleged the Prius was used to ram a stationary police vehicle.

"At approximately 12 noon on Monday the 30th of June, police observed the same stolen vehicle driving in an erratic manner in and around the township of Leongatha," police stated on the Eyewatch - Bass Coast Police Service Area Facebook page.

After police immobilised the vehicle, the 15-year-old repeat offender from South Gippsland and two young female passengers were arrested at the scene and transported to Wonthaggi Police Station for questioning.

"The 15-year-old male was successfully remanded in custody and fronted the Magistrate where he was further remanded until a later date," police reported.

Police units from South Gippsland, Wonthaggi and Bass Coast CIU were all involved in a coordinated effort.

Some of those commenting on the Facebook post thanked the police, with people surprised but pleased the alleged driver was denied bail.

"Such an outcome would not have been possible without the assistance of community members; as a result, police were able to reduce further risk to public safety and property," the police stated.

# Treaty yeah, treaty later in the year for First Peoples

announced on Friday that it expects to introduce the Statewide Treaty Bill to Parliament later this year.

And a feature of that Bill will be how to evolve the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria into an ongoing representative body to provide advice to Government and make decisions over matters that affect First Peoples.

When it happens, we are likely to have one or two seats at the table including a member of the Bass Coast Reconciliation Network, Gunai man Brian Stevens, and co-chair of the assembly Gunditjmara man Rueben Berg, who shares his time between Phillip Island and the state's south west.

Last Sunday, July 6, Mr Stevens was at the Ngangga Community Festival, chatting with Bass Coast Shire Councillors Tracey Bell, Jon Temby and Tim O'Brien, and

anyone interested in talking about the treaty process.

Victoria's Statewide Treaty Bill is proposed to give the Assembly decision-making powers to make sure First Peoples' communities can design and deliver practical solutions for their communities.

The proposed body will sit within our existing parliamentary and democratic structures. It will not have veto power on policy or legislation – a power that does not exist under Victoria's parliamentary system.

Details about the progress being made on the Treaty Bill follows the tabling of the Yoorrook Justice Commission's Yoorrook for Transformation and final report, Truth be Told.

## San Remo foreshore not acceptable there's got to be a better way

CONCERNED over sporadic maintenance, lack of on-ground management and stalled improvements to the San Remo foreshore local residents and landowners are calling for a better pathway forward.

"There has effectively been no active management since 2019 and the deterioration is plain to see," said San Remo Community Association president Mark

"The San Remo Community Association is committed to returning the 27.5 hectare foreshore reserve to community management, something that worked extremely well for decades," Mr Jamison said.

"San Remo is the fastest-growing town in the region surrounded by water on three sides, and the foreshore is central to both our identity and our future.

"It needs urgent reinstatement, management, and proper

planning, something only a dedicated, local committee can provide. The current management is unacceptable."

Secretary of the San Remo Community Association, Susan Alcock said responsibility for the area was split between Parks Victoria to the high water mark, Bass Coast Shire for the retail precinct, VicRoads to the pine trees alongside the Phillip Island Road, and DEECA for the foreshore.

"DEECA is managed from Traralgon and has refused to do maintenance," said Ms Alcock.

"Bass Coast Shire had to step in as a goodwill gesture to clear scrub and provide access to walking tracks and pick up rubbish," said Ms Alcock.

"The path hasn't been maintained, signs can't be read, and there's graffiti on the walls.

"The San Remo Community Association has exciting plans for the foreshore including a concrete all-abilities walking track from the Post Office to Li-

'We're missing out on grants." Despite repeated requests over several months through Bass Coast MP Jordan Crugnale, the San Remo Community Association said it is yet to meet

"This neglect and total lack of accountability needs to change,' said Mark Jamison.

"The community has made it clear we want the foreshore returned to local, accountable hands, we're not just volunteers, we are an incorporated association with experienced committed and locally engaged committee members.

The foreshore is in desperate need of maintenance upgrades according to Eastern Region Nationals' MP Melina Bath.

"For years a Committee of Management oversaw 27-hectare reserve but that changed in 2019 when DEECA took over," said Ms Bath.

The San Remo Community Association has strong community backing.

"No point in getting angry," said Ms Alcock.

"If we've got a problem we need to find a pathway. We need to clean up the town. Ongoing maintenance is really the biggest problem."

The plan is for safer, accessible footpaths, better signage and amenities, new facilities like a toilet block, saltwater pool, skate park, and recreation centre.

"The retaining wall needs replacing," said Ms Alcock.

'You can't muck around in this environment. Tidy up, relocate, fix it. It's about public

# Inverloch foreshore at risk as emergency meeting called

By Inverloch Foreshore **Action Group** 

THE Inverloch Foreshore Action Group are calling an emergency meeting in Inverloch on Sunday, July 13, to rally community support to save the Inverloch Foreshore and vital community assets.

"The emergency meeting is being called because State Government agencies are now planning a retreat which means vital community assets will be lost including hundreds of homes long term. This will result in a significant section of the Inverloch township as we know it now, lost forever," Action Group member Alan Brown said.

"For the past ten years, the Government has been aware that significant erosion has been occurring at the Inverloch foreshore and should be ashamed of their inaction.

"Presently, significant portions of what remains of the dune formation at Inverloch continue dropping into the ocean and Government agencies are now talking retreat options.

"Retreat means the Government walks away and a significant portion of the Inverloch township as we know it today will be lost," he said.

"Not everyone understands how serious the present issue is regarding the loss of the Inverloch Foreshore. After ten years of government inaction watching the fore-

shore disappear, we now have a full-blown crisis with eventually hundreds of homes at peril of being lost through inundation by the ocean if immediate protective works are not undertaken."

For much of the dunes it is too late, but unless the Government acts immediately. the Inverloch Surf Lifesaving Clubhouse will be lost and the road between Inverloch and Cape Paterson will be cut off.

As a short-term stopgap measure, the Government is considering pumping sand from the Inlet at a cost of millions of dollars before they retreat. With absolute certainty, unless protective measures are put in front of

that freshly pumped sand slurry it will all be lost. We know this as a certainty as for months the Bass Coast Shire Council, to their credit, has been placing hundreds of tons of sand around the Surf Lifesaving Clubhouse in an attempt to save the building but the sand is washed away within days of it being placed there. In fact, it often disappears later the same day. The Action Group commends the Council for their valiant effort to save the Clubhouse but obviously what is desperately needed is for the Government to put in permanent protective works in front of the Clubhouse as a matter of extreme urgency.

They have done exactly that at Silverleaves at Cowes on Phillip Island in recent weeks so the question is why are they saving Silverleaves but walking away from Inverloch?

"People need to be in no doubt, they are planning a short-term temporary fix which will wash away and be lost as they retreat," Mr. Brown said.

"Last week, highly respected former Woorayl Shire Engineer Keith Godridge, a member of the Action Group, released a comprehensive report on what can be done to save the Inverloch foreshore and community assets permanently."

People should come to the public meeting this Sunday afternoon where Mr. Godridge will explain his report and take questions.

"I implore people to come to the public meeting and hear first-hand, issues surrounding the present crisis and what can be done to save Inverloch and the homes of hundreds of residents.

"The only thing which will save Inverloch now will be people power," Mr. Brown said. "Even if your home is not amongst those at risk, please come along to support your neighbours.

### Poison bait incident alarms dog owners

THE likely poisoning of a dog with a rat bait picked up at the Blue Gum Reserve off-leash dog park in Dunsmore Road, Cowes has local dog owners alarmed.

"It's not the first time," said Cheryl Owens, president of the Phillip Island Dog Owners Association.

According to Janine, the distraught owner of 13-year-old schnauzer Reuben, the bait could have been anywhere in the

"I bought Reuben home today, and all that could be done has been done.

"The Vet is keeping him on Vitamin K and will continue with anti-toxin for rat poison. It's still touch and go."

Cheryl Owens said the incident was of massive concern to all dog owners.

"The problem is we don't have a bait or a toxicology report."

Dog owners have been warned to remain vigilant when walking their dogs in the reserve after a report earlier this year that a dog had died from eating poison bait in the area.

"Janine and Reuben go to the park daily," said Ms Owens.
"Watch your dog, keep your eye on it.

"Apart from the danger to dogs, wildlife in the area is also at risk of ingesting bait. It's a horrible thing to do. It would be a real pity if the only dog park on Phillip Island can't be used."

Reuben's owner said one very important part of rat poisoning everyone should know is that the first symptom can be constipation. Janine took Reuben to the Vet for treatment for constipation, but no other symptoms were present.

Cheryl Owens asked anyone who may see baits to place them in a sealed disposable bag and report it to police.

"Reuben was holding a whopping two kilograms of blood in his tummy so if you don't notice anything else, you will sure notice the swollen tummy," said Janine.

"We walk the whole entire park so please stay vigilant.'

# No easy solution to problem gambling across South Gippsland and Bass Coast

PUNTERS on the Bass Coast spent a whopping \$19.15 million on various forms of gambling in 2024/25 including poker machines, lotteries and sports wagering.

South Gippsland gamblers according to the Victorian Gambling and Casino Control Commission (VGCCC) spent \$6.94 million in the same period.

Losses on poker machines accounted for nearly half of gambling revenue.

According to the VGCCC, the gambling industry is highly lucrative because it taps into people's fantasies of winning big on products that are designed to ensure punters lose more than they win.

Bass Coast gamblers hand over \$1.6 to \$1.7 million to the gambling and lottery industry each month while in South Gippsland gamblers spend \$660,000 a month.

VGCCC CEO Annette Kimmitt said rates of gambling harm in Victoria have increased by 13 per cent over the last 10 years with more than a quarter of gambling participants suffering harm aged 18 to 24 years.

Crown Melbourne accounts for a third of participants experiencing harm in Victoria (36 per cent), sports betting (35 per cent), poker machines (29 per cent) and wagering on horse, harness and greyhound racing (20 per cent).

"The house always wins," said Ms Kimmitt.

"People who experience severe gambling issues are more likely than others to take up inducements like bonus bets, reward programs and early cash-outs, which are often promoted through direct marketing messages.

"Customers who understand these tactics are in a better position to protect themselves from harm," she said.

Examples of how to protect yourself include taking regular breaks, setting and sticking to time and money limits, keeping track of losses, and only gambling when sober.

"The gambling industry spent \$53 million on advertising in Victoria in 2023, much of which seemed to imply that gambling is a game of skill rather than chance," Ms Kimmitt said.

"This type of misinformation can result in people underestimating the risks, as well as their chances of winning, and leading to negative consequences, including serious harm"

Every year more than 400,000 Victorians experience at least one type of gambling harm, such as feelings of guilt

and regret or other psychological distress, relationship problems, financial issues, physical or mental health concerns, and work or study difficulties.

The Salvation Army is actively involved in addressing problem gambling by offering support services and advocating for policy change.

The Salvos provide counselling, financial assistance, and support groups for individuals and families affected by gambling addiction.

# South Gippsland Water tops the state with a rate hike of 6.1%

South Gippsland Water is about to add an extra \$80 a year to your water rates bill.

A typical annual rate bill for a South Gippsland Water user which includes owner/occupier households and those paying rent will jump by 6.1 per cent from

The average water bill from South Gippsland Water will increase from \$1324 to \$1405, the highest increase of any water business in Victoria and well above the state average.

By comparison, a typical water bill for Gippsland Water will increase by 1.9 per cent in 2025/26 from \$1465 to \$1492, and Westernport Water up 2.1 per cent from \$1171 to \$1183.

South Gippsland Water has historically kept water prices low in comparison with other water corporations according to Managing Director Rob Murphy.

"The prices we charge customers are lower than the actual cost of supplying water and wastewater services in the region," said Mr Mur-

"We know a lot of our customers are doing it tough with cost-of-living pressures and we have support measures in place," he said.

An approved tariff schedule released by the Essential Services Commission last week outlined the maximum price each water business can charge for specific

Inflation is blamed as the main driver for an average 2.4 per cent jump in water rates across the state.

Having kept prices historically low, South Gippsland Water said it needed to lift water rates to compensate for the increasing cost of

"Like many others, we are facing increasing costs of electricity, insurance and infrastructure materials, we also have to maintain, renew or repair a significant amount of infrastructure

across the region to deliver water and wastewater services," said Mr Murphy.

"We plan major projects as part of our drive to continuously improve the services we provide to customers and are committed to the Victorian Government Net Zero target to have 100 per cent renewable energy in place by 2025.'

South Gippsland Water has improvement projects planned for the Leongatha, Meeniyan and Wonthagwastewater treatment

A further project to improve water pressure for a localised area of Wonthaggi will begin this month with a noticeable improvement in water pressure for local residents expected by September.

Rob Murphy said the Head Office functions of South Gippsland Water would remain in Foster however a review of the current headquarters had revealed ongoing problems.

We have the occasional roof leak at Foster," said Mr

South Gippsland Water

has looked at refurbishing the Foster offices but found the cost of refurbishment to be almost as much as a new building.

"We're now considering what the best use is for the Foster office, but we have no intention of moving out of the town or proceeding with plans for a single major office facility in Leongatha or Wonthaggi," said Mr Mur-

Chairperson of the Essential Services Commission Gerard Brody encouraged Victorians to reach out to their local water supplier if they're having trouble pay-

## Mount Vermon? Sign spelling error sparks local frustration

A BERRYS Creek couple says a simple spelling mistake on a newly installed road sign is yet another example of council waste - and a sign (no pun intended) that the basics aren't being done

Locals Fergus and Deb first to spot the blunder earlier this week when they noticed the new sign for Mount Vernon Road had been put up with a glaring typo: "Mount Vermon Road".

The couple said the road sign had always been spelled correctly in the past, and they were baffled that the old sign - which seemed to be in good condition - was replaced at all.

"They replaced a perfectly good sign with a misspelled one," Fergus said. "To make matters worse, the new sign had fallen over onto the road, and I had to lift it off the road with the tractor. I reported this to the council. It's just a total waste of money from the council." Fergus said they had raised

the issue with local councillor Brad Snell, who has supportive. The fallen sign has since been stood up again, but the error remains.

Thankfully the O'Connors, who have called Berrys Creek home since 2012, say they're not aware of anyone being confused by the incorrect spelling yet - largely because the road itself is in such poor condition that few want to use it.

"Most people try and avoid the road as it's in a disgraceful state. It's quite dangerous," Fergus said.

The mistake has left Deb shaking her head.

"I couldn't believe that they would make that error, and I couldn't believe how many steps it must've gone through with nobody picking it up.'

The couple say they'd like to see the sign replaced properly - and an explanation for why it was needed in

"Well, it would be sensible to replace the sign with a correct road sign, and it would be very sensible to explain why a perfectly adequate sign was replaced," Deb said.

Fergus added: "If they can't get the little simple things right, how are they supposed to get the big things right?" Contacted for comment,

South Gippsland Shire Council stated: Council was alerted to the spelling mistake on Tuesday and replaced the sign on Thursday.

### 2024-25 Investment **Markets**

Another strong year – But can it last?

ustralian investors have enjoyed another year of solid returns across most major asset classes, with the 2024-25 financial year marking a third consecutive period of strong

Despite early concerns around global instability, inflation, and trade tensions, investment markets delivered betterthan-expected results. According to AMP's Shane Oliver, the performance was driven by central bank interest rate cuts, easing inflation, and resilience in the global economy.

#### **Shares and Property**

Both Australian and global share markets were standout performers. The ASX 200 posted a return of 13.8% over the financial year, led by technology, financial, and telecommunications companies. However, mining stocks lagged, reflecting ongoing concerns about global trade and weaker commodity prices.

International shares fared even better. Global equities returned 13.8% in local currencies, but a weaker Australian dollar pushed this to 18.6% in AUD terms. US and Chinese stocks were particularly strong, buoyed by ongoing enthusiasm for artificial intelligence and easing inflation pressures.

Property investments also rebounded. Listed Australian real estate investment trusts (REITs) delivered a 14% return, while global REITs were up 7.9%. According to CommSec, this marked a turnaround after previous years of underperformance driven by rising interest rates.

Meanwhile, residential housing saw modest growth. Home prices across Australia rose 3.4% overall, with Perth, Brisbane and Adelaide leading the way. The recovery picked up pace in early 2025, again reflecting lower interest

#### **Bonds & Cash**

Fixed income and cash investments also made positive contributions, although more modest than equities. Both Australian and global bonds rebounded during the year as interest rates fell and inflation eased. After several tough years, bonds provided capital gains and helped diversify portfolios.

Cash investments delivered a 4.4% return-stable and in line with expectations. This reflected higher interest rates earlier in the cycle, with recent cuts by the Reserve Bank of Australia expected to bring these returns down over time.

Vanguard Australia noted that bond markets "returned to more typical behaviour" as inflation cooled and central banks shifted from raising rates to holding or cutting them. Income-focused investors saw improved results after a long period of uncertainty.

#### What Comes Next?

Looking ahead, most economists expect returns to be more modest. AMP forecasts average annual growth across diversified asset classes closer to 6-7% over the medium term, due to stretched valuations and ongoing risks.

According to CommBank's Chief Economist Stephen Halmarick, "We've likely seen the peak in returns for this cycle," citing global uncertainty and the limited room for further rate cuts.

Geopolitical risks remain in focus too. Ongoing tensions between the US and major trading partners - including tariff uncertainty and military activity in the Middle East - continue to cast a shadow. Nevertheless, markets have so far proven resilient, and many expect this to continue if economic growth holds up.

#### **Final Thoughts**

After a volatile few years, the 2024-25 financial year proved once again that markets can surprise even in uncertain times but the future is never guaranteed.

# **Chasing foxes and dreams at Corner Inlet**

CAPTURING an elusive fox on Dream Island, tackling weed infestations and keeping watch over threatened beach nesting birds are just some events in the compelling story of the past year of Gippsland Catchment Management Authority's Corner Inlet Connections project.

"It's been another successful year of dedicated work in the Corner Inlet Ramsar site where, for nearly two decades, we've been working with partners and community to protect the inlet's significant natural values," waterways officer for West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority (CMA) Tanya Cowell said. "We're pleased to share what's been achieved in partnership with Parks Victoria, Trust for Nature, Birdlife Australia and specialist contractors.

"Every effort is an important step towards our shared goal of a healthy and resilient inlet that we can all enjoy - whether you are a fisher, farmer, birdwatcher, walker or cial way and want it cared for."

A huge effort was made in tackling Spartina infestations across the entire Ramsar site to protect the habitat. Long-term monitoring shows this consistent annual treatment is significantly reducing this threat - a major win for the environment and wildlife.

Protecting an additional 20 hectares of habitat was another great win with Trust for Nature leading a program to protect saltmarsh through weed control and fencing from stock on private properties in the Tarraville and Hedley areas.

Multiple landholders have expressed interest in being involved with the project and the Trust is currently assessing projects for future years. Landholders wanting to come on board can contact Billie Emmett from Trust for Nature at billiee@tfn.org.au.

Foxes are the number one predator for the Inlet's beach nesting birds including

An elusive resident fox on Dream Island was caught thanks to a determined contractor. The 500-hectare island is critical habitat for vulnerable beach-nesting bird species to breed, and the removal of this fox will increase the likelihood of breeding success. Remote sensing camera detected another fox that will be targeted in 2025/26.

Summer and winter monitoring of beach nesting birds by BirdLife Australia and a team of highly skilled and dedicated volunteers showed generally low success in chicks fledging despite the birds putting in their best efforts. Hooded Plovers made 27 nesting attempts across four islands, yet only two fledglings were produced on Dream Island. Similarly low fledgling rates were seen for the Inlet's Pied Oystercatchers, Crested, Caspian, Fairy and Little Terns. These failures are largely due to predators, high tides and people.

### PICAL expands community garden with new glasshouse

PHILLIP Island Community and Learning Centre (PICAL) has taken another step forward in its mission to tackle local food insecurity, with the installation of a new glasshouse at its Settlement Road community

This marks the beginning of an expansion project funded by a \$24,000 grant from VicHealth's Growing Healthy Communities

The new glasshouse is described as the "engine room" of the garden, enabling volunteers to propagate seedlings that will soon fill an expanded network of garden beds.

In addition to the glasshouse, the funding will provide for additional raised garden beds, soil, mulch, as well as garden bed screenings and lining an upgraded watering system, cold storage refrigeration, a PV solar energy system and other essential infrastruc-

Since re-launching in July 2023, PICAL's community garden has become a vital part of the local emergency food supply chain. The garden produces over 30 kilograms of fresh, seasonal produce weekly, which is distributed through PICAL's community pantry.

The community pantry is the major emergency food relief service on Phillip Island and within a 35 kilometre radius in Gippsland, currently supporting more than 340 families per month - a number that continues to grow due to the ongoing cost-of-living crisis.

"This expansion allows us to produce more high-quality, locally grown food for those who need it most. We're not just growing seasonal produce - we're growing community resilience and connection," said Neil Wilmot, volunteer and PICAL Community Garden Co-ordinator.

Operated by a dedicated team of 25 volunteers, the garden functions under sustainable "circular economy" principles by composting leftover organic waste from the community pantry. While open to the public when staffed, the garden's primary purpose is to supply the community pantry with fresh food and offer volunteers a meaningful way to connect and contribute to the well-being of their community.

With the new glasshouse and other improvements funded by VicHealth's Growing Healthy Communities program, PICAL, is reinforcing its commitment to sustainable food access, environmental responsibility and community empowerment on Phillip Island.

#### Mushroom murder trial goes into 11th week

CHRIS Reason, six times a Walkley Award winner, with two Logies and a Graham Perkin Australian Journalist of the Year Award for covering everything from the Fukushima nuclear disaster to the deaths of Nelson Mandela and Princess Diana.

He was there last week, so was Channel 7 news anchor Mike Amor, Ben Knight, the BBC, Daily Mail, Reuters and all the majors.

At its peak last week, there were more than 200 news people, from all over the world, waiting inside and outside the Latrobe Valley Law Courts for a verdict in the Erin Patterson mushroom murder

The jury retired just prior to lunch on Monday, June 30 to consider their verdict. and they came back to the jury room in the courthouse at 10.30am on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and even Saturday last week, wrapping it up at

They resumed at 10.30am on Monday. July 7, into the 11th week of the marathon trial in the Supreme Court at Morwell.

Essentially, to the outside observer, nothing happened.

Photographers and film crews entertained themselves taking pictures of the comings and goings by the main players; the prosecution, the defence, and the police informant in the case, Detective Leading Senior Constable Stephen Ep-

The Patterson and Wilkinson families are no longer attending the court.

They waited, we waited, the world waited for a verdict, which came on Monday, Juy 7, at 2.15pm.

# But was it a motive for murder?

IF YOU accept what the defence had to say, there was no real issue between Erin Patterson and her estranged husband

"It was a brief spat, we say, about child support which the evidence says was resolved amicably," said Colin Mandy SC in his closing remarks during the 11-week Erin Patterson mushroom murder trial, way back on Tuesday, June 17.

It started, they say, in November 2022 and was over by late December that year, "the critical period being December 5, 6 and

That's a full seven months before the Beef Wellington lunch on Saturday, July 29, 2023.

The prosecution? Not so

They say Erin Patterson gave Simon "multiple incentives to attend" the lunch before he ultimately declined, and that she fully intended to serve him the same meal she served the other guests.

"The prosecution suggests that this sixth Beef Wellington, that the accused went to the trouble of making, was clearly intended for Simon Patterson," Crown Prosector Dr Nanette Rogers told the jury in her closing address on Day 32 of the trial.

"The prosecution case is, had Simon Patterson changed his mind and decided to attend the lunch after all, he too would have been served that sixth poisoned Beef Wellington," she

Clearly, the submissions from the opposing counsels, are a world apart, which as they say, is a matter for the jury.

But what did Simon Patterson have to say about it?

He told the court that they met in the early 2000s when they were members of "a fairly eclectic group of friends" while working at the Monash City Council, a friendship that became romantic and the couple married on June 2, 2007.

"Erin is very intelligent. I guess some of the things that attracted me to her in the first place was definitely her intelligence. She is quite witty and can be quite funny," said Simon about his wife.

He also spoke about their first period of separation in Perth when he was living in an onsite caravan for about six months after driving across Australia. on his own, with a six-month-

"What I understood from Erin was that she was struggling inside herself," he said.

He acknowledged the relationship was "strained" during an on and off period until a permanent separation in late 2015, but that he was "always keen to have a good relationship, have a good marriage and a good strong family to bring up the kids in", a sentiment he shared with Erin even after separation.

He continued to care for her "very much", he said, they were friendly most of the time, had easy arrangements with the custody of the children, travelled overseas and interstate on holidays and continued to own property in common.

But a noticeable change came over the relationship when Erin moved to Leongatha later in 2022, and there was a dispute over child support arrangements, choice of school, school fees, and medical bills for the

He said Erin became very upset about these issues, often expressed in messages to him, while also seeking to involve Simon's parents Don and Gail in the dispute.

A message from Erin Patterson to her Facebook Messenger friends, on December 6, 2022 supports that: "Simon's dad contacted me this morning to say that he and Gail had tried to talk to Simon about the matters I raised and to get "his side" but he refused to talk about it other than to signal he disagreed with what I said. Beyond that he won't talk about it. So, Don said they can't adjudicate if they don't know both sides and Simon won't give his side".

By December 9, 2022, it

had escalated: "His mum was horrified I had claimed child support. Why isn't she horrified her son is such a deadbeat that I had no choice but to claim?

Mr Mandy addressed the difficulties in Erin and Simon's relationship in depth during his closing remarks, especially with regard to the prosecution's claim they didn't have to prove a motive.

He claimed that "the brief spat" which reached a crescendo during the Facebook Messenger exchange around 5, 6, 7 December "didn't stretch much beyond that".

"It was a brief spat, we say, about child support which the evidence says was resolved ami-

"What was the point of leading from Simon Patterson all the evidence about the dispute over his tax return and child support payments which flared up and then dissipated?" asked Mr Mandy.

"The reason why all of that is before you, and in evidence in this trial, and the reason why it was led by the prosecution, is because they want to try and show that there was some kind of difficulty in the relationship between Erin and Simon and that it therefore might provide a reason for her to murder his parents and his aunt and uncle six months later, seven months later. Even just saying it aloud demonstrates, in our submission to you, how unpersuasive that argument is, an example of many of the prosecution's unpersuasive theories which we'll try and develop," said Mr Mandy.

So, was there still tension in the relationship after December

In her own evidence. Erin Patterson acknowledged that the relationship between Simon and herself, in the six months leading up to the July 2023 lunch, continued to be "strained", that she agreed with Tanya Patterson, that there was a deterioration in the relationship, that she wasn't attending as many family functions, and shifting the children to a new school early in 2023 was her decision.

Erin Patterson was charged and found guilty by the jury of three counts of murder and one of attempted murder arising out of a family lunch at her home on Saturday, July 29 where a meal of Beef Wellington, with death cap mushrooms, was served. Mrs Patterson had pleaded not guilty to all charges, maintaining that what happened on the day was a tragedy and a terrible accident.

- January 2014: Second child born
- 2014: Bought a house in Nason Street
- Sometime in 2015: Another period of separation, Erin moved out into a rental November 2015: Erin bought
- a house in Anthony Street Korumburra and moved in
- Late 2015: Separation becomes permanent
- 2015-2022: Continued to holiday together, share ownership of property
- Mid-2022: Moved to new house in Leongatha
- October/November 2022: Relationship became strained over child support, school and medical payments

#### New taps at Fish Creek Primary School

FISH Creek Primary School students are enjoying a fresh way to stay hydrated thanks to new drink taps installed with the help of a \$10,000 Community Resilience Grant from South Gippsland Water

The taps, which feature striking Indigenous artwork, are part of the school's initiative to improve water access and education while also supporting environmental sustainability. The grant follows a precautionary Boil Water Advisory issued for Fish Creek in April after a contractor damaged a main water pipe.

South Gippsland Water's Managing Director, Robert Murphy, said the Community Resilience Grants are about supporting local communities in building long-term strength and preparedness.

"We know the effects a Boil Water Advisory has on our community – from businesses to individual households," Mr Murphy said.

"That's why we make a Community Resilience Grant available after the advisory is lifted. It gives community organisations, like Fish Creek Primary School, the opportunity to apply for funding that strengthens their resilience in challenging times and supports water safety, education, and awareness."

Fish Creek Primary School used the grant to replace old, leaking drink taps with new, high-efficiency units that help conserve water and reduce reliance on single-use plastics.

"The new drink taps are a fantastic addition to our school," said Principal Dale Thomas.

"They're not only practical and environmentally friendly, but they also carry deep meaning for our community through the Indigenous artworks they feature. We're incredibly grateful to South Gippsland Water for their support."

The unique tap installations include two artworks by Indigenous artist Luke Penrith - "Connections" and "Saltwater and the Coastline." The school selected these pieces to reflect the local community's connection to the coast and waterways, and to emphasise the importance of preserving natural water systems.

"We wanted to use this opportunity to educate our students on the value of water and the rich cultural heritage that surrounds it," Mr Thomas added.

"These artworks are daily reminders of our shared responsibility to care for the environment."

# IT'S TIME

### Don't lodge just yet

THE Australian Taxation Office (ATO) is warning taxpayers not to lodge their tax returns until their income statement is marked as 'tax ready' and data has been pre-filled by the ATO.

Last year 142,000 people who lodged in the first two weeks of July had to lodge amendments, or had their returns investigated and amended by the ATO to fix inaccuracies in their tax return, for example, income that had not been declared properly.

ATO Assistant Commissioner Rob Thomson said that waiting until late July allows for the ATO to prefill information in your tax return.

"We know doing your tax return is something to tick off your to-do list each year, but there's no need to rush. The best time to lodge is from late July once everything is ready.

"We pre-fill information from your employer, banks, government agencies and health funds into your tax return to help you get it right the first time – regardless of whether you use a registered tax agent or lodge yourself," Mr Thomson said.

Waiting for this information to be pre-filled reduces the likelihood of mistakes or omissions, which can often result in taxpayers having to submit an amendment which can cause issues and delays for taxpayers.

"If you wait until late July to lodge, all you need to do is check your information, add anything that's missing and include any deductions or offsets that you're eligible for.

"If you're keen to get your ducks in a row before you lodge, make sure you have all the necessary records, ensure your personal information and bank details are up to date and check the ATO occupation guides to see what deductions you may be able to claim.

"The ATO is also encouraging taxpayers to download the ATO app and set up a strong digital identity to protect themselves this tax time to ensure your interactions online are safe and secure. The app not only allows you to keep records of your work and general expenses but it will keep your information safe, including notifying you of any suspicious activity on your account," Mr Thomson said.

Once your employer has finalised your income statement, it will be marked as 'tax ready'. Taxpayers can check if their income statement is 'tax ready', as well as if pre-fill is available in myTax prior to lodging or in the ATO app.

# Smart tax tips for small businesses in 2025

AS THE 2025 financial year has come to a close, small business owners should begin to consider what the new financial year holds.

1. Instant Asset Write-Off

The \$20,000 instant asset write-off was extended to June 30, 2025, for businesses with turnover under \$10 million. If there is no further extension, the default instant asset write-off is back to just \$1000.

2. Increase to Employee Super The new rate of super guarantee is 12 per cent and this is effective from the first payday after June 30, 2025

(even if that payday was July 1). Timely payments are essential with super - not just for compliance, but for cash flow planning. The ATO is preparing to launch "Pay Day Super" from July next year which will mean employers will have to pay their employees super at the same time as their pay is run.

3. Review Your Business Structure A 25 per cent corporate tax rate applies to small businesses, so if you are currently trading as a sole trader or partnership it may be time to reassess whether this structure is providing the most tax-effective outcome. There are other benefits to consider with your business structure, so it is worth discussing with your accountant to determine what is right for your situation.

4. Stay Ahead of ATO Scrutiny

With nearly \$1 billion in new funding, the ATO is ramping up audits and compliance checks and has increasing access to data-matching tools. Ensure your bookkeeping is accurate, GST is reported on time, and other compliance obligations are under control. Also, note that the General Interest Charge payable on outstanding ATO debts is no longer tax deductible. Better to source other forms of short-term finance if you can, to keep your interest costs deductible.

# Government backs business with payroll tax relief

THE payroll tax-free threshold will lift from \$900,000 to \$1 million meaning even more small businesses will pay no payroll tax according to the State Government.

It follows the lifting of the threshold from \$700,000 at the start of the financial year.

The change will mean about 6000 businesses no longer paying any payroll tax and a further 22,500 businesses paying a reduced amount - saving up to \$14,550 per year.

#### Financial incentives to entice future tradies

THE Key Apprentice Program has been launched.

This program provides new apprentices working in residential building trades with financial incentives totalling \$10,000.

Under the program, apprentices will receive \$2000 at six, 12, 24, 36 months, and at the completion of their apprentice-

A top floor entertaining room with an alfresco deck affording beach views, a suspended fire-place in the living room, spiral staircases and the ability to see from the top storey to the first floor are among the house's standout features.

Owner director Leigh Allchin, who established the business in 2008, explained that while that project was highlighted by the judges, they also took account of other construction work Allchin Builders has done, both current and completed.

"One of the judges was an engineer and one was a builder; they were very happy with our finish and the detail we'd put into our build," he said of the Inverloch house, adding the judges could see the difficult nature of the build and were impressed that its challenges were overcome.

"There was a lot of problem solving throughout that build," Leigh said.

Incorporating an existing structure into the project presented multiple challenges, including the fact that the structure did not originally meet modern-day specifications.

That required extensive consideration on site to determine how to build the house to create the desired look, functionality and safety.

Bringing the owners' vision of a suspended fireplace to fruition also involved extensive problem-solving.

"We had to put some steel in the structure to hold it up and we had to get engineers involved a number of times throughout the build to strengthen it and to hold that extra weight of the fireplace," Leigh said of a challenge presented by working with an existing structure.

The house is constructed over four levels, with the original A-frame one of its features, a style of which there are a few examples across the Inverloch coastline.

"Ours has got a modern façade and it's been brought up to date," Leigh said.

o date," Leigh said. A variety of claddings were

Bringing the owners' vision—used including one resembling of a suspended fireplace to 'charred timber'.

A standing seam approach was taken with the Colorbond roof to ensure there were no visible fixings.

With the owners having designed the house as their long-term home, a lift was installed, another involved process that the Allchin team successfully tackled.

The new works increased the structure's size by about 45 per cent

While there was nothing straightforward about the Inverloch project, Leigh said that's what the Allchin Builders team is all about.

"We like doing these custom builds and that's where we built our name; no two jobs that we do are the same." he said. The owners designed the house, with a draftsman formalising the plans.

COVID and planning delays disrupted the build but the owners were delighted with the completed house.

Allchin Builders, which has a team of 14 and works with chosen tradies, has just completed a couple of Warragul projects and has a big build coming up in Beaconsfield.

"It's good to be recognised by engineers and other builders that do the judging," Leigh said of the recent award, pleased the business's accomplishments have been noticed.



# TS Constructions awarded the MBV sustainable home

TS CONSTRUCTIONS Cooinda project was awarded the Best Sustainable Home at the 2025 Master Builder Victoria awards. The 8.0-star project was built in Australia's premium sustainable housing project, The Cape, in Cape Paterson.

This carbon-neutral, energy and water-efficient coastal home sits within the top one per cent of sustainable homes in Australia. The home features state-of-the-art energy-efficient design, construction, and fit out, which all combine to keep the home beautifully comfortable in all weather conditions, while reducing annual running costs to below \$500 per annum.

Director of TS Constructions, Tony O'Connell, said the Cooinda's design is functional.

"We've used a sustainable guide for the home's layout; it's north-facing with crossflow ventilation, smart window placement, and deep eaves – these all play a role in keeping the home comfortable," said Tony.

"In a typical home, winter temperatures might drop to under 10 overnight. But in homes like Cooinda, we're seeing consistent, comfortable bands between 16 and 25 year-round."

Public perceptions around sustainable housing are evolving, Tony said. "When we started building at The Cape 10 years ago, there was still this idea that sustainability was unaffordable, but the reality is, these homes are cheaper to run, healthier to live in, and more comfortable. And they're not significantly more expensive to build."

The Cape has clear and prescriptive guidelines for all homes, and of the 150 approved designs within the estate, 90 have been delivered by TS Constructions – a remarkable achievement given the competitive landscape.

"Of those 90 homes, no two are the same," said Tony.

"There is a mandatory minimum 7.5-star rating, 2.5kW PV solar, and 10,000 litres of water storage. At 8.0 stars with 8.8kW of PV and 12kW/hr of Redback batteries and 46,000 litres of water storage, the Cooinda project exceeds this."

TS Constructions has worked closely with the clients and the architect to build this stylish, 263m² doublestorey home (200m² of living space, again a Cape requirement) with visually impressive articulation and material selection.

The ground floor consists of a large, north-facing living zone and kitchen

that opens onto a wide deck with views of the garden. There are two bedrooms and a home office. The upper floor has a large mezzanine and balcony. Rooms and windows have been situated to capture both prevailing sea breezes, creating that natural cross flow.

The home has been constructed to provide a shelter from the southerly winds from the ocean, while allowing the owners to open up to cooler summer breezes.

The fixtures and finishes are a standout on this home, including the appliances and tiling that were selected not only for their functionality but to lift the home well above standard.

The joinery was finished to a high level of detail and incorporated a glass photographic splashback. Miglas Aluclad double glazed windows provide the low maintenance of aluminium on the external facade, with the warmth of timber on the inside. Carefully selected recycled red bricks provide a stunning feature throughout the home, along with recycled glass in the polished concrete slab.

"Using one of our designs we modelled, the price differential between a six-star home and an equivalent eight-star design is around \$7000. Based on the reduced energy required to run the home, this additional up-front cost is likely to be recuperated within four years. Modelling suggests an annual power bill including daily connection charges of approximately \$300, or \$25 per month," Tony explained.

"The home is visually stunning, and the rooms are spacious with minimal use of passages. Within this home, we also explored other products, such as our plaster, which uses recycled materials, and low-VOC paints, which are less toxic, and we also extend this approach to our joinery, ensuring it's toxin-free."

Both Embodied Carbon and End of Life recycling were considered in the selection of materials, leading to items such as the external woodstone blockwork, which incorporates 40 per cent recycled timber in its composition (timber from shredded single-use timber pallets).

With demand for sustainable homes rising and awareness growing, Tony said owners are doing their own research and together we're creating sustainable homes with forward-thinking ideas.

"It's these owners that are taking us to the next level – and of course, The Cape has been built with a quantum leap in advanced design."

## How to start the conversation on sexual assault?

IT'S a conversation no parent, guardian or caregiver wants to have with their child – no matter their age. However, Victorians were left in utter shock last week at the revelation that 26-year-old Point Cook man Joshua Brown was arrested and charged with over 70 sexual offences linked to childcare centres.

Child sexual abuse includes a broad range of illegal sexual behaviours, and though in last week's case it included young children in care, such crimes are most often committed by someone the child knows. A 2023 report released following the Australian Child Maltreatment Study estimated that three in 10 Australians have experienced child sexual

But how do you have a conversation about body safety, particularly with toddlers?

Firstly, use the correct names of body parts - don't be embarrassed. Using anatomically correct terms not only reduces shame but also gives children the right language if they ever have to speak up. The language used to describe body parts can also matter in legal cases.

Teach children body autonomy - it's okay if they don't want to hug or kiss someone, and don't pressure them to. Teaching children consent from a young age helps them throughout their life.

Talk about people and gut instinct - have conversations with kids about people who make us feel safe inside, and those who perhaps make us feel icky or scared, and ask them to tell you if someone fits the latter criteria. They don't have to know why someone doesn't feel right - what matters is that they feel safe to tell vou.

Discuss secrets and surprises - No child should be asked to keep a secret. Surprises, like birthday gifts, are different. Teach children to tell you if anyone asks them to keep a secret, and explain how secrecy can be part of unsafe behaviour.

Finally, remind children you love them, and create an open environment where they feel safe and comfortable talking to you. Every small conversation builds on the next. If they feel heard and supported, they're more likely to come to you.

If you suspect a child has been a victim of sexual abuse, Sexual Assault Services Victoria recommends having a calm conversation in a safe environment using open-ended questions.

Listen carefully and without interruption or judgement, and be mindful of your own reactions.

And, not least, tell them they've done the right thing by telling you.

#### Recognising the signs

Children may not always show obvious signs of trauma or be able to express what they're feeling. Instead, they often communicate through changes in behaviour, emotions, or physical symptoms.

#### **Emotional** and behavioural indicators:\*

- Mood changes, depression, anxiety, or social withdrawal
- Feeling jumpy, nervous, agi-
- tated and easily startled Difficulty regulating emotions - rapid, sometimes exaggerated changes in mood where strong emotions or feelings occur such as uncontrollable laughter or cry-
- Difficulty concentrating or learning new information; change in academic perfor-
- · Resistance to going to school or participating in a usual activity (e.g. sports practice)
- Trouble falling or staying asleep, sleep disturbances or nightmares
- Generalised fear and anxiety – a persistent feeling that they are not safe
- Change in general behaviour - seeming 'out of sorts' Over-compliance and eager-
- ness to please • Fear and avoidance of cer-
- tain people and places
- Acting as if nothing has happened
- Stating that they can deal with it on their own.

#### Physical signs may include:\* · Headaches, stomach aches,

- appetite or bed-wetting, weight changes • Bruises in sensitive areas
- Pain, swelling, or discharge in the genital area Pain or burning during uri-
- nation Victoria Police have a dedi-

Lynne and Robert Jackman have donated 30 comfort hearts to Gippsland Southern Health Services' (GSHS) Leongatha maternity ward to give babies and their mums a bright start to life.

The comfort hearts started a few years ago when a relation of the Jackmans had a premature baby at 26 weeks in New Zealand.

"The hospital asked if anybody could make and donate comfort hearts and Lynne has taken it upon herself to continue and expand the tradition," Robert said.

At the moment, Lynne is making comfort hearts for the Christchurch Women's Hospital in New Zealand, Latrobe Regional Hospital, a private hospital in Melbourne and now GSHS.

The hearts are given to mothers and babies if they need to be separated.

manager Dayna Leatham said the care hearts were a nice way for mum and baby to stay linked while apart.

When a baby needs to be transferred to a special care nursery, we can offer a small heart to both the mother and the baby," she said.

"Before the transfer, we swap the hearts, which helps support bonding and makes the transition a little easier for both.

"We get mum and baby back together as soon as we can but it's a nice way to retain a connection while they're little memento that they can keep and for a baby book."

Ms Leatham said the handmade care hearts were a lovely gesture that would be welcomed by families.

"We're truly grateful to Lynne and Robert for reaching out and offering this thoughtful extra care to our mums and babies," she said.

Lynne said she loved coming up with the different designs and giving mums and babies another way to connect.

They are made from cotton material, often sourced from garage sales and op shops.

"It's not only a win for the hospitals and mothers and babies, but for Lynne as well," he said.

#### Hearing Aid Simulator puts control in your hands

A REVOLUTIONARY digital tool developed by Australian company PocketAid is giving people – from major cities to regional towns - the power to explore hearing support without stepping into a clinic or committing to costly devices.

This world-first, free online Hearing Aid Simulator allows users to "test drive" the benefits of hearing aids in the comfort and privacy of their own homes.

It's a significant breakthrough for anyone hesitant to acknowledge hearing challenges due to stigma and for people living in regional and rural areas, where access to in-person hearing services can be limited. It also serves growing demand among urban Australians who want more convenience, privacy and flexibility in their healthcare

"The simulator is perfect for anyone curious about hearing improvement, who may have previously been unsuccessful with hearing aids or hesitant to explore them," said PocketAid CEO Don Hudson.

"It delivers a powerful preview of the kind of clarity, tone balance, and speech recognition now possible with ready-to-use technology."

Kelvin Wilson, a retired farmer and former Army Reservist from regional Australia, has spent a lifetime surrounded by loud machinery and rifle fire, without the benefit of ear protection. Years of exposure have left him with tinnitus and worsening hearing in his right ear, which he openly attributes to his time on the farm and in the Reserves.

'My right ear is much worse than my left, and that's because of the gun shots," Mr Wilson said.

"If I am at the back of the room when someone is speaking, I just can't grasp what is being said because of the background noise. It's very annoying.

"The difference in the quality from the start of the hearing aid simulation to the end was out of this world!

"This will be the way of the future for people wanting to address their hearing loss. I can do my research at home without having to worry about being persuaded to buy another expensive device. I've got full control."

An estimated one in four Australians will have some level of hearing loss within 25 years, yet many will go undiagnosed. The reasons often include stigma, cost and the logistical burden of seeking help.

The free tool allows users to input their own audiogram, or choose a preset hearing loss profile - mild, moderate or severe - and then experience realistic listening simulations in 12 real-world scenarios such as:

- having a conversation in a busy café,
- watching television,
- or talking on the phone.

The simulator also allows family members to gain insight into a loved one's hearing loss, helping them understand their challenges and better support them.



### Like it or not, change is coming

IT WAS interesting to see the avalanche of troll comments and negativity that flowed from an innocent video posted by the Sentinel-Times of the smoking ceremony at the opening of the Ngangga Community Festival at the Berninneit Cultural Centre in Cowes last Sunday.

Many of the 470 messages on the Sentinel-Times' Facebook page expressed opposition to the smoking ceremony and used it as an opportunity to unload a few racist remarks while they were at it.

The comments are misplaced on a number of counts.

Anyone who went to the festival at Berninneit couldn't help but be impressed with the array of art, craft and cultural activities for kids on their holidays. Interest for their parents and others and the positive vibe from the organisers

And people were lined up right down the street to participate in the ceremo-

The other issue that the general community needs to catch up with, like it or not, is the advanced state of Victoria's treaty negotiations and the extent to which First Peoples' culture and decision-making is being introduced into everything the government does.

On Wednesday this week, for example, the Bass Coast Shire Council is being asked to endorse the new Statement of Planning Policy coming out of the Distinctive Areas and Landscapes process, which charts the course for growth and development in this area for the next 50 years.

A feature of that document is the role being ascribed to Traditional Owners and the Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation in all of council's decision-making.

Council is being asked to endorse the document, but they have no choice really. Local government has long been an agency of the State Government, and while individual councillors can get up and have their say, they virtually have no control anymore.

The point is this, it's almost certain now that the Labor Government will be returned to office at the November 2026 election, such is the disarray on the Coalition side, and these changes which embrace our indigenous heritage are coming at a pace.

It's a case of get involved, get informed or get out of the way.

#### Speak up for Question Time

PUBLIC Question Time (PQT) at Bass Coast Shire Council meetings is a longheld right for our community.

It is fundamental to open and transparent governance at Council.

We are fortunate to have it, as not all communities are permitted this right.

Since 2016 successive Bass Coast Shire Councils have imposed tighter restrictions on this right.

In 2022 some former Councillors even attempted to remove this right altogether. But a strong community pushback left Councillors in no doubt that the community was opposed, and the attempt failed.

In many ways, public question time can be the most important aspect of open democracy and community participation at Council meetings.

Even Council itself acknowledges that PQT is the only opportunity for community members to put public questions to Council meetings.

But now we see that public question time is under attack once again.

#### Community update "Save Our Bank"

SINCE Thursday, July 26 when Bendigo Bank announced the closure of Korumburra's last remaining bank on August 29, 2025, the Korumburra "Save our Bank" working group (currently made up of members of the Korumburra Round Table and the Korumburra Community Development Association Inc.) has been working hard to stop the closure of the branch. This follows the successful community campaign we coordinated in 2021 to save the bank; our submission to the Senate Inquiry into Bank Closures in Regional Australia in 2023; and our several meetings with state and regional managers of Bendigo Bank between 2021 and 2024.

As part of our renewed campaign to save the bank, we sent a letter to the Managing Director of Bendigo Bank inviting him to meet with us and demanding that the Bank reverse its decision. or alternatively that they support the establishment of a community bank in our town. We have also been in touch with Mary Aldred MP, federal member for Monash, who will be writing to the Managing Director of Bendigo Bank to express her opposition to the decision Affordable homes in and asking that they look at alternatives. She will also have the opportunity to raise the issue when Parliament resumes in July.

We have the support of Danny O'Brien who is writing to the board of directors. We spoke to Cr Nathan Hersey, who is also writing to the Managing Director to express his opposition to the closure and help us advocate for the establishment of a community bank.

In addition, we have done media interviews (ABC Gippsland radio and WIN News), begun exploring options for a community bank and we've reached out

# Cape Paterson?

THE member for Narracan reportedly believes that the return of the Cape Paterson town boundary to Seaward Drive blocks 'affordable homes' and impacts housing supply - tell him he's dreaming! This confected outrage is not about affordability, housing supply or 'flawed processes' - it's much more likely that his comments reflect the views of those who were lured by the potential financial rewards of coastal proximity to speculate on the possible rezoning of Cape Paterson farming land.

The local community, and those who visit here for recreation, know and observe daily that, as enshrined in the final draft SPP, Cape Paterson is a fragile area of outstanding environmental significance that needs protection for future generations.

Yes, affordable housing is desperately needed in Bass Coast but it's completely inappropriate in Cape Paterson given its location, limited infrastructure and that it has none of the services families need every single day.

It's a complete fabrication that affordable housing will ever happen in Cape Paterson where houses are at least 20 per cent more expensive than in Wonthaggi, and where holiday homes predominate. Domain lists \$790k as the median price for a three-bedroom home in Cape Paterson and in Wonthaggi it's \$500k - so where's the 'affordability'?

Curiously, Wonthaggi is never marketed as the thriving important coastal regional town it is, with all the services required for affordable living, a wide variety of available housing lots - and it's only 10 or 15 minutes from the coast.

After years of research and consultation, one outcome of the SPP Standing Committee deliberations in 2023 was the commissioning of reports on three Bass Coast settlements to address matters raised in the hearings. The Cape Paterson report, by the independent landscape assessment firm Peter Haack Consulting, concluded that the dunes north of Seaward Drive were of significance and worthy of preservation, with those findings adding weight to other comprehensive research on the environmental values of the area. Council determined that development north of Seaward Drive was not required to support municipal housing needs and called for the return of the town boundary. The Department of Planning also conducted an additional consultation in 2024 and found that 90 per cent of respondents supported the return of the boundary to Seaward Drive (1188 in total responded).

Recently, the Bass Coast Shire Council Mayor, Councillor Halstead, warmly welcomed the draft final SPP. After Council consideration (and acceptance by other local relevant authorities) it requires signature by the Governor in Council and gazetting after which it will be immediately operational in the Bass Coast Planning Scheme – a milestone that the Cape Paterson community, and others who really know this significant place, will no doubt also warmly welcome.

Emily described the set as astonish ing, saying there will be lots of local talent on show, with the overall production requiring a huge team, the members of which are supportive of one another.


She is hopeful that cast members have felt supported and challenged but not out of their depth.

Friday night's opening of Alfred Hitchcock's The 39 Steps directed by Justin Stephens, is everything you would expect and more, and throw in a sprinkle of Wonthaggi Theatrical Groups renowned ability to pull off incredible performances and the audience were not left disappointed.

The play is comedy meets classic thriller that is minimalistic yet filled with an array of roles, and countless props. To be more specific there are over 100 roles played by four characters, most of which are left to the Clowns.

Hats off to the set construction team led by Tad Henry who have built a theatre within the theatre, brick walls and all, and the props and scenic art departments who have created an uncountable number of items that are used once, sometimes twice in the show. Without noting any spoilers a prop car appears for yet an instant, but by gosh the car isn't a cardboard cutout door.

The care and dedication the behind the scenes team have put into the Hitchcockian homage is fantastic and must be praised.

For the four cast members who take the audience on a 100-minute whitty masterclass in parody, congratulations on a fantastic opening night.

Justin Stephens as Richard Hannav is impressive, bold, and dynamic. While you occasionally feel sympathy for him, you're quickly snapped back to reality by one of his pompous remarks. Expect British humour, and just a few British remarks...

Joel Stevenson stars as clown one alongside Pearl Hunter (clown two), the duo are fantastic throughout.

Of particular note, Joel's performance as Mrs McGarricle is wordescaping, belly laughing comedic bliss, and without speaking out of place, something very few men could pull off.

Melbourne-based actor Pearl Hunter's multi-role mayhem levels Joel's, both building off each other's high energy performances, though also, gives her own charm and suave to her characters.

One highlight, is Mr McGarricle. I won't ruin any surprises but expect a stereotypical sketchbook Scotsman less the bagpipes, but complete with tam o'shanter.

As for Mr Memory and Compere there are simply no words.

And last but not least, Rhiannon Stephens stars as Annabella, Pamela and Margaret, all at different times of course. Congratulations to Rhiannon for her portrayal of accents and holding character whilst performing, one can only imagine the laughs during rehearsal, particularly where Annabella is concerned.

In typical Almodovar style, there is a lush, omnipresent orchestral score, seductively rich blocks of colour in the design (particularly the keynote arterial red), and – in a way utterly characteristic of Almodóvar – the story is layered and interspersed with flashbacks and incidental scenes which are semi-detached from the storytelling's downstream

Almodóvar, now aged 74, has clearly been thinking a lot about mortality. "The Room Next Door" isn't a weighty philosophical work – as mature as it is, it still has glimmers of cheeky humour and campy melodrama. But it develops

# Arancini

ANY leftover Risotto Milanese can be made into Arancini - so named because they look like little oranges. If there are no leftovers, just make another batch. You will also need a beaten egg, some flour and breadcrumbs.

#### **Ingredients**

- 1 egg beaten
- Flour
- Breadcrumbs
- 1/4 cup cooled rice
- Mozzarella

#### Method

In three bowls, place the flour, breadcrumbs and beaten egg.

Moisten your hands and scoop up 1/4 cup of cooled rice.

Make it into a ball, then make a hole and place a cube of mozzarella inside. Cover it back up so the mozzarella is inside the ball of rice.

Make all the balls, then dip them all into the flour, then into the eggs, then the breadcrumbs.

Once they are all made, leave to dry out for an hour, then heat oil in a wok or deep fryer and fry them, turning, until they are golden brown and crisp all over.

Serve as a first course.

# ■ WONTHAGGI WOODCRAFTERS

In woodworking, nothing is ever wasted. That extends even to bits that are considered waste from a woodworking perspective.

The workshop dust extractors are emptied regularly. and the sawdust is then used by members for compost.

Shavings would take too long to break down in a compost heap but they make a great mulch. In both cases, they help nourish the next generation of trees.

Any unusable offcuts become firewood, but only after the wood has been used as much as is reasonably possible, and the segmented turning groups make sure that even the smallest pieces have a chance at living on as a piece of art.

This is all keeping in mind that some of the timber was originally fence posts, floorboards or framing. Woodworking is a very sustainable pursuit.

# The gentle whisper of faith

JESUS described the joy a relationship brings with him in Matthew 13: 44-46: "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which a man found and covered up. Then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field."

Like countless other Christians I have a relationship with Christ which is life changing for the better. Jesus told his disciples to spread this Good News. Because this relationship can be difficult to explain some people, out of frustration and eagerness, try to share the message by being pushy.

Scripture doesn't appear to support that approach.

In Revelations 3:20 one reads: "Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the doors, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me."

The English artist William Holman Hunt's famous painting portrays Jesus carrying a lantern and knocking at a door with no handle on the outside. The picture rightly implies that God does not force himself on anyone and waits for them to open themselves up to him. God made people free.

In my own faith tradition examples abound of parents who have a great love for God, and undoubtedly a very real relationship with him and try to instil that love into their children through forceful means. This sadly can end up turning them away.

Then there are the people who, in my own faith tradition, encounter God through a certain way of praying and try to coerce others to do the same. Rather than drawing them to that way, this makes them opposed to it.

The words from 1 Kings19-13 come to mind: "...After the wind there was an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake came a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire. And after the fire came a gentle whisper. When Elijah heard it, he pulled his cloak over his face and went out and stood at the mouth of the cave.'

People are more likely to encounter God if he is presented to them in a gentle manner and non-confrontational



# Inverloch RSL marks **Reserve Forces Day**

CALLS are growing to recognise reservists as veterans without restrictive service requirements.

The Inverloch RSL has proudly acknowledged Reserve Forces Day, underscoring the invaluable role that Australia's reservists play in the nation's defence. In a heartfelt commemoration, the RSL paid tribute to the men and women who serve as part of the Australian Defence Force (ADF) Reserve, drawing attention to their essential contributions at home and abroad.

Australian reservists have been at the forefront of many of the country's most significant operations in recent history. Their service has spanned critical missions in Timor-Leste, the Solomon Islands, Iraq, and Afghanistan, where they have worked alongside permanent forces to deliver peacekeeping, humanitarian support, and combat operations. The versatility and commitment of reservists have ensured that Australia can respond rapidly to international crises and domestic emergencies

For many, the dual role of balancing civilian life with military responsibility is a testament to the character and dedication found within the reserve

"Reservists are essential to Australia's defence contribution," the Inverloch RSL Secretary said.

"Time and again, they have proven their readiness to step up in times of need, whether that's overseas deployments or responding to natural disasters here at

Amid the celebration, Inverloch RSL has renewed its call for a change in how reservists are recognised by the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA). Currently, reservists are not automatically recognised as veterans unless they have completed one day of continuous fulltime service - a requirement that excludes many who have shown unwavering commitment through part-time service and operational deployments.

"In our view, a reservist is a veteran from the moment they serve, not just when they meet an arbitrary threshold," the RSL asserted.

"It's time for DVA policy to catch up and acknowledge all those who put themselves forward for Australia's defence, regardless of technicalities.'

The policy, they argue, leads to the paradox where a reservist is considered a veteran only when they cease being a reservist, a distinction that fails to honour the realities of modern

The call for equal recognition comes as support for reservists grows across the country. Communities like Inverloch are rallying behind their local service members, advocating for reforms that recognise the full spectrum of military service. As Australia's strategic environment evolves, the adaptability, experience, and commitment of reservists will remain central to the nation's security.

The Inverloch RSL's Reserve Forces Day commemoration stands as a reminder of the ongoing contribution of reservists and of the need to ensure they receive the recognition and support they deserve, both during and after their service.







# Feedlot competition drives excellent returns at Leongatha VLE

STRONG feedlot competition resulted in excellent prices for good quality heavy cattle at Thursday's Store Sale, with Nutrien South Gippsland Livestock offering three big lines of Angus steers, weighing mostly in the 500-600 kilo bracket and making between \$4.80 and a little over \$5 a kilo.

Those lines of feeder steers came from Aquila Fields in Neerim South, Tyers-based Baillie Brothers and Jackson Pastoral in Sale, with feedlot buyers snapping up all those

A pen of 19 Aquila Fields steers with an average weight of 544 kilos went for \$2750 a head, equating to \$5.05 a kilo.

Fifteen Jackson Pastoral steers, weighing an average of 510 kilos, fetched \$2550 each, a return of \$5

The top pen of Baillie Brothers steers on a per kilo basis made \$4.91 for 23 animals weighing an average of 586 kilos and going for \$2880 each.

Other agents also enjoyed a successful sale.

Sentinel-Times saw a pen of 15 Angus steers, weighing an average of 500 kilos from A. Virgona in Launching Place sold by Jarrod Bennetts of Everitt Seeley and Bennetts for \$2430 a head, a strong return of \$4.86 per kilo.

That followed the sale of a pen of 14 Virgona steers that averaged 605 kilos and went for \$2850 at \$4.71 per kilo.

After wishing business partner David Phelan a happy birthday to the cheers of those present and noting that Phelan & Henderson & Co is celebrating its 10th birthday, Simon Henderson sold a pen of 18 Angus steers from Formbuild in Ventnor.

Those cattle made \$2290 each at \$4.76 per kilo, weighing an average of 481 kilos.

Brian McCormack of Nutrien Gippsland South Livestock stressed it wasn't only the heavy cattle and steers achieving strong

"Everything sold very well, with some of the lighter well-bred steers in the \$4.50 to \$5 range, and the best of the heifers a bit over \$4," he said, with heavier heifers doing

Thirteen Angus heifers from D. Whitley, weighing 385 kilos on average, provided a highlight, achieving \$1580 at an excellent \$4.10 a

"A lot of the heifers were in the \$3.50 to \$3.80 range," Brian said, with even well-bred examples in the 200-odd kilogram bracket still making it into that price range.

Brian put the excellent prices down to ongoing strong northern competition and the reduced number of cattle available.

"It's just supply and demand," he

# Aussie avo production experiences 'short-lived' dip

riencing a dip in avocado production with the 2024/25 crop estimated to be down 15 per cent on last year, a newly released Rabobank report said.

However, the drop in Australia's booming 'avo' production is expected to be short-lived, resulting from the phenomenon of 'alternate bearing' where trees can produce a large crop one year followed by small or no crops the next, according to the report by the agribusiness banking specialist RaboResearch division.

Australian production is forecast to rebound to record volumes of around 170,000 metric tonnes in 2025/26.

Even with the decline in this year's production, there will still be plenty of avocados to go around.

RaboResearch analyst Anna Drake said Australia is estimated to produce 128,000 metric tonnes of fruit in the 2024/25 season - which equates to close to 20 avocados per person a year.

Meanwhile, the world's appetite for avocados continues to grow at a rapid rate, with the global market 'smashing' the USD 20 billion (AUD 30 billion) mark for the first

Global avocado export volumes are expanding rapidly, the Rabobank Global Avocado Update 2025 report says.

Ms Drake said growth in new 'bearing acreage' in Australia is starting to slow, with the area planted at the peak of new avocado planting in 2019 now in full production.

"New avocado planting has continued to drop off sharply," she said.

"Avocado tree planting in 2024 was at its lowest level since 1999 and down more than 90 per cent from the highs in 2019, signalling the beginning of a levelling off in crop size."

Ms Drake said while

Australian avocado export volumes remained flat in 2024, export prices improved for growers, up 13 per cent year-on-year to AUD 5.18/kg.

"Export volumes to the major destinations of China, Singapore and Malaysia remained almost unchanged year-onyear, while those to India increased sharply after improvement in market access," she said.

Ms Drake said over the past five years, Australian avocado exports had shown impressive growth, with 10 to 15 per cent of production volumes now moving into export channels.

Following the anticipated rebound in Australian avocado production next season, Ms Drake said continued export growth across Australia's key markets will be a critical factor in easing downward pressure on prices for the industry.

Globally, the report said the market continues to grow, with an average annual market value - in terms of consumer prices now estimated at USD 20.5 billion - more than AUD 30 billion.

RaboResearch senior horticulture analyst David Magana said three main regions represented 88 per cent of this market value – Latin America. North America and Eu-

While Latin America

leads global consumption, the market value in the rest of the world is still low at 12 per cent.

North America has seen a significant increase in avocado demand growth in the past two decades, led by marketing campaigns.

Globally, avocado export volumes are growing rapidly, RaboResearch said, driven by increased production and diversification of exporting coun-

"Amid this rise of new suppliers, seasonal oversupply in certain markets is a concern that will require continued demand creation and marketing strategies," RaboResearch said.

RaboResearch expects global avocado exports to continue to expand in the next few seasons.

"We estimate global avocado exports will surpass three million metric tons by 2026/27, a significant increase from one million metric tons in 2012/13," Mr Magana said.

"This massive growth is the result of increasing exports from the current top three avocado exporters - Mexico, Peru and Colombia - accounting for about two-thirds of global exports."

Another factor, the report says, is the continued diversification of growing regions and the appearance of next exporting countries.

# Bass Coast avoids VFF farm rate hit list

By Bruce Wardley

BASS Coast Shire may have avoided the Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) hit list for the five worst farm rate rises in 2025/26, but local farmers are still not happy.

A review of farm rates by the Bass Coast Branch of the VFF revealed local farmers are paying a third more for their rates this year than they were five years ago.

The Victorian Government's local government rate capping policy isn't working according to the VFF, particularly for farmland along the coast.

VFF President Brett Hosking said farmers continue to get the raw end of the stick.

"We won't stand idle and watch the burden of funding for key services rely more and more on the agricultural sector from rates to the fundamentally wrong Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF).

"Farmers are wondering when the financial hits will stop.

"When you've got one group of taxpayers in some cases facing double-digit rate increases, there can be no doubt the system is flawed," said Mr Hosking.

"Some farmers face increases in the tens of thousands of dollars."

VFF Bass Coast Branch has calculated that the average farm rate assessment based on Bass Coast's 2025/26 budget is \$3963 compared to \$2391 for commercial premises and \$1690 for residential ratepayers.

Residential rates have barely moved in 10 years according to the VFF

Secretary of the VFF Bass Coast Branch Faye Tuchtan said differential rates for farmers are not

discounts but adjustments reflecting the imbalance of the rating system.

Farmers in general pay more in rates than urban areas," said Ms Tuchtan.

"Rating structures rarely account for the ability of a farmer to pay.

"Land is a farmer's working capital and should not be taxed.

The farm soil provides the population with food and fibre.

"The fundamental principle should be that as the value of farmland increases the rate differential should be adjusted to reduce the rate burden paid by farmers."

Rather than setting the farm rate differential at a fixed percentage of the general rate, the Bass Coast Branch of the VFF has proposed a rating strategy for farmland with an upper and lower limit.

They have also asked for a reduction in the farm rate differential to at least 75 per cent.

According to the VFF, farmers may have significant wealth in the form of farmland but often low capacity to pay for reasons beyond their control such as weather conditions or markets.

Faye Tuchtan and Graham Wood may have recently retired after farming in Grantville since the late 80s but the day-to-day challenges faced by farmers are never far from their minds.

"At least I don't have to pull on the gumboots anymore and feed out," said Fave.

A major problem for Bass Coast farmers according to the VFF is the Capital Improved Value of the land which is impacted by the proximity of Bass Coast to Melbourne and the occasional sale of large parcels of land on Phillip

"One big sale of farmland puts the rates up for everyone," said Graham.

Farm rates in Bass Coast have

jumped from \$3000 to \$4000 in five years.

"Values have gone up because of the proximity to town.

"People from Melbourne like being in the country and close to the coast," said Faye.

"Bass Coast Shire is very fertile country

"Capital Improved Value (CIV) is set by the State, not local government.

"They don't assess farms individually."

Rates are a huge impost on farmers said Faye, especially when there's a drought.

"Farming is a pure gamble.

"You rely on the rain, prices in the saleyards and the cost of fertiliser, feed and fuel."

Graham Wood said what is needed is a five-year rolling average for farm rates.

"It is not unusual for a farmer to go a couple of years without an income but still have to pay rates every year," he said.

"A couple of big sales on Phillip Island could then be averaged

"The ESVF which is a levy (or tax) is also a problem," said Gra-

"Farmers will be paying three times what they were before on this levy.

"Some years it is hard to make a profit. This year was extremely hard with no grass and no growth until spring.

"Not much hay was baled last spring because of the drought and some farmers had to buy in feed from Western Australia and Queensland.

"We're so lucky to have been able to retire and not go through this drought," said Faye.

"Big bills play on your mind."

# Burra Foods lifts season opening milk price again

BURRA Foods delivered another step up in its milk price on Friday, rising to a range of \$9 to \$9.50 per kilogram of milk solids, having originally announced a price range of \$8.60 to \$9.10/kgMS ahead of the new milk season.

The latest announcement follows an earlier increase to between \$8.80 and \$9.30/ kgMS.

At the time of that first step up, Burra CEO Stewart Carson explained in his letter to suppliers that the company's sales team had been busy engaging with customers to negotiate prices for the second half of the year, with the leadership team having reviewed the outcome of the market visits.

It was explained that sales price and volume, production output and costs and the overall impact on Burra's financial forecast were considered, with the determination made that a price step up was justified.

Mr Carson advised the business's milk suppliers on July 4 that, "After reviewing our competitive position, Burra Foods would like to announce an increase to their minimum opening price for the FY26 season of \$0.20/kgMS."

Other processors have also stepped up their original offers for the new milk season, with Bulla having upped its price three times, now providing a range of \$9.15 -\$9.95/kgMS, after starting at \$8.40 - \$9.20/kgMS.

The pure Jersey population in New Zealand is less than 10 per cent of the market, cross breeds - usually a Jersey-Holstein Kiwi cross mix - are about 60 per cent, and Holsteins 30-35 per cent.

Jersey New Zealand president Julie Pirie, who visited Australia for the World Conference, says the future for Jerseys in New Zealand is bright.



"Most of the services will be based at the YES Youth Hub in Wonthaggi but they will extend throughout the Bass Coast area."

The Youth Hub has been a valuable space for young people to hang out since 2019, and Anglicare Victoria is planning to expand this important work and provide even more activities and options.

"Loneliness is a challenge for people of all ages," said Ms Kennard.

"The YES Youth Hub plays such an important role in connecting young people who are feeling isolated. If any local businesses or community groups are interested in being involved with the Youth Hub please get in touch and we can discuss how we can work together."

Anglicare Victoria Hub Coordinator Bella Green said the youth hub was a great place for young people to come and feel safe.

"We look forward to forging strong relationships with young people and will be looking to co-design some programs with their help.

"We are planning to re-launch the Youth Advisory Committee so if any young people are interested in getting involved, we would love to hear from them."

# Scam call almost costs local business, experts step in

IN A world where technology about his browsing habits and and even drain bank accounts, software installed, it failed to also opens doors for cybercriminals to exploit unsuspecting victims often with nothing more than a phone call. Recently, a Leongatha-based business narrowly avoided a major security breach after they received a phone call from someone claiming to be technical support. The caller sounded legitimate, instructed the client to install software, and assured them it would fix a "critical issue" on their device. But in reality, this was no support call; it was a sophisticated scam attempt.

The scammer discussed with the director of the company

"The scammer has built a profile of the director for some time by monitoring him before the attack," said a spokesperson from IT Solutions in Gippsland.

Once access is granted, scammers can silently install malware, steal login credentials, aware.

# \$2.7 million in boat ramp upgrades underway

MEMBER for Bass Jordan Crugnale has announced work has begun to build a new ramp and jetty at Lang Lang, while resurfacing of the Tankerton ramp was almost complete and would improve boating access at French Island making boating safer and more accessible for local and visit-

The \$2.7 million upgrades have been funded by the Better Boating Fund, which reinvests recreational boaters' licence and registration fees and has seen close to \$140m returned into projects and programs across the state to improve boating facilities, access and safety since 2021.

Designs for both ramps were led by the Victorian Fisheries Authority's (VFA) Better Boating division in conjunction with the Lang Lang Foreshore Reserve Committee of Management, French Island Community Association and the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate

At Lang Lang, a new, longer concrete ramp will feature a jetty with space for up to five boats to increase the efficiency and capacity of the facility. The new single-lane ramp, to be constructed parallel with the existing ramp, will be slightly steeper so the rear wheels of vehicles stay out of the water, however it will remain primarily suitable for use at higher tides given the area's flat seabed. Beach accessibility will also be improved as part of the jetty build.

Construction firm Simpson Construction is undertaking the work which began earlier this week. While work is underway, boaters can launch at Corinella or Grantville. The Lang Lang Foreshore Caravan Park remains open during the build, anticipated to be complete by November

Across Western Port on French Island, the Tankerton ramp will soon re-open following a resurfacing project that made use of an innovative design solution to reduce long-term maintenance costs. The old surface had fallen into disrepair and is being replaced by durable articulated concrete mats fixed to the seabed.

The mats are comprised of sections of concrete joined by flexible tethers and their large grooves allow for sand and seagrass to be cleared by wave action. The ramp's long flat gradient is now safer to drive on and will be easier to maintain in the long run through the replacement or repair of individual sections.

The projects are among several boat ramp upgrades around Western Port, with Rhyll, Cowes, Corinella and Hastings already upgraded, while construction is expected to begin at Tooradin later in 2025.

# TT Battle for Supremacy 2025

THE very top echelon of motorcycle road racers from all over the world bring themselves, their machines and their teams to test their skills on the 37.75-mile public road circuit that is fury on two wheels. For a two week period between the last week in May and the first week in June, it's on like Donkey Kong. The TT (Isle of Man Tourist Trophy) is the most revered motorcycle event in the

Hundreds of entrants risk life and limb at speeds in excess of 200 mph. In the pursuit of personal milestones and glory on the rock of dreams. This is the pinnacle of motorcycle road racing. Forget MotoGP and World Superbikes as the bravest, most courageous and skilled riders pit themselves against the ultimate test in their sport, which is simply the TT. To be counted as a finisher in this event is to be considered a winner, regardless of where each rider is placed. This event is not for the faint-hearted as it takes no prisoners. There are no sand traps, large run off areas like short circuit racing, just rock walls, manhole covers, barbed wire fences and a thousand other dangerous obstacles that add to the challenge. Riders call this stuff "street furniture".

Riders can take three years to memorise the 250-plus corners on the circuit, and newcomers are made to wear orange jackets for identification purposes. This is the Colosseum of motorcycle road racing, where liberty means freedom. Mistakes can be fatal. All riders are aware of the risks before they open the throttle and blast down Glenclutchberry Road in 10-second intervals, for this event is a time trial held over six laps, approximately 225 miles at breakneck speed.

There is a respect among riders and spectators alike for the challenges presented by this gruelling encounter. The average lap speed gets faster each year around the course and currently sits around 137 mph with the fastest riders taking 16 minutes and 36 seconds to complete the journey. Superbike, Supersport, Supertwin, Sidecars and Superstockers are the five classes contested, with two races in each category, with the main event being the Senior TT for Superbikes.

The big three, Michael Dunlop, Dean Harrison and Peter Hickman, have been joined by rising star and winner of the 2024 Senior TT, Davey Todd, as the riders to beat. In fact, most of these riders will compete across four classes using their smarts, cunning, nous, courage and determination to shave seconds off their lap times to get to the top dias.

There's no adequate financial reward or bag of gold at the end of the rainbow that would

justify the risks involved, just respect and fulfilment for achieving the ultimate.

The Raging Bull, Michael Dunlop, a Northern Irishman, is the "King of the Road" with 29 TT wins. At 36, he has been unbeatable in the Supersport and Supertwin classes. Dunlop lives for the TT! He isn't a media pinup boy; in fact, he has little or no time for such distractions. A down-to-earth, grassroots road racer who sits top of the heap! He has no qualms about being popular. Michael receives no special treatment, which could be seen when his team, Hawk Racing, arrived in the paddock. MD was pitching in, setting up the team tent, unloading the spare parts, just another link in the cog.

During practice week, Dunlop watches his opponents, learning their strengths and how reliable their machinery is. He holds his cards close to his chest. In 2025, Michael came out in the last qualifying session, last bike on the road, first bike on the timesheets. He gives the opposing riders no redress. This strategy is simple; whatever you can do doesn't matter because I can go faster.

On Wednesday evening, in a practice session, the big four is reduced to three. Fourteen-time TT winner Peter Hickman loses control of his bike at 140mph on a very fast part of the circuit at Kerrow Moar. Fortunately, Hicky is alive despite facial, back and leg injuries; he lives to fight another day, but not at the 2025 meeting. The medical staff at Noble's hospital have patched him up. Battered and bruised Hicky leaves after a two-night stay. Last year, Hicky lost control at Ginger Hall, a fast sweeping left-hander at 120 mph. Maybe there's a message; the game might have gone past him.

Up-and-comer Tom Weeden loses control of his Superbike at Glen Helen, which spits him into a wall, where he incurs multiple leg fractures. Sidecar duo, Peter Founds and Jevan Walmsley, considered a podium chance, get airborne going over Rhencullen, losing control of the chair, being spat down the road some 300 metres. Both are conscious when the orange army (sector marshals) come to their aid. Aussie Josh Brookes rolls off the throttle when he sees the red flag displayed, only to be clipped by Davey Todd, who doesn't see the flag marshal's signal at 176 mph. Both riders avoid injury in a close

Without the 600 volunteer marshals who volunteer their time, the TT wouldn't exist. These hardy souls walk the track in a point-to-point course check, searching for and removing any loose stones and debris that may be a potential cause of an accident. Each marshall has a specific task in case of a rider having an "off". Medics follow the riders as travelling marshals on the latest Superbikes. Helicopters hover overhead in case an air lift to Liverpool is required.

Dean Harrison, a very popular and highly skilled factory Honda rider from Laxey, has been the fastest in Supersport practice sessions, putting in some great times. Forever the bridesmaid, Dean deserves success. Likeable team mate of Peter Hickman, the mullet, Davey Todd, appears to have the speed to challenge "The Raging Bull" in the Superbike event, but there is an underlying query about whether he can match Dunlop over six gruelling laps in the main showdown, the

Race One RST Superbike TT (4 laps)

Dean Harrison on his Honda sets the early pace, but by lap 2, Davey Todd and Michael Dunlop, who were both on BMW's had gapped Harrison by 12 seconds and settled down to have a two-man war. Todd had the ascendancy by the slim margin of 2.9 seconds going into the

last lap, but "The Raging Bull" was coming and coming fast. By Barregarrow, there were twotenths of a second separating the riders. Dunlop had picked up six seconds over Todd on the second lap pitstop, but he was delayed in getting past Dean Harrison on the road through Kirk Michael. After 150 miles of spectacular action, Todd got the victory by 1.2 seconds over Michael Dunlop, with Dean Harrison third. Australian rider Davo Johnson was ecstatic, finishing fifth in this event on his under trialled Kawasaki.

Race Two Sidecar TT (2 laps). Crowe brothers, Ryan and Callum, blitzed the Mountain Course, breaking the lap record held by Ben and Tom Birchall in an outstanding display. Thirty seconds quicker than the chasers on the first lap, the Isle of Man locals took the Sidecar event to new levels. The Crowes went round the course in 121.021 mph, winning by 77 seconds from Ben Birchall and Patrick Rosney, with Lee Crawford and Scott Hardie 17 seconds further adrift.

Race Three RST Supersport TT (3 laps)

Smarting from his narrow loss to Davey Todd in the Superbike race, Michael Dunlop was out for redemption in the first Supersport event running on the Vtwin Ducati. Again, Dean Harrison (Honda) sets the early pace, opening up a sixsecond advantage over Michael Dunlop on lap one, but Dunlop turned up the wick with an average speed of 130.1 mph that his opponents couldn't match. At the finish line, winning his 30th TT, Michael Dunlop had streeted Dean Harrison by 10.2 seconds with James Hillier coming in third. This win on the Ducati was the manufacturer's first at the TT since 1996. Dunlop's celebrated victory was on his seventh different manufacturer's machine.

Race Four RST Superstock TT (3 laps)

Spectators had a long wait before this event got underway, with the day session cancelled due to poor weather and the event program being pushed back to 6.30pm. Fans had been sitting in the hedges from 7am, such was their dedication. Davey Todd (BMW) took up the early lead, but Dean Harrison was carving up the track on the Honda with Michael Dunlop (BMW) close in third. On the second tour, Harrison, ever the bridesmaid, got the bit between his teeth and overtook Todd to record a popular victory by 11.6 seconds with Dunlop 20 seconds further back in third. With 28 podiums in his career, Harrison had just notched up three wins, so his fourth victory was richly deserved.
