Supreme Court challenge to Cape Paterson town boundary

AN APPLICATION has been made to the Supreme Court challenging the process which has led to a restricted town boundary for Cape Paterson.

Confirming the matter will be taken to the Supreme Court, Jim Watson co-founder of the Wallis Watson Group, declined to comment further.

Fiercely opposed to any extension of the Cape Paterson town boundary beyond Seaward Drive, the Cape Paterson Residents and Ratepayers Association (CPRRA) have restated their view that there had been open and transparent consultation throughout the six-year Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) process.

According to CPRRA spokesman, John Coulter, the need to protect the significant landscapes adjoining Cape Paterson was clearly explained when the revised boundary was placed on public exhibition in December 2024, with all parties invited to comment.

"There was overwhelming support (with) 90 per cent of submissions (backing) a

revised boundary to enable the long-term protection of our unique landscapes, flora and fauna, and the adjoining Marine National Park," said Mr Coulter.

However, project managers, Wallis Watson, have previously claimed the owners were denied natural justice.

The site, often erroneously referred to as 'the Wallis Watson land', is 60.2 per cent owned by Bass Coast Shire residents who are part of the Cape Paterson Unit Trust No.1 for which Wallis Watson Group is the project manager.

The State Government's recent draft Final Statement of Planning Policy for Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) within Bass Coast was described by the Cape Paterson Residents and Ratepayers Association (CPRRA) as a win for the local community.

"It will direct future housing away from coastal villages and hamlets towards larger established towns with infrastructure and services," said Mr Coulter. Earlier this month, Wallis Watson considered that the Standing Advisory Committee should be reconvened to provide Wallis Watson with procedural fairness in relation to a decision which stood to restrict development in Cape Paterson for the next 50 years.

Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale MP claimed the town character of Cape Paterson was highly valued by locals and tourists alike for its coastline, beaches, village feel, and natural environment.

"This has gone through an extended process," said Ms Crugnale on Monday.

"Council endorsed by resolution the boundary change at Seaward Drive and a remarkable number of submissions were received from community members through the many formal engagement avenues during this period, and everyone had the opportunity to present their submissions at the Standing Committee hearings as well."

Bass Coast Shire Council this month formally endorsed the final draft of its Statement of Planning Policy (SPP) as required by the Victorian Government DAL legislation, though Cr Ron Bauer claimed the motion was a Shire rubber stamp during the meeting.

"I am still concerned about the natural justice afforded to developers in Cape Patterson," said Cr Bauer at the time.

"They initially invested monies under one set of criteria and have now been confronted with a boundary change which prohibits expansion and locks in the current town boundary."

A haven turned into a hell

A 1920's cottage in the leafy, historical Caledonian Cresent of Wonthaggi was meant to be Danielle and Ale's safe haven, a retreat, a place of peace and healing and an investment for the hardworking couple's family.

Now, three years later, their family has been torn apart, Ale's mental health has suffered significantly, their privacy has been destroyed, the value of their investment has deteriorated, and their dream property has quite literally become a living nightmare.

In June 2023, eight new developments under the State Government's Homes Victoria, Big Housing Build, valued at \$5.3 billion, were announced.

One of these was the twelveunit facility, all with balconies. at 6.3 metres tall, set out on a 1000m2 block, at 9 Caledonian Crescent by Mind Australia (Mind).

The facility is to cater to people living with significant mental health and wellbeing challenges.

"It is a monstrosity. So out of place. It's broken us, and no doubt others in the quiet, historic street. We are at a loss for what to do. No governance. A business allowed to do whatever they want, to 'help others' at what detriment to everyone else, around that development, who have to live with it?" said Danielle.

This is not a case of Not In My Back Yard (NIMBY).

Each resident who spoke to the Sentinel Times explicitly said they support social housing in their street; it is the size of the project and the impact that they are opposed to.

Their concerns about the facility are their privacy and peace being destroyed, the value of their homes dropping, their sense of safety being diminished, the character of the street being destroyed, and the lack of parking infrastructure that has and will continue to cause congestion-related issues.

To rub salt in the wound, Danielle and Ale bought the property from a couple in 2022, who worked at the Bass Coast Shire Council, who reportedly knew about the impending project and neither the couple, nor Council disclosed this information to

of this going on," said Ale's neighbour Pam, substantiating his claim.

Sadly, Danielle and Ale have since divorced, and Ale is renovating the house so they can rent it out, with a view to selling it - according to the couple, at a huge loss.

Ale's mental health issues have been exacerbated by the excessive amount of construction and workers' noise, dust and pollution, lack of privacy and a complete disruption to

"I've got PTSD, depression and anxiety because I was witness to the Melbourne Bourke Street massacre in 2017.

"In the last two and a half, or three years, I've been using this place to heal, have chickens and grow a veggie garden. I go fishing. I love it. I go diving. I go spear fishing. The waters have been my source of healing," ex-

"But unfortunately, this year, when the construction started, I went downhill.

"I personally don't go out the back anymore because I'm exposed to people I don't want to be. I get upset because it's so intrusive to my privacy.'

Ale has spent \$10,000 on a fence that was required for the construction and has contacted Mind several times asking for adequate screening to be put in place, which the organisation agreed to on June 30, 2025, but no action has been taken since.

According to overlooking building regulations within Victoria, developments should not have a direct line of sight either into an adjacent building's habitable room or into a secluded private open space of an existing dwelling, and measures must be taken to screen 90 per cent of the perimeter with a wall or other barrier.

"It is ironic, because this development is for people with acute mental health, I understand that and I love the intent, but unfortunately, by doing so, it has destroyed my healing place," said Ale.

Compounding these issues for Ale is the lack of communication and public consultation around the project, and the lack of transparency and accountability from local and state authorities.

Very little has been imparted to the residents about the project, and one agency simply points the finger at the other, with the Bass Coast Shire Council stating:

"The proposal at 9 Caledonian Cr, Wonthaggi, was exempt from requiring a planning permit as it complied with state-wide exemptions for the provision of Community Care Accommodation.

"Given this exemption, there was no application before Council to consider the planning merits of the proposal, nor was there an opportunity for the application to be advertised publicly for feedback from the community.

However, while the Victorian Planning Scheme provides an exemption to the usual local government planning application process for projects such as Community Care Accommodation, the development is still required to meet all usual

building standards for height, setbacks, overshadowing, access and egress, and the permit was approved on this basis - by Council.

"The Bass Coast Shire Council, as the decision-making authority, has confirmed that the project meets the requirements of Clause 52.22 of the Bass Coast Planning Scheme for Community Care Accommodation," stated Mind CEO, Gill Callister. "Mind's subsidiary, The Haven Foundation, is a Community Housing Provider and can develop residential properties where land is zoned residential."

Danielle and Ale have contacted lawyers, who want thousands of dollars to conduct research and due diligence. Legal Aid have refused to take the case because it goes against a government body.

"The optimal outcome for us? We fu**ing sell that place and get out of there, right? But we're going to lose so much money," said Danielle.

"It's fine to build these things. But there's land everywhere down there. Why would you put it in that location, that size? It is so out of place. I get that we need mental health housing – we might even need it in the future – but it's wrong to do it in that way."

"Yes, it's going to benefit a number of people, but how many other people's lives is it going to stuff up?

"And why the fu** can they get away with that," added Danielle.

Driver so drunk he didn't know he'd hit someone

A 47-year-old Narre Warren man who allegedly struck and killed a 68-year-old, retired retail worker from Wonthaggi, on Sunday afternoon, March 2 this year, was allegedly so drunk he didn't know he'd crashed into the woman and her friend's dog. The critically injured local woman, Heather Mills, was taken to hospital, but later died of her injuries. The dog died at the scene. The incident happened in Campbell Street, Wonthaggi where Ms Mills was taking a friend's dog for a walk.

Sampath Jayasundara, who appeared by video link at the Latrobe Valley Magistrate's Court last Friday, July 25, to face 15 charges; one of culpable driving causing the death of Heather Mills, one of failing to stop after being involved in a fatal collision and another of failing to render assistance, allegedly recorded a blood/alcohol reading of 0.268 at the time, more than five times the legal limit.

Twelve other charges have been laid against Mr Jayasundara, including possession of cannabis, failing to provide a name and address, failing to report the incident, careless and dangerous driving, crossing the dividing line in both Campbell Street and Chisholm Road.

Mr Jayasundara has pleaded guilty to the charge of culpable driving causing death, but according to his lawyer, Tony Hargreaves, he is taking issue with the lesser but still serious charges of failing to stop and failing to render assistance, because he was simply too drunk to know his car had struck the victim.

Mr Hargreaves said his client had no issue with the fact that he didn't stop and render assistance but maintained that not all of Section 61(3) of the Road Safety Act (1986) was made out, specifically (b) that "the driver of the motor vehicle knows or ought reasonably to have known that the accident had occurred and had resulted in a person being killed or suffering serious injury".

Mr Hargreaves said his client's very high blood/alcohol reading was consistent with him falling asleep and crossing to the wrong side of the road, but that chest-worn CCTV police video footage supported the claim that Mr Jayasundara didn't know anyone had been struck and injured.

These matters are yet to be resolved, and the case is due to return to the Latrobe Valley Magistrate's Court on Friday, September 19, 2025.

Mr Jayasundara's bail has been extended to that date.

'Procurement' biggest area of corruption risk, says Cr Schelling

APPEARING before State Government's Inquiry into Fraud and Corruption Control in Local Government on Monday this week, South Gippsland Mayor Cr John Schelling said he regarded "procurement" as the biggest area of risk of corruption for local shires.

Cr Schelling attended the inquiry with the shire's Manager of Governance and Integrity, Rhys Matulis, where the local council representatives fielded questions about councillors' disclosure of interests, equity of funding across the shire's three wards, and processes in place to deal with fraud or corruption issues highlighted by the community, staff and councillors.

On the issue of disclosure of interests, Cr Schelling said councillors relied on the advice of shire officers when filling out their disclosure statements, also noting he was comfortable with the equity of funding across the three wards, that needs were assessed shire-wide not on an individual equity basis.

LOADED with suitcases ready By Bruce Wardley to reunite with family in the USA, local couple Debbie and Frank were forced to wait in the biting cold at the Inverloch bus stop with no bus shelter.

The bus shelter was damaged and removed by Bass Coast Shire Council after a car crashed into the bus stop in January, injuring a 15-year-old boy.

One possible reason for the delay in replacing the bus stop could be the planned reversal of the service road behind the bus shelter to operate in a oneway easterly direction to maintain operation of the bus stop during construction of a multistorey development overlooking

Provision for electric vehicle integration within the car parking area behind the bus stop to allow for future installation of electric vehicle charging infrastructure could be another reason.

All plausible explanations, but not good enough for commuters waiting for a bus at Inverloch on The Esplanade in winter without any shelter from the wind or rain.

PROPERTY owners along The Esplanade at Sunderland Bay have had enough.

Presented with a special charge scheme to seal The Esplanade between Sunderland Bay Road to Zephyr Court and improve drainage, residents just want the job done.

"We want it to go ahead in November," said property owner Gavan. "Eighty-seven per cent of residents have voted for it."

Bass Coast Shire Council received a petition from property owners requesting a road and drainage upgrade project for The Esplanade in March 2024.

After engaging with affected property owners between July and August 2024 Council delivered a range of concept options and costs for community consideration.

"The process was democratic," said Gavan. "We were asked if we would like to sign a petition to council."



Capital works by Westernport Water are already in progress on The Esplanade at Sunderland Bay with a Special Charge Scheme to seal the road and improve drainage on the way.

The total project cost is estimated at \$1,849,550.

After the deduction of amounts to be paid by Council, the cost of the proposed scheme to each individual property is estimated at between \$11,938.28 and \$28,897.69.

New cop in town: Loch's long wait ends as Senior Constable Conti takes up post

IT IS Senior Constable Giuseppe Conti's first week as the new cop in the town of Loch, and after a couple of years without a police officer, locals have welcomed him warmly to the town.

A desire for a change and a country town with a strong sense of community to raise his family in led the officer to apply for the position in Loch.

Having originally come from Melbourne's western suburbs, the Senior Constable gained experience over the past few years policing in the country communities of Central Victoria, before wanting a change.

"I just wanted to try something new, and I thought, well, if I'm going to try something new, I might as well do everything new. A new role. A new community. A new everything," said Snr Const. Conti.

"We moved into town right at the start of the school holidays. I wanted to start at the start of school term, just so it was a nice smooth transition for everybody at home."

In his first week on the job, Snr Const. Conti has introduced himself to business owners, local community groups and other curious locals, and he has been astonished at the response.

"Before I even introduced myself as a police officer, I introduced myself as new in the area, and people in this area are so welcoming to new people. It's absolutely amazing," he said.

"They are very excited to have

a police officer in town since they haven't had one for a couple of years. I just had a good chat with them. Told them what I expect from them and what they should expect from me. I've let everyone know that I'm here for them."

The new police officer will be working fulltime hours on various shifts, and when the lights are on and the police van is there, it's a good sign he is on duty. When off duty he advises people to call 000.

Loch and surrounds have seen their fair share of break-ins, theft and vandalism recently and Snr Const. Conti puts this down to a number of different issues.

"When I found out I got this position, I really threw myself into what was happening in town, and the big drivers, from what I can see, especially with thefts and burglaries (are) youth driven crime. These are from offenders – that we get for these kinds of crime – from outer areas, so they're not local people that are committing these particular crimes.

"In terms of vandalism, that's

local people and unfortunately in small country towns (there's) not much to do, so people just get up to mischief.

"The big thing is road policing out here. I've noticed that a lot of collisions occur, especially soon after it starts raining."

On only his second shift in town, the officer was called out to a collision on the Douin Road, where unfortunately, someone had rolled their car.

But Snr Const. Conti believes that police presence in the area can help lower the incidence of crime and will be covering the towns of Grantville, Nyora and Poowong as well.

"Where I previously lived, I was eight minutes from my single-member police station. As soon as the police officer wasn't in town, their local IGA was burglarised a number of times and they had a few incidents. So having a police officer in town, someone showing their face, someone driving up and down the street, interacting with the public, is a very big deterrent."

The officer commented that while dealing with crime and road accidents is a huge part of his work, he is also big on victim-centric policing.

"I really try to look after victims and really make sure that they're heard because they are voiceless when it comes to crime. Usually, it's all about the offender and everyone forgets about the poor victim. Also, the idea of helping people is a great thing. I think it's a very noble cause to be a part of," he said.



Offshore wind energy discussions in Toora

INTERESTED attendees at Toora Hall chatted about renewable energy on Wednesday, particularly offshore wind energy generation, with representatives of VicGrid and a dozen energy project proponents there, future job opportunities and other benefits for locals being key areas of interest.

As a learning support adviser assisting trainees and apprentices at TAFE Gippsland, Louisa Vale said she is excited about the "genuine job opportunities" that will arise in areas such as construction and maintenance.

She said that given the different skillset that will be required, TAFE Gippsland is busy determining what traineeships and courses to offer to prepare people to seize future opportunities.

South Gippsland Shire Council was strongly represented at the Toora session, with Mayor John Schelling, CEO Allison Jones and senior staff present.

Ms Jones said the focus is on maximising benefits of the off-shore wind energy generation industry for the community, environment and the economy.

Cr Schelling elaborated on what council is striving to achieve

"What we're trying to do here is line up the Federal, State and Local Governments, so we're all talking from the same position; currently, you've got the Federal Government doing one thing, the State Government doing another thing, and then we're picking up the pieces at the bottom," he said.

"We're trying to all be on the same page so that we can work for the community benefit that's going to come out of offshore wind (energy generation) for South Gippsland."

Cr Schelling recalled the

benefits that flowed into the local area through Barry Beach with the thriving oil and gas industry of the 1960s and 1970s, saying the aim is to ensure comparable community benefits flow from the offshore wind energy sector.

He stressed the importance of the Federal and State Governments letting people know what they are doing to meet future energy requirements, highlighting the fact people are concerned about running out of electricity when the region's current power stations close.

One of the proponents at Wednesday's session, Blue Mackerel, has started its environmental surveys, which feed into the required environmental impact assessments, a range of complex surveys being conducted on and offshore.

All up, that is expected to take place over about the next three and a half years, with a timeframe of two years for the required surveys and expectations that the environmental impact assessments will take a further six months, followed by an extensive government assessment likely to take another year.

Should projects be deemed viable, a competitive process will take place and sufficient finance will need to be secured by successful proponents.

Southerly 10, which is responsible for the Star of the South project, is the furthest along the lengthy path of requirements, having received an exploration licence back in 2019 to determine industry feasibility, enabling it to have completed a lot of the studies other proponents are undertaking now.

The next aim for Southerly 10 is to progress to public exhibition in relation to environmental approvals, later this year or early next year, enabling members of the

public to comment, with the option to view summaries or detailed reports.

Werner Theinert of Harmers Haven was an interested visitor at the Toora renewable energy session given he teaches a course about renewables, sustainability and resilience at Wonthaggi U3A.

He is keen to learn more about the bidding process that will take place between offshore wind energy project proponents.

"There's a race on; the power stations are getting older by the day and it's time to get something done to get this thing on the road," Werner said of the need for action.

In the meantime, he continues to inform his U3A class about subjects including solar panels and household batteries, ways in which some of those who are in a position to are taking charge of their own energy needs.

Can you offer Bruce the pawfect home filled with love?

KELPIE cross Bruce can't wait to share his affection, looking forward to finding a home with someone who can spend lots of time with him and provide plenty of exercise and attention, Sentinel-Times visiting him at the South Gippsland Shire Council-run pound and animal shelter in Korumburra.

Council took over the facility in July 2023 and is proud not to have euthanised a single rehomeable animal.

Community safety officer Hayley Cranston described Bruce, who was found as a stray in Leongatha, as "highly energetic", adding that he loves a cuddle, both of which became quickly apparent as he went for a short walk with her and senior community safety officer Rod Banks.

Bruce, who is believed to be about two years old, has a fondness for toys and balls and would be ideally suited to someone with a strong routine.

While council's focus is on getting animals home to their owners, those that are unclaimed or surrendered are either transferred to other rescue organisations or adopted directly from council.

Between the start of July last year and the end of this June, 400 animals were impounded by council, with 275 of those

cats and 125 dogs.

Of those, 117 animals were reunited with their owners (32 cats and 85 dogs), 151 were rehomed to rescue organisations (128 cats and 23 dogs), while 27 were rehomed directly by council, with 19 of those cats and eight dogs.

Council stressed that registered animals have a greater chance of being reunited with their owners, with registration also reducing the likelihood of fees and infringements being issued.

While council encourages people to have their pets microchipped, the chips can sometimes be difficult to find and owner contact details may lapse, the latter of which is less likely with yearly pet registration, helping return animals wearing their registration tag.

Registration fees help keep the pound running and assist with caring for its residents.

Of the 400 animals impounded over the specified period, only 45 were registered, 34 of which were able to be returned directly from the vehicle without having to go to the pound, 29 of those being dogs and the remainder cats.

Surrenders accounted for 91 of the impounded animals, 57

ity of which were semi-owned or from farm colonies of cats that had got out of control.

of those being cats, the major-

surrendered for a variety of reasons.

Council has agreements with 18 rescue organisations, both local and across the State, which assist in rehoming animals when council can't do so directly.

"We have great working relationships with local vets and have a team of officers passionate about animal welfare and ensuring the best outcomes for our animals," a council spokesperson said.

Seeing Hayley and Rod interacting with Bruce, and the affection he showed for them demonstrated their fondness for the animals and their caring approach.

All animals available for adoption from the South Gippsland Animal Shelter are listed on PetRescue.

Fight to have a bank in Korumburra is not over yet

KORUMBURRA Save Our Bank working group and local councillors are continuing to push ahead in order to try and secure support from the Bendigo Bank for a Community Bank model.

The current Bendigo Bank in Korumburra is the last bank in town and is due to close on Friday, August 29, 2025.

Two weeks after meeting with the working group, South Gippsland Shire Councillors and Federal Member for Monash Mary Aldred, the Bendigo Bank remain tightlipped on all fronts about the proposal.

"We've had a response which has been less than satisfactory. That means that they're going down the path of looking at the post office option for banking and that's all," said SGSC Mayor John Schelling.

But we haven't given up on that yet. I've asked the Economic Development team (from SGSC) to follow through, to see what they can come up with in response.

"We're very passionate about it. There's going to be no bank between Leongatha and Lang Lang, and Warragul and Wonthaggi. So, it's a fair chunk of land in the middle that's got nothing," the Mayor add-

The Bendigo Bank is, however, offering financial support to Milpara Community House to allow staff to support people requiring assistance with Services Australia and the closure of the bank and to prepare people to use the Bank@Post services.

"The idea is the bank is going to assist

people in changing over to an account that has a card – they are only passbook holders," explained Noelene Cosson, spokesperson for the working group.

"We fear that they have to get their pension then changed into those new accounts, and that's the problem, because that's not easy to do.

"Milpara House is helping people that need assistance with getting their pension into the right account, so that they can then withdraw it at the post office, because the post office only operates with accounts with a card, not passbook accounts.'

The bank itself will reportedly obtain a list of all the people that fit into the category of only having a passbook account and will be inviting those people to come into the Bendigo Branch before it closes, to open a new account.

Milpara House will provide a list of dates and times to the Bendigo Bank as to when those services are available and the bank will then inform their customers.

The Korumburra Save Our Bank working group are still pursuing the Community Bank option and are grateful to have the support and leadership that Council and the Economic Development team can

"We are still pushing for a Community Bank facility. We feel it is extremely shortsighted to leave Korumburra and the surrounding area without a bank, when it could be a success if their business model wasn't set up to fail in Korumburra," said Noelene.

Humble home kitchen to Wonthaggi's newest hit

Wonthaggi had been waiting for, a delicious Indian restaurant in the heart of town, open seven days a week and offering a wide variety of dishes.

Serving Aussie favourites like butter chicken and korma to vegetable samosas and paneer dishes, there is something to suit every taste bud, including a good selection of vegetarian dishes.

The Curry Club began as a modest community food initiative from a family kitchen on Phillip Island and has grown into one of South Gippsland's most beloved Indian eateries.

"We just wanted to make a community," said founder Surdeep Singh, affectionately known as Bunty.

"It was a communityfocused group first... we started from home and sold food to friends and family. It was not like a restaurant before - we had no plans of opening a restaurant."

The Curry Club's origins stretch back to just before the COVID-19 pandemic, when Bunty and his wife Vanita began cooking and delivering meals directly to customers' doors from their family kitchen to earn a bit of extra money for their young family.

"We were cooking in the house and delivering to their doorstep," he recalled. "We didn't think of commercialising it at that time.

The pandemic may have shuttered many restaurants, but it also opened a unique window for this family to grow. With help from Bunty's dad, Amarjit, who was unable to return home due to the pandemic, they navigated lockdowns and council approvals to bring their food to life for locals.

"It took off. We were just busy, and we were fortunate to get a shop in such a good location in front of Woolies in Cowes. I never dreamt of a restaurant, let alone two restaurants," Bunty admitted.

"We wanted to make some extra money, that's why we started cooking from home, that is why it was called a club, because we wanted to make our own

little community selling the food. Even now, we still put the community first."

The Curry Club donates meals to people doing it tough through PICAL and is looking forward to the same opportunities opening in Wonthaggi in the future.

"We'll go and give them like 50 lunch packs, and then they distribute it to the people who need it," he said.

"We try to give back to the community - it's the backbone. It's not about take, take, take from the com-

Now settled into their Wonthaggi location, a decision due to regulars travelling to Cowes from Inverloch, Cape Paterson, Dalyston, and Wonthaggi, The Curry Club continues to serve food tailored to the local palate.

"We picked the favourites of Australians," Bunty ex-

"We don't have a big Indian community in South Gippsland, so we had to pick things that suit the community – less spice, more balance."

That doesn't mean compromise.

"We have a lot of techniques to contain the flavour but eliminate the heat on the tongue," he said.

Their menu may be smaller than some Indian restaurants, but it's finely tuned and still offers a great selection.

"We have a very small menu, so we've mastered what we do," Bunty said.

"These are all my favourites and signatures."

butter Unsurprisingly, chicken is a customer fa-

But Bunty urges locals to try another dish: "I would really recommend people try our korma - it's the perfect balance. Not too sweet, not too spicy.'

And if you're after something a bit special, try their Kashmiri house-made naan - a refined take on the traditional Peshwari style, filled with coconut, ground cashews and almonds, sultanas, and cardamom.


"Not many people try it," Bunty said, "but it's one of the best things you can eat, even on its own.'

The heart of The Curry Club remains grounded in its roots: family, flavour, and a deep respect for the local community.

Calling for a year-round barge service to Point Leschenault Jetty

PARKS Victoria is looking for an experienced operator to operate a year-round barge transport service to French Island using the landing site at Point Leschenault Jetty.

Spirit of French Island, which currently operates the barge from Corinella on the eastern side of Western Port to French Island, is looking to continue the service.

"The Spirit of French Island has been the French Island barge for just on 20 years," said manager and skipper for six years Brad Thomas.

"Terry Easy owns it and loves the place," said Brad.

"One of a kind, Terry was raised on French Island as a boy.

"He's very environmentally conscious."

Two and a half times larger than Phillip Island, French Island is 75 per cent National Park.

Accommodating two standard-size cars, or a larger truck, the Spirit of French Island barge also takes foot passengers, but visitors to French Island are advised to arrange transportation at the other end as there are limited facilities once you land.

Calling for an Expression of Interest (EOI), Parks Victoria is seeking a high-quality barge operator with the vision and the capacity to continue the delivery of a year-round barge service using the barge landing site at Point Leschenault Jetty for berthing, and the loading and unloading of vehicles, plant and equipment.

The Point Leschenault Jetty landing site at French Island has been described as a rare berthing opportunity with a barge licence offered for between three to 10 years up to 2035; it is the current barge landing area.

The successful applicant will be invited to enter discussions with the Corinella Foreshore Reserve Committee of Management for the issuing of a barge berthing and landing licence over the eastern landing site at Corinella.

The successful applicant will be responsible for all costs associated with any capital works and the ongoing maintenance and operation of the berthing area.

A compliant EOI response is required for the proposed use of the berthing site at Point Leschenault Jetty, including the loading and unloading of vehicles, plant and equipment, and ancillary uses reasonable to the operation of a vehicular barge.

Acting Commercial Director of Parks Victoria, Elise Armitage, said it was the first time the licence has been offered competitively in more than 10 years.

The current barge crew is well-regarded in the local community according to Brad.

"To provide a service for all those years without fault is a true testament to those who make it possible."

New street library proves a drawcard in Bair Street

LEONGATHA'S impressive street library proved a hit on Wednesday, having just arrived at its home outside Nick's Clothing, the shop's owners and the mobile library's creator delighted with the public's response.

Former councillor Rosemary Cousin drove the idea of a book-swap facility in the heart of town, inspired by one she saw elsewhere, approaching Paul Hendry of Leongatha Men's Shed about creating one locally.

He threw himself into the project with his usual enthusiasm, producing the largest street library this scribe has seen, which was actually a downsized version of his original plan.

"I must admit, it came up a bit bigger than I had originally thought it might," Paul said of the contrast between what he visualised in the planning stage and the finished product, but he is confident there'll be plenty of books to fill it.

Paul had some help from friends at the Men's Shed in managing the heavy plywood used in constructing the sturdy bookshelves.

Nick's Clothing owners Louis Jess and Nic Vitetta are happy to do their bit for the community and will bring the library inside each evening and if it starts to rain too heavily, with Louis also having contributed some paint to the project and Rosemary donating funding.

While it took a bit of a gang to transport the mobile library to its home, it will be no trouble moving it in and out of the shop, given it is on sturdy wheels from an old hospital bed.

As well as building the shelves, Paul filled them with a selection of his books, comprising works of fiction, a cookbook and some Australian picture books.

He wrote a few instructions for library visitors, encouraging them to swap books, with those deposited to be in good condition, or borrow briefly if stopping for a nearby cup of coffee and wanting something to read or flick through.

With his characteristic humour, Paul noted that Mills & Boon books are not permitted, saying they will be placed in "file 13", apparently a polite way of referring to a rubbish bin.

Vicki Whelan was quick to

check out Bair Street's new attraction.

"It's amazing to see it in the main street," she said, declaring it "wonderful" and saying she had already spotted about 10 books she'd like to read.

"It's lovely looking out for other people's enjoyment," Vicki said.

Her reaction and that of others seemed beyond Paul's expectations.

"I'm over the moon with the attention it's already got," he

Louis and Nick were also relishing standing outside the store chatting to those who came for a look at the books, with a great community vibe evident, the library looking the part alongside a rack of clothing.

Community Bank Mirboo North and District celebrate 15 years

THE Community Bank Mirboo North and District celebrated their 15th birthday last Wednesday with a sausage sizzle, cookies and pens for staff, stakeholders and the community.

Over the last decade and a half, the bank has given 80 per cent of its profits back to the local community, with a current total of \$2.6 million donated.

"Obviously, we can't make a profit without customers and we always say people have to bank somewhere, so they might as well come bank with us," said executive officer Anne-Marie Dieperink.

The bank was born when the town was left without one about 20 years ago.

Locals rallied together and the Bendigo Bank was happy to sign an agency franchise at the time.

One staff member manned the agency alongside a roster of volunteers who would sit in the agency one at a time, because a minimum of two staff members were required for it to be open.

Five years in, and the community once again got together to see if they could make it into a full branch, under the com-

munity banking model.

"They got a whole steering committee together. They went around town because they needed to sell \$800,000 worth of shares locally to be able to source the funding to start the branch," explained Anne-Marie

"They worked so hard because they still needed to get that money together and were successful at the last minute. They got over their target, actually, and then used that money to start up the bank. So that was 15 years ago now."

Funding from the bank has

gone to community and sporting groups for many different projects over the years, including the Mirboo North pool, education support awards, emergency funding and social welfare support.

"By having this bank in town, they say every local dollar turns over six times. (For example), we pay Jess and Jess takes it to the IGA and then the IGA goes to the bakery (etc), and so every dollar turns around six times within the community."

There are more than 200 community bank branches in Australia, and they are valuable assets as they are located primarily in regional communities.

Under the model, staff are trained by Bendigo Bank in their systems, processes and procedures, offering services that match the major banks, and a board of directors oversee the business.

"It's such a great model. It's very unique. We would not have been here except for our community. It's been amazing," said Anne-Marie, adding they have another ten years of guaranteed operation.

"So as long as we make the profits, we will stick around."

Drone training a first for South **Gippsland** regional schools

LEONGATHA Secondary College is about to offer the first regional full drone licence and qualification training course for a cluster of school students within South Gippsland.

Funded by the Martin Carlson Foundation in partnership with South Gippsland Bass Coast Skills Alliance (SGBC TSA) and South Gippsland Bass Coast Local Learning and Employment Network (LLEN) the Drone Taster Program will be run at Leongatha Secondary College from September 11 to 12.

The drone licence course is for Year 10 students who are serious about doing a Certificate III in Aviation in 2026 and 2027 and interested in a career in the aviation industry.

The Drone Taster Program will be run over two days with an introduction to the drone industry and drone technology, types of drones and industry use cases, drone rules and airspace basics, sub-2kg CASA regulations, and briefings on safety and safety zones.

Careers in the drone industry will be explored, including the demand for drone technology, job roles, licensing pathways, flight control skills and drone simulators.

Flight preparation and pre-flight and safety checks will also be covered, including logging and orientation, scenariobased discussion groups and a quiz on the first day's activities.

The second day of training will provide opportunities for practical flying sessions, including hovering, drone movement, and take-off and landing

An afternoon flying session will include flight circuits, filming, and mission control basics, and real-world data capture and mapping concepts, as well as a course overview, pathways into RPAS careers, licensing and RePL and school-based Cert III delivery.

Certificates of Participation will be presented at the conclusion of the training.

The program is fully CASA-aligned for content and safety protocols using qualified RPAS trainers with structured sessions for both beginners and advanced learners.

Places are limited and prospective students are asked to confirm their place by contacting their school by Friday, August 15, 2025.

The cost is \$50 per student and bookings can be made through Trybooking.com.


With generous support from the Korumburra-based Martin Carlson Foundation, Team Blue Flame competed against some of the best student teams in Victoria.

Facing tough competition, the two Korumburra S.C. representative teams Hydrospeed and Blue Flame ran a magnificent fourhour endurance race coming in 11th and 12th.

The Hydrospeed team started in third and fourth position during the first hour, running a consistent race, then sat in sixth position for the majority of the time until they ran out of speed and were overtaken by more strategic teams. Blue Flame suffered some early car difficulties but persisted and got back on the track later in the session.

STEM Coordinator at Korumburra Secondary College, Stacie Witton, paid tribute to the Martin Carlson Foundation for providing an invaluable opportunity for Korumburra S.C. students to learn, innovate, and grow both as individuals and as a team.

"Throughout the program, these future leaders have developed

the creativity, ingenuity and real-world problem-solving skills needed to tackle tomorrow's energy challenges," said Ms Witton.

"On behalf of our students and school community, I would like to extend our heartfelt gratitude to the Martin Carlson Foundation for sponsoring our team's participation in the 2025 H2GP Challenge. Well done to everyone, you all did an amazing job.'

The H2GP Challenge was described as an extraordinary

experience for the Korumburra students who gained hands-on skills in engineering, teamwork and problem-solving while also developing presentation and communication skills by sharing their journey with others.

"Despite facing unexpected complications on race day, the Korumburra teams performed exceptionally well, an achievement the College is incredibly proud of," said Ms Witton.

"Our results could have been

even higher without those raceday challenges, but as our students quickly learned, that's the reality of racing."

Team Blue Flame won the Best Presentation Award, recognising modifications made to the car and the hurdles the team overcame during their journey in the competition.

The students also wrote and performed a creative and highly informative rap about the H2GP Challenge, which left a lasting impression on everyone, according to Ms Witton.

The Hydrogen Grand Prix (H2GP) program is the largest hydrogen-powered model vehicle competition in the world, challenging tomorrow's innovators to design, engineer, build and race their own remote-controlled cars powered entirely by hydrogen

The Martin Carlson Foundation was formed to advance the education, welfare and health of young learners living in rural cities and country towns.

Meeniyan Op-shop hopes to continue to thrive at same location

nity Op-shop (MACS) has been running for 17 years with 50 volunteers helping to raise money for the town, and now the building they operate from is up for

About 20 local non-profit groups benefit from MACS, a couple of these are in Dumbalk and a couple are in Stony Creek, but the rest are in Meeniyan.

The sporting clubs benefit, as well as the Progress Association, the Rec' Reserves, the Primary School, the Town Hall, the Community Garden, and the CFA, just to name a few.

\$20,000-\$30,000 Between per quarter is given out to the groups who can save it or spend it, depending on their needs; and MACS celebrated a whopping \$1 million milestone in donations earlier this year.

The successful volunteer organisation have been running from the prominent main street location for the past eight years, and while they have a lease until 2027, they have their fingers crossed that a potential new landlord will extend their lease thereafter.

"We would hope that they'll continue. But if they don't want to continue with the same

business, then hopefully they'll give us enough time to find something. But at the moment, Meeniyan is pretty full," said Loris Tuxen, president of the MACS Committee.

With its large showroom and large yard for storage, it is the third and best location the organisation has been in, added

"There are one or two smaller shops on the market, but not as suitable as where we are."

Major contributions from MACS go toward keeping several of the towns vital services alive and thriving, including the community food cupboard, the community garden and the town

Each volunteer nominates an

organisation, which then receives the money from the hours they work, and this can be varied depending on what's needed.

"If there's something around town that is needed, then we will hear and people can change who they donate to. So, the Meeniyan Progress Association are wanting to do a mural on the wall on IGA, so people are putting a bit more money to them. When various clubs need some equipment, people put a bit more into them, and so on," explained Loris.

Loris puts MACS enduring success down to the dedicated volunteers and the reasonable prices they charge, in comparison to other op-shops.

"We run a lot at 50 cents," explained Loris.

Volunteers of the store also ensure they minimise waste and landfill for items they don't think they can sell by passing these on to Lifeline and are one of the few stores that Lifeline still picks up

"It's a pretty good draw card in the town. People come from far and wide, and people often say, 'oh, I'm here on my way to a holiday,' that sort of thing. So, it's quite well known I think, for those who pass through the town," said Loris.

The daffodils may already be in bloom in Leongatha, but not for much longer if the daffodils continue to disappear from public garden beds.

Keep your hands off our daffodils

THE daffodils may already be in bloom in Leongatha, but you might be lucky to see one this year despite the best efforts of South Gippsland Shire Council.

Just metres from the home of the Leongatha Daffodil Festival, the first few yellow blooms just emerging alongside the Leongatha Memorial Hall were ripped from their garden beds over the week-

With the Leongatha Daffodil and Floral Show encompassing the Daffodil Festival, Camellia Show and Photo Exhibition still a month away on August 28, 29 and 30, few daffodils may be left if the blooms continue to disappear overnight.

Contrary to popular opinion, cutting daffodils early does not encourage more flowers to bloom later.

Responding to a request by Sentinel-Times on Monday, the South Gippsland Shire Council CEO Allison Jones stated:

"Thankfully, picking daffodils and other flowers is not a common issue in South Gippsland. Our crews take great pride in creating vibrant, colourful spaces for everyone to enjoy, so we appreciate the community leaving these floral displays untouched for all to enjoy.

"However, the community is welcome to pick items from our edible gardens throughout the

More people seeking urgent care locally

MORE people are seeking urgent medical care across South Gippsland, and they are finding new ways to get it. Over the past 12 months, more than 5000 people have presented to Gippsland Southern Health Service's (GSHS) Leongatha Urgent Care Centre (UCC), an average of about 15 each day. At the same time, the number of people seeking urgent care at the Korumburra hospital has dropped from two to about one per day.

Local residents are also turning to virtual support, such as Nurse on Call and Victorian Virtual Emergency Department to get medical advice.

GSHS operates the free Leongatha UCC with on-staff doctors, while the Korumburra UCC is in partnership with doctors from the Korumburra Medical Centre.

GSHS CEO Lou Sparkes said there had been a shift away from Korumburra following the adoption of a new medical work model, leading to free urgent care in Leongatha.

"If people attend the Korumburra UCC, doctors are called for serious cases and supported by ward nurses, but more often ambulances will be called to take people to Leongatha," she said.

Moved on after 59 days parked in Wonthaggi business district A WOMAN and her dog have then it would have been totally phoned the police. Fortunately, aggressive most of the time, and

been moved on from McBride Avenue after her vehicle was towed on Wednesday, July 23, at 6.15pm after 59 days.

It comes after local businesses and their staff endured over eight weeks of harassment and abuse by the woman, who had been offered assistance with accommo-

"Not only is parking limited along McBride Avenue as it is, but she was incredibly antagonistic towards the shopkeepers, and made us feel uncomfortable," business owner Clair Burns stated.

"Had she been nice and friendly, and not caused any problems,

different: however, her attitude and the mess she created, we are glad she has finally left. She had to move on."

It's understood she was banned from entering two local venues after harassing patrons and would often target older individuals begging for money.

"It took too long," Clair added, stating that during the 59-day period the woman only received one parking fine.

"After the first couple of weeks, I went to ask if she was okay, saying I was quite concerned for her, and she went ballistic - taking photos of the shop, throwing rubbish, I

she wasn't aggressive towards our customers, but she was definitely aggressive towards the shopkeepers. You didn't know if it would be a good day, and you'd be left alone or if she was going to go off."

Clair was not alone; staff at a local licensed venue were also harassed and left to continuously clean up the mess she had left on their outside tables.

"She allowed her dog to use the footpath out the front of the venue. The staff had to ask her to pick up after her dog on a few occasions," owner Paradee Titulaer stated.

"She also harassed our patrons for money. She was quite

council and the police were powerless to help us."

On one occasion, Clair was also forced to contact council after the dog was left in the vehicle for over five hours, but as it was not deemed a "hot day", the council were powerless to smash a window.

Though understanding of her situation, local businesses want to ensure the same thing doesn't happen in the future, stating "it simply should not have got to the point it did" with authorities powerless to help local small businesses facing harassment and abuse.



Is Equine Assisted Therapy covered by NDIS?

THE short answer: Yes!

If you've been told that the NDIS no longer funds Equine Assisted Therapy, you're not alone – so let's clear up the confusion.

Since Minister Bill Shorten's announcement in March 2024 about the need for services to meet the "reasonable and necessary" criteria, there's been a lot of misunderstanding - especially around therapies involving animals. Many participants, Support Coordinators, Plan Managers, and even some Local Area Coordinators were left thinking that animalassisted therapies had been ruled out completely. What has changed is the emphasis on quality and qualification. It's no longer enough to offer time with animals and call it therapy. To be considered under NDIS funding, Equine Assisted Therapy must now be delivered by a qualified professional - such as a counsellor, psychologist, or occupational therapist – who uses equine-based activities as a 'tool' within their structured, goal-oriented therapy.

This is what's now referred to as 'Equine Assisted Therapy', a recognised form of 'Animal Assisted Therapy'. These services remain claimable under NDIS, as long as

they meet the criteria for being "reasonable and necessary" and are provided by a therapist with relevant qualifications.


Providers who do not hold a formal qualification with a regulatory body may offer what's often called "animal therapy," but this is only fundable under specific categories such as Innovative Community Participation, not therapy sup-

AS A journalist, Ben Harvey is no mug, apparently. He's been around.

Won 'Columnist of the Year 2022' in the WA media awards, according to his LinkedIn page.

In an article in the online publication 'The Nightly' owned by Seven West Media which publishes The West Australian, the newspaper he has worked for since 2012, he has included 'Leongatha' in the same sentence as 'Snowtown', 'Columbine', the Norwegian island of 'Utoya' and Martin Bryant's 'Port Athur'.

'Welcome to Murder Town' is the catchy graphic of a stylised postcard with scenes of Leongatha and Erin Patterson that accompanies the article.

"The dairy province of Leongatha used to be famous for its milk and cheese," he says, "but on July 29, 2023, Erin Patterson ensured it would subsequently be known for a different food.'

OK, yes, we can cop the stuff about Beef Wellingtons and death cap mushrooms, but it's an absolute crock to say that anyone here is concerned about damage to our reputa-

Outsiders might think that, but Leongatha people don't. The reason? Erin Patterson is not one of us.

She's not related to anyone locally, so no tarnished bloodlines. She lived in the town for less than a year before the fateful lunch date, in July 2023, and only lived in Korumburra for 10 years. Again, not related to anyone locally there either.

Unlike our world-class milk and cheese, she's not a product of South Gippsland.

She was, in effect, parachuted in here to commit her heinous crime. We don't own the crime, or her.

By all means, report the news, but leave out the rubbish.

Line of defence to keep the sand at bay

I TREMBLE at what is happening to the Inverloch foreshore. I tremble at the speed with which it is happening. And I tremble at what, in the absence of a workable plan, will happen to it.

At the time of writing, nine houses in Surf Parade, Inverloch, are for sale. I have had a connection with this street since 1963. In my adult life, this is the greatest number of houses to be on the market there at one time. The market is jittery.

The status quo is not working. The costly remedies which government is pursuing



are akin to band-aid treatment for a gaping wound. Without anything more, they are no remedy.

In that context, is Mr Godridge's proposal not worth considering? Why not give it

Faced with nature's erosive - the word is insufficiently strong - force, does Spring Street have the humility to change tack and the gumption to help save Inverloch's foreshore by adopting the Godridge option?

A tribute to a decent chap from his friend

In Gippsland's fields and courtroom halls, Through duty's call and justice's laws, Stood Brad Proudlock, calm and wise With steady hand and watchful eyes. A man who served with heart and might, Both on the land and in the fight.

A life in blue, where courage grew, Inspector Brad saw all things through. From troubled streets to calmer days, He bore the badge with quiet praise. And when he left that trusted post, He farmed the soil he loved the most.

Beside his Jenny, strong and true, Through every storm that they lived through They met life's trials with steadfast grace, Illness could not their bond erase. Together still, through thick and thin, Their laughter echoed deep within.

Though sickness came, and came again, It never broke his will or flame. With humour sharp and spirit high, He stared each challenge in the eye. A quiet strength, not loud or proud, Yet in his eyes, to the sky unbowed.

Five hundred times he stood to serve, A JP firm, with steady nerve. At police desks through thick and thin, He gave his time with his usual grin. And awarded a Fellowship, well deserved, A title fitting one who served.

So here's to Brad, whose name shall stay In hearts that watched him lead the way. With grit and grace and honour bright, He walked his path in truth and light. A Gippsland man, both kind and just A life well lived, a man we held in trust.

IN THE words of Dr Terrance Shannon, "Brad kept good company."

And it's no surprise that Brad's passing on July 4 sent shockwaves through the local community.

You see, he was a regular face around town, not just out and about but always up for a hello and conversation at Wonthaggi Police Station, where he served as a Justice of the Peace, sitting behind the glass window.

A well-known and longterm local resident of Coast and South Gippsland, there are many in the community whose lives have no doubt crossed with Brad's. Notching up 500 shifts as a JP in May, since 2015, Brad at that stage had signed over 45,000 documents both at the signing station and elsewhere, including aged care facilities, Bass Coast Health and at home.

Multiply that by his presence at the station and there's no doubt that there would be few whose paths he hadn't crossed.

"Brad was a special person committed to helping out in the community wherever he could," John Duscher OAM, JP, FRVHJA

"He was part of our small team of JPs who work out of the Wonthaggi Police Station, a service that started over 10 years ago and Brad was one of the original JPs

"I was so pleased to be able to present him with a special award from the Royal Victorian Honorary Justice Association, a Fellowship [in recognition of his 500th shift], which I know he was so proud to receive.'

The sentiment echoed by Sergeant Tim Ryan, who stated that Wonthaggi police were privileged to be a part of Brad's 500th volunteer shift celebrations at Wonthaggi Police Station's Document Signing Station.

"We know that this recognition did mean a great deal to him," Sgt Ryan said, stating it was always a pleasure to see Brad walking through the doors of a morning.

His good humour, experience and local knowledge invaluable to the police.

"Never a man to have a bad day, Brad also gave troubled people many some very good and practical life advice. Likewise, many people who were having a bad day came into the police station and spoke to Brad, and left in a better way, because of his good nature and the care he showed them," Sgt Ryan

catchphrases "Brad's of "Oh no, here's trouble" when he saw the nightshift coming in after doing a long shift on overtime and "Go get'em boys. Drive safe," when the troops were rushing out the door to a major job, will be missed greatly.

"As will his genuine concerns about the local police and their families. He always had time for a chat. making drinks for the busy watchhouse keepers and leaving some Arnott's Assorted biscuits for them to enjoy.'

A man who served his community, many scribed him as a professional, reliable man, a statement this scribe can certainly attest to.

"Brad was an esteemed friend and colleague, very sincere, popular, humble, professional, reliable and a warm, friendly spirit that will never be forgotten," Mr Duscher added.

"He reached out to serve his community and was a regular visitor to our aged care facilities to witness documents and also provided great support through his volunteer work at Bass Coast Health, driving patients to their health appointments across

Melbourne."

A role Brad took great pride in.

"This 'gem' is a huge loss to his family, friends and to the community he loved," Mr Duscher said.

Speaking at Brad's funeral last week, Dr Shannon shared the following (abbrev.):

"We gather today not only to honour the life of a good and faithful man, but to recognise something quietly noble about the path he walked.

"That tradition of that path reaches back to England, when, around the year 1351, King Edward III created the first ever JP. Who was tasked with maintaining the King's Peace, not through force, but with wisdom, fairness, and trust...

"And now, in our own time, in our own quiet corner of Victoria, we have known and served beside a man who wore that same mantle with pride and humility. Brad Proudlock JP FRVAHJ stood for the same ideals - fairness without favour, service without reward, and a steadfast presence when it was most needed.

"He never sought the spotlight, but he stood as part of a long and noble tradition – one that spans nearly seven centuries, to this 16th of July 2025...

"And today, as we lay Brad Proudlock JP FRVAHJ to rest, we do so knowing that he upheld that trust with quiet dignity and honour."

Cherished by all who knew him, rest in peace Bradley Proudlock.

A saviour not from Krypton, but from compassion

I'll admit it upfront – I'm more of a Marvel fan than DC. I've always been drawn to the humour, the humanity, and the messy, relatable flaws of characters like Spider-Man or Iron Man. So I wasn't entirely sure what to expect when I sat down to watch James Gunn's Superman on the weekend.

But I left the cinema unexpectedly moved.

This wasn't just a flashy superhero flick – it had a deeper spiritual pulse. Superman isn't merely a cape-clad icon here. Gunn recasts him as a beacon of human kindness in a world that's grown increasingly unkind.

At a time when our shared story often feels fractured and cynical, Gunn leans into something simple but radical: "Basic human kindness is a value... we have lost."

There's a strong spiritual undertone throughout. Superman as immigrant: born on another world, walking among us, misunderstood and often rejected yet he chooses love over conflict, mercy over fear. That's not just metaphor - it's Gospel.

In the Christian story, Jesus left the divine realm, dwelt with humanity, and embodied compassion and justice.

The film also subverts the usual tragic arc - Superman's adoptive father is still alive. He doesn't just shape Clark through pain, but through steadfast encouragement and presence. It's a beautiful reminder that faith isn't only forged in trial - it grows in the warmth of hope, love, and belonging.

In Superman, the real miracle isn't the flying or the strength. It's this: even in a chaotic world, one life anchored in goodness can pull others toward the light.

And we know the One who first showed us how. No cape reauired.

An exhibition which celebrates the ordinary in an extraordinary way

RACHEL Warren is a local mixed media artist who will be exhibiting her work at Coal Creek this August. Titled Finders Keepers, it is a celebration of texture, colour, and the therapeutic act of gathering and arranging.

Rachel is inspired to create from ordinary objects and is particularly drawn to colours, textures and the placement and shape of objects.

"I'll just see colours, shapes, textures, and something nostalgic, something that means something to me, and I don't know why, but it just excites me, and I'm inspired by it, and I want to make something with it."

One such work in the exhibition features a piece of twine that lay on a road on her farm.

"I really loved the colour pink on the dirt road, and I kept driving over it and over it, and I'm thinking, I really want to do some collages of this pink twine on this brown background."

Seeing and thinking through a creative lens inspires in Rachel the most unusual of ideas, and transforms the ordinary into the extraordinary.

An idea can be sparked by a collection of something, like toothbrushes or little toy cars, or a pun or play on words – such as 'a brush with death', which, Rachel said, will see a toothbrush end up in a coffinlike box.

"I'll just be in my house and I'll think, God, I've got a few of these, and then I'll start thinking, I might do some art with it.

"Sometimes I have to tell people, can you please stop posting new toothbrushes. I've ended that exhibition."

Rachel's love of collage and assemblage began when she was a teenager, and more recently, she has been experimenting with assemblage photography, all of which will form part of the upcoming exhibition.

"The assembly photography started on a trip to Bali, where I started collecting things on the beach, and I couldn't bring them back, so I started just playing around and assembling the things that I found and photographing what I'd make on the sand."

"It was what washed up on

the day, so they're like little, I suppose, time capsules of the day. There'd be old thongs or bits of broken tiles or just different textures of wood."

This sense of discovery, connection and creation is a theme that runs strongly through Rachel's life and work, and none more so than this year, which she has dedicated solely to her art – her therapy – as she also calls it.

"I feel like I'm back at uni, where I can just keep working on something and not have to pack it up. It's fantastic, because I just used to think, well, I've got to stop this. I've constantly had to stop things. So, I can just continue in that flow of working, of creating. I don't have to stop the creative flow, which is lovely. It's making me very happy, for sure. I'm absolutely loving this year."

The Finders Keepers exhibition is about collecting and finding beauty in everyday things, and Rachel is hopeful that viewers will find the works interesting and joyful, even nostalgic, and connect to one bit or another.

"You can kind of stare into them because they're very layered. They're little sort of time capsules of found things, washed-up things, things that are held on to. They're all capsules, so you can look into them, and I hope that they feel some sort of memory or nostalgia or connection in that way," explained Rachel.

"It's playful, I'd like people to smile. My art is not polished or about perfection, but more about discovery, connection and creating your own story."

The nine day festival will again include workshops, art exhibitions, a community market, music, High Tea, our famous Devonshire teas and new additions inspired by the 2026 theme.



Shorthorn success and strong overall market at Leongatha VLE

FATHER and son Greg and Craig Arnott of Ellaswood near Bairnsdale were pleased with their decision to sell at Leongatha VLE on Thursday, their five pens of well-bred Shorthorn steers attracting strong prices, all being snapped up by commission buyer Campbell Ross.

It was the first time the Arnotts have had cattle at Leongatha saleyards, having previously sold at the Pakenham saleyards, online or direct to a feedlot.

Dave Setches of Alex Scott & Staff auctioned the Shorthorns, impressed by their quality and prices as well as the overall demand for steers the agency sold on Thursday.

"The Arnotts have been breeding Shorthorns for many years and they've got the job spot on," he said, remarking that as far as Shorthorns go, the Arnott cattle are as good as you'd see anywhere.

They buy bulls from the highly regarded Eloora Shorthorns.

Dave commented that while Campbell Ross finished up with all the Arnott cattle, there was plenty of competition from the likes of JBS.

Overall, he observed ongoing strong feedlot competition for mid-500-kilo steers, driving prices for those cattle to almost \$5

Weaner steers sold by Alex Scott & Staff fetched well over \$5 a kilo for the best of the lighter calves.

market again and there was probably more agent and local support here today," Dave said, estimating the crowd was double the size of a fortnight ago.

earlier-than-usual sale of many Spring drop calves that went north has created a fear of missing out, with Dave estimating there'll be only about half the number of such cattle available in August and September compared to A13_3025 usual.

"That's why they're taking a big lift and week-onweek they're getting dearer and dearer," he said.

Sentinel-Times chatted to the Arnotts about their Shorthorns.

They run about 200 breeders plus replacements, choosing the breed temperament weight-for-age.

Prices exceeded their expectations, one pen of cattle weighing an average of 425 kilos selling for \$2140 a head at \$5.03 per kilo and a couple of other pens each making \$4.94 per kilo on cattle averaging 392 kilos and 364 ki-

With silage running out and hay getting low, it was time to move on some cattle and given the healthy state of the market, it was an ideal opportunity to do so.

While the Arnotts don't get a lot of feedback on their cattle, what they hear is positive, such as the quick turnoff times their animals achieve.

Concerns over traceability and biosecurity of US beef

INVERLOCH-BASED livestock agent Simon Henderson is shocked by the Federal Government's decision to allow US beef from cattle born or raised in Canada or Mexico to be imported into Australia, pointing to concerns about a lack of lifetime traceability.

That sentiment is shared by the likes of the Federal Leader of the Nationals, David Littleproud and the president of the Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF), Brett Hosking.

Mr Littleproud called for an independent review into the decision, stressing the need to ensure the arrangement meets biosecurity requirements, including traceability.

"I believe Labor's announcement needs to be independently reviewed, with an independent panel set up by industry to review the science behind the decision," he said, adding that the Government hasn't released the protocols to be put in place.

"I am concerned we could be sacrificing our high biosecurity standards for Prime Minister Anthony Albanese to obtain a meeting with US President Donald Trump," Mr Littleproud said.

While Mr Henderson hadn't yet had a chance to read about the situation when he was contacted by the Sentinel-Times on Thursday afternoon, he said he was not aware of any

consultation having taken place with beef producers or anyone in the industry.

"We know that the US is taking a lot of our beef because it's a clean, green product and it is lifetime traceable, so that if there is a disease outbreak, it can be followed up quickly and effectively dealt with," he said.

He noted the reason a ban was put on US beef coming into Australia was because of an outbreak of Mad Cow Disease, something that was highlighted in the Australian media at the time of Donald Trump's sweeping tariff announcements on an array of countries.

The VFF argues traceability must play a key role in protecting Australia's livestock industry following the lifting of restrictions on US beef imports to Australia.

"There's no second chance when it comes to protecting Australia's multi-billion dollar livestock industry from the threat of biosecurity risks," VFF president Brett Hosking said.

produces "Australia some of the cleanest, safest and healthiest food in the world, and the government must be one hundred per cent sure any imported product doesn't risk devastating the local industry."

The ABC quoted Federal Agriculture Minister Julie Collins as saying, "This decision has been purely based on science," but the national broadcaster pointed out that the trade restriction was one of the Trump Administration's key grievances with Australia.

"Some believe the change could help Australia negotiate a better deal with the US, particularly on tariffs," SBS News reports, a sentiment expressed by many other sources.



first aid and patrol operations. This is a hands-on elective that allows students to learn by doing and feeling," Mr Clark explained.

"This year we introduced an







Drouin a step closer to joining West Gippsland competition

WEST Gippsland Football Netball Competition made a step towards expanding its league on Wednesday, July 23.

The competition voted to approve Drouin Football Netball Club's presentation to join the league in 2026.

Presentations from Pakenham and Officer-ROC clubs were not approved.

"Each club had their reasons for voting the way they did. It was decided that Pakenham and Officer were not the right fit at this time," West Gippsland Football Netball Competition (WGFNC) operations manager Brett Tessari said.

"We have requested a meeting with the Gippsland league to discuss bringing Drouin over to us, and we are waiting for a response. If Gippsland refuse, the decision can be appealed with AFL Victoria.

"We are expecting a robust conversation on the subject."

The inclusion of Drouin would expand WGFNC to a 12-team competition next season.

It is viewed as a step towards a divisional competition.

"We are still focused on getting a divisional competition off the ground. We need all clubs to be comfortable and know 100 per cent that it would not be detrimental to them," Tessari said.

"We adopted a strategic plan some time ago and this is a good step down the right path to divisional football."

Tessari said the league would ideally feature 16 teams before a divisional competition could be considered.

Korumburra-Bena Football Netball Club said it is open to the league expanding.

"There is a gap between the bottom and top, and divisional football is a priority for us," Korumburra-Bena club president Ken Myors said.

"A divisional competition would help us to develop our players, both on the field and on the netball court. We would be playing sides of a similar skill level more regularly, rather than having to front teams that are dominating.

"It'd be good for morale and recruitment. We've been having a really good season, but to continue to grow, you need to show that you are winning.

"We support all the clubs in the WGF-NC, and we are conscious these decisions cannot be made lightly. Everything has been discussed thoroughly and respectfully, with all points of view taken into consideration."

Kilcunda-Bass Football Netball Club is also focused on a divisional competition to futureproof the club.

"We believe we need the competition to be divisional to remain sustainable. Kilcunda-Bass currently has a 34 per cent win rate," Kilcunda-Bass club president Shea Eden said.

"So many voluntary hours of work go into keeping the club going and putting a senior side on the ground, so divisional football needs to happen to maintain interest."

WGFNC entered discussions with the potential clubs over the past few months and ensured full compliance with AFL Victoria transfer rules.

The WGFNC board thanked the applicants for their time and honesty during the process and will continue to work in the best interest of community sport.

Tessari said it was encouraging to see three teams interested in joining WGFNC in the one year.

"It shows that the league is an attractive competition. We still have a way to go, but the standard of our football and netball competition is fantastic, which is proven in the success in the interleague competitions.

"Most recently, our juniors secured a back-to-back win, and their third win in four years,

"We don't need to go a million miles an hour – we just need to get everything in order and make sure all clubs are going to be viable moving forward."
