# OUR GREEN DROUGHT

SOUTH Gippsland is in the grips of a green drought despite above average rain in July and farm dams across the region starting to fill at last.

Wonthaggi rain gauges reached 119.4mm for the month compared to the July average of 97.6mm, but annual totals are well down.

While 94.7mm fell in June, the previous six months all struggled to top the 30mm mark, providing no autumn break for pas-

Rhyll recorded 76.8mm last month compared to a July average of 67.6mm, Wilson's Promontory 161.8mm compared to an average of 122.5mm, Yarram 59mm compared to a July average of 46.8 mm and Pound Creek 87.8 compared to an average of 83.9.

But the rain came too late according to Kernot farmer Peter Brown.

"We're in a green drought because of the cold." he said.

"It's green, but there's not much grass "Dams are starting to fill but they have a

long way to go." Peter said it could take another four weeks before there'll be enough feed for cattle.

"But there are signs spring is on the way,"

"We'll continue to feed out for at least another month until spring."

Local farmers say it could take until mid-

September before the pasture is growing strongly enough to sustain stock.

"Farm dams will be unlikely to fill this year," they said.

"Most dams are only a quarter full, we need more run-off."

Drought support was announced by the State Government over a month ago but according to Nationals MP Melina Bath local farmers are still trying to access it.

They have either received no response or been told the government is taking Expressions of Interest only," said Ms Bath.

"It is unthinkable that the Labor government would announce support then leave our farmers waiting."

# 'Here if you need me' says Aldred MP

the Australian Parliament on Tuesday last week, new Member for Monash, Mary Aldred, invoked a term popular in netball parlance: "Here if you need me".

It looks set to characterise what might turn out to be a long spell as the local Fed-

Having made her obligatory first speech before family, friends, local party members and a strong showing by representatives on both sides of the House, Ms Aldred wasted no time stretching her wings.

On Wednesday, she put a question to the Prime Minister, no less, ultimately answered by the Minister for Climate Change and Energy Chris Bowen, about the rise in power bills for Victorian families.

And on Thursday, she joined the Bendigo Bank pileon with her first Statement by Members, applauding "the Korumburra roundtable's fine advocacy on behalf of our community" and calling on the Albanese government to respond to the Senate inquiry into bank closures in regional Australia.

During her four-day trip to Canberra, Ms Aldred also met with Bass Coast Mayor Cr Rochelle Halstead and CEO Greg Box in Parliament House where a number of important local priorities were discussed, including coastal inundation at Inverloch and Silverleaves, Bass Coast College and local roads.

She hosted a visit by the Trafalgar Primary School and by the weekend she was at "the wonderful Trafalgar Farmers Market" taking the opportunity to meet and chat with locals.

It was a big week, but it's all part of the plan, according to the 3000-word text of her first speech, finishing with the following declaration:

"I recognise that each day I spend in this place is a day closer to when I will leave. I plan to make each day count by advancing the cause for which I am here, a passionate belief in the purpose and potential of the people of

Monash. To my electorate, I asked for your trust and confidence. You have given me the opportunity of a lifetime. I will work my heart out for you.'

Many local organisations, places, causes and people got a mention in a speech that traditionally serves as a reference point for the performance of a local MP, revealing how they went by their own standards.

Ms Aldred has set the bar pretty high and her Leader, Sussan Ley, for one, believes she'll do an excellent job as a local member who is destined for higher office.

Asked at a reception in

the Opposition Party Room last Tuesday evening if she thought Ms Aldred would be a long-time local member, Ms Ley gave her strongest possible endorsement: "She'll be a lot more than that!"

In her speech, Ms Aldred said there were many local priorities but chose to focus on only four:

- Delivering a new West Gippsland Regional Hospi-
- \* Coastal erosion at Inverloch and Phillip Island, calling for a national framework to address coastal inundation across Australia.
- Funding for infrastructure in regional areas as "the

tivity".

 A commitment to the proper care and support for veterans when they re-enter civilian life.

On those subjects she said: "During the last few years, I've worked with local communities in Inverloch and Phillip Island who are staring down the barrel of coastal inundation. They cannot afford to wait years for mitigation; their homes will disappear. They face a problem which many other coastal communities are grappling with, which is why I believe we need a national framework to address coastal inundation across Australia."

"The Prime Minister was once a transport minister who said nearly a decade and a half ago that he believed that 'Infrastructure is the critical enabler of productivity.' I agree. But, in regions like mine, roads and infrastructure still lag generations behind. It's about levelling up opportunities for manufacturers and primary producers who depend on getting their products to market competitively. I'll work with anyone who's prepared to walk the talk on making that investment. But our regions are tired of inaction.'

"I'm not a veteran, but I am passionately committed to improving the lives of those who are. We must properly address the care and sufficient repatriation to civilian life of those who sign up and are forever changed by that call to serve. I commit myself now, until the end of my time in this place, to that effort.'

Ms Aldred has already been appointed to several roles in the parliament including the following:

- Member of the Standing Committee on Appropriations and Administration
- Menber of the Standing Committee on Communications, the Arts and Sport
- Member of the Publications Committee
- Member of the Joint Committee of Public Accounts and Audit

Our green drought

The Nationals are calling for fodder, agistment and water support. The Victorian Government's drought package includes \$144

million in direct support to help farmers and communities across the state with grants up to \$5000 for on-farm improvements to help manage the drought, and an additional \$5000 top-up in 11 local council areas where the drought has hit hardest.

Farm management advice and planning help is available, however service providers to support the delivery of the program have still not been finalised.

Farmer Clive Hollins said cattle prices are good now, but he had to unload stock when prices were down because they simply ran out of feed due to the lack of rain.

"I'm still feeding out despite the rain," said  $\;$ 

"We bale hay and make our own silage but this year we had to buy in hay."

"We have 24 rolls left which might just be enough to get us through."

According to Ian Hitchings it's the worst season since 1975 when farmers had to start shooting cattle because they were worthless.

"Saleyard prices then slumped to \$10/head for cattle.'

Fortunately, according to local producers the Americans are taking all the beef they can get at the moment particularly chopper cattle for grinding beef.

"All their cattle come from feedlots and they're too fat, they have to mix it up with Australian beef.

"China and Japan buy the better quality beef," said Graham Wood.

Agriculture Victoria has suggested farmers use urea to boost winter growth.

After a poor spring and summer and a late autumn break Agriculture Victoria Livestock Industry Development Officer Nick Linden said the need to grow more feed is now a top priority.

# **IN BRIEF**

#### Charges laid for Venus Bay Wombat deaths

A SOUTH Gippsland man has been charged with 20 offences under the Wildlife Act 1975 and the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act 1986 for alleged conduct leading to the deaths of up to nine wombats in Venus Bay.

The charges follow an extensive investigation by the Conservation Regulator and Victoria Police into the deaths that occurred at Venus Bay in Gippsland on Tuesday, February 18, 2025, in what allegedly represents a senseless and deliberate act of animal cruelty.

Chief Conservation Regulator, Kate Gavens, said, "Wildlife cruelty is unacceptable. Conservation Regulator will investigate and seek prosecution for serious cases of wildlife cruelty."

All wildlife in Victoria is protected under the Wildlife Act 1975. The Conservation Regulator urges anyone with information about wildlife cruelty to report it to Crime Stoppers Victoria on 1800 333 000 or by visiting crimestoppersvic.com.au. ports can be made anonymously.

#### **Electrical fault sends** car up in flames

FIREFIGHTERS and police attended a car fire on July 28 at 10.30pm in Lance Creek after reports that a vehicle was on fire.

It's understood the black Jeep was left on the side of the road by the driver after the dash lights all came on. Opting to leave the vehicle and arrange a tow truck in the morning, the vehicle then  $% \left( -\frac{1}{2}\right) =-\frac{1}{2}\left( -\frac{1}$ proceeded to catch fire a short time later, after the driver had left. Fire investigators deemed the fire non-suspicious, with an electrical fault as the cause.

POLICE are investigating a suspicious car fire in Kardella on Wednesday, July 30, at 4.40pm along Fairbank Road. It's alleged the Holden VE Commodore Wagon was dumped off a car trailer towed by an older Patrol, possibly red in colour.

#### Don't leave them parked up

A HOLDEN Captiva was set alight in the early hours of July 30, around 4.30am on the South Gippsland Highway in Bena after suffering a mechanical fault the day before. The driver parked the vehicle off the road, set to collect it the following day during daylight hours, but offender/s subsequently set the vehicle alight. The fire has been deemed suspicious, with anyone who has information urged to contact Crime Stoppers.

#### Third car torched in matter of nights

A THIRD vehicle, a white Tovota Hilux, was set alight on Whitelaws Track in Buffalo at 3.30am on Thursday, July 31. The fire has been deemed suspicious, with the vehicle displaying a stolen front number plate. Anyone with information, contact Crime Stoppers.

#### Car snaps power pole in collision

A DRIVER was taken by road to Wonthaggi hospital with minor injuries on Friday, August 1, at 6.45am after colliding with a power pole on Lyndhurst Street in North Wonthaggi.

The accident is still under investigation by local police.

It's understood 20 homes in the vicinity of the accident were briefly without power at 9.30am as power to the pole was isolated by AusNet and the pole replaced. Power was restored by 1.45pm to affected customers.

#### Driver rescued after car trapped by live power lines

EMERGENCY services were called to a collision between a car and a power pole on Back Beach Road, Ventnor, on July 28 at 3.30pm near Pyramid Rock Road.

A male driver in his 50s was

stuck in his vehicle with live power lines impacting the vehicle. A passing SES volunteer was able to extract the driver before emergency services arrived. Due to the fallen powerline,

which was also smoking and sparking small blazes in nearby scrub/grass, AusNet was called to the scene and turned off power to the fault, which subsequently affected 4100 customers.

At 4.55pm, AusNet was able to restore power to 4014 customers, with an additional 27 customers restored at 5.18pm.

The remaining 59 homes were without power until 11.25pm when AusNet was able to complete a new pole installation and repair the line.

#### Meth driver gets marching orders at Foster

AT ABOUT 9.55am on Sunday, August 3, local police from the Foster Police Station were patrolling the Foster shopping area when they conducted a routine intercept of a vehicle in Main Street.

It is alleged that the driver, a 52-year-old male from Foster, returned a positive result for Methyl-amphetamine.

"The driver (or soon to be walker) will next be off to the Korumburra Magistrates' Court to explain themselves to the magistrate," according to a report on the Bass Coast Police Service Area Eyewatch page.

"The actions of those people who put others at risk by driving when impaired is not something that will be tolerated by your local police in Bass Coast and South Gippsland, and we are committed to removing them from our local roads.'

#### Erin back in court

THE preliminary hearings, ahead of the sentencing of convicted Leongatha mushroom killer, Erin Patterson, are expected to commence in the Supreme Court in Melbourne this Friday, August 8.

Disability Without Limits

The principal tasks at the mention hearing on Friday will be to determine whether the suppression order on certain pre-trial material can be lifted and also to set a date for the plea hearing.

The sentencing will follow the plea hearing at a date yet to be fixed.

Ms Patterson is required to attend in person or via video link.

#### Leongatha in search for missing Tasmanian plane

THE Australian Maritime Safety Authority and Tasmanian Police issued a statement on Sunday afternoon, August 3, advising that areas of southern Victoria, around Morwell and Leongatha, had been included in a search for a missing light aircraft.

The light plane, with two people on board, was reported missing after taking off from George Town airport on Saturday afternoon.

The two people, from northern Tasmania, were travelling to Central Western NSW with a scheduled stop in Leongatha. Family members raised the

alarm on Saturday night after they failed to arrive as expected to Hillston Airport in NSW.

The male pilot is aged in his early 70s and his female passenger is aged in her 60s.

Tasmania Police helicopter and marine resources are conducting search activities near George Town and along Tasmania's northern coastline.

The Australian Maritime Safety Authority and Victoria Police are conducting searches over Bass Strait and also in Gippsland.

AMSA and Tasmania Police urge anyone near George Town or transiting the waters in northern Tasmania and Bass Strait, or southern Victoria near Leongatha, to keep a lookout for any signs of the aircraft or its occupants, and if safe to do so, render assistance.

# Why textile wall might work for us

THE spring tides and stormy weather which stripped 100 years of sand off the good ship Amazon last August-September and wrecked the dunes in the process are coming.

The medium-term fix of an extension to the geotextile bag wall in front of the Inverloch Surf Lifesaving Club is still months away but according to a video which emerged at the weekend from the world famous Jeffreys Bay surf beach in South Africa, it might not be the way to go.

The YouTube video, entitled 'J Bay Sand Bag Suicide!', by longtime local surfer, fisherman and adventure seeker, Trevor Hansen, shows how the introduction of bag walls has sped up the process of erosion, not slowed it down, as waves rebound off the vertical structure and gouge the sand down to the bedrock.

"You can see the embankments are gone completely and those bags which were lying on sand have dropped down a long way and that whole section of beach embankment that was here is now gone," says Hansen as he walks the length of his beloved beach.

"And the first big swell, as I keep saying, once it starts hitting the bags and rebounding, it'll pull this down, so the level will drop and the bags will drop with it," he says indicating where metres of sand have already

"And what you'll end up with is the bags at this level, with no beach whatsoever. It will be

horizontal rock and all of the remaining sand will disappear."

A link to the video, posted in recent days, was provided to the Sentinel-Times by a former local Parks Victoria officer who preferred to remain anonymous but still pointed out the similarities between Jeffreys Bay, admittedly with bigger swell and extenuating circumstances, and

So, will the same thing happen here if, according to the approved DEECA plan, an extended geotextile wall becomes part of the response at Inverloch?

Project officer for the South Gippsland Conservation Soci-

ety, Philip Heath, acknowledged that "while not ideal", the geotextile wall extension had been supported by the conservation society and other members of the Inverloch Coastal Action Network (ICAN) group in an effort to protect the surf club building.

"The extension to the wall will be shaped around in an effort to avoid the undercutting effect and the plan is to envelope the whole thing in the dune renourishment works and then to start the revegetation," said Mr Heath this week.

He said it was his understanding that tenders for the extension of the wall in front of the surf

150,000m3 of sand, from within Anderson Inlet, had closed in recent days and he expected the work to commence in October and be completed in time for the Christmas rush.

The conservation society has been consulting with DEECA over the plan and also their role in revegetation works. Will it be a success, only time will tell.

Last week, in State Parliament, Bass MP Jordan Crugnale called on the Environment Minister, Steve Dimopoulos, to keep the Inverloch community fully informed about developments.

Here in part is what Ms Crugnale had to say in Parliament last Wednesday, July 30

"My adjournment matter is for the Minister for Environment, and the action I seek is for the minister to provide an update on the timing of the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action's community engagement activities regarding the Inverloch surf beach erosion and dune reconstruction project and the release of the final capeto-cape resilience plan report. The need for further engagement is clear.

"A recent public meeting organised and hosted by active local residents attracted over 350 attendees. This is strong evidence that the community is seeking information, transparency, meaningful involvement and practical ways to help best protect our beach and public as-

# A pear-dicament for duo arrested after old trainline escapade

A MALE and female have been released on bail after a motoring exploit through the back bush reserves of Wonthaggi on Wednesday morning at 8.21am.

According to local police, it is alleged that a 33-year-old male from North Wonthaggi and a 21-year-old female from Wonthaggi attempted to somewhat recreate the old railway line journey between the Historic Railway Line/Bushland Area and the Wonthaggi G243 Bushland Reserve of the mighty black steam locomotives, albeit in a white Toyota Hilux workmate.

It's alleged the modern-day engine driver and his female fire stoker were attempting to haul some suspected ill-gotten gains.

As the modern-day locomotive chugged its way from Billson Street along the former line, it made its way up into Loughran Drive, where it avoided the bollards and kept going up the in-

At Dowling Street, the driver was presented with a simple choice, to go right or go left, but decided to go straight ahead, down a driveway.

The little Hilux came in fast and spun, the rear tray met the trunk of a large pear tree which softly buffeted the tray, then took a tight grasp, as the small spinning wheels dug into the

# **Councils continue to fight back against State Government levy**

LOCAL ratepayers will receive their annual rates notice from Council this August amidst much controversy and Council fears backlash.

The notice will include the State Government's new and increased Emergency Services Volunteer Fund Levy – previously the Fire Services Levy.

Under the controversial revamped tax, amounts will double for homeowners, triple for farmers and more than triple for commercial and industrial properties.

Councils are furious at having to collect the hefty tax on behalf of the State Government, with no say over how the money – estimated to be \$3 billion over three years – will be spent.

A community alliance called Not In Our Name are opposed to the tax and coordinated a conference on Saturday, July 26, where 30 mayors and councillors representing 22 Victorian councils met in Melbourne.

Two major actions came out of the meeting.

"We've set up a working group of nine councils, three from rural, three from regional, three from metro, that'll help to coordinate a unified campaign across councils," explained Nathan

Murphy, Not in Our Name committee member and San Remo local.

"Firstly, calling for a moratorium on the tax, and secondly, to have a public inquiry on the tax."

Bass Coast Shire Councillor Meg Edwards attended the event. "It's something I feel is impor-

tts something i feel is important. It's important to learn from other councilors in the state, and to show your support. I'm not for the tax obviously, so it's putting into action my words," said Cr Meg Edwards.

"The government will collect the rates in total, including the emergency services tax, from the council, regardless of whether individuals pay it or not, the council is still liable for the tax. So, it's not an option for us not to pay it.

"I will be raising a motion at the next council meeting. I will have a motion going to that council meeting for it to be taken to the MAV (Municipal Association of Victoria) conference, which I'm not a delegate for, but I would like our delegate, who is the mayor, to take this motion to MAV."

Cr Edwards is also organising another rally against the ESVF to be held at the Wonthaggi Workmen's Club on Tuesday, August 19 at 7pm. Bev McArthur, the Shadow Minister for Local Government, will be speaking at the event, as well as Nathan Murphy from the United Firefighters Union. The Minister for Local Government will also be invited to attend.

Cr Edwards said that the event is for anyone who is upset about the ESVF, which will be itemised on their rates notice.

"Anybody who's concerned about their rates notice and the impact of extra taxes, they would be very welcome to come along. They might like to attend, have their voices heard and learn what they can do about it."

its popular art and craft classes with dozens of vibrant artworks hanging on the walls, testimony to the creative talents of the Waterline Community.



# Farmers again take fight to Melbourne

VICTORIAN farmers again took their battle with the State Government to the steps of parliament on Wednesday, the focus this time on fighting against planned legislation to force them to allow representatives of transmission companies and VicGrid onto their properties or face hefty fines.

State leader of The Nationals and Member for Gippsland South, Danny O'Brien, was among the speakers, labelling it "another day, another protest on the steps of parliament by regional Victorians fed up with a Labor Government that has no respect for them".

That follows the much larger numbers that descended on Spring Street to protest against the State Government's Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund.

'To now have this Bill that says, 'We don't really respect you and if you get in our way, we will break down your gates and cut your locks and we will fine you \$12,000 for the privilege is just a disgrace," Mr O'Brien told attendees on Wednesday.

As tractors drove by and protesters displayed signs such as one saying "No farms, no food, no future", he declared that the only way for regional Victorians to be treated with respect is to vote the Coalition into government at the State election in November 2026.

"We will repeal this Bill, we will repeal the emergency services tax and fight for regional Victoria," Mr O'Brien declared.

State Opposition Leader Brad Battin labelled the government's approach to energy infrastructure delivery as being done in "dictatorship style", saying the planned legislation is "draconian" and intended to take away farmers' rights.

The Liberal Member for Berwick also committed to repealing the legislation if the Coalition is elected.

Should the legislation go through, landowners will face fines of up to \$12,210 for obstructing access to their land.

A resounding cheer rang out when Mr Battin spoke of farmers wanting the government to get out of their lives.

# A little funding goes a long way at the State Coal Mine

A \$2000 grant from Bass Coast Shire Council has gone a long way in helping volunteers at the State Coal Mine transform their community garden into a more sustainable and efficient space.

The Friends of the State Coal Mine applied for the grant to ease the workload of volunteers and improve the site's composting and irrigation systems. The funding has already made a noticeable difference, with new compost bays built and an automated watering system now operating across the garden beds.

For garden coordinator Marg McCulley, the impact was more than just practical. A young boy visiting with his father stopped in front of the newly installed composting sign and said, "I get it!" That small moment was enough to make the volunteers' day.

Volunteers say the upgrades have brought fresh energy to the garden, which produces eggs and vegetables for locals in need. Waste from the on-site café and staff kitchen is now recycled through a closed-loop composting system, which turns scraps and clippings into nutrient-rich compost that feeds the veggie beds.

"The three compost bays allow us to manage organic waste more efficiently," said Parks Victoria ranger Katherine.

"It breaks down into compost over time, which enhances the soil and provides many benefits to the garden. There are also environmental benefits, like reducing greenhouse gas emissions and conserving water."

With many school groups, families, and tourists visiting the site each year, the garden also plays a key educational role. The new sign above the compost bays, supplied by Thom Fox, helps explain the composting process in a way that's simple and easy to understand. The artwork was generously donated, saving the project hundreds of dollars in design costs.

Thanks to the new irrigation system, volunteers no longer need to drag heavy hoses through the garden. A simple timer keeps the beds watered and thriving, freeing up time and effort for the team.

The garden, which features a popular cottage display, was even included in this year's Bass Coast Edible Gardens open weekend. Its success is a testament to what a small grant and a lot of community spirit can achieve.

The Friends of the State Coal Mine thanked Shirley Egan from the Shire office for her support with the application. Cr Mat Morgan also visited the garden on Wednesday, July 30, to see the improvements for himself.

The grant was delivered just before the end of the financial year, and every dollar has certainly been put to good use.





# Mouth of the Powlett River opened to clear inundation of farmland

THE mouth of the Powlett River has been opened to ease inundation of adjoining farmland after above-average rainfall across Bass Coast in July.

Rainfall in the Powlett River catchment exceeded the July average with Wonthaggi recording 119.4mm for the month compared to an average of 97.6mm.

West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority (WGCMA) said an artificial opening of the Powlett River estuary was approved earlier in June. This was done to reduce the impact of the estuary closure on surrounding farmland and in recognition of ongoing drought conditions over 12 months.

The estuary stayed open for five days in June and water levels dropped to 20 centimetres.

This is not something that is done often, according to WGCMA.

"It was driven by exceptional circumstances and WGCMA has been working with landholders and multiple partner organisations to manage the estuary closure."

In recent days, it was determined that there were more risks associated with the Powlett River estuary remaining

closed than there were with an artificial opening.

"Good freshwater flows and low swells allowed for optimal conditions for an artificial opening," said WGCMA.

"A safe opening means good, dissolved oxygen levels reduce the risk of a fish kill."

The Powlett River estuary on Bunurong Country is listed as a nationally important wetland due to its extensive saltmarsh and wetland communities and heritage values.

To reduce the impact of artificial openings on the

environment and farmland, WGCMA is working with partner agencies and landholders to explore alternative land management practices that reduce the need for artificial openings.

Options under consideration include land buybacks and land management agreements, with WGCMA proactively looking for funding opportunities to implement alternative land management measures in the Powlett River estuary.

The Department of Transport and Planning

has also asked Parks Victoria to open the Bourne Creek estuary to alleviate the risk of flooding on the Bass Highway.

WGCMA is monitoring the Bourne Creek estuary and has provided a permit to allow Parks Victoria to open it, provided it is safe and feasible for the estuary environment.

The Department of Transport and Planning is working with WGCMA to also explore options for raising the Bass Highway to reduce flooding in the future.

# Korumburra Botanic Park sign stolen

DESPERATE thieves have stolen the lettering from the Korumburra Botanical Park sign from the front gates, only a year after the brass commemorative plaque was stolen.

Locals speculated that the letters may have been taken to be melted down for a few bucks, as was thought to be the case with the original commemorative plaque and two bronze plaques, which were stolen from Loch earlier in the year.

An observant resident noticed the missing letters mid-July and the South Gippsland Shire Council was notified.

"I think they're all brass letters, so I think that's why they've been taken. So, they'll have to replace them with something, a cheap alloy," said Ben Ellis, Secretary of Friends of Korumburra Botanical Park (FKBP).

"It's a very disappointing situation, but they're running out of things (to take)." Council have stated that

Council have stated that they will be replacing the

DESPERATE thieves have lettering and are investitolen the lettering from the forumburra Botanical Park likely to be stolen.

About 12 months ago, the commemorative plaque that was on one of the posts was ripped off and presumably melted down.

The plaque was in memory of the park being gazetted by the Governor in Council in 1903, with the gates being erected for the centenary of the park in 2003.

"One of our members had a picture of the historic plaque, so we were able to send that to the shire, and they could recreate a new plaque, which is probably made out of some alloy, which isn't worth stealing."

Meanwhile, at the park, the FKPB have 2500 plants to get into the ground this winter, after already planting out half, which was funded by Landcare.

They've started down by the creek, where it was still damp in June, but dry everywhere else, and Ben is hoping the recent rain will mean they can plant out the rest in time for spring.

# Creativity flows from physical actions in Korumburra

WHILE Tsuri, known as Hirovasu TWOONE (pronounced twoone), is in Leongatha working on a new look for South Gippsland Shire's trio of ArtCubes, mentoring a couple of young artists who are collaborating on the project, he recently ran two events in Korumburra.

His free Youth Art Workshop, held at Korumburra Community Hub, was for those aged 12 to 25, with the main concept being to promote thinking through physical action, the creative process triggered by movement.

"I just told them, 'Don't think too much about what you are going to paint; instead, just start moving bodies or hands to make a mark'," Hiroyasu said, that approach getting the creative young participants going as ideas sprang to mind in response to the marks they had made.

While he brought along red, white and blue paints, participants were given just one colour for each canvas, TWOONE believing that limiting colours enables one to focus easily on movement, shapes and tones, rather than thinking about what colour to use next.

The workshop was followed by an artist talk at the Coterie, with a mixed crowd hearing about Hiroyasu's shift into the art scene after his move from Japan to Melbourne at the age of 18, originally to learn English, and his

subsequent travels around the world creating art.

Early in his time in Melbourne, he met street artists through skateboarding and socialising, soon being invited to join them.

Having found joy in creativity as a child and seeing something in that field as a dream job, it had appeared unrealistic until he was surrounded

by people living that lifestyle. So, 10 months became 11

years," Hiroyasu said of his extended stay down under.

He then lived in Berlin for eight years with his Aussie wife, maintaining his connection with Australia, where he had permanent residency, by continuing to come back for artistic projects.

They now have a house in

Italy, a base from which to travel to many countries.

# Help support young learners get their driver's licence

GAINING a driver's licence is an exciting step to independence for young people, especially in country areas, but for some who don't have access to a supervising driver or a suitable car, it can be difficult.

This is where The Salvation Army's Drive for Life L2P Program comes in, with volunteer mentors who help young learners build up their driving hours and apply for their

With four cars across the South Gippsland Shire, including in Loch, Leongatha, Mirboo North and Foster, learner drivers can gain access to both drivers and cars close to home. But the program needs more

volunteer mentors.

"First and foremost, we're

looking for people who've got calm and measured dispositions and demeanours. They're not going to get too anxious or panic themselves in the car," explained Stephen Harvy, Drive for Life/L2P Manager.

"Every young learner on the program will do half a dozen lessons with a proper driving instructor before they sit in the car with a supervisor.'

Mentors complete a free, one-day training course that provides technical and behavioural information on how to guide a young person as they learn to drive, as well as ongoing support.

We bring our mentors and volunteers together once every few months, and we have gatherings to try and help them

share their experiences and how they're going about it," said Stephen.

Mentors are paired with the same learner driver to build rapport and connection, and for consistency and continuity.

Arrangements can be made with the learner and booked in an online calendar.

"Mentors will book in a time, and they'll pick up the car and then meet the young person, go for a drive, put the car back, explained Stephen.

Mentors are asked to commit what time they can, ideally about one to two hours a week or fortnight, with other mentors available to fill in, in the event of holidays or illness, for example.

Steve added that all the

learner drivers have a lived experience with disadvantage and face some barriers in order to be eligible for the program and are very grateful for the support and help received.

"I've had young people that have reached back to us when they finished who say it's just absolutely lifesaving. It's getting a licence, but it's life-changing. It might mean the difference between them being able to get to certain employment or not, or to get to studies, or to just have independence," said Ste-

# Coroner releases report into death of farmer during Mirboo North storm

THE report from an inquest late in the afternoon before the into the death of Bruce Manintveld, a 50-year-old farmer from the major storm event that ravaged Mirboo North in 2024, has been released.

At the time of his death, Bruce lived with his wife of twenty years, Fiona Baker, on their farm, with Bruce working full time and Fiona helping out part

Fiona described Bruce as being "born to be a farmer.'

According to the coroner's report, a typical day on the farm began at approximately 4.45am, milking the cows and whilst other chores were attended to during the day, the cows needed to be milked again day's work was complete.

Darlimurla, who died during at about 4.30pm, Bruce and 55 and 85km/h. Fiona saw the storm coming on the weather radar.

Fiona had returned to the farm from her other external work early because of this extreme weather.

Bruce formed the view that if he started his end-of-day farm routine, bringing the cows in for their afternoon milking, immediately, he ought to be able to get the cows safely into the milking shed, and set off to do that riding his quadbike as usual.

At about 4.45 pm, a severe storm heralded a change in the weather pattern in the South Gippsland area.

on the Beaufort Wind Scale, which signals the potential for structural damage and dislodged roofing risks.

After the storm had passed, Fiona went out to give Bruce a hand at the milking shed but was surprised that he was not there.

She walked up the laneway looking for him and initially noticed some dead cattle and the farm quad bike stationary.

She then noticed that Bruce had been thrown clear of the bike onto the ground.

From retracing the path of

Contemporaneous wind gusts the debris whilst looking at the pattern of visible injuries, it appears a dislodged retractable roof was blown directly into Bruce's path, striking him and also killing several nearby

> Fiona called 000 and followed the 000 call taker's instructions, commencing resuscitation until paramedics and police arrived about 25 minutes later.

Bruce's death was reported to the coroner as it fell within the definition of a reportable death in the Coroners Act 2008. Reportable deaths include deaths that are unexpected, unnatural or violent or result from accident, or injury.

# Getting it and Keeping

or many Australians heading into ≺ retirement, the Age Pension plays an important role in helping cover day-to-day living costs. But working out whether you're eligible - and how much you'll get - can be confusing.

Here's a simple overview of how the Age Pension works and what to keep in mind if you're planning to apply or already receiving it.

#### How eligibility works

There are three basic requirements to qualify for the Age Pension:

- 1. You must be over a certain age. As of July 2025, the Age Pension age is
- 2. You must be an Australian resident, usually for at least 10 years.
- 3. You must meet income and asset test rules, which look at what you earn and what you own.

The income test includes things like superannuation income, part-time work, or investment returns. The asset test looks at property (not including your home), investment assets, savings, vehicles, and other belongings of value.

Both tests have limits. If you're under those limits, you may receive a full **pension**. If you're above, you might still qualify for a part pension.

#### **Current Age Pension Rates and** Thresholds (as of July 2025)

- Maximum fortnightly pension\* \$1,149.00 (\$29,874 per year) - Single \$1,732.20 (\$45,037 per year) - Couple
- Full pension asset test (homeowner) Less than \$321,500 - Single Less than \$481,500 - Couple
- Part pension asset cut-off (homeowner)

Up to \$704,500 - Single Up to \$1,059,000 - Couple

- Full pension income test Less than \$5,668 per year - Single Less than \$9,880 per year - Couple
- Part pension income cut-off Up to \$65,416 per year - Single Up to \$99,954 per year - Couple

#### Don't qualify? You may still get help

If you're over Age Pension age but don't qualify due to your income or assets, you might be eligible for the Commonwealth Seniors Health Card.

This card gives access to cheaper prescription medicines and may offer savings on medical services, electricity, gas, and rates — depending on where you

#### **Keeping the Age Pension**

Once you're on the pension, it's not set-and-forget. You'll need to keep Centrelink updated if your financial situation changes — for example, if you start a part-time job, receive an inheritance, or sell an asset.

Regular updates ensure you're getting the right amount. If not, you might be overpaid — and required to pay it back

#### Make it easier with online tools

There are free calculators and estimators available on the Services Australia website to help you work out what you're entitled to. If you'd rather speak to someone, the Financial Information Service is a free government service that can help explain your options.

The Age Pension provides a base level of income to help older Australians live with dignity in retirement. Knowing how it works - and keeping on top of any changes - helps you stay in control of your finances and avoid unnecessary

# **Concerns expressed over lack** of progress at Coal Creek

WHILE refurbishment of train carriages at Coal Creek is a bright sign of progress, Friends of Coal Creek (FOCC) are concerned with delays in planning for the Park's future financial stability, and with the loss of its team leader Kim O'Connell, who was integral in planning and running events.

 $Adde\bar{d}$  to these concerns is council's decision not to continue financially supporting the park's annual Halloween event.

FOCC president Roger Powell expressed the group's disappointment that Kim's contribution has ended.

"He was a breath of fresh air and brought to Coal Creek a range of skills that weren't there previously, and we've lost that, and we are the poorer for it," Roger said, noting that, among other things, Kim specialises in running events and programs.

Council CEO Allison Jones said it is not yet determined whether Kim will be replaced.

"Council commits significant resources to Coal Creek operations and, as such, it is appropriate to responsibly review staffing resources when positions become vacant," she said.

The CEO noted that the Park is being managed by experienced members of the existing council team, who have strong knowledge of its operations.

The FOCC president spoke of council's decision not to fund the Coal Creek Halloween evening, suggesting that contrasts with the aims of the Coal Creek Strategic Plan.

"Within the Strategic Plan there are multiple references to events, both community and commercial, large and small, being supported and being critical to the long-term development of Coal Creek," Roger said.

He noted council said its decision not to continue supporting the Halloween event is based on cost, arguing that it is inconsistent with achieving the aims of the Strategic Plan.

"The Halloween event requires significant resourcing from council staff and volunteers, and after a review of activities planned, it was determined not to proceed in 2025," Ms Jones said.

Roger expressed conern about such a decision being made without any consultation, particularly given the strong involvement of community groups in running the Halloween event.

"Because we've had some of these events, the Park has benefited," he said, pointing out that aspects such as drainage and the internal road system have been improved as a result.

As for the Coal Creek Strategic Plan, Roger said that after all the effort and public consultation that



went into its creation, it couldn't be quickly acted upon because council then began embarking on a Financial Plan for the Park.

That process has included engaging consultants to develop a business case for Coal Creek, with \$50,000 set aside in the council Budget to facilitate that.

"It has now taken nearly 10 months, and we haven't seen the first draft," Roger said, remarking that while the business case for the Park was originally expected to be presented to councillors at the August council meeting, that is now not expected to occur until November.

"The business case is still progressing and will be presented by the end of the year; the August date was approximate only," the council CEO responded.

A major aim of the Coal Creek Strategic Plan is to reduce the Park's financial reliance on council over time, with council acknowledging in the plan that it doesn't expect Coal Creek to be completely self-sufficient. certainly not in the short term.

"The goal is to ensure it a larger share of its operating costs and is able to fund improvements and maintenance as the Strategic Plan is implemented," it is stated.

One of the short-term actions outlined relates to the holding of marquee events throughout the year to draw crowds, with the aim of continuing "to build Coal Creek's reputation as a unique venue for events such as festivals and holiday celebrations".

That leads into a longterm goal to "position Coal Creek as the key venue for major events and exhibitions in South Gippsland, leveraging its unique setting and facilities".

While an important short-term aim expressed in the Strategic Plan is to restore the operations of Coal Creek's bush tramway to attract train enthusiasts and young families and raise revenue, the track restoration is proceeding slowly, with Roger explaining that is due to the reliance on volunteers who have constraints on their time.

He argues that funding is needed to pay people to undertake that work in a timely fashion.

On the bright side, much has been achieved in the restoration of the separate large railway carriages.

The first class carriage roof, which was in far worse condition than imagined, is now repaired, with the other carriages requiring less work.

Once everything is right with the roofs, the next step is to repair the inside of the carriages, with further funding needing to be secured for that stage.

Roger highlighted a ple of other positive initiatives council is taking, saying it has committed to doing required work on the railway station platform and to buying materials to re-weatherboard the Jeetho school building.

"So, there are some positive things going on, just that we're perplexed we're not seeing events and other activities taking place," he said, adding that he has heard there are at least a couple of music gigs planned for summer.

# Fighting to keep the French Island barge service local

A SKIPPER for all seasons, long-time French Islander Terry Easy is determined to keep the Corinella to French Island barge locally owned and operated.

"The original farming families all put in to save the barge," said Terry. "It's the lifeblood of French Island.'

Parks Victoria has called for Expressions of Interest to operate a year-round barge transport service to French Island using the Point Leschenault Jetty landing site.

Many of the farming families on French Island can be traced back to the Soldier Settlement Scheme introduced for servicemen returning from the First World War.

Terry Easy was raised on French Island. "We had free range then," said

Terry.

"Rabbits were a part of growing up, we worked the farm and hunted rabbits. The old man said he paid for our house by selling rabbit skins. I used to take the fresh rabbits on the school run with me.'

Working on scallop boats in Tasmania, Terry gained his Master 5 Certificate and took ownership of the Spirit of French Island seven years ago.

Crossing between French Island and Corinella up to six times a day, the barge carries vital supplies for the farmers such as steel, hay, fertiliser, fuel and bottled gas.

"A lot of cattle have been taken off the Island because of the

drought."

Emergency service vehicles and fire trucks also use the barge along with Parks Victoria.

Using high tide to navigate the treacherous sand banks and occasional thick sea fog, the Spirit of French Island cruises at a leisurely six knots, covering the twokilometre crossing in around 20

Measuring 19 metres in length with a displacement of 26 tonnes, the Spirit of French Island can carry as much weight again fully laden.

"Visitors can come by foot or bring their 4WDs and cars," said

"Come over in the morning

(subject to the tide) and return in the afternoon. It's surprising how many people visit French Island."

Western Port Bay is very tidal. and a low tide early in the day can restrict operating hours, though weather is not usually a problem, according to Terry.

"We've never missed a crossing because of bad weather for six

No stranger to early mornings, Terry said he needed to be at the Tankerton Jetty by 7.30am every morning as a student to catch the ferry to the High School at Hast-

The ferry left Stony Point at 4.30pm, returning to the Island

"Every now and then, the weather would get rough, and we'd have the day off school.

"Sometimes the fog was so thick you couldn't see the bow of the ferry.

Dolphins are a common sight on the crossing to French Island, and Sea Eagles nesting on The Point produce two or three fledglings every year.

French Island also has longnosed potoroos, bandicoots, Australian water rats, koalas and Cape Barren geese, but no Kangaroos.

Kangaroos can't swim, according to Terry.

French Island convert Janine Harrison said there is plenty to see and do on French Island, including the original chicory kilns, local wine tastings from the French Island Vineyards and a delicious all-day menu, freshly roasted coffee and good old-fashioned hospitality at the French Island General Store.

Employing four people, including a second skipper, Terry said the barge runs year-round.

"It's a million-dollar investment in the local community.

"To keep it all running is a very

extensive operation.' After just seven years as the sole owner and operator of the business, Terry hopes commonsense will prevail.

"My family goes back to when the original five farmers got together and bought the barge, it's the first open tender.'

# Repairs underway for Smiths Beach Rescue Base

WOOLAMAI Beach Surf Life Saving Club (WBSLSC) began repairs and maintenance to the Smiths Beach Rescue Base yesterday, Monday, August 4.

WBSLSC are managing the project with works to repair corroded steel on the rescue base structure.

During the period of works, the stairs and landing (adjacent to rescue tower) will be closed. However the timber accessibility ramp is planned to remain open other than a one to three day closure in mid-August.

Access to Smith's Beach will remain open at all times via the western access stairs.

Completion of this stage of the project is likely to be mid-September 2025.

Phillip Island Nature Parks will then begin separate upgrade work on the accessibility ramp (late 2025) and stairs and landing (2026).

Contractors will do their best to minimise inconvenience to beachgoers during the works.

The Club is very grateful for the support of members of the local community, the Smiths Beachcombers Association, Phillip Island and San Remo Rotary, the Victorian State Government's Tiny Towns Grants Program, the Victorian Emergency Services Equipment Program, our local member Jordan Crugnale MP and Phillip Island Nature Parks.



# **Shore Break crashing open** the door to mental health

BERNINNEIT was a packed house last crate, and a surfboard, helped keep the fo-Wednesday night for 'Shore Break': a gripping solo theatre performance that not only succeeded in captivating the audience, but also sparked raw, honest conversations about men's mental health in the Bass Coast community and beyond.

The night opened with a speech by Cr Tim O'Brien, who didn't shy away from the confronting facts. Suicide rates in regional areas like Bass Coast are up to twice those of greater Melbourne. O'Brien spoke about the importance of simply asking the question -"Hey, you seem a bit out of whack, want to talk?" His words provided a great setup for the emotional punch that followed.

What came next was an extraordinary 75-minute monologue performed by acclaimed actor and writer Chris Pitman. His debut play 'Shore Break' is a poetic and haunting portrayal of an isolated man trying to make sense of his past while sitting by the ocean with nothing but his surfboard and his memories.

The show began quietly. The only sound was Pitman waxing his board as soft, reflective music played. He opened with a rhyming poem by Madge Morris Wagner, before switching into a completely different gear, speaking in gritty, authentic Australian vernacular. It set the tone for a performance that felt deeply personal and grounded in reality.

Pitman's character was foul-mouthed, yes, but also vulnerable and familiar. He meandered through stories of his life with honesty, humour, and pain, his natural style making it feel less like theatre and more like listening to a mate you haven't seen in years opening up. The minimal set, featuring just a chair, a cus on his words, and his delivery never wavered. No sound effects. No lighting tricks. Just Pitman, alone, carrying the weight of the story on his shoulders.

Despite the intensity of the subject matter, Pitman found some space for humour. But when the mood did shift, it hit hard. Subtle changes in body language or a sudden rise in his voice were all it took to snap the audience back into silence.

And silent they were. Aside from occasional chuckles, the room was completely still, a sign of just how immersed everyone was.

Following the play, Beyond Blue's Paul Milne led a panel discussion with Pitman and big wave surfing legend Ross Clarke-Jones. Both men spoke openly about their own struggles.

"This play tonight smashed it. Amazing," he said.

The night didn't end when the curtain figuratively fell either. Viewers were invited to stay behind for pizza, drinks, and conversation with the panel. Private chill-out spaces and free counselling were made available, showing the organisers were just as committed to care as they were to art.

What Shore Break managed to do so well was start a conversation without preaching. It didn't offer solutions or lecture. Instead, it gave the audience space to reflect on themselves, on the men in their lives, and on what it means to struggle quietly. As Cr O'Brien said, "We each have a role." Sometimes that role is simply to listen.

# New sub-group seeks to raise profile of First Nations

RAISING the profile of Aboriginal culture, people, their creativity, resilience and their issues in Mirboo North and surrounds is the Mirboo North Reconciliation sub-group (MNRSG). The group falls under the Bass Coast South Gippsland Reconciliation Group (BCSGRG) and was formed following last year's 'voice' referendum and the storm damage to country in Mirboo North.

President of the BCSGRG Dr Marg Lynn, alongside MNRSG coordinator, Gail Margaret, helped to coordinate the yes campaign in South Gippsland.

"We had a lot of connections through that, and we were hearing from people that they wanted to not to let things drop, that they had been made so much more aware of indigenous issues of the history and culture of First Nations people and their aspirations," said Dr Lynn, which was the first major impetus to form the subgroup.

"And the other one was the massive storm in February last year in Mirboo North and the impact of that on Country; and our awareness that Aboriginal people have been caring for Country for millennia, 60,000 years, and so we, at that time, made a connection with the Kurnai elders, and we've been working with them ever since.'

Over the past year, the new group have been very active and celebrated a Kurnai Cultural Expo in May, attracting over 100 attendees to the event.

"That was highly successful, and that was a small part of an expo that the Kurnai community ran in Warragul a couple of weeks ago, and that raised quite a lot of interest in

"We had lots of great conversations. The Kurnai elders who were there had great conversations, and we did too," said Dr Lynn.

The sub-group has also been meeting with local educators, from childcare through to the secondary school, who have joined the reconciliation group with plans to work to-

An exhibition during NAIDOC week featuring 50 Years of NAIDOC Week posters was also held by the group.

"They were on show at the Mirboo North Market in June and that raised quite a bit of interest, with a number of people joining the group, and we had lots of valuable conversations with people about all sorts of issues. It was a worthwhile exhibition," said Dr Lvnn.

The Mirboo North Reconciliation subgroup meets on the second Thursday of the month at 10am (August is an exception and the next meeting will be in September).

The Bass Coast South Gippsland Reconciliation Group has also been very active, most recently holding the Ngangga Community Festival on Milawul (Phillip Island) in honour of NAIDOC Week in July.

Coming up is a free screening of the documentary Murundak: Songs of Freedom, which will be shown at the State Coal Mine on Saturday, August 9 at 2pm.

The BCSGRG meets regularly on the third Thursday of the month at 1.30pm with two evening meetings per year. For more information contact marglynn@tpg.com.au.

# **Traffic Signals Installation**

New traffic signals will be installed at the Dandy Premix Quarries intersection to reduce truck traffic through Grantville and improve safety for pedestrians and motorists using the Bass Highway.

Works commenced July 2025, approx. 4-month duration Lane closures, reduced speed limits, contra-flow traffic Deep Creek St and Bass Hwy Service Rd access impacted Two bus stops temporarily relocated

## **COMMENCEMENT AND DURATION OF ROADWORKS**

Stage 1 Roadworks confined to the existing quarry intersection commenced early July 2025.

Stage 2 Roadworks on the Bass Highway Northbound carriageway are scheduled to commence on 14 August and are expected to be completed by 19 September 2025.

The Stage 2 Roadworks require temporary closure of the Bass Highway Northbound carriageway and the introduction of contra-flow traffic to the Southbound carriageway.

The left lane of the Southbound carriageway will continue to be used for southbound traffic and the second lane for northbound traffic after diversion across the highway median to share the Southbound carriageway. During Stage 2 Roadworks, each of the two lanes of the Southbound carriageway will have traffic moving in the opposite direction.

During Stage 2 Roadworks there will be reduced speed limits through the Bass Highway construction zone with modified traffic layouts and traffic controls in place to assist motorists.

## **ROADWORK TIMES AND** TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

Stage 2 Roadworks will generally be undertaken Monday to Saturday (6 days/week) between 7.00am and 7.00pm. Some short-term roadworks may be carried out overnight.

Traffic controls including Variable Message Signs (VMSs), Safety Barriers, Portable Traffic Lights, Traffic Controllers and Truck Mounted Attenuators (TMAs) will be in operation.



Deep Creek Street and the Bass Highway Service Road traffic will be temporarily impacted during Stage 2 roadworks.

Deep Creek Street: temporary use of Bonney Road for Bass Highway access and egress, including for Smith Street, Broome Court, Stewart Street, Malcolm Drive and Panoramic Drive traffic.

Bass Highway Service Road (northbound, western side of Bass Highway): temporary northbound egress to Bass Highway under traffic controller supervision. This will also impact on traffic from Blackwood Drive, Swan Street, Vision Lane and Lang Street using the


Bass Highway Service Road for northbound entry to Bass Highway.

#### **BUS STOP - NORTHBOUND**

The Bass HWY northbound bus stop located in the Stage 2 Roadworks construction zone will be temporarily relocated further north (approx. 120m) with signage, waiting area provision and pedestrian protection provided.

#### **PROJECT OUTCOMES**

Installation of the Traffic Signals will enable trucks to turn right, northbound onto Bass Highway, resulting in a major reduction in quarry trucks through Grantville. The Traffic Signals will also improve Bus Stop pedestrian safety and assist safer Deep Creek Street traffic flows onto Bass Highway.





IT IS hard to watch the news these days. The constant stories and pictures of war, starvation and famine have me crying out at

Lament isn't a word you hear often, but it is a very human experience. It is a deep and passionate expression of sorrow, grief, or re-

It is a deep-felt groaning of pain or despair. It takes courage to sit with pain, name it, and give it a voice.

Yes, I know this is all sounding a bit down. Not quite what you were expecting.

But, that is the point.

In those moments of loss, grief and pain, we often feel pressure to "look on the bright side" or think "she'll be right.'

In the Christian tradition, even Jesus on the cross cried out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Matthew 27:46), echoing words from ancient lament psalms. There is space in faith and in life to name what feels unfinished, broken, or unresolved.

Lament gives voice to our pain and sorrow. Opening a space for truth to be spoken in community. It is not weakness, but courage: an act of faith that trusts God can handle our rawest words.

When we speak our grief out loud, especially in community, we realise we're not the only ones sitting with hard feelings. Our stories weave together, building resilience and hope.

Lament is about bringing our sadness, confusion, and questions, not just the good stuff, into the open. In doing so, we know that God meets us there.

Keep calling out. Keep lamenting. Raise your voice to injustice, cruelty and hate.

Sit in the mismatch of what you see as broken and how things should be.

Cry out "WHY?"

And then, sit quietly for the heart-shaping work that follows the practice of lament.

## Graduate paramedic on the road in Korumburra

KORUMBURRA'S new graduate Ambulance Victoria (AV) paramedic, Simon Bendall, brings experience to the role, having established himself as an Ambulance Community Officer in Mirboo North, a big shift from his longterm career in IT.

After always wanting to be a paramedic, he started the transition through Non-Emergency Patient Transport.

Simon's interest in paramedicine was sparked through growing up loving the American television show 'Emergency', a medical drama about paramedics in Los Angeles, but he was also driven by his desire to help people.

While still working in IT, that desire saw him extensively involved in a couple of volunteer services, becoming a third Lieutenant at Mount Martha CFA, being a training officer there and for the Peninsula Group, and also being part of Southern Peninsula Rescue.

Diagnosed with dyslexia when he was in Grade 6, and having faced the challenges it presented from the outset of his education journey, Simon didn't have the confidence to pursue paramedicine when he finished school.

"I ended up working in IT, in project management, both locally and around the globe; it was exciting, but I was ready for a change," he said.

The fact he was helping companies rather than people drove his desire to pursue a different path.

When both his parents passed away within 18 months of each other, that prompted Simon to act on his desire for change, realising "life is too short."

While dyslexia sometimes makes learning more challenging, he has found that as technology has progressed, it has supported his learning

Since making the shift from IT, Simon has earned a series of qualifications that have led him to where he is.

They began with a Certificate III in Patient Transport, allowing him to become a Patient Transport Officer.

While working in that role, he commenced his Diploma of Paramedical Science, that allowing him to become an Ambulance Transport Attendant, involving more responsibility including cardiac monitoring and additional medications.

He then succeeded in applying for a position as an Ambulance Community Officer in Mirboo North, starting there after COVID lockdowns ended, then combining non-emergency and emergency work and gaining a good mix of experience.

Having enjoyed studying, it seemed logical to pursue a Paramedicine Degree, something he undertook by correspondence through the University of Tasmania, with theory and exams online but practical components of the course assessed at branch with someone suitably qualified.

He secured an Ambulance Victoria scholarship through the Pathway to Paramedicine, AV providing him with a mentor, and meaning that at the end of his degree he would go straight into the graduate program.

Simon has committed to working regionally for the next five years, delighted with that arrangement and having already started his position in Korumburra.

While his new role involves more responsibilities, his previous experience gives him a great platform, having learned to build patient rapport and trust, and developed his communication skills and ability to assess alternative treatment pathways.

He feels well supported by AV, his colleagues and mentors and his family. and will be under the direct supervision of a clinical instructor for at least the next six months as he carries out his responsibilities.

Simon is proud of his achievements. "My advice to anyone thinking about a career change would be to have faith in yourself, trust your instincts and do it," he said.

# There ain't no leniency anymore

BASS Coast Highway Patrol are enforcing the full law when it comes to e-scooters after a period of continual unsafe and illegal riding.

Operation Annoyance, as it's been deemed, is targeting e-scooter riders doing the wrong thing across Bass Coast and South Gippsland. Last week seven people were caught riding e-scooters illegally, a significant portion underage, with an additional three people fined for riding illegally or in an unsafe manner. One rider was caught riding on the footpath with no helmet on.

"The new laws were introduced on October 4, and since then we have worked through a phase of education and warning riders," Bass Coast Highway Patrol Sergeant Pearce explained.

'There has been sustained reminders in the news and online around riding e-scooters safely, however, we are continuously seeing illegal e-scooters on the road and unsafe behaviours. These behaviours have seen fatalities across Austra-

if they are doing the wrong thing, and the fines are hefty, not to mention they can affect your vehicle driving licence.

Riding a non-compliant escooter will set you back five penalty units and a \$1018 fine, whilst riding without wearing an approved securely fitted helmet is two penalty units and \$407. Riding an e-scooter whilst using your mobile or a portable device \$611, and three penalty units. Exceeding 0.5BAC or zero for prescribed drugs and expect the same penalties as motorcyclists.

"There was a big campaign locally around education,' Bass Coast Highway Patrol Leading Senior Constable Dengerink said.

"We've received numerous complaints about unsafe and illegal behaviour, and because of this we are specifically targeting this behaviour before someone is seriously injured

or killed."

"The team will be out and about for a sustained period throughout August," Sergeant Pearce added noting investigations remain ongoing surrounding e-scooter activities in Cowes recently.







# Early childhood services promote healthy dental habits

ESTABLISHING healthy habits from an early age gives children the best chance of good oral health in adulthood.

This Dental Health Week (August 4-10), local kindergartens, long-day care centres, and family day care services are focusing their efforts on promoting oral health through their involvement in Smiles 4 Miles.

Smiles 4 Miles is an initiative of Oral Health Victoria, which aims to improve the oral health of Victorian children and their families. The program is delivered in Bass Coast and South Gippsland by the South Coast Prevention Team (Health Promotion workforce of Bass Coast Health, Gippsland Southern Health Service and South Gippsland Hos-

Unfortunately, tooth decay is an oral disease that affects half of all children and adolescents.

The percentage of children in Bass Coast and South Gippsland aged three to five years attending public dental services who have at least one decayed, missing or filled tooth is 30 per cent and 42 per cent, respectively, which is above the Victorian average. Children with tooth decay and poor oral health can have trouble eating, sleeping and paying attention in kindergarten.

As part of the Smiles 4 Miles Dental Health Week Challenge, services are supporting children and their families to establish positive oral health habits by promoting the three key messages of Smiles 4 Miles - Drink well, Eat well and Clean well.

San Remo Preschool was one of the 2024 Dental Health Week Challenge winners and is looking forward to participating again this

Early childhood teacher and educational leader Amy Andersen says, "Dental Health Week is a great opportunity to promote the importance of oral health to families and to educate children through a vari-

ety of fun learning experiences. "We focus on the colours and textures of food to help children break out of their comfort zones and inspire them to try new vegetables. We also have a dental corner set up where children can practice brushing their teeth in gentle circles."



# Lemon delicious **Pudding**

EVERYWHERE I look there are trees full of lemons left out for passers-by to take. Who doesn't like lemons? Well, babies, yes, but most folks do.

The trick with lemon peel is to peel the skin with a potato peeler - this way, the lemon oil, where the flavour resides, does not fly off into the air...

Then, grind it with the sugar. Have a sniff! Amazing. Another hint - roll the lemon on a board, pushing down to release the juice – gets lots of juice out.

#### Ingredients

- 60 gm butter
- ¾ cup sugar
- 2 eggs, separated
- 4 tbsp self-raising flour
- 1 lemon, grated rind and juice
- 1½ cups milk

#### Method

Peel the lemon with a potato peeler and put it into a food processor with the sugar. Grind

Add the butter and cream together, then add the egg yolks and beat well.

Add the sifted flour and lemon juice, stir well, then slowly add the milk.

Beat the egg whites until they hold stiff peaks, then fold in

Pour this into a buttered shallow casserole and bake for about 45 minutes.

Serve with cream.

# Are we seeing the signs of energy panic?

THE decision by the would-be developer of a \$10 billion Victorian offshore wind farm, Blue Float Energy, to withdraw from its 2GW Gippsland project because its major shareholder, Quantum Capital, said it was no longer commercially viable, must have sent shivers down Chris Bowen's spine.

An article by the ABC quoted Bruce Mountain, director of Victoria University's Victoria Energy Policy Centre, saying the fact an operator was pulling out without trying to sell their assets was a sign that things were off track.

But, if the Minister for Climate Change and Energy was concerned, he didn't show it while being peppered with questions about the government's renewable energy targets and the cost of power in parliament last week.

In fact, he was happy to engage on the subject, quoting a report by the Australian Market Commission, which said "... residential electricity prices in the National Electricity Market (NEM) could be around 13% lower in 10 years' time if renewable energy and infrastructure development proceed as expected".

He went on to say that the Australian Energy Market Operator "confirms that renewable energy, connected by transmission and distribution, firmed with storage and backed up by gas-powered generation, is the lowest-cost way to supply electricity to homes and businesses as Australia transitions to a net zero economy", which is exactly the plan for Australia.

But there was a sneaky little 'IF' in there... "if renewable energy and infrastructure development proceed as expected".

So, how are we going, bearing in mind that 22% of Victoria's generating capacity, at Yallourn, will be turned off in mid-2028, a decision that was underscored recently by its owners EnergyAustralia and confirmed by the Victorian Minister for Energy and Resources, Lily D'Ambrosio, in a statement in March this year?

And a further 30% at Loy Yang A is due to be shut down in 2035, only 10 years from now.

How are we going? We don't know.

In the 2000-word statement to the party faithful last week, Premier Jacinta Allan made no mention of what must certainly be the most important structural shift in the state's and the nation's history. It was all about working from home and leading the nation in the treaty stakes.

But we started to see the first sign of the State Government being prepared to press the panic button last Thursday when it rammed through the 'National Electricity (Victoria) Amendment (VicGrid Stage 2 Reform) Bill 2025' in an hour and a half, which among other things will see farming individuals fined \$12,000 and companies fined \$48,000 if they refuse government access to their properties for the transmission line rollout.

"In my 10 or 11 years in this place I have never seen a Bill 160 pages long with a shorter second-reading speech. It is just a disgrace," said Danny O'Brien MP.

So, the pressure is on, and we're going to see the fallout from governments at both the State and Federal level falling behind in the rollout of their new energy plan.

The drive to develop the Victorian Renewable Energy Terminal at the Port of Hastings, and the resulting dredging on Western Port, will be the next cab off the rank and don't expect the deferential response the project got from the Federal Environment Minister Tanya Plibersek last time.

Is it too much to ask for an honest progress report on the renewable energy rollout plan ahead of the next State election? I guess that would be a 'yes'.

# Where's the water discharge benefit?

IN THE two SCS's planned for The Esplanade extending from Batman Street to Zephyr Court, BCSC claims in its concept plans there are "Community Benefits of the project to people in the broader community."

One of the benefits of the project BCSC claims in its concept plans is "...improvements in surface and stormwater quality discharging to the existing drainage outfalls."

At present, all drainage from these sections of road flows unfiltered through outfall drains directly onto the beaches of Sunderland Bay and thus, eventually into the ocean. BCSC's concept plans state that drainage from these projects will continue unchanged via the "existing drainage outfalls."

So how can council claim a benefit if nothing is being changed to improve or filter the outfalls? In fact, studies show that bitumen and asphalt roads are responsible for their own unique pollutants. These pollutants are comprised of things such as tyre particles (theconversation.com/one-of-the-biggestmicroplastic-pollution-sources-isnt-strawsor-grocery-bags-its-your-tires-259440), fuel and oil and other vehicle fluids leakage or spills, cleaning products, paint, road composition fragments, road material fluid/chemical contaminant leeching, as well as sediment and herbicide catchment which can contain heavy metals and toxic chemicals such as polyaromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) and mercury which have shown to be carcinogenic and hormone disrupting to aquatic

In their desperation to have road and drainage upgrades, I suspect BCSC and scheme proponents may choose to ignore and/or reject the suggestion that surfaced roads produce their own form of pollutants and contaminants. So be it.

However, the fact remains, that without upgrades to the existing outfall infrastructure there will be no change made to the function of outflows to reduce or improve the flow of waste and water-born pollutants onto our beautiful beaches.

How then can BCSC make the claim that these two projects will be of any benefit to the community by improving the quality of water discharging to the beach outfalls?

## Order a life saving test today

CANCER Council Victoria urges eligible 45–49-year-old Victorians to order a free bowel screening test kit and do it as soon as it comes in the mail

It has been one year since changes to the Australian Government's National Bowel Cancer Screening Program (NBCSP) came into effect, which saw the program's age criteria changed to allow Australians aged 45-49 to opt-in to receive a free bowel screening test kit in the mail.

Bowel cancer is Victoria's second leading

cause of cancer-related death among men and the third among women. Doing the bowel screening test every two years when you're due can help find bowel cancer early and before symptoms appear.

While research from Cancer Council Victoria's Centre for Behavioural Research in Cancer, funded by the Australian Government, shows high intentions from this cohort to participate in bowel screening, new data has revealed that less than five per cent of eligible Victorians in this age group have ordered the life-saving test in the first six months of it being available to them.

Data from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW) shows that within the first six months (July to December 2024) of the program being offered to 45-49 year-olds, 20,657 Victorians in this age group requested a bowel screening test kit.

This is a small fraction of the approximately 420,600 Victorians aged 45-49 who are now eligible for the life-saving test.

The test is free, quick, easy and done in the comfort of your own home. Bowel cancer can develop with no symptoms or family history. This is why doing regular screening from the age of 45 is so important, even if you feel well and live a healthy lifestyle.

This age change has allowed even more Victorians to access this life-saving test. We urge people aged 45 to 49 to order a test and do it as soon as it comes in the mail – it could save your life

People aged 45-49 can request their first bowel screening kit through the National Cancer Screening Register, while people aged 50-74 receive the bowel screening kit in the mail every two years.

#### No Community Bank for Burra

WE WISH to inform the community that the Bendigo Bank has officially ruled out the possibility of establishing a Community Bank in Korumburra. This decision will leave our town without a physical bank presence once the doors close on August 29. The ATM will no longer be available after this date.

The Bank has advised that their decision not to establish a Community Bank is based on several factors, including the close proximity to their corporate branch in Leongatha and the long term performance of the Korumburra branch, which they feel does not provide confidence in the sustainability of a Community Banking model. Additionally, the Community Bank model has changed significantly since it began and now requires up to ten times the level of community investment, which the Bendigo Bank believes would place an unreasonable financial risk on our

community.

In light of the closure, the Bank is contacting customers who do not currently operate an account with card access and is encouraging them to switch to accounts that will allow them to use banking services offered at the Post Office.

The Save the Bank group has successfully negotiated some funding for Milpara Community House, situated on the lower level of the Community Hub, to assist affected residents, particularly those receiving pensions, to have the details with Services Australia changed to their new account. This assistance will be on Tuesday's between 10am-4pm.

We have also secured a waiver of fees at Bank@Post for two years, which will help ease this change.

Community groups will need to apply for

a card attached to their accounts in order to make deposits at the Post Office.

We did manage to retain a reduced-hours branch for the past four years, following the Bank's original decision to close in 2021. While we are grateful for the extra time this provided, we acknowledge this current outcome is far from ideal for our town and leaves us bitterly disappointed that a town our size is left without a bank.

We want more people to get help sooner to remain housed, so we call on the Albanese Government to set up a \$500 million Homelessness Prevention Transformation Fund, increase Commonwealth Rent Assistance by 60 per cent, and increase social and affordable housing to be one in every 10 new homes by 2040. Everyone in Australia should have a safe, secure home and the best chance at a good life.





# Red hot prices at Leongatha VL

By Andrew Paloczi

THURSDAY'S Leongatha Store Sale was a spectacular success all around, following on from Tuesday's excellent Prime Sale results, Sentinel-Times being welcomed to the saleyards by Leongatha VLE managing director Brian Paynter, who declared, "The prices are red hot."

"It would be \$100 across the board, \$200 in places," Nutrien South Gippsland Livestock's Brian McCormack said of the price rises since that agency's last Store Sale a fortnight ago, adding there were some even bigger increases.

Feeder cattle were making into the low \$5 a kilo range, calves fetching in the \$5.30 to \$5.60 and beyond bracket, Mr McCormack giving the example of 250 kilo cattle jumping up to 50 cents a kilo, which would equate to \$125 a head increase.

A pen of 23 Angus steers from Mardan's Dallas and Heather Campbell, weighing an average of 258 kilos, made an excellent \$5.65 per kilo, Mr McCormack selling them for \$1460 a head, a pen of their slightly lighter steers fetching \$5.45 a kilo.

"They're impeccably bred cattle," Mr McCormack said, noting the Campbell's animals are renowned for their "good doing" and have mainly Innesdale bloodlines.

While Dallas would like to have got a little more weight on the cattle, he was unsurprisingly delighted with the prices achieved, Mr McCormack describing him as "over the moon".

SEJ's Jimmy Kyle sold a pen of 24 Angus steers, averaging 305 kilos, for \$1730 a head, making \$5.67 per kilo.

The heifer side of the sale also achieved tremendous prices, with Nutrien selling cattle from a business trading as High

Donna Egan came to Thursday's Store Sale to see her brother's cattle sell, the separate lots of Angus, Black Baldy and Hereford achieving strong prices, and she was pleased to observe "The market's come up", that applying across the board. A04 3125

Voltage, weighing an average of 413 kilos, for \$1990 a head at \$4.81 per kilo.

A pen of lighter heifer calves from Debbie Kroger of Main Ridge made \$5.02 a kilo, weighing an average of 235 kilos and attracting \$1180 a head.

Sentinel-Times saw Nutrien's Jack Ginnane sell a pen of 18 Angus heifers from Leongatha South's N & A Botha for \$1990 each, the animals weighing an average of 439 kilos, equating to \$4.53 a kilo.

As with all other categories, coloured cattle performed strongly on Thursday, Mr Mc-Cormack saying those with some Euro in their breeding were appealing to domestic fatteners, Euros being Limousin, Charolais and Simmental.

Nambrok's Willdarben Farm achieved \$5.39 a head for a pen of 14 Black Baldy steers, weighing 486 kilos on average and making \$2620 a head.

Boolarra's N Kreun & G Busuttil sold a pen of nine Hereford Red Angus cross steers through Nutrien, making \$5.54 per kilo, the animals weighing an average of 249 kilos and selling for \$1380 a head.

Mr McCormack thinks the excellent prices flowed on from a lack of numbers in Tuesday's fat sale, as people look to stock

He observed that while the market is still very much feeder-driven, the number of cattle going back out on grass is rising, accounting for perhaps 25 per cent of those sold on Thursday as opposed to somewhere around 10 per cent recently.

"There was a bit more competition from East Gippsland today," he said, saying buyers from Sale, Heyfield and Bairnsdale were all active, and that overall cattle numbers weren't that high.

Mr McCormack expects the market to rise a bit more yet due to limited cattle numbers, saying it's a matter of supply and demand.

# Biggest Pedal & Plant yet helps koalas | Demand strong at Prime Sale

Network's annual Pedal & Plant Day, held recently, was a resounding success with almost 80 people gathering to plant native species for koala habitat at Ruby.

Club, Leongatha Rotary Club, Korumburra Landcare Nursery and The Good Side Photography also helped to deliver the fun filled and productive event.

"I want to shout out and thank all the committee members and Arawata Landcare members who participated in the organisation and running of this event. We had 79 community members,

including 15 children, sign in and take part, resulting in 1500 indigenous plants being "rehomed" in one of the most iconic places along the South Gippsland Rail Trail, said Nick Dudley, Arawata Landcare Group President.

"I couldn't believe how quickly and effectively we got the plants in the ground and guarded, creating an outdoor art gallery."

were achieved at Tuesday's Leongatha Prime Sale, with the market rising 30 cents per kilo in places but a good 20 to 30 cents in general, according to Tim Gibson of Alex Scott & Staff.

"Last week probably had the bigger jump, but it went again, which is always good to see," he

"We had a very good couple of pens of Limousin and Charolais cross grain-fed finished calves, vealers, and they all made \$5.11 a kilo," Tim said, giving credit to colleague Glenn Barwick for auctioning them, those calves all being steers.

The high quality of those steers, which were in the 450 to 500 kilo range, prompted a couple of processors to go hammer and tongs on them.

Such was the demand on Tuesday that Tim is confident similar quality heifers would have made as much.

He remarked that a lot of well-finished grass-fed

prices cattle made it to the mid \$4 mark, with some going a bit higher.

Many cows achieved between \$4.20 and \$4.40 per kilo, with a few pens

getting up to \$4.50. It wasn't only the top cattle fetching strong prices.

"We didn't have any exceptional bullocks in our run, but there were some first cross bullocks that didn't have the best breeding and they still made \$4.60s and \$4.70s," Tim said. He attributes the ex-

cellent prices to abattoir operators' concerns about ensuring they can meet their quotas, with the need to provide for strong export demand, Tim explaining there is a flow-on effect to feedlots.

With a bit of rain and resultant confidence, others are wanting to buy cattle before Springtime, having sold a lot and looking to restock.

With feedlots currently paying good prices, many farmers are selling their heavier cattle and going

# Shearing as the next Olympic sport

speed and skill that shearers embody on a daily basis simply performing their job is being proposed as worthy of the Olympics.

Shearing and Wool Handling competitions are held locally, nationally and internationally with many countries competing, such as South Africa, Japan, USA, France, Germany, Ireland, South America, the UK, and New Zealand.

During competitions, shearers compete against the clock to shear as many sheep as possible with precision, avoiding nicks and cuts to the sheep, which impacts the quality of the wool.

It allows shearers to showcase their skills, speed, and efficiency, right across the in-

A young shearer from WA, Kaylee Sander, has started a petition to include Shearing and Wool Handling as an Exhibition Sport in the Brisbane 2032 Olympics.

Chloe Dann is a small mob sheep shearer based in South Gippsland and has seen a few conversations about the topic over the years, but remains on the fence about shearing becoming an Olympic sport.

"It's a hard one because it's hard to know how shearing would be received by people who know nothing about the industry. For people that have a bit of an idea, it's such an incredible skill, and it's wonderful watching people, particularly really good shearers.

"And I think that's interesting for a lot of people, but I'm worried it would be sort of similar to the break

dancing situation."

Chloe is referring to the 2024 Olympics in which break dancing was debuted as a new sport and Australia's entrant, Rachel Gunn's (Raygun) unusual performance was mocked and ridiculed worldwide

"Although I do believe that the world's best shearers are as good athletes as any other

sport, because they are true athletes."

The stereotypical idea of a shearer being big and burly with a cigarette dangling from their mouth does exist, but they are not the shearers competing in and winning shearing competitions, said

"Those people are incredibly fit and very disciplined.

"Any shearer that has shorn world records is following a regime similar to that of any other Olympic athlete. There is a nutritionist involved, they're at the gym, morning and night, and then also shearing eight hours a day on top of that, which is incredibly physical as well. They do that preparation for months on end," explained Chloe

"I think that there is a lack of understanding, particularly around world record shearers, what their unbelievable athleticism is, going into those world records.

Chloe concedes that bringing shearing into the Olympic field could have other positive implications for the industry.

"Î think it would open up a lot more interest, because it is so hidden away and a lot of people don't know anything about it.

"I do shearing demonstrations regularly, and people are always so surprised about the process that it doesn't just fall off all that sort of stuff."

While the International Committee (IOC) Olympic will make the final decision on whether shearing is included in the 2032 Brisbane program, Kaylee is passionate about it.

'We should raise the profile of this thrilling and underrecognised sport that is founded on the honest work of everyday men and women, many of whom come from poor, rural and minority backgrounds," wrote Kaylee, as part of the petition.





Julian, Cam and Tom Stone all featured prominently for the Lions and left no stones unturned in their quests for a Stony Creek win.


Other Lions working feverishly for a favorable outcome included Mitchell J Rowe, Cody Loughridge and Jai Bright.




The Sea Eagles are set to play Koo Wee Rup at home in round 18. They last met Koo Wee Rup in round 10 and came away with an 11-point win.



He finished equal fifth amongst the 53 Australians who competed and missed out on winning gold by just one target.

Robert shot during the morning rotation and was kept in suspense all day as the winning shooter competed during the afternoon rotation.

"It was a close run in the end, and a really good event," he said.

Returning home with his silverware, Robert now has the full complement of medals, having won gold in Italy in 2022 and bronze in America in 2024.

He also competed in England in 2019 but fell out of the plac-

Locally, Robert has been a member of the Westernport Field and Game Club since he was a junior, inspired by his father.

He went through to the seniors but then moved away to Melbourne for work.

Life came along and Robert got married and had children and didn't find his way back to the sport until he was 38.

He has been heavily involved with the field and game club since he was 50.

Now, just shy of 70. Robert has enjoyed travelling the world and performing exceptionally well on the international stage.

"There are a lot of great local clubs I have to thank – they are all great clubs to shoot at. I primarily shoot with Westernport, but I attend events in Moe, Morwell and Traralgon. It helps to keep my eye in," Robert said.

"I love it. I've always been competitive when it comes to clay target shooting. I'm stoked to be part of it."

His passion for clay target shooting is shared by his family.

His granddaughter, now 16 years old, recently shot 25 straight, and his son and brothers have all been involved in the sport.

Robert said it's the inclusivity that makes the sport what it is.

"Men and women, seniors and junior, and all abilities can get involved with clay target shooting - that's the key. There's no limit to who can compete," he

Robert is looking to continue his run in 2026, with the World Sporting Clay Championships set to be held in Portugal.

"I will be trying out for Portugal through a series of selection shoots," Robert said.

"If I continue down the path I'm on, I'll hopefully make the Australian team again."

The Australian Championship is set to be held in Brisbane, the Grand Prix in Cooma, New South Wales, and the Oceanic Championships is yet to announce a location.

Robert thanked his family for their ongoing support.

"You rely on your family so much to give you a chop out so you can travel," he said.

Robert made special mention of his wife Fiona, who has always supported him in the pursuit of his dreams.
