SKILLS SHORTAGE IMPACTS GROWTH

ALMOST one third of all advertised job vacancies are in regional Australia, according to this week's National Skills Commission (NSC) data.

And as Phillip Island is poised for a huge influx of visitors for the return of the Australian Motorcycle Grand Prix, local business is all too aware that 'Food Trade Workers', other hospitality staff and retail workers are among those in the shortest supply across Gippsland.

Of course, the dire shortage of doctors, nurses and medical practitioners heads the list in this region with 266 vacancies, while there are 119 jobs available for health diagnostic and therapy workers, plus 70 in health welfare support.

But, anecdotally at least, the number of

people needed in hospitality and retail in Bass Coast in particular, is well in excess of advertised vacancies in Gippsland: listing jobs in food trades as 138, hospitality 181, retail sales assistants 207, and hospitality/retail managers 97.

"It's right across the board; bar staff, kitchen, housekeeping, reception, maintenance; we've got vacancies in all those areas but we're not as badly off as some who've had to close for two or three days-a-week to keep operating," said Kimberley Brown, General Manager of the North Pier Hotel in Cowes and Vice President of the Phillip Island Business Network.

"We had our busiest Saturday in three years over the four-day Queen's memorial and grand final weekend, bigger than

the Australia Day Saturday and here we are, ahead of huge weekend for the grand prix hoping we can fulfill our guests' expectations.

"We're usually able to rely on picking up some staff at the end of the snow season but we got none out of that this year.

"We're looking to recruit more school leavers than we have in the past this year.

"Everyone's pretty buoyant about the Island's economy but there's no doubt the shortage of staff, in all areas, isn't allowing business to reap the rewards of catering to a big crowd, and we just hope it doesn't affect our visitors' experience," Ms Brown said.



Candidates hear passionate Western Port Woodlands' plea

IN AN election race that sits on a knife-edge, the issuing of a 'how to vote card' by the members of the 'Save the Western Port Woodlands' group could prove crucial in the pivotal race for Bass.

And the group will use the responses by Bass candidates who attended their one-issue forum at the Corinella Public Hall last Saturday afternoon when formulating their voting guide.

It's likely to come out strongly in favour of Greens' candidate Callum Bugbird, who was both forceful and unequivocal in his opposition to the ruination of the Western Port Woodlands for sand extraction.

Both the independent Jenni Jobe and the Nationals' candidate Brett Tessari backed a moratorium on future expansion, until a proper impact assessment is completed.

Aaron Brown for the Liberals said he had received a commitment from the relevant Coalition Shadow Ministers, including Shadow Minister for Planning, Ryan Smith, and Shadow Minister for Resources, Richard Riordan, that they would "update the 1996 Extractive Industries document for Lang Lang to Grantville including the Gurdies, ensuring it balances the needs of the resources sector with the need to protect the unique environment in the Bass Coast and Cardinia Shires".

Jordan Crugnale, the Labor incumbent, expressed her con-

cerns and listed the advocacy work she had done on behalf of the community.

Around 200 people crowded into the Corinella Hall to hear the latest in the campaign to Save the Western Port Woodlands.

As well as the Bass candidates, Austin Cram (Animal Justice Party Eastern Victoria candidate) attended while the group's Bass candidate is appointed.

The Save Western Port Woodlands group is calling for:

- A moratorium on any new mines in the Woodlands.
- An Environmental Significance Overlay to be placed over the Woodlands, and for
- The woodlands to be excluded from Extractive Industry

Interest Areas.

Convenor of the event, Catherine Watson, listed some of the actions of the group to date and while they were disappointed with the response to the area in the government's draft Distinctive Areas and Landscapes Plan, the group was "nervously optimistic that something good is about to happen" in that regard.

South Gippsland Conservation Society representative Gerard Drew spoke about the Woodlands as a significant refuge for native flora and fauna.

"There's quite a lot of sand mines already dotted throughout but the one that has really got us scared is the expansion of the mines," he said showing a devastating map of future sand-

pit expansion.

Geologist Ted Minty said there were numerous places around Victoria, close to rail and major highways with suitable sand resources, raising concerns about up to 5000 sand truck movements-a-day on the Bass Highway at the height of future sand mine expansion.

Other speakers followed before Mayor Cr Michael Whelan spoke, saying the council had concerns on two fronts about the expansion of extractive industries in the area including the loss of the woodlands and danger of leachate getting into Western Port.

He said the council had written to the Minister for the Environment and Water Tanya Plibersek with concerns under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act.

Jane Jobe Vice President of the Phillip Island Conservation Society said Western Port has lost its liver when the Koo Wee Rup Swamp was drained and was now at risk of losing its kidneys as well.

"The water quality of Western Port is threatened by these sand mines," she said, likening the fight to save the Western Port Wetlands as being as serious as the threat posed by AGL's gas project.

Sun shines on \$600,000 Island croquet pavilion opening

"IT'S been a remarkable journey to get here today but it always starts with the community..."

It was with those words that Bass MP Jordan Crugnale officially opened the \$600,000 new Phillip Island Croquet Club pavilion on Friday, October 7, just seven short years from inspiration to completion.

"You came up with the idea, you developed a staged approach, and you went to the council telling us this is what gets our community together. It's not a clubrooms, it's a magnificent pavilion.

"And it's one of these grants, from the Sport and Recreation Victoria 'Community Sports Infrastructure Stimulus Program' that didn't require a lot of local money from the council and the community to make it work.

"Your timing was perfect," Ms Crugnale said.

Contributions to the project include: Council (\$30,000), Sport and Recreation Victoria (SRV \$545,000), Phillip Island Croquet Club (\$25,000).

In addition, Bass Coast Council acknowledged the significant club contribution towards the detailed design for pavilion.

Club stalwart David Mann provided a brief history of the project, underscoring Ms Crugnale's remarks.

"It was devised in 2015 as a three-stage development plan: 1. To build a half-size lawn, 2. A new clubhouse (old one not big enough, needed to be relocated), and 3. To extend the third lawn to full size," said Mr Mann.

"We spoke to the council in 2016, discussed extending the existing clubrooms but it would have been more expensive and they raised the idea of going in with an application for the same sort of thing at Wonthaggi.

"The council put in an SRV application that was initially unsuccessful but was ultimately funded in 2021. We ambitiously set a target of five years, but seven years was a remarkably short journey."

Mr Mann made the following formal thank yous: Bass Coast Shire Council, with special mention for recreation planner Kelly Boyd and project manager Abbas Niazi during the construction phase, the State Government, particularly SRV, Andrew Donahue Building Design, TS Constructions especially Mal Lindsay, Trevor Bowler and their team, the club's sponsors Fineweld Stainless Steel, Amaro Park, and The Bendigo Bank, and past president Pauleen Leditschke and present-day president John Swarbrick. And also, Jennie Wills for organising the day.

Both Mr Mann and croquet club president John Swarbrick praised the Bass Coast Shire Council for its leadership and its impeccable timing, and the state government for backing the initiative.

Skills shortage puts handbrake on growth

Across Gippsland, as well as health professionals, hospitality and retail vacancies; legal, social and welfare; business/finance, education, engineering, vets, carers/aides, automotive and driver/storemen positions are heavily represented in job adverts.

Regional Australia Institute (RAI) CEO Liz Ritchie said August data shows 309,000 job advertisements nationally of which 91,000 are in the regions.

"When accounting for unadvertised jobs, which are often low-skilled, temporary positions, we know this number

could be doubled or even tripled," Liz Ritchie said.

And it's not just the shortage of people to take jobs, lack of childcare and accommodation is also holding the regions back.

About 3.7 million regional Australians live in a regional childcare desert, according to the National Skills Commission.

When it comes to access to a doctor, there are about 328 full time equivalent GPs for every 100,000 people in the regions compared to an average of 465 FTE GPs in our capital cities.

Ms Ritchie said a shortage

of builders, plumbers, electricians, machinery operators and labourers was constraining badly needed developments such as new housing projects and putting a handbrake on productivity growth.

Three projects share in more than \$1m in funding

MINISTER for Local Government Melissa Horne has announced the latest round of projects from the State Government's \$50 million Growing Suburbs Fund with three in Bass Coast.

The Government is investing \$1.14m towards the projects locally, which include:

- Rhyll Foreshore Playspace Stage 2 - \$235,000

The Rhyll Playspace stage 2 will create a high quality nature based playspace on the Rhyll foreshore.

Westernport Water plans \$42.88M capital works

WESTERNPORT Water is entering a key phase of its work over the next five to six

years, aiming to get the sign off by its customers, the Essential Services Commission and the State Government for a program of works and price settings from 2023-2028.

A feature of those plans is an investment of \$42.88 million in capital works, including \$4.34 million to upgrade the King Road Treatment Plant at Coronet Bay, and \$1.88 million to begin Stage 1 of the design and construction of a biogas plant at the Cowes Wastewater Treatment Plant, to reduce the impact of greenhouses gases on the environment.

The authority doesn't expect residential bills to increase beyond inflation for the period, proposing that there will be no increases at all in 2024-2028, maintaining, they say, the cheapest average water bills in Victoria.

The first public consultation period for the new plan opened on the Engage Victoria website on Thursday, October 6 and will close on December 1, 2022.

Wonthaggi history piece shortlisted for award

THE Victorian Community History Awards shortlist has been announced with a historical book based in Wonthaggi featured in the finalists.

Some 21 publications and eight projects have been shortlisted for 10 prizes ranging from \$500 to \$2,000.

All are also in the running for the \$5000 Victorian Premier's History Award to be announced at the Melbourne Arts Centre on October 21.

Making the shortlist was, 'A Sort of History of Me, My Family and a Cow Named Gina', written by Sebastian J. 'Sam' Gatto.

The novel is partly based on historical documents, personal memories and family stories, the book narrates the migration story of a Calabrian family to the coal mining town of Wonthaggi.

Set mainly in the 1950s and 1960s, it describes the struggles and successes of the family as it becomes part of the community.

The shortlist also includes online and physical exhibitions, podcasts, websites, walks and tours, books and articles.

The Victorian Community History Awards are presented by Public Record Office Victoria in partnership with the Royal Historical Society of Victoria and are funded by the State Government.

Nationals appeal primary's school case

DEPUTY Leader of the Nationals, Emma Kealy, and Nationals Candidate for Bass, Brett Tessari, visited Wonthaggi Primary School last week as the school ramped up their bid to secure dire funding.

Both were quick to praise the incredible work of the teachers and staff at Wonthaggi Primary amidst failing, inadequate and subpar facilities.

As teachers scrounge to continue providing a first-rate education and high-quality learning, Wonthaggi Primary School Council President, Caroline Moore is ensuring no child is left behind.

In their appeal for \$20 million to create connected spaces, and cope with the ever-increasing influx of students, the master plan is not only about upgrading the facilities and bringing them in line with other schools but also addressing safety concerns on all fronts.

Students Axel, Boyd, Louie and Billie were on hand to speak openly and honestly with Emma and Brett about their experiences and what having upgraded facilities would mean to them, and

future generations during a round table.

"The facilities haven't changed in 40 years," Brett explained drawing on his experience as a child meeting up with his friends and cousins who attended Wonthaggi Primary.

The first public school with an outdoor pool, Brett recalled many summers spent at the only pool in town, and the importance of community

water safety.

"The school dates back to 1911 and there are significant failings, not least of which is the fact that one set of toilets are simply unusable - forcing children to cross to the other side of the school to go to the toilet," he said.

"I can see firsthand that the Wonthaggi Primary school is in need of an upgrade and that is why I'm lobbying for investment

to fix the outdated facilities."

Mr Tessari took the case to The Nationals Member for Eastern Victoria Member Melina Bath who has raised the matter in State Parliament.

"I have called on the Education Minister to provide funding for the school to ensure that it has modern and acceptable facilities, not the least of which is working toilets," Ms Bath said.

Helping Island visitors to recycle

MINISTER for the Environment and Climate Action Lily D'Ambrosio announced funding of more than \$3 million will be shared by 39 organisations through the Circular Economy Communities Fund.

Funded projects include bicycle recycling and, repair, reuse and recycling and re-purposing of recreational fishing gear, a soap repurposing project, and several innovative food rescue and community garden programs.

Phillip Island Community and Learning Centre will create a local micro-industry for the many watersports and camping enthusiasts who live on and regularly visit the Island, creating a repair facility for items like tents, caravan annexes, yacht sails and surfboard covers to encourage people to repair rather than replace them.

Reground will expand their coffee collection service to businesses producing coffee waste across Victoria, engaging 130 businesses, recovering 270 tonnes of coffee waste to 260 end users, providing over 200,000 people with a sustainable choice when it comes to coffee.

Soap Aid Ltd will re-establish a soap repurposing centre in Melbourne to divert around 30 tonnes of soap and repurpose into soap bars that will be distributed via community organisations out to approximately 20,000 vulnerable Victorians across the state.

The Circular Economy Communities Fund is delivered through the Government's circular economy plan, Recycling Victoria: a new economy.

'Wear all the gear' police appeal to visiting riders



Bass Coast Highway Patrol Acting Sergeant Scott Simcock made a personal appeal to riders to stay safe while visiting the area this week.

BASS Coast Highway Patrol police officer, Acting Sergeant Scott Simcock was right on message, ahead of the return of the Australian Motorcycle Grand Prix this coming weekend, when he addressed a huge crowd of motorcycle riders at the annual Blessing of the Bikes in Cowes' main street last Sunday.

It was all about road safety and he knew what he was talking about.

"My message today is all about road safety and I can speak from experience after being involved in a motorcycle crash myself earlier in the year," said Acting Sergeant Simcock.

"We are here to promote motorcycle safety but I just want to get across the message about wearing the proper apparel so you can get home - you've got to wear all of the gear, all of the time, because you never know when you will be the victim of a collision.

"Without doubt, I would not have been able to come through as well as I did if I wasn't

wearing all the right gear."

Simcock was riding his police bike in Wonthaggi on June 17 this year when a young driver made a mistake and turned in front of him. He had nowhere to go.

"The bike was a write-off but fortunately I wasn't," he said.

And the fact is that neither motorcycle riders nor country drivers are faring that well this year where the TAC's road fatality statistics are concerned.

Fatalities are up 35% in regional Victoria from 80 to 108 compared with the same time last year, against a five-year average of 96.

Motorcycle fatalities are also up, by 40%, from 30 to 40 deaths to the same time last year, against a five-year average of 28.

The state's road toll is up in total from 171 this time last year to 195.

Male deaths are up 18%, and the age groups not doing well are 18-20 (up 133%), 26-29 (up 43%), 40-49 (up 30%) and 50-59 (up 30%).

Mayor's message

FIXING the shortage of social and affordable rental housing in Bass Coast is one of the priorities of the Council.

The serious lack of housing is stopping families moving to our regions to fill critical job vacancies, while others are simply unable to find homes to live in, which is simply unacceptable.

I have previously said the search for solution could include people renting out their holiday homes on long-term leases. But fixing the housing crisis will require many different solutions, which is why councillors recently met with the organisers behind Homes for Homes, a long-term, sustainable solution to increasing the supply of social and affordable housing.

The Big Issue established Homes for Homes to provide a way for the whole community to work together to solve homelessness. The program raises funds through voluntary donations from donors, both individuals and property developers, agreeing to include a register their property with Homes for Homes. When the homeowner sells their home, they are invited to make a tax-deductible donation of 0.1% of the sale price to Homes for Homes.

Importantly, the registration remains with the property after the sale, encouraging the incoming homeowner to also consider making a contribution in the future when they sell.

Councils across Australia are looking at different ways to support Homes for Homes either through providing uplift or fast tracking for participating developers and by introducing Homes for Homes to their existing residents. Some councils are considering making Homes for Homes compulsory on all future planning permits.

Recently several Melbourne developments included Homes for Homes in their planning permit application, with Homes for Homes working closely with the developers and planners to achieve a positive social outcome.

Homes for Homes has granted over \$1.28 million toward a diverse portfolio of 13

projects in only a few short years. All grant funds are allocated to raise the supply of social and affordable housing. The creation of new housing means that there is less housing stress and more people have a safe and secure place to sleep each night. Funds have been granted across VIC, ACT, NT and QLD. Later in 2022, Homes for Homes will grant a further \$160,000 across NSW and WA.

Homelessness impacts many people in different ways and Homes for Homes looks to fund projects that support the diverse range of people experiencing homelessness and housing stress. Grant funds have so far helped to create housing for a range of people in need, including families living in housing stress, women over 55 escaping family violence, affordable tenancies for people in Aboriginal communities and people with mental illness cared for by aging parents.

Expert Housing Advisory Groups advise on the best projects to fund, based on the greatest housing need and which projects will make the most impact.

The registration with Homes for Homes would not compete with any existing Bass Coast Shire policies, rather, it would run in parallel.

Bass Coast will continue to explore how to support Homes for Homes, so that donations raised via developers who create housing in Bass Coast Council can remain within Bass Coast. This means that our local area will benefit from a boost in social and affordable housing.

Homes for Homes is certainly an interesting idea, and one worth exploring because we are committed to addressing the chronic lack of social and affordable housing. It's a simple way of making a big difference.

Cowes rides off with new festival

THE economic impact of the annual Australian Motorcycle Grand Prix is set to extend into a whole week of festivities after Zaidee's Rainbow Foundation initiated the Island's first motorcycle festival at the weekend.

While the weather was against the set up for the event and Saturday night's performance by leading 90s live band, Chocolate Starfish, the 'Blessing of the Bikes', in Cowes' main street, on Sunday was a cracking success.

Hundreds of riders started arriving from early morning and by the blessing time, shortly after 12 noon, the whole lower end of Thompson Avenue was filled with 400 or 500 bikes.

The event is expected to grow from here.

They represented an instant 'show and shine' bike show as enthusiasts, visitors and interested locals wandered around, coffees and lunch in hand, inspecting the shiny machines, old, new and historic, and enjoying the ambience.

Speaking at the formal part of the event, in between sets by Dirty Rats Old School Oz Rock band, father of Zaidee and co-founder of the Rainbow Foundation with his wife Kim, Allan Turner praised blessing event initiators, Marcel Widmer and wife Sabine who started it all at Mirboo North seven years ago.

He said the event would help raise money for Zaidee's charity, awareness of joining the organ donorship register, in memory of Zaidee's lifesaving donations to save seven other people, including a newborn baby.

Zaidee was one of only six children across Australia who donated organs in 2004, when she died of a brain aneurism 18 years ago."

Former motorcycle rider Bass Coast, Deputy Mayor Cr Leticia Laing, welcomed the visitors on behalf of the council, inviting them to call in at local shops in their travels. Shire keeping close eye on renewable energy prospects

BASS Coast Shire has welcomed the Federal Government's commitment to renewable energy but raised a number of concerns regarding offshore wind.

According to the shire, they actively support the transition to renewable energy and accepts that when it comes to wind power, the Victorian coastline has significant potential.

The coastlines of Bass Coast, South Gippsland, Wellington, and East Gippsland Shires provide strong, consistent winds, proximity to electricity markets as well as connection to the existing grid and associated industry.

At this stage there is only high-level detail provided regarding location, consequently Council's response should be considered within this context.

Whilst offering in principle support, Bass Coast expresses the following concerns for the Gippsland offshore renewable energy infrastructure area:

- the proposed area identified is extensive and given the size of current and possible future turbines, too close to the shore,
- the proposed area would have a significant impact on several nationally iconic views including the globally recognised Phillip Island Penguin Parade,



- the area is an environmentally vulnerable and sensitive marine environment,
- the impact on whale migration, the iconic penguin parade and mass shearwater migration requires independent investigation,
- the aggregated impact of multiple environmental issues would affect the visitor economy of the region,
- Local Government has limited resources to effectively play its role in the planning and approval of projects,
- Developing new industries such as offshore wind in Australia will generate significant opportunities for economic prosperity in region and careful consideration and planning is required to maximise local participation and benefit while mitigating negative

impacts, consideration of construction and servicing infrastructure particularly waterside is required when determining most appropriate areas,

• there is no detail regarding onshore location of works including the need for underground transmission and project consolidation of shared infrastructure and easements.

The shire further added, "We encourage Commonwealth, State and Local governments to work collaboratively to streamline the approval process for such applications."

"Since the recent announcement by the Federal Government, Council has been approached by several potential offshore wind proponents.

"Council is concerned about

how it will be able to contribute effectively to any approval processes which includes Commonwealth approval, State (EES) approval, and local land use planning approval, all of which will require significant resourcing.

"Council would welcome the opportunity to directly discuss how the approval process may be structured to reduce the burden on our community and enable us to effectively review and comment on the numerous applications we are likely to receive."

The shire summarised their position stating that given the limited information in the current Notice to Declare an Area proposal, "It is difficult for council and the Bass Coast community to form a final position on this matter."

Key concern over offshore wind raised

THE Destination Phillip Island Board (DPI) has made a submission to the Commonwealth Government's plans to approve area maps for potential offshore windfarms along the south coast of Phillip Island.

DPI acknowledges and supports the transition to renewable energy in Australia and Victoria, and the concept of offshore windfarms as one of the sources of renewable energy.

However, there are a number of concerns that DPI considers need to be addressed in considering the development, construction and operation of offshore windfarms in the waters off Phillip Island and Bass Coast.

These are issues that are relevant to tourism, recreational and commercial fishing, the community, and to the environment, animals, birds and sea life.

The area proposed includes all of the Southern coastline of Phillip Island from The Nobbies to Cape Woolamai. The map proposes an area as close as 5kms from the coast.

Destination Phillip Island is concerned about the impacts in the following areas and has suggested that the maps exclude the Phillip Island and Bass Coast areas to avoid these impacts arising.

Key points raised include:

- The visual amenity impact of an offshore windfarm and or windfarms
- Impact on marine ecosystem including the population of little penguins, seals, whales, dolphins and other species
- Impact on bird life and the migration paths of birds
- Direct impact on business – fisherman commercial and recreational, on water tourism operations
- Onshore environmental impacts – including transmission pathways
- Impacts of construction and operation of offshore wind farms including accommodation shortages, impact on roads and local jetties

Exciting progress at Korumburra Secondary College

PROGRESS continues at Korumburra Secondary College (KSC) despite the wet winter delaying the completion of building works, with new classrooms now expected to be ready by the end of the year.

The gymnasium, basketball and netball court, and performing arts centre building is still on course to be in service by the start of next year, with the roof now on.

When it's complete, students will enjoy ample runoff areas around the basketball court, with the performing arts area featuring a rollout stage.

With the more advanced of the two new buildings yet to be completed, students will continue to use their existing classrooms for this term.

"Initially the target was to

be in the first building by the start of term 4, but with the weather we didn't want to rush to get into the classroom wing by this week, so towards the end of last term we made the decision to stay where we are," assistant principal John Wilson said.

He added that will ensure there is no disruption for year 12 students during their busy final term of school.

"We didn't want to be mixing in a move out of one building and into another in the middle of all that," John said.

As well as classrooms, the first of the soon-to-open buildings also contains staff offices, a library and an airy arcade that will house student lockers and act as a meeting place, complete with planter boxes and seating.

The revamped section of the KSC also features a bright

In addition to the two new buildings, the school's administration area has undergone a transformation after being redesigned, with assistant principal John, principal Vaya Dauphin, the business manager and the technical support leader now all having new offices in one area.

John explained his previous offices as assistant principal have each been like an outpost and he is enjoying the centralised approach.

"For the school leadership and the administration staff to be together in one area really helps," he said.

It allows for easier communication while still providing individual offices rather than an open plan space.

The revamped section of the KSC also features a bright

and spacious wellbeing hub for students to unwind when needed.

It acts as a central point for them to connect with a range of wellbeing services, rather than having those services scattered around the school.

Those services include the school nurse, twice weekly visits from a Headspace representative, education support staff, the wellbeing coordinator, and the family links program to help families engage with the school.

While the wellbeing hub offers a relaxing lounge style area, it also includes separate rooms, with principal Vaya pointing out that is crucial when private discussions between wellbeing service providers, students, and sometimes parents, are required.

Ambulance Victoria's Shocktober is back again

LOCALS are being urged to refresh their cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) skills and sign up to be a GoodSAM responder this October.

Now in its third year, Ambulance Victoria's (AV) Shocktober is a nationally recognised campaign aimed at improving cardiac arrest survival rates.

AV's Gippsland Regional Director Ross Salathiel said about 19 Victorians suffer a cardiac arrest every day but only one in 10 survive, taking the lives of our loved ones far too soon.

GoodSAM is a life-saving app that connects patients in cardiac arrest with a nearby volunteer who is willing to start hands-on CPR while an

ambulance is on the way.

Cardiac arrest happens when a person's heart suddenly stops beating and stops pumping blood effectively around the body; it can happen to anyone, anytime, anywhere.

"Pre-hospital care in Victoria is world class, but it all starts when a bystander steps in and starts compressions. While bystanders alone will never replace an ambulance service, equipping people with skills to start the chain of survival; starting chest compressions or CPR and using an AED saves lives," Ross said.

"Anyone can save a life in three simple steps. Call, Push, Shock: Call Triple Zero

(000), Push hard and fast on the middle of the chest, and Shock using an AED."

An AED is used to deliver a shock to help restore normal heart rhythm following a cardiac arrest.

"The use of public AEDs has nearly doubled in the last ten years; anyone can use an AED, regardless of whether they have received training to do so. If someone is in cardiac arrest and an AED is available, simply open it and follow the verbal instructions," Ross said.

"Finally, if you have an AED please register it with AV and ensure it is accessible 24/7 where people in need can use it - not locked away. If some-

one suffers a cardiac arrest and a bystander calls 000, the call-taker can direct people to that nearest AED - this small but important step can help link AEDs in communities across Victoria with people who need them when they need them."

Approximately 1100 GoodSAM responders have been invited to participate in the FIRST, which is expected to start in Victoria later this year.

Economic framework project crucial to shaping shire's future

BASS Coast Shire has commenced the development of an Economic Development Framework which will outline plans to increase opportunities for businesses.

This includes opportunities for business activity and investment, facilitate participation in employment and education, and build the competitiveness, diversity and resilience of the economy.

The purpose of the framework is to guide Council on how they will focus resources to influence economic development such as, investment attraction, workforce development, new business support and visitor economy.

The development of the Framework will be over four distinct phases, with each phase having opportunity for community involvement.

The first steps include the State of the Shire report, a critical document which will inform and support the development of the framework that considers the shire's population, business and industry, and land, housing and environment.

It evaluates key population and economic data and trends in the context of the shire's peri-urban Local Government Area, as well as the potential vulnerabilities revealed in data and its state relative to the rest of Gippsland and Victoria.

The report highlights that the shire's consumer economy is worth around \$800m per year, however, Visitor Local Spend is 'extremely volatile'.

It notes that by Victorian standards, Bass Coast's unemployment rate is high.

"As of December 2021, the smoothed unemployment rate was 5.7 per cent, higher than for all of Victoria although within the expected range for the Gippsland region," the report states.

For Business and In-

dustry insights, in 2021, the shire's Gross Regional Product was \$1.7b, with economic activity dominated by tourism and industries servicing population growth.

While for Housing, Land and The Environment, Bass Coast is characterised by high-value 'rural' land accommodating agribusiness, tourism and conservation services.

It notes that the shire's residents mostly live on land zoned General Residential, accounting for 66 per cent of all residential zoned land.

The development process of the framework includes:

Discover phase - October

The first phase involves data gathering to explore the high-level challenges and opportunities for Bass Coast. This phase is supported by collecting information through business and industry surveys and the completion of a State of the Shire report.

Define phase - November

This phase will examine key data and learnings gathered during the discover phase, with a Discussion Paper to be formed.


Development phase - November 2022 - January 2023

Following the public exhibition period and summary of feedback the Framework will be presented to Council for consid

Deliver phase - February 2023 - ongoing

This phase involves the implementation of the Framework and delivering on actions identified over the next 4 years. A 12-month action plan will be created each year.

Community has say on Cowes Streetscape

THERE has been a strong response to the Cowes Streetscape Master Planning project being undertaken by the shire with well over a hundred submissions made online and in-person.

The project seeks to reshape the main hub of Cowes and connect The Esplanade to Olive Justice Place to the Redeveloped Cowes Cultural and Community Centre.

The shire held numerous in-person sessions while residents were able to make submissions online, with the feedback now under review.

Some of the greatest changes will occur in Thompson Avenue, between Chapel Street and The Esplanade, with traffic transitioning to one-way southbound vehicle traffic only with limited parallel parking options.

A critical aspect of the plans includes a significant reduction in parking spaces for some areas.

In Section 1 - Thompson Avenue North and The Esplanade, the current 66 parking spaces will be reduced to 24 with four taxi rank spaces.

Section 2 parking will be reduced from 73 to 61, Section 3 - Chapel Street to 41

from 46, Section 5 - Church Street will transition from 12 spaces and 12 informal spaces to 11 parking spaces.

While Bass Avenue will revert from 6 formal and 42 informal spaces to 40 parking spaces in the short-term plan and 58 in the long-term plan.

Other aspects of the project are detailed in the draft concepts.

For The Esplanade and Thompson Avenue North (from Chapel Street) key changes include:

- The Esplanade transitions to one-way vehicle traffic westbound within a 10km/h shared zone.
- Shared zone streetscape
- Accessible passage by all abilities with no kerbs and introduction of expanded terraced ramped landscape at no steeper than 1:20 gradient
- Upgrade pedestrian paths, ramps and stairs to enable universal access.

Church Street (between Warley and Bass Avenue):

- Provide raised crossings at intersections and mid-block crossing between Thompson Avenue and the Transit Centre.
- Upgrade footpath surfaces, including widening along the north side of Church Street.
- Slow traffic along Thompson Avenue from Church

to 30km/h.

- Reduction in car parks will be required to allow for raised pedestrian crossings mid-block and at intersections.

- Chapel Street and Church Street intersections to become signalised and fully raised level with the footpath.

Chapel Street (between Warley and Bass Avenue)

- Retain slip-lane vehicle access to/from Transit Centre car park; remove parallel car parking and transition the space into a flush shared zone with seating, wayfinding signage and improved garden beds.
- Provide raised crossings at intersections and mid-block crossing connecting the shopping centre with Olive Justice Place.
- Upgrade pedestrian paths, ramps and stairs to enable universal access.

Church Street (between Warley and Bass Avenue):

- Provide raised crossings at intersections and mid-block crossing between Thompson Avenue and the Transit Centre.
- Upgrade footpath surfaces, including widening along the north side of Church Street.
- Slow traffic along Thompson Avenue from Church

Street northbound to 30/40 km/h; and provide directional parking signage.

Bass Avenue (between the Esplanade and Chapel Street):

- Narrow the vehicle carriageway to 7m wide.
- Provide angled parking along east side of Bass Avenue, buffered by a vegetated nature strip with trees.

• Widen the footpath along the west side of Bass Avenue and provide wide planted nature strips with treed colonnade.

Feedback submitted online included concerns regarding one-way traffic, possibility of less parking spaces and replacing roundabouts with traffic lights.

One contributor stated, "The reduction of car spaces from 66 to 24 in a shopping and restaurant area where there is an ageing population who need ready access to facilities is flawed. Also, a speed limit of 10km per hour is impossible for a driver to achieve. There seems to be a lack of common sense in this proposal. I have no issue with this area of Thompson Avenue being closed off for events which is something that already occurs."

Early days still for charge scheme

DEVELOPMENT of concept design options for the proposed Sunderland Bay and Surf Beach special charge scheme is underway, with residents soon able to visualise what the potential road and drainage upgrades would look like.

The concept designs are an important part of the decision-making process for residents, as they will show a range of options aimed at improving the quality and safety of local roads, reducing dust and upgrading poor drainage.

The community reference group will help develop and provide feedback on the concept design options, prior to these being circulated to the property owners to indicate preferences.

As part of the planning process, Council will also undertake a series of environmental studies in the area to assess any potential impacts on plants and wildlife.

Bass Coast Shire Mayor Cr Michael Whelan said the Surf Beach and Sunderland Bay estates were identified on Council's road and drainage improvement list as a high priority, as the current infrastructure doesn't meet the needs of the growing community.

"We are still in the very early planning phase of this project, and will be in a position to provide more information about the benefits, costs and what is involved, once the concept plans are developed.

Upgrades can include sealed roads, improved drainage systems, footpaths, landscaping, lighting and safety treatments like speed bumps.

Western Port Ward Councillors, Cr Bruce Kent, Cr Rochelle Halstead and Cr Clare Le Serve, said they were available to residents to provide extra support and answer questions as the project progresses.

Cr Halstead said, "We know residents have a lot of questions about this proposed project, and we are happy to meet with people to discuss their questions, and any concerns they may have, directly."

"We are still in the very early planning phase of this project, and will be in a position to provide more information about the benefits, costs and what is involved, once the concept plans are developed.

"This road and infrastructure project will not go ahead if the majority of property owners are not in favour of it. The material we are preparing now will help residents make an informed decision about what improvements they want in their local area."

Once the current planning phase is complete, Council will be able to advise residents of the proposed costs involved if the project was to go ahead.

A decision on whether the project will proceed will not take place until around August-July next year.

Dust still not settled on charge scheme support

STRONG opposition continues to mount against a potential special charge scheme at Surf Beach and Sunderland Bay estates.

A group of concerned residents have formed in an effort to have the project completely abandoned by the shire.

The scheme allows council to pass on the cost of constructing sealed roads, kerb and channel, footpaths, underground drainage and other capital infrastructure to the owners of properties.

Council had estimated earlier this year the project could cost between \$22.8 to \$30.4m, based on previous projects.

Following the first round of feedback and a council vote to proceed with the next stage of the project, consultation for concept plans was undertaken during May and June.

The shire has been developing several options of concept plans for a preferred option to be selected.

"There is likely to be a minimal cost option, then several other options with additional features included with indicative cost ranges," the shire stated.

"The questionnaire responses will also be reviewed street by street to develop concept plan options and locate any additional features such as landscaping and traffic calming."

During October to November, the shire will present concept plans options, which will include indicative cost ranges.

It is important to note that construction is not yet approved or considered, with several more legislative processes required to be taken through before works can occur.

According to the shire, it can

take three to four years of planning, design and approvals before construction commences.

Residents' concern

The Sentinel-Times was contacted by a representative from a group of ratepayers and homeowners who are opposed to the project, called 'Say No to Sunderland Bay and Surf Beach Special Charges Scheme'.

The representative highlighted the initial surveys gave no opportunity for those involved to outright state they didn't want the scheme to be implemented.

They stated out of the 1033 homeowners across the estates, they are hoping to establish how many are in favour or against the scheme.

Some of the issues they highlighted included a range of aspects

such as personal costs and the impact on the natural environment of the area.

"The cost - we already pay thousands of dollars in rates each year, particularly since council has revalued homes in these areas and question why should we be paying a further tax when the roads are council's responsibility," the group stated.

"The reason why people have purchased in these areas is because it is virtually the last natural and untouched area on the Island - they didn't want to be in a suburban environment.

Residents don't want the area to look like a suburb e.g. Cape Woolamai - they don't want footpaths, more street lights, kerbs and more concrete.

"Many ratepayers have complained about the dust factor

- the majority have said they would be happy to contribute to the original primer sealer which most roads had for well over 10 years."

The representative further highlighted they believed the shire was not listening to their concerns and there was a lack of face-to-face opportunities.

The Sentinel-Times contacted Cr Bruce Kent, who used to live at Surf Beach, asking what feedback he had been receiving from residents.

Cr Kent said for a period of almost three years, he had received a 'significant' number of emails favourably asking when a scheme would be going ahead.

"To be fair with that, I suppose if there's no talk of the scheme, you're not going to get people objecting to something that didn't

exist at the time," he conceded.

"As soon as it has gone into motion, yes, the other side of the coin has come into play."

"Those objections range from we don't want it at all, to we only want the main roads to go in, such as The Esplanade."

Cr Kent highlighted that during his time in council, other charge schemes had also been underway such as Pioneer Bay.

"I've also witnessed the outcome for Cape Woolamai too," he said.

"I think if people spoke to residents at Cape Woolamai and Pioneer Bay, they would realise the pros and cons."

"It's a fantastic situation to get rid of the dust, we can put speed controls in and it's win-win for people."

"But the downside is nobody wants to pay for these things."

The shire has so far only provided estimated costs in comparison to the scheme recently completed at Pioneer Bay.

The total scheme cost was \$4.6m with 230 residents paying for 92 per cent of the costs, which equated to an average amount of \$18.4k per property.

Individual costs for each property are proportioned based on frontage to the road and property size.

Council has also engaged consultants to undertake feature survey, geotechnical and pavement design, flora and fauna studies, a cultural heritage due diligence assessment, street concept plan development and functional drainage designs for the Surf Beach / Sunderland Bay areas as part of concept plan development works.

Korumburra men look ahead to new shed

KORUMBURRA Men's Shed members are looking forward to their move to a new home, which while a short walk from their current premises, will provide a much-needed upgrade in facilities and space.

The organisation received Victorian government funding last month to convert the locomotive storage shed, in the Korumburra railyards, to their new home.

Currently, the group's expanding membership is crammed into the old railway goods shed.

"We've signed a lease with VicTrack," the Shed's John Davies said.

A planning permit is needed to reclassify the locomotive shed from its current transport status to community use.

The building will be

converted from its current storage guise into a user-friendly facility with the addition of windows and a door, and improved car access will be created with the installation of a new crossover.

"I can't see anything physically happening to the building until maybe early next year," John said.

He said Korumburra Men's Shed has occupied its present home for about seven years after a move from Coal Creek and has outgrown it.

"Our current building is way too small and there's not enough space to do some work," John said.

He estimates the new premises are at least six times larger, as well as being much more modern.



Streetscape works continue in Korumburra's Little Commercial Street and are expected to be completed by early next year, with the Korumburra Hub building set to be finished around the same time.

Korumburra streetscape advances

KORUMBURRA'S streetscape works continue to progress, with South Gippsland Shire Council confident those in Little Commercial Street are on track to be completed by early 2023.

That should coincide with the completion of the Korumburra Hub building in the same precinct, which will house a range of local services including the town's library and community house.

Gippsland company ACE Earthmoving is carrying out the Little Commercial Street works.

Some parts of the project are almost finished, with the lower section of the car

park and works in Boston Place open for use.

Current works are further up Little Commercial Street, behind Commercial Street buildings.

The Korumburra Streetscape Project is a multi-stage initiative that aims to revitalise the town's CBD.

In addition to redevelopment of parts of Little Commercial Street and Commercial Street, the project will also include 'Upper Commercial Street' on railway land.

The project aims to deliver on elements identified in the Korumburra Town Framework and Streetscape master-planning works

completed in 2016," council has previously stated.

Funding of \$5 million was secured through the Victorian Government's Community Infrastructure Loans Scheme for project components in the Little Commercial Street precinct and Commercial Street.

Little Commercial Street works commenced in April this year, with an overall contract value of \$1,821,025.

They are intended to complement the Korumburra Community Hub and improve the appeal and functionality of Little Commercial Street between Bridge Street and

Radovick Street.

The Upper Commercial Street works involve construction of a new carpark with at least 30 new parking spaces and associated infrastructure in the Korumburra Railway Station precinct.

The carpark will service the adjacent commercial area and users of the Great Southern Rail Trail.

Delays in obtaining Heritage Victoria consent have put the Upper Commercial Street component of the project on hold for now.

Design works for Commercial Street are underway, with council saying it continues to consult with key stakeholders.

Have you seen the purple tent?

GIPPSLAND Women's Health's Regional Roadshow has been travelling across the region since September 12, visiting many of the nooks, crannies and hidden gems.

They've helped women reconnect and answered pressing questions at a multitude of pop-ups and workshops, but their biggest challenge is yet to come.

"We're four weeks into the roadshow now, and we've got two more to go," Gippsland Women's Health's Sam Foat said.

"Even after the first day, it was really apparent to us that we had made the right decision in going out to communities.

"What we're really seeing is that they're just crying out for support, whether that be assisting someone going through violence – knowing how to help or prevent those type of instances from occurring, and education around sexual and reproductive health."

Strong attendance at the pop-ups and workshops has been a welcomed relief as stories from near and far help shed light on issues affecting women and their communities.

"What we're finding is that there are people in the community who are very well connected, and we're focusing on the ripple effect our messages are having. For instance, we're having nurses and teachers attend, and they've got a whole network of their own to share our information with.

"It's the quality of the conversations that we're having with people that is really making the difference.

"Other issues that we're really hearing is the lack of access to GPs and doctors, particularly around getting quality information and simply feeling that they're being listened to."

Earlier this year, CEOs of Victoria's 12 women's health services called for an increase in funding from \$2.05 per woman per year to \$5.75 per woman per year.

The increased funding would certainly help deliver solutions to these issues.

"Violence, in particular, has been a huge problem, which we knew already because the stats speak for themselves," Sam added.



Gippsland Women's Health are embracing the last legs of their 30 year roadshow tour of Gippsland.

"The data is there, and we know that it's a significant problem throughout Gippsland, but the openness of women coming to us and saying either they've lived with it before, and they're telling us how they got out of it or that they know someone else going through it and they need to understand how they can help them through those situations."

Gippsland Women's Health may have been around and celebrating 30 years with their roadshow, but many women do not necessarily know what they do.

"It's been really beneficial. What we wanted to do through this roadshow is re-establish connections with both community as well as other partner services and organisations; and look at ways to better collaborate and strengthen our partnerships, and also just to be recognised in the community again.

"The other thing that we're showcasing is how vast Gippsland is. It's such a huge area, and we're completely underserviced – we have some of the worst rates of violence against women, teen-

age pregnancy, alcoholism, STIs, all of those issues that you know impact women's health, and we just aren't getting the service and recognition that we need."

The Roadshow is not just about women with men also welcome to attend the pop-up and workshops.

"Even if we're helping one woman that's the impact that we want to make; we're not expecting to change the world right now and we're not going to see immediate change in mindsets and attitudes.

"We want to reconnect with women. We want to ensure that they're being heard and listened to, and we are using their stories and their experiences as a cause for change; and give them the tools and confidence to seek service and health support and keep pushing for outcomes and answers they deserve."

GWH are also finding women do not necessarily know the right questions to ask.

"Health literacy gives individuals the confidence and empowerment to get quality outcomes. For example, people we've talked to have had migraines, and the doctors

have said, 'Oh, that's just hormones or your period', meanwhile they've had brain cancer."

From here the roadshow heads to Baw Baw and Latrobe Valley and members of surrounding districts are more than welcome to travel and attend the sessions.

If you see a purple tent, pop along and say hi to the incredible women of GWH, knowledge is power with free resources and free information available.

Carinya Lodge residents conquer Everest and competitors

CONQUERING Everest has been the topic of conversation throughout Korumburra's Carinya Lodge since early September, with its aged care residents not only achieving that but seeing off a large field of competing establishments.

The champagne was flowing on Thursday morning after the Carinya Cats were declared triumphant in The Everest 2022 challenge during a Zoom ceremony.

"We won the Team Challenge and the highest team average," the lodge's executive assistant Sarah Jackson said.

Carinya was around mid-field in terms of resident numbers but outmuscled its opponents.

The lodge team numbered about 50 with its nearest rival Calwell Wanderers having 20 more representatives.

Sarah said that as well as the rivalry with 30 other aged care residences, there has been plenty of internal competition, with many Carinya residents keen to outperform each other.

Such has been the enthusiasm for the whole challenge, some residents had to be reined in to prevent them exercising excessively.

Action has taken place indoors and outdoors.

Metre signs were placed inside, with the outdoor walking group's distances calculated and everyone submitting daily totals throughout the event.

Everyone could take part, with residents in wheelchairs able to be pushed by volunteers to help clock up kilometres.

Guide Healthcare ran The Everest 2022, inviting aged care centres to participate.

Mount Everest was chosen because it is the world's highest mountain, with its peak close to 9 kilometres above sea level.

However, The Everest challenge was based on the 85km distance from Lukla in Nepal to the Mount Everest summit.

Residents of all competing homes were urged to work as teams to see how many times they could conquer Everest between September 5 and the end of the month.

"We're swapping oxygen deprivation for obstructive pulmonary disease and altitude sickness for arthritis," Guide Healthcare said, outlining the extent of the challenge.

Carinya residents raced to the summit, eventually achieving the feat 12 times by clocking up a whopping 1048km between them, with Calwell Wanderers managing a tick over 1,000 kilometres.

While Carinya residents averaged around 40km a day, they went all out on the competition's penultimate day by cranking up their exercise regime to record 91km.

There was no difficulty generating enthusiasm, with Carinya's staff just as swept

up in the competition as residents.

Staff ensured residents were aware of their progress and that of rivals.

"We gave them weekly updates and certificates for personal bests," Sarah said.

"We had a picture drawn on the wall to see how far we were going up Mount Everest and where the closest team was compared to us, and generally we've been in the top two."

The Everest has done more than promote chatter and competitiveness.

"We have noticed their mobility has improved and residents are saying they are sleeping better and want to eat more which is great," Sarah said.

She is looking forward to seeing clinical statistics to see what impact they reveal from The Everest.

Carinya resident Norm was delighted with the outcome of The Everest.

"I'm proud to live here in Carinya Lodge; they're a great bunch of people and there's nothing better, in my mind, that they have won today," he declared.

While it's not yet certain what the next challenge will be, Carinya's residents and staff are ready to take it on.

Establishing competition with other local aged care facilities, such as Leonagatha's Woorayl Lodge and Wonthaggi's Rose Lodge is likely, something that would drive rivalry and fun to greater heights.

Climate change hypocrisy exposed at Corinella

SOME people think 'action on climate change' is gluing your hands to a Picasso painting or being the first council in regional Victoria to declare a 'climate change emergency' in your shire.

Running around making noise, painting slogans and waving placards is as far as some are prepared to go.

But there's a map doing the rounds at the moment that shows the sand mines which already pockmark the Woodlands in the hinterland between Lang Lang and Glen Forbes will eventually consume almost all of those 'reserves' of trees and native bushland to the eternal detriment of Western Port.

Imagine the damage that has already been done to that waterway by draining the so-called 'Koo Wee Rup Swamp' which must have been, at one time, an incredible wetlands system to rival the Gordon in Tasmania.

We've lost that now and no doubt the biodiversity and water quality in the bay has suffered, impacting bird and fish life, which is all-the-more reason why the mangroves and coastal bush that remain must be protected.

However, if that was important to climate change activists, there would have been 2000 people at a political candidates' meeting in Corinella last Saturday afternoon, not 150 or 200.

But 200 was good and it helped to shed more light on the hypocrisy and deceit of government when it comes to climate change.

While the state and federal government are out applying all the window dressing to the climate change debate, by pressuring AGL to close Loy Yang A and erecting hundreds of giant wind turbines around our coastline, in the absence of an overall energy plan, they can't see the wood for the trees.

Here they have an opportunity to stop the drawdown on carbon, and save Western Port, not to mention the impact of allegedly 5000 sand trucks-a-day on the Bass Highway and the area's vital tourism sector, by at least stopping and studying the effect of massive sand mine expansion in, not only Bass Coast, but South Gippsland Shire as well.

Perhaps then, they might place limits on expansion here and look elsewhere for construction and concrete sand to feed Melbourne's insatiable appetite for urban sprawl.

And publishing the final Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) Plan for Bass Coast, to expose the government's intentions where sand extraction is concerned, before the election, so the voters can decide, would be a start.



Emissions targets just magic pudding

Reported, The South East Councils Climate Change Alliance, has set a 67% emissions reduction target to contain global warming within 1.5 degrees C.

No mention of net zero emissions by 2030.

But no target from the Bass Coast Shire.

Such targets sound grand but are not achievable in any practical sense by local government who have no control over 90% emissions reduction strategies, e.g. electrical generation. So, such statements are just noise.

But I would suggest this group catch up with their climate change reading.

The world has unfortunately already missed that target as suggested by the new book, "HotHouse Earth, an inhabitants guide" by Bill McGuire.

This book is an excellent starting point if you want a current real status report on Global climate change.

A concerning read but not the "scare the horses stuff that we are going to a climate hell", as promoted by many climate activists.

Its main premise is that we now need to learn to live the effects of climate since the evidence is very strong that the 1.5 rise window is now closed.

Even if all countries stand by their pledges to reduce carbon emissions COP26 meeting in Glasgow it will still be difficult to achieve the 45% reduction target by 2030 with temperature rises expected to range between 1.8 and 2.0 degrees C. Still a liveable increase.

The Federal government has set 43% reduction target in GHG emissions.

So why engage in grand standing when your organisation has no control over the process.

The Chair of SECCA is also the Bass Coast Shire Mayor, who reportedly said that Shire is not wedded to the 67% recommendation.

So it is reasonable to ask just what is the BCSC signalling.

My reading of their Climate Action Plan, "The Plan" is a 100% reduction in GHG emissions by 2030. See the Executive Summary trajectory graph.

Yet later the "Plan" admits that the Shire has no control over, or the ability to reduce the estimated 600,000 tonnes of carbon emissions per annum generated in the Shire.

The Federal reduction target yields 342,000 tonnes (ce) and the SECCA target yields 162,000 tonnes (ce) by 2030 for Bass Coast.

Based on these figures BCSC Plan is an emissions magic pudding.

In my view its action plan is not achievable, and is no more than an aspirational public relations exercise.

Please at least come up with an achievable and sensible plan for those emissions

you can measure and control, and not rely on declaring climate emergencies, and leave the big reductions to the other governments who have the necessary power.

One area of emissions reduction that can be influenced directly by the BCSC is through planning for the construction of the built environment, in other words real estate development.

Yet this area, which can contribute up to 35% in total GHG emissions and is expected to grow by 50% by 2050 is not included in the "Plan".

Why? New suburb construction can immediately contribute 27% to increasing greenhouse gases. But emissions control in the construction industries means both reductions in developer return on investment and tax farming via new rates from new houses.

Not attractive to a local government.

In this area, if the BCSC allows in the future another North Wonthaggi style development, then it has failed its climate emergency declaration and shows that it is not serious about climate change.

Yes, it is imperative that housing needs to be provided, but let us give people a better choice for their future.

Environment a major factor

It has many years since there was such a clear challenge to election candidates in Bass with a local environment focus.

We must improve mental health support

Victoria's mental health workforce is overworked, fatigued and being forced to close waiting lists as demand continues to increase, with many would-be patients waiting over a year for appointments.

The Nationals understand that people need mental health support when they need it, not a year from now.

That's why The Nationals and Liberals have a plan to slash wait times for mental health support for Victorians and provide two million additional mental health appointments.

The Nationals and Liberals in government will fund an additional 750 psychology supervisors in Victoria and launch a new matching service to help psychology graduates find the right supervisor for them, across all parts of Victoria.

Those additional supervisor positions will increase Victoria's capacity by adding up to 1,300 new psychologists over the next two years.

Under Labor, which was warned three years ago in the Royal Commission into Mental Health's interim report that it must prioritise building Victoria's mental health workforce, there are currently more than 6,000 mental health job listings online.

We need innovative solutions to fix the mental health crisis, and only The Nationals and Liberals have real solutions that will rapidly build Victoria's mental health workforce.

The workforce strategy also includes recognising counsellors as mental health practitioners, which would unlock an additional 2,000 practitioners to deliver mental health support in our schools.

Korumburra Cenotaph is turning 100 years old

DID you know that the Korumburra cenotaph is 100 years old in October 2022.

According to the late Ray Walls, our Cenotaph, was very nearly not built.

Like all districts, ours was desperate to remember and commemorate the loss, pain, and suffering that the recent war brought to us.

Indeed, there was a move as far back as 1915 to acknowledge the losses from the war in a formal way.

Early History

Initially, there was great debate over how our fallen soldiers should be remembered, and this went on for months. Discussions centred on whether to build a Memorial Hospital or Memorial Hall, an Avenue of Honour was also suggested. Our district was divided about an appropriate way to commemorate its losses. In the interim smaller groups of people started to organise their own honour rolls and remembrance boards. Throughout the district, various communities, halls, schools and even employers commemorated their losses by organising Honour Boards. Many of these still take pride of place within our communities. It was Poowong that led the initiative. The Poowong cenotaph was dedicated nearly six months before Korumburra's.

However, this was not enough. The district wished to have a central location where they could focus their attention and mourn their losses, and the debate continued. Eventually a stone monument was settled upon. The original site was suggested to be the intersection of Radovick and Commercial Streets in Korumburra. However, this was decided to be too much of an obstacle to traffic. Eventually a site was chosen at the top end of Commercial Street where it meets with Bridge Street. Here our cenotaph remained until early 1970, when State Government guidelines required that it be shifted, and another site chosen. This time it was relocated to a pleasant public park in Queen Street, where it remains to this day.

What is a Cenotaph

Most war related memorials or monuments recognise those who served or some historic battles. Some monuments are dedicated to famous individuals who were champions to a just cause. Some are dedicated to political leaders or generals that lead armies or even nations, throughout history. A cenotaph is a very special type of memorial. The definition of cenotaph is quiet simply a '... monument to a person whose body is elsewhere'. In our context, our cenotaph is dedicated to those local service men and women who lost their lives whilst on active service. For these men or women and their families, our cenotaphs have a particular meaning. Because, often, they were, and are, the only public recognition of their loss. They remain the one place where their families and their friends could try and come to terms with the reality of their loss.

Design and Build

The Korumburra Cenotaph was designed by R V Courtney and originally constructed by G B Edwards of Armadale. Our cenotaph is unique by design and function. Within the former Shire of Korumburra there are only two such Cenotaphs (the other is in Poowong). Our Cenotaph was dedicated by Brig Gen Harold "Pompey" Elliott on October 14, 1922.

Aside from the relocation to Coleman Park, our cenotaph has since remained largely untouched. More recently we have updated by installing an additional monument in proximity to the cenotaph. This includes additional names, not listed previously, however as a community we have resisted the temptation to try and fix additional plaques etc to the original structure. Here it has remained and continues to fulfill its function. This is as a reminder of past generations of our community, who at a time of crises gave their lives in the service of our country.

Names Listed

The key thing displayed on any cenotaph is the names. On the Korumburra Cenotaph you will find 232 local names. The time span covered by our Cenotaph covers the period from March 1915 and concludes in February 1949. Each name lists a local member of our community who lost their life in the service of our country. But it is so much more than that. Each name is linked to a local family and each name is a son, husband, father, or brother who left our district and never returned. Sadly most of the details of their stories have been lost through time. However, we do know their full names and the circumstances of their loss.

RSL Role

Your local RSL has some very clear and important roles to play within the community. It works with its members and cares for the welfare needs of veterans, their families, and widows. They take the lead in community remembrance services. One of the lesser-known roles is also part of its charter. This is to perpetuate the memory of our fallen.

Rededication Service

With that role in mind, the centenary of our cenotaph has provided us with the opportunity to rededicate ourselves to the tasks of remembrance and to, again, give thanks to those early members who gave so much in the pursuit of freedom.

So, in the run up to November 11, the Korumburra RSL will be conducting a rededication service for our Cenotaph. Our service will be conducted on Saturday, October 22, 2022, at Coleman Park, commencing at 10:30 am. This service will be supported by members of the RSL and the Australian Defence Force. We invite you all to share with us this important occasion.

Spring bursts into life at Loch Village

ENTHUSIASTIC gardeners and those keen to enjoy a relaxing spring event will mix at the Loch Village Garden Festival, which features open gardens, artworks and garden photography on the weekend of October 29 and 30.

The festival was first held around 16 years ago, and the Loch Village Garden Club is delighted to return it to the calendar after being unable to hold the event the last couple of years.

The garden club's Howard Booth's Lochchester garden is one of those featured.

It is a woodland garden full of interesting plants, with a range of trees including hazel, Manchurian pear, viburnum, crazy filbert, mulberry and silver birch.

It also features many climbers and a kitchen garden.

Howard explained his passion for gardening.

"It's relaxing and rewarding and it's lovely to be able to look out on the garden and share it," he said.

Witsend is an attractive cottage garden attached to an 1890s cottage, being another of the delight's attendees will enjoy.

"The owners have added an additional block to the original garden and created a pear walk, rose garden and mixed shrubbery, and there's a magnificent 100-year-old eucalyptus

Strzelecki," Howard said.

A more recently planted section of trees includes white cedar, Chinese elm, Japanese maples, silver vein maple and golden ash.

The works of seven artists will be displayed in the Public Hall, with Poowong Garden Club's garden-themed photographic exhibition also on show.

While more a community event than a fundraiser, a raffle will be held to raise money for the village.

"We buy trees and council plants them for us," Howard said.

He outlined why the Loch Village Garden Festival appeals to people.

"It's a relaxing, low-key event," Howard said.

Pineapple perfect in Colin's backyard garden

AFTER a lifetime of dairy farming and community service, Colin Willmott, is entitled to please himself what he does with his time after downsizing to a smaller house and smaller garden in a new part of Wonthaggi.

An avid orchid grower and natural green thumb, Colin decided to raise the degree of difficulty last year and take up the challenge of growing pineapples.

In Wonthaggi? He what, decided to grow pineapples? Come on!

And he didn't just try, he succeeded in growing up two sweet-tasting, beautiful, big pineapples, so much so that he's going again this year.

"Pineapples are from the Bromeliad family, so I thought, with the right encouragement, I should be able to grow them here," said Colin this week.

"We got two last year and they were very nice, but I think I can do better this year.

"They grow from the tops of the pineapple but that takes a couple of years before you get a flower and fruit. It's quicker if you grow from the suckers or pups that come out from a mature plant.

"And they're a lot better, much sweeter, the ones you grow yourself, than the ones you get in the supermarket that have been cut when they're still very green. The best way to know if a pineapple is ripe is to smell it. You can smell that sweet aroma when they're best for eating."

Despite downsizing from the garden in Delmarni Court, where they hosted three big open garden days for the Wonthaggi Lions Club, generating upwards of \$12,000 for charity, it's surprising what Colin and Pam have been able to pack into their suburban garden.

Along the side of the house, north and west facing, they've got tomatoes, just planted a few weeks ago, a delightful greenery with all manner of plants including bromeliads, stag-horn ferns and more, plus a raised veggie patch with strawberries, lettuce, spinach, and silver beet.

There's an ornamental

pond with fish, along the back fence a number of hydroponic projects, plus the makings of a petunia feature, orchids and other plants sprinkled around, and a big polypropylene hot house where the real work gets done on Colin's award-winning orchids.

And inside, this year's pineapples are already flourishing.

"I've really only been growing orchids for six years but this year (at 32nd Annual Orchid Show in the Wonthaggi Workmen's Club last month), they put me up into the advanced section where I got three firsts and a third," he said.

Colin is a member of the South Gippsland Orchid Society, which meets in the Angling Club at the Wonthaggi Recreation Reserve, on the second Wednesday of the month.

"It's terrific being in a gar-

den or flower club, it helps a lot. People do things in different ways and get great results. You can share what you do, get plenty of encouragement, there's guest speakers, trips to other gardens and flower shows. It's good."

The Willmotts lived most of their lives out at Glen Alvie, a community they loved being a part of, with Colin's parents Alf and Lilly coming to the area in 1921.

The fire brigade, helping build the recreation reserve and hall, the friends... but they moved into town in 2011, set up a big, beautiful garden in Delmarni Court but now downsizing at their new house.

And it's amazing what they've been able to do with a smaller backyard with dozens, maybe hundreds of orchids as a feature, all the veggies you need, hydroponics and more, oh yes, and pineapples!

All your spring growing tips

SPRING is a busy time of year and even busier this year as all this rain has caused the weeds to grow like they are on steroids.

It is a great time of year with so much colour appearing in the garden. Looking good at this time of year are the crab apples.

Crab apples are tough and put on a spectacular display of flowers many after the leaves have appeared and some are great to use for crab apple jelly.

Another advantage is that many crab apples are small trees some only growing to around 3 metres so are great for small gardens.

Mirboo North is famous for its spring display of crab apples planted in the street and these are ionese pleana (bechtels crab apple) which are available as a tree or grafted standard.

Ionesis pleana have masses of large pink buds that open to white flowers, but the fruit is not very useful. If you want a good crab apple for fruit look at pioneer rose with bright pink/red flowers and large fruit. Flowers and fruit are not the only talents of crab apples many of them are gloriously fragrant when in flower and others also put on a splendid display of autumn colour.

Another spectacular plant coming into flower now are the peonies.

The genus name Paeonia is derived from Paion, the physician to the gods in Greek mythology, implying praise for something of exceptional quality and the huge decorative flowers certainly make them desirable.

They are among the largest garden flowers with a range of colours from lemon yellow to shades of red and pink to almost black almost every colour represented except for blue.

Also many blended-suffused from single to semi doubles and full double flower form... When people talk about peonies, they usually

relate to the herbaceous type which grows, flowers and then dies down to ground level in winter every year.

These can be divided every 3-4 years and therefore be grown cheaply (unless a new variety). Tree peonies are slower growing and harder for the grower to build up plants rapidly.

Young divisions are not hardy and must be grown in containers for at least two years before they are saleable.

The average tree peony in a 10-inch pot is a 5-year-old plant.

This explains why they are so expensive.

The Japanese varieties are grafted as most do not grow well on their own roots, but their flowers are sensational.

Even though this is the best time to buy peonies (when you can see them flowering), they are better planted in the autumn.

Select a well drained place with at least half a day of sunlight.

The bloom will last longer if sunlight is filtered during the heat of day. When planting add dolomite lime as tree peonies must have a high calcium magnesium content to grow successfully.

Tree peonies unlike all other plants, do all their root feeding and storage in the coldest months of the year from mid autumn to the end of winter.

Once established tree peonies are drought hardy and they also grow well in large pots. Another type of peony (which is a relatively new introduction) is the ITOH.

They are a cross between tree peonies and herbaceous and are getting very popular due to their disease resistance and are good performers and flower well in pots and in the ground.

Most people are in a hurry to plant the summer vegetables like cucumbers, tomatoes etc but it is important to

remember it has been a long cold winter and the ground has not warmed yet so it is better to wait a bit as the nights are still cold.

These plants still be raised by seed, and it is better to wait until late October/November to plant seedlings of tomatoes and especially basil. This also goes for passionfruit.

Many of the old fashioned plants are making a comeback and for good reason as they are tough and long lived. One of these favourite old-fashioned plants are lilacs.

Lilacs or Syringa are a genus of popular, hardy deciduous shrubs with colourful fragrant flowers.

They are one of the most deliciously fragrant of the woody plants that flower late spring and early summer. There are many varieties available the most common is the grafted syringa vulgaris (if not grafted it becomes a suckering shrub that is difficult to control).

Flower colours range from white and creamy yellow to red, blue, purple and may be single or double. Lilacs make a great display in a vase but for flowers to last the stems must be crushed. Lilacs are happy in most well drained soils; they need full sun and benefit from pruning especially after flowering.

The shire has been doing a lot to promote shop local and it is important to support small business as often they can do things that big businesses cannot.

Alec Campbell had a farm and one of his favourite trees there was his macadamia which produced lots of nuts that Alec would dip in chocolate.

Unfortunately, due to ill health Alec had to go into care and wanted his family to each have a macadamia tree.

The nursery at Mirboo North got some cuttings from his tree and Faceys nursery grew Alec some macadamia trees from his original tree which he then passed on to his family.



Townsend Nursery's gardening tips

TO ensure the garden flourishes this spring the team at Townsend Nursery have provided several essential suggestions to help home growers tend to their gardens after the blistering cold winter.

Vicki Edwards of Townsend Nursery said now is the time to start thinking about where you would like to plant your tomatoes, remember they like full sun and should always be planted with marigolds - these act as a companion plant to help with pests and disease.

"The first step is to prepare your ground by adding compost, manure or blood and bone - this will prepare the soil, then plant the marigolds and you'll be ready to plant the tomatoes over cup weekend," said Vicki.

"Remember that tomatoes can be planted anywhere from a pot to a large garden bed."

Vicki also recommends companion planting for peaches if there is any sight of leaf curl, planting marigold, French lavender, rosemary or parsley can help fight pests and disease without the need to spray any harsh chemicals.

Spring is known as the best time to prune the garden, so Vicki encourages home gardeners to give their patio a clean-up and start pruning all the daisies, this way the garden will be ready to bloom in time for Christmas.

"A light prune throughout the garden will encourage new growth - including all stone fruits - apricots, nectarines and peaches, they can be cut back to a third now," said Vicki.

"Spring is also a good time to feed your citrus trees with blood and bone or anything on hand."

This season is also good time to plant strawberries and blueberries, remembering that spreading pine needles around the base of the blueberry bush will aid as feed by providing an acid soil.

Then when deciding to plant cucumber, corn, peas and zucchini, Vicki said it is best to plant with a straight seed, they will grow much better than a punnet."

"And when planting I always recommend layering the soil with damp cardboard or newspaper as a base, followed by mulch over the top; this will prevent the weeds and is a natural alternative to spraying."



From Koonwarra to Art Conservator Mel Carlisle can be found behind the machines at Wonthaggi Garden Supplies.

FROM Koonwarra to Te Papa Tongarewa, Mel Carlisle is best known in Bass Coast as the feminine side to Wonthaggi Garden Supplies.

However, Mel has not always hauled around concrete pavers and been seated in a loader, instead she once followed artwork to Japan, worked in national galleries and even spent time living in New Zealand as an art conservator.

"It started for me in high school," Mel said.

"I loved art, and I can remember there was a class for careers, and you had to say what you were going to do when you left school and what that meant for your subjects in VCE."

"In the Jobs Guide there was a bit where you could say what you liked, and it would tell you the career options. I didn't mind science and chemistry and I loved art."

"I put those in, and I remember conservator came up and I didn't even know what a conservator was. I read about it, and it just sounded amazing, and that was the beginning of discovery..."

Growing up in Koonwarra and attending Leongatha Secondary, Mel recalls the school shuffling around classes – most students didn't mix art and science.

"I chose my VCE subjects of art and chemistry, much to the confusion of teachers trying to coordinate classes, not many people did chemistry, maths and art, so a lot of the maths and science classes were on at the same time as art classes."

"I remember going in and saying no, this is why I want to do it."

It wasn't until after finishing

school that Mel got a taste in the real world.

"You do work experience in year 10, and none of the galleries would take a 15-year-old kid into the Conservation Departments. I had to wait until I'd finished year 12 and I volunteered at the NGV."

"I loved it so much and I got into the course in Canberra."

A Bachelor of Applied Science at the University of Canberra, Mel was one of four school leavers, everyone else was postgraduate, in the limited class of 30.

"It was the only course in the southern hemisphere."

"It was a big learning curve moving from Koonwarra to Canberra – I was 17 years old and studying this very challenging degree."

Moving back to Melbourne, Mel started volunteering at the NGV and then secured a job with the relocation team, moving the collection back to the St Kilda Road building after the renovations.

After six months at the War Memorial in Canberra, Mel headed back to NGV to the Painting's Conservation Department.

"I worked at the NGV on all sorts of contracts in the paintings and the exhibition departments for five years – it was such an exciting place to work. The NGV has such an incredible collection and so much of their collection is behind the scenes in storage; it's an old painting collection too."

The sheer volume of the collection (over 75,000 works) means there is not enough wall space to display the whole collection with the largest donation established in 1904 from the Felton Bequest.

"A lot of the collection was built on (the Felton Bequest) so they have a lot of incredible paintings and because they have such an amazing collection, there's a lot of loans that go out all over the world."

"You work to prepare paintings for travel and sometimes you get to go with the paintings."

"I got to go to Tokyo with a few colleagues from the Conservation Department for the big exhibition on Emily Kame Kngwarreye in 2008."

Accompanying Anwerlarr anganenty (Big yam dreaming) a 2.91 metre by 8.01 metre artwork, and stretched in situ. The exhibition attracted record crowds and signified one of Emily's dreams: that her work, her stories, be seen by people around the world.

"It was such an exciting trip to go on. My colleague Carl from the NGV and I went, and we stretched the painting in the exhibition space."

"It's so big, it doesn't fit in lifts or through doors and exhibition spaces. It gets rolled up every time it moves."

"It's incredible all the people at the NGV, there's mount makers and frame makers that help build systems to transport these paintings along with the conservators. There's a lot that goes on that you wouldn't think about, and that's the whole idea."

"I worked on a little project investigating the types of pigments that were used by the Australian Impressionists, and we were able to track the travel that those artists did to Europe. Bringing back these new modern pigments to work within paintings and

identifying when they first painted colours like cerulean blue."

Meeting her husband, Chris through mutual friends at a New Year's Eve party in Venus Bay, the pair have been pretty inseparable since.

"We had to do a bit of long distance. But then Chris (a landscaper) has always said he can dig holes anywhere, that's when I applied for the job in New Zealand."

"I worked in New Zealand for five years at Te Papa Tongarewa on some really beautiful artworks there."

"My colleague Katherine and I worked on a painting by Colin McCahon 'Northland Panels'. It couldn't be displayed for a long time because there was a lot of cracking and loose paint. It was a type of paint that is really matte and almost chalky, and a lot of the traditional materials couldn't be used."

"We had to find a consolidant to stick the paint down to allow it to be displayed because it hangs on loose canvases."

Studying conservation, individuals can specialise in a particular area: for Mel this was paintings.

"You can specialise in paper, objects, textiles and go even further."

"In the southern hemisphere we really only do easel paintings. In the Northern Hemisphere, a lot of people specialise in frescoes."

Moving back to Australia heavily pregnant with their second daughter, Mel and Chris decided Melbourne was not for them and they brought a little farm in Outtrim.

"We moved initially back to Melbourne and felt a bit

overwhelmed by the city.

"Chris has been a landscaper for over 20 years and this business came up for sale. He thought, he could do this, and I might work here one day a week. We now spend a lot of time here!"

"It was 100 per cent new for me. I've haven't done customer service since I was a high school girl working in a supermarket. I had a lot to learn about materials and what everything is used for."

"But I get to help people and I still get to be creative. I help people work out what works in their gardens, what colour stones, pebbles and mulches, and I really do like working with customers. It's really satisfying."

"Meeting people and getting to know our regulars and talking to people about what they're working on and helping them work out a plan. It's really nice."

A far cry from multi-million-dollar artworks, Mel now proudly has her truck licence, drives a loader and gets her hands dirty on a daily basis, but she wouldn't say no if NGV opened a mini gallery in Wonthaggi.

"I do miss the collections that I was working with, but I really love the life that we have here in the country, owning our own business and what that means for bringing up our family."

"It's such an amazing place to live down here – the beautiful coast and we are so close to the city. If we want to go to the NGV for the day you can drive up in the morning, see an exhibition, have a great lunch and drive home again."

"My youngest daughter, Coco, likes coming to the gallery with me..."

The need for God

DO WE need God in our rapidly changing technological world?

It is worth reflecting on Queen Elizabeth II's 1957 Christmas message in which she brought up the topic of technological advancement by stating that people all over the world could see her on TV.

In that speech she said: I am not surprised that many people feel lost and unable to decide what to hold onto and what to discard, how to take advantage of the new life but without losing the best of the old, but it is not the new inventions which are the difficulty.

The trouble is caused by unthinking people who carelessly throw away ageless ideals as if they were old and outworn machinery.

They would have religion thrown aside, morality and personal and public life made meaningless, honesty counted as foolishness and self-interest set up in place of self-restraint.

At this critical moment

in our history, we will certainly lose the trust and respect of the world if we just abandon those fundamental principles which guided the men and women who built the greatness of this country and commonwealth.

Today we need a special kind of courage, not the kind needed in battle but a kind which makes us stand up for everything we know that is right, everything that is true and honest, we need the kind of courage that can withstand the subtle corruption of the cynics.

Queen Elizabeth had a German background. The house of Windsor came into being in 1917 when it replaced the historic name of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha.

She must have been genuinely shocked to learn about the atrocities committed in Germany just prior to and during the Second World War by otherwise highly educated and cultured men.

This may help us to understand her Christmas

speech.

It is worth reflecting especially on her words, 'it is not the new inventions which are the difficulty, the trouble is caused by unthinking people who carelessly throw away ageless ideals as is they were old and outworn machinery.'

Queen Elizabeth believed that we are a spiritual and material being.

If we are merely a material being without an eternal soul, then how do you argue against the Nazi's policies of eliminating the weak and the deformed?

She believed that we are all children of God. Given her incredible life of service it would be fair to conclude that she was motivated by spiritual values such as love, honesty and goodness, to name a few. Spiritual values are most important!

The timeless values Queen Elizabeth held onto and expressed through her service helped bring hope, love and meaning to countless lives.



Free psychology sessions available to Rural Victorians

RURAL Victorians are now able to access free sessions with a provisional psychologist through an innovative new program by telehealth platform Rural Health Connect, Federation University and the Victorian Government.

With psychologist waiting lists stretching months in many rural areas and cost also pushing sessions out of reach for many, this new solution aims to make psychology sessions more accessible.

Provisional psychologists are psychology students in their final years of study who complete regular sessions with a board approved supervisor.

Through this project provisional psychologists will be available on the Rural Health Connect platform for regular therapy sessions at no cost, as a means of early intervention and to help reduce the pressure on registered psychologists.

Users can access up to 20 sessions via telehealth with the same psychologist to help in the following areas: anxiety, low level depression, sleep issues, grief and loss, anger and stress. It is available to children and adults.

There is no need for a GP referral or mental health treatment plan. This means that users can book directly via the website or referrals can be made via schools and other support organisations.

This pilot is initially open primarily to residents of bushfire affected areas and will likely be expanded across all of rural Victoria.

"We are really excited to launch this project as we think it provides a really innovative solution to long term issues around accessing mental health services in the bush," Rural Health Connect Director Megan Gomez said.

"This project removes a lot of barriers that can prevent people getting help - long waiting lists, cost, lack of access to a GP for a referral, to name a few.

"Provisional psychologists are a bit of an untapped workforce and it makes sense for them to form part of the solution."

Federation University Head of Clinical Services and Programs Associate Professor Megan Jenkins said provisional psychologists are in their final years of study and are skilled workers with the capacity to provide a high level of psychological care to individuals who would otherwise struggle to access a psychologist.

"This program will help us to train a generation of psychologists with important insight into the unique challenges faced by rural and regional Australians."

Federation University has a strong commitment to improving access to psychologists for rural and regional Victorians, this partnership with Rural Health Connect will help us to deliver more services to under-resourced communities as they recover from natural disasters and the impact of the pandemic."

Sessions are done over video call, via an easy-to-use a link set via email and phone.

Two in five young people experiencing mental ill-health

AFTER more than two years of unprecedented pressure on young people two in five are now reporting a mental health condition.

Following headspace Day recently, the National Youth Mental Health Foundation is imploring Australians to stop and think about the significant challenges confronting young people.

headspace Day offered Australians an opportunity to raise awareness about youth mental health so young people, their families and friends know where to go for support in tough times.

"The demand for headspace services has never been greater than it is today," headspace CEO Jason Trethowan said.

"We've known from before the pandemic the period of adolescence and early adulthood is a critical time in a young person's life, and 75 per cent of mental illnesses emerge before the age of 25.

"After the tumultuous events of the past two years, including COVID-19, enforced lockdowns and natural disasters, the proportion



of young Australians experiencing mental ill-health has increased to two in every five.

Mr Trethowan says this year's headspace Day theme was, 'Pause. Reflect. Reconnect', and offered a pathway for young people to prioritise their mental health in the wake of the most severe COVID-19 measures.

"Many young people coming to headspace say they are experiencing anxiety and depression, and report feeling busy, stressed or upset in their everyday lives.

"It's also important that all of us – families and friends, teachers and colleagues, mental health professionals and governments – take stock of how we can best support the young people in our lives to get back on track and reach their potential.

"That includes making sure we too take daily steps for a healthy headspace, and model self-care for the young people around us.

"Bouncing back from the past two years is a challenge that is going to require all hands on deck."

We encourage any young person, family, or friends in need of support to visit their local headspace centre.

Support is also available via phone and online counselling service eheadspace seven days a week between 9am-1am (AEST). The number is 1800 650 890.

Data reveals insights to alcohol harm

ALCOHOL is the first drug most are introduced to – whether a sip as a child or at underage parties on the farm; it's also one of the most addictive.

A Central Nervous System (CNS) depressant, psychologically the learned behaviours that affects an individual and its use as a coping mechanism against stress, anxiety and other uncomfortable emotions is what makes it addictive.

The latest statistics by the ABS (published in March for 2020-21) show that one in four Australians aged 18 years and over exceeded the Australian Adult Alcohol

Guideline, with men more likely than women.

The guideline recommends that 'to reduce the risk of harm from alcohol-related disease or injury, healthy men and women should drink no more than 10 standard drinks a week and no more than four standard drinks on any one day.'

This data was collected during the pandemic with those living inner regional (29.2 per cent) and outer regional and remote (30.3 per cent) more likely to exceed the guideline than those living in major cities.

As per the recent Australia's attitudes and perceptions towards drugs report for Latrobe-Gippsland, given \$100 to reduce alcohol misuse, most would spend it on education (\$37) followed closely by law enforcement (\$33) and treatment (\$30).

The report also highlighted that the support for reducing the trading hours for pubs and clubs has dropped by 19 per cent.

The Index of Relative Socio-economic Disadvantage (IRSD) also showcases how Bass Coast and South Gippsland are made up of all levels, from those most to least disadvantaged across the postcodes.

The biggest stressors of

individuals aged 18 years and over is mental ill health and death of a family member or close friend – unsurprisingly serious illness falls closely behind and is the leading factor in those 65 years and over.



Library staff are already helping many people, including seniors, with a wide range of technological issues but enjoy having more time to work through complicated issues during Get Online Week.

Learn to tell stories digitally at Myli

WHILE books are still a vital part of libraries, the once staid institutions have embraced modern technology, with Myli Libraries set to offer patrons training in digital story telling.

The course will run in Mirboo North, Foster, Leongatha and Korumburra.

Get ready to Skiffle

SKIFFLE is a high energy upbeat American roots music in the style of UK proto-rockers Lonnie Donegan, Chris Barber, and the Vipers Skiffle Group.

They will be playing on Sunday, October 16, 2.00pm - 4.30pm Phillip Island Bowling Club.

It was the birth of British Rock.

Donegan's blistering 1954 hot recording of Leadbelly's Rock Island Line started the UK skiffle craze that inspired countless musicians to pick up the guitar, an instrument that was hitherto largely ignored by British popular music.

The Beatles, Van Morrison, Mick Jagger, Jimmy Page and the Bee Gees all started their musical career as skiffle players, exploring the rich tradition of American hillbilly and blues from Leadbelly to Woody Guthrie.

Classic skiffle tunes include upbeat sing-along versions of many well-known traditional folk songs such as John Henry, Stewball, Cumberland Gap, Lost John, Midnight Special and Maggie May.

About the band members: Floyd Thursby, lead vocals and rhythm guitar, is a songwriter, composer and experienced performer in the popular music of many cultures.

Upon discovering skiffle

he was electrified by the sheer energy of Lonnie Donegan's performances. He also performs with the acclaimed French gypsy jazz ensemble La Mauvaise Reputation (under the name Paul Gillet), and solo as a singer-songwriter.

His 2019 album "To Those In Flames" was The Age's Album of the Week and his 2020 album "The South Lands" featuring duets with Vietnamese singer-songwriter Mademoiselle, was shortlisted for the 2021 Music Victoria Awards (Best Intercultural Act)

Tom Flenady, double bass and vocalist, has been performing music that is rooted in skiffle for as long as he can remember.

When reading the work of one of his favourite folk figures, Billy Bragg, Tom discovered the story of the style that inspired so many of his heroes, and has been enamoured ever since.

When not playing skiffle, Tom can be found on the bandstand performing jazz from the early days of New Orleans, to the modern, original compositions of contemporary Melbourne musicians.

Adam Russo, leader guitar and vocals, has been quietly carving a niche for himself amongst Melbourne's bustling jazz scene for more than 10 years, specialising in the swinging guitar style of the

1920s to 1950s. He can be found most nights gigging around town, alternately channeling

Farmers declare country roads maintenance crisis

THE Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) is calling on both sides of politics to commit funding certainty for regional road maintenance declaring the terrible condition of country roads has reached crisis levels.

VFF President Emma Germano said years of neglect and underfunding has left Victoria's regional road network in a ruinous state and in desperate need of investment.

"Speak to anyone living in regional Victoria and they'll likely have one thing in common – their local roads are dodgy and dangerous."

"More than 50 per cent of all road fatalities occur in regional Victoria, despite it being home to 24 per cent of the State's population. We won't accept that," Ms Germano said.

As part of its 'Fair Go for Regional Victoria' campaign, the VFF has called for a minimum of \$2 billion over the next four years for targeted arterial road maintenance.

The plan has been supported by the State Opposition, but with less than two months until the Victorian State Election, regional communities are waiting to hear the Labor Government's plan.

In addition to funding for arterial roads, Ms Germano called on both sides of politics to reintroduce the Fixing Country Roads Program to provide funding grants to rural and regional councils to undertake local road projects beyond regular road maintenance.

"Council roads make up 87 per cent of the State's road network and represent 10 per cent of local government expenditure. This is putting a disproportionate strain on rural councils that have large road networks, but a small rate base to help fund their upkeep."

Ms Germano concluded saying road maintenance is an important issue for regional communities and expects to see a plan from both sides of politics.

"It's time for our leaders to stand-up and put an end to the country road maintenance crisis. Driving on safe roads is a top priority for regional communities at this election and we need both sides of politics to deliver certainty," Ms Germano said.

Dairy Farm Monitor reports another positive year

RESULTS from the 2021-22 Victorian Dairy Farm Monitor Project (DFMP) report show Victorian participants on average experienced the fourth highest financial returns recorded in the 16 years of the project.

Dairy Farm Monitor is a joint initiative of Agriculture Victoria and Dairy Australia, with financial and physical data gathered from participant farms in Gippsland, South-West and Northern Victoria.

Agriculture Victoria Farm Business Economist, Natalie Nelson said the average profit in 2021-22 from the 80 participant farm businesses was approximately \$384,000 per farm (\$1.72 per kilogram of milk solids), which was 45 per cent above the long-term average.

"This strong performance was influenced by a nine per cent increase in average milk price to \$7.37 per kilogram of milk solids.



"However, the increased milk price coincided with higher input costs and supply constraints, including labour, feed and fertiliser, which impacted on the overall 2021-22 farm business margins."

"For dairy farms in the irrigation areas of the Goulburn Murray and Macalister Irrigation District, favourable seasonal

conditions and lower irrigation costs assisted in strong performances," Ms Nelson said.

Dairy Australia Lead Farm Business Data, Helen Quinn, said the results were particularly encouraging with farmers indicating an optimism for farm business returns in the coming 12 months.

"The Dairy Farm Monitor

Project is a valuable source of information to the industry, with the annual reports providing comprehensive physical and financial analysis for government and industry decision-makers on the farm-level factors that contribute to profit.

"Australia-wide there are 250 participating farms, with Victoria representing the biggest cohort in the project," said Ms Quinn.

Ms Nelson said the financial and production information collected in the report enables businesses to effectively track and compare their business performance over time.

Briefings on the 2021-22 Dairy Farm Monitor Report will be hosted by Dairy Australia in each of the regions in early November.

Candidates to face off at local farmer forums

RURAL communities will have the opportunity to test the candidates standing in a number of electorates ahead of next month's Victorian election at upcoming forums to be hosted by the Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF).

VFF President Emma Germano will host the forums and said it will be a great opportunity for the candidates to share their vision for the local community.

"Candidates will be asked how they will address these key issues if elected, as well as

there being the opportunity for community members to ask their own questions.

"We want to ensure the voice of our farming community is respected by those standing for office. The forums are an opportunity to focus on the issues that matter to our regional communities."

Ms Germano said the forums are part of the VFF's 'Fair Go for Regional Vic' campaign, which calls on all candidates and parties to prioritise regional communities.

"Too often, elections are

focused on how to make Melbourne the most liveable city on earth, rather than making Victoria the most liveable state."

"That's why the VFF is focused on delivering a fair go for regional Victoria as part of this year's State election campaign. We want to draw attention to the challenges and opportunities that our communities face on a daily basis."

Ms Germano said candidates will be asked for their position on the key commitments sought by the VFF in its election policy statement, which

was launched in June.

"Whether its road and rail, farm and rural crime, rural health or regional housing, the VFF is championing the issues that matter to everyone living in regional Victoria."

"I encourage all community members to take part in the forums by bringing their questions and to come and hear what the candidates have to say," Ms Germano said.

All forums will begin at 7pm and will be held in Gippsland on Wednesday, November 9, at Grantville Hall.

City limits – saving agricultural land for the future

THE Victorian Planning Authority's Wonthaggi North East Precinct Structure Plan was released earlier this month, which aims to rezone land for future development including 5000 new homes and 60 hectares of commercial land over the next 30 to 50 years.

With a booming population to regional and rural areas, accommodating that growth is difficult, especially when the boom is happening in prime agricultural parcels, and it's a topic very near to Berrys Creek farmers, Deb and Fergus O'Connor.

"We've become very passionate about farming and saving the farming land," Fergus said.

"We got involved through Coal & CSG Free Mirboo North when they were fighting Mantle Mining and we wanted to save our underground water."

"We've got a fantastic spring that feeds the whole property and the dams over a hectare."

Coal & CSG Free Mirboo North was formed in 2012.

Members from Mirboo North and surrounding areas came together campaigning against Mantle Mining applying for Exploration Licences for coal seam gas (CSG) and coal; and discovered adjacent tenements for other companies. The pair also joined forces with Farmers for Climate Action.

"It's a dual concern we have," Deb explained.

"We're concerned about protecting the natural environment from the ravages of mining, but there's also recognising agricultural land should be kept as agricultural land, especially around Warragul and Drouin."

"In Australia we haven't got huge amounts of productive agricultural land," Fergus added.

"We're on the red ferrosol and we need to protect it."

Protecting the red ferrosol ensures a sustainable future for Australians.

"We can stock one beast to

the acre, the big stations it's one beast to 100 hectares," Deb said.

"Should we be doing that? Because you hear environmentalists talk about the degradation to the soil and the way they have to round them up using helicopters – they make it a big, exciting Outback experience."

"Let's do something other than agriculture on it and similarly, recognise that in Drouin and Warragul we've got the best soil in Australia, let's produce our food from it."

Equally, Gippsland has the water supply.

"We've got the underground water here," Fergus said.

"We are one of the few areas that the dairy industry is not irrigated – we've got the rainfall, the underground water and the soil, we shouldn't be using it for housing."

Fergus and Deb's comments are echoed not just by Farmers for Climate Action, but Technical Lead Long Range Forecasts Bureau of Meteorology's Andrew Watkins.

"I met Andrew in March 2018 at Farmers for Climate

Action, and he said then, 'South Gippsland was the least affected area in Australia by climate change'.

"South Gippsland could actually feed Australia – that's how good the farming is here."

"We can grow everything to feed Australia in South Gippsland because we've got the water, we've got the rainfall and we've got the soil."

Attempting to preserve the agricultural land with an agricultural planning overlay, Fergus and Deb soon discovered there had been coal overlays until recent years that had protected the land from houses – extending into Baw Baw Shire.

"We were still on the Peninsula but had brought this property when we heard about Coal Seam Gas in South Gippsland."

Jumping online they discovered an exploration license over their property.

"We would have had the moral power, but not the legal power to stop them exploring on our land," Deb stated.

"And this is what we're so annoyed about, mining

trumps agriculture every single time," Fergus said.

"Since the new government's come in, they want farmers to do more work to sequester more carbon and cut their emissions."

"Agriculture in Australia produces 16 million tonnes of greenhouse gas a year, these are CSIRO figures. Fugitive emissions from (leaking) gas in Australia is 8 million tonnes, and it's not the gas that's burned for purpose."

"Why doesn't the gas industry have to do what the farming industry is already doing?" Fergus asked.

Fergus has even advised fellow farmers and helped saved them much needed monies after suggesting a soil test.

"(One farmer) came to me six weeks later, and said, 'I've had some soil tests done. I don't have to put any nitrogen on for six years.' He came to me two years after that, and said, 'my cows are looking so much better, and the conception rate has gone through the roof.'"

It is driven by an 8.7 litre Fiat Power Train engine generating 445 horsepower.

Terra Trac is patented by CLAAS, with the system enabling the machine to operate smoothly and efficiently on challenging terrain, while minimising its impact on the soil.

"The track is always in contact with the ground, even if the surface is undulating," product manager for High Horsepower CLAAS Tractors James

Harrison said.

Unlike other vehicles with tank-like tracks, the Axion 960 Terra Trac is steered by conventional front wheels, which is why soil disturbance is minimised.

In Korumburra, the versatile tractor will be used for tasks such as linkage-mounted mulching, plowing, and hoeing and is well-equipped to pull large implements.

With the purchasers of the tractor having multiple properties, its ability to comfortably negotiate sealed roads is important.

"The tracks have been designed to be self-cleaning and self-cooling," James said.

The tractor can reach an impressive 45 kilometres per hour on the road, with trials demonstrating it can

Top tips for taking a winning wildlife snap

JAYDEN GUNN is a freelance photographer and passionate conservationist who specialises in Australian birdlife and vertebrate pest animal management. He spends a lot of time out in nature, often in remote areas studying some really exciting bird species that most people don't get to see.

"I took up photography to be able to share these incredible birds and their environments with people," shared Jayden.

"I figured if I can show them how wonderful they are; if I can use my photographs to educate others and tell stories about the species pictured, then maybe the world might just appreciate them a little more and want to protect them."

Jayden's favourite thing to photograph is the glossy

black cockatoo.

"I'm obsessed with them. They are so different from other black cockatoo species; they're secretive and often very quiet so it makes them difficult to find and photograph," he says.

"They're also a difficult subject to photograph because of their black colouration so it makes getting a good image of these birds all the more exciting."

What is Jayden's top three tips for taking a great picture of flora and fauna?

1. When photographing wildlife you have to be patient and quiet! Most animals are very afraid of people, so you have to sit and wait to get a good shot.

2. If you want to photograph a particular animal or plant species make

sure you research it before you go in search for it – the more you understand a plant or animal species, the easier they are to find and photograph.

3. Don't be afraid to get dirty! Lay down in the mud to get the right angle of a flower, lay down in shallow water to photograph a bird wading on the shoreline, hide in a bush to stake out a visiting bird – the world's best nature photographers go to great lengths to capture incredible images!

EPA's guide to cutting greenhouse gas

EPA VICTORIA has released a practical guide to help farms and other businesses to minimise their greenhouse gas emissions.

The new Guideline for Minimising Greenhouse Gas Emissions is designed to give businesses a guide to choosing reasonable actions to suit their size and situation, so they can cut their emissions and meet their obligations under the Environment Protection Act 2017.

EPA Victoria CEO Lee Miezin says EPA has made improvements to the guideline after releasing a draft version for feedback earlier this year.

"Importantly, the guideline does not impose a rigid set of rules on farmers or other businesspeople. It focuses on taking reasonable actions based on your individual situation," Mr Miezin said.

"Big industrial operators might calculate their greenhouse gas emissions in proportion to their scale and resources, while a family farm or other smaller business might use simpler measures of success, such as reductions in their power and gas bills," he said.



Leongatha Golf Club to host star amputee players

SOME of Australia's top amputee golfers will tackle the fairways and greens of Leongatha Golf Club in a Charity Golf Day contest, with club members and others invited to be part of the action on October 28.

The event has been organised through a collaboration between Amputee Golf Victoria (AGV), Leongatha Golf Club, and Inverloch Rotary Club and will showcase the high standard of amputee golf to those in the Leongatha region.

Each team of four in the Ambrose format event will include one amputee golf champion.

The new competition is intended to be held annually.

The majority of funds raised are going to AGV to run its programs, with the organisation still quite young and without substantial financial reserves.

"That helps to pay for events and opportunities for new people to get involved in the sport," AGV president Mike Rolls said.

A free all abilities golf clinic and Come and Try day, held prior to the competition, provides a snapshot of the type of programs AGV provides.

Such sessions precede each of its regular social events.

"We pay for coaching and equipment and welcome everyone who's an amputee or has a different disability type," Mike said.

He outlined what drives those running AGV.

"Our main vision for Amputee Golf Victoria is to position golf as a sport of choice for anyone who goes through the journey of limb loss, because it's a very inclusive sport," Mike said.

Golf lends itself to people with a range of mobility challenges and caters for a broad age spectrum.

The sport proved a crucial part of Mike's recovery after a bout of meningo-

coccal disease in 2001 at the age of 18, having previously been an active person who enjoyed playing footy.

"I woke up to the news that I'd be an amputee and I'd have a disability for the rest of my life," he said.

While initially he was too ill to think about a return to sport, his father eventually dragged him out to play golf.

"I realised I can still hit a ball pretty good so all my energy went into golf, and it's become a real lifesaver for me, and I'm sure a lot of other guys who play our events will tell you golf has played a major role in their recovery," Mike said.

AGV is keen to address an underrepresentation of women and kids in amputee golf, with hopes the Come and Try day and charity golf event in Leongatha will encourage new participants.

"We've got wonderful amputee golfers coming in from around the country," Mike said, adding some feature highly in the amputee golf world ranking system.

He came into contact with Leongatha Golf Club through one of its members, and reflected on the club's commitment to providing inclusive sport.

"They were always keen to support amputee golf and to get more people with a disability involved in the game," Mike said.

Those at AGV see golf as much more than hitting a ball, or even competing, he explained.

"It's a really amazing outlet for your mental health and the social connection you get is a wonderful thing," Mike said.

Leongatha Golf Club general manager Justin Speirani said some of the funds

raised during the Charity Golf Day may be used to make the course more accessible to all-abilities golfers.

"That might be reshaping some of the bunkers so someone who's not 100 percent mobile can get into them," he said.

"There'll always be an entry point, so it's about adjusting the grade of the entry points so they can access the bunker easily."

Improved paths to tees is another way of boosting accessibility.

Building works are underway for the purpose-built, stand-alone facility, which will provide additional amenities for Wonthaggi Tennis Club members and guests.

The new pavilion, which boasts sustainable design features, will span 207sqm of internal floor space and include a social room and outdoor deck overlooking the existing courts, as well as office space and kitchen facilities.

Club secretary and committee member Phil Dempster said the new building would provide huge benefits to members.

Mr Dempster highlighted that their current club room was becoming very outdated, and they would be able to host more social nights when the building is completed.

"One of the hassles about it (current facility) is we play on Tuesday nights and sometimes it's nice to sit down and have something to eat," he said.

"But people will come in, put in their results and just take off."

"We've also got the new courts, we used to have a key to access them but now it's all keypad."

"You book the court and you're sent a number."

Club president Russell Cargill added they had long been campaigning for a pavilion, and thanked the shire for their support.

Mr Cargill also highlighted that fortunately many members are beginning to return after the downturn of lockdowns.

"We had our first Tuesday night competition recently, it was just a night where people come and have a go," he said.

"And nearly all the courts were full."

"It's starting to look up."

Traffic and pedestrian controls will be in place while

the works are undertaken, and one large tree will be removed as part of the project. A vegetation removal permit was not required.

The works, which have been funded by the council's Capital Works Program and a Victorian Government grant,

are expected to be completed by May next year, depending on favourable weather, contractor and supplier availability.

Wonthaggi croquet pavilion on the way

IT'S one down and two to go when it comes to the three Bass Coast sports projects funded in June 2021 through a \$1.78 million grant from the State Government's Community Sports Infrastructure Stimulus Program.

Last Friday, October 7, Bass MP Jordan Crugnale opened the \$600,000 Phillip Island Croquet Club pavilion.

Earlier last week, recently appointed builders, TS Constructions started work on the \$870,000 pavilion for Wonthaggi Tennis Club at Wonthaggi Recreation Reserve.

And soon we'll see a new pavilion for the Wonthaggi Croquet Club also underway.

Speaking at the opening of the Phillip Island club's new

facility, Wonthaggi croquet vice president Tom Lacey said the club had gone out for tenders which close on October 19.

"The SRV grant was in the order of \$480,000 but we've still got to add the club's money and council's funding to that," Mr Lacey said.

But he acknowledged it was encouraging to see the other projects in the same funding program on the go.

The three pavilions were part of a successful bid for \$5.5 million from the SRV stimulus program for new lighting at the Cowes, Dalyston and Inverloch recreation reserves and a six-kilometre path linking Corinella to Bass Valley Primary School, via Tenby Point, one of Council's top 10 advocacy priorities.

Luke guides Izzi to marathon glory

OVER 35,000 runners took part in the 2022 Melbourne Marathon Festival on October 2, including 2020 Tokyo Olympian Izzi Batt-Doyle, who clocked the fastest debut marathon time ever by an Australian woman (2:28:10), coming second overall in the women's race.

Batt-Doyle competed in Tokyo in the five-kilometre event and travelled from Adelaide to pull off the amazing feat in her first marathon, although it wasn't a solo effort, her elite team should not go unnoticed.

A big part of her three-person team was San Remo prodigy Luke Nicholson, who was tasked with the role of an elite pacer for the Olympian.

Nicholson and Batt-Doyle's other two teammates, ran in diamond formation, meaning Luke ran at the front, taking the wind and creating a slipstream for Batt-Doyle to run through, easing the amount of energy she needed to expend.

Nicholson ran the first 17-kilometres out in front, starting outside the MCG around Albert Park Lake and then finished at the bottom of St Kilda, where he ran back to the 'G to cheer Batt-Doyle over the line.

"She was insane and not even tired at 17k, when I pulled out, I guess that's why she's an Olympian," said Nicholson.

After Nicholson pulled out, another pacer took the Olympian to the 30km mark before she was left with her training

partner to the end, finishing the 42.2km event in record time, impressing herself along the way.

"At about 40km, I was still feeling good, and I started to cry, I couldn't believe I was going to finish the marathon, I was over the moon, I couldn't believe how good I felt," she said.

The 2020 Olympian finished in eighth place in both the 5000 and 10000 metre events at this year's Commonwealth Games

in England, topping off her year with her marathon, she praised her 21-year-old pacer.

"Thank-you to Luke for all the work he did out front," she said.

For Nicholson, the event was a truly memorable one, as an elite pacer he was treated to free Nike kit and access to exclusive elite runner rooms to mingle with Olympians and elite runners before and after the race.

The San Remo local and for

mer Newhaven College school captain was extremely grateful for the experience.

"It was an unbelievable effort from Izzi and I'm so honoured to be a part of it, a truly memorable experience and one I'll never forget," he said.

He also gave his thanks to those that have helped him along the way.

"I would like to thank my family for their ongoing support with my running journey, bringing me up to races and supporting me on the sidelines. Paul Van-Cuylenburg, a guy I went to school with; for giving me drinks and gels on course."

"Tim Crosbie, the event director for the opportunity to pace, my physio Micheal O'Connor for his ongoing advice and support and massager Tim Tracy.

"I would also like to thank the 24/7 gym in San Remo for sponsoring me, believing in me and giving me access to the gym facilities in order to improve my running."

"And finally, my parkrun family who constantly cheer me on at Phillip Island Parkrun every Saturday morning. Regardless of ability, each of you inspires me to try my best and give 100 per cent so thank you."

Nicholson is an exceptionally driven runner with a real passion for the sport and looks forward to building from this experience in the summer.

"I now look forward to the summer track season and aiming for a national qualifying time in the 5k," he said.

AFTER COVID robbed them of a membership record season in 2020, the Wonthaggi Amateur Basketball Association (WABA) has recovered in sensational fashion.

With 680 total registrations, the WABA boasts 81 junior teams, 21 senior teams and 50 games a week with 530 juniors and 160 seniors playing, 13 men's teams and eight women's teams.

Their representative or 'Coasters' teams are thriving too, with 14 teams competing, four age groups playing two full sides and 146 total players competing.

An incredible achievement from the regional club and in speaking to new president Michael Bell and representative team's co-ordinator Lincoln Morris, one that has been achieved thanks to their new home stadium and the evolution of the sport itself.

"I think it comes down to a lot of things, obviously the new facility, but basketball is really taking off too," Bell said.

"The sport is in a growth period at the moment, but I think our facility and the growth in our area is helping a lot."

The new four-court stadium has the full plethora of facilities from a grandstand on the show court, to a canteen and has helped Wonthaggi become the hub of basketball in the area.

"This is our second year with our two CBL (Country Basketball League) teams, basically we can only run what we have today because we have this facility, which has been massive," Bell said.

"We've had a mini tournament of practise games we had Foster, Korumburra, Leongatha and Phillip Island all here today and that was under 12s and 14s and the CBL will follow that up and we've got 10s, 16s and 18s (tomorrow)."

It's not hard to see the impact the new facility has had on the association, allowing them to not only run 50

games of domestic basketball weekly, but also host representative teams from clubs around the region and state.

An amazing step in the right direction for an association that once struggled to get juniors and adults on the courts, and Bell and Morris heaped their praise on the growth of the game and their club.

"Basically, we just wanted to get them out and playing, COVID stopped a lot of kids from getting active and I think basketball is a great sport," Bell said.

"You only have to go to one spot, one night, one stadium, indoors, five kids on a court and every kid gets a touch it's great for self-esteem."

"We've got an all-abilities program running now on Mondays, which is growing, we had six last year we've got

10 in it now, we're catering for all with everything we're doing."

WABA hosted a mini 'festival' of basketball last weekend, with junior representative teams from around the region converging on the Coasters home courts building up to Saturday night's CBL home openers against local rivals Korumburra.

Both the women's and men's CBL games produced some incredible basketball in front of a bumper crowd, showcasing the great culture WABA has built thanks to some hard work behind the scenes.

"We've put a lot of time into developing our referees and coaches and supporting them and that obviously feeds into better quality games and experiences for the kids who enjoy it because that's the thing that matters," Morris said.

The new association president agreed with Morris and is hugely grateful for the work of those who came before him.

"It's a credit to a lot of our past committee members, and a few of our execs who have stepped down, there'd be at least 15 on the committee, there's a lot of people willing to help," said Bell.

"Kids actually want to come to the basketball, come in here any night of the week and there's kids in here, even tonight there's kids from Korumburra playing around, it's great there's a good crowd out there it's phenomenal."

"It's taken a lot of hard work from a lot of people to get this happening so, thanks to Cathy Garnham, Cam and Mandy Lean and Katrina Maxwell who were previous execs, they put a lot of hard work in."

The association has built and sustained an exceptional culture and is headed in the right direction both on and off the court, as Bell and Morris explained.

"I think looking at the practice games and the competitiveness of all our rep sides, it's a credit to the development of our domestic competition, we've started running under 8s and you can see the skill difference coming through to our under 10s," Bell said.

"It means we've sort of fast-tracked their progress through the system a little bit so when they want to play rep we can compete against these bigger associations and be more competitive."

Saturday's CBL matches were split at one apiece as the reigning champion Coasters women's side were defeated by a strong Korumburra line up, and the Coasters men snatched victory in the final seconds thanks to a clutch bucket from Abram Cox in a fiery matchup.

The Coasters men and women will be back in action this Saturday night at home, when they host Sale with the women's tipping off at 5:30pm and the men at 7:30pm.

Island turns it on for Aussie SUP titles

PHILLIP Island's changeable weather provided a challenging backdrop for the return of Surfing Australia's national Stand-up Paddleboard Titles to the Island in the past week.

It thrilled the marathon competitors, riding a stormy easterly wind back to Cowes from Coronet Bay midweek, offered "user-friendly" offshore conditions for the surfing heats on Thursday and Friday before biting finalists hard with tough onshore conditions on Saturday.

But organisers and competitors alike were delighted with the success of the event and the challenges posed by the Island.

"From my perspective, after being involved in the running of dozens and dozens of surfing events, Phillip Island is simply one of the best places in the world to stage surfing events and that's acknowledged all over," said SUP Titles manager Max Wells of Inverloch.

The standout performances were by Hannah Finlay-Jones of NSW who won three Australian titles including 10-foot women's open, and James Casey of Narrabeen who also won three titles including the Open Men's Short and Longboard and the Technical event.

"He was also second behind Ty Judson of NSW in Surfing Australia's SUP Marathon (Open) Race, from Coronet Bay to Cowes on Wednesday. Judson completed the 16.34km event in a near world-record time of 1hr 7mins, 12 seconds faster than his 2019 time, back the other way, on a howling south-westerly in 2019.

"These were world-class conditions for these competitors and they raved about the event here at Phillip Island," said Wells.

But the sentimental victory of the whole week, came in the Over 50s Men's Surf Final when Australian SUP Titles stalwart, Andrew Cassidy of NSW, claimed his first-ever Aussie title after competing at all 13 title events over the past two decades.

"I've been in every Australian SUP Titles since 2009 and

In Moto2 just one single point separates Kalex riders Augusto Fernandez and Ai Ogura for the respective championship after the last round's results in Thailand.

So anything is possible in this category.

The 765cc machines are no slouches when it comes to top end speed as a new record of 301.8km/h was recently achieved so the Island crowd will have thrilling entertainment in this class as well.

Moto3 class will see more close tussling as the bikes are powered by 249cc DOHC liquid cooled single cylinder engines designed for lightweight machines to maximise rider skills.

Bartel can't understand AFL's timeline on Hawthorn investigation

JIMMY Bartel can't understand why the AFL has set a soft deadline of completing the investigation into the racism allegations at Hawthorn by December.

The league released a statement on Wednesday confirming the appointment of a four-person panel set to investigate the claims separate to the AFL's integrity unit.

The statement added the terms of reference are still being finalised, but AFL general counsel Andrew Dillon said the league is hoping to confirm a projected end date for the investigation in December 2022.

But with the seriousness of the allegations that have seen Alastair Clarkson and Chris Fagan stand down from North Melbourne and Brisbane respectively, Bartel can't fathom why the AFL has decided to squeeze the investigation into just two months.

"I don't think you need a hard deadline on it though, because the seriousness of this and what's been alleged, there is going to be no good outcome in this," the three-time premiership Cat said on Sportsday.

"There's going to be bad outcomes either side, there can't be any grey in this."

"It takes as long as it needs, and how much scope and how much ability will this panel have? Will they get to interview everybody?"

"Like everyone, I don't think we should draw any conclusion until we've heard from everyone, that's the right of everyone involved."

AFL CEO Gillon McLachlan called for the investigation after the ABC published testimony from former Hawthorn players and their families that alleged racist and inappropriate behaviour against Clarkson, Fagan and former player development manager Jason Burt.

Both Clarkson and Fagan have indicated they deny the claims and Bartel suggested this inquiry will draw on for years no matter how soon the AFL wants it wrapped up.

"Either way there's enormous repercussions for whatever side this lands on. Like enormous," he continued.

"If we think at the end of this report and any other investigation that goes into it that's it ... the lawyers have probably got another year or two years of this."

"We can't just have those allegations and then just go, 'You know what, we don't know, it's sort of inbetween'."

WorkSafe Victoria has also initiated an investigation into the claims at Hawthorn.

AFL Media's Damian Barrett recently voiced a similar concern to Bartel, stating he "can't see" Clarkson and Fagan being able to coach in Round 1 next year.

Toner sets tone as Foster beats Nyora

FOSTER skipper and accomplished opener Josh Toner top scored for his team with 37, helping his side to set a defendable total and claim a 26-run win over Nyora at Poowong.

Trent Crawford was another solid contributor with the willow for the Tigers, making 33.

Nyora's bowlers performed well, with three of them capturing a couple of wickets each, and another trio managing one wicket apiece as they contained Foster to a moderate 9/146.

Now captain, Henry Dolphin, topped Nyora's batting and bowling statistics last season and continued to impress with the ball, starting this campaign with 2/26 off eight overs.

However, Foster prevented him doing much damage with the bat in hand, with Crawford dismissing Dolphin for just 16.

Although that proved to be Crawford's only wicket for the day, he kept the pressure on Nyora's batsmen, allowing just 14 runs off his eight overs, after his earlier strong showing with the bat.

Toner set a glowing example for his side, with the tenacious Tiger following his solid batting effort by turning destroyer with the ball, taking 5/29.

While his wickets didn't include any of Nyora's top order, he played a part in their downfall too with a couple of catches.

Toner's sticky hands were called on again, with one of his wickets a caught and bowled.

Lochie Rowe did best with the bat for the ultimately defeated Nyora, making 27 runs before none other than Toner ended his time at the crease.

Andrew Pattie did the early damage for Foster with ball in hand, knocking over Nyora opener and former skipper Daniel Esler, number three batsman Jake Henry, and next-in Jake Hackett.

Pattie finished with 3/18 from his six overs.

Korumburra sweeps past MDU target

The Alvie won the toss and sent the Sharks in to bat, and the visitors made the most of it, David Britt and Harry West putting on a 52-run opening stand before Britt fell for a well made 39 (from 31).

Clint Wilson then took over, tearing apart the Club middle order to claim 4/34, the Island's best figures on the afternoon.

MotoGP magic returns to the Island

Frenchman Fabio Quartararo, current leader of the championship, will be looking for a change of fortune when he heads to the Island.

manding points lead early on in the championship, Quartararo has had to deal with a rampaging Bagnaia closing down his lead after the Italian posting six grand prix wins this season.

For Pecco Bagnaia the challenge of winning the 2022 MotoGP championship for team Ducati is surrounded by high expectations as Ducati has only won a single senior class championship in 2007.

The exceptionally talented Aussie rider, Casey Stoner, remains the only competitor to ever pilot the Italian machine to the ultimate glory of a championship win.

The fast-flowing Island circuit

will definitely favour the Ducatis whose top end speed of 350km/h has left the Yamahas struggling to get in the mix at the chequered flag.

Having recently sewn up the Constructor's championship in Aragon in Spain in round 16 team Lenovo Ducati will be confident of their chances with Bagnaia and Aussie rider Jack Miller displaying some good form.

Add into the mix Aussie Jack "Thriller" Miller's convincing win in Japan, where he crossed the finish line 3.5 seconds clear after opening up a 5.5 second lead at one stage and the prospect Phillip Island round will have Aussie fans flocking to the world's best circuit.

Miller, who has been racing

for most of the year on a hard compound rear tyre and soft compound front tyre selected hard compound's all round for the Japanese Grand Prix simply blew the opposing riders off in his wake.

Tyre choice is absolutely vital in this sport.

Round 18 was a wet race in Thailand where Jack Miller led the race for 10 laps before being overtaken by Portuguese rider Miguel Oliveira with Miller's teammate Pecco Bagnaia placing third.

Frenchman Fabio Quartararo had a disastrous race finishing in 17th spot missing out on any points.

Bagnaia has closed to within two points of Quartararo with

three races to go for the season.

With a first and second in his last two outings, Aussie Jack Miller has closed to within 35 points of the lead in the championship and it is conceivable that he too could win the MotoGP title for 2022 if he can maintain his rich vein of form over the next three rounds.

An Aussie gunning for the title on his home track will get the hackles up on the necks of the Australian faithful who will be there in thousands to cheer Jack across the line.

Miller, who earnt third place in the 2019 GP at the Island has whetted his appetite to go to the top step on the podium at this year's event.


