# STORM BRINGS TRAGIC LOSS

KIANI Eden and her family were out risking their lives into the early hours of the morning last Tuesday as a dangerous electrical storm wreaked havoc in the Bass area.

Damage started out at the Bass Recreation Reserve, where a light pole was struck, knocking out power to the reserve. Over at the Eden property on Bass Road, mother-of-three Kiani saw sparks throughout her house coming from her power points.

Tragically, one of the bolts then struck

their beloved two-year-old racehorse, Wildwood Road, scaring him through a nearby fence, and killing him instantly.

The death of the young colt was just the beginning of what turned into a devastating night for the Eden family that left Kiani's three children traumatised.

Speaking with the Sentinel-Times this week, the Bass local explained the horror that all began when her brother Shea took a phone call from their father Kent, saying one of Shea's horses had been affected.

"It was one of my brother's fillies, purchased for \$180,000, it's really sad. They cost a lot of money too, racehorses," Kiani said.

Shea's filly suffered a broken back and had to be euthanised.

As awful as it is to lose any animal under such circumstances, Wildwood Road was a rising star for the Edens and its 12 owners, his career including two runs with a promising third-place finish on debut in Adelaide.

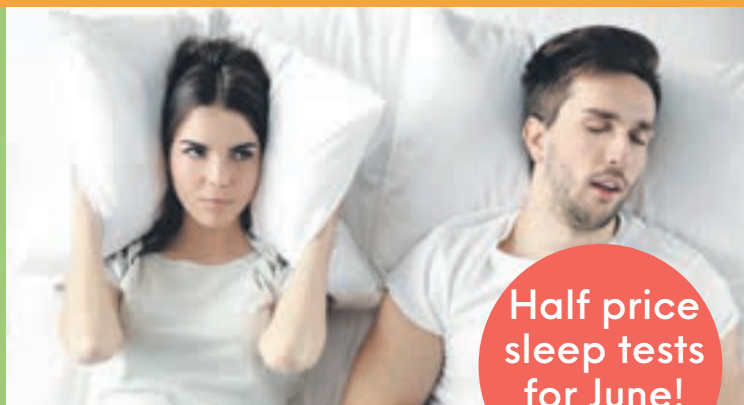

## Storm brings tragic loss of racehorse at Bass

"We've lost potentially a very good racehorse there, but we'll never really know now after his career was cut short."

Overall, 17 horses ran off, spooked by lightning, six of which had life-threatening cuts from jumping through fences.

Kiani discussed the extent of the storm's destruction.

"Dad's been a beef farmer in Bass all his life, he's 68 but he's never experienced anything like it" Kiani added.

Shea, Kent and Kiani along with Kiani's partner Ricky Maund all risked their lives, venturing out into the deadly storm to do whatever they could to save their beloved horses.

"They were cutting horses out of fences and catching others that had been cut open by the fences."

"I think, for my partner, brother, and dad, it was 2am when they'd finished getting horses out of paddocks."

"They do mean a lot to our family, in hindsight we probably all should've stayed inside and out of danger."

"But when the adrenaline kicks in and you know you've got injured livestock out there, your first instinct is to go to their rescue."

Their courageous rescue mission was borne out of the deep love and connection they share with their horses, Kiani explained.

"Obviously when you have a

small business with the horses you become attached to them and it's quite devastating that a horse you work with every single day of the week can be killed in a situation like that."

"They're more than just a business to all of us. We do actually look after them better than we do ourselves."

The tragedy has also deeply impacted the Edens from a business standpoint.

"You need these horses in your stable to keep running your business, then on the other side, you've got owners that have paid good money to race these horses. They're virtually left with nothing," Kiani said.

The horses that were lucky enough to survive the storm are facing a tough battle to get back on the racetrack.

"The ones that are injured but still alive, their chances of racing anytime soon look slim. They may never ever race again."

A vet was at the property for six hours on Wednesday, tending to the various cuts and gashes on the injured horses.

The devastating electrical storm comes a year, almost to the day, that another terrible storm brought down power to thousands of homes and rural properties in the local region, on June 9 last year.

## Asset plan out for consultation

BASS Coast Shire is seeking feedback on its Draft Asset Plan.

The plan identifies the infrastructure assets that council owns or manages, and informs the community on how these assets will be managed in the long term.

The Asset Plan considers how council plans to optimise life cycle costs of capital and maintenance expenditure on \$728m of infrastructure across four major asset classes of roads and transport, buildings and facilities, open space and parks and stormwater drainage.

Long term infrastructure renewal funding is allocated in the plan to ensure that levels of service expected by the community can be sustained in the long term, by council's ability to maintain and renew its infrastructure.

The Plan highlights known challenges and emerging issues including social, economic and climate implications.

The Asset Plan sits alongside the Community Vision, Council Plan and Long Term Financial Plan.

The engagement period closes on Tuesday, June 7.

Comments and feedback received will be integrated into the Final Asset Plan, which will be considered for adoption at the council meeting on Wednesday, June 15, 2022.

## New finish date for bridge, handrail works

FOLLOWING the breakdown of machinery resulting in significant delays in the construction of a replacement bridge deck and balustrade handrail at Shearwater Estate, Cowes, works are set to resume.

The project began in November last year, as the existing timber decking and handrail had significantly deteriorated to both east and west bridge structures.

The new decking material is locally manufactured using recycled plastic, which the shire claims is more UV and slip resistant than timber.

The balustrade timber handrails will also be replaced with a UV resistant fibreglass section.

However, the manufacturer's machine (decking material) broke down earlier this year and required replacement parts causing delays in the project.

The installation of the handrail is now anticipated to commence on Monday, June 6, with decking installation to commence late June.

The project is expected to be complete by August this year.



IN BRIEF

'White elephant' or  
Wonthaggi gold?

THE Nationals' Shadow Minister for Water, Steph Ryan, flagged it earlier in May, now the Water Minister Lisa Neville has confirmed it as an option – Wonthaggi's desalination plant might have to be expanded to meet the state's burgeoning water needs.

Although you wouldn't think that this week!

The option was acknowledged at a recent Public Accounts and Estimates Committee (PAEC) session where other water investment options were canvassed including a pipeline from Geelong to Melbourne.

When asked whether a second desal plant was on the cards, Minister Neville confirmed it was an option, stating that Labor's "trying to make an orderly transition to manufactured water", which includes the use of recycled water.

Ms Ryan said the response from the Minister came at a time when "the first desal plant was still burning a hole in Melbourne's back pockets".

Three hospitals on  
'code yellow'

THREE Gippsland hospitals, Bass Coast Health, West Gippsland and Omeo have now signalled 'Code Yellow' emergencies due to internal crises over staff shortages.

Bass Coast Health CEO, Jan Child, revealed last week that shortage extended to as many as 70 staff members being away at the peak, due to COVID protocols and influenza.

The escalation at two more Gippsland hospitals comes after the State Opposition Leader Matthew Guy visited Warragul last Friday to promise \$400 million towards the \$600 million cost of building a new West Gippsland Hospital between Warragul and Drouin, if they win the next election.

He said the Federal Government would need to provide \$200 million.

The State Government has not matched the promise but a spokesperson for Health Minister Martin Foley's office described the Opposition plan for Warragul as "half baked" with "no costings, timeframe or details".

POLICE were called to a crash in Wonthaggi on Thursday, June 2.

Officers were told a grey Mazda 3 sedan travelling on Fincher Street crashed into a parked car causing it to flip about 10.00pm.

The car was unoccupied at the time.

It is believed the driver of the Mazda left the scene prior to police arrival.

CFA was notified at 10.55pm to reports of a washaway required as a result of the accident.

An investigation into the crash is ongoing.

The collision temporarily closed the highway in both directions as Police, Ambulance Victoria, SES and CFA worked to rescue two trapped individuals.

# How costs are chasing the record milk price

DAIRY farmers have welcomed the record opening price for milk in the past week, above \$8 per kg milk solids, and pushing up towards \$9.

But they've cautioned that costs are rising just as quickly, if not outpacing the monthly milk cheque.

"Look, I think the biggest issue at the moment is the input costs. Of course, you're pleased to see a good opening price, but feed, fuel and fertilizer, together with the rising cost of land, energy, stock replacement costs and labour costs; just about anything you like to name is going up."

That's the view of United Dairyfarmers of Victoria Policy Councillor for Region 6, Ben Vag of Leongatha.

And he's also concerned about a vacuum in informa-

tion from the processors as to whether they've locked away domestic sales during the pandemic and don't have the supplies to access the improving returns on the export market.

"It's hard to gauge how they're going at the moment, and we'd like to hear more about that from them but as for asking if they can pay more, that's a matter for them. It's also important to see our manufacturers in a strong position as well."

But he said it was equally important that they continued to send the right signals to the market in order to secure milk supply.

"We've still got older farmers exiting the industry, and either selling up or going to beef, and we need to be seeing a return on investment or fewer and fewer people are going to con-

tinue milking cows.

"The rising cost of land puts pressure on leasing and share farming as an option and we've seen some young farmers biting the bullet and buying land which is a tough thing to do in the present climate."

Fortunately, according to Andrew Mackie of Dairy Livestock Services, which organises some of the dairy dispersal sales locally, there's only a modest number of people going out of dairying at the moment.

"We had one a couple of weeks ago where the family was going over to beef, partly because they couldn't get the labour, but there haven't been that many."

"The issue for most is that while the value of land has gone up, which is good, you

don't see the benefit of that unless you sell. You might own a \$15 million farm but you're still working seven days-a-week."

Leongatha based milk processor, Saputo Dairy Australia (SDA), announced its opening price for the 2022-23 season last week at a "weighted average farm gate milk price for non-exclusive supply of \$8.50 per kilogram milk solids".

It was a significant increase over the \$6.55/kg opening last year.

But there have been reports of Australian Consolidated Milk pushing up towards \$9.

Burra Foods announced an opening milk price range of \$8.20-\$8.60/kg MS for the 2022-23 season in May. Fontterra has reportedly opened at \$8.25. Step-ups are expected.

## Incredible demand continues to impact health service

BASS Coast Health (BCH) will keep a Code Yellow internal emergency status in place, as the health service continues to be impacted by a shortage of staff due to illness.

Many staff have been furloughed due to being affected by COVID-19, influenza, gastro, colds and other illnesses that are sweeping through the community and other areas, as BCH staff come from far and wide.

In recent times, BCH has had up to 60 staff on personal leave on any given day, either sick themselves or to care for their own ill family.

"BCH called a Code Yellow in early May and this status remains as a signal to our staff and to our community that we are in extraordinary times," BCH CEO Jan Child said.

Bed numbers in the inpatient areas have remained capped with staff deployed to areas such as the emergency department (ED), to ensure BCH can look after its sickest patients, 24/7.

"We review a number of metrics daily to make sure we are prioritising our resources to the highest risk, highest need areas, and we are truly grateful to the BCH staff who continue to go above and beyond, like never before, to maintain our services," Ms Child said.

Some new services that were planned to commence have been put on hold, and other service expansion such as new surgery, has been halted until the worst of this current wave of COVID and influenza has passed.

Ms Child praised the BCH team for their tremendous work during the two years of the COVID pandemic and particularly right now.

The demand on BCH's ED has increased significantly in the past two years.

From January to March 2020, 1919 patients presented (triaged as most unwell) compared with 2749 patients in January - March 2022; a 43.2% increase.

The acuity of patients has increased.

The most unwell patients accounted for 62% of patients, compared with 43.4% in 2020.

Within BCH's inpatient wards there has been a 15.2% increase in inpatient separations from current financial year, 2021-2022, compared with financial year 2019-2020.

# Tessari throws his hat in with the Nationals

WHEN Brett Tessari was voted in as a Bass Coast Shire Councillor at the 2020 council elections, he did so with a whopping 49.91 per cent of the vote.

Now the former two-time Mayor of Bass Coast is aiming to take that local popularity all the way to Spring Street as the Nationals' Member for Bass at the November 26, 2022 election.

"I reckon the Liberals and Labor have both got a 20,000 vote start on me, so I've got a lot of work to do. I'm going to get out into the community and listen to what people are saying. The federal election showed a lot of people are dissatisfied with the two major parties," he said.

The Nationals' announced their star recruit as the candidate in Bass, to take on the Liberals' Aaron Brown and the incumbent, Labor's Jordan Crugnale, at the

Nationals' recent State Conference recently.

"The Bass Coast has so much potential to thrive with a strong local representative in Victorian Parliament and I believe the best way to do that is as part of a team of Nationals MPs who are dedicated to securing a fair share for all regional Victorians."

## Shire projects delayed by contractor availability, material shortages

BASS Coast Shire's Quarterly Performance Report for January 1 to March 31, 2022, revealed timelines relating to the delivery of the capital works program have been negatively affected.

According to the report, which was adopted at shire's May meeting, council expects that \$26.9 million in capital projects will be carried over to 2022-23, with \$21.7 million of this attributed to projects that were expected to be delivered over multiple years.

This is due to delays in receipt of materials and availability of contractors as a result of the pandemic.

The report states council has forecast a capital works program of \$40.7 million for 2021-22, which is \$5.6 million higher than budget.

"This forecast increase is due

to the commencement of works linked to successful grant funding outcomes and the forecast completion of works originally budgeted in previous financial years."

The combined capital works program, current year and

multi-year/carryover projects is 32.5 per cent complete.

Council is forecasting to achieve an end of year expenditure result of 60.2 per cent, noting 32.1 per cent of the balance expenditure is due to budget phasing of multiyear

projects.

Highlights of capital works projects include the Cowes Cultural Centre, Newhaven soccer pavilion, Rhyll Boating facility upgrade and the Phillip Island and Community and Learning Centre rebuild.

Council's forecast net result is favourable to budget by \$4.0 million with a \$12.5 million surplus forecast for the year ended June 2022, with the main contributor the result of unbudgeted capital grants.

However, council's adjusted underlying result is forecast to reflect a \$1.6 million deficit after grants and contributions are removed.

Tied to the performance report was progress made in the Annual Action Plan 2021-22 third quarter, with 23 of 25 projects on track or complete.

The draft Tracks and Trails Strategy aims to help Council create township connections through its network of tracks and trails, to enhance the experience of residents and visitors in Bass Coast.

The Strategy has assessed the current network of tracks and trails throughout the Shire and has identified 38 new trail opportunities to expand the local network. A connected and accessible trail network supports active and healthy communities, showcases and protects the natural environment and encourages increased visitation to the region.

IT was my pleasure to attend the Youth Live4Life Spring into Winter annual dinner in Melbourne recently, hosted by Brian Nankervis. It was also wonderful to hear from Clare Bowditch and Jacinta Parsons and see young people involved in the entire evening. Minister for Regional Development, Mary-Anne Thomas, also attended the event.

Youth Live4Life is a registered charity that works with regional communities to improve the mental health and well-being of young people. In a partnership between Bass Coast and South Gippsland Shire Councils and Live4Life, a local three-year program was launched earlier this year.

The program, which involves local secondary schools, the Department of Education and numerous key community and youth services in our region, was initiated due to the increase in critical incidents and increase in young people presenting to support services in Bass Coast and South Gippsland.

Delivering the Live4Life program with South Gippsland, across our Shires, brings our community together to invest in and improve the mental health and wellbeing of our young people.

It was World Environment Day on Sunday, a great day to reflect on the importance of preserving and restoring our environment, right here in Bass Coast.

We have been recognised as the best recyclers in the state for three years running – by diverting just over 75 per cent of our waste away from landfill.

The Bass Coast community deserves to be acknowledged and celebrated for their brilliant recycling efforts and commitment to our environment.

Another way we are working on enhancing our local environment is through our biolinks program. Since 2018, over 2.5 million indigenous plants have been planted across the Shire, resulting in around 1100 hectares of revegetation.

We have 46 landowners signed up for the biolinks program this year, which is the largest number of landowners we have had participating since it began. With their help, we'll plant another 125,000 indigenous plants across this Shire.

As part of my role as the Councillor Advisory Group Chair of the South East Councils Climate Change Alliance, I had the opportunity to meet with Shadow Minister for Environment and Climate Change James Newbury recently to discuss ways to reduce emissions and adapt to climate change.

In an election year it is really important to engage with all of the parties to seek the best outcome for meeting the climate challenge.

Helping her mum by peeling potatoes and vegetables ready for dinner, Lyn was in the kitchen every opportunity

she got.

"My dad would make sausage rolls and his own flaky pastry... and my grandmother was one of those who's table was full of people – relatives, visitors..."

At the tender age of 15, Lyn and her family moved to Aberdeen, where her father was originally from.

"Then when I was 20, I came to Australia.

"Mum and Dad initially stayed in Scotland, but then missed us so much that they applied to come here – without telling me."

## Have your say on social housing

COUNCIL has developed a draft Social and Affordable Housing to help advocate for additional affordable housing support and investment in South Gippsland.

To ensure the objectives listed in the strategy align with community expectations, a community consultation period is now open until Friday, June 10.

The strategy was developed after research indicated that there were more than 1000 households in housing stress in South Gippsland Shire. Housing stress is when 30 per cent or more of the household income is spent on housing, leaving limited income for other expenses like food, transport, health, education and utilities.

"The number of people experiencing housing stress in South Gippsland Shire is very concerning," Mayor Cr Mohya Davies said.

"We hope that by developing this strategy we can start a conversation in our community about affordable housing and how we can provide support to those who need it.

"We want to make sure we are on the right path though, so I would encourage anyone with an interest in this area to give us your feedback by sending in a submission or completing a survey."

The strategy proposes actions such as the development of an advocacy program to seek funding for affordable housing from the state and federal governments, and planning scheme amendments to incorporate the Affordable Housing Strategy into the South Gippsland Planning Scheme.

## Cowes Rotunda facelift

BASS Coast Shire has appointed TS Constructions to undertake building renewal works at the Cowes Rotunda located at the Cowes Jetty Triangle.

- It is expected that there will be sections of the pathway impeded during material delivery and removal.
- Removal of asbestos in compliance with all applicable codes and regulations.

The draft plan includes projects and activities that are designed to improve visitor and trail user experience.

"We're here and we're talking strategically where to put them," Heather said of the potential for horse yards along

the Rail Trail.

The community garden area in Meenyan is a potential site that would offer the opportunity to use horse manure as compost.

Such ideas would involve working with council and the local traders association.

Heather said people in Fish Creek have also been investigating the possibility of horse yards there.

She considers providing horse yards along the trail has the potential to bring considerable additional spending into towns and would make the GSRT more appealing to horse tour operators.

Heather said one such operator she has travelled with has expressed interest in the GSRT with its attractive and varied scenery and abundance of towns, and the addition of further horse yards along the route would be a significant drawcard.

Such facilities would also be terrific for local riders.

"We really like doing lunch rides," Heather said of her riding group.

The six Toora horse yards feature a dog and child proof perimeter fence to help ensure safety for all.

A water tap near the yards is another possibility, with riders bringing their own containers for horses to drink from.

## Lions' have say on Great Southern Rail Trail

A TRIO of Lions Clubs from the local region are united in their desire to help broaden the appeal of the Great Southern Rail Trail (GSRT), bringing more visitors into towns along its route and enhancing the experience of trail users.

"If we can work together and identify with the council what needs to be done, we can get in and do some of it," vice president of Korumburra Lions Club Roger Powell said.

As community service organisations, Lions Clubs strive to benefit local people.

Roger attended one of Wednesday's South Gippsland Shire Council sessions for people to comment on its draft GSRT Visitation and Marketing Plan.

He was joined at Coal Creek by Strzelecki Lions Club president Russell Jones and Leongatha Lions Club membership director and former

president Mike Touzel.

With an estimated 100 members between the three clubs, there is potential for many interesting ideas on how to make the most of the rail trail.

One suggestion on Wednesday was to reinvigorate an old Lions Club shelter on the trail near Korumburra.

The possibility of community or family days along the

trail was mentioned.

So was the potential for the Lions Clubs to provide and staff a coffee and cake caravan at a point along the trail.

Implementation of that suggestion would be contingent on not adversely affecting local hospitality businesses, perhaps operating during different hours.

An earlier feedback session was held at Foster.

Council's manager of economy, community, investment and marketing Christian Stefani said suggestions received fell broadly into two categories.

Some people and groups focused on the development of the GSRT itself, while others shared their ideas on how the trail can best be promoted.

Improved signage along the GSRT is something people have identified as an important need, with that including trail markers and directional signs, along with ones highlighting historical and natural features of interest.

The need for seating along the way and carparking facilities for people to access the trail at various points has also been highlighted.

At some points that may include the need for parking by those with long vehicles.



Still time to have say on Local Law draft

THE weather may have dampened attendance in person, but it hasn't stopped residents from submitting online for Bass Coast Shire's Draft Local Law.

Fifteen submissions have been received by Council with three additional submissions from the in-person session at Inverloch on May 27.

"We have had lots of positive feedback," Bass Coast Shire team leader community safety, Cyleste O'Neill said.

"From individuals understanding the draft, to us elaborating, and also how the law would look.

"Most submissions and questions relate to short stay accommodation, in particular, how the registration process would look."

Questions have also been raised regarding dog regulations and Council – some of which fall under state laws.

"We also had a few questions around drones – which is governed by CASA, which do not fall under the remit for local laws."

Those unable to visit in person are welcome to submit online, call and speak with the team over the telephone or visit Bass Coast Shire Wonthaggi Office in person.

The Draft Local Law No. 1 Neighbourhood Amenity 2022 for community feedback is open until June 16.

The Local Law, which must be reviewed every 10 years, covers a range of items - from unsightly land, roadside and footpath trading and planting on nature strips, to building sites and animal management.

A significant proposed change to the new Local Law is the inclusion of Short Stay Accommodation, which seeks to:

- Regulate the control and use of short stay rental accommodation.
- Ensure an appropriate standard of management of such accommodation
- Implement a registration and renewal requirement of such accommodation
- Set a 'maximum stay' duration for customers

The draft policy also states registration would be required and that, "the owner or appointed agent of any private property must not advertise, use, or allow to be used, the private property for Short Stay Rental Accommodation, unless the private property is currently registered with council under this Local Law."

Other new additions to the draft Local Law include:

Bees: An owner or occupier of private property must, within seven days of becoming aware of the existence of an unmanaged European beehive or hives on the land, take steps to cause that hive or those hives to be removed.

Display of vehicles on a road or municipal place: A person must not display a vehicle, caravan, boat or any other thing for sale on a road or municipal place.

Spoil on roads from vehicles: A person must not allow any soil, earth, mud, clay, liquid waste or like substance to fall or escape onto a road from any vehicle which they are driving.

'I was sick of running, of being hunted.'

'I knew how to pull apart a gun and reassemble it with devastating efficiency.'

David recounts his harrowing ordeal, but what he highlights is you do not have time to suffer emotionally in those scenarios and instead he could only process the hardships when he arrived in Australia.

"Australia is lovely to refugees,

it has provided English lessons and trauma counselling, but the previous government was also very cruel," Felicia explained.

"We live in hope of the new government."

Embarking on the journey to Australia as a refugee is not an easy choice, and in most situations refugees are grateful for a safe roof over their head, they are also good citizens – working, paying taxes, integrating through community groups, the list is endless, yet Australia doesn't make it easy.

"It can be difficult for them to get a job.

"They have to keep reapplying for short term visas and often don't know if or when they will be kicked out.

"We have to live in hope.

"One gentleman has been here for 10 years, he is recognised as a refugee, but he hasn't been given permanent residency."

This year SGRAR are raising money for one man, Z\*, and his family.

Z escaped the Taliban 10 years ago and has been separated by his family since.

Being of Hazara ethnicity, his family remain in extraordinary danger – his daughter is not allowed to study, whilst the ISIS-bombs explode around their town.

Screening the acclaimed and award-winning film 'Flee' on Sunday June 19 (2pm Wonthaggi Union Theatre), SGRAR are raising funds for food, rent, to buy passports and for flights to get his family to Australia.

Celebrate the strengths and achievements of refugees as

well as their courage and ingenuity for having survived.

Many famous refugees, who came by boat, are helping shape Australia for the better.

Anh Do, an award-winning author, lawyer, comedian and artist, and Professor Munjed Al Mundaris, who ran from persecution under Saddam Hussain's Iraq, is an orthopaedic surgeon, author and human rights advocate, to name but two.

There are courageous survivors on our doorstep with a South Sudanese family who escaped the South Sudan Wars, starvation and hardships.

There are also some forty Karen refugees who escaped the Burmese army and now call Wonthaggi home, having purchased their own homes and many obtaining Australian citizenship.

# ‘Citizen scientists’ to help protect fur seals

USING drone technology, marine scientists have captured thousands of photographs of seal colonies at Seal Rocks off Phillip Island, and The Skerries near Mallacoota.

With the help of budding conservationists via an online portal, these images will be used to identify new pups and entangled seals.

This count data is vital for ecosystem monitoring, and for the ongoing protection of this species.

Now in its fifth year, Phillip Island Nature Parks Marine Scientist Rebecca McIntosh said the SealSpotter Challenge is growing in popularity, with people from more than 90 countries identifying more than 120,000 seals last year, a tally that includes counting each photo up to 10 times for accuracy.

“Together, the two colonies are home to about 30,000 seals, which is a big proportion of the species,” Dr McIntosh said.

“We learn so much from using drones.”

The SealSpotter Challenge is also used to see how many seals are entangled in marine plastics like fishing line and bags.

The SealSpotter challenge will start on June 8 and run until June 22.

Korumburra Round Table news

## It's Korumburra but not as we know it

IT'S all happening in Korumburra as this report from President of the Korumburra Round Table, Pee-Wee Lewis, indicates.

Community Hub, rail trail, streetscape, station restoration... it's go, go, go!

"Well, as promised, we had Council's Manager of Infrastructure Delivery, Jareth Goss, attend our Round Table meeting a week ago, and it was great to hear about the latest progress on all of Korumburra's current projects," said Mrs Lewis in her report from this month's meeting.

"The Korumburra Hub, on the old kindergarten site, is moving along quickly now. The floor on the top deck has been poured, the walls are going up, and in the next few weeks, the lift will be in. The project is still on track to be finished at the end of the year and hopefully operating from about February next year.

"Little Commercial Street is progressing, with the bottom section having been completed, and work now commencing on Boston Lane, which is currently closed off to traffic. A bitumen seal will be laid over the whole road once it is completed, and the finishing date for the street is around the end of spring this year.

"The restoration of our magnificent railway station building is to commence any day, and the Station Working group, known as The Station @ Korumburra (TS@K) will be calling a meeting around August of people interested in coming up with ideas for the use of the station, once it has been restored. Keep an eye on

their FB page or watch this space as the time comes closer.

"The Commercial Street streetscape will be the final piece of the puzzle to be completed. The Round Table and the Korumburra Business Association are extremely keen to have the powerlines installed underground all the way up the main street, with the latter group having written a submission to the Shire Budget process for consideration of the undergrounding.

"However, at this stage it remains unbudgeted for and unlikely, which is disappointing. We also learnt that moving the traffic lights to the Radovick Street intersection – a decision for VicRoads, not the Shire – is a low priority for VicRoads and hence also unlikely.

"There was also discussion of electric car charging stations - two likely to be installed up behind Kelly's Bakery where there is easy access to Shire-controlled, metered power.

"Also, the final bridge on the Rail Trail between Korumburra and Loch is almost complete, with work then commencing on the two bridges between Loch and Nyora, which will then complete that section of the trail.

"And finally, on the supermarket to be constructed in King Street (opposite the bottom petrol station), settlement on the land that has been sold by the shire to IGA is still on track for June next year, or earlier if agreed, which allows plenty of time to move everything from the library and Historical Society to our brand-new Hub.

"Rug up, everyone! Cannot believe how quickly the winter winds blew in."

The grant from the government's Sports and Recreation Victoria, Local Sport Infrastructure Fund will allow the \$575,500 project to come to fruition, with council committing to fund the remaining \$325,500.

Bass Coast Shire Mayor Cr Michael Whelan said it was a fantastic outcome for the local community.

"The Kilcunda Community Association has been very proactive in advocating for this project, identifying it over six years ago as a high priority for the town," Cr Whelan said.

value in this project. The skate park and playspace will become a wonderful asset for Kilcunda."

The design for the skate park and playspace has been developed over the past 12 months by skate and play specialist Playce, in consultation with a working group of local residents and the Kilcunda Community Association.

The accessible design includes a skate park with a

bowl and roll in for beginners, a deep end for more advanced skaters, slappy kerb, water fall and pier seven ledge.

The facility will also feature a shelter with seating and an accessible ramp entrance from both the Bass Coast Rail Trail and the foreshore.

The playspace will include a natural feeling space with timber and rock features, along with traditional play

elements for climbing, sliding and swinging.

The project will also include landscaping works, with some minor vegetation removal, however, the existing Norfolk Island Pine which creates shade will be kept. Additional trees and garden beds will be planted to act as landscape buffers around the play and skate areas. Seating, paths, a water fountain, bins and bike racks will also be installed.

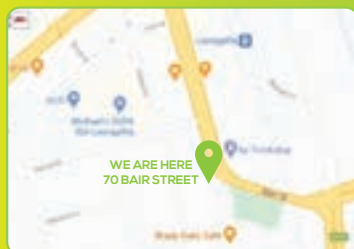

## Rehabilitation groups return

BASS Coast Health (BCH) is making sure the community recovers from illness and surgery by reintroducing groups for patients with cardio and respiratory conditions.

The cardio group assists people with a range of conditions through a tailored program of cardio and weight exercises at Wonthaggi Hospital.

The cardio groups are held at Wonthaggi on Tuesdays from 1pm to 3.30pm, and at the Phillip Island Health Hub on Wednesdays from 1pm to 3.30pm.

Patient Deb Watson recently completed the eight-week cardio course and credits the program with assisting her recovery.

"The exercises are all dependent on where you are at in your recovery and may include the walker, exercise bike, stepper, weights and resistance band," she said.

Deb, who is also president of the BCH Inverloch Art Show Auxiliary, took part in the group after a triple bypass.

"The depression that is associated with heart surgery is very common and to have a social element to the group is very encouraging, as patients get to interact with each other and staff too," she said.

"That's really important for your recovery. I feel way, way better."

Another participant, Barry Cocks, suffered a major heart attack in January and subsequently had a pacemaker installed.

"It will take 12 to 18 months to get back to a standard where I can do things again but in the meantime I'm finding this group great," he said.

"It's informative and the physiotherapists and nurses are fantastic. Mentally, this group helps because I have a support system around me."

Pulmonary rehabilitation clinics are also available to people with chronic lung conditions, such as chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, emphysema and pulmonary fibrosis.

With education and exercise components, pulmonary rehabilitation aims to help clients improve their breathing and overall wellbeing, reduce flare-ups and keep people out of hospital.

Clinics for the eight-week program are held at Phillip Island Health Hub at Cowes on Wednesday mornings and at Wonthaggi Hospital on Thursday mornings.

To access the cardio and respiratory groups, patients are required to submit a referral from their specialist or GP to Bass Coast Health's referral coordination team by emailing [access@basscoasthealth.org.au](mailto:access@basscoasthealth.org.au). Patients can also self-refer.

## Amongst his kingdom in Cowes

THE state's best budding gardeners living in public and community housing have been recognised as part of the annual Victoria in Bloom competition, and one of those was Phillip Island's very own Wayne Clarke, taking home the Best First Year Entered Garden.

"I actually entered as a bit of a joke," Wayne explained.

"I grew up on a farm in South Australia – mixed dairy and beef.

"Even then we were growing our own vegies – not that I wanted to – but if you wanted to eat, you had to go and work for it."

From station work to agricultural, machinery driving and harvesting across Australia, veggie gardens always found their way into Wayne's life.

"Very bleak looking places you end up sleeping in – a camp cottage sort of thing you might say.

"I've always had a garden, a busy garden of some description, provided I was there long enough.

"If it was only a fly in job, I didn't bother too much."

Filled with vegetables, with a few flowers around the outside for the owner's wife to brighten her day.

"I lost my leg in 2000; I

worked for about 18 months after.

"Little things got too hard because I had an artificial limb; subsequently, I came down to Pakenham to live with a mate of mine on a 100-acre bush block.

"Whilst it wasn't a nice place to have a garden, I put one in.

"I did a lot of other work as it wasn't suitable for me as a disabled person in a wheelchair.

"I turned the hillside into a piece of flat land with free soil from a nearby subdivision.

"The opportunity was there so I grabbed it.

"I've lived like that most of my life."

Moving to Cowes 12 years ago, Wayne rebuilt the backyard and front garden – making it wheelchair-friendly.

"When I moved in, there was a bit of grass and steps.

"I rebuilt the verandah. They were going to pull it down and I said, 'Don't do that boys, I'll fix that.'

"Which over time I did – I turned it into a usable place for a disabled bloke in a wheelchair.

"This is my little kingdom."

Over the years, Wayne has adapted and fixed up his home to last him forever.

"These places are pretty

drab when you move in – I've done all the flooring myself, got the carpet done, put up the blinds.

"I've got a philosophy – if you've got something you think you can't do at the time, take a break, think about it.

"And that's how I manage to get things done."

Wayne's garden is filled with flowers and seedlings – from delphiniums to orchids, his can-do attitude giving him independence and finding adaptable solutions to get the job done.

"I do most of my garden from seed.

"At the moment I'm healthy and fit, and the only reason is I do it myself – I don't get any home help, other than maybe window cleaning."

It's not uncommon to see Wayne on his way from Mitre 10, his trolley loaded with mulch and soil as he wizzes by or on the bus back from Buntings surrounded by bulbs and plants.

"Here I am stacked up, I've got a plant sitting in a shopping bag, I've got another shopping bag hanging off the other leg with four orchids in it, and I travel by public transport everywhere.

"Jack of all, master of none.

"I have a go at anything. If I don't succeed, I stop, have a think and have another go.

"Most things I've managed to get up – but if it doesn't, I couldn't tell you what it was because I'll never do it again!

"My worst part is I don't read the instructions properly, or I put them in the wrong time of year.

"My favourite plant is Fountain Grass – it's beautiful.

"I'm trying out two or three things this year that I've never done before – calendula, butterfly weed...

"Cardinal Creeper, a green leaf with a bright star shaped flower – very attractive, but I tell you what when it takes off, it goes.

"It's like a bushfire - you're forever trying to prune the thing to keep it under control."

Minister for Housing Richard Wynne said the Victoria in Bloom entrants are always outstanding and this year was no different.

"Gardens have the power to bring people and entire communities together and we have heard some remarkable stories as part of this year's competition about how gardening has provided solace over the last two years," Mr Wynne said.

## Korumburra facelift taking shape

THE \$1,821,025 Korumburra Streetscape Project is progressing with works underway to improve Little Commercial Street.

The contract was awarded at South Gippsland Shire's November meeting last year, with works then commencing in late January.

The multi-stage project aims to revitalise the Korumburra CBD.

It includes redevelopment of parts of Little Commercial Street, Commercial Street and "Upper Commercial Street" in the railway land.

The streetscape works will complement the Korumburra Community Hub, which is currently under construction, and improve the visual appeal and functionality of Little Commercial Street, between Bridge Street and Radovick Street.

The shire advised that the Little Commercial Street area will be impacted by construction for most of 2022.

Works are being completed in a staged manner, with each section to be completed to be made available for public use before moving on to the next.

Construction work will move gradually through the site from Radovick Street, through to Mine Road as progress is made.

The Upper Commercial Street works involve construction of a new carpark, with at least 30 new parking spaces and associated infrastructure in the Korumburra Railway Station Precinct.

The carpark will service the adjacent commercial area and users of the Great Southern Rail Trail.

Streetscape works in Commercial Street are planned to follow the Little Commercial Street and Upper Commercial Street works.

The project are being completed by ACE Earthmoving, based in Mirboo North.

### Why it's time to cry over spilt milk

BINDING agreements for the ownership and supply of most of Australia's exported natural gas, for a relative pittance, were signed with state-owned Chinese companies as far back as 2002.

It's not a surprise. It's a disgrace.

It's a tragic indication of the calibre of people we have running governments in this country. Local, State and Federal.

And it's not going to be fixed anytime soon. Now they're talking about rolling back the restrictions on coal seam gas fracking so that more gas can be produced, to "solve" the problem, when we're already the biggest exporter of LNG in the world.

We say 'tragic' because there's no doubt that old, frail and sick people will die in their homes this winter because of the massive hikes in gas and energy prices when the community has been crying out for bipartisan agreement on energy policy for years.

It's a failure for which all sides of government are responsible.

But it's not an isolated issue, sadly. Last week we were told that the COVID-19 pandemic is causing a severe shortage of another critical product used to perform routine but potentially life-saving patient scans and procedures at hospital – dye.

Hospitals in the US report being low on "contrast material", a fluid that is injected into patients intravenously to make CT scans and MRIs readable; likely to be a problem here as well. It also allows doctors to identify clots in the heart and brain.

The shortage stems from COVID-19 factory shutdowns in Shanghai, where most of the supply of the ingredient is made.

We've had other examples too, like the shortage of the diesel additive, AdBlue, mostly imported from China and Russia, which threatened to shut down the entire transport sector in Australia.

And there are many other supply chain issues which are impacting all aspects of our life and work in Australia.

Now, we can't produce everything here, but we certainly have to take a more strategic approach to the things we want to produce and dairy products must certainly be one of the ones that's protected and supported by government legislation.

We've seen the sort of angst that a shortage of baby formula in the US has caused in recent months.

But the future of Australia's dairy industry is by no means assured.

We've heard during the week that Queensland's dairy sector is on the verge of collapsing as hard-pressed operators exit the industry in the face of rising costs and slow-to-respond increases in income.

So, it's pleasing that during the past week, milk companies have announced opening prices above \$8 per kg MS. But, together with government, they have to do more to secure this vital industry.

And government could start by legislating a fair price for fresh milk on the supermarket shelves and making it law that the difference between the \$1.30 per litre the supermarkets are prepared to accept, and the real price is passed on directly to the farmers.

For goodness sake, Coca-Cola costs \$2.84 per litre!!

### Political pressure on farm fence 'error'

Two months ago, the State Government widely distributed a draft Bass Coast Statement of Planning Policy clearly outlining proposed landscape planning controls.

This is a very serious document as the State Government proposes to legislate to have the proposals become law. Many of the Government proposals will adversely affect farmers in Bass Coast and have been of great concern since the document was released.

As a farmer and fencing contractor in Bass Coast, I have taken a close interest in the government's proposals. The document was drafted by officers from the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning and without doubt, would have been subjected to close scrutiny throughout its formation and prior to its release.

It would have certainly been signed off by government prior to public release. This is of course understandable as it is for proposed legislation.

Indeed, the declaration of an area under the Act triggers the requirement for the Minister for Planning to prepare a Statement of Planning Policy (SPP) for the declared area.

Among the issues of great concern to farmers was the following on page 22 and I quote direct from the document: "A permit is required to construct a fence. This does not apply to a post and rail fence up to 1.8 metres in height".

The document was under development for two years yet only two months was given for public submissions. On May 18, 2022 the major rural paper in Victoria, the Weekly Times ran a front page story headlined, Farms Under Fire and highlighted amongst other things, the requirement for farmers to gain a permit before building a fence on the Bass Coast (Page 1).

The government did not refute this story or others which have circulated since the proposals were released two months ago.

Many farmers in Bass Coast contacted the Liberal Party candidate for Bass, Aaron Brown, asking him to take up the matter on their behalf which he certainly did. As a result, the present Labor MP for Bass Jordan Crugnale responded by saying that the requirement to obtain a permit for a farm fence was, and I quote: "A drafting error".

It was no drafting error, but knowing Ms Crugnale is under serious challenge, the government has clearly moved to kill off their clumsy attempt to make farmers obtain a permit before building a farm fence and in doing so have effectively thrown the public servants from DELWP under the tractor. How pathetic. Aaron Brown obviously has the local

member under pressure but instead of effectively accusing DELWP public servants of making a "drafting error" she should simply have stated the government would withdraw this totally unreasonable proposal. This is not the end of the matter and I understand Mr Brown is pursuing the other issues of great concern to local farmers. Well done Mr Brown, keep up the good work.

# Strong show of solidarity for National Sorry Day

THE community came together for National Sorry Day to share stories, learn, heal, and explore how to move forward in truth and understanding. Well over 120 people attended the event on Thursday, May 26, at the Nobbies Ocean Discovery Centre to acknowledge the strength from survivors of the Stolen Generations and their families who carry with them grief and ongoing impacts with them today. The event was opened by Traditional Owner Auntie Sonia Weston and Joseph Eiszele from the Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation, with a personal introduction to country and a customary smoking ceremony to cleanse bad spirits from the past for a better future. The inaugural National Sorry Day was held in Australia on May 26, 1998, one year

after the first “Bringing Them Home” report, an inquiry into the past policies that led to the removal of children from their families and communities. While this date carries great significance for the Stolen Generations and their families, it is also commemorated by Australians right around the country. Event host Patrice Mahoney OAM, said that Sorry Day is the hardest day for Aboriginal people apart from January 26, explaining that Sorry Day is like the “funeral” and National Reconciliation Week is like the “wake”. “This day is about you coming into our space; this is a culturally safe space, a space held by Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander peoples, and today is about you

coming into our space and listening to our life experiences and history, which can be hard to voice,” said Patrice. Uncle Anthony Egan, Auntie Doseena Fergie, and Auntie Beverly Munro, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Elders, bravely shared their life experiences of racism, losing their connection to family, identity, and culture. Grief that continues today. “My great-great grandmother was taken in the 1850s and some of her children were also Stolen Generation including my great grandmother. From my mother’s generation, there was a denial and trying to hide their Indigenous heritage, I didn’t know that I had Indigenous heritage until I was 15,” said Auntie Bev. “Help us make everyone else aware that there are Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander

people in this community who are brave, resilient, and very strong.” This year, the National Reconciliation Week (NRW) theme is Be Brave. Make Change a challenge; to Be Brave and tackle the unfinished business of reconciliation and to Make Change for the benefit of all Australians, change starts in your daily life – where you live, work, play, and socialise. The Sorry Day event was put together by members of the Bass Coast Reconciliation Network in collaboration with the community, who invite everyone to come together this NAIDOC week in July, for a Reconciliation Bridge Walk that was postponed during National Reconciliation Week due to poor weather. I once was an alcoholic, drug addict, suicidal and a self-harmer. I tried many ways to get myself on track or at least have some sort of normalcy in my life - nothing worked. I tried lots of ways. I can't at this point tell you what got me into that situation as that's for another day but what I can tell you is, that nothing worked.

Nothing could save me nor give me peace at night or give me any hope. It was an endless cycle that I kept rotating around. But then I was introduced to Jesus Christ, the Saviour of the world and He showed me a different way.

He brought order into my life where before there was only chaos. He gave me a purpose and a meaning to live where before I was hopeless. He showed me a different way of life. So, getting back to my original question, 'Have you ever wondered why some people do not change or compromise their faith?' This is why. He turned my life around so why would I give credit to someone or something else for the change in my life. Why would I compromise my faith? I cannot and will not. How is your faith going?

# Life behind the Red Cross Meritorious Service Award

"IT WAS during the first lockdown," Peter Jones said, as he recalls his recent Australian Red Cross Meritorious Service Award.

"There was a piece in the Sentinel about the Red Cross - ringing the vulnerable to see if they're okay.

"I rang the lady up and started talking and found out she was the call centre coordinator.

"I said I'd been in IT, and she asked if I knew anything about spreadsheets, and I said, 'Yeah, I know about spreadsheets.'

"She said, 'We've got a bit of a problem - we're training up new people to work on the phones, but the data that we're getting out is all jumbled up.

"It takes eight hours to filter the spreadsheet.

"Things like putting in the wrong postcode - they had to go through and check all the post codes and for example, if someone wanted nappies, what sort of nappies, animal food - what animals do they have?

"All of these little things that weren't up to scratch at that stage.

"So, she sent me down the spreadsheet, and I said look, this is not a spreadsheet thing.

"This is more of a Microsoft Access database.

"After about five, six weeks, I did it pretty well full time, we got it sorted out.

"I honestly thought at the beginning that it was only a temporary thing until they got themselves working.

"I gave it to them and it just disappeared - obviously it worked.

"Then about a year later, they said, 'Oh, you've got an award.'

"I found out that the eight hours have gone down to 15 minutes a day."

But how did a Kiwi from Inverloch with dyslexia find the solution to a worldwide organisation's dilemma?

"My wife and I met in Scotland traveling around - a working holiday.

"We returned to New Zealand and were in Christchurch, I was

applying for these jobs and there was an opening for a computer operator."

With little to no experience in the industry, Peter jumped on-board as a junior computer operator.

"I found out later they needed a male who was over 25 because it was night shift by yourself.

"About three or four weeks later, the head operator left, so I got that job.

"And then about three or four months later, they asked me if I'd go upstairs and do the installation of the software - there was no computers back in those days, no hard disk drives.

"By the time I got up there, two weeks later, the guy had gone.

"Here's a room full of goodies go for it - that's how I got in it."

A project manager for IBM, Peter has contracted most of his working life since.

"I'm not a programmer. They used to call me a Polyfilla."

Standing beside Peter is his beautiful wife, Kaye, a born and breed woman in Yarram, whom he met on the Scottish slopes.

"We went to Aviemore in Scotland because they had a ski field," Peter said, reminiscing on their early days.

"We both worked in a hotel, and she had a five-pound allowance and I thought that was alright..."

"We got on and then hitchhiked all through Europe."

"I worked in London, prior to Scotland," Kaye added.

After spending the season on the slopes, the pair headed to Dorchester-on-Thames and worked in the local pub.

"The pub was about 300 years old - it was beautiful - a little village."

"(I remember) this Rolls Royce pulled into the car park - a man got out he looked like WC Fields, he had this big red nose and a top hat.

"They were on their way home from Ascot - the horse had won - he was absolutely pickled.

"He enjoyed the food and said, 'excellent, bring the cook out', we get the chef and he comes out and he slaps £10 in his hand.

"This is 1978 - where you didn't earn much money.

"You've got a little lady washing dishes?"

"Well, no, it's a little man."

"Bring him out!"

Kaye then cleaned the gentleman's tie after he promptly spilt

something and was rewarded with £5.

"There's a group of young guys nearby saying can we do anything!"

Coming home overland, Kaye and Peter planned on coming through Kathmandu, but their plans were abruptly halted in Greece.

"We met up with a couple of guys Simon and Dominic, Oxford scholars, and they were in touch with home and said, 'did you heard the Shah of Iran has been deposed and they're shooting tourist buses and bombing tourist hotels - we ended up having to go back to London and fly home...' Kaye said.

"A ferry was supposed (to take us to Turkey for our flight to London) but because the Greeks and the Turks hated each other, nobody bothered to let the Greeks know that it wasn't coming.

"We'd changed all our money to Turkish, so in the end, we slept on the beach, buried everything in the sand.

"Woke up in the morning and there's all these other people popping up - there must have been about 20 people sleeping on the beach!"

The pair have embarked on journeys near and far, had careers that have taken them on adventures, have two puppies, Holly and Zoe, and after 44 years together, there is no surprise they've dedicated time to multiple organisations including BlazeAid, Gippsland Farmer Relief, Probus, Inverloch Community House and 3mFM to name but a few.

"I volunteered for the Community House and one of the things that I noticed was that it was all run by volunteers.

"I wrote this program that did Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, all on one spot.

"So people didn't have to know how to run the spreadsheet or know how to use Word to print out business cards and things. The program just does it for you."

## Keeping youth engaged and enjoying country life

A PROGRAM that helps young people in the Foster district to stay engaged and enjoy country life has defied COVID-19 lockdowns and is set to flourish thanks to a funding boost.

Manna Gum Community House has used \$5000 from the Gardiner Foundation Community Grants Program in partnership with the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal to maintain the youth group's impetus after a pilot program was impacted by COVID-19 lockdowns.

Manna Gum manager Bec Matthews said the youth group and after-school space provided a vital outlet for young people as they emerge from lockdowns.

"We've got to make sure our young people are staying here and having a positive experience living in regional areas," Ms Matthews said.

The Gardiner Foundation Community Grant and other financial support allowed the youth program to continue

during COVID, even though it had to operate remotely during lockdowns.

"Every time the schools were in lockdown we couldn't run it, but we sustained the core group of kids," Ms Matthews said.

"We had grant money to run the program so we supported young people in other ways, such as dropping off packages and doing what we could remotely, but fundamentally it is about people being together."

Ms Matthews said the program aimed to overcome a lack of local social activities for young people outside of sporting arenas.

"We wanted an informal place for young people to create their own space," she said.

There is some mentoring from group coordinator Tracey James and volunteers but young people are encouraged to take the lead.

"Tracey has developed the

program by listening and responding to the young people who attend the group and has a great rapport with them, which has really been the foundation of the program's success," she said.

"Young people contributed to the design of the area and what they want to do and it's really working because it has been based on what the kids want," Ms Matthews said.

The program was originally targeted at 12 to 25-year-olds, but it mostly attracted young people aged around 12 and 13. It has been expanded to include 11-year-olds.

"It's mainly those going into year 7 and becoming teenagers," Ms Matthews said.

"What's really lovely is that we find kids that don't normally hang out together at schools connect and there are friendships across different age groups."

Now in its 20th year, the Gardiner Foundation Community Grants Program is delivered by the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal (FRRR).

THE GROVE Gippsland specialises in producing Krowera Hills extra virgin olive oil, free from additives and farmed with organic principles, bursting with fruity flavour and a pepper finish.

Six varieties of olive are grown at The Grove, with the produce of its 1,700 trees hand-picked, and now crushed on site with a recently purchased press.

While some of the olives are suited to both oil and eating, such as Manzanillo and Kalamata, all are used for oil.

Other varieties grown are Frantoia, Leccino, Nevadilla Blanco, Pendolino and Corregiola.

The Grove Gippsland uses a cold press approach, pressing its olives just once.

Sediment is allowed to settle over a month with the clear olive oil then siphoned off.

No pesticides are used on the olive crop and there are no chemicals in the pressing process.

Once harvested, the olives are simply cleaned and destalked before being crushed.

Krowera Hills extra virgin olive oil is ideal for use in dressings and can be used for frying.

"It's beautiful drizzled over cooked food and if we're doing steaks at the restaurant we'll have a drizzle of olive oil after the salt and pepper and that's all the seasoning we'll give our steaks," operations manager Tracey Kinnaird said.

While storms reduced the size of this year's crop, the quality of the oil is excellent.

"The wind ripped off flower buds reducing the quantity of fruit but we've managed to get some amazing oil," Tracey said.

Harvest time has recently taken place and is usually around June.

As well as adding delicious flavour to your food, the aromatic olive oil is high in mono-unsaturated fatty acids and polyphenols which help lower cholesterol.

"I have a little bit as a tonic most days," Tracey said, commenting she often adds a little lemon juice when doing so.

With the oil providing its own delightful taste, The Grove Gippsland never adds additional flavourings to it.

As well as the chance to buy olive oil to take home, you can enjoy it at The Grove's restaurant, with experienced and passionate chef Nathan Harris featuring it in much of his cooking.

Local produce is used where possible.

The large venue is also a perfect setting for weddings.

The business is open on weekends between 12pm-3pm and is located at 27 Uren Road Krowera.

While The Grove is only open on weekends, sister restaurant Pearl, situated in Inverloch, operates six days a week and also has Krowera Hills extra virgin olive oil available to buy.

STYLISH and comfortable living doesn't always come in a large package, with tiny houses continuing to grow in popularity, a trend Korumburra's Base Cabin has embraced and helped drive.

The business started in Mirboo North, relocating early this year.

Co-director Dave Clark previously built full-sized architect-designed homes, with his move into tiny houses inspired by a visit to America and Canada.

Dave mentioned the idea of building tiny houses to friend and design enthusiast Ryan McCormack who came aboard as co-director.

Base Cabin's philosophy is to build architectural tiny homes using high end materials.

"We use nice marine ply and other timber surfaces, with attention to detail," Dave said.

The company's focus on high quality has resulted in it winning a gold medal in the 2020 Good Design Awards, as well as being a finalist in Victorian Premier's Design Awards the previous year.

The eye-catching design and impressive finishes of Base Cabin's tiny houses have resulted in some appearing in publications such as Tiny Houses, and Green Magazine.

One Base Cabin house will receive extensive attention when it appears on the next series of The Block, with the winners of a challenge to enjoy a well-earned escape to the tiny house.

"You can visualise something and make it work," Dave said of creating such scaled-down houses, making it clear that their size doesn't have to limit your imagination or creativity.

However, it does require more organisation than a larger house in terms of coordinating those working on different aspects of a tiny house.

"You're working in a tight space and it's a challenge with lighting," Dave said.

Running his own electrical business in Leongatha, Geoff Giliam enjoys the challenge of working on tiny houses for Base Cabin.

"There's lots more in a small space but you fit most things you have in a house in a tiny house," Geoff said.

Carpentry apprentice Quin Aveling started out doing work experience at Base Cabin through school and is delighted he ended up working with tiny houses.

"It's cool watching them all get put together," Quin said, adding that the changing designs and opportunity for buyers to request some adjustments keep the projects interesting.

Once in place the tiny houses are secured on jack stands ensuring stability.

They are accompanied by freestanding decks, making it easy to relocate them should the need or desire arise.

Tiny houses are proving particularly popular on rural properties.

Base Cabin's petite but functional houses are in demand far afield, with a number of them having gone interstate.

One was collected on Thursday for its journey to South Australia.

Another is the house of a Noosa retiree.

Others are used as B&B accommodation.

Base Cabin's tiny houses start at \$70,000, but with many variables it is best to discuss your specific requirements.

Based on trailers, the tiny houses are treated like caravans rather than falling under normal building regulations.

## Bass River Dairies' award-winning milk from local farmers

BORN on the property, Loretta Mabin recalls living in a caravan in the shed whilst the family home was being built, her parents acquiring the property in 1967.

Retiring in 2010/2011 Loretta's parents stepped away from the day-to-day and leased to a share farmer for seven years.

Fast-forward, and Loretta and her partner, Richard Rowe, have turned the dairy on its head, milking the 200 head once a day with a low bulk milk cell count.

"We couldn't believe it!" Loretta exclaimed.

"We only had heifers initially and thought we might as well try once a day and see how it goes.

"Everyone gave us negative feedback – you'll be having high cell and your milk quality will be pretty ordinary.

"It was quite the opposite – we were getting pretty low bulk milk cell count.

"We finished our first season and got a milk quality award from it."

Luck of their first season was anything but, their girls a year older the pair recorded 34,000 bulk milk cell count the second, and that was not long after calving.

"I thought there has got to be a better way (than

milking twice a day and the Urea system) – I didn't like how the cows were functioning.

"When we arrived the calf rate was ordinary – an empty rate of 35% and that was over 12 weeks of joining.

"We got it down to 8 weeks of joining, one of those weeks was sex semen and 13% empty.

"This season we got it down to 9% - eight weeks and two weeks of sex semen.

With a goal of 220-230 head, Loretta and Richard do not want to push the system, especially as they transition to regenerative farming.

"We spoke with a milk mate who thinks outside the box and started multi-species crops - it was gorgeous to watch.

"With the biodiversity you don't have to use pesticides – you see the lady beetles and bees.

"We found the cows loved it and it got us through summer.

"Our grass is nutrient dense, without fertilisers – even our neighbours have noticed the difference in the cows.

"Our in-calf rate is fantastic, and we have defined seasons."

Producing high quality milk and partnering with

Bass River Dairies was purely by chance.

"Annette and Adam were drying off and wanted a break," Loretta said.

"They told Glen we were in the top 2 in the Saputo Magazine in Gippsland.

"Glen rang straight away and that's how it evolved.

"At one stage we didn't think we could supply as our fats and proteins are so high, but they worked with it."

Bass River Dairies Non-Homogenised Whole Milk was awarded a Gold medal at this year's DIAA Dairy Products Competition (Class 59).

"Mum and Dad would be proud as punch up there – they won milk quality awards in 1999 and 2000, including gold.

"Dad loved the dairy – he lived for it and was deeply involved in every aspect.

"It's nice to get the cows back to where they were.

"Supplying milk to Glen is a point of difference, it's more personal.

"Devlin took his mate to Bassine – he was proud as punch!

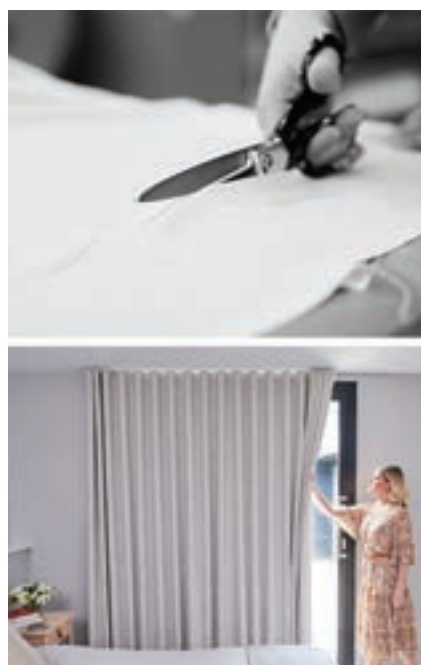
"Credit to Loretta for high quality milk production, and good to know our respectful handling has not caused damage to their beautiful milk," Kaye Courtney of Bass River Dairies said.

GLaWAC has a membership base of more than 600 Traditional Owners, representing approximately 3000 Gunaikurnai people from five major clans.

Other industry members on the One Gippsland Board include Food and Fibre Gippsland, Destination Gippsland, Federation University and TAFE Gippsland.

Bass Coast Shire Council, Baw Baw Shire Council, East Gippsland Shire Council, Latrobe City Council and South Gippsland Shire Council are member councils.

# T-bone road rescue simulation for Wonthaggi SES

'A BLUE Mazda has t-boned a white ute – the driver is trapped.'

Words flow over the radio, the crew is calm and collected, and ready for anything that they may face at the scene.

With many roads across Bass Coast Shire now having reduced speed limits, there are less MVAs (Motor Vehicle Accidents) that require emergency services to attend to across the shire.

However, when rescue is required to a "persons trapped incident", the nearest Road Rescue provider is dispatched.

The Emergency Management Victoria State Road Crash Rescue Arrangements (2017) oversees and sets the standards, procedures, operating systems, governance and protocols that all road crash rescue providers must abide to.

For Wonthaggi SES, that means acknowledging the page within four minutes, responding within eight minutes and having at least two Road Crash Rescue (RCR) accredited individuals on board.

"We train to have our best day on their worst day," SES East Region Casual Trainer and Wonthaggi SES Unit Controller Jarrod Hargreaves explains.

"We want to minimise the impact of devastation."

Whilst on the way to the job, Jarrod briefs the crew.

Running over several scenarios, they research the make and model of the car/s (where possible) and prepare for what they may come across.

Arriving on scene, it is all systems go.

"The type of impact and patient's injuries will depend on the access and extrication plan used," Regional Operations Officer (East), Jennifer Harden explains.

"Continuous communication and engagement are key on scene with all emergency services personnel."

With many moving parts and specialised tools, it is essential members know exactly what is happening at all times.

"Before anything else, the crew undertakes a Dynamic Risk Assessment, and then the vehicles are stabilised – this is checked multiple times throughout the event.

"In tonight's training, the crew are taking the b pillar and door off, the driver's feet are not trapped, but often we will have to perform a dash roll or dash lift to release trapped feet."

Using spreaders, cutters, the combi and hooligan tool, members take a systematic approach.

"We have to be incredibly careful of undeployed air

bags – often we will isolate the battery to stop them deploying, but it really depends on the incident at hand, as sometimes we may need the battery connected to move electric components within the vehicle.

"Ensuring everyone on scene is safe and not just the patient (but all the emergency personnel).

"Any sharp exposed metal parts are covered with sharps protection – orange, fire retardant, magnetic items that come in an array of sizes.

"We also have a mental health peer session."

Crews run a debrief after each incident, ensuring the mental health and wellbeing of each member, and identify any learnings that the crews may need to fix, any equipment that may need replacing, etc.

Additionally, every two years a qualified mental health team called PEER visit each unit for training.

PEER may also be required to visit immediately after traumatic events.

"The SES are big on mental health and wellbeing – making sure there are no signs of PTSD."

Whether a patient self-extricates, or they are carried off on a spinal board (as demonstrated in Tuesday evening's

training), SES works closely with Ambulance Victoria to find the safest means of helping and extracting the patient.

Across Bass Coast and South Gippsland, the RCR Emergency Management Gippsland Region includes Fish Creek CFA, Leongatha SES, Loch CFA, Mirboo North CFA, Phillip Island SES, San Remo SES, Wonthaggi SES and Yarram SES (Wellington Shire).

Wonthaggi SES is very proud to have recently welcomed new members Jessy Stanley and Gurt Els on board, and have received the new women's attire.

Wonthaggi SES and other SES units in the shire are volunteers and provide a service 24/7.

Units across the state are always looking for more members to join to maintain capacity and build capabilities across the service.

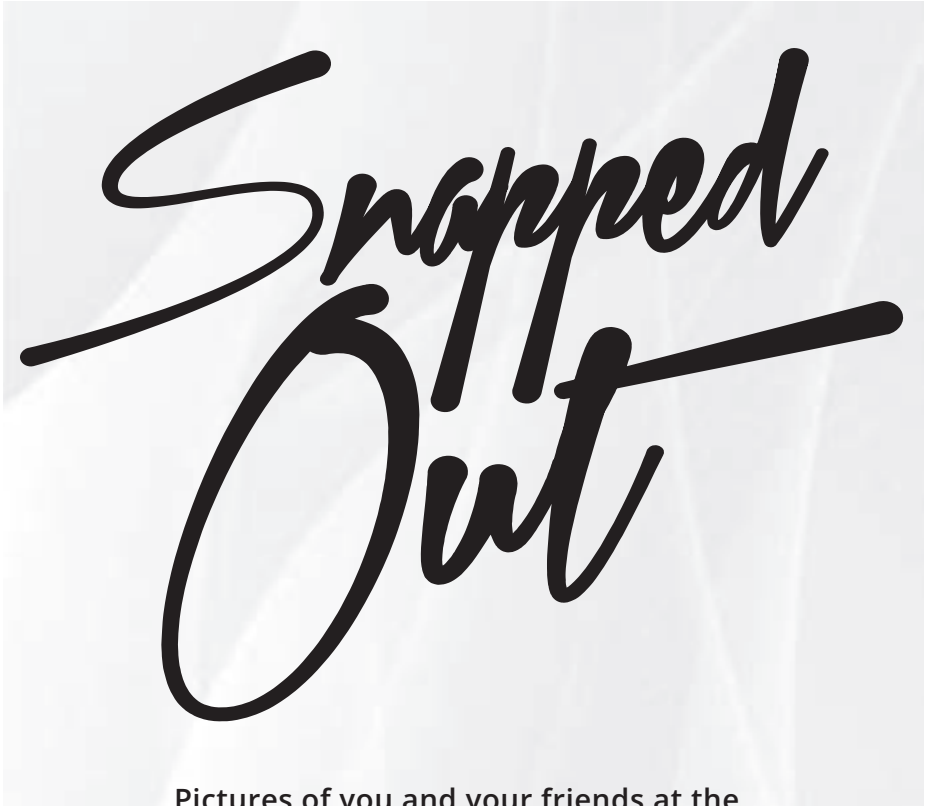

## CHICKEN Marbella

By Meg Viney

THIS week's recipe is delicious - it addresses all 5 taste buds - sweet, sour, bitter, salty, umami. I make this when time is short because it is marinated ahead of time and the cooking is easy.

Accompaniment is egg fettuccine, which is tossed in the sauce left over after the baking. Adjust the quantities for your guest numbers.

### Ingredients

- 10 chicken thighs, bone in, skin on
- ½ cup fresh oregano (or marjoram), chopped
- ½ cup red wine vinegar
- ¼ cup olive oil 1 cup pitted prunes
- ½ cup green olives (add a little of the brine)
- ½ cup capers (add a little of the brine)

### Method

Marinate the chicken in one layer, for up to 2 days, covered and in the fridge. Do not turn.

Prior to cooking, pour over 1/2 cup white wine and sprinkle with about 1/3 cup of brown sugar.

Place in a 180 oven for about 90 minutes. The liquid will be reduced and the skin golden and crisp

Fifteen minutes before serving, boil plenty of fettuccine in boiling salted water.

Pour the juices from the chicken into a cup. Drain the fettuccine and pour in the juices and a drizzle of cream, then reduce the juices until they become a sauce.

Place the chicken on one side of a platter and the fettuccine on the other.

Serve immediately. I often serve a steamed green veg (broccoli or beans), tossed in a little butter, as a first course.

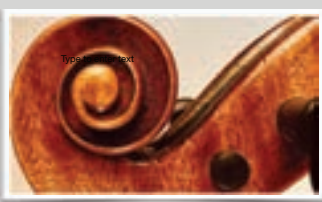

It is a lot of work for the nursery as every plant has to be labelled and priced, but the buyer is the winner as they save heaps and there is a huge variety from which to choose.

Most plants that lose their leaves in winter are available as a bare root.

The most popular are fruit trees and we see a huge variety of apples, apricots, peaches, pears, plums and more.

When buying fruit trees, it is important to check first whether the tree you are buying needs a pollinator.

Most plums, pears and apples need a pollinator, and you need to check that the varieties you are buying will pollinate each other.

If space is limited, you can plant two or even three varieties together.

This is better than buying multi grafted trees because unless you are an expert on trees and pruning, the stronger variety will dominate and often the weaker one will not survive.

Plus, you get the varieties you want.

As house blocks get smaller and people time poor, the latest trend is for more dwarf trees.

So now you can buy dwarf peach, apricot, apple, plum, nectarine and almond.

However, these trees will still put on vigorous growth if pruned in spring and so are better if pruned in summer after fruiting.

Winter is also the clean-up time in the garden.

After trees fruit trees have lost their leaves, it is time to spray.

Stone fruit such as peach and nectarines will benefit with a regular spray of copper to help prevent curly leaf in spring and apples also will benefit to prevent black spot.

After pruning roses spray with lime sulphur this is a very old fashioned and organic remedy being both a fungicide and insecticide, and does an extremely good job of controlling a wide range of problems.

It will help kill off the dormant spores of fungus that like to over winter in the ground as well as mites and rose scale.

Lime sulphur can also be used to prevent leaf curl and brown rot on nectarines and peaches, the downside is the smell (like rotten eggs).

This time of year we also see the availability of many of the old fashioned favourites like rhubarb, asparagus and berries.

Rhubarb is easy to grow and is perennial; the plant usually lasts from 10-15 years.

The crowns can be thinned or divided, and new clumps started every 4-5 years.

There are several varieties of rhubarb.

Some have red stems like Ever Red whilst others have green stems like Victoria.

The green stemmed varieties are just as reliable and tasty as the red. Rhubarb is low in kilojoules, high in vitamin C and calcium and has a moderate iron and fibre content.

It was once used as a mild laxative.

Never cook rhubarb in aluminium saucepans as the oxalic acid in the stems dissolves the protective layer normally found on these saucepans, forming a poisonous compound called aluminium oxalate.

Rhubarb's eating qualities were actually discovered long after the plant was cultivated.

For a couple of thousand years, the plant was grown solely for its medicinal qualities.

Chinese herbalists used the root of wild rhubarb as a purgative, and Marco Polo wrote about the plant in the accounts of his travels through China.

Not until 1778 did people learn that they could cook, and eat, the stems.

The stems must always be cooked before eating as the raw state is indigestible. Rhubarb leaves are high in oxalic acid.

In other words, they're poisonous, and if you manage to chew through around five kilograms of the things, they'll probably kill you.

However, possums are able to eat the leaves without being poisoned.

While rhubarb loves a reliable supply of moisture, the crown will quickly rot if conditions become waterlogged.

So in addition to a rich soil, a must for growing great rhubarb is drainage. Work in plenty of organic matter such as rotted manure or compost prior to planting.

Don't harvest any stalks for at least a full year from planting.

Give the young plant time to develop a decent sized crown, and you'll be amply rewarded.

Another popular vegetable available over the winter months is the humble potato.

They are available are seed potatoes and it is important to use certified seed potatoes to help stop the spread of disease in potatoes.

Potatoes are very easy to grow and are a rewarding crop. Garlic is still available to plant and another easy and rewarding crop to grow.

While there is not much in flower at this time of year there are quite a few trees that make a statement with their colourful bark and trunks.

One of the best is a Japanese maple called Sango Kaku (or better known as the coral bark maple).

This tree has attractive bright green foliage in spring and autumn which turn bright yellow with an orange tinge at autumn and then in winter the striking bark turns a bright red.

It is a real eye catcher for the garden. Silver birches and other varieties are birch are also grown for the white bark in winter and crepe myrtles also develop interesting bark as they age.

So embrace the cold, it will soon be spring and there is even more work to be done.

PLANTING season has begun at Bass Coast Landcare Network.

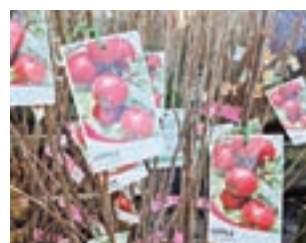
The first planting of the year at Corinella Foreshore saw 1300 plants put into the

## Shock decline for house prices

AUSTRALIAN home prices fell for the first time since the start of the pandemic, dropping -0.11% in May, as homeowners saw their first interest rate rise in more than a decade, according to the PropTrack Home Price Index.

Key findings of the report saw prices continued to decline in Melbourne (-0.27%), with other areas of Victoria seeing a decline of -0.32%.

Monthly price growth has slowed almost everywhere across the country, with regional areas seeing a flat result in May.

Many regional parts of the country, including WA (-0.43%) and QLD (-0.19%), recorded falls.

Adelaide and Brisbane were the strongest performing capitals over the month, with both markets bucking the trend and delivering continued growth in 2022.

Over the past year, growth standouts among the capitals have been Brisbane and Adelaide, while regional counterparts in QLD, NSW and Tasmania have led growth outside the capitals.

While May's housing market activity was disrupted by the federal election, price growth has been slowing for some time.

Annual price growth has fallen from 24% only six months ago to 14% now.

Conditions have now shifted rapidly from 2021.

This follows expectations of sharply higher interest rates in 2022, which will erode the affordability of existing prices.

The speed of official interest rate hikes and wages growth remain the key unknowns for price growth moving forward.

# Landlords put on notice over mould

WITH vacancy rates low in many parts of Australia, tenants say landlords are taking advantage of their market power by "letting mould run rampant and refusing to invest in mould removal".

However, tenants are then leaving scathing online reviews of the rental properties.

RentRabbit.com.au, which lets tenants leave reviews of places in which they've lived, gets contacted regularly by renters complaining about mould, according to co-founder Ben Pretty.

"Almost every day we receive comments from frustrated tenants who can't understand why landlords keep hiking their rent yet refuse to properly maintain their property," he said.

"The average tenant is a reasonable person who understands that, from time to time, problems will occur. In those situations, they quite rightly expect the landlord to take the problem seriously and solve it within a reasonable timeframe. If that happens, they appreciate

the landlord's service. But if it doesn't, they have every right to be upset.

"If mould is left untreated, it can cause serious health consequences. So, the feedback we get from renters is they believe landlords should have a legal obligation to disclose any known mould problems when advertising a property. Or if a mould infestation breaks out after they move in, they believe landlords should have a legal obligation to fix the problem, as part of their duty of care."

## Korumburra Hub on track for end of year completion

The Hub was designed by architects France-Jones Morehen Thorpe and will accommodate:

"The development of the Korumburra Community Hub is progressing well despite the various challenges currently facing the construction industry," a council spokesperson said.

"The project is on track for completion in late 2022, with user groups likely able to move in during early 2023."

Funding of \$5M was received from the state government's Community Infrastructure Loan Scheme and \$750,000 from the Living Libraries Infrastructure Fund.

# Emma Germano says ‘shop around’ for good veggie prices

PRESIDENT of the Victorian Farmer Federation, Emma Germano, said recently that consumers shouldn't neglect their local Farmers Markets when shopping around for fruit and vegetables at a competitive price.

And that was certainly the case at Churchill Island last Saturday when a number of local producers, and others from the nearby Mornington Peninsula and Yarra Valley tuned out with their own produce, freshly picked and packed ready for the day.

One of them was Jay Dunstan from Into The Roota Farm at Bena.

Hammered by the vicious storms that ravaged South Gippsland in June last year, Jay is back up and running and he's finding it hard to keep up with demand on his regular market circuit.

"If I'd known about what was going to happen with the floods in northern NSW and Queensland, I'd have put in a lot more rows," said Jay.

"Yes, we got hit hard last year ourselves, but we're back up

and going now and we can't keep up."

His supplies of locally grown cauliflower, broccoli, salad spinach and more had been virtually cleared off the stall by mid-morning at Churchill Island despite chilly weather, that somehow relented long enough for a successful market.

Market manager Melissa Burge said she was working with fresh food producers to make sure there was a good variety at local Farmers Markets and so far, supplies were holding up.

"If our producers have been struggling a little for produce, we've been trying to spread them out so we've got coverage at all the markets and so far, so good."

And buying good local produce doesn't mean you're paying a premium.

David Simpson of Gembrook had a great selection of potatoes for sale and some of them were out at prices below that of the major supermarkets.

"I grow them, hand pick them and sell them myself," said David while offering some advice

on the best varieties to mash, roast and make salads; his favourites being the Dutch Cream and Nicola.

But there were also Sebago, Kennebec and Gippsland Gold; selling for the fair price of \$3-\$3.50 per kg where Coles was selling them for \$4.50.

That's not always going to be the case, but in an interview on Channel 9 recently, Emma Germano said it paid to shop around for specials at the supermarket, to stock up on frozen veggies when the price is low and not to forget the Farmers Market, including coming in late to swoop on stock left over.

"There's so many different factors that are contributing to these high prices on the supermarket shelves. Hopefully we'll see some of that level out in the next little while, but it might be more common to see this sort of thing into the future as well," Ms Germano said.

Asked what was driving the increases, Ms Germano said the geopolitical issues overseas, impacting crops, supply chain and input prices for fuel

and fertiliser, on the back of COVID disruption were factors.

"I guess right now, it's really about those weather events that have happened in Queensland and northern New South Wales. They've had an impact and will continue to have an impact for some time.

"People have to remember of course that when you go into a supermarket and pick up something to buy, it certainly wasn't planted on a farm yesterday. So, things that are on the shelves now, you know, were often planted, three, four or more months ago. And so that's going to continue to have a bit of a disruption I guess, at least through throughout winter."

But Ms Germano said it was up to everyone involved in the supply of fresh food to share some of the costs, while ensuring a fair price for all.

She said farmers certainly weren't seeing all of the lift in prices and she urged the supermarkets to do their best to keep prices down, as much as possible, while the supply issues were ongoing.

## Successful planting day for Landcare groups

FITNESS and community spirit combined in Dalyston and Kilcunda, with the local environment set to benefit from the addition of 3,000 plants.

Three Creeks Landcare members were out in force, planting at Powlett River Caravan Park and Old Kilcunda Station.

Volunteers arrived and travelled between locations by bike.

The event is one of the many organised by Bass Coast Landcare Network (BCLCN).

Both of Saturday's planting locations are part of the Bass Coast Shire Council's Bio Links program, linking corridors of vegetation, increasing biodiversity, and providing wildlife habitat.

BCLCN project officer

Joel Kilgour said that with the ground softening due to rainfall it is the start of the planting season, with the network organising many planting days with various Landcare groups across the Bass Coast region.

He explained Saturday's planting sites are distinctly different.

The caravan park location is a woodland area, home to plants such as coastal banksias, while the Kilcunda site is a native grassland habitat.

That influenced what the group planted at each site.

"We focused on all three layers of the environment, including canopy trees like banksias, midlevel plants such as Melaleuca, and then grasses at the lowest level, trying to recreate

what was there originally," Joel said of the woodland site.

He explained the Ecological Vegetation Classification system is used to determine how specific locations were prior to settlement, so they can be restored as closely as possible to their natural state.

Native grasses and small shrubs were planted at the Kilcunda grassland location.

Funding sparked the idea to combine bike riding with planting.

"We got a grant for wellness planting, so that's why we incorporated the ride as an exercise activity," Joel said.

Volunteers enjoyed a generous morning tea between planting sessions.

# Help shape future of egg industry

FOR the fifth consecutive year, Australian Eggs is asking the public to take part in a large-scale research study to inform a national conversation about the future of the egg industry.

Australians consume over 17 million eggs each day, so it's important for the industry and egg farmers to understand and respond to the community's opinions on the things that matter to them.

The research is being conducted by engagement science company Voconiq, which was spun out of Australia's national science agency, CSIRO.

The research will explore community attitudes towards the egg industry across a broad range of topics, including food security, biosecurity, traceability, animal welfare and environmental impacts.

Dr Kieren Moffat, Voconiq CEO, said this fifth year of research will build on the previous findings from 2018 to 2021, to examine and understand the community's changing views and priorities, and provide a solid indication of the public's trust in the Australian egg industry.

"More than 33,000 Australians have contributed to this research program over the past four years, providing a

deeper understanding on what the community values in and from the egg industry," Dr Moffat said.

"Sustainability is a major issue globally and it is important that the egg industry remains focused on how it fits into this growing movement. The research program has always been linked to the United Nations Sustainability Development Goals and in 2022 we will be working to draw these links out more explicitly in the context of egg production.

"We encourage Australians who want to have a voice on issues related to the egg industry to take part in the public open survey, as the data collected will be shared with Australian Eggs to shape their agenda and priorities over the coming years."

The research is the fifth annual cycle of community engagement to inform the Australian Eggs Sustainability Framework.

## Intersection needs urgent attention, says O'Brien

THE APTLY nicknamed 'Kamikaze Corner' remains a major focus of attention in Leongatha for all the wrong reasons, with member for South Gippsland Danny O'Brien backing the local council's advocacy of action to rectify its hazardous nature.

"The South Gippsland Highway intersection at McCartin, Roughhead, Anderson, Long and Hughes Streets is in urgent need of attention," Mr O'Brien said.

He continues to campaign for State Government funding for the Leongatha Heavy Vehicle Alternate Route stage 2, having recently tabled a second petition in the Legislative Assembly calling for the funding.

"The intersection is a debacle and causes great frustration to Leongatha locals, people throughout South Gippsland and visitors alike," Mr O'Brien said.

He labelled it as "dangerous and confusing", declaring that he'll continue to work to ensure the community's concerns on the issue are addressed.

The petition calls on the State Government to fund both the design and construction of stage 2 of the Leongatha Heavy Vehicle Alternate Route as soon as possible.

A State Government spokesperson said at the end of April that, "The government continues to work with South Gippsland Shire Council to further understand the safety, economic and amenity benefits of stage two of the Leongatha Heavy Vehicle Alternate Route for residents and industry."

The Leongatha Heavy Vehicle Alternate Route stage 2 is a priority project endorsed by One Gippsland, the peak regional advocacy body representing the Gippsland region, membership of which includes the South Gippsland Shire Council.

Stage 1 of the Leongatha Heavy Vehicle Alternate Route was completed in 2016.

The Nationals leader, Peter Walsh, inspected the infamous intersection with Mr O'Brien during a recent visit to Leongatha.

## Poowong transport campaign continues

POOWONG locals continue their determined campaign for public transport to link the town with Melbourne.

Member for Gippsland South, Danny O'Brien, recently tabled a third petition from the Poowong community calling for that to occur.

The previous petitions were tabled in 2017 and 2019.

"I've been supporting the community's fight to have some of the Melbourne services travelling the South Gippsland Highway operate through Poowong to give locals a public transport option," Mr O'Brien said.

The 2019 petition contained 809 signatures.

The current petition to be tabled by Mr O'Brien notes Poowong's previous lack of success in gaining a public transport link to Melbourne.

It requests the Legislative Assembly of Victoria to call on the state government to provide services that stop at Poowong, or at the least initiate a trial to gauge the level of demand.

Mr O'Brien highlighted the need not just for better transport links between Gippsland and Melbourne but between the region's towns.

"We have a significant issue in many of our small towns across Gippsland that just don't have good public transport connections," Mr O'Brien said.

He added that is particularly problematic for younger people without a licence or car, the elderly, and others who don't have their own modes of transport.

Dennis was a member of the Scots Guards, with his duties including providing security for the Queen.

One of the organisers of the Loch service, Howard Booth, said the event followed a celebration members of the community held 10 years ago to mark the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

"She's provided exemplary service," he said of the Monarch's 70-year reign.

# Royalty continues to captivate the nation

GLASS plate negatives uncovered from the Rose Stereograph Collection last year showed the intimate moment between a mother and her young baby.

The baby would go on to become the longest reigning queen in history.

At that moment in time, she was simply Princess Elizabeth Alexandra Mary, the daughter of Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York.

At the mere age of 25, Princess Elizabeth, became Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

Celebrating her Platinum Jubilee, Elizabeth has been a figurehead and steadfast symbol throughout seventy years.

Seventy years that has included 19 wars, conflicts and emergencies around the world, 14 UK Prime Ministers

From a gold State Coach to her Rolls Royce Phantom's,

the Queen's love of four wheels has seen many vehicles grace their garages and find home in her private collection.

It's therefore no surprise that prior to her coronation, Elizabeth drove an aid truck for the Women's Auxiliary Territorial Service in World War II, and was a trained mechanic.

From horse-riding and pigeon racing to football and stamp collecting, the Queen's hobbies have not always been those of traditional royalty; and her appearance in the 2012 London Olympics alongside James Bond left a nation roaring in delight.

And much to her delight, the Queen even pranked American tourists, when out for a walk she was asked in she lived locally (in Scotland). She mentioned she lived in a

house nearby and when asked if she met the Queen, she pointed to her security and said, "No, but he has!"

In celebration, Australia joined in with events across our great nation, whilst iconic landmarks and building, like the Australian War Memorial, were illuminated in royal purple.

And at the end of the celebrations, whilst we can only hope she is not leaving us anytime soon (who wouldn't want her to take out the title of the longest reigning monarch ever), it does draw an era to a close.

For the public to celebrate and give their thanks to a woman who has faced heartache, pain and happiness, and whose smile lights up a room.

# Loch lights up for Queen's Jubilee celebrations

THE historic township of Loch joined communities all around the Commonwealth on Thursday night, June 2, in lighting up their version of the Queen's Beacon at the start of four days of Platinum Jubilee celebrations in Australia.

It might only have been a portable spotlight on the end of an electric generator in Sunnyside Park, on a cold, dark night, but it was an official event, one of hundreds of such occasions to mark the 70th year of the Queen's reign.

A member of the Loch Community Development Association, Howard Booth, said Queen Elizabeth II was much loved and respected in Australia, since her first visit in 1954 when an estimated 75 per cent of the population turned out to

see her.

"I've seen the Queen on two occasions in Australia, once when she opened the Royal Children's Hospital in Melbourne and another time when she opened the Immigration Museum, formerly the Customs House in Flinders Street," Mr Booth said.

"From her war service to the number of times she's visited Australia to open facilities and events and I think the vast majority of people in Australia respect her for what she's done."

As well as lighting the Queen's Beacon and combining it with the ubiquitous community sausage sizzle, Loch also staged an ecumenical service on Sunday, lunch and a special 'Royal Pudding' competition, a unique event in the world for the Platinum Jubilee.

It was indicative of Mr Gibson's willingness to move from one goal to the next, even in his later years, which saw him not only build on his uncle Stewart Scott's legacy at Alex Scott and Co but also to develop an agricultural business of his own, while participating strongly in the community as board member of REIV's predecessor, as a representative on the Victorian Stock Agents Association, through Rotary, and sports including golf. Together with bridge, it was an interest he shared with his wife of 62 years, Anne, who also accompanied him on a horse ride to Canberra along the Alpine Way.

Fit, strong and healthy to the end, Mr Gibson passed away quickly and unexpectedly after planting trees on his Inverloch farm.

A large crowd of people was in attendance at the Inverloch Community Centre; family members, work colleagues from Alex Scott and elsewhere, golf and bridge friends and others from south and west Gippsland where the Gibsons made their homes.

## New training vessel for new generation of marine experts

THE state government has invested in a unique boat at TAFE Gippsland, which will be used to train the next generation of local maritime experts.

Minister for Fishing and Boating Melissa Horne unveiled the catamaran the bar-ba-ka – the Boon Wurrung word for 'porpoise' – funded by the Labor Government's \$877,000 investment.

The 12-metre-long bar-ba-ka is an ideal vessel for surveying, conservation work and commercial and recreational boating. The configuration of its accommodation, deck and engine makes it unique to Australia.

The bar-ba-ka was built in Australia in 2015 and has since been upgraded with new water quality and navigation equipment to ensure TAFE students have access to the latest technology during their training.

It will be based at the Seamac Campus and used by students in maritime courses as well as training in laboratory skills, STEM and conservation – providing a pipeline of skilled workers in emergency services, conservation, commercial and recreational fishing, and for regional employers and government agencies like the EPA.

The bar-ba-ka replaces TAFE Gippsland's existing vessel the Murray MV, built in 1946, which was outdated and no longer met industry standards.

He told stories of the legendary feats of his great mate Gerry Parker and others.

In 1978 I made the move, training with the Fourths side under the legendary David Pugh.

Pughy would arrange little league games for us fringe players at half time of the Firsts game on a Saturday.

Two decades later I was organising the Blues half time grid games, hosting the AusKickers.

The footy club became my second home.

We had some great juniors and were always competitive.

I rucked in a Fourths grand final but I.K. had a star player who we just couldn't get past.

In the late '90s that "kid", Brett Lovett, became Blues senior coach after his AFL career was complete.

I returned as a 34-year-old to play when Lovey was the coach.

I had been a spectator for a few years since returning to town but I just wanted to play again.

I loved every moment, playing 70 games of Reserves footy in the final four years of the Blues.

I got on committee, became Secretary and then started my coaching in charge of the Under 14s.

My under 14s team won the final ever premiership cup claimed by the Blues.

I started playing with Blues as an 11-year-old in 1978 and played my final game in 2004 as a 37-year-old (with a big gap in the middle).

I loved the club.

In the past couple of years, I have written the history of this great footy club.

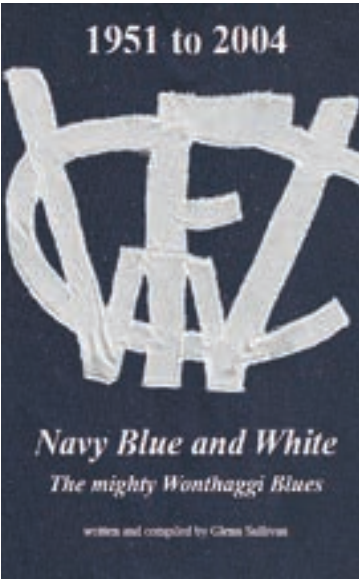
My 290-page book covers every Senior game from 1951 to 2004, but there is much more than that.

## Young Cat's 'hectic' diet program to gain weight

A LIGHTLY framed Sam De Koning arrived at Geelong weighing 85kg.

De Koning, selected with pick No.19 in the 2019 National Draft, now weighs in at around 100kg.

The 21-year-old defender says his drastic body transformation is down to a "hectic" diet program, consuming up to six meals a day, even eating until he was sick at times.

Standing at 204cm, De Koning is having a breakout season, averaging seven intercepts and a tick under five marks a game.

"It's a blessing and a curse that I was born with a good metabolism because my diet is basically to try and eat as much food, but obviously good food, as I can," De Koning told Sportsday.

"Throughout my experience in the hub in 2020 and also the short finals one in Perth in 2021, it was about trying to get as much food in as I can and throughout pre-season – sometimes I'm eating until I'm sick.

"It's definitely hard and you have to commit yourself. It's around five or six meals a day. It's pretty hectic.

"It can be a bit boring having rice and pasta and steak and chicken all the time, so it's about trying to find variety and getting yourself up to make meals and preparing meals and staying professional.

"Because the goal is to play AFL and if that means putting on weight then that's what you have to do.

"I peaked throughout this pre-season at 103, but I think that was a little too heavy.

"At the moment, I'm sitting at around 100 and I've put on around 15 kilos throughout my time in the AFL."

De Koning received a Rising Star nomination after finishing with 19 disposals, 11 intercept possessions and nine marks in Geelong's win over Adelaide in Round 11.

"Cray season is often a time when friends and family rug up, camp together by a waterway for a weekend, enjoy a warm fire, tell a few stories and catch a meal to share.

"One of Victoria's most popular catchments to go Murray cray fishing is

the Goulburn, in the river above Lake Eildon, in the lake itself, and downstream through Seymour and Nagambie to Shepparton.

"The Ovens and Kiewa rivers are productive waters for Murray crays too, along with Waranga Basin."

VRFish Chair Rob Loats said chasing a feed of Murray crays in Victorian rivers is a great way to spend a winter's day, checking hoop nets or open top lift nets from a tinnie, in between warming up by a campfire and spending quality time with loved ones in the great outdoors.

One of eight former AFL greats involved, Burgoyne was selected by Thomas' Magpies in the inaugural Carlton Draft program.

Commissioned by Brisbane Lions legend and Fox Footy host Jonathan Brown, the Carlton Draft allowed eight struggling Victorian country footy clubs the chance to 'draft' an AFL legend.

Thomas held high praise for the initiative.

"It's a bit like winning a raffle to be honest, when we put in, we didn't think we were going to win it," he said.

"The promotion from Carlton Draught and Fox Footy has been so good for all the clubs involved."

With no football scheduled this week-

end for many local clubs such as Leon-gatha, Wonthaggi and Poowong, Daly' hopes to make the match a huge event.

"During COVID we've had it pretty tough over the last couple of years, as most clubs have, we're hoping this will give us an injection of enthusiasm," Thomas said.

"We're hoping kids come out of the woodwork and start playing sport again.

"As far as we're concerned that's one of the most important things we need to do, get our junior numbers going again."

Bringing in the AFL's Indigenous games recorder holder is certainly one way to get more juniors involved, but the club aren't looking at stopping there.

There will be food trucks and live music on the day to create a true event like atmosphere, something Thomas was excited to explain.

"We're trying to make a big day of it, as it's the long weekend in June we'll be able to attract a crowd," he said.

The unmissable contest between the 10th and 12th teams on the West Gippsland League table will be broadcast by Fox Footy adding to the atmosphere.

Garfield travel down the highway following last week's loss to IK, they will be desperate to spoil the show for their first win of the season.

Dalyston come in after a loss to Cora Lynn on the road, looking to grab their second win of the season, with 'Silk' at their disposal to urge on their young side.

Thomas mentioned the importance of Burgoyne in mentoring the young Magpies lineup.

"It's going to be enormous, last week we debuted Jaxon Foon, he's only 16, he would've been eight or nine watching him on the TV, so now getting the opportunity to play with him is fantastic," he said.

Burgoyne's insight will be invaluable for the 'Pies, who are missing star forward Adam Amin, who is away on international cricket duties.

Burgoyne will pull on the black and white stripes at 2pm on Saturday, June 11, at Dalyston Recreation Reserve and is sure to entertain Dalyston and Hawthorn fans alike.
