# - Phillip Island dropped from pool strategy

BASS Coast Shire Councillors will be asked this Wednesday, October 15, to vote on officially dropping Phillip Island from its two-pool strategy.

They've picked a funny place to do it.

This week's monthly council meeting will be held in the \$34 million Berninneit Cultural Centre in Cowes, the project that took over Phillip Island's number one project priority status, under a previous council, from the proposed Cowes aquatic centre.

If the vote goes through, as it is likely to do, the Island's pool project will be banished to the never-never.

But you could see that coming.

While the Phillip Island Aquatics and Leisure Centre project still gets a mention in the shire's Long Term Financial Plan 2025-35, also to be tabled at this week's council meeting for adoption, under "future years" beyond 2035, with a nominal figure of \$40 million beside it, it was already on the outer.

Phillip Island Ward Councillor Ron Bauer acknowledges this but maintains the council will continue to advocate for the island aquatic centre. His Mayor, Cr Rochelle Halstead agrees, but the report doesn't support their view.

"That's why I insisted that it continue to get a mention in the Long Term Financial Plan. Who knows, if Federal politics tightens up at the next election, it's the sort of project that could get commitments from both sides," said Cr Bauer.

Mayor Cr Halstead said the shire's call for \$90 million for two pools was simply falling on deaf ears.

"Government isn't looking at funding as many aquatic centres because of running costs and we've also got the situation at Wonthaggi where we're dealing with a failing piece of infrastructure," said Cr Halstead.

"We don't want to be spending \$10 million on a pool that's past its use-by date,"

"But the reality is councils are trying to replace important infrastructure with one hand tied behind their backs, while the government maintains its rate cap in the face of rising costs.

"Our shire needs a facility, and the existing one is in Wonthaggi, but short of spending \$10 million to keep the old one going, we believe we've got a very good case for funding, and the State Government has just got to stump up."

Cr Halstead said the shire was looking to change its advocacy strategy by making Wonthaggi the priority, but it doesn't mean they've dropped Phillip Island.

# The good news is bridge works will be at night

what happens when there's a disruption to traffic on the Phillip Island Bridge last Thursday.

While contractors were erecting banners for the Bass Coast Shire Council under a Memorandum of Understanding with the Australian Grand Prix Corporation, traffic was banked up for kilometres on both sides of the bridge for several hours.

According to feedback on social media, it added 16 minutes to your trip, with traffic management personnel keeping one lane open alternatively. A spokesperson for the shire claimed "traffic was unfortunately delayed approximately five minutes," but those caught in the snarl reported much longer delays.

"The wind on Thursday as well as the additional works on the bridge had an impact on how quickly this was able to be completed," said the shire.

Some suggested the work could have been carried out at night or in the early morning when traffic was light, others were tolerant about preparations for the hosting the GP this Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

While local businesspeople and tradesmen bemoaned regular traffic delays getting on and funeral cortege for Jon Trigt, who was buried at San Remo last Thursday following his funeral at Cowes making mourners an hour late for the wake back at the Phillip Island RSL.

However, according to Transport Victoria, additional inspection and assessment works, ahead of major bridge rehabilitation work, will commence after the GP from 8pm, Monday, October 20 and are expected to be completed by early November.

"We are installing additional sensors to the San Remo/ Philip Island bridge as part of our bridge inspection works," said Transport Victoria. "These works will take place mostly at night to minimise disruption to traffic."

The works involve the use of a Bridge Inspection Unit to access the sides and underneath the bridge.

"Our bridge inspection works, including underwater checks, were completed in late November 2024 and sensors installed in March 2025. Sensors allow real-time monitoring, reducing the frequency of on-site inspections and traffic disruption.'

Lane closures and a 40km/h speed limit will be in place from 8pm to 6am.

But the report to be tabled at this week's council meeting indicates council will not continue advocating for two aquatic centres.

"Advocacy feedback has indicated that the two-pool concurrent delivery strategy is unlikely to attract external funding, necessitating a shift towards sequencing pool delivery to enhance funding opportunities. The amended Bass Coast Aquatic Strategy 2015 and revised Bass Coast Aquatic and Leisure Centre Concept Plan (Redevelopment Option) have been developed to position Council for success in future funding advocacy."

Labor Senator for Victoria, Michelle Ananda-Rajah, who visited Bass Coast recently, and was taken on a Cook's tour of the shire's advocacy project sites, was shocked at the projected cost of the two aquatic centre facilities.

The two-pool strategy wasn't

The report to be tabled with the amended Bass Coast Shire Aquatic Strategy also identifies the more pressing problem, the state of the "only aquatic centre serving the Bass Coast Shire" at Wonthaggi.

According to the Facility Management (FAMP), several building components are nearing the end of their useful life, "with substantial renewals anticipated in the next 10 years"

"An estimated financial investment of \$10 million is needed to sustain existing service provision; this allocation does not address upgrades or changes to the level or type of service offered to the community.

Cr Halstead was asked when council would have to start spending substantial funds to save the old pool but said she hoped it wouldn't come to that.

As well as keeping the old

pool going in the interim, Council is proposing to spend more than \$40 million on a new pool complex by 2031, starting with an initial \$1 million over the next two years to develop a new design.

"It is proposed to fund this major project from a loan of \$15.75 million and \$15.75 million from government grants (State and/or Commonwealth) with an initial investment of \$1 million from Council reserves to fund the detailed design," according to the LTFP.

An expected steep-increase in the population of Wonthaggi, predicted at 17.21 per cent between 2025 and 2035, on the back of developments like the Wonthaggi North East residential precinct, is enabling 5000 new homes and approximately 12,000 more residents in the town in the next decade.

The shire desperately needs to provide for that population

But, as secretary-treasurer of the Phillip Island Aquatic Centre Fund for the last 14 years, Peter McMahon said, the shire might be throwing out its best chance of attracting funding by ditching the Phillip Island aquatics project.

"There's no doubt that the numbers stack up better on Phillip Island than they do at Wonthaggi, not only locals who have to travel to Wonthaggi to train and learn to swim, but the visitors as well. Traffic data will tell you that but that's another problem," said Mr McMahon.

"They may be throwing away their best chance of getting government funding by going all-in on Wonthaggi," he said.

Mr McMahon said the development of an aquatic centre at Phillip Island was a key part of the provision of proper sporting facilities, anticipating that the AFL would be one of the key organisations pushing for more playing fields on the Island.

#### Police can't identify Wonthaggi shooter

WHEN a 42-year-old father of two was shot in the back in a residential street in Wonthaggi in January this year, it appeared to many people to be a serious escalation in local crime. The incident took place while a young girl was reportedly sleeping inside, with other neighbours disturbed when several cars were damaged as the offenders made

The local man was airlifted to Melbourne with non-life-threatening injuries, where he was operated on, under general anaesthetic, to remove shotgun pellets from his shoulder and to fix a broken nose.

The two men, charged in relation to the incident, a 24-year-old and a 28-year-old, both of Wonthaggi North, appeared by video link from prison at a committal hearing in the Melbourne Magistrates' Court last week, each facing a long list of charges.

At a committal hearing, the magistrate has to decide if there is enough evidence to support a conviction on the charges and for the matter to be committed to a higher court for trial, or he might decide there is insufficient evidence, and the accused may be discharged. It is by no means clear what course of action Magistrate Nick Goodenough will favour when the matter returns to court on Friday, November 7 for closing statements and possible applications for bail for the two

During the hearing last Wednesday, October 8, the court heard from police informant in the case, Detective Senior Constable Thomas Francavilla of the Armed Crime Squad. Under questioning by criminal law expert Ran Zaydan, on behalf of one of the men allegedly involved in the incident, Detective Francavilla acknowledged that while police had secured a lot of CCTV footage from around the time of the incident, in the early hours of Sunday, January 12, none of it identified her client at the scene.

He also agreed that while ammunition, a black balaclava, and a slam-gun, among other items, including drugs, were seized at the accused man's address; a dirt bike he was allegedly riding, a backpack seen in video footage and a balaclava he was allegedly wearing had also not been recovered. Nor had the weapon allegedly used in the shooting.

The detective did say, however, that the accused man was caught on video sitting on the bike "immediately prior" some distance

Grace Morgan, ranked as one of Victoria's best junior counsels, didn't put any questions to Detective Francavilla, but claimed during some preliminary bail discussions that there was no evidence to say who discharged the weapon.

"In fact, there is a body of circumstantial evidence which supports that he didn't," she said of her client.

The detective repeated what he had said earlier, to a similar question from Ms Zaydan.

"I can't say definitively who discharged the firearm at [the victim]."

Magistrate Goodenough adjourned the hearing until Friday, November 7, ordering that the prosecution's final submissions be tendered by October 22 and the statements by the defence by October 29.

Both legal representatives foreshadowed making bail applications for their clients.

#### Police appeal for footage after motorcyclist airlifted

POLICE are investigating and have appealed for witnesses with CCTV and dashcam footage after a motorcycle collided with a vehicle turning right along Bass Highway on Saturday afternoon, around 2.45pm.

It's understood the driver of a vehicle had slowed and was turning right onto Bambrook Road in Inverloch, when a motorcycle, also travelling in an easterly direction and allegedly travelling at speed, attempted to overtake multiple vehicles and collided with the turning

Three passengers in the vehicle were uninjured, with police. fire brigades, SES and paramedics all present at the scene.

The motorcycle rider was airlifted to hospital, as a precaution, due to the impact and is understood not to have lifethreatening injuries.

#### Get bushfire ready during green waste disposal period

THE fee-free green waste period is on again.

From Saturday, November 1 to Sunday, November 23, domestic loads of green waste will be accepted free of charge at any of Bass Coast Shire Council's waste facilities to encourage preparation for the fire

Council's waste facilities are located in Grantville, Wonthaggi, Inverloch and Cowes.

With the first weekend of the disposal period coinciding with the Melbourne Cup weekend and council's waste facilities remaining open on Melbourne Cup Day, high demand may lead to queues and delays, particularly on this first weekend. Disposing of your green waste in the middle of the fee-free period may help you avoid delays, so plan ahead.

Those visiting Cowes Recycling Bank should note that large trucks and trailers (over 8' x 5') are not accepted and will be redirected to Grantville Transfer Station during the fee-free green waste period.

Weed species including blackberry, English ivy, agapanthus, mirror bush and plants that cannot be mulched, such as

palm fronds, are not accepted as green waste at any of the locations, however, these can go in your kerbside Organics (green lid) bin at any time.

#### Clothes damaged after youth set fire in Big W

TWO youth were arrested on Tuesday, October 7, a short time after a small fire broke out at Wonthaggi Big W.

It's understood the fire was small in nature in the kids clothing section and was extinguished through the use of handheld fire extinguishers by one of the Big W employees.

Incident Controller from Wonthaggi Fire Brigade Jamie Moresco credited the quick actions of the Big W team in suppressing the fire with fire extinguishers on scene, before local fire brigades from Wonthaggi, Inverloch and Dalyston arrived with firefighters ensuring the scene was safe, utilising further fire extinguishers.

Three bays of clothing in the children's section were damaged, one directly from the impact of the fire and the other two due to extinguishers.

"The fire at our Wonthaggi store was extinguished by a BIG W employee, and all customers and staff members were safely evacuated from the store. We're thankful that no one was injured, and are grateful to the police and fire brigade who attended and assisted," a spokesperson for Big W stated on Tuesday evening.

#### Tenby Point man charged after \$15M drug bust

EIGHT people have been arrested, five of whom have been charged, after police dismantled a sophisticated cannabis crop in Melbourne's southeast, with thousands of plants seized worth \$15 million.

One of those arrested is a 26-year-old man from Tenby Point.

Officers from the Springvale Divisional Response Unit were assisted by multiple units and executed simultaneous search warrants at a home in Keysborough, and a property in Devon Meadows on Tuesday morning, October 7.

At the 20-acre property, it will be alleged, eight suspects fled when police arrived, however, all were arrested at the scene shortly after.

Five of them have been charged, including the Tenby Point man.

All five were charged with cultivating a large commercial quantity of cannabis. They appeared in Melbourne Magistrates' Court on Wednesday, October 8, where they were further remanded in custody to reappear at a later date.

The Tenby Point man was also charged with possessing a drug of dependence.

A two-day search of the property revealed the true extent of the alleged illicit crop, with police dismantling the sophisticated set-up that was growing in gardening igloos.

Approximately 4500 plants of varying maturity were removed from the property, with an estimated potential street value, according to police, of approximately \$15M. The plants will be destroyed following forensic examination by a botanist.

Police also seized a firearm, and quantities of amphetamines, cocaine, ammunition and cash from the property.

Three men aged 32, 37 and 41 were released on intent to summons for cultivating a large commercial quantity of cannabis, while a man and woman, both aged 33, were spoken to and released pending enquiries.

Further charges are expected.

# Millions lost on delayed coastal erosion works at Inverloch, they say

have been wasted through delays to coastal erosion works at Inverloch, according to recently released Freedom of Information (FOI) docu-

Nationals' Member for Eastern Victoria, Melina Bath MP, said critical works on the Inverloch surf beach remain at a standstill despite the State Government receiving a \$3.3 million grant from the Federal Government three years ago.

"The Allan Labor government has concealed the extent of the worsening erosion crisis," said Ms Bath.

"With each tide and storm event the risk increases.

"The Inverloch Lifesaving Club and nearby homes are under imminent threat.'

Revelations contained in FOI documents obtained by Ms Bath show government hazard mapping as early as 2022 identified the possibility for disaster from major erosion or inundation events within two years.

showed The documents there was a need for onground works to commence as soon as possible with the government's own economic modelling showing an alleged cover-up of between \$42 million and \$558 million in damages and value lost.

"Coastal erosion works were identified as a priority in 2022," said Ms Bath.

"Despite knowing the dire consequences and not protecting Inverloch's coastline and community, the Allan government is complicit in causing mental anguish for residents.

"The beach is eroding, dunes are vanishing, and the lifesaving club is under threat while Labor refuses to prioritise the works."

In an email sent recently to Inverloch residents, Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale MP claimed the project at Inverloch would begin after the peak summer holiday period.

"Repairs and an extension to the geotextile container wall will be done by Bass Coast Shire prior to Christmas funded by the State Government," said Ms Crugnale.

"As we all know this largescale engineering project was

scheduled for this spring, however, the timing of onground works has been influenced by contractor vessel and machinery availability."

President of the Inverloch Surf Lifesaving Club, Glenn Arnold, has been frustrated by the delays.

"We were told something would be done in winter, but still nothing has been done.

"We've now been told the sandbags will be complete by Christmas.

"The geotextile bags will be extended at either end of the lifesaving club.

"Thousands of dollars have been wasted," he said.

Melina Bath has accused the State Government of a serious lack of transparency.

"Labor's so-called community consultation was clearly engineered to align with a pre-set decision. The Allan government's secrecy and refusal to release the final Cape to Cape Plan speaks volumes.

"Every day these critical works are delayed the Allangovernmentisrecklessly rolling the dice, risking essential infrastructure, and putting the town on the line.

"The community has been lied to," she said.

According to Ms Bath, the initial repair bill was estimated at \$6 million with a sense of urgency, but years later the Cape to Cape Resilience Plan is still pending.

"The community has had meetings, petitions and rallies signifying the urgency of the project, but the community has been told to wait until February 2026," she said.

"The community has been betrayed by the government.

"In 2022, the government said there was a risk to infrastructure both public and private, and a danger to the beachscape and loss of economic revenue to the town.

"Over the last three years, the lowest estimate of the cost to the community is \$42 million, notwithstanding the emotional and mental health cost to residents not knowing.

Glenn Arnold said this in-

cluded young families just starting their mortgage journey and retirees with all their money tied up in residential properties.

"It didn't need to be anywhere near that," said Mr Arnold.

"There's a level of frustration and fear. Public forums and public groups have come together and got nowhere."

"The Minister for Environment has to wear the blame," said Ms Bath.

"This should have been resolved years ago.

"The damage is now significantly worse and will cost

significantly more."
"It's duplicitous," said Ms Bath.

With between 300 and 350 juniors expected on the beach for the nippers program over summer, Mr Arnold is concerned about heavy machinery raising safety issues.

"It's disingenuous," according to Mr Arnold.

The Inverloch Surf Lifesaving Club continues to grow and now boasts 1200 members.

#### The crime or the time: How fair was Erin Patterson's sentence 'solitary confinement for years the time of sentencing, that fixburdensome than for a main-

THE Department of Public Prosecutions has beaten Leongatha triple murderer Erin Patterson to the punch.

While Ms Patterson is still expected to seek leave to appeal her conviction, on three counts of murder and one of attempted murder, the Acting Director of Public Prosecutions, Diana Piekusis KC, has already issued Ms Patterson with a Notice of Appeal to the Court of Appeal in respect of the sentence passed on her on Monday, September 8, 2025 in the Supreme Court in Melbourne, specifically the nonparole period of 33 years.

The grounds for appeal are as follows:

1. The sentencing judge erred in finding that there was a 'substantial chance' the respondent would be held in to come' when such a finding was not open on the evidence, and that finding infected his assessment of the respondent's likely future conditions in custody and his decision to non-parole period.

2. The sentence imposed on the offender is manifestly inadequate, in that: (a.) It was inappropriate for the sentencing judge to fix a non-parole period; or (b.) The non-parole period of 33 years is manifestly inadequate.

Ms Piekusis said the DPP considered that there was an error in the sentence imposed and that a different sentence should be imposed, satisfied that an appeal should be brought in the public interest.

It was acknowledged by the trial judge, Justice Beale, at ing or not fixing a non-parole period was the main dispute he needed to determine.

"Sentencing case law establishes that, as a general rule, harsher than normal conditions of imprisonment warrant mitigation of penalty. There is nothing about your conduct whilst in custody which might cast doubt on the application of that general rule: as Ms Hosking (Corrections Officer) indicated, you are in a management unit to protect you from other prisoners, not vice versa. Nor do you have any relevant criminal history," said Justice Beale on September 8.

"In their written submissions, the prosecution conceded that your conditions of imprisonment are more

stream prisoner and that they are likely to remain so for the foreseeable future.

"You have effectively been held in continuous solitary confinement for the last 15 months and, at the ver there is a substantial chance that, for your protection, you will continue to be held in solitary confinement for years to come."

It was for this reason that Justice Beale handed down a non-parole period of 33 years while saying that "fixing a nonparole period is not to undervalue the horrendous nature of your offending".

No date has been set for the appeal by the DPP, nor has Ms Patterson lodged her application seeking leave to appeal her conviction.

#### It's challenging but future looks bright, says Mayor Halstead

AT TWO meetings of the Bass Coast Shire Council this month. the council has released a plethora of financial and planning reports describing how things are going financially and what happens next.

Last week, it was the Council Vision 2045, Council Plan 2025-29, Annual Action Plan 2025-26, Quarterly Performance Report (end June 2025) and Annual Financial Report and Performance Statement 2024-25.

This Wednesday, council will table its Annual Plan 2024-25, Long Term Financial Plan 2025-35, Asset Plan, Health Safety and Resilience Plan, Disability Action Plan, Domestic Animal Plan 2026-29, Road Management Plan and updated Aquatic Centre Strategy.

At the risk of being blinded by science, if not the avalanche of paperwork, the Sentinel-Times put some questions to the Mayor Cr Rochelle Halstead about the shape of the shire's finances.

 What is your assessment of the overall financial health of the Bass Coast Shire Council?

Response: The sustainability of local government has been challenged for many years now. Especially when rate caps set by the Minister do not keep in line with CPI and cost shifting continues to haunt our budgets. However, at financial year-end, four of seven financial ratios are within the low-risk categories set by VAGO. This includes Liquidity and Indebtedness, both performing better than budget and indicating council remains able to meet its financial obligations. Our team have worked hard to find a balance between community demand and fiscal financial management, and it hasn't been easy but nor are household budgets in the current Victorian financial climate.

· The Council's adjusted underlying net result for the year ending June 30, 2025 (which excludes capital grants and contributions) is a \$6.8 million deficit compared to a budgeted underlying deficit of \$100,000. Is this a fair indication of how council's financial position has deteriorated during the past 12 months?

Response: Local government is not there to make money, it's there to provide support and build resilient communities through provision of infrastructure and services. Not including capital grants and contributions, it does show how fine our budget cuts to the bone without them.

and why our team advocacy is vital. Let's flip the script and recognise what a great job our teams have done attracting grants to Bass Coast! With that said, for 2024-25, the result has been impacted by a higher depreciation expenditure (non-cash), and the cemeteries service transfer, a once-off payment reflecting council's continuous evaluation of the services and associated levels provided.

• In an overview of 2025 (page 19 annual report) it says "the Bass Coast Shire's balance sheet remains strong with over \$1 billion in Property, Plant and Infrastructure assets and relatively low levels of debt" but headwinds include: "the rate cap is not keeping pace with inflationary pressures" and "Councils operating costs have increased, particularly those linked to CPI and depreciation". Are you concerned that the Council is increasingly less able to meet customer expectations for works and services under the present funding arrangements?

Response: Council is very asset rich, but remembering assets also require maintenance and, in some cases, complete renewal. This brings ongoing costs and need for capital grants. As our community grows so too will our operating cost, our service cost and investment costs. With a strong balance sheet and low debt level, Council has ensured access to alternative funding sources to maintain service levels in line with the community's expectations, whilst continuing to manage and respond these cost pressures. Is it challenging, yes, but with a good team and a committed elected council, both of which Bass Coast have, I am confident in the future.

• Are you happy that one of council's 'Strategic Indicators' for success in its new Council Plan 2025-29 is that Council's Capital Works Program is 80 per cent completed? Given that any project which makes it on to the annual program is a top priority project, shouldn't the measure for success be 100 per

Response: Delivering 100 per cent is always preferable but there are many varying factors as to why capital works can be held up. I am proud of our teams who continue to push the envelope with an ambitious capital works program and year on year are delivering in an incredibly challenging local government environment.

### Too much stormwater for Cape Paterson



# The Lord's Prayer a bridge too far for Bass Coast Council

ly meeting of Bass Coast Council, Wonthaggi resident Karen Thorp broke with recent tradition and recited The Lord's Prayer in council chambers.

On behalf of the 194 people who signed a petition seeking reinstatement of The Lord's Prayer to council proceedings, Mrs Thorp spoke passionately about her beliefs.

"It's a very simple prayer," said Mrs Thorp.

"It is for everyone, it's seeking blessing, it's seeking wisdom from God, and it's offering forgiveness, also acknowledging the source of our moral law."

"Our Father, who art in heaven," began Mrs Thorp.

At the completion of the prayer Mrs Thorp said the petition from citizens of Bass Coast Shire drew attention to the error of removing The Lord's Prayer from the order of business at council meetings in 2014.

The petitioners requested that The Lord's Prayer be reinstated as a reading at the commencement of proceedings of Bass Coast Council as soon as possible.

"The merit of saying The Lord's Prayer is the action of publicly acknowledging the responsibility one has to the people they are serving," said Mrs Thorp.

Acknowledging Mrs Thorp's words in support of the petition Cr Ron Bauer said he could not state strongly enough how against the petition he was.

"This is a multi-cultural

country. There are 1500 religions or belief systems on the planet. Each one as relevant as the next, including atheism."

"I do not see why we should privilege one over the other," said Cr Bauer.

"Let's leave prayers and praying in the church and concentrate on the business of council in council," he said.

Cr Tim O'Brien was also opposed to the petition.

"Australia is a secular country, and at the last census only 43 per cent of Australians identified themselves as Christians, we've got multiple religions being practised.'

Cr O'Brien said he had no doubt the petitioners were sin-

"But using The Lord's Prayer to publicly acknowledge the responsibility one has to the people they are serving is eyewash," he said.

"It feels to me like it is just making mischief."

Cr Meg Edwards called for a division when it came to a vote on the petition.

Voting in favour of continuing the current practice of opening council meetings with a councillor statement were Cr Temby, Cr Tessari, Cr Halstead, Cr Bauer, Cr Morgan, Cr O'Brien, Cr Bell and Cr Thompson, Cr Meg Edwards disagreed with a dissenting vote.

#### Duo arrested after burglary spree

POLICE have arrested two people following a series of alleged commercial burglaries across the Bass Coast, where almost \$100k worth of cigarettes and alcohol were allegedly

It's alleged the duo targeted multiple service stations and grocery stores between Monday, October 6 and Wednesday, October 8, using a stolen vehicle to commit the alleged offences.

The alleged thefts occurred at:

- A supermarket in Inverloch cigarettes and alcohol valued at approximately \$60,000
- A general store in Tarwin Lower alcohol valued at approximately \$5,000
- A service station in Fish Creek cigarettes valued at approximately \$10,000
- A general store in Mirboo North cigarettes and alcohol valued at approximately
- A bottle shop in Inverloch alcohol valued at approximately \$12,000

Following an investigation by Bass Coast Crime Investigation Unit detectives, with support from Leongatha, Korumburra and Wonthaggi uniform members, two people were arrested last week including:

- A 22-year-old Leongatha man was charged with handle stolen goods, possess cocaine, possess controlled weapon, possess proceeds of crime. He was bailed to appear at Korumburra Magistrates Court on December 11, 2025.
- A 16-year-old boy from the Bass Coast area was charged with theft of motor vehicle, theft, drive disqualified, handle stolen goods. He was bailed to appear at a children's court at a later date.

Police have also recovered a stolen vehicle which was allegedly used during the incidents. All allegedly stolen items have since been seized by police and returned to the affected stores.

"Police have seized all of the allegedly stolen items and delivered them back to the affected stores - a great outcome for local business owners who've been through a tough week," said Detective Inspector Leigh Balthazaar, investigation and response manager.

# Labor's state-of-the-art firefighting fleet grounded before fire season

THE grounding of Forest Fire Management Victoria's entire fleet of 290 Mercedes G-Wagens and 59 Unimogs has crippled fire season planning just weeks before the declared fire danger period for South Gippsland and Bass Coast.

A contingency fleet of Landcruiser vehicles, fire tankers and bulldozers will be called into service after structural issues were detected in the UniMogs and cracking in the chassis of G-Wagens.

As a result, the entire G-Wagen and Unimog fleet has been pulled off the road indefinitely, amid serious safety concerns just weeks before the fire season.

Launched in 2017 under Labor's \$32 million state-ofthe-art upgrade, the G-Wagens and Unimogs were touted as world-class firefighting assets for rapid response and access to remote terrain.

Leader of The Nationals and Shadow Minister for Emergency Services, Danny O'Brien, called on Premier Allan to reveal how many vehicles are affected, and what contingencies are in place to protect communities.

"Labor promised Victorians a state-of-the-art firefighting fleet, but eight years later has delivered a world-class failure. Victorians deserve answers on how this failure was allowed to happen and what steps will be taken to ensure community safety."

Shadow Minister for Public Land Management Melina Bath slammed the Allan Labor Government for leaving regional Victoria dangerously exposed ahead of a high-risk fire season.

"Grounding Victoria's frontline fleet weeks before fire season is an unacceptable failure given nearly 40 per cent of the state is public land," said Ms Bath

"Labor's flawed bushfire policy, Safer Together has delivered just 1.6 per cent of land treated for fuel reduction annually since 2015, and the government routinely fails to

meet its own fuel-driven risk targets.

"At a time when we need every piece of equipment and personnel working to reduce risk, it is our CFA volunteers who are being asked to carry the load with ageing equipment and limited resources."

The CFA said its members are ready to protect the Victorian community this coming fire season and have been working closely with its Victorian emergency service partners.

"CFA is closely monitoring many bushland areas across the state, in particular West and East Gippsland, due to underlying rainfall deficits in these areas," a CFA spokesperson said after the FFMVic announcement last week.

"Due to the current dry conditions and high fuel loads, if an ignition occurred on a hot, windy day, fire could carry readily.

"Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) has been keeping CFA informed of the progress of the current fleet repairs and have assisted FFMV with the provision of fire vehicles that were due to go to disposal."

Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) said it has been keeping CFA informed of the progress of the current fleet repairs and have capacity for the immediate risk outlook.

"The safety of our firefighters is paramount, that's why regular safety inspections of vehicles and equipment are so important, a Victorian Government spokesperson stated on Friday.

"FFMVic has brought online additional vehicles to continue undertaking critical bushfire season preparations and respond to bushfire emergencies.

"These repairs are being fast-tracked over the next two months."

FFMVic is also working on agreements to secure additional emergency response vehicles from other states if required.

# 'Stabbing' incident an accident, they say

WHEN an Ambulance Victoria helicopter flew in low over Wonthaggi last Friday night, shortly after 8pm, and police confirmed reports of a 'stabbing incident', local residents feared the worst.

However, while police investigations are ongoing, witnesses to the incident have told police it was an accident.

"Investigations are ongoing, but the 40-year-old Wonthaggi male involved was heavily intoxicated at the time, as too were those in the house," said Sergeant Ryan Burns.

"He's stripped off his shirt and reportedly fell on a steak knife or similar.

"They've reported it as an accident, but police are continuing to investigate the incident."

He was airlifted to Melbourne with a serious but non-life-threatening injury and is reported to be recovering in hospital.

The incident happened shortly before 8pm last Friday, October 10.

# Have your say on domestic animal management in South Gippsland

ANIMAL lovers and others are set to have a further say on the latest Domestic Animal Management Plan (DAMP) for South Gippsland Shire, its aim being to strike a balance between pet welfare and protection of the community and environment from nuisance dogs and cats.

With the current DAMP expiring at the end of this year, council has prepared a draft DAMP for 2026-2029.

Should councillors vote in support of a recommendation before them on Wednesday, a period of public feedback on the draft DAMP will open on Friday, October 17, running until Tuesday, November 4.

Consultation informing the creation of the draft DAMP called for off-leash dog parks and improved beach access for dogs, while some focused on the need to address the issue of roaming cats and dogs.

Dog aggression and dogs harassing or attacking livestock, and domestic animal impact on native wildlife were among key concerns raised.

As well as guiding responsible pet ownership, the DAMP is intended to detail the training provided to council's Authorised Officers and help implement measures to minimise nuisance caused by cats and dogs and identify dangerous, menacing and restricted breed dogs and ensure they are managed appropriately.

#### Council question confusion in South Gippsland Shire

PUBLIC questions in South and Friday, November 21. Gippsland Shire council meetings are intended to now be restricted to ones relating to topics in the council meeting agenda, and may be read out by the questioner when that person is present at the relevant council meet-

However, it is unclear when questions will be read out if the questioner is not present at the meeting.

Public question guidelines are included in council's Governance Rules 2025, on which community members are expected to have their say between Thursday, October

with councillors voting on Wednesday on a recommendation to open consultation on the document.

It is difficult to reconcile two apparently contradictory points in the guidelines.

"There is no requirement for a questioner to be present at the council meeting in order to have their question(s) and the response read out,' it is stated.

"If the questioner is not present at the council meeting, the Chair or a member of council staff or councillor nominated by the Chair may read to those present at the 16 meeting a question which

has been submitted."

However, it is also noted that, "The Chair may refrain from reading a question or having a question read if the person who submitted the question is not present in the gallery at the time of the meeting when the question is due to be read.'

The purpose of public question time, from council's perspective, is outlined in the draft document.

"It is not designed to take the place of contacting a councillor or councillors directly to discuss a matter, or to replace contacting council's customer services for assistance; rather, it is

designed to allow for clarification of issues or matters contained within the council meeting agenda," it is stated.

It is specified that questions must be submitted either electronically or in hard copy form to the Leongatha council office at least 48 hours prior to the start of the council meeting to be answered at that meeting.

Questions must meet specified requirements to be con-

Questioners granted permission to read out their question or questions, must not raise any additional questions or alter the previously submitted questions.

# New Foster Skatepark seems destined for Showgrounds

FOSTER Showgrounds is the probable home of the town's planned new skatepark, despite the concerns of those at Foster & District Agricultural & Pastoral Society about the facility's potential impact on the annual Agricultural Show.

A period of community consultation on the exact location within the Showgrounds is likely.

This Wednesday, South Gippsland Shire councillors will vote on a recommendation to endorse Foster Showgrounds as the chosen skatepark site and undertake stakeholder consultation to determine the final location within the Showgrounds.

While Foster Station hasn't been entirely ruled out, council stresses that would come at a significantly increased cost due to the lack of supporting infrastructure, estimated at \$500,000.

An extended pedestrian link to the CBD, public toilets, services (sewer, water and electricity), street furniture, lighting and formalised parking just some of the infrastructure required.

Existing infrastructure at Foster Showgrounds includes toilets, rubbish bins, drink fountains, shelter and seating

While council acknowledges the concerns of those at Foster & District Agricultural & Pastoral Society, it points out that it is only one of the user groups at the Foster Showgrounds and that its views may not be representative of the broader community.

In its October council meeting agenda, council makes its view on the skatepark matter clear.

"Although recommencing another community consultation process is an option, regardless of the results, the Foster Showgrounds would remain the standout location for a new skatepark," it states.

Skatepark design works are currently being undertaken, with council estimating construction costs in the vicinity of \$500,000, the project potentially supported through a combination of grant funding and Capital Renewal in future

#### **Bass Coast EV** targets set up to fail

THE failure of Bass Coast Shire to get anywhere near its performance target of switching half of its council fleet to electric vehicles has raised serious concerns over the Bass Coast Climate Change Action Plan.

The latest quarterly performance report released by Bass Coast Shire revealed a major setback in its plan to transition 50 per cent of the council fleet to electric vehicles.

Of the 21 actions flagged in the 2024-2025 Annual Action Plan, 19 were reported to be complete, with two outstanding items not completed due to external factors.

Council's plan to incorporate the Bass Coast Housing Strategy and Neighbourhood Character Study into the Bass Coast Planning Scheme was delayed due to State Government changes to Victoria's planning system.

Council's target for moving its vehicle fleet to electric vehicles, to reduce emissions and support Council's Climate Action Plan was only 60 per cent complete.

Council was told the vehicle fleet target is unattainable because while electric vehicles are available for deployment as tools of trade utility vehicles, none of the Australian market entrants meet the mandatory five star ANCAP safety

The Bass Coast Climate Change Action Plan for 2020-30 has recognised the role of both council and the community in a collective response to reduce emissions and build community resilience against the local impacts of climate change.

Council's 10-year Electric Vehicle (EV) Transition Plan was designed to allow a phased transition to a carbon-neutral fleet, including passenger vehicles, light commercial vehicles and alternative transport opportunities.

The Climate Change Action Plan will be reviewed within a 10-year timeframe.

#### Green light for Esso ORC at Barry Beach

ESSO has received regulatory approval for stage one of its Onshore Reception Centre (ORC) at the Barry Beach Marine Terminal and is now undertaking planning and technical studies for future stages.

Detailed planning activities will be undertaken by Esso and environmental studies to assess the potential environmental impacts and risks associated with the ORC.

Subsea drilling at the Kipper platforms and a drilling campaign from the Marlin complex will now both be completed by  $202\hat{5}$ , along with jack-up rig activities.

Gippsland Basin geophysical and geotechnical investigations will continue across multiple license areas to provide information on plug and abandonment activities, decommissioning, and development and maintenance around existing facilities.

Stage two of transportation and offloading operations will include transportation of structures through Victorian state waters and the subsequent offload and set-down of the decommissioned rigs at Barry Beach Marine Terminal.

Esso is currently developing a Bass Strait Producing Environment Plan, which will detail the risks and impacts associated with the operation and maintenance of producing infrastructure.

A Bass Strait Non-Producing Environment Plan is also being developed, which will detail the risks and impacts associated with non-producing infrastructure in the 'Cessation of Production' or 'Stasis Mode'

Plans are being progressed to remove pipelines from the Bass Strait seabed, including shallow buried umbilicals and flexible flowlines in Commonwealth waters.

Community members and stakeholders have been invited to attend Esso community consultation sessions from 5pm to 7pm at the Foster War Memorial Arts Centre, 79 Main Street, Foster on Tuesday, November 11, and 5pm to 7pm at the Leongatha RSL, Corner Smith Street and Michael Place Leongatha on Wednesday, November 12.

# State Coal Mine upgrade works about to start

THE much-loved State Coal Mine in Wonthaggi is about to get a \$1.5 million shot in the arm with work about to start on the long-awaited \$1.5 million upgrade.

Former coalminers Dan Carr, Reg Wilson and Friends of the State Coal Mine, including George Scott OAM, welcomed the encouraging development.

Parks Victoria CEO Lee Miezis said the upgrade to the main heading shaft at the Wonthaggi State Coal Mine should be completed by April next year.

"Groundwork is expected to start in the next few weeks," said Mr Miezis.

"The contracts for the main heading shaft have been awarded and design work on the drift cart is proceeding.

"We will talk through the designs for the drift cart again later this year."

Shotcrete is to be used in

the main heading shaft to make the tunnel safer, along with rock and cable bolts.

Parks Victoria is now in the process of finalising permits from Heritage Victoria.

"Heritage permits are needed so we do not lose what is special about this site.

"The drift cart needs to be re-engineered to meet modern safety standards."

The mine's tracks, timber sleepers, and ballast for the drift car will be replaced with new concrete sleepers, improved drainage, and a maintenance inspection pit.

Speaking more widely of the work of Parks Victoria, Mr Miezis promised more boots on the ground, and more partnering with local communities.

"It's back to basics," Mr Miezis said.

"We want more people outdoors enjoying our parks.

"To show what makes our

parks so special, including the State Coal Mine."

Mr Miezis said there would be half-price camping this summer in most popular parks, while other State Parks will continue to be free.

Mr Miezis said a top priority was to make sure Parks Victoria rangers can do their

"They're the heart and soul of Parks Victoria, and my role is to make it easier for them.'

President of the Friends of the State Coal Mine, Garry Wilson, said Parks Victoria had given a solid commitment to get the work done.

"We are being kept informed, and timelines have been set.

"It should have been earlier, but the CEO apologised for the time lag.

Programs for young people are mentioned fleetingly but lack substantial detail.

Bass Coast Mayor Cr Rochelle Halstead said the plans would guide decision-making knowledged the community's vital role in shaping them.

"Community feedback shaped everything from the recognition of coastal woodlands to stronger support for agriculture and a focus on local business and

These plans belong to the community as much as they do to council," said Mayor Cr Halstead.

# Speak up for what you believe, vale Jon Trigt

THIS is the first time the Sentinel-Times has published this photo of the late Jon Trigt of Phillip Island being escorted from the September 2023 Bass Coast Shire Council meeting by police.

We didn't print the photo at the time because the 'punishment' of having your picture in the local paper, being carted away by police, didn't seem to fit Jon's 'crime' of interjecting with "shame, shame, shame" after the council narrowly voted to advocate for a yes vote in 'The Voice' referendum.

We needn't have worried.

As we discovered at his funeral, in St John Uniting Church in Cowes on Thursday, it was one of Jon's proudest moments.

As too was the incident in December that year when Jon made a stand against the hare-brained scheme of having just nine chairs for the community in the council chamber, with most people being forced outside, to watch a screen in the foyer.

The council quickly did away with those arrangements as a result.

Jon refused to heed former Mayor Cr Michael Whelan's directive that he depart the chamber of his own volition, but he still managed to make another point on the way out, with the message on his wind-cheater "Every question matters Mayor".

Jon explained the reason for his outburst in one of his many letters to the Sentinel-Times: "Bass Coast ratepayers, are quite capable of making up their own minds, remember they voted you in. For the record, I will be voting YES... While we continue to see the Mayor, Cr Michael Whelan omit to read out eight questions, submitted by ratepayers at this council meeting September 20."

Celebrant at Jon's well-attended funeral on Thursday, Lisa-Anne Prendergast, summed up the contributions during the service made by Jon's son and daughter, Adrian and Judith, and his four grandchildren.



Turns out it was one of the late Jon Trigt's proudest moments, the day he was escorted from the public gallery by police at the September 2023 meeting of the Bass Coast Shire Council, after being booted out by the former Mayor Cr Michael Whelan for saying "shame, shame, shame" when council voted to advocate for a 'Yes' vote in The Voice Referendum. Jon later revealed he was voting 'Yes' anyway, but didn't need to be told what to do by the council.

"As we take a moment to reflect on the stories and the memories that have been shared today, a clear picture of Jon comes into focus of a man who is pragmatic and straight to the point, with a streak of humour that was as dry as it was unintentional.

"He was unpretentious, quietly determined and always guided by a firm sense of what was right, even if it meant challenging the system or the council along the way.

"Jon lived by his own compass. He valued hard work, honesty and a good argument backed by facts. He believed in fairness and had no time for wasting money or words or opportunity. Beneath that nononsense exterior was a generous heart, a curious mind and a deep pride in his family and his community."

Jon Trigt was born Jan Van Trigt on January 31, 1941, the oldest of three children to Jan and Francis Van Trigt in Eindhoven, Holland where he lived before emigrating to Australia with his family in January 1954, living initially, as 320,000 other new arrivals did, at the Bonegilla Migrant Camp in Wodonga, before moving to Richmond.

He left school at age 14 but trained as an instrument maker at Kodak, ultimately working extensively in the mining industry as an engineer, around Australia, and also overseas including in New Zealand, where he met his wife Teresa, a local nurse, PNG, and Iran, with his work often taking him away from home in Warrandyte and his family for up to 12 months at a time.

The couple bought a block of land on Phillip Island in the 1980s with the intention of retiring here, after which Jon also immersed himself in the local community, culminating in a determined run for

council in 2024 with the slogan: "We deserve better, and together we can do better".

As an indication that his passion and persistence made its mark, Jon Trigt was accorded a fine tribute at last week's council meeting in a glowing eulogy by fellow traveller, Cr Ron Bauer, in the presence of Jon's son Adrian, who joined the Mayor and Councillors at the meeting and afterwards for a cup of tea.

Cr Bauer remarked on Jon's willingness to hold council to account and his keen interest in local affairs, not only willing to "talk the talk but also walk the walk" after deciding to stand for council in 2024.

"We stopped seeing him at council meetings when his diabetes and cancer became too much... somehow council meetings will never be the same," said Cr Bauer.

It was a welcome gesture that Jon's son Adrian remarked on at the funeral service.

# Curbing youth crime with proactive policing

NOT feeling safe in your own home is now the single biggest issue raised with police at local Coffee with a Cop sessions on the Bass Coast.

Leading Senior Constable Nick Carlson and Senior Constable Megan Krause from the Wonthaggi Proactive Policing Unit attended the first Coffee with a Cop at Bunnings.

"Machetes and the newly introduced ban on machetes are of particular concern, particularly for farmers," said Leading Senior Constable Carlson.

"Farmers want to know what to do with machetes and firearms."

Machetes can be disposed of in safe disposal bins located outside select police stations across the state, including Wonthaggi during the current machete annesty.

Firearms can be surrendered to police or to registered firearms dealers.

With the recent surge in youth crime showing no signs of abating Leading Senior Constable Carlson reminded local residents to keep car windows and doors locked at all times, and check that doors and windows are locked at home before going to bed.

Sensor lights and cameras can make you feel safer and are helpful for police.

Having spent a number of years in the Bass Coast Proactive Policing Unit (PPU), Leading Senior Constable Carlson said part of the job is managing youth offenders.

"It's a problem for both boys and girls most often around the age of 14," said Nick.

"We need to stop this behaviour."

Leading Senior Constable Carlson said he feared for the safety of the community.

"Kids in stolen cars often film what they are doing to post on social media or steal cars for adult crime gangs."

'Shift the mindset and change the story'. It's an approach based on adventure therapy, according to the Proactive Policing Unit. "It's about getting out into the bush."

Police hope to start the program in Wonthaggi next year, targeting 12 to 15-year-olds.

## Remembering the life of a Chisholm TAFE pioneer

CHISHOLM Institute of TAFE has joined the broader education community in honouring the life and legacy of Virginia Simmons AO, a visionary leader who oversaw the ongoing development of Wonthaggi TAFE.

The first woman to become director of a TAFE institute, Virginia Simmons was appointed CEO of Chisholm TAFE in 2001, just three years after the current Wonthaggi campus was established.

As the longest-serving female CEO of a Victorian TAFE Institute, Virginia led both the Chisholm and Kangan Institutes with distinction, transforming them into inclusive, future-focused institutions that empowered thousands of learners.

Virginia served on numerous economic and education boards, including the Victorian Qualifications Authority (VQA) and International Training Australia (ITA), further shaping policy and

practice at the highest levels.

Contributing to international education development across China, Africa, the Middle East and the Pacific, Virginia helped build skills and industry growth in emerging economies. She worked with a wide range of international agencies, including AusAID, the International Finance Corporation (IFC) of the World Bank, SEAMEO and IDP Education Australia.

At the heart of Virginia's leadership was a deep belief in the power of education to change lives.

One of her proudest achievements was the establishment of the Caroline Chisholm Education Foundation, which continues to support learners facing financial hardship.

Virginia's leadership style was marked by strategic vision, integrity and compassion. She mentored countless professionals across the sector, many of whom now hold senior leadership roles.

Her colleagues remember her as an inspiring mentor and a deeply principled leader.

In a career marked by distinction and dedication, Virginia Simmons AO received some of Australia's highest honours for her contributions to education. She was appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) in 2010.

In 2008, she was awarded the Sir James Darling Medal for outstanding contribution to education and in 2011 she was inducted into the Victorian Honour Roll of Women.

To celebrate her enduring impact, Chisholm Institute established the Virginia Simmons Outstanding Contribution Award in 2024, recognising exceptional leadership and commitment to educational excellence within the vocational sector.

One of these is the Foodcube wicking garden bed. Adrian explains that "The wicking garden beds are essentially water tanks and garden in one. They capture rain and deliver water as plants need it, maintaining ideal soil moisture levels at all times and encouraging rapid and healthy growth. Typical yields are between 10-20 kilograms per m2, depending on how a plot is managed throughout the year"

Enjoying the support of over 80 members, 'The Farm' provides a community hub nestled in the heart of The Cape at Cape Paterson. It is a great place for the local community to gather, learn, share skills and access fresh, organically grown vegetables. The

#### Learn how to save energy and money at Myli Wonthaggi

IF YOU think you're paying too much for electricity, why not drop into Myli Wonthaggi on Wednesday, October 15 at 2pm for some helpful hints on saving energy.

John Godfrey from the Bass Coast Climate Action Network will have some low-cost energy tips, which will save you money by spending very little.

"Small steps add up over time," said John.

"Focus on one thing, get it done and then move on, learn from others."

According to Choice Australia, you have to keep switching between plans at least once or twice a year to keep

paying low prices for energy.

Modern air conditioning split systems should be used for heating.

"They're much more efficient than other forms of heating," said Mr Godfrey.

To prevent warm air from getting cold against the windows, place cardboard, a towel or corflute across the curtain rail to block or slow the air flowing down.

It's best if your curtains extend to the floor and either side of the window if possible.

#### Honouring service, community and legacy as memorial walk prepares for opening

SOUTH Gippsland is preparing to mark an important chapter in its history with the opening of the WWII and History of the Hospital Memorial Walk at Leongatha Memorial Hospital on Monday, October

Developed in partnership with the Leongatha RSL and the Leongatha and District Historical Society, the Memorial Walk will be a permanent indoor installation that honours both those who served abroad and those who carried the work of care at home.

The walk will feature the names, units, and stories of servicemen and women from the former Woorayl Shire, alongside the story of how the region rallied to build the Woorayl District Memorial Hospital in response to community needs. It connects sacrifice and service, showing how remembrance and healthcare have always been interwoven in South Gippsland.

From the Bellingham brothers, who were killed alongside their cousin Albert Kuhne at Gasmata Beach, to Fish Creek nurse Rosetta Wight, who died while serving in Singapore, the Memorial Walk preserves the memory of individuals whose absence was felt in every paddock, pub, and classroom. Alongside them are the stories of doctors, nurses, and auxiliaries who carried the weight of care locally; figures such as Dr Alec Bennett, Matron Jean MacRae, and the Lyrebird Auxiliary, who helped sustain health services for generations.

The Memorial Walk will officially open on Monday, October 20, at 1.30 pm, exactly 77 years to the day since the public meeting at Memorial Hall that first proposed building a hospital for Woorayl Shire.

Kate Ginnivan, transformation and community engagement lead at Gippsland Southern Health Service (GSHS), said the project has been shaped by community input and represents a bridge between

"As we step into the next chapter as part of Bayside Health from January 1, it is vital that we honour the people and stories that brought us here," Ms Ginnivan said.

"The Memorial Walk is not just history on a wall, but a living reminder that care, service, and resilience are the threads that have always bound our community together."

Community members are invited to attend the opening ceremony and walk among the stories.

'The Memorial Walk stands as a tribute to the past, a recognition of the present, and a promise to carry forward the legacy of service and care for future generations," Ms Ginnivan said.

# Eye-opening PARTY program brings trauma reality to Foster students

THE Foster Secondary Year 11 students participated in a PARTY program that teaches teens about the reality of trauma-related death and injury in a hospital-simulated environment.

The Prevent Alcohol and Risk-related Trauma in Youth - or PARTY is a oneday hospital simulation program pitched to kids 15 and over run by Latrobe Regional Health and held at the South Gippsland Hospital.

The program has received funding from The Community Bank Foster and Toora, which enabled it to be delivered free of charge for 2025.

The young people get to spend a day at the South Gippsland Hospital learning what happens in the emergency department, Intensive Care Unit and rehabilitation unit, hearing from a range of emergency and health workers.

The program gives youth a blunt and no-holdsbarred account of trauma and often preventable consequences of risk-taking behaviours. This includes drink driving, wearing seatbelts, unsafe partying,

fighting, or even "death by selfies". It aims to teach kids about taking calculated risks, making safe choices, how to look out for mates, and the importance of calling 000.

LRH Clinical Nurse Specialist and co-PARTY coordinator Janet May said young people in regional Victoria are over-represented in trauma statistics.

"The impacts in smaller regional communities are huge. We aim to teach teenagers who are about to start driving and hit the party scenes, that it can happen to them, and the flow on effect to their families, friends and community is huge. If we can save one life, it's worth it," she said.

The program delivers heartbreaking personal accounts from trauma survivors and the impact on their families and communities.

Local community emergency services (CFA Fish Creek Rescue, CFA Toora, Bass Coast Pro-Active Police Unit, and Foster Ambulance) all attended for the day and presented to students the impacts of road trauma and making good choices.

Olivia Hughes, year 11 student, said, "that hearing from a real-life trauma survivor Jacob Fry and hearing how it impacted him physically and emotionally, was confronting".

#### Shane Warne Legacy Health Check is back in Leongatha

FROM October 13 to 27, previously took the test the Shane Warne Legacy Health Check is available at Leongatha RSL during opening hours.

Following a tremendous response to the free Health Checks in May of this year, the Leongatha RSL have once again sponsored these important health checks as part of the Club's Community Connection Program.

The checks are free of charge and will take about four minutes to complete.

The checks cover such things as blood pressure, heart rate, body fat percentage, height, weight and BMI. The Health Check console then produces a report based on the information gathered to give you a snapshot of your current health situation.

"We were very surprised and excited by the number of people that took up the Health Check opportunity in May," said Greg Nugent, General Manager of Leongatha RSL, "so much so that we have decided to place the machine in the Club so that people who missed out before can take advantage of the opportunity this time. It is also a great opportunity for people who

to recheck on how things are going with the overall heart health."

A snapshot of Leongatha's heart health after the machines' first visit, where 55 per cent of participants were female and 45 per cent male, with a median age of 60.

Key findings included:

- High blood pressure: 23.7 per cent
- BMI over 30: 41.2 per cent
- Smokers: 7.7 per cent
- Predicted type 2 diabetes cases (next 5 years): 15 individuals (6.1 per cent)
- GP follow-up recommended: 90 participants
- No blood pressure check in the past year: 128 individuals

The availability of this machine to the Leongatha and surrounds community is in line with Leongatha RSL's Community Connections program, and they look forward to residents, young and old, taking advantage of the service. The previous results showed a number of interesting results across all demographics, so even if you call in to check your current status for peace of mind, it will be four minutes well spent.

#### Forecasting boost ahead of thunderstorm asthma season

FAMILIES around Gippsland can find some relief this thunderstorm asthma season, with a new automated pollen counter in place at Federation University in Churchill.

The new Churchill automated pollen counter is one of six across the state, providing data on the enhanced grass pollen and epidemic thunderstorm asthma risk throughout Gippsland.

The system combines weather data alongside the grass pollen counts to determine the risk of an epidemic asthma thunderstorm. During Victoria's grass pollen season, October 1 until December 31, alerts on the risk of an asthmatic thunderstorm asthma will be issued daily via the VicEmergency app.

The purpose of this system is to help families, communities, health and emergency services to be better prepared and lower the chance of health risks during asthmatic season.

This modernised network has been made possible by the funding provided by Australian Government's Disaster Ready Fund and the Victorian Government.

"In the past, we were relying on day-old data and manual counting methods. With automation, we can now monitor pollen in a timelier way, giving a clearer picture of risk," said Dr Edwin Lampugnani, AirHealth Chief Executive Officer, whose team is operating these pollen counters.

Detrimental asthmatic thunderstorms can be triggered by the high grass pollen levels. As strong winds make pollen burst and the tiny pollen particles get carried for long distances and can be inhale into the lungs.

Severe asthma symptoms can be a health risk to those 25 per cent of Australians who suffer from hay fever. Gippsland's Region Public Health Director Dr Alyce Wilson urges people at risk to stay up to date with the pollen forecasts.

"I encourage everyone to check the epidemic thunderstorm asthma forecast daily on the VicEmergency website or app and set up a watch so they can receive alerts and up to date advice and warnings.

Ten people lost their lives during the 2016 epidemic thunderstorm asthma event that spanned across Victoria, with more than 3500 emergency departments involved.

"People should also avoid exposure to storms, especially the wind gusts that come before them. During these periods they should go indoors, close windows and doors, and turn off air conditioners that draw in air from outside.

"People should also follow their asthma action plans or hay fever treatment plans, use preventive medication as directed, and make sure they know asthma first aid."

# GSHS strengthens local care, close to home

The presentation highlighted the 57 per cent growth in Urgent Care Centre presentations at Leongatha Memorial Hospital over the past year, a clear indication that more residents are choosing local care over travelling further afield.

Services such as breast screening and cardiac CT now support faster diagnosis and treatment, with results closely integrated into inpatient and community care. Meanwhile, aged care facilities like Koorooman House have completed major capital works and care redesign, led by a newly appointed Nurse Unit Manager and Director of Nursing focused on care of older people and a warm, community atmosphere.

The revitalised Volunteer Program, led by Vicki Riley, now brings together 35 active volunteers across residential aged care, pet therapy, transport, and gardening. A new partnership with Leongatha Secondary College has even seen students and volunteers work side by side on the Maternity Garden project - bridging generations and building community pride.

'Volunteers are the quiet strength of our health service," Ms Sparkes said, encouraging more community members to get involved with the support of Vicki to onboard and provide ongoing support.

When the floor opened for questions, Probus members shared heartfelt reflections on their own experiences with GSHS.

One member said, "Both my husband and I received emergency care at Leongatha and couldn't speak more highly of the staff; they were so caring and reassuring."

Another added, "The reception staff are exceptional. We're so grateful for the access to these services locally. They really matter to us."

Ms Sparkes concluded by reaffirming that the upcoming merger with Bayside Health is designed to strengthen, not replace, local care. "This is about collaboration, not competition," she said.

#### Phillip Island Rotarians advance Timor-Leste Clean Water Project

MEMBERS of the Rotary Club of Phillip Island and San Remo have returned from a humanitarian trip to Timor-Leste, where they worked with Disaster Aid Australia and Rotary Projects Timor-Leste East to expand a life-changing clean water program.

During the visit, the volunteers helped install and audit ultra-filtration clean water systems in schools and communities and met with Timor-Leste's Minister for Education. That high-level meeting is expected to yield a joint commitment to roll out these safe water units across government schools, greatly widening the project's reach.

Over the past eight years, the Rotary-led initiative has installed 34 ultra-filtration systems across Timor-Leste, now providing access to safe drinking water for an estimated 44,000 students.

Recent audits confirmed that all units are in excellent working condition - notably, even the first system deployed in the country about eight years ago remains fully functional. This durability is a testament to the technology's robustness and the Rotary team's diligent maintenance efforts.

These ultra-filtration systems are innovative, gravityfed water filters that use advanced membranes to remove

99.9999 per cent of water- brings environmental benefits needing electricity or chemicals, enough to meet the daily needs of a school or village. This access to clean water has sharply reduced waterborne illnesses and improved day-today life and school attendance for students, who can now drink safely on site rather than fetching or boiling water.

Importantly, ready access to plentiful drinking water has another direct impact on classroom performance, as students are less likely to fall asleep in class due to dehydration in Timor's very hot tropical climate. The shift also

borne contaminants. Each by curbing reliance on purunit can purify up to 10,000 chased water in disposable litres of water a day without plastic bottles, or using wood fires to boil water, reducing both plastic pollution and deforestation.

The local Rotary contingent's meeting with the education minister is aimed at extending the clean water program into many more state-run schools, potentially benefiting thousands more children soon.

This project highlights what a small community-driven team can accomplish on the global stage. The Phillip Island and San Remo Rotarians – all volunteers – together with many Rotary clubs around Australia, have poured time and resources into improving lives abroad, in partnership with Timorese communities.

"It's a fantastic project simple, sustainable technology that's truly life-changing,' said Rotary Phillip Island and San Remo spokesperson Duncan Hedditch.

"Once a system is installed, the local community maintains it, and it just keeps giving clean water year after year."

The club's ongoing commitment, from fundraising at home to hands-on work in the field, reflects Rotary's ethos of "Service Above Self" and the power of a local initiative making a worldwide

# The secret world of Freemasonry a myth

AS SOCIETY changes the essence of Freemasonry remains the same, according to the Woolamai Daylight Masonic Lodge based in Wonthaggi.

How old is your grandmother was once a question attributed to Freemasons seeking to identify another Freemason. The answer for Wonthaggi would have been 661, which is the official number of the Powlett Lodge at 17 Edgar Street in Wonthaggi or 277 for the Woolamai Daylight Lodge.

"It was never a secret," according to Freemason Ken Barnes

The exclusive use of a handshake or Freemason's hand grip, however, remains a tightly guarded secret and is still used by Freemasons to identify each other worldwide.

With historical origins going back to medieval stonemason guilds, Freemasonry has evolved to a worldwide fraternity active in every civilised society.

Freemasonry boasts 7000 members statewide, including several hundred Gippsland members in 24 Freemasons Lodges extending from Koo Wee Rup to Orbost.

Among Gippsland's first Masonic Lodges was the Walhalla Freemasons Lodge, number 69, dating back to 1876, and Sale Freemasons Lodge, number 51, established in 1924.

According to Ken Barnes, Freemasonry is an invaluable fraternity of men, although there are also women's Freemason Lodges in Melbourne.

"We look for men of mature age with good report and highest morals," said Ken.

"The selection process remains rigorous and new members are always welcome.

"We accept men of any race, religion, colour or creed."

New members are recruited in one of two ways: either by personal introduction by another member or a friend

who can vouch for the new

who can vouch for the new member, or by an application online through Freemasons Victoria.

"Four references are required in addition to a police check," said Mr Barnes.

Meetings are held once a month in a formal meeting space with wardens and junior wardens assembled around symbolic squares and compasses, the squares representing good and bad, and the compasses symbolising moral boundaries.

Together, the symbols are said to be a reminder for Masons to lead a balanced life.

Visitors from other Lodges are welcome at meetings. The work of a meeting can involve introducing a new member, or a lecture from a member of the Lodge or visiting speaker.

Local Freemasons have always been active in charity work, including assisting with the recent purchase of a learner driver car for the Bass Coast L2P program.

Powlett Lodge also raised \$50,000 for Armitage House at Wonthaggi Hospital.

Ken Barnes said Freemasons Victoria is one of the state's largest fundraisers and raised over \$130,000 for young people experiencing homelessness through 'Sleep at the G'.

"Freemasonry is a world-wide fraternity of men who believe in the principles of equality and charitable acts. It is one of the few remaining organisations that honour and respect religious, cultural and political diversity.

#### You can say 'I told you so'

THE decision to direct all funds towards the Wonthaggi Aquatic Centre does not solve an important issue; Cowes residents travel over 20 minutes to an aquatic centre, and for the population, is the second top of the list for this issue in Australia by population size (Royal Life Saving Australia 'State of Australian Aquatic Facilities 2025' report).

The council agenda states: "An independent review of the Bass Coast Aquatic Centre Concept Masterplan and Feasibility Study was completed and provides a rescoped concept master plan for the redevelopment of the existing facility. Findings of the review

(1.) The adopted master plan costs have increased 100 per cent since 2021, making the current concept master plan unafford-

Someone in the council needs to explain that statement as it makes no sense. Construction for commercial projects costs do not double in less than five years. Someone has got their sums wrong there.

It should be noted that private swim school operators are reporting a reduction in build costs over the same period. It would be prudent to check the track record of companies who are providing these estimates as to whether they can control costs and have a track record on completing projects on time.

"Additionally, the current economic environment creates funding challenges for the existing Bass Coast Aquatic Centre concept masterplan.'

In plain English, the council does not have enough money to complete this project.

More councils are discovering the worth of 'peer reviews' for aquatic centre new builds and upgrades. This is vital for regional councils who may only have one aquatic centre. Larger councils own up to 22 aquatic centres, so comparing centres against others they own is standard practice.

Peer reviewing is the process of a second design team reviewing the work of the designer who the council has engaged. Engaging a design team does not guarantee a optimal result.

And feel free to add in "I told you so" re not having the money to build a pool on the Island. Big dreams with no budget equals disappointment all round.

At least the council have the courtesy of telling everyone what they intend to do with ratepayers' money.

THE Bass Coast Shire Council's Annual Report, to be tabled for adoption at this week's council meeting, is reporting success with one of council's key performance indicators, increasing the amount of new social and affordable housing facilitated within Bass Coast in the past year.

It's good to hear.

In answer to a recent Community Question from local resident, Fred Morris, about the number of social and affordable housing contracts signed by council in the past three years, after the State Government provided \$25 million to Bass Coast, the shire's CEO Greg Box rightly pointed out that the council doesn't get that money, nor does it built social housing itself.

But it can do plenty to make housing approval, in general, easier and also to support the process of opening up new social and affordable housing in particular.

"The program is entirely managed by Homes Victoria. Council facilitates social housing outcomes through advocacy, leveraging the Planning Scheme, and contribution of Council land," said Mr Box on behalf of the council.

"Bass Coast has signed contracts to contribute land for two funded social housing developments. Council works closely with community stakeholders, Community Housing Providers and the Victorian Government to maximise investment through the Big Housing Build. At present, 12 homes have been completed with 56 more underway, representing a total investment of \$37.5 million."

It's a good start, but there's still much

According to the shire's 'Engage Bass Coast' website, this area is experiencing a crisis in housing affordability and availability with tight vacancy rates placing significant pressure on local communities.

This will only increase over the summer months.

"Our residents experience both mortgage and rental stress at rates higher than the Gippsland and Regional Victoria average, with more than a third of renters in stress. The affordability crisis is starkly illustrated by the fact that, in the 12 months to June 2023, only 1.2 per cent of all housing sold was affordable to low-income households, compared to almost 10 per cent in June 2020.

"There are currently 672 households in our shire with an unmet need for affordable housing, and over 1100 people on the Victorian Housing Register waitlist seeking housing in Bass Cast. Council's Affordable Housing Strategy provides a platform for partnerships with State and Federal Government to boost supply of social and affordable

So more, much more needs to be done, and while a lot of council's oxygen in recent months has been devoted to planning initiatives, which is fair enough, it's time to refocus on one of the key problems facing this community, an issue that is one of the main contributors to stress, dislocation and ultimately a driver of crime.

On that score, it's good to see the extensive focus given to the availability and affordability of housing in the shire's new 'Healthy, Safe and Resilient Bass Coast' plan, also being tabled for adoption at this week's council meet-

"Partnerships strengthen our collective ability to address the full spectrum of health and wellbeing, housing, infrastructure, social connection, education, economic opportunity, and the environment. A strong example is our Housing Strategy, developed through collaboration with those who bring expertise in housing, infrastructure and community support... this collaborative approach reflects our commitment to understanding the ways that health, housing, education, income, culture and environment intersect," says the plan in part.

OK, so we understand the problem and have made some inroads into addressing it but it's time to set aside the outside noise and make a real impact on housing in Bass Coast over the next 12 months by adjusting policy settings, activating those partnerships and advocacy efforts, encouraging those with approvals to get on with it, and generally making it easier for those who want to build.

And let's see some regular, comprehensive reporting about what the shire and the sector is doing, and what they're building... "if you don't measure it, you can't manage it!"

# Chloe Wade, a finalist in this year's Victorian Education Excellence Awards

OUTSTANDING teachers and schools are being celebrated for their innovation and excellence, with finalists being announced for this year's Victorian Education Excellence Awards.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Education Ben Carroll congratulated the 41 finalists across 14 award categories, which recognise inspirational teachers, principals, and education support staff making a difference to the lives of students in Victorian government schools.

One of this year's finalists includes Chloe Wade, a teacher from Welshpool and District Primary School, who has improved student literacy and numeracy using data-driven and evidence-based practices. She also supports staff with disability inclusion, helping them to develop and refine individual learning plans for students with disability.

This is Chloe's fifth year in teaching after graduating from Federation University, and the award nomination is for the Early Education Career – recognising new teachers and their outstanding efforts.

When Chloe first started teaching, the school had begun a new phonics program in 2021 called Sounds Right. The program involved training for staff and has shown significant progress in student literacy.

Chloe is a Prep/Grade One teacher and said it's the teaching of all the sounds, and how to use those sounds to decode words. Chloe is also a mentor to two other teachers in grades two, three and four, five and six.

"I've helped these teachers implement the program, and we've seen great results," she said.

"As you move through higher

levels, the phonics program is obviously more challenging, for example, we're teaching three sounds; for instance, a trigraph together to make one sound," she said.

"Since implementing this program, we've continued to develop it, and it helps massively with spelling. The students are learning the sounds and then learning to write them, so this skill transfers across into their writing as well."

With the numeracy program, Chloe said Welshpool and District Primary School has implemented a whole-school maths program.

"We have all the students together as a whole, and then we group them by their abilities. We then work across the school with all the different year levels.

"This was implemented as when we returned from COVID, we noticed many gaps in the students' learning, and since implementing it, we've seen phenomenal growth across all levels."

Judging panels for the education awards will determine the winners of each category, who will be announced at a ceremony on Friday, October 24, a week before World Teachers' Day.

The awards also support the continued professional development of staff, with professional learning grants of \$20,000 available for each individual award winner, and \$25,000 for each team award.




Depending on how many you are serving, you can buy a whole 259 gm ricotta or a large one - even a chunk will do if the numbers are

You will need olive oil, pepper, fresh herbs (e.g. lemon and/or silver thyme and rosemary), black olives, and sun-dried tomato strips, which are a great addition.

Oil an oven pan, place the ricotta on the oil and sprinkle all the ingredients you like over and around, then top with pepper and some more oil (sun-dried tomato or olive

Bake at 180°C for 20 minutes, with the oven grill for the last 10 to 15 minutes to get a golden top.

#### John Cranko and the Stuttgart Ballet grace The Union's screen

CINEMA and dance fans in Bass Coast will soon have the chance to see the story of the gifted and charismatic choreographer John Cranko on the big screen.







# **Busy Store Sale sees strong prices as charity takes spotlight**

Store Sale was high on quality with the heifer section performing strongest.

Approximately 3800 cattle were available, SEJ's Jimmy Kyle describing it as "an exceptional yarding from start to finish".

That was attributable to annual consignments of large runs of cattle, particularly from East Gippsland, Jimmy pointing out there weren't many "bits and pieces" across the yarding, with mostly whole pens of highquality cattle being sold, keeping the auction flowing.

He suggested the market overall may have eased a touch compared to recent

"Seasonal conditions, not so much in South Gippsland, but elsewhere in Victoria and NSW probably play a part on every market throughout every state," Jimmy said.

While it was mostly the usual buyers, there were a couple of new ones from Western Victoria.

Commission buyers Campbell Ross and Anthony Hullick were again busy.

SEJ attracted strong prices for various heifer breeds. A pen of 13 Angus heifers from Woodside's M. Belcher went for \$4.84 a kilo, weighing an average of 326 kilos and selling for \$1580 each.

Twelve Angus heifers from C. Stafford in Nayook made \$4.63 per kilo, weighing an average of 360 kilos and attracting \$1670 a head.

Angus heifers from Argent & Walker in Glen Forbes also performed strongly, making up to \$4.60 a kilo, that being

for cattle weighing an average of 395 kilos.

Seven Charolais heifers from J & J Malberg, also in Glen Forbes, sold for \$1410 per head, weighing an average of 303 kilos, equating to \$4.65 per kilo.

Eight Red Angus heifers from Strzelecki Red in Yinnar South made \$4.54 per kilo, weighing an average of 385 kilos and selling for \$1750 each, while 18 Hereford heifers from L & S Marriott in Tarwin Lower went for \$1380 each, with a weight average of 310 kilos, making \$4.45 per kilo.

Like Jimmy of SEJ, Meat & Livestock Australia Market Reporter Brendan Fletcher noted the improved overall quality at Thursday's Store Sale, reporting "more straight-bred cattle fewer dairy cattle and their crosses".

"Results were very mixed with heavy Angus steers selling firm, while crossbred and coloured cattle with weight eased around \$100 a head; weaner steers eased around \$100 a head for most categories," Brendan said.

He also shared Jimmy's views on the performance of

"Heifers sold firm in some places and up to \$100 a head dearer, with most categories in the black," Brendan said.

While there was plenty of Store Sale action, that wasn't the key event at Leongatha VLE on Thursday.

"The highlight for us was the charity auction we had for young Jenson Park, to see the community rally together and raise up to \$30,000 for a 10-month-old boy who's got a rare brain cancer," Jimmy remarked, SEJ having teamed up with Nutrien to conduct the auction.

Former Geelong footballer and now Nutrien livestock agent Tom Hawkins was there lending his support to the cause.

### Keep soil in place when your paddocks are bare

MAINTENANCE is the key to reducing soil and sediment movement in paddocks.

While spring rain is valuable for pastures and replenishing farm dams, run off may also carry sediment into livestock dams, particularly where there is exposed soil in heavily grazed paddocks.

Hay bales or netting held together with steel posts or stakes to control sediment flow into dams can be a good starting point. Although the cost of hay and the hazard of steel posts should be considered. Coir logs are a potential alternative to hav bales.

Fibreglass posts and construction site hazard fencing (barrier mesh) are another, often safer option.

Using 20 metres of barrier mesh and four fibreglass posts upstream of a dam is both highly visible and relatively low cost, at around \$85 per site.

Aim for mesh openings that are no smaller than 100mm square.

Smaller openings will block up with debris too quickly and the fence will fail.

It is also important to remove stakes or mesh once the risk of sedimentation has reduced to avoid debris buildup.

Building earthen banks to protect areas from sedimentation usually requires survey design, knowledge of soil type and risks, suitable equipment, and expertise to successfully construct. A good understanding of catchment size and potential water volumes is necessary to avoid failure.

Road and track maintenance is also important.

Annual maintenance with a slight camber in the road surface to shed water to the side with the shortest distance possible will help to prevent wheel tracks from developing into drains and washing out the track surface. Culverts and side drains should also be cleaned annually to prevent blockages and water from being redirected to less suitable discharge areas.

130,000 checklists and logged more than 4.1 million birds across the country using the free Aussie Bird Count app.

Bold, adaptable species, the Rainbow Lorikeet, Noisy Miner and Australian Magpie again topped the charts.

Will they swoop in for the top three once more in 2025?

You can go out and count as many times as you like during Bird Week, as long as each count lasts 20 minutes and is submitted separately.

With more than a decade of data, the Aussie Bird Count results can provide BirdLife trends in urban bird populations, contributing to a dataset that helps to guide future awareness campaigns, conservation priorities and community education.

### Melbourne Water grants enhance Landcare projects

MELBOURNE Water is proud to deliver over half a million dollars to support Landcare groups and networks restoring, enhancing and protecting our local environment.

In the 2025 funding round, 32 organisations will receive Landcare Grants of up to \$20,000 to improve biodiversity, restore habitats and promote community development, partnership and educational opportunities with grants totalling over \$145,000 awarded to environmental conservation groups across the Bass electorate. A further 83 groups will each receive a \$500 support grant to cover administra-

tion and running costs.
"At Melbourne Water, safeguarding our water, land and biodiversity is at the heart of who we are," said Melbourne Water regional Landcare coordinator, Barry Ken-

"Protecting and revitalising our waterways, wetlands, parks and ranges is critical as they face increasing pressures from climate change and population growth.

"That's why we're proud to administer these grants on behalf of the Victorian Government to Landcare groups doing such vital work on the ground. From partnering on projects to providing support via grants and training, together we're ensuring the health of the environment now and for generations to come.'

In 2025, \$514,750 has been allocated to groups across the Melbourne Water region to empower grassroots action and sustain vital environmental projects. Some of the successful organisations picking up the grants include Landcare groups, Landcare networks, registered Aboriginal parties, Friends of groups and committees of

This includes the Bass Valley Landcare Group, awarded \$20,000 to partner with landholders to fence and revegetate gullies and waterways with indigenous plants. Working with the Bass Valley Primary School and local volunteers, they will host planting days to create habitat for threatened species, including the swamp antechinus, southern toadlet and southern brown bandicoot.

Phillip Island Landcare awarded \$20,000 for the seascape to landscape links and new directions, which will see them collaborate with landholders and the Bunurong Land Council to plant 3000 indigenous plants in endangered Swamp Scrub, install wallaby-proof fencing, and host a community planning session to guide future landscape restora-

Bass Coast Landcare Group were awarded \$20,000 towards community learning - seed, collecting, sowing, growing and planting at Bass River Garden and Arboretum.

South Gippsland Landcare Network (SGLN) were successful in receiving \$20,000 for plants, bikes and bugs -

bringing Landcare to the people project. Kirby Leary of SGLN said plants, bikes and bugs are one of eight Victorian Landcare Grants received by groups within South Gippsland Landcare Network (SGLN) and the network itself.

"It aims to engage a diverse range of community members to interact and learn about the natural environment," said Kirby.

"In addition, through this funding, SGLN will partner with BugBlitz and local primary schools to deliver events that will delight and inspire future Land carers through hands-on, field-based environmental education. This funding will also contribute to further planting and improvements to biodiversity on the Great South Rail Trail for the entire community to enjoy."

Gippsland Threatened Species Action Group will enhance habitat for threatened species, including the Growling Grass Frog and Lace Monitor, by constructing and revegetating new wetlands and undertaking infill planting to strengthen existing woodland habitat.

South Gippsland Conservation Society, in partnership with Bunurong Land Council and BCLN, will create and restore 5.8 hectares of habitat to support Lace Goannas and Blue-winged Parrots, with strong community involvement through planting days.

Anderson Inlet Landcare Group will establish wildlife corridors and biolinks by planting 4500 native plants, erecting stock-proof fencing, and undertaking weed control across three key sites with their grant of \$20,000; while 3 Creeks Landcare Group will protect and restore four waterways by installing fencing and revegetating four hectares with 8700 indigenous plants, improving soil stability, water quality, and habitat for local wild-

"These grants recognise the incredible work of our local Landcare groups, who are restoring habitats and waterways through revegetation, habitat creation, weed control, and fencing," Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale said.

"They're also engaging and educating the community, building the skills we need to strengthen both our environment and the community connections that

The Western Port Biosphere Reserve, Loch-Nyora Landcare Group, Poowong-Triholm Landcare Group, French Island Landcare Group Inc. and Powlett Project Landcare Group were all successful in receiving \$500 for administrative works.

Melbourne Water administers the Port Phillip and Westernport region program of Landcare Grants, funded by the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) and delivered through Victoria's ten catchment management authorities.

### Learn to grow multispecies pastures in South Gippsland

FARMERS in South Gippsland are invited to join South Gippsland Landcare Network's Multispecies Coaching program, with the third year about to start. Expressions of interest are currently being sought for new participants to join the over 50 farmers already involved.

The program includes two workshops (with farm visits) where multispecies specialist Jade Killoran will support farmers to develop a plan to trial multispecies on their farm.

The first will be held on Tuesday, October 28, in Meeniyan, and the second in February/March 2026. There will also be three online meetings to compare results and ask further questions.

Participants will become part of a growing community of farmers from rounds one and two and will also be able to compare notes and support each other via an online chat group. Jade Killoran is a cover cropping researcher and specialist with 12 years of experience in the Victorian high rainfall zone. She'll cover what, when and why for multispecies forages (including what feed gap to cover), sourcing seed and paddock preparation, and plant role and function. Also, how to identify common multispecies, fertiliser and grazing basics for multispecies crops, tools for monitoring, and how to plan your own multispecies pastures.



### **Bair Street Buzzing from Biketoberfest**

LEONGATHA'S Bair Street was packed on Saturday, October 11, as the town once again hosted Biketoberfest Leongatha 2025, a celebration for motorbike lovers and petrolheads alike that continues to grow every year.

More than 2000 people turned out to enjoy the free, family-friendly event, which transformed Bair Street into a chrome and leather sea. Motorbikes of every shape and size lined the street, while live music, community stalls, and the scent of food from local cafés and food vans filled the air.

One of the highlights was the trials riding demonstrations, where professional riders thrilled the crowd with their daring stunts, leaping over cars, balancing on obstacles, and manoeuvring their bikes in ways that seemed to defy physics.

Committee member Cherie Pritchett said the event, which coincides with Motorcyclist Awareness Month, had reached new heights this year.

"This has been our best year ever," she said.

"We've had 430 motorbikes

come through, and we actually had to close Bair Street parking because we were at capacity. We've been close to that before, but this is the first time it's ever happened."

Ms Pritchett said Biketoberfest was about more than just the bikes.

"The purpose of the event is to raise awareness for motorbike safety and to raise money for mental health," she said.

"We work alongside Black Dog Ride, who do wonderful things for the community around mental health, and we try to raise money for them during the day."

Black Dog Ride is an Australia-wide initiative that promotes awareness of depression and suicide prevention, a cause that has resonated deeply within the riding community.

According to Ms Pritchett, community support has been a major part of Biketoberfest's success.

"The community support has been fantastic," she said.

"Everyone has been on board, and the event just keeps getting bigger and bigger."

The idea for the festival first came about during the COVID lockdowns, when organisers were looking for a way to reignite community life in Leongatha.

They had just completed the refurbishment of Bair Street, so we thought why not hold an event here," Ms Pritchett said.

"Our aim was to fill up Bair Street with motorbikes, and we'd done that by 11am."

Among the many visitors who made the trip to Leongatha was Ross Millar, who rode down from Park Orchards in Melbourne's east on his 2021 Indian Roadmaster Jack Daniels Edition: one of only 107 ever made.

"It was social media that drew us here," he said.

"We read about Biketoberfest and all the different types of bikes, from Harleys to sports bikes. The highlight for me has been looking at all the bikes and talking to some great people."

As engines roared and music played through the afternoon, Biketoberfest once again cemented itself on Leongatha's community calendar.




